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Dems' division, emails roil party

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Democrats who gleefully jeered Republican divisions last week awoke to a political mess of their own making Monday as party unity behind Hillary Clinton proved much harder to secure.

Gathering for their convention in Philadelphia, Democrats struggled to shake lingering bitterness among supporters of defeated rival

Bernie Sanders and dealt with the aftermath of a leadership shakeup at the top.

The party announced Monday it would kick off its fourday spectacle with speeches from some of its most popular figures. Massachusetts Sen. Elizabeth Warren, a progressive favorite, would deliver convention keynote. Sanders and first lady Michelle Obama will also take

The kickoff lineup had long been intended to appeal to the party's restive liberal wing, but that task has become unexpectedly urgent. A trove of embarrassing leaked emails some said reveal an anti-Sanders bias at the supposedly neutral Democratic National Committee has ripped open some barely-heeled primary wounds.

It was unclear whether the resignation Sunday of party chief Debbie Wasserman Schultz would be enough to unite the party behind Hillary Clinton. How the emails were stolen

hasn't been confirmed, but the Clinton campaign pointed the finger at Russian hack-"There is a consensus among

experts that it is indeed Rus-

sia that is behind this hack of the DNC," Clinton campaign spokesman Brian Fallon told CNN Monday morning, arguing Russia was trying to influence the outcome of the U.S. election.

Trump dismissed the suggestion in a tweet: "The joke in town is that Russia leaked the disastrous DNC e-mails,

Gas prices fall in Texas, nation

Average retail gasoline prices in Texas have fallen 2.8 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$2.00/g yesterday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 gas outlets in Texas. This compares with the national average that has fallen 4.5 cents per gallon in the last week to \$2.15/g, according to gasoline price website GasBuddy.com.

Including the change in gas prices in Texas during the past week, prices yesterday were 50.7 cents per gallon lower than the same day one year ago and are 11.9 cents per gallon lower than a month ago. The na-

tional average has decreased 15.7 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 56.6 cents per gallon lower than this day one year ago. According to GasBuddy his-

torical data, gasoline prices on July 25 in Texas have ranged widely over the last five years: \$2.50/g in 2015, \$3.40/g

2014, in in \$3.54/g 2013, \$3.35/g in 2012 and \$3.61/g 2011. Areas near-

by Texas and their current gas price climate: Midland Odessa, \$2.03/g, down 3.7 cents per

gallon from last week's \$2.07/g: San Antonio, \$1.99/g, down 2.4 cents per gallon from last week's \$2.01/g; Austin, \$2.02/g, down 1.6 cents per gallon from last week's \$2.04/g.

"As air temperatures across the country rise to sweltering levels, gas prices have continued to cool," said Patrick DeHaan, senior petroleum analyst for GasBuddy. "Not only are gas prices nationally at their lowest level of the summer, but they have continued to decline as the glut of oil and refined products has persisted. Almost every state saw a decline in gasoline prices versus last week, thanks to crude oil prices approaching their lowest level of the summer.'

"I foresee that excluding a major hurricane or other disruption, we are very likely to see many more states with average prices falling under \$2 per gallon by Halloween. Truth be told, however, that really isn't a far stretch considering two out of 5 stations nationally and 11 states are already there," DeHaan

Budget on tap for city council meeting Tuesday

Big Spring City Council members will get their first look at the proposed municipal budget for the coming fiscal year when they meet at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday in council chambers, located at 307 E. Fourth St.

Working off input received from the council earlier this year, City Manager Todd Darden will relay proposed budget details during the meeting. And if Darden and his staff follows that input, the new budget will

be very no-frills in nature. Financial realities point to a leaner-than-usual budget for the coming fiscal year. For starters, the city is expected to see a \$50 million drop in taxable values from the previous fiscal year, and, on top of that, officials are expecting to see a decrease in



sales tax revenue, as well. To make financial matters even worse, one of the city's top taxpayers, Western Containers, is expected to close its doors within the next three months.

"There's no doubt we'll have to be more creative in the coming fiscal year," Darden said. "It's going to be quite a challenge for the staff to present a balanced budget." In fact, the city is facing an operating budget shortfall of approximately \$280,000, he added.

Despite these budgetary constraints, however, council members made it clear that they would prefer to keep spending money, even at a reduced rate, on the city's infrastructure needs, most notably in streets and water and wastewater lines.

"It's going to be a challenge that I hope we don't back down from," District 4 Councilman Steve Waggoner said. "Especially when you're talking about infrastructure, the more you put it off, the more you'll have to do in the future."

Mayor Larry McLellan echoed Waggoner's comments.

"I believe infrastructure needs to be our top priority," he said. "We have to keep chipping away at streets, water lines and wastewater lines ... Let's move forward to make Big Spring a better place to live. Maybe we'll be taking baby steps for the next few years, but at least we'll be moving forward."

The budget and tax rate will not be formally approved until September.



Authorities: 2 killed, 17 shot at Florida nightclub

FORT MYERS, Fla. (AP) — Two people have been killed and more than a dozen shot at a nightclub in Fort Myers, Florida, authorities said.

As many as 17 people have been shot in the early Monday shooting at Club Blu, police Capt. Jim Mulligan said.

Three people have been taken into custody and there are two active crime scenes, Mulligan said.

The area was later deemed safe, but Mulligan said a street was still closed as authorities investigated.

In a statement, authorities said the Fort Myers police and the Lee County Sheriff's Office were "actively canvassing the area looking for other persons who may be involved in this incident."

Germany: Syrian asylum seeker blows himself up

ANSBACH, Germany (AP) - Afailed asylum-seeker from Syria blew himself up and wounded 12 people after being turned away from an open-air music festival in southern Germany in what officials said Monday may have been a suicide bombing. It was the fourth attack to shake Germany in a week three of them carried out by recent immigrants.

The 27-year-old blew himself up at a bar shortly after 10 p.m. (2000 GMT), having been turned away from an open-air music festival in the southern town of Ansbach because he didn't have a ticket.

Roman Fertinger, the deputy police chief in nearby Nueremberg, said it was likely there would have been more casualties if the man had managed to enter the concert venue.

Three of the 12 victims suffered serious injuries in the blast. The attacker's rucksack had contained sharp bits of metal.

"My personal view is that I unfortunately think it's very likely this really was an Islamist suicide attack," Bavarian interior minister Joachim Herrmann told German news agency

Iraq finally bans fake bomb detectors after July 3 blast

BAGHDAD (AP) — For nearly a de-

cade, anyone driving through one of Baghdad's many checkpoints was subjected to a search by a soldier pointing a security wand at their vehicle and watching the device intently to see if its antenna moved. If it pointed at the car, it had supposedly detected a possible bomb.

The wands were completely bogus. It had been proven years ago, even before 2013 when two British men were convicted in separate trials on fraud charges for selling the detectors. The devices, sold under various names for thousands of dollars each, apparently were based on a product that sold for about \$20 and claimed to find golf

Yet the Iraqi government continued to use the devices, spending nearly \$60 million on them despite warnings by U.S. military commanders and the wands' proven failure to stop neardaily bombings in Baghdad.

It took a massive suicide bombing that killed almost 300 people in Baghdad on July 3 — the deadliest single attack in the capital in 13 years of war — for Prime Minister Haider al-Abadi to finally ban their use.

The reason it took so long is likely the widespread corruption in the government. Iraqis mocked the device from the start, joking that too much aftershave could set off the antenna.

'Pokemon Go' players

stumble on hidden history

PROVIDENCE, R.I. (AP) — Historical markers have long dotted the landscape, often barely noticed by passersby — until they became treasure-filled stops this month on the "Pokemon Go" trail.

Players hunting for fictional creatures on their smartphones are now visiting real-life memorial plaques, statues, mosaics and landmarks, ranging from a Civil War battlefield in Chancellorsville, Virginia, to a Hells Angels clubhouse on New Zealand's North Island.

Some don't bother to linger at these Pokestops, staying just long enough to stock up on the virtual balls they'll use to bonk and capture the next Pokemon. But for others, the GPS-powered "augmented reality" game is heightening awareness of the history and geography of their neighborhoods.

Trump taunts claims that Russia hacked DNC emails for him

WASHINGTON (AP) - Donald Trump on Monday dismissed as a "joke" claims by Hillary Clinton's campaign that Russia is trying to help Trump by leaking thousands of emails from the Democratic National Committee. Clinton campaign chairman John

Podesta added fuel to the debate Monday, saying there "a was kind bromance going on" be-Rustween sian President Vladimir Putin



and Trump. The Clinton campaign says Russia favors Trump's views, especially on NATO.

"The new joke in town is that Russia leaked the disastrous DNC e-mails, which should have never been written (stupid), because Putin likes me," Trump wrote as part of a series of Tweets. "Hillary was involved in the e-mail scandal because she is the only one with judgement (sic) so bad that such a thing could have happened." Wikileaks posted emails Friday

that suggested the DNC was favoring Clinton over her rival Sen. Bernie Sanders during the primary season, enraging die-hard Sanders supporters who have long claimed that the DNC had its finger on the scale throughout the primaries. The disclosures prompted the resignation of DNC chairwoman Debbie Wasserman Schultz on the eve of the party's convention in Philadelphia, where Clinton is expected to officially accept the nomination for president.

How the emails were stolen hasn't been confirmed.

"Before I was just going from Point A to Point B, but now I'm learning things," said 15-year-old Jaiden Cruz as he walked by a plaque Wednesday in downtown Providence, Rhode Island, marking where Abraham Lincoln spoke at an old railroad hall in 1860. The plaque is a Pokestop, and shortly before Cruz arrived, another

Clinton's campaign stood firmly behind their claims of Russian involvement Monday.

"There is a consensus among experts that it is indeed Russia that is behind this hack of the DNC," Clinton campaign spokesman Brian Fallon told CNN.

It is not clear whether the WikiLeaks breach is linked to an earlier incident in June. Crowd-Strike Inc., a cybersecurity firm, said last month that the DNC asked it to investigate a suspected breach of its systems that began as early as last summer. CrowdStrike said it quickly found traces of two of the best adversaries in the hacking arena, both tied to the Russian govern-

On Sunday, Clinton campaign manager Robby Mook said that it was "concerning last week that Donald Trump changed the Republican platform to become what some experts would regard as pro-Russian."

Trump's senior policy adviser Paul Manafort called statements by the Clinton campaign "pretty desperate."

In return, Clinton seized upon what she called the "fear and the anger and the resentment" from Trump and Republicans, dismissing Trump's declaration that only he could fix the problems that afflict the nation.

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Delino DeShields is known for his speed, stealing 101 bases in 2012 in the minors, not for his power.

DeShields homered in the seventh inning to break a tie and the Texas Rangers defeated the Kansas City Royals 2-1 on Sunday.

DeShields, who was recalled Thursday from Triple-A Round Rock, walked and doubled before leading off the seventh with his third home run. DeShields hit a 2-1 pitch from Luke Hochevar out to left.

"It so happened that today I was the guy that got us the go-ahead run," DeShields said. "I was just trying to hit the ball hard. I wasn't looking for anything specific. I wanted to get on base. Before I had gotten on base in every at-bat.

"With the game tied and if I get myself in scoring position, there's a good chance for me to touch home plate. I got into it pretty good and got it over the fence, but the main focus was just putting the barrel on the ball and try to get on base."

The loss dropped the Royals to 48-49, the first time the World Series champions have been below .500 since May 15 when they were 18-19. The Royals have lost 13 of 19 games in July.

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



Today is Monday, July 25, the 207th day of 2016. There are 159 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight History:

On July 25, 1956, the Italian liner SS Andrea Doria collided with the Swedish passenger ship Stockholm off the New England coast late at night and began sinking; 51 people ,Äî 46 from the Andrea Doria, five from the Stockholm ,Äî were killed. (The Andrea Doria capsized and sank the following morning.)

On this date:

In 1866, Ulysses S. Grant was named General of the Army of the United States, the first officer to hold the rank. In 1909, French aviator Louis

Bleriot (bleh-ree-OH') became the first person to fly an airplane across the English Channel, traveling from Calais (kah-LAY') to Dover in 37 minutes.

In 1918, the musical revue "The Passing Show of 1918" opened on Broadway, featuring a cast that included Fred Astaire and his sister, Adele, and the song "I'm Forever Blowing Bubbles."

In 1934, Austrian Chancellor Engelbert Dollfuss was assas-

sinated by pro-Nazi Austrians in a failed coup attempt. In 1941, President Franklin

D. Roosevelt froze Japanese assets in the United States in retaliation for Japan's occupation of southern Indochina. In 1946, the United States

detonated an atomic bomb near

Bikini Atoll in the Pacific in the first underwater test of the device. In 1952, Puerto Rico became a

self-governing commonwealth

of the United States. In 1965, Bob Dylan drew boos from some spectators at the Newport Folk Festival as he

performed with a rock band. In 1975, the musical "A Chorus Line" opened on Broadway at the Shubert Theatre, beginning a run of

6,137 performances.

In 1986, movie director Vincente Minnelli, known for such musicals as "Gigi," "An American in Paris" and "Meet Me in St. Louis," died in Los Angeles at age 83.

In 1994, Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin and Jordan's King Hussein (hoo-SAYN') signed a declaration at the White House ending their countries' 46-year-old formal state of war.

In 2000, a New York-bound Air France Concorde crashed outside Paris shortly after takeoff, killing all 109 people on board and four people on the ground; it was the first-ever

crash of the supersonic jet.

Ten years ago: Israeli troops sealed off a Hezbollah stronghold and widened their control of southern Lebanon; an Israeli airstrike hit a U.N. border outpost, killing four observers.

Five years ago: In a primetime address to the nation, President Barack Obama made a last-ditch call for compromise on raising the government's borrowing ability before an Aug. 2 deadline; in a rebuttal, House Speaker John Boehner (BAY'-nur) said negotiations with the White House had been futile. The NFL Players Association executive board and 32 team reps voted unanimously to approve the terms of a deal to end a $4\neg\Omega$ -month lockout. Movie director Michael Cacovannis ("Zorba the Greek") died in Athens at age 89.



Rio de Janeiro and five days before Martha Karolyi's 74th birthday. "It has everything we

could possibly ask for," USA Gymnastics President Steve Penny told The Associated Press. "Along with what it represents to our heart and soul, as a physical facility, we couldn't go out and build it. It's been custom made what for what we want and need. You add up all the elements and it's like 'Dang, what an easy decision."

The Karolyis established the rustic estate in Sam Houston National Forest about an hour north of Houston in 1983, eventually expanding it to 2,000 acres. USA Gymnastics is buying 36.2 acres, including three training gyms, housing for up to 300 athletes and coaches as well as a dance studio, dining hall, medical and rehab facilities and recreational areas. The facility will also get a new name: the USA

Gymnastics Athlete Development Center at the Karolyi Ranch.

The Karolyis will keep their residence, a hunting lodge Bela Karolyi built and the remaining acreage. USA Gymnastics will have right of first refusal if the Karolyis decide in the future to sell off other parcels of land.

The USA Gymnastics board of directors unanimously approved the sale, pointing to the amenities, the location and the unique aspects of the ranch — which includes a vast array of wildlife from camels to peacocks - that have helped turn the women's national team into an international powerhouse. The five-woman team Karolyi will lead to Brazil next month is heavily favored to back up the team gold medal it won with ease in London four years ago.

"This place has stood the test of time," Penny said. "There things we have to make sure we do a little bit differently, we have to fix some things. Nothing that is going to require significant work. It's sturdy. It's a

sturdy place to be."

Karolyiannouncedher decision to step down after the Rio Games last summer. The Karolyis $are\,expected\,to\,maintain$ a presence at the ranch, and USA Gymnastics is considering turning an older portion of the main gym — one lined with pictures, medals and trophies from major competitions dating back to the 1980s — into a museum to honor the Karolyi legacy.

"They are still a part of us," Penny said. "They will always be a part of USA Gymnastics. They're still both going to play vital roles for us in the future. Martha will always want to drift into the gym and we'll always want her to do Bela Karolyi joked the


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
