AUSTIN, Texas — Texas will allow concealed handgun license holders to carry their weapons into public university buildings, classrooms and dorms starting Monday, which is also the 50th anniversary of the mass shooting at the University of Texas' landmark clock tower.

WHO CAN HAVE A **CONCEALED HANDGUN ON CAMPUS?**

Anyone who holds a Texas

a person must be at least 21 (18 if in the military) and pass both classroom and gun range training courses. There are also restrictions on convicted felons, people charged with felonies and high-level misdemeanors or people with a history of mental illness. Texas has more than 1 mil-

lion concealed handgun license holders.

law allows guns in buildings, classrooms and dorms, but rules may differ from campus to campus, as each school is required to map that out.

For example, at the University of Texas at Austin, where faculty and students vigorously protested the law, teach-

ers will be allowed to declare their offices as gun-free zones, but most will post signs announcing it. Dorm residents can have guns in common areas, such as dining areas and lounges, but not sleeping rooms, where no storage of weapons is allowed. Exceptions to the room restrictions will be made for visiting family members who are

Air Evac upgrades aircraft

The Big Spring Air Evac Lifeteam base has a new addition, and Base Pilot Supervisor Jason Sullivan could not be happier. The base opened in October 2007, and just recently welcomed its newly upgraded Bell 206 LongRanger.

The helicopter was upgraded with state-of-the-art technology, including the Cobham HeliSAS/Autopi-

lot and Garmin 500H glass cockpit. The autopilot and Stability Augmentation System enhances flight safety by reducing the pilot workload and increasing flight stability. Together with the Garmin 650 and 500H (glass cockpit), the pilot is able to focus on other things outside the aircraft.

"We've been looking forward to receiving the Garmin 500/650 glass cockpit and HeliSAS autopilot since Air

Evac announced the upgrades would be company-wide a couple of years ago," Sullivan said.

The aircraft, known affectionately as "Dolly" by her crews, returned to the Big Spring base on July 14.

"There is no doubt that the Glass Cockpit/Autopilot is a huge investment that Air Evac has made for its employees and patients alike," Sulli See **EVAC**, Page 3



Officials: 1 dead, 3 hospitalized in Austin shooting

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — A shooting in a crowded entertainment district in downtown Austin early Sunday caused a chaotic scene, leaving one woman dead and three others wounded and police searching for a suspect.

Austin police say they want to question a 24-year-old possibly armed man in the overnight shootings. Police are circulating a photograph of a man described in a statement as a "person of

Austin Police Chief of Staff Brian Manley says police received reports of gunshots in crowded Sixth Street Entertainment District shortly after 2 a.m. Sunday, and found that five people had been shot.

"It was a very chaotic scene," Manley said. "A lot of people running in different directions with all the gunshots coming out."

One woman was pronounced dead at the scene, and three other women were taken to University Medical Center Brackenridge with injuries that were serious, but not life-threatening. Manley said another victim declined to be transported to the hos-

"We have multiple individuals, witnesses, that we are currently interviewing," Manley said. "We had one individual who was initially noted as a person of interest, however that person's status at this point is unde-

Manley said because of the large crowd presence, police were getting descriptions of a suspect from wit-

NTSB: Balloon hit power lines before crashing, killing 16

LOCKHART, Texas (AP) - A hot air balloon hit high-tension power lines before crashing into a pasture in Central Texas, killing all 16 on board, according to federal authorities investigating the worst such disaster in

A power line was tripped at 7:42 a.m. Saturday, and the first call to 911 came a minute later, National Transportation Safety Board member Robert Sumwalt said during a news conference. The crash site was near a row of high-tension power lines, and aerial photos showed an area of scorched land underneath.

"There is physical evidence to indicate that the balloon, or some component of the balloon, hit the physical wires themselves and not the tower," Sumwalt said.

The NTSB will look at several factors including reports of foggy weather, but is concentrating first on gathering evidence such as witness statements.

The pilot was Skip Nichols, 49, according to Alan Lirette, who identified Nichols as his best friend, roommate and boss. Lirette said he helped launch the balloon. The NTSB has not yet publicly identified the pilot or the

Matt Rowan and his wife. Sunday Rowan, were among those on board, his brother Josh Rowan said. The recently married couple from San Antonio, both 34, had texted family and posted on social media pictures of the balloon being set up, the rising sun and them in the basket.

"It's a bit haunting now," Josh Row-

an told The Associated Press on Sun-

The NTSB said the balloon was run by Heart of Texas Hot Air Balloon Rides. Nichols' Facebook page identifies him as the chief pilot.

The passengers met the balloon operator in the San Marcos Wal-Mart parking lot at about 5:45 a.m. Saturday, and traveled to Fentress Texas Airpark. Ground crew members told the NTSB that they launched about 20 minutes after the expected 6:45 a.m.

11-year-old boy accidentally shoots self in Houston

HOUSTON (AP) — Houston police are investigating after an 11-year-old boy accidentally shot himself with a gun at a home, the third such incident in the area in recent days.

Police tell the Houston Chronicle the shooting happened Sunday night.

Police say the boy got his uncle's gun and was accidentally wounded in the neck. He was rushed to a hospital, where he was in critical

condition.

The Brazoria County sheriff's office says a 7-year-old boy shot himself in the head Thursday after getting the key to a locked gun cabinet and getting a revolver in Alvin, located south of Houston. He's expected to recover.

A boy believed to be 5 died after shooting himself July 26 at a Houston-area home. Harris County sheriff's office deputies said it appeared to be accidental.

Bexar County Commissioner Kevin Wolff accused of DWI

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A Bexar County commissioner has been arrested and charged with misdemeanor driving while intoxicated after his vehicle rear-ended two vehicles in the drive-through line at a San Antonio fast-food restaurant.

Court records show Commissioner Kevin Wolff was arrested about 3 a.m. Sunday at a Whataburger restaurant just north of downtown San Antonio. Police say a field sobriety test suggested that Wolff was impaired. Wolff declined to take a breath test after his arrest, so a warrant was obtained to take a blood sample.

licensed to carry handguns. At Texas A&M Univer-

sity in College Station, guns are allowed in dorm rooms and teachers must get permission from the administration to ban guns from their office.

State law still bans weapons from some campus areas, such as hospitals and sporting events.

WITH THE STATE'S OPEN CARRY LAW, WILL WEAPONS BE ON DISPLAY IN CLASS?

No. The open carry law specifically does not apply to college campuses. Any handguns on campus must be holstered and kept out of sight.

ARE GUNS ALLOWED AT PRIVATE SCHOOLS? COMMUNITY COLLEGES?

Private schools like

Texas speech on campus and Baylor, Rice, Christian and others lead to more campus suican ban guns under the state law. Currently, Amberton University, which doesn't allow students under 21 and has a total enrollment under 2,000, is the only private school that has opted to allow guns.

As for community colleges, they have until August 2017 to allow weapons, giving them more time to adjust for security and other measures.

WHY IS THE LAW SO **CONTROVERSIAL?**

Texas has allowed concealed handguns in public for 20 years. Gun rights advocates consider it an important protection, given the constitutional right to bear arms, as well as a key self-defense measure in cases of campus violence, such as the 1966 UT shootings and the 2007 shootings at Virginia Tech.

Opponents of the law fear it will chill free

guns on campus. WHAT'S THE SIGNIFICANCE OF THE **AUG. 1 START DATE?**

It's unsettling for some because it falls on the anniversary of Charles Whitman's shooting rampage, in which the Marine-trained sniper opened fire from an observation deck on top of the school's landmark clock tower. It has come to be accepted as the nation's first mass shooting, with 17 deaths attributed to him.

Among those who urged state lawmakers not to approve campus carry was Claire Wilson James, the first person Whitman shot. She was pregnant and was shot through the belly, killing her unborn child.

Walker claims 1st major with win at PGA

SPRINGFIELD, N.J. (AP) One of the last people who would have predicted Jimmy Walker's win in theP-GA Championship at Baltusrol was the man himself.

Though Walker felt some improvement last week at the Canadian Open, he'd struggled much of the year, particularly in the majors. And he'd never really come close to winning in golf's biggest events.

So after a pressure-packed par on the final hole gave Walker a one-stroke win over defending champion Jason Day on Sunday, he was somewhat surprised and plenty relieved.

"I wouldn't have called this, but it's huge," Walker said. "It's nice to get in the position and keep the hammer down and keep making birdies and playing well."

Walker played so well in one of the strangest PGA Championships in recent memory that he led wire to wire. And after Day eagled 18 to close within one stroke, Walker played a solid third shot from the rough near the 18th green, then two-putted in near darkness for his first major title.

"It's surreal," said Walker, whose 67 put him at 14-under-par 266. "It feels sweet. It's amazing. I haven't been playing all that well and it felt like some things clicked last week, and brought it in this week and been thinking a little better on the golf course. I'm having a hard time putting words to it right now."

Day, trying to join Tiger Woods as the only back-to-back winners of the PGA Championship in stroke play, didn't have any such trouble.

"One guy this week was

better than me," Day said. "I know exactly how Jimmy feels, because I did exactly that last year. So it was actually quite nice to be able to see him celebrate with his family and friends there. ... He's a very deserving win-

Moreland leads Rangers to win

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Mitch Moreland and Lucas Harrell helped the Texas Rangers get another big win as they pull away again in the American League West.

Moreland homered for the fifth time in his last five starts and Harrell won in his Texas debut as the Rangersbeat the Kansas City Royals 5-3 to finish a sweep of the four-game series.

After having their 10-game division lead shrink to 2 1/2 games last Wednesday, the Rangers have pushed the advantage back up to six games. Harrell (3-2) gave up three runs and four hits –

including solo home runs to Eric Hosmer and Drew Butera — in six innings. The 31-year-old righthander was acquired from Atlanta last Wednesday to help the Rangers' injury-riddled starting rotation. Sam Dyson earned his 22nd save.

"More than anything else, what we saw this weekend is when we get quality starts . we have an opportunity to utilize our bullpen the way we need to," Texas manager Jeff Banister said. The Rangers received quality starts in three of the

four series games. They received quality starts in only three of their previous 21 games in July. Harrell was the eighth Rangers pitcher to make

a start in July. Colby Lewis and Derek Holland missed the entire month on the disabled list, and Yu Darvish returned from the DL on July 16.

"This team's already on a roll," Harrell said. "My job is to come in and get people out and keep us in

Kansas City hit just 2 for 25 with runners in scoring position during the series. The defending World Series champions went 7-19 in July, their worst month since recording the same record in

"We take probably the last couple of weeks and try to forget that," Eric Hosmer said. "Times are just rough."

Moreland's two-run homer was his 18th this season, the last five coming within 16 at-bats. Nomar Mazara also homered against the Royals, who have allowed an AL-high 141 homers this season.

Since Prince Fielder was lost for the balance of the season to another neck injury, Moreland has

Expert to Olympians: Don't put your head under water

(AP) — Just days ahead of the Olympic Games the waterways of Rio de Janeiro are as filthy as ever, contaminated raw human sewage teeming dangerous bacteria, according to a 16-month-long study commissioned The Associated Press.

Not only are some 1,400 athletes at risk of getting violently ill in competitions, but the AP's tests indicate that tourists also face potentially serious health risks on the golden beaches of Ipanema and Copacabana.

The AP's survey of the aquatic Olympic and Paralympic venues has revealed consistent and dangerously high levels of viruses from the pollution, a major black eye on Rio's Olympic project that set off alarm bells among

sailors, rowers and openwater swimmers. Since the AP released the

initial results last July,

athletes have been taking

JANEIRO elaborate precautions to precautions, what about the prevent illnesses that could potentially knock them out of the competition, including preventatively antibiotics, bleaching oars and donning plastic suits and gloves in a bid to limit contact with the water.

antibiotics combat bacterial infections, not viruses. And the AP investigation found that infectious adenovirus readings — tested with cell cultures and verified with molecular biology protocols — turned up at nearly 90 percent of the test sites over 16 months of testing.

"That's a very, very, very high percentage," said Dr. Valerie Harwood, Chair of the Department of Integrative Biology at the University of South Florida.

"Seeing that level of human pathogenic virus is pretty much unheard of in surface waters in the U.S. You would never, ever see these levels because we treat our waste water. You just would not see

this."

300,000-500,000 expected to descend on Rio for the Olympics? Testing at several of the city's world-famous beaches has shown that in addition to persistently high viral loads, the beaches often have levels of bacterial markers for sewage pollution that would be cause for concern abroad and sometimes even exceed Rio state's lax water safety standards.

In light of the AP's findings, Harwood had one piece of advice for travelers to Rio: "Don't put your head under water.'

Danger is lurking even in the sand.

Samples from the golden beaches at Copacabana and Ipanema revealed high levels of viruses, which recent studies have suggested can pose health risks particularly to babies and small children.

"You know how quickly an infant can get dehydrated and have to go to the hospital," said Harwood. "That's the scariest point to me."

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

Here North became declarer, placing the U.S. East, Al Roth, on lead. Rejecting the normal-looking heart lead, Roth decided to lead dummy's first-bid suit, spades. Not only that, but he led the queen instead of the deuce!

This proved exceptionally effective. Declarer naturally thought Roth had the jack of spades to back up the

queen, so he ducked in dummy.

Roth then continued with the seven, the ten losing (surprisingly, from declarer's viewpoint) to the jack. When West, Bill Root, shifted to a low heart, declarer confidently followed low, thinking that East started with a doubleton spade and therefore would not have another spade to lead. But Roth won the heart return

with the ten and produced still another spade — the deuce — a card he supposedly couldn't have. Root thereupon cashed three more spade tricks, and the unfortunate Venezuelan declarer went down two for minus 200, giving North America an 800-point gain on the deal.







Today is Monday, Aug. 1, the 214th day of 2016. There are 152 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight History:

On Aug. 1, 1966, Charles Joseph Whitman, 25, an engineering student at the University of Texas in Austin, went on an armed rampage that killed 14 people, most of whom were shot by Whitman while he was perched in the clock tower of the main campus building. Whitman, who had also slain his wife and mother hours earlier, was finally gunned down by police.

On this date:

In 1714, Britain's Queen Anne died at age 49; she was succeeded by George I.

In 1876, Colorado was admitted as the 38th state.

In 1907, the U.S. Army Signal Corps established an aeronautical division, the forerunner of the U.S. Air Force.

In 1913, the Joyce Kilmer noem "Trees" was first nublished in "Poetry: A Magazine of Verse.' In 1936, the Olympics opened

in Berlin with a ceremony presided over by Adolf Hitler. In 1944, an uprising broke out in Warsaw, Poland, against lasted two months before collapsing. In 1946, President Harry S. Truman signed measures estab-

lishing the Fulbright Program

and the Atomic Energy

Commission. In 1957, the United States and Canada agreed to create the North American Air Defense Command (NORAD).

In 1971, the Concert for Bangladesh, organized by George Harrison and Ravi Shankar, took place at New Madison York's Square Garden. In 1975, a 35-nation summit

in Finland concluded with the signing of a declaration known as the Helsinki Accords dealing with European security, human rights and East-West contacts.

In 1981, the rock music video channel MTV made its debut.

In 1994, Michael Jackson and Lisa Marie Preslev confirmed they'd been secretly married 11 weeks earlier. (Presley filed for divorce from Jackson in January 1996, citing irreconcil-

able differences.) Ten years ago: Mel Gibson issued a statement in which he denied being a bigot; he also apologized to "everyone in the Jewish community for the vitriolic and harmful words" he'd used when he was arrested for investigation of drunken driving. Fidel Castro released a statement a day after ceding power to his brother Raul in which he sought to reassure Cubans that his health was stable after intestinal surgery.

Five years ago: The U.S. House of Representatives passed, 269-161, emergency legislation to avert the nation's first-ever financial default.

One year ago: Japan's Imperial Household Agency released a digital version of Emperor Hirohito's radio address on Aug. 15, 1945, announcing his country's surrender in World War II; the digital recording offered clearer audio, although Hirohito spoke in an arcane form of Japanese that many of his countrymen would have found difficult to comprehend. British singer and TV host Cilla Black, 72, died in Estepona (eh-steh-POH'-nah) in southern Spain.





Fight with Khan family tests Trump's 'say anything' strategy

NEW YORK (AP) — Donald Trump's presidential bid has thrived on controversy of his own making. Now, the Republican nominee kicks off the first full week of the general election campaign having put his strategy of saying the politically unimaginable to its greatest test yet.

Trump broke a major American political and societal taboo over the weekend when he engaged in an emotionally-charged feud with Khizr and Ghazala Khan, the bereaved parents of a decorated Muslim Army captain killed by a suicide bomber in Iraq. He further stoked outrage by implying Ghazala Khan did not speak while standing alongside her husband at last week's Democratic convention because they are Muslim.

The outcry was swift and bipartisan, leaving Trump largely isolated among his fellow Republicans and potentially putting at risk whatever progress the New Yorker had made during his convention at winning over the independent voters who will likely decide the fall election.

"I am appalled that Donald Trump would disparage them and that he had the gall to compare his own sacrifices to those of a Gold Star family," said New Hampshire Sen. Kelly Ayotte, a Republican seeking re-election in one of the nation's most competitive Senate contests.

Both House Speaker Paul Ryan and Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell issued statements praising Capt. Humayun Khan, awarded a Bronze Star and a Purple Heart after the U.S. soldier was killed in Iraq in 2004. Though neither explicitly mentioned Trump, the congressional leaders pointedly denounced his proposed ban on foreign Muslims entering the country, a policy he had altered in recent weeks but nevertheless one that returned to the center of the campaign debate via his attacks on the Khan family.

Skydiver becomes first person to jump and land without chute

LOS ANGELES (AP) — After leaping from an airplane, Luke Aikins rocketed toward earth for two minutes, and then calmly flipped onto his back at the last second and landed in a 100-by-100-foot net

Cheers rose from those who gathered at the Big Sky movie ranch on the outskirts of Simi Valley to watch the stunt, including his family.

The 42-year-old skydiver with more than 18,000 jumps made history as the first person to survive a leap without a parachute and land safely in a net.

As the audience erupted, Aikins quickly climbed out, walked over and hugged his wife, Monica, who had been watching from the ground with their 4-year-old son, Logan, and other family members.

"I'm almost levitating. It's incredible," the jubilant skydiver said, raising his hands over his head as his wife held their son, who dozed in her arms.

"This thing just happened! I can't even get the words out of my mouth," he added as he thanked the dozens of crew members who spent two years helping him prepare for the jump, including those who assembled the fishing trawler-like net and made sure it really worked.

The jump — from the death-defying altitude of 25,000 feet — makes Aikins the only skydiver ever to go from plane to planet Earth without a para-

The stunt, broadcast live on the Fox network for the TV special "Stride Gum Presents Heaven Sent," nearly didn't come off as planned when Aikins revealed just before climbing into his plane that the Screen Actors Guild had ordered him to wear a parachute to ensure his safety.

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Aikins didn't say what prompted the original restriction, but SAG spokeswoman Pamela Greenwalt said the union and producers "could not come to an agreement on the safest way to pursue this stunt and therefore we could not sanction it to go forward under a union agreement.'

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Aikins said he considered pulling out at that point because having the parachute canister on his back would make his landing in the net far more dangerous. If he had to wear it, he said he wouldn't bother to pull the ripcord anyway.

"I'm going all the way to the net, no question about it," he said from the plane. "I'll just have to deal with the consequences when I land of wearing the parachute on my back and what it's going to do

A few minutes before the jump. one of the show's hosts said the requirement had been lifted. Aikins left the plane without the chute.

He jumped with three other skydivers, each wearing parachutes. One had a camera, another trailed smoke so people on the ground could follow his descent and the third took an oxygen canister he handed off after they got to an altitude where it was no longer needed.

Then the others opened their parachutes and left him on his own.

Aikins admitted before the jump he was nervous. and his mother said she was one family member who wouldn't watch.

When his friend Chris Talley came up with the idea two years ago, Aikins acknowledged he turned

"I kind of laugh and I say, 'Ok, that's great. I'll help you find somebody to do it," "he told The Associated Press as he trained for the jump last week. A couple of weeks after Talley made his proposal,

Aikins called back and said he would do it. He'd been the backup jumper in 2012 when Felix Baumgartner became the first skydiver to break the speed of sound during a jump from 24 miles above Earth. Aikins was able hit the net with pinpoint preci-

sion thanks to GPS alerts in his helmet and a sophisticated lighting setup on the ground that was visible from more than 25,000 feet up,

Texas balloon pilot had been arrested for DWI in 2000

LOCKHART, Texas (AP) — The pilot of a hot air balloon that crashed in Texas and killed all 16 people aboard had been arrested in Missouri for driving while intoxicated in 2000, police said, and the Better Business Bureau there had warned consumers about doing business with him after complaints about his balloon touring company.

Alfred "Skip" Nichols, 49, was identified as the pilot by his friend and roommate Alan Lirette, who said that Nichols was a good pilot.

"That's the only thing I want to talk about, is that he's a great pilot," Lirette said, speaking to the AP from a house he shared with Nichols in Kyle, Texas. "There's going to be all kinds of reports out in the press and I want a positive image there too."

Federal investigators said the balloon, which was operated by Heart of Texas Hot Air Balloon Rides, hit high-tension power lines before crashing into a pasture in Central Texas early Saturday morning. One witness who lives a quarter-mile from the site, Margaret Wylie, said she heard popping sounds and saw what looked "like a fireball going up."

Authorities have not publicly named Nichols or the victims of the crash. They said identification of the bodies could be a long process.

Paradox nation: Norway, a climate leader making money on oil STAVANGER, Norway (AP) — Norway wants

to get rid of gasoline-fueled cars, plans to become carbon neutral by 2030 and spends billions on helping poor countries reduce their carbon footprints. Meanwhile, it's pushing ever farther into the Arctic Ocean in search of more oil and gas. "We know there is a paradox," admits Vidar Hel-

gesen, Norway's climate and energy minister. "We have been living well from oil and gas. But there is no country in the world that has done more to undermine the oil and gas industry than Norway." The mountainous Scandinavian country of 5 mil-

lion people is torn between its ambition to be a global leader on climate change and the awareness that its wealth is linked to the world's dependence on fossil fuels. This apparent contradiction is particularly strik-

ing in Stavanger, Norway's oil capital. The west coast town is the hub of an offshore in-

dustry that has made Norway the world's eighth biggest exporter of oil and third biggest exporter of natural gas. Norway's \$875 billion oil kitty is the world's largest sovereign wealth fund, and hydrocarbons account for 40 percent of Norwegian exports.
