## Extended chase ends with wreck on US 87

### Suspect hospitalized, faces charges

 A Big Spring man faces felony charges after leading law enforcement on a high-speed chase across a portion of Howard County before colliding with another vehicle and landing in the hospital.  
 Michael Shae Jackman, 30, is currently in an Odessa hospital with injuries sustained

in the wreck, which occurred at the intersection of Highway 87 and Leatherwood Road Tuesday afternoon.  
 Once he recovers from his injuries, he is expected to be jailed on a felony revocation of probation warrant and a felony charge of evading police in a vehicle.  
 The chase began shortly after Jackman, driving a tan Cadillac Escalade in the 3600

block of W. Highway 80, was spotted by Big Spring Police Department narcotics officers at around 2:30 p.m. Tuesday, according to information released by BSPD.  
 "The officers recognized Jackman, knowing he had a felony warrant for his arrest out of Taylor County for

## Sales tax receipts continue to fall for Big Spring, other area towns

 Monthly sales tax revenue continues to fall for cities in Howard County as the Crossroads area and the Permian Basin region as a whole continue to feel the effects from the economic downturn in the oil and gas industry.  
 "You have to look at these numbers in perspective," said Terry Wegman, Big Spring Economic Development Corporation (EDC) executive director. "We are down compared to last year, but we estimate to end closer to the 2013-2014 figures, which are still more than the 2011-2012 net revenue."  
 Both the city of Big Spring and the EDC expect the trend to continue through the next year and both taxing entities have based their upcoming budgets accordingly, Wegman said,

The 8.25 cents of tax collected on every dollar of retail sales in the city of Big Spring are allocated in three ways — 6.25 cents are given to the state, 1.5 cents are put into the city of Big Spring's general revenue fund, and a half-cent is used to fund the EDC.  
 The following figures are sales tax collected in June 2016 and percentage of net gain or loss compared to June 2015. The monies were disbursed to taxing entities in August by the state:

- Abilene: \$3.9 million, -1.31 percent
- Ackerly, \$4,586.25, -18.08 percent
- Big Spring, \$739,945.75, -23.10 percent
- Coahoma, \$9,426.41, -33.42 percent
- Colorado City, \$60,776.68, -11.87 percent

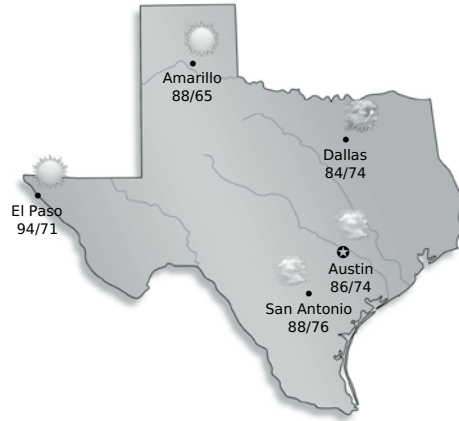

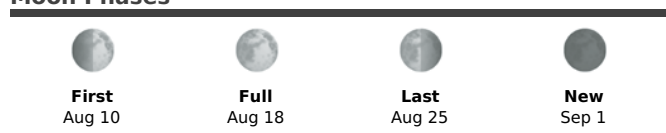

## Weary GOP hopeful Trump staff shake-up triggers new momentum

WASHINGTON (AP) — Weary Republican leaders are accepting Donald Trump's latest staff shake-up, hopeful that a new leadership team can reverse the New York businessman's struggles even as some worry it's too little too late.

The Republican National Committee has already conceded it may divert resources away from the presidential contest favor of vulnerable Senate and House candidates if Trump's standing does not improve in the coming weeks. RNC chief strategist Sean Spicer called Trump's staffing changes the "healthy growth of the campaign at a senior level at a key point."

Spicer also urged caution as Trump's new team contemplates whether the fiery populism and free-wheeling style that won him the Republican nomination will give him a better shot at the White House than uniting his party and rallying moderate voters.

"I think people want him to be authentic," Spicer

said. "They appreciate he's not a scripted politician, but there's a recognition that words do matter."

Trump on Wednesday announced a staff overhaul at his campaign's highest levels, the second shake-up in the past two months.

The Republican nominee tapped Stephen Bannon — a combative conservative media executive with no presidential campaign experience — to serve as CEO of his White House bid.

## California wildfire brings destruction and uncertainty

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif. (AP) — A ferocious wildfire had swallowed up many homes as it spread across 40 square miles of mountain and desert east of Los Angeles. Exactly how many, however, and to whom they belonged, remained uncertain.

Firefighters were faced with the difficult task of tallying that damage while still battling the huge, unruly blaze.

That left evacuees in a cruel limbo, forced to

spend another night wondering whether anything they owned was still intact.

They included Shawn Brady, who had been told by a neighbor that flames had raged down their street. But he was waiting for official word.

"What I've been told is that flames are currently ripping through my house," said Brady, a dockworker who lives on the outskirts of the evacuated town of Wrightwood with his mother, sister and a dog.

## Diplomat's defection poses major PR problem for Pyongyang

TOKYO (AP) — The defection of a North Korean senior diplomat in London poses a major problem for Pyongyang on a number of fronts — not least of which is how to publicly respond.

As of Thursday, Pyongyang hadn't made a public statement about the defection. But when — or if — it does, its response will likely be ferocious and accusatory.

Seoul's Unification Ministry announced Wednesday that Thae Yong Ho, minister at the North Korean Embassy in London, has arrived in South Korea with his family and is under the protection of the South Korean government.

Thae was the second-highest official in North Korea's embassy and is the most senior North Korean diplomat to defect to the South.

Seoul, which doesn't always divulge defections, was quick to seize on this one as evidence of growing dissent within the North's ruling elite.

Its Unification Ministry claimed Thae defected because of his disgust with the Kim Jong Un regime and worries about the future of his children. A spokesman for the ministry further said that the defection is a sign of weakening unity within the North's ruling class.

## 2 car bombs in eastern Turkey kill 6, wound close to 220

ANKARA, Turkey (AP) — Two car bombings targeted police stations in Turkey, killing at least six people and wounding at least 219 others, officials said Thursday.

A car bombing attack on a police station in the eastern province of Van late Wednesday killed a police officer and two civilians. At least 73 other people — 53 civilians and 20 police officers — were wounded, officials said.

Authorities blamed that attack on the Kurdistan Workers' Party, or PKK, which has launched a campaign of car bombings targeting police stations or roadside bomb attacks on police vehicles. Last week, PKK commander Cemil Bayik threatened increased attacks against police in Turkish cities.

Jackman refused to stop, commencing a chase along parts of Interstate 20, Andrews Highway, County Road 21, and Highway 87.

Jackman initially traveled west on Old Highway 80 before turning eastbound on Interstate 20. From there, he exited onto the Andrews Highway and headed

west before turning onto County Road 21.

"The officers continued to follow Mr. Jackman at a safe distance but keeping the vehicle in site until marked Howard County Sheriff deputies arrived to assist," the release stated. "At County Road, 21 Mr. Jackman continued northbound to Leatherwood Road before turning eastbound, at which time deputies assisted with the pursuit."

Deputies pursued Jackman east on Leatherwood until he reached Highway 87, where he ran a stop sign and collided with a tractor-trailer heading south on 87. Jackman then exited

the vehicle and fled on foot for a short distance before collapsing, officials said.

"Responding officers immediately began first aid on Jackman and called for Emergency Medical Services to respond for treatment," the news release stated. "An Air Evac helicopter was dispatched to the scene, where Jackman was flown to Odessa Medical for treatment. Department of Public Safety troopers responded to the scene and conducted the accident investigation."

As of Wednesday, Jackman was still hospitalized with undisclosed injuries. There

were no other injuries reported in relation to the incident, officials said.

Upon Jackman's release from the hospital, authorities said he would be charged with his felony probation revocation warrant and felony evading police in a vehicle.

# 94 percent of Texas school districts meet academic standard

AUSTIN, Texas — Nearly 94 percent of districts and around 84 percent of public schools in Texas met minimum education standards, officials announced Monday, in the final incarnation of an academic rating system that next year will be replaced with letter grades between A and F.

The Texas Education Agency has tweaked accountability ratings to ensure few failing "improvement required" ratings, meaning that 90-plus percent of districts and around 85 percent of schools have now met basic state requirements each of the last four years. That's despite Education Commissioner Mike Morath suggesting only about a third of high school graduates in the country's second most-populous state are actually ready to succeed in college or an immediate career or vocation.

"It's just like children's soccer nowadays, where everyone gets a trophy," Bill Hammond, a former state lawmaker

who now heads the Texas Association of Business lobbying group, said of Monday's ratings. "It doesn't tell the public anything because there's no differentiation between the various schools."

Texas State Teachers Association spokesman Clay Robison countered that those schools and districts flagged for failing to meet state standards have traditionally been concentrated in poor areas and have disproportionate numbers of minority students, or those who speak foreign languages at home and require extra instruction to learn English. He said the problem will only get worse when the state starts handing out "Fs."

"They call it differentiation. I call it stigma," Robison said. Nearly 65 percent of Texas' 5.2 million public school children are black or Hispanic, and almost 60 percent of students statewide come from impoverished households.

The ratings use student performance on a statewide exam regimen known as STAAR that this

year was plagued by computer problems.

Also Monday, the education agency announced that high school student performance on four of the five standardized STAAR tests needed to graduate improved or stayed the same last year when compared with the 2014-2015 academic year — even as passing standards got tougher. In 2013, Texas cut the number of such required exams from 15 to five amid widespread student and parent complaints about over-testing.

Biology exam passing rates slipped a percentage point to 91 percent in the 2015-2016 academic year, while Algebra I remained unchanged at 81 percent, as did English I at 63 percent and English II at 66 percent. Ninety-four percent of students taking the U.S. history exam passed last school year, up three percentage points from 2014-2015.

The accountability system also examines how well districts and schools close "achievement gaps"

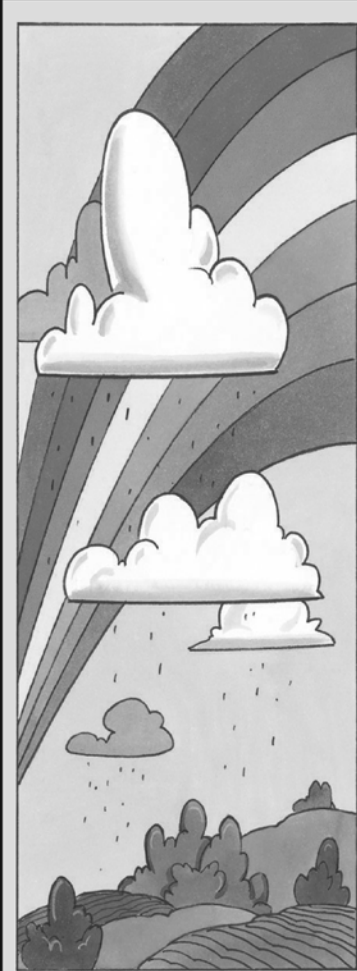

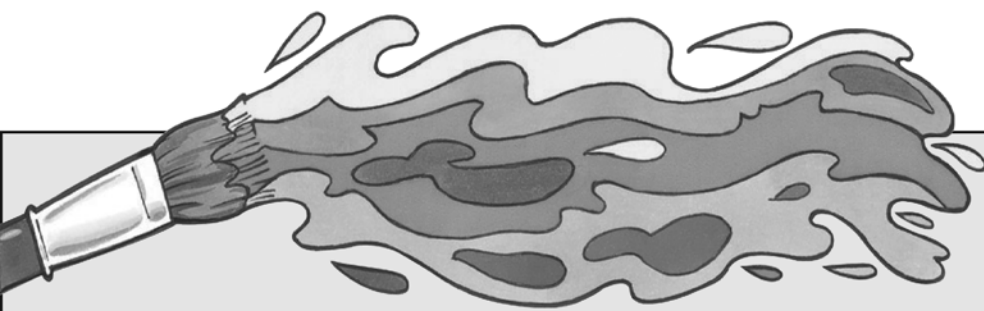
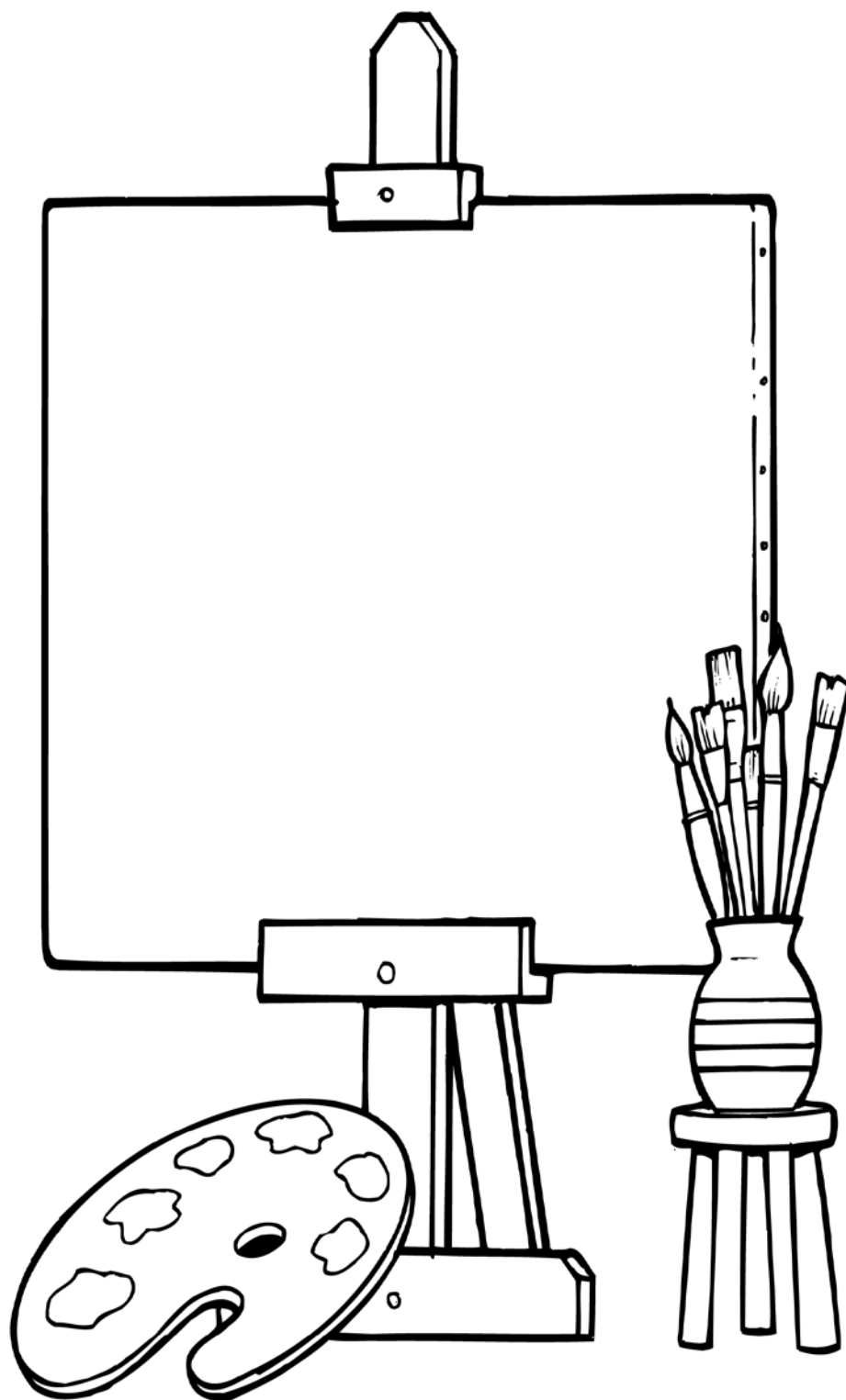

### Lochte's swim teammates to meet with authorities on robbery

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP) — Three American Olympic swimmers planned to meet with Brazilian law enforcement Thursday to discuss a reported robbery targeting 12-time medalist Ryan Lochte and his teammates, a U.S. Olympic Committee official said.

USOC spokesperson Patrick Sandusky said Jack Conger and Gunnar Bentz were released by local authorities after being pulled from a flight at the Rio de Janeiro airport, with the understanding that discussions would continue amid uncertainty over what truly took place during a late outing the night Olympic swimming wrapped up at the Rio Games.

Fellow teammate Jimmy Feigen also plans to talk to officials, Sandusky said, as he navigates a judge's order that keeps him in Brazil. The order similarly called for Lochte's passport to be seized, but the star swimmer had already returned to the United States before authorities could enforce the decision.

A lawyer for Conger and Bentz said Thursday that they won't be allowed to travel Brazil until they provide testimony to investigators. The swimmers didn't speak to reporters as they left the airport, shuttled away by a black car waiting outside. They departed for an unspecified location in Brazil and had yet to testify, said attorney Sergio Riera.

Representatives from the U.S. consulate arrived at the airport shortly after the swimmers were stopped from leaving the country.

The action comes amid increasing tension between Brazilian authorities and the American swimmers over the ever-changing account of the robbery. Police say they have found little evidence so far to support the claims, and that the swimmers were unable to provide key details in interviews.

The office of Judge Keyla Blanc, who ordered the passports seized, said that there were discrepancies in the statements by the swimmers.

Lochte has said he was with Conger, Bentz and Jimmy Feigen when they were robbed at gunpoint in a taxi by men with a police badge as they returned to the athletes village from a party, several hours after the final Olympic swimming events.

NBC reported Wednesday night that Lochte backed off some of his earlier claims about the robbery. He now says the taxi wasn't pulled over by men with a badge, but that they were robbed after stopping at a gas station, NBC reported. Lochte also said the assailant pointed a gun at him rather than putting it to his head.

The U.S. Olympic Committee said police went to the athletes village to try to collect the passports, but the swim team had already moved out.

Lochte's father told The Associated Press by phone from his Florida home that his son called him Tuesday after arriving in the United States. The 32-year-old swimmer was going to pick up his car and buy a new wallet to replace the one that he said was stolen.

"I'm just happy he's safe," Steve Lochte said. "It was an unfortunate experience for him and the other three. I don't know what all the controversy is. They were basically taken out of the taxi and robbed. The main thing is he's very lucky that he's safe and that all they got was his cash and wallet."

While he's medaled often in the Olympic pool, Lochte's accomplishments have long been overshadowed by teammate Michael Phelps — the most decorated Olympian in history. He won a gold in Rio in a relay race alongside Phelps.

The group did not call police, au-

thorities said, and officers began investigating once they saw media reports in which Lochte's mother spoke about the robbery.

A police official with knowledge of the investigation told the AP that police cannot find their taxi driver or witnesses from the robbery. The official spoke on condition of anonymity because the investigation is ongoing.

Police interviewed Lochte and one other swimmer, who said they had been intoxicated and could not remember what type and color of taxi they rode in or where the robbery happened, the police official said. The swimmers also could not say what

time the events occurred.

Lochte's attorney, Jeff Ostrow, has said there is no question the robbery occurred.

"Why would anybody fabricate anything?" Steve Lochte said. "It's just ridiculous."

Lochte told USA Today that he and his teammates didn't initially tell the U.S. Olympic officials about the robbery because "we were afraid we'd get in trouble."

Steve Bentz, father of Gunnar Bentz, when reached by phone late Wednesday night, said: "I really don't want to say anything," and hung up.

### Astros shut down by Martinez in 8-2 loss to Cardinals

HOUSTON (AP) — It's all going wrong at once for the Houston Astros.

Cardinals starter Carlos Martinez took a no-hitter into the sixth inning, Astros right-hander Doug Fister had another tough start and St. Louis beat Houston 8-2 on Wednesday.

"We've got to play better if we expect to make a push here," Astros manager A.J. Hinch said. "The big numbers we've given up are obviously not helpful. On the offensive side, the more that we swing outside of the strike zone to try to do too much, we see some rough things. It's a tough league, tough schedule, and if we want to make a point of this season being a little more memorable, we need to be better."

Fister (11-8) gave up four runs, seven hits and a walk while striking three in four innings.

Fister has allowed four or more runs five times in his past 10 starts.

"It was a disappointing day," Fister said. "Any loss is a tough loss to swallow. I felt good today. I felt strong, I felt in control, but they put a few good swings on balls, and the ball bounced their way today."

### Cowboys' D marked by youth, unproven vets

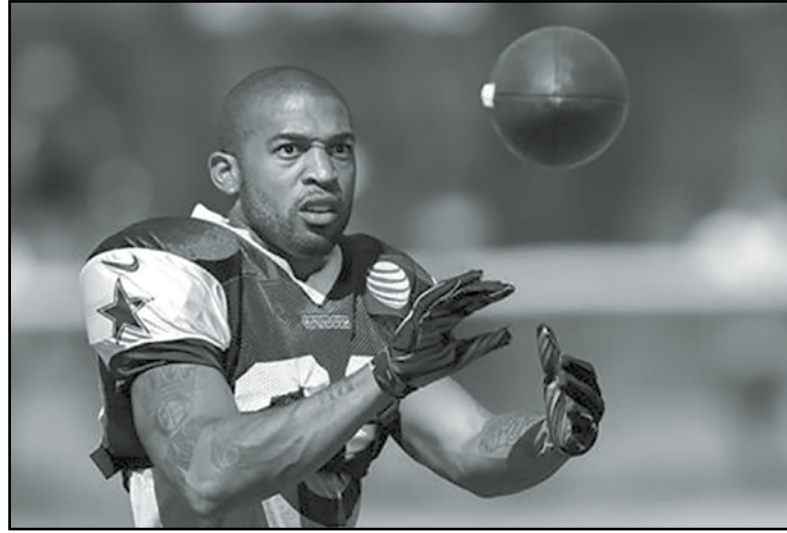
OXNARD, Calif. (AP) — The Dallas defense figures to start the season with a cornerback as its career sacks leader, which explains why Rod Marinelli recently was asked if he can remember coaching so many inexperienced or unproven players.

And when someone suggested that he would prefer a batch of Pro Bowl pass rushers instead, the Cowboys defensive coordinator skipped the obvious one-word answer and said, "That we develop."

Owner Jerry Jones and son Stephen, the executive vice president of personnel, are counting on that mentality with Dallas missing three suspended starters to open the season. It's possible that two of them — linebacker Rolando McClain and rush end Randy Gregory — will miss the entire season dealing with their issues.

Add to that a mediocre 2015 when the Cowboys were last in the NFL in takeaways and turnover margin, and the questions were plentiful at training camp. The Cowboys broke camp Wednesday and play their preseason home opener Friday night against Miami.

"Those things hurt," Marinelli said of McClain's 10-game suspension and the four-game ban for Gregory

and fellow end DeMarcus Lawrence — all on violations of the NFL's substance-abuse policy.

"But disarray sounds like everybody's going different directions. Nobody knows what they're doing. I think of a bunch of men who want to play like a unit. If we just play together as a defense, we did that a couple of years ago, and this has got a little more talent actually right now than we did."

Marinelli spoke of 2014, when Dallas was among the league leaders by forcing 31 turnovers on a 12-4 team that

won the NFC East and a playoff game.

But when quarterback Tony Romo and receiver Dez Bryant missed significant time with injuries last season, the defense couldn't make up the difference with game-changing plays as the Cowboys tumbled to 4-12.

The Cowboys tried the approach of a proven pass rusher in free agency last year, signing Greg Hardy despite the stain of a domestic violence case and a looming suspension that originally was 10 games but reduced to four. Hardy's production sagged

### Rangers win 6-2 as Darvish ends long losing streak vs. A's

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Yu Darvish had a demonstrative show of emotion, pumping his fist and letting out a shout after ending the seventh inning with another strikeout and two runners on base.

A day after his 30th birthday, the Texas Rangers right-hander finally ended his long personal losing streak to the AL West-rival Oakland Athletics — a team that until Wednesday night he had beaten only in his first start against them more than four years ago in his eighth major

league game.

Darvish struck out nine and walked only one as the Rangers won 6-2. He was 0-8 in his previous 10 starts against the only MLB opponent with more than three wins against him.

"It's a different lineup. But like me, I change, too," Darvish said through his interpreter. "I feel just fortunate that I got a win."

All-Star center fielder Ian Desmond and recently acquired Jonathan Lucroy each had three RBIs as the AL-best Rangers completed a three-

game series sweep.

Darvish (4-3) bounced off the mound after striking out Coco Crisp to end the seventh.

"He's a very tough out. He doesn't strike out. He battles," Darvish said. "Mentally, I wanted on top of it and make sure I could strike him out."

Crisp struck out three times after homering on the second pitch of the game. Jake Smolinski went deep leading off the fifth for the only other Oakland run.

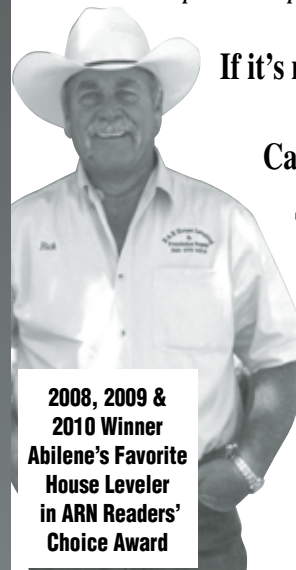

*The first step tells the tale*

East dealer.  
Both sides vulnerable.  
**NORTH**  
♠ J  
♥ 10 7 6 3  
♦ A K J 8 5

The bidding:  
East South West North  
Pass Pass 1♣ 1♦  
1♠ 4♥ Pass Pass  
4♠ Pass Pass 5♥

Opening lead — king of spades.  
**This deal occurred** in a team-of-  
four championship. At both tables  
South wound up in five hearts, and at  
both tables West led the king of  
spades. But at one table the contract  
was made, while at the other it went  
down one.

At the first table, West's king of  
spades held the first trick, and West  
then shifted to the jack of clubs.  
Declarer won with dummy's ace, dis-  
carding a spade, and returned a  
trump to the king and ace. There was  
nothing the defenders could now do  
to defeat the contract, and South eas-  
ily took the rest of the tricks.

At the second table, East-West  
came up with a far better defense.  
Here, East alertly overtook the king-  
of-spades lead with the ace and  
shifted to his singleton diamond.

South could not recover from this  
blow. He won the diamond in  
dummy and led a low trump to the  
king. After taking the ace, West  
returned a diamond for East to ruff,  
and the contract went down one.

Not a difficult defense, you may  
say, but the fact is that most players  
in East's shoes could not bring them-  
selves to play the ace of spades on  
their partner's king at trick one. The  
thought might not even occur to  
them, which is one of the reasons  
why good defense is generally  
regarded as the hardest part of the  
game.

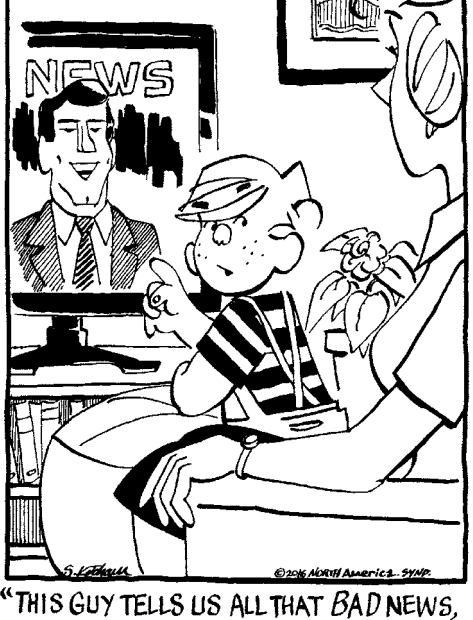
Of course, West could have shifted  
to a diamond at trick two at the first  
table and then led a second diamond  
later to defeat the contract. Neverthe-  
less, East must bear the main respon-  
sibility for West's failure to find this  
defense. He should not have allowed  
West the opportunity to go wrong.

**This Date In History**

Today is Thursday, Aug. 18, the 231st day of 2016. There are 135 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On Aug. 18, 1846, during the Mexican-American War, U.S. forces led by Gen. Stephen W. Kearny occupied Santa Fe in present-day New Mexico.

On this date: In 1587, Virginia Dare became the first child of English parents to be born in present-day America, on what is now Roanoke Island in North Carolina. (However, the Roanoke colony ended up mysteriously disappearing.)

In 1838, the first marine expedition sponsored by the U.S. government set sail from Hampton Roads, Virginia; the crews traveled the southern Pacific Ocean, gathering scientific information.

In 1914, President Woodrow Wilson issued his Proclamation of Neutrality, aimed at keeping the United States out of World War I.

In 1920, the 19th Amendment to the Constitution, guaranteeing all American women's right to vote, was ratified as Tennessee became the 36th state to approve it.

In 1938, President Franklin

D. Roosevelt and Canadian Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King dedicated the Thousand Islands Bridge connecting the United States and Canada.

In 1954, during the Eisenhower administration, Assistant Secretary of Labor James Ernest Wilkins became the first black official to attend a meeting of the president's Cabinet as he sat in for Labor Secretary James P. Mitchell.

In 1958, the novel "Lolita" by Vladimir Nabokov was first published in New York by G.P. Putnam's Sons, almost three years after it was originally published in Paris.

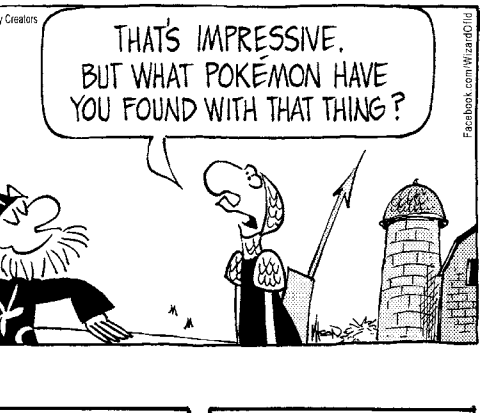
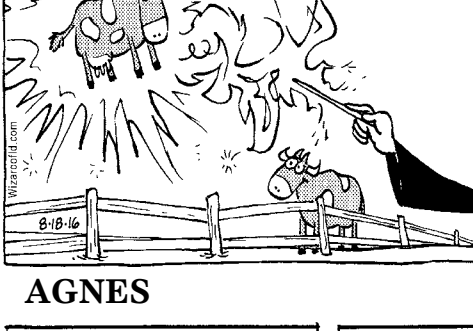
In 1963, James Meredith became the first black student to graduate from the University of Mississippi.

In 1969, the Woodstock Music and Art Fair in Bethel, New York, wound to a close after three nights with a mid-morning set by Jimi Hendrix.

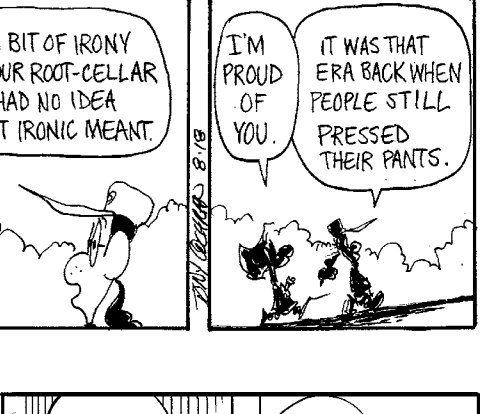
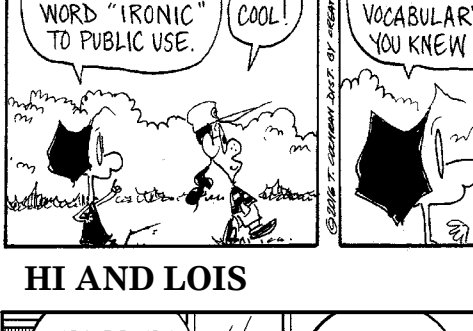

## BACK TO SCHOOL: Enrollment up a bit as kids return to school

WASHINGTON (AP) — No more staying up late during the week. Farewell to sleeping in. And hello, homework!

The lazy days of summer are ending for millions of children as they grab their backpacks, pencils and notebooks and return to the classroom for a new school year.

Some facts and figures to know as the new school year begins:

### ENROLLMENT AND COSTS

About 50 million students are expected to attend public elementary and secondary schools this fall. That's up just slightly from the 2015-16 school year, according to the Education Department. They'll be taught

by some 3.1 million school teachers from pre-kindergarten through high school, with an average student-to-teacher ratio of about 16 students to each teacher. Around 249,000 teachers are new hires this school year.

The growth of charter schools is continuing, with enrollment increasing from 800,000 in 2003 to 2.5 million in 2013, according to government figures. Some 40 states and the District of Columbia reported having about 6,400 charter schools.

The U.S. spends about \$11,670 per pupil, on average, on public school education.

About 4.8 million students are expected to attend private school this fall, down slightly from the previous school year.

The National Center for Education Statistics estimates that 3.5 million students, both public and private, will graduate from high school at the end of the school year.

### LONGER SCHOOL YEAR

Some schools are adding to the traditional 180-day year. In Washington, D.C., for example, 10 public schools are moving to extended-year schedules.

Students in those schools will have

20 more days per year than peers at other schools. They'll have shorter breaks over the school year, which will run 200 days through all 12 months. The idea is less time away from school in the summer will help boost learning and achievement.

### HIGHER ED

The cost of college continues to rise. Undergraduate tuition, fees, room, and board were estimated at \$15,640 at public institutions, \$40,614 at private nonprofit institutions, and \$23,135 at private for-profit institutions for the 2013-14 school year.

In the last 10 years, prices increased 34 percent at public institutions and 25 percent for private nonprofits.

In all, 40 percent of 18- to 24-year-olds were enrolled in college or graduate school in 2014, according to Census Bureau numbers.

### HOW U.S. STUDENTS STACK UP

The latest results from national math and reading tests show slipping or stagnant scores.

Math scores were down for fourth and eighth graders over the last two years. It was the first decline since 1990.

Reading grades were flat for fourth graders and lower for eighth graders, according to results from the National Assessment of Educational Progress.

Globally, American students trail their counterparts in Japan, Korea, Canada, Germany, France and more.

In reading, the U.S. ranks No. 16 in a global test given to 15-year-olds. Scores were worse for math, with the U.S. ranked 30th against students from other countries taking the Program for International Student Assessment, or PISA tests.

### NEW LAW OF THE LAND

The nation's schools districts are working with states and the federal government as they implement a new education law passed last December that returns to the states significant control over education policy. But the Education Department still plays an oversight role for the nation's 100,000 or so public schools.

States and schools are busy developing new accountability systems — a key component of the Every Student Succeeds Act. The law allows states and districts to design their own measures of achievement and progress, and decide independently how to turn around struggling schools.

And while students still have to take federally mandated reading and math tests, the law encourages states to cap the amount of time students spend on standardized testing each school year. The Obama administration has recommended that districts cap the percentage of classroom time students spend taking required statewide standardized tests at no more than 2 percent. The Council of the Great City Schools says testing amounts to about 2.3 percent of classroom time for the average eighth-grader in public school.

between minority and economically disadvantaged students and their white or wealthier counterparts, and youngsters' readiness for college or the workforce after high school.

The state rated more than 1,200 districts and 8,600-plus schools, including charter campuses. About 1,100 public school

districts and charter operators met the standard this year, while 66 — or 5.5 percent — didn't.

Among elementary schools, 234 needed improvement compared with 118 middle schools and 67 high schools. There were 48 schools with kindergarten through 12th grade all on one campus that needed improvement.

The letter grades law sailed through Texas' Republican-controlled Legislature last year, with supporters saying it will be

easier for parents and students to understand. Democrats and education advocates opposed the measure, and Robison said Monday that it was easier "to pass this A to F gimmick" than increase public education funding.

Florida implemented an A-F grade system in 1999, under then-Gov. Jeb Bush, who unsuccessfully ran for president this year. Fifteen states have since adopted similar ratings or are in the process of doing so.

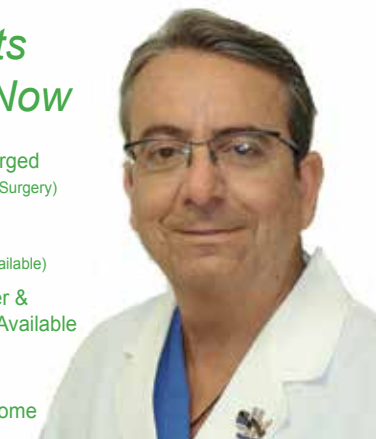
