The average farm that is infested with rats will re-guire about 10-15 pounds of the mixture to completely rid the premises of rat and mice. The secret of using any anto-coagulant poison is having it con-stantly before them for several days. If rats only get one meal of the poison it probably won't ef-fect them.
