State Highway 51 Made Federal Route

State Highway 51 has received designation as a federal route, it was announced this week. This is of tremendous importance to cities and towns along the highway for it means that Highway 51 is due to become a major north-south transcontinental route.

Highway 51 runs north and south through Castro County. Verification of the federal designation of this highway marked the culmination of work begun by the late Mr. T. A. Singer, owner and operator of the West Texas Tele-

phone Company. Mr. Singer saw Texas State Highway 51 as the southern sector of a national route extending from Big Bend National Park in Texas to Regina, Canada. He began working on this dream when much of the highway was still only a dirt road. Years of

travel, working and planning by Mr. Singer and the people with whom he instilled his own enthusiasm for the project finally paid off. The machinery he set up before his death on May 28th, 1957 finally resulted in the designation last week.

The announcement came when D. C. Greer, Texas Highway Engineer from Austin and chairman of the Highway Numbering Committee of the Association of American Highway Officials, informed a meeting of the International Parks Highway Association that

a new U.S. route has been established from Big Ben Park in southern Texas, to Pluma Junction in South Dakota. The designation was made by a meeting of the state highway officials in San Francisco. No number for the new highway has yet been set. The federal government will care for the highway.

International Parks Highway extends 1670 miles through the states of Texas, Oklahoma, Colorado, Nebraska, and North and South Dakota. It is State Highway 51 through the southern states, follows State Highway 19 across Nebraska, and joins U.S. 85 in South Dakota, near the towns of Lead and Deadwood, to continue on to North Dakota to the Canadian border at Fortuna.

The highway serves a great agricultural section throughout its length. It connects vacation lands in most of the state it crosses, including the Big Bend Park in Texas, Chadron State Park in Nebraska, the Black Hills area of South Dakota, and Roosevelt National Park in North Dakota.

This road also acts as a connecting link between three of the states important oil basins. It runs through the heart of the Permian Basin in Texas, then continues north through the Denver-Julesburg Basin, which centers around Sidney, Nebraska, and finally links up with the Williston Basin of North Dakota.

Highway officials say the federalization will bring a stepped-up flow of traffic from tourist, freight, and passenger transportation, as well as transfer of mail and other large-scale moving operations.

The route offers an all-weather fast, dependable traffic link, since there are no high mountain passes, no metropolitan areas, and a few hazards to driving, often encountered on more crowded roads. It is also about the best route from Mexico to Central Canada.

This will be Dimmitt's first federal highway. Chances are good the new road will mean more tourist courts, cafes and service stations in future years.

U.S. 851 is the number promoted by the International Parks Highways Association for the new road, but it remains only a suggested number. The highway's number must remain the same in all states as does U.S. Highway 66.

The route will probably be advertised through billboards and other mediums as a traffic artery. It is already fairly heavily traveled for a West Texas highway. The Highway Association plans to remain active and to promote the use of the route.

A program of Christmas music will be presented by the Dimmitt High School Choir, directed by Mr. Roy Lowe, at the regular meeting of the Parent Teacher's Association Tuesday, December 16 at 8:00 in the high school auditorium.

Mr. Lowe said the choir will sing a varied selection of Christmas music which will include some brand new publications as well as traditional selections.

about dimmitt and castro county by bascom nelson

With the coming Christmas season approaching, it would be well for the county population to again take cognizance of the fact that each and every one of us who ventures, however timidly, out of town is mixing himself into the greatest cauldron of carnage since the Romans threw poor credit risks to the lions.

During 1957 there were enough people killed on the highways in Texas alone to almost populate the city of Dimmitt. There were almost as many people sent to the hospitals of the state as live in the towns of Amarillo and Lubbock combined.

The biggest jump in accident fatalities comes during the Christmas season. So it behooves us to say these things because somewhere in the back of every Castro County motorist's mind we want to help keep alive that little troublesome spark that keeps eyeballs twitching nervously from side to side and remaining constantly alert.

For although it seems too many people harp on the hackneyed idea of highway safety, the fact remains that such harping has done more good than anything else. We may not like to admit it, but we have whatever caution we have simply because we have seen or heard of other citizens being picked up off the highways in baskets. For instance in 1935, when the speed limit was 45 miles an hour, there were 16.7 deaths per 100 million miles traveled. Today there are only 6.4 for the same mileage at a speed limit of 60 miles an hour. These grisly details aren't as encouraging as they seem since the 6.4 figure can cause many broken hearts and homes. But it does bring home the fact that the continued emphasis on safety by the Texas Department of Public Safety, the press, radio, TV, and other mediums has caused most drivers to be safety conscious.

Quite a bit is continually being done about highway safety. Swain Burkett, a local lawyer, returned last week from Austin where he was a member of the Governor's Highway Safety Commission. At their first annual conference the commission went into great detail concerning the present death rate and positive steps that could be done about it.

Most of us don't like to admit it, but we drive too fast. It is estimated that 28 percent of all highway travel by automobiles in Texas is in excess of the 60 mile an hour speed limit. Anyone familiar with machines and metal contrivances knows that it is suicide to put as much faith in our vehicles as we do. Should anything happen to a front wheel, the steering mechanism, or suspension system of an automobile at 80 miles an hour there's not much the driver can do but wait and see what happens.

So before starting out this year take a good look at your family, then look into a mirror. What you see would be pretty hard to replace.

Human beings must have something in common with the bears and frogs during the winter months. Every morning we feel like we've been hibernating for months. It's almost like being awakened from the dead.

It may be other people are the same way but it doesn't look like it. Every morning about 7:30 when we poke our head out the front door to see if it really is daylight yet, we see cars going by with shining, wide awake and alert faces behind the wheels. The fact that it is so ridiculously early in the morning doesn't seem to bother them.

Most mornings we would swear the alarm is fouled up. Otherwise why should it be going off at 3 a.m.? But it's always right.

If anyone could come up with a sure-fire way of awakening made easy for people who habitually stay up until midnight, they could get rich.

Area Rat Killing Drive Starts With Poisoning Next Week

A county wide rat and mouse control program will be launched beginning the week of December 15th. The control program is sponsored by Farm Bureau and the Extension Service. Charles Hottel, County Agent will direct the campaign.

Noble Howard, President of the Farm Bureau said rats have built up considerable this fall and are a serious health hazard, as well as doing thousands of dollars in damage. A campaign this time of the year with every one participating, should reduce the number considerably.

Mr. Hottel said the poison to be used in the campaign is 'Fumalin' one of the anti-coagulant poisons. To be effective the rat and mice must have consumed the bait from 4-8 days before it can kill them.

The bait is not extremely hazardous to livestock and pets, although it is a poison and should be treated as such.

The poison bait is obtained from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in bulk form and will be sacked by local 4-H club boys in approximately 1 pound sacks which will sell for 25c. The average farm that is infested with rats will require about 10-15 pounds of the mixture to completely rid the premises of rat and mice.

The secret of using any anti-coagulant poison is having it constantly before them for several days. If rats only get one meal of the poison it probably won't effect them.

By having a county wide campaign the poison is purchased at a considerably saving, and material will be sold at cost.

Several county business firms are cooperating in the campaign by serving as bait stations. The places of business where the poison can be picked up any time after Saturday 13 are: In Dimmitt,

Farm Bureau Office; In Hart, Cox Butane Supply; In Nazareth, Brockman Hardware; at Easter, The Community Grain Company and in Sunnyside, the Sunnyside

Grain and Supply Persons wishing to obtain the poison should get an adequate supply as the poison will only be available during the campaign.

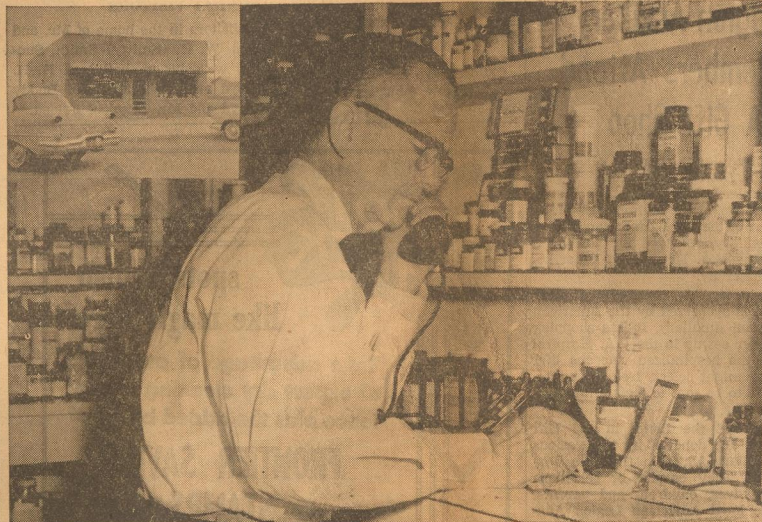

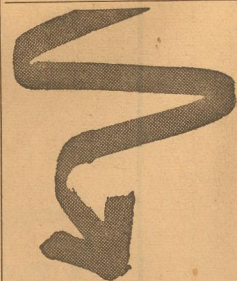
JayCee-Ettes Hold Christmas Party Tuesday Night

Postmaster Urges Early Mailing Of Christmas Items Before Rush

Postmaster Tom Bice said this week that, "Christmas may seem quite a way off, but nevertheless, we're starting our annual 'Mail Early For Christmas' Campaign immediately, because there's every indication that the 1958 Christmas season will set an all time mailing record."

The Postmaster said further that right now is the time to plan your Christmas card and gift mailings. The first thing to do is to check your Christmas card list very carefully—make sure that each address particularly on mail to larger cities includes full names, street and number, city, zone and state.

Bice went on to say that by a little advance planning, a lot of headaches can be avoided when the Christmas rush is on. The Postmaster suggests that you stock up now on heavy wrapping paper, sturdy corrugated cartons, strong cord, and paper adhesive tape, for use in securely packing and wrapping your Christmas gifts. Remember, also, that you can include your Christmas card or letter inside your gift package if you'll just add the appropriate First Class mail stamp for postage for the package itself. Be sure to use only First Class four cent, or seven cent Air Mail postage on your Christmas cards. All Cards sent by First Class mail may include a personal handwritten message, whereas a signature only is authorized on cards that are mailed at the three cent, Third Class rate.

The Postmaster says it's especially important to include your return address on every Christmas card envelope. Besides being socially correct, this is a big help to both you and your friends in keeping your mailing lists up-to-date. Through the fine cooperation of the public during recent years, Postmaster Bice reports that great progress has been made in getting the Christmas mails through on time.

Speaking further about his plans, the Postmaster said, "with over 170,000,000 people in the USA today, that means more Christmas mail than ever before, and that's why the Post Office needs your help in planning your Christmas mailings well in advance."

Christmas cards and gifts for most distant points should be mailed first, preferably well before December 10th, and those for nearby points should be mailed by December 15th, or at least a week before Christmas.

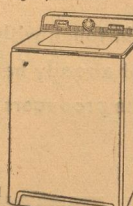

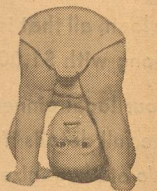

LIVESTOCK MARKET REPORT

Post holiday marketings of cattle and calves at the sale this week were in reduced supply with about 3,700 head offered during the two days of selling. This total is the smallest full weeks run at the local market since August and represents a decrease of around 17,000 head from last week and some 1,000 short of the same period one year ago. The volume of cows, bulls, and slaughter yearlings was the smallest this fall and made up less than 10 percent of the total run. There was larger number of feeder steers on sale and this class made up 20 percent of Tuesday's supply. On Monday, Medium and low Good stocker and feeder classes dominated, however, on the following session Good grade predominated and there was an increased showing of the Choice grade. Most of the Choice grades however was represented in the stock calf class. Trading was active throughout each session with cow selling fully steady. Bulls were mostly steady, instances 50 lower on Commercial grade at the close. Prices for feeder steers were generally steady, some sales weak to 50 lower on closing round. Stock steers and heifers moved at fully steady levels while stock calves were strong, spots 50 higher on Choice heifer calves.

Rocket Traffic Signals

It is likely that nothing in our lifetime has caught the imagination of all the people of the world as has the world's entry into the space age. This imagination has manifested itself in many ways in every age group of our society and, inevitably, in the building, testing and firing of rockets by amateur and professional scientists. This is a wonderful thing, I believe, and is a demonstration of the old adage, "we learn to do by doing." Like everything else however, there are certain hazards in these practices, and it is recognized that precautions must be taken to protect life and limb.

For this reason the Civil Aeronautics Board is considering proposed regulations for the operation of rockets and missiles. It is pointed out that these proposals stem from the increasing number of instances of potential hazards to aircraft in flight rather than any determination to destroy or unduly suppress any scientific endeavor, since the educational benefits to be derived from an organized experimental rocketry program are of great importance to all the nation. CAB points out that launchings of missiles have been conducted within the confines of airport traffic patterns, civil airways, and in such manner that they have penetrated other controlled air space areas. They have occurred at times when weather conditions prevented observation of aircraft in flight, thus creating a hazard to planes operating under instrument flight conditions. Certainly, the continued and ever increasing use of air space will dictate extremely efficient and precise use of this space. The Board's concern with these potential dangers has been shared by state and municipal authorities who have, in many instances, enacted ordinances providing that no rocket, other than for military or industrial purposes, shall be fired within the areas of their authority without prior approval and issuance of a permit. This concern has been enlarged by recent large scale production of rockets which are available to the general public through hobby shops and department

stores. I point out that these regulations are not final and that they may be amended or altered after consideration of views and opinions of citizens all over the country. The initial proposals are, however, these:

That, no rocket or missile shall be fired so as to be at any time at an altitude of more than 500 feet above the surface, unless the site utilized and the firing are approved by the administrator of the Civil Aeronautics Board.

That, no rocket or missile shall be fired from within or into any control zone, or so as to be at any time within five miles of any airport.

It is also pointed out that, in event these proposed regulations are adopted, holders of or applicants for a permit issued by the Administrator of CAB are not relieved of their responsibility to comply with any state or local (police, fire, aviation) ordinance, law or regulation.

The hearing to consider the adoption of these regulations will be conducted by the CAB here in Washington, probably sometime in February. As in all such proposals, interested persons may submit their views so as to reach the CAB Bureau of Safety by January 27, 1959.

stage and made something worthwhile.

A staged production has something movies and television can never offer. By watching a real life drama, done in a professional manner, the persons watching can develop a feeling of actually participating that doesn't come through any other acting medium. This is a hard feeling to get over, especially with high school actors whose training is virtually nonexistent. A good stage production is more of an experience than entertainment and anyone willing to come and try to enjoy it will find themselves treated to a pleasant evening.

A few years ago you could count the needy in Dimmitt on the fingers of one hand. Then one man planted his wheat crop and with the help of his family harvested it. The same held true for his feed crop. Most businesses in town were either owned by the people who worked them or good wages were paid skilled and semi-skilled help. There were almost no jobless people, nor were there laid-off Latin Americans or Negroes. But times and situations change. A man who works for a dollar an hour and is frequently out of work due to weather or seasonally idle farms is in a bad way. He can't have saved anything, especially if he has a family to support. These cases usually want work badly but this time of year common laborers are not in much demand. There are relief agencies he can

turn to, but these are geared to just keeping the family alive until the bread-winner can find work. A family in this situation can't have much of a Christmas. There are several agencies in Dimmitt who will possibly try to help these people during the Christmas season. Everyone in this land of plenty should have the opportunity of having a certain amount of

the traditional Christmas day trimmings. So when the JayCee-Ettes and church organizations start their Christmas welfare work, it would be a fine thing if everyone would help by giving old toys, clothes and anything else that would aid the cause. If we remember correctly, there were some thirty or thirty-one families who fell into

the needy category last year. With almost no trouble to ourselves, they can be helped to have a fine Christmas instead of just another cold day.

RUNNING WATER SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS—The above double row of Arizona Cypress trees were planted for windbreak. The trees are 10 years old and were planted on the south and west of the farmstead for protection against prevailing southwest winds. Maximum protection would have been received if windbreak had also been planted on north side of farmstead.

The objective of windbreaks is to serve as a barrier against high winds and to protect farm buildings, gardens, orchards, and livestock from wind and prevent damage from drifting sand and snow. Remember: March 1957 thousands of head of cattle perished in a blizzard which had wind driven snow with velocities of 75 miles per hour. Tall evergreen windbreaks could have been useful. It takes several years to grow a desirable windbreak, so you should plant yours next spring. The Running Water SCD is now taking applications for potted Arizona Cypress trees. Applications must be made by March 15, 1959 and blanks are available at the local SCS office.
