## Neugebauer questions prison decision

 Big Spring's congressional representative says he has serious questions about Obama administration plans to begin phasing out federal use of private prisons. Currently, the federal government houses thousands of

its prisoners at privately-run facilities such as the GEO Group-operated prisons in Big Spring, but Deputy Attorney General Sally Yates told the Bureau of Prisons in August to begin reducing "and ultimately ending" the Justice Department's use of private prisons. Department of Justice of-

officials cited a recent audit showing private facilities having more safety and security problems than government-run prisons. In addition, federal prison populations have been dropping be-

cause of changes in sentencing guidelines the past few years. However, U.S. Rep. Randy Neugebauer (R-Lubbock) wants the Justice Department to clarify its rationale behind the plan. In a letter Neugebauer and five other Texas congressman sent to DOJ officials late

last week, he said the move would adversely impact several Texas communities, including Big Spring. "I have many questions surrounding this directive," Neugebauer said in a Friday statement. "The DOJ and the BOP have not provided details about how this policy See **PRISON**, Page 3

## Garden City woman dies in accident

A Garden City woman died in a Midland hospital after being involved with a two-vehicle collision two miles south of Garden City Friday, according to information released by the Department of Public Safety (DPS).

According to a release by the DPS, Alicia Guerrero, 41, of Garden City was pronounced dead by Justice of the Peace David Cobbs at Midland Memorial Hospital.

Guerrero was a passenger in a 2007 Dodge Charger which was struck by a 2004 Dodge Ram 2500 driven by Cayla J. Lattimore, 23, of Jarrell late Friday night on Rural Route 33, two miles south of Garden City, the release stated.

According to the DPS, the Dodge Ram 2500 was traveling north on RR 33 and drove off the roadway into the barrow ditch, overcorrected then went into a skid striking the the Dodge Charger which was heading south on RR 33.

Lattimore was taken to Scenic Mountain Medical Center with non-incapacitating injuries, DPS reports.

Also injured in the collision was Itzamara G. Caranza-Guerrero, 18, of Garden City, the driver of the Charger. She was transported to Covenant Hospital

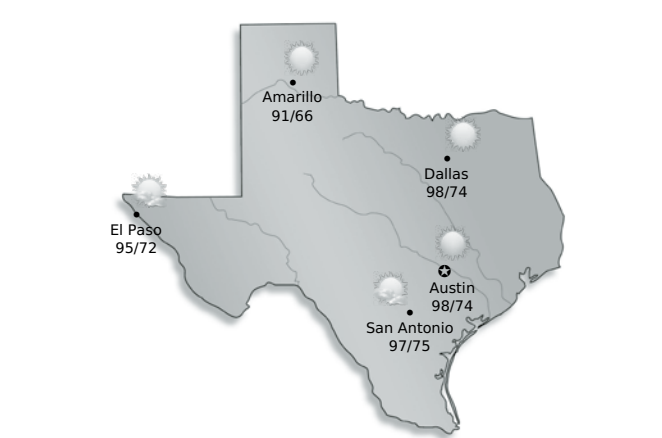

## Harlingen police arrested 15 in prostitution sting at park

HARLINGEN, Texas (AP) — Police have arrested 15 men in a weekend prostitution sting at a South Texas park amid concerns over immigrants being forced into the sex trade.

Harlingen police say the undercover operation happened Friday and Saturday in the Gutierrez Park area.

A Harlingen police statement says the prostitution sweep was in response to citizen concerns about activity in the area.

Undercover officers who were approached by the suspects agreed to accept money for sex acts.

## Texas man found guilty in Montana triple shooting

BUTTE, Mont. (AP) — A Texas man has been convicted of killing a Montana man and shooting two others.

The Montana Standard reports that 48-year-old Tony Dwade Sawyer was found guilty Monday of deliberate homicide and two counts of attempted deliberate homicide.

The November 2015 shootings left 37-year-old Joe

Powers dead and wounded Steve Drury and Hunter Smith.

Sawyer told investigators he feared for his life before shooting the three men in a rural area about 13 miles southeast of Butte.

He says they had all used methamphetamine before driving to the area and that he believed Drury had planned to "get rid of" him.

But prosecutors argued against Sawyer's self-defense claims, saying testimony showed Sawyer faced no danger and that he shouldn't have fled after the shootings.

District Judge Brad Newman scheduled sentencing for Nov. 2.

## Sheriff's office: Deputy fatally shot armed woman in Spring

SPRING, Texas (AP) — A Harris County Sheriff's Office spokesman says a deputy fatally shot a woman in Spring who refused orders to drop a gun.

Sgt. Cedrick Collier says two deputies responded Monday night to a home in Spring, where they encountered a woman who family members said had been threatening to kill them. The family members also said the woman threatened to harm any law enforcement officers who responded.

Collier says the woman pulled up in a vehicle and

got out with a pistol in her hand. He says she refused orders to drop it then pointed the gun at the two deputies. One deputy fired, striking the woman.

EMS was called to assist her, but she was pronounced dead at the scene.

## Student's body found burned, dismembered; man charged

GRAPEVINE, Texas (AP) — Officials say a man has been charged in the death of a North Texas college student whose body was found dismembered and burned in a park.

Grapevine police said Monday that 30-year-old Charles Dean Bryant has been charged with capital murder in the death of 24-year-old Jacqueline Vandagriff. Her body was found in a park Wednesday after firefighters extinguished a fire.

Police Sgt. Robert Eberling says Bryant and Vandagriff were seen together in a Denton bar the night before her body was found.

change will be implemented and the impact it will have. I am joined in this letter by five other members of Congress whose districts, like Texas 19, stand to be heavily and adversely impacted by this decision.

"In addition to the impact on jobs and our local governments, this directive also raises questions of potential national security concerns because it sends the message that law enforcement for criminal aliens is not a priority

for the federal government," Neugebauer's statement added. "One of the major questions that remains unanswered is where the prisoners currently housed in these private facilities will go."

In a statement released in the wake of the DOJ announcement, GEO Group officials said they were taking a "wait and see" approach to the situation.

"While our company was disappointed by today's DOJ announcement, the impact of this decision on GEO is not imminent," the statement read. "As acknowledged in the announcement, the BOP

will continue, on a case-by-case basis, to determine whether to extend contracts at the end of their contract period.

"Notwithstanding today's announcement, we will continue to work with the BOP, as well as all of our government partners, in order to ensure safe and secure operations at all of our facilities," the statement added. "Additionally, we will continue its efforts to provide industry-leading offender rehabilitation programs and reentry services with the objective of reducing recidivism and ensuring individuals successfully transition back into local commu-

nities. Our company provides high-quality, diversified services across all segments of the correctional and community reentry services spectrum in the United States as well as internationally."

The policy change does not cover private prisons used by Immigration and Customs Enforcement, which hold up to 34,000 immigrants awaiting deportation.

The private prisons on the chopping block are operated by three private companies — Corrections Corporation of

America, GEO Group Inc., and Management and Training Corporation.

# Michelle Obama hosts a Broadway event to help educate girls

NEW YORK (AP) — Michelle Obama tapped some big voices to help deliver her push to get girls educated across the world.

The U.S. first lady went to Broadway on Monday to host a concert for the spouses of global heads of state that included performances from the female-centric shows "The Color Purple," "Waitress," "Wicked" and "Beautiful: The Carole King Musical."

"More than 62 million girls around the world are counting on us to be their voice," Obama said. "And I intend to continue speaking out on their behalf — not just for the rest of my time as first lady but for the rest of my life. And I hope that you all will join me."

The concert was held at the Bernard B. Jacobs Theatre — the normal home of "The Color Purple" — as part of the Let Girls Learn initiative, which encourages world leaders to provide education opportunities to millions of girls globally who do not attend school.

"When people hear stories

of girls who aren't in school, they want to help. And as spouses of world leaders, so many of us here in this room have a platform that we can use to tell these stories and bring people together to take action for these girls.

Because people will pick up the phone when we call," Obama said.

The event, emceed by TV talk show host Stephen Colbert, took advantage of the gathering of world leaders in New York for the opening of the 71st United Nations General Assembly.

More than 50 spouses attended, along with public school children and girl scouts who packed the theater.

Colbert joked that Michelle Obama is one of the most admired women in the world "despite her constantly telling everyone to eat their vegetables." She hit the stage to a thundering ovation.

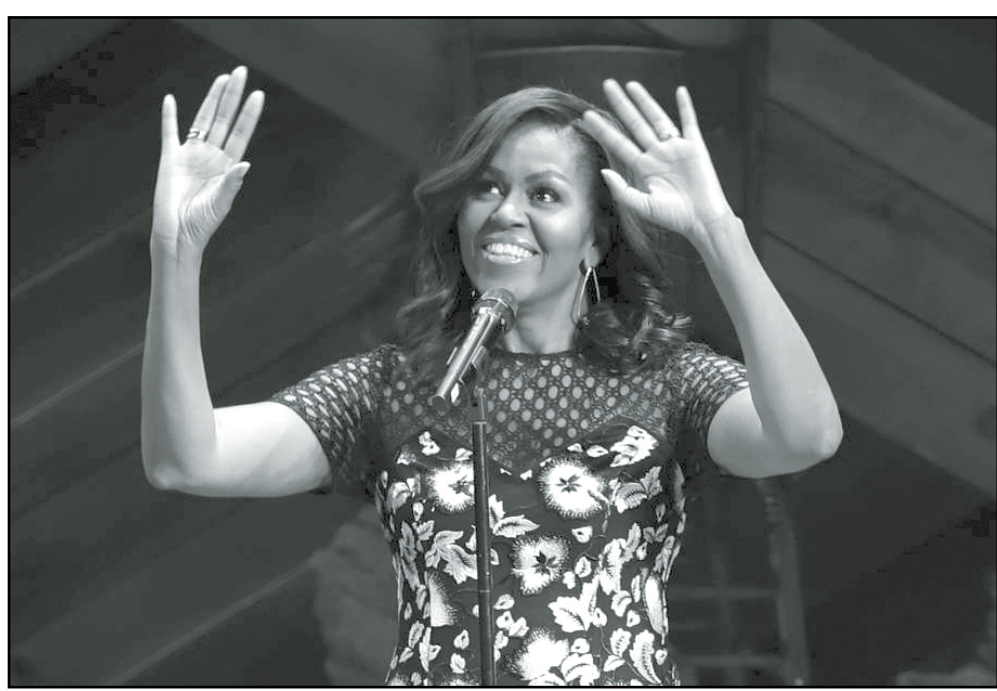
Remarks also were made by three girls from Jordan, Pakistan and Malawi about the work in their home countries still needed for adolescent girls, as well as song-

writer Sara Bareilles, Jordan's Queen Rania, and Gertrude Mutharika, the first lady of Malawi.

Bareilles, who wrote the songs "Brave" and "Love Song," helped create the musical "Waitress," the first-ever Broadway musical with an all-female creative team. She joked that she didn't even notice that at first.

"What a gift that was — that I was given an opportunity to be so seen and so empowered and so trusted and so reflective of my environment that I actually for a moment forgot to notice how rare it was," Bareilles said.

"That is my wish for girls all over the world: That they

The 90-minute event included the 2016 best actress Tony Award winner Cynthia Erivo singing a powerful "I'm Here" from "The Color Purple," Jennifer DiNoia

and Carrie St. Louis singing "For Good" from "Wicked," the performers Charity Angel Dawson, Stephanie Torns and Jenna Ushkowitz singing "A Soft Place to Land" from "Waitress," and a medley of songs by Carole King led by Chilina Kennedy.

## House that played Harry Potter's Privet Drive home for sale

LONDON (AP) — A suburban London house that starred onscreen as Harry Potter's childhood home is on the market.

Fans of the boy wizard will recognize 12 Picket Post Close as 4 Privet Drive, home of Harry's dastardly aunt and uncle, the Dursleys.

The couple grudgingly took Harry in after his parents were murdered and made him sleep in a cupboard under the stairs.

The house in Bracknell, located 30 miles (50 kms) west of London, was a location featured in the 2001 film "Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone." A studio set of the house was built for later installments of the eight-film series.

Real estate agent Chancellors says the 3-bedroom house "has recently undergone complete renovation to an extremely high standard." It has an asking price of 475,000 pounds (\$616,000).

## Colson Whitehead is finalist for Kirkus fiction prize

NEW YORK (AP) — Colson Whitehead is up for another literary honor, the Kirkus Prize for fiction.

Whitehead's acclaimed "The Underground Railroad," a novel set during the Civil War, is among six nominees announced Tuesday for the \$50,000 award. Whitehead's book is also on the longlist for the National Book Awards and last month was chosen by Oprah Winfrey for her book club.

Another novel on the National Book Awards longlist, Adam Haslett's "Imagine Me Gone," is a Kirkus finalist. The other fiction choices are Joe McGinniss Jr.'s "Carousel Court," C.E. Morgan's "The Sport of Kings," E. Annie Proulx's "Barkskins" and Amor Towles' "A Gentleman in Moscow."

Kirkus, the book industry trade publication, also announced six finalists each for \$50,000 prizes in nonfiction and children's literature. Like the National Book Awards, many of the Kirkus picks have themes of race and social justice.

Winners will be announced Nov. 3. Nonfiction nominees include Susan Faludi's memoir about her father, "In the Darkroom," and J.D. Vance's best-seller about growing up in a rural white community, "Hillbilly Elegy." The other nonfiction picks are Sarah Bakewell's "At the Existential Cafe," Matthew Desmond's "Evicted," Michael Eric Dyson's "The Black Presidency" and Beth Macy's "Truevine."

"Thunder Boy Jr.," a picture book by Sherman Alexie and illustrator Yuyi Morales, is a nominee

for children's books.

The other finalists are Ashley Bryan's "Freedom Over Me," Russell Freedman's "We Will Not Be Silent," Jason Reynolds' "As Brave As You," Traci Chee's "The Reader" and Meg Medina's "Burn Baby Burn."

## 'Downton's' Maggie Smith asks Jimmy Kimmel where her Emmy is

LOS ANGELES (AP) — "Downton Abbey" star Dame Maggie Smith wants Emmy host Jimmy Kimmel to show her where her Emmy is.

Kimmel joked during his Emmy monologue Sunday night that stars had to be present to win under what he called "the Maggie Smith rule." The British actress had been nominated nine times for Emmys and won three without ever showing up.

When Smith won again on Sunday night, Kimmel took the statuette from presenter Minnie Driver and said, "We're not mailing this to her. Maggie, if you want this, it will be in the lost and found."

The 81-year-old Smith responded Monday with a message on the Masterpiece Theater Twitter account, saying "If Mr. Kimmel could please direct me to the lost and found office I will be on the next flight."

## Ken Burns says new Nazi documentary evokes refugees' plight

KEENE, N.H. (AP) — When Ken Burns screened clips of his latest documentary at the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum, a fearful woman approached him and asked, "Is this going to happen to us again?"

The documentary, "Defying the Nazis: The Sharps' War," tells the story of a Wellesley, Massachusetts, couple who rescued refugees and dissidents in Europe before and after the start of World War II. It airs on PBS on Tuesday, the day Democratic President Barack Obama and other world leaders host a summit aimed at securing new commitments to support today's refugees.

The parallels to today weren't lost on Burns, who co-directed the film with the couple's grandson Artemis Joukowsky.

"It's about sacrifice, and it's about cost," Burns said. "We live in a very narcissistic age, and people don't make those gestures, or at least we live in a media culture that does not isolate and focus on people who make these kinds of selfless gestures without the PR attached to it."

## Wealth of clues led to quick arrest of suspected bomber

NEW YORK (AP) — The man suspected of planting bombs in a New York neighborhood and a New Jersey seaside town may have aimed to inflict carnage incognito, but he didn't succeed for long in concealing his identity.

Ahmad Khan Rahami provided investigators with a wealth of clues that led to his arrest about 50 hours after the first explosion, according to three law enforcement officials familiar with the investigation.

His fingerprints and DNA were found at the scene of the Manhattan bombing, they said. His uncovered face was clearly captured by surveillance cameras near the spot of the blast.

Electronic toll records showed a car to which he had access was driven from New Jersey to Manhattan and back to New Jersey the day of the bombing, according to the officials, who spoke to The Associated Press on condition of anonymity because they weren't authorized to discuss an ongoing case.

Those and other clues spurred officials to publicize his name and photo Monday morning, asking for help finding Rahami, 28, a U.S. citizen born in Afghanistan, who lives with his Muslim family in Elizabeth, New Jersey.

## UN suspends all convoys in Syria after attack on aid trucks

BEIRUT (AP) — The U.N. humanitarian aid agency suspended all convoys in Syria on Tuesday following deadly airstrikes on aid trucks the previous night that activists said killed at least 12 people, mostly truck drivers and Red Crescent workers.

The attack plunged Syria's U.S.-Russia-brokered cease-fire further into doubt. The Syrian military, just hours earlier, had declared the week-long truce had failed. The United States said it was prepared to extend the truce deal and Russia — after blaming rebels for the violations — suggested it could still be salvaged.

In Geneva, spokesman Jens Laerke of OCHA said further aid delivery would hold pending a review of the security situation in Syria in the aftermath of the airstrike. Laerke called it "a very, very dark day... for humanitarians across the world."

The U.N. aid coordinator said the Syria government had granted needed authorizations in recent days to allow for aid convoys to proceed inside Syria. Humanitarian U.N. aid deliveries had stalled in recent weeks amid continued fighting, and the truce had not paved the way for expanded convoys as initially expected.

It was not clear who was behind the attack late on Monday, which sent a red fireball into the sky in the dead of night over a rural area in Aleppo province. Both Syrian and Russian aircraft operate over Syria, as well as the U.S.-led coalition that is targeting the Islamic State group.

## Pressure on Argentina's Macri to keep vow on Syrian refugees

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) — Having escaped the civil war in her homeland to find refuge in Argentina, Nairouz Baloul hopes the South American nation will now welcome many more Syrians like her to begin a new life.

President Mauricio Macri has said he wants to allow more than 3,000 Syrian refugees into Argentina. But the plan has stalled, and organizations and members of Argentina's Syrian community are pressuring the administration to keep its promise.

"If he has the key to unlock this, I think he shouldn't hesitate to open the door to other human beings," said Baloul, 29, an English teacher who escaped what she calls a "living nightmare" in Syria.

One of her brothers was killed by a bomb in Damascus in 2014. She prefers not to speak about it but since she arrived in Buenos Aires last month with another brother, she has become hopeful that the rest of their family will be able to join them in Argentina.

"I feel safe now, but I'm not totally happy because I want others to be safe as well," Baloul said.

## For Obama, a swan song on global stage in final UN speech

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — Standing before the United Nations for the last time as president, Barack Obama will reassure foreign leaders that the world is better equipped to tackle its challenges than at almost any point in history despite a cas-

cade of harrowing crises that seem devoid of viable solutions.

Obama's speech is always a focal point of the annual U.N. General Assembly, but his address Tuesday marks Obama's swan song on the international stage. He stepped into his role eight years ago with sky-high expectations and has struggled to deliver when it comes to solving global problems partially beyond America's control.

Ben Rhodes, Obama's deputy national security adviser, said the president was cognizant of the fact that bright spots such as economic growth and climate change cooperation are offset by the "great deal of unease" in the world, including Syria's civil war and concerns about Russia's aggression toward Ukraine.

"The way the president will approach this is trying to apply what we have done that's worked in the last eight years as a template for how we deal with other crises," Rhodes said.

He cited diplomatic achievements on Iran and global warming and outreach to former U.S. adversaries Cuba and Myanmar as illustrative of the approach Obama hoped would continue after he leaves office.

## World leaders at UN must tackle Syria, extremism, refugees

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — World leaders gather at the United Nations for their annual meeting Tuesday with an array of global crises that desperately need solutions, topped by the Syrian conflict, escalating attacks around the world by Islamic extremists, and millions of people fleeing fighting and poverty.

Whether the 135 heads of state and government and more than 50 ministers are able to make any progress before the high-level meeting of the General Assembly ends on Sept. 26 remains to be seen. While hopes are high, expectations are low.

The leaders are meeting against a backdrop of rising ethnic and religious tension, fighting elsewhere in the Mideast and Africa, a warming planet, and unfulfilled goals to give every child in the world a primary school education and to achieve equality for women.

The global chaos facing the leaders was made even starker in the past two days with the attacks in New York City and the deadly attack on a U.N. humanitarian convoy in Syria and the near collapse of a cease-fire in the war-ravaged country that has been repeatedly broken.

The latest developments placed added importance on a meeting early Tuesday morning of the International Syria Support Group, comprised of about 20 countries supporting opposing sides in the conflict. It will be led by U.S. Secretary of State John Kerry and Russian Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov, who hammered out the cease-fire agreement.

## Mall attacker was recent college student, security guard

ST. CLOUD, Minn. (AP) — He was a recent college student with an interest in computers who had worked part time as a private security guard. He was said to be an honor student in high school. And he had nothing more than a minor traffic citation on his record.

But on Saturday, for reasons still unclear, authorities say Dahir Ahmed Adan put on a security guard uniform and went into a central Minnesota mall armed with what appeared to be a kitchen knife. In an attack that took just minutes, he injured 10 people before he was shot and killed by an off-duty police officer.

Those who know Adan, 20, say he was a calm, cool guy with a good head on his shoulders. They are trying to come to terms with what happened and figure out what pushed him to violence.

Authorities have released little information about Adan but say they are investigating the attacks as a potential act of terrorism. An Islamic State-run news agency

claimed the attacker was a "soldier" for the group.

## Stunt? Even with jerseys and books to sell, Tebow says no

PORT ST. LUCIE, Fla. (AP) — Mets fans can buy a few jerseys featuring names of players in the team's instructional league.

Cespedes jerseys, they're big sellers. Cone jerseys, available as throwbacks.

Of course, those are for Yoenis Cespedes and David Cone, and not the instructional leaguers — Ricardo Cespedes and Gene Cone. No, the only of the 58 players getting a spotlight in this camp with the Mets is Tim Tebow, the quarterback-turned-baseball-hopeful whose No. 15 jersey is already a hot seller even though he has yet to take one professional at-bat.

The Mets are cashing in already, and Tebow has a book coming out next month. Yet both the team and its new star-of-sorts insist this is no publicity stunt, even though the odds seem stacked very high against a 29-year-old former football player finding his way to the major leagues.

## 20K cases dismissed over refinery emissions release in Texas

GALVESTON, Texas (AP) — A judge has dismissed about 20,000 cases filed against BP by people who alleged they got sick after a 2010 emissions release from its Texas City refinery.

The Galveston County Daily News reports a judge Monday granted BP's request to remove nearly half of the 45,000 pending class-action cases. Judge Lonnie Cox found some plaintiffs never showed evidence of damages or they opted out of any settlement, where the other cases remain.

Regulators say the refinery in April and May 2010 emitted 500,000 pounds of chemicals, including carbon monoxide and benzene. BP denied that the release, during flaring, caused health issues.

Investigators determined BP violated Texas air quality laws. The company paid \$50 million in a state settlement including past emission violations. Marathon Petroleum Corp. now owns the refinery.

## South Texas police officer arrested on drug counts, fired

RIO GRANDE CITY, Texas (AP) — A South Texas police detective has been arrested on drug trafficking charges after investigators say he tipped off dealers to law enforcement activity.

Court records show Ramon DeLaCruz Jr. remains in custody pending a federal detention hearing Thursday in McAllen. Rio Grande City police Chief Noe Castillo says DeLaCruz was fired Monday after about two years on the force.

DeLaCruz was arrested Friday on charges of conspiracy to possess with intent to distribute marijuana.

The complaint says DeLaCruz helped dealers distribute more than a ton of marijuana, including some pot stolen and redistributed after being reported as a drug seizure.

# Big 12 falls behind Power 5

CHARLESTON, W.Va. — These are not proud times for the Big 12. The conference ranks last among the Power 5 leagues, going 15-11 against nonconference opponents over the first three weeks.

The .577 winning percentage ranks last among the Power 5 conferences and sixth among all FBS conferences, while the 15 wins are eighth among the 10 leagues.

The Big Ten leads the way at 79 percent, followed by the Southeastern Conference, the Pac 12, American and the Atlantic Coast Conference.

"I look around the country and there's a lot of surprises that take place," Kansas State coach Bill Snyder said Monday. "Coaches understand that they're vulnerable every time they get on the field."

And all that preseason talk of again making the four-team College Football Playoff needs to be put on hold, at least for now.

First, the Big 12 needs to get into position. The conference has no team ranked in the top 15.

"I hope it's too early to figure it out," said Baylor interim coach Jim Grobe. "A lot of teams have at the first of the year started a little sluggishly. We are no different than everybody else. We hope as we go through the season we get better and better."

Oklahoma made the playoff a year ago despite losing to Texas. After falling to Houston and Ohio State this month, the 25th-ranked Sooners are 1-2 for the first time since 2005, and now coach Bob Stoops is using a bye week to shift his team's focus on winning a conference championship.

"As far as goals go, that's always a major one for us," Stoops said.

No. 16 Baylor (3-0) and West Virginia (2-0) are the league's only remaining unbeaten teams.

Coach Charlie Strong of No. 21 Texas (2-1) said the Big 12 "will be fine," while Oklahoma State's Mike Gundy said it will be sever-

al weeks before the football playoff committee starts taking an in-depth look at individual team performances.

"We've got to play our games, keep going and do the best we can," Gundy said.

Oklahoma State (2-1) hosts Baylor on Saturday in a game that will give early momentum in the league race. Four other teams continue nonconference play, and Kansas, Texas Tech and Texas join Oklahoma in having a bye week.

Some other notes from around the Big 12:

—Premature celebrations: Stoops said he planned to talk to the Sooners about dropping the ball short of the goal line on a 97-yard kickoff return for a touchdown Saturday against Ohio State. The touchdown stood.

Against Texas, Cal's Vic Enwere did the same thing at the end of a 55-yard run. Cal retained possession and ran out the clock.

Andrus scored the winning run on All-Star center fielder Ian Desmond's RBI single with no outs in the ninth inning as the Rangers beat the last-place Los Angeles Angels 3-2 on Monday night for their MLB-best 46th consecutive win.

"That has been our DNA this year. We didn't give up until the last out, until the last pitch, and it's contagious," said Andrus, who also had a tying solo homer in the seventh.

Andrus led off the ninth with a sharp single to left off Jose Alvarez (1-3) before Carlos Gomez turned an attempted sacrifice into a bunt single. Desmond's single gave the Rangers (89-62) their 20th last at-bat victory and they improved to 35-10 in one-run games.

Nomar Mazara also homered for the Rangers, whose magic number is three to win their second consecutive division title. After Seattle lost and Houston won later Monday, the Mariners and Astros were tied for second place, 9 1/2 games behind Texas in the AL West.

"Play it straight, just trying to

play the same way we've been playing all year," Desmond said about being close to clinching. "It's been working. No need to change it now."

Closer Sam Dyson (3-2) worked a scoreless ninth for the victory after starter Martin Perez went seven innings and Matt Bush worked a perfect eighth.

Alvarez, the sixth Angels pitcher, had gotten out of a bases-loaded jam in the eighth following a 38-minute rain delay, two innings after Rangers manager Jeff Banister was ejected for arguing when a replay challenge overturned an out and led to an Angels run.

Yunel Escobar was thrown out by several feet trying to stretch his hit into a triple in the sixth, then motioned toward the outfield. Manager Mike Scioscia challenged the ball had become lodged underneath the padding on the wall in right-center field and should have been ruled

dead, as per the ground rules for the Rangers ballpark.

"We thought that someone put their hands up like it was out of play. I think that's what (Escobar) saw," Scioscia said. "He kind of stutter-stepped and slowed down."

Banister was ejected when he came out to get an explanation and kept questioning crew chief and second base umpire Joe West after Escobar was put at second base. The replay showed right fielder Mazara played the ball and never indicated it was wedged under the padding.

"From the infield you can't tell if it's stuck. ... But when we went to replay, they said it stuck. So it's plain and simple a ground-rule double," West told a pool reporter after the game.

"I had an outfielder who felt like the ball was not lodged. If you look at the video, the ball

## Marwin Gonzalez and Astros score twice in 9th to beat Athletics 4-2

OAKLAND, Calif.

(AP) — A big pinch-hit double by seldom-used Tyler White in the eighth inning and little discipline at the plate by Marwin Gonzalez in the ninth provided just enough to keep the Houston Astros on the fringe of the AL wild card race.

Manager A.J. Hinch's ballclub might be down — three games, in fact — but they're not out.

White hit a game-tying double in the eighth and Gonzalez followed with a two-run single off Ryan Madson in the ninth and the Astros came from behind to beat the Oakland Athletics 4-2 on Monday night. "We need them all,

I loved how our team hung in there until the end," Hinch said. "Some of the biggest at-bats were when the game was on the line."

Houston remains three games behind Baltimore and Toronto in the race for the AL wild card spots.

"We're fighting to the end," Gonzalez said. "Nobody's quitting. We've got to fight until the end."

The Astros trailed 2-1 going into the eighth inning but tied it on White's RBI-double then they scored twice in the ninth to keep their slim playoff hopes alive.

Jose Altuve and Carlos Correa opened the inning with singles.

After Evan Gattis was intentionally walked, Gonzalez lined the first pitch from Madson (5-7) into center field to drive in Altuve and Correa.

"He didn't get too big," Hinch said of his switch-hitting first baseman. "Sometimes our guys, they want to win so badly, you want to be the guy, we can come out of our swing a little bit. Not tonight."

Correa finished with two hits while Gattis hit his 28th home run of the season to help the Astros to their fifth straight win over the A's.

Former Oakland reliever Luke Gregerson (4-1) retired three batters for the win. Ken

Giles pitched the ninth for his 12th save.

Ryon Healy and Bruce Maxwell hit solo home runs for the A's, who had won six of seven before the bullpen allowed three runs in two innings.

Cotton allowed one run over six innings. The right-hander retired 18 of the 20 batters he faced, allowing Gattis' home run in the second. He struck out six.

"Every time out he looks like the same guy," A's manager Bob Melvin said. "He's locating all his pitches, his changeup in any count, and his curveball was probably better today than we've seen it. He pitched great."

mond suit by first cashing the king or the ace. (Remember, you are assuming a 4-0 division because if the suit is divided 3-1 or 2-2, the grand slam is cold.)  
**To settle the question** beyond the shadow of a doubt, you next cash the ace of spades, and when everyone follows suit, you know that playing a low diamond to the ace is certain to bring home the grand slam.  
**This is because West** cannot have less than a six-card suit for his vulnerable three-club bid, and since he has already shown up with three hearts and a spade, he cannot hold four diamonds.  
**Sure enough,** when you lead the diamond six to the ace, West shows out. You then continue with the deuce and trap East's J-9-5, whatever he does. If he plays the five, you finesse the seven; if he plays the nine instead, you win with the king, cross to the queen of spades and return the four of diamonds, gobbling up East's J-5 with your Q-7.  
**Ordinarily,** when you hold K-Q-x-x opposite A-10-x-x-x, you would cash the king first — and it would be easy to make that mistake here from force of habit. But in the present case — where you're lucky enough to hold the seven and eight in the two hands, and also have the benefit of West's three-club bid — cashing the ace is clearly the correct play.

This Date In History

Today is Tuesday, Sept. 20, the 264th day of 2016. There are 102 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On Sept. 20, 1946, the first Cannes Film Festival, lasting 16 days, opened in France. Among the films honored with the Golden Palm were "The Lost Weekend," "Brief Encounter," "Rome, Open City" and "Pastoral Symphony"; "The Battle of the Rails" won the International Jury Prize.

On this date: In 1519, Portuguese explorer Ferdinand Magellan and his crew set out from Spain on five ships to find a western passage to the Spice Islands. (Magellan was killed en route, but one of his ships eventually circled the world.) In 1870, Italian troops took control of the Papal States, leading to the unification of Italy. In 1884, the National Equal Rights Party was formed during a convention of suffragists in San Francisco; the convention nominated Belva Ann Bennett Lockwood for president. In 1911, the British liner RMS Olympic collided with the Royal Navy cruiser HMS

Hawke off the Isle of Wight; although seriously damaged, the Olympic was able to return to Southampton under its own power. In 1947, former New York City Mayor Fiorello La Guardia died. In 1958, Martin Luther King Jr. was seriously wounded during a book signing at a New York City department store when he was stabbed in the chest by Izola Curry. (Curry was later found mentally incompetent; she died at a Queens, New York, nursing home in 2015 at age 98.) In 1962, James Meredith, a black student, was blocked from enrolling at the University of Mississippi by Democratic Gov. Ross R. Barnett. (Meredith was later admitted.) In 1973, in their so-called "battle of the sexes," tennis star Billie Jean King defeated Bobby Riggs in straight sets, 6-4, 6-3, 6-3, at the Houston Astrodome. Singer-songwriter Jim Croce, 30, died in a plane crash near Natchitoches, Louisiana. In 1976, Playboy magazine released an interview in which Democratic presidential nominee Jimmy Carter admitted he'd "looked on a lot of women with lust." The historical drama series "I, Claudius," starring Derek Jacobi as the fourth emperor of Ancient Rome, began airing on BBC

Television. In 1984, a suicide car bomber attacked the U.S. Embassy annex in north Beirut, killing at least 14 people - two Americans and 12 Lebanese. The family sitcoms "The Cosby Show" and "Who's the Boss?" premiered on NBC and ABC, respectively. In 1999, Lawrence Russell Brewer became the second white supremacist to be convicted in the dragging death of James Byrd Jr. in Jasper, Texas. (Brewer was executed on Sept. 21, 2011.) Raisa Gorbachev, wife of the last Soviet leader, Mikhail Gorbachev, died at a German hospital after a battle with leukemia; she was 67. In 2000, Independent Counsel Robert Ray announced the end of the Whitewater investigation.

TCU’s Gary Patterson said if one of his players does that, “they just need to keep running up our tunnel.”  
—Louisville’s Lamar Jackson: The Cardinals quarterback has launched himself into early Heisman Trophy chatter. The only player ahead of him in total offense is Texas Tech’s Patrick Mahomes at 544

yards per game. Jackson is at 459.  
Texas Tech coach Kliff Kingsbury gives Jackson his due.  
“That kid’s phenomenal,” Kingsbury said. “Lamar has had some nationally televised games and beat a very good Florida State team. I think if Patrick just continues to improve and does what he’s been doing against the competition (that) continues to get stiffer as we move into conference, all that stuff will take care of itself.”  
—TCU’s KaVontae Turpin. Patterson declined to disclose the status of the wide receiver and returner who was helped off the field

in TCU’s 41-20 win over Iowa State. Turpin entered the game leading the nation in all-purpose yards at 236 per game.  
Patterson said Turpin has a leg injury and “hopefully we’ll get him back in the future.”  
—Kansas turnovers. Coach David Beaty isn’t pleased that his team has 11 turnovers in three games. But he points out the Jayhawks have surrendered just 22 points off those turnovers.  
“That’s amazing what our defense has been able to do,” he said. “If we can just minimize those mistakes, that will help us get into the win column.”
