Volunteers battle fire near Forsan

FORSAN — Fifteen homes along Wildfire Road were in potential danger Wednesday from a large grass fire that was eventually contained after several hours of work by the Howard County Volunteer Fire Department.

According to Howard County Volunteer Fire Department (HCVFD) Chief Tommy Sullivan, it was all hands on deck to put out a grass fire in south Howard County late Wednesday afternoon.

"At 4:30 p.m. we got a call for a fire out on Longshore and FM 461," a bleary-eyed Sullivan said this morning. "One of my firefighters lives south of

Grand jury indicts man who engaged police in standoff

A Big Spring man who was in a brief standoff with law enforcement officials in September was indicted by the Howard County Grand Jury.

Joe William Petty, 53, of 2011 Johnson St. was indicted on a charge of delivery of a controlled substance (more than 1 gram but less than 4 grams) which is a 2nd degree felony.

In late September, Petty

was arrested following the standoff, which began when investigators with the Department of Public Safety attempted to serve an arrest warrant at a residence on Bluebonnet Street. According to reports at the time, Petty retreated back into the residence and locked the door.

The SWAT team was called in and once the team approached the door,

"The first time I saw them, I thought this is something I'd love to do and then I just fell in love from there," McMurray said. "If you love the military, you will love this."

McMurray, a Lance Corporal in the Young Marines Crossroads Unit, was recently named the Young Marine of the Year for the 4th Battalion.

"He is motivated, dedicated and he loves this program," said Roger Rodman, commander of the local unit. "His ambition is to enlist in the Marine Corps after graduation, which is not a requirement of this program, but many kids in this program have that desire. Officials: Early voting for general election passes 5K

After a slow start to the week Monday, early voting for the Nov. 8 general election picked back up, as 653 people cast their ballots Tuesday.

Tuesday's count brings early voting totals to 5,103, which represents about 30 percent of Howard County's registered voters.

Early voting for the general

election continues through Friday in the county elections administrator's office, located on the first floor of the county courthouse. Voting hours are from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., except for Thursday, when polling will be held from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

There are few contested state races for Howard County voters to decide upon, but the biggest race has probably

made up for lack of drama elsewhere.

Since the national party conventions this summer, presidential candidates Hillary Clinton (Democrat) and Donald Trump (Republican) have been locked in a heated political battle. Other presidential candidates on the ballot in Texas are Libertarian Gary Johnson and the Green Party's Jill Stein.

As has been the case for the past several elections, voters must provide suitable ID before they will be allowed to cast their ballots. If they do not have one of the state-approved forms of photo identification, they can sign an affidavit that will allow them to vote, as long as they can provide documentation which includes their name and address.

Police: 2 officers in Iowa killed in ambush-style attacks

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — Police in Des Moines, Iowa, say two officers have been shot and killed in ambush-style attacks.

The Des Moines Police Department said in a news release that the shootings took place early Wednesday. Officers responded to a report of shots fired at about 1:06 a.m. and found an Urbandale Police Department officer who had been shot.

Des Moines officers responded to assist. About 20 minutes later, a Des Moines officer was found shot. Both officers have died.

The Des Moines Police Department said suspect information is being developed. The agency didn't immediately release any other information but said a news conference

was planned for 5 a.m.

Iraqi forces pause at edge of Mosul, weather cuts visibility

GOGJALI, Iraq (AP) — Iraqi special forces were holding their positions along Mosul's eastern outskirts on Wednesday as poor weather hampered visibility in operations to rout Islamic State fighters from the country's second-largest city.

Brig. Gen. Haider Fadhil said that no advances were planned for the day, as high humidity and clouds were obscuring the view of aircraft and drones.

From the Mosul neighborhood of Gogjali, which is inside city limits but just outside more urban districts, the guns went largely silent on Wednesday, though sporadic rifle cracks could be heard.

town and got on the radio and said there was a long column of smoke. That's never a good indicator in a wildfire. We got out to Wildfire Road and we deemed at that time we had potentially 15 houses in danger."

Sullivan said he assigned his large fire trucks to protect the houses and then made the call for all available personnel and fire trucks to the scene. In all, nine HCVFD units, a fire unit from the Glasscock County Drumright Fire Station, a bridge dozer and two maintainers from the Howard County Road and Bridge Office, and

Howard County Sheriff's Deputies responded to the scene.

"In all we had about 35 personnel on the scene," he said. "We got the fire contained about 10 p.m. We had some trucks working spot fires for the next couple of hours. Everybody went home about midnight."

According to Sullivan, the fire originated from a power line pole break which caused a fuse in the power substation to overload and drop out onto the ground, igniting the grass. Wind gusts of up to 18 mph at times during the afternoon helped to drive the fire. Also, the terrain and location of the fire created some hinderances for firefighters, Sullivan added.

"It was down in a valley," he said. "Our bigger trucks had to use the water supplies for structure protection. We got the maintainers to help cut roads to get our brush trucks and cab units in."

All structures were saved and no injuries were reported after the 5½-hour fight, Sullivan said.

"It was a good day," he said.

Anybody can sell you a can of green beans, but for you to have a good time doing it is a different story."

Oklahoma transplant Ray Porter opened his first grocery store in Andrews in 1945, and the chain has been family owned and operated ever since, Ellison said. It's that family dynamic, he noted, that separates Porter's from oth-

er grocery stores. "Our decisions are based on people, not numbers," he said. "We're a business, so of course we're trying to make money, but that's not what drives us. You'll be greeted at the door with a warm smile

... and when all is said and done, sackers will carry your groceries out to your car."

Today is considered the "soft" opening of the store. Ellison said its grand opening, complete with give-aways and other events, will be

Young Marine must perform 50 hours of community service to stay active in the group. Young Marines study close order drill, survival skills, map and compass, and field and knot tying. The program also teaches Marine Corp history.

"If we can make a difference in one young person's life — male or female — ... that's what we want to do to teach them respect, self-re-

spect, teamwork, leadership, and discipline so they can be successful in life and not have to wander around from pillar to post before it finally clicks," Rodman said. "If we can teach them this young, they will lead a successful life and they will be model American citizens. That's what we are out to do."

This year, Rodman was selected as the Registered Adult Volunteer of the Year for the 4th Battalion.

"I was quite surprised at the honor of being

selected of RAV of the Year," he said. "That is not why I am in the program. I am in the program for these young people to learn how to live their lives successfully. I am humbled and I am proud."

Both Roger, a U.S. Marine Corps and Navy veteran, and his wife Carrie, began the Crossroads Young Marines and have overseen the program for the past nine years. Roger said its one of the best youth programs he's seen. "As we see America's youth on a downtrend

as far as personal accountability, self-respect, almost every aspect of their lives, that's what makes she and I more determined to run a good program like this to teach these kids," he said. "Sooner or later, we are going to hand that torch off to them and I'd rather hand it off to somebody like Young Marine Lance Cpl. McMurray then somebody that doesn't know what it means to be accountable and responsible. That's how we raised our kids and our kids are successful."

The Crossroads Young Marines meets every other Saturday at the First Baptist Church in the Young Marine's Headquarters, 705 FM 700. The initial cost to join is \$200 for the first year, which includes all uniforms, boots, and other necessities to begin the program, then \$80 for each additional year.

What FBI Director Comey did wrong

In July, FBI Director James Comey shattered his near-sterling reputation by letting Hillary Clinton off the hook. After delivering a meticulous case against Clinton for setting up a private server and allowing classified information to flow into it illegally, he inexplicably decided not to recommend indictment by the Department of Justice.

This followed hard on President Obama announcing he would begin publicly campaigning for Clinton, Attorney General Loretta Lynch meeting secretly with Bill Clinton at a tarmac in Arizona and the FBI performing a peremptory interview with Hillary Clinton — after which Clinton attended a late showing of "Hamilton." Minutes before Obama took the stage with Clinton, allowing her to use a lectern with the presidential seal, Comey announced there would be no indictment.

Comey's decision set off jubilation in Democratic circles, and rage in conservative ones. I wrote for National Review, "This sort of open moral debauchery

would have made Boss Tweed blush."

Then came last Friday.

Comey announced, in a letter to lawmakers, that new emails had been found on a device in Anthony Weiner's possession — no, not that device — and that they could shed new light on the Clinton private server investigation. All hell broke loose. Democrats immediately labeled Comey faithless, a political hack manipulated by the Russians. Republicans said that all was forgiven and that Comey had finally corrected his original error.

In reality, Comey merely committed the cardinal moral sin: He valued his institution over doing the right thing. He did it in July, and he did it again in October.

In July, Comey decided that he didn't want the FBI dragged into the presidential election. To that end, he stepped beyond the normal powers delegated to the director of the FBI and publicly requested that the DOJ not intervene with Clinton. His goal: to protect the FBI from accusations by the left of politicization. And just to demonstrate how apolitical the FBI supposedly was, Comey listed all the findings of the investigation.

The result: The left was overjoyed, and the right thought the FBI rigged.

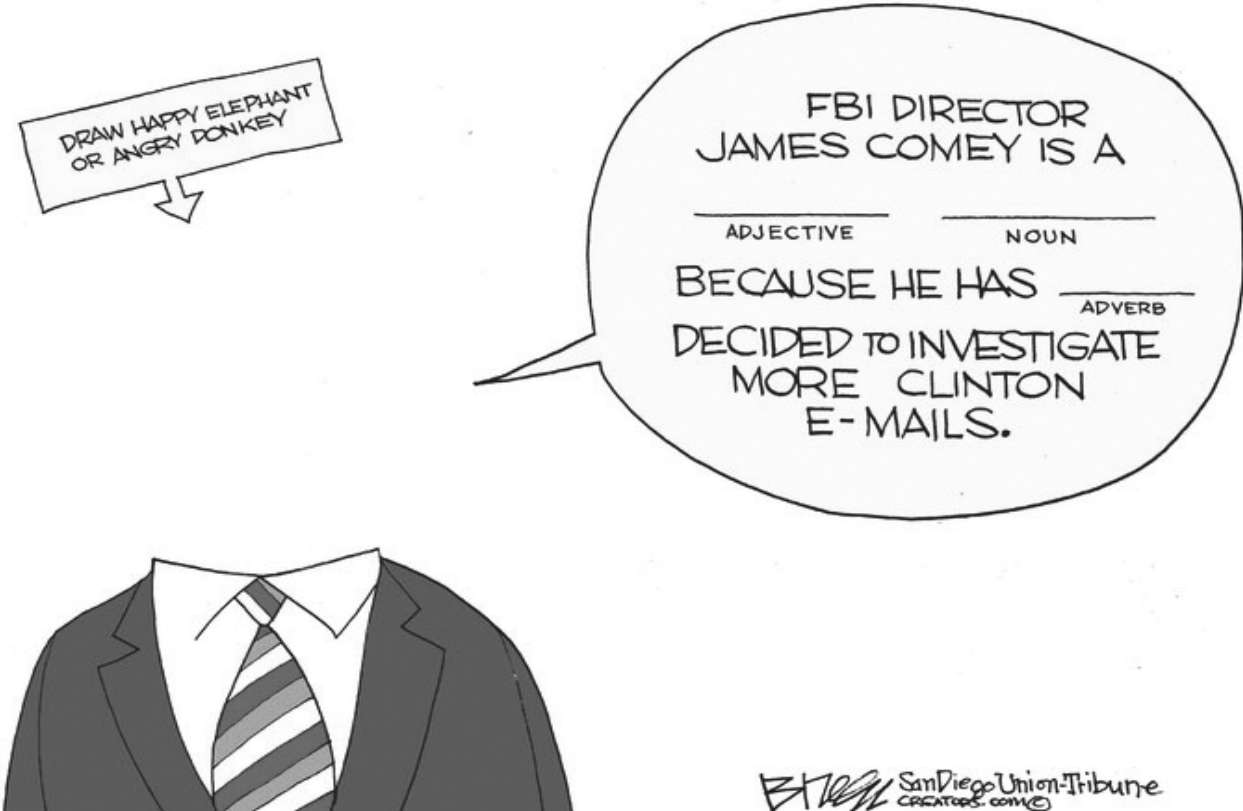
Now, Comey wants to ensure that the FBI isn't accused of being a Hillary Clinton tool. He knew as soon as he heard about Weiner's device that he'd eventually have to tell the public about the re-initiation of the Clinton investigation, and he feared that if he waited until after the election he'd expose the FBI to a thousand Hillary-controlled-the-FBI allegations. So he came forward.

The result: The right was overjoyed, and the left thought the FBI rigged.

Whenever someone seeks to protect an institution rather than telling the truth, the institution pays the price. When NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell attempted to soft-pedal the abuse of women in the NFL in order to "protect the shield," he only ended up destroying the brand. When Chief Justice John Roberts voted to uphold Obamacare in the name of protecting the reputation of the Supreme Court, he only ended up destroying that reputation. Comey has destroyed the reputation of the FBI.

The only solution to the complete undermining of institutions lies in the honesty of those who head those institutions. At least Comey came clean this time. For Comey and the FBI, though, it's too little, too late.

The rest of your ballot

The presidency isn't the only choice next week. There are more issues than "Who's worse, Trump or Clinton?"

Other important things are on the ballot.

Congressional elections may determine whether Obamacare lives or dies.

Electionbettingodds.com currently says Republicans will hold the House but lose the Senate. But it's close.

And politicians aren't the whole story.

In Kansas and Indiana, voters will decide whether the "right to hunt and fish" should be protected by their state constitutions. Advocates say such a right is needed because zealots will keep inventing "endangered" species and new gun restrictions until most hunting and fishing is impossible.

For similar reasons, Oklahoma voters will vote on a ballot measure guaranteeing a "right to farm."

Several states will allow voters to punish their neighbors on Tuesday by imposing "sin" taxes. Politicians like taxing "sin" because it gives them money while letting them claim that they discourage bad behavior.

So, four states offer ballot measures that would raise tobacco taxes.

Massachusetts, Rhode Island and New Jersey vote on whether to expand legal gambling, but only state-run gambling. In

Rhode Island, 61 percent of the revenue will be kept by the state. State-run gambling is always a bad bet, but government will really screw you in Rhode Island.

I'm surprised politicians stop at gambling and don't tax all the Bible's deadly sins: pride, envy, lust, etc. Probably because politicians don't want to tax themselves.

Californians will vote on expansion of a counterproductive rule: a ban on plastic bags. Its supporters say it reduces litter and protects oceans and wildlife. As usual, the zealots ignore science, convenience and health.

A canvas reusable bag must be used 131 times before it will compensate for the minor environmental impact of plastic bags.

Most reusable bags get contaminated by bacteria. The government tells us to carefully wash reusable bags, but almost no one does.

So California voters are likely to vote themselves increased health risk, bad smells and higher costs — for no real environmental benefit.

In Massachusetts, voters are likely to prohibit keeping pigs, calves and hens in spaces where they "can't lie down or turn around freely." This may improve animals' lives. I write "may" because more space also leads to more fighting — even cannibalism — among animals.

But the new law will triple the amount of space farmers need. That raises costs. Egg prices increased 22 percent after California passed such a law.

On Tuesday, Washington may vote to impose a carbon tax on itself. It won't have a noticeable effect on climate change, but it will make enviro-zealots feel better.

Fortunately, Tuesday also offers voters some good choices. Nevada voters may choose to open their state's energy market to competition. Competition lowers costs. I was surprised to see that unions oppose that. Do unions now oppose everything that's good?

Four states will get to vote on legalizing medical marijuana, and five vote on whether to legalize weed for all adults. The betting suggests that most of these measures will pass.

These are issues Americans disagree about — and it's good we don't have to wait for Washington, D.C., to reach agreement about them. Innovation often comes from state experiments.

Abortion and gay marriage were first legalized by states. Likewise, women first got the vote in Wyoming. Only after that did other states, and the federal government, follow.

James Madison, chief architect of the Constitution, would have approved. He wanted leeway given to state governments. In the Federalist Papers, in words that would be partly echoed in the Constitution, Madison wrote, "The powers delegated by the proposed Constitution to the federal government, are few and defined. Those which are to remain in the State governments are numerous and indefinite."

Since then, arrogant presidents and other federal officials have taken powers from the states. That leaves Americans fewer choices.

But the states will prove again on Tuesday that they still have a say, even if we're stuck with President Hillary Clinton for the next four (or eight?! please no!) years.

Reward up to \$200,000 for missing Texas college student

ALPINE, Texas (AP) — Alpine police say the reward for information leading to the whereabouts or safe return of a missing West Texas college student has increased to \$200,000.

After Trump, an evangelical examination of conscience?

Evangelicals, deeply divided over Donald Trump, are wrestling with what the tumultuous 2016 election will mean for their future.

His candidacy has put a harsh spotlight on the fractures among Christian conservatives, most prominently the rift between old guard religious right leaders who backed the GOP nominee as an ally on abortion, and a comparatively younger generation who considered his personal conduct and rhetoric morally abhorrent.

"This has been a kind of smack in the face, forcing us to ask ourselves, 'What have we become?'" said Carolyn Custis James, an evangelical activist and author who writes about gender roles in the church.

The outcome of this self-examination is as important for evangelicals as it is for the Republican Party. Christian conservatives have been among the most reliable members of the GOP coalition. Recent PRRI polls found nearly seven in 10 evangelicals backed Trump. Yet, those numbers are lower than the 79 percent who voted for 2012 Republican nominee Mitt Romney, a Mormon who had struggled to win over conservative Protestants for theological and other reasons.

Any election post-mortem will, of course, be shaped by who wins the White House.

A Hillary Clinton victory could draw energy away from any re-evaluation of the religious right, given her support for abortion rights and gay rights, and the opportunity she will have to shape the U.S. Supreme Court. While many younger evangelicals have fought for a broad range of concerns, including fighting climate change and poverty, they are staunchly opposed to abortion, often more so than their parents.

"I think there could be a resurgence in some way of some kind

of Christian right approach to politics," said John Fea, a historian at Messiah College in Pennsylvania, and author of "Was America Founded as a Christian Nation: A Historical Introduction." "Many evangelicals, whether 'Never Trump' or willing to support Trump, are ultimately shaped by a core set of convictions. They are still going to be — for good or for bad — one-, two- or three-issue voters primarily. I think that persists."

And if Trump wins? Evangelicals who advocated for him, such as Tony Perkins of the Family Research Council and author and broadcaster James Dobson, would feel vindicated before their critics if Trump fulfills his promise to appoint conservative high court justices. "Very early on he was concerned about the marginalization of Christianity," said the Rev. Robert Jeffress, pastor of the megachurch First Baptist Dallas, who advocated for Trump. Jeffress said the candidate reached out to him on the issue a year and a half ago. "He believes that Christians are continuing to lose their religious freedom in America," Jeffress said.

Yet, even if Trump proves loyal to Christian conservatives, questions would remain about whether his evangelical supporters traded their integrity for influence. The thrice-married Trump has been accused of sexual misconduct by several women, bragged about grabbing women's genitals, mocked a disabled reporter, maligned Mexican immigrants and insulted the parents of a fallen American Muslim soldier.

"If they can support even Donald Trump, and even after we learn more and more about him, then this has actually been a charade all along designed to raise money or to grasp for power or to build institutions or personal platforms," said Collin Hansen, a longtime Re-



publican and editorial director of the Gospel Coalition, an interdenominational evangelical ministry. He said he hoped leaders who opposed Trump had retained enough credibility to provide "something to build on."

Those leaders include Russell Moore, head of the public policy arm of the Southern Baptist Convention; Peter Wehner, a fellow at the Ethics and Public Policy Center who served three Republican presidents; editors for the influential evangelical magazines Christianity Today and WORLD; and many prominent evan-

gelical women. Deborah Fikes, a former representative to the U.N. for the World Evangelical Alliance, endorsed Hillary Clinton.

Christian conservatives had split over politics long before this presidential race. Many younger Christians had rejected the strategies of the Moral Majority and Christian Coalition as harmful to the church. A study by Brad Fulton of Indiana University found a significant decrease in recent years in conservative Protestant churches distributing voter guides — a staple of religious right mobilizing — or engag-

ing in political activity in their congregations.

At the same time, conservative churches have become home to growing numbers of Latinos and immigrants from other countries with different voting patterns. In a recent PRRI poll, nearly two-thirds of white evangelicals supported Clinton, while nearly two-thirds of non-white evangelicals supported Clinton.

"We are not the same community as the 1980s. We are not the same community as the 1990s. Evangelicalism is no longer exclusively led by white males who

are 60, 70 years old," said the Rev. Samuel Rodriguez, president of the National Hispanic Christian Leadership Conference, an evangelical group that counts 40,000 churches as members. He did not make an endorsement in the presidential race.

Still, that shift to a more diverse church with a new generation of leaders is only just beginning.

Many of the older religious right figures who backed Trump continue to have an impact through their organizations and Christian radio, even though their influence has dwindled.

Lady Steers' season comes to an end

ABILENE — The Big Spring Lady Steers have been eliminated from the playoffs in the opening round after straight sets Tuesday, 25-13, 25-13, 25-12.

The Lady Steers played arguably their best game of the season, but as the fourth seed from District 5-4A going up against the first seed from 6-4A, they ran into a team that looks to be one of the favorites to win the 4A state championship later in the year. "You're going to eventually come up against one of those teams that you can practice all you want, but they're going to be scrappy, they're going to get the ball up, and they're just going to be able to outplay you," Big Spring head coach Sunni Strickland said. "And I'm not taking anything away from our girls because that was one of the best games we've played. It just didn't fall our way."

The Lady Blues were unquestionably the best team that Big Spring faced off against this year at the 4A level, and at times in sets Big Spring did more than hold their own. Janisha Smith, Logan Terrazas, Kloe Gang, and Kayleigh Penny had a great night on the block going up against a powerful front line that included the kills leader in 6-4A in Jasmine Sims, and Jori Hanlan, Alexess Sosa, and Courtney Myers did their part digging out balls that got through the block. The Lady Steers also got admirable performances from co-captains Katie Wash and Addie Jimenez, who were

relentless in their efforts to bring Big Spring back from large deficits, including a crucial 6-1 run in the second set with Big Spring down 9-2 in which Wash had multiple kills on set dumps while also serving from the back line.

It was the last game for Wash, Jimenez, Sosa, and Smith as they'll be graduating this spring, and Strickland said replacing them both on the court and in the leadership department won't be easy.

"All four of them are just natural leaders in their own way. We've got verbal and nonverbal leaders, and everybody brought something to the team. It's going to be hard to replace them because of their leadership roles, whether it was in practice or on the court or in conditioning. All of them played a vital role in where we are today, and now we're going to be fairly young coming up," Strickland said. "That was my challenge to them after the game tonight, was for those newbies and those young kids to step up and take that leadership role, and be the ones that are going to lead."

She added that strong performances from sophomores Terrazas and Penny down the stretch of the season bode well for next year.

"It's very important (to end the season strong). They need to see what they need to continue to do to take that role. We're losing our two big outside hitters, and for Logan and Penny to start peaking now is great because we're going to need people to fill those roles. I think they know what it's going to take now and they've kind of gotten in a groove, and hopefully they

continue to improve from now until next season," Strickland said.

Though a first round exit is never ideal, the way all the Lady Steers played in the final month of the season is a reason to be positive. Big Spring struggled mightily in the early part of the year, and there's no denying the team consistently got better as each week passed and the season drew to a close.

"We've had to overcome a lot of things this season, not just on the court but off the court. There for a while, it was not going well. If we

would've continued on that path, there would have been no way we'd be in this game tonight. Those girls were able to overcome that and start playing together as a team, start trusting each other, and that's leaps and bounds over what we were doing at the beginning of the season," Strickland said. "We had a very long losing streak and morale was down, then all of a sudden it just clicked and they started playing well and playing together, and you can't ask for anything more than that."

1 more: Cubs beat Indians, force Series to deciding Game 7

CLEVELAND — One more game. For everything.

Either a 108-year World Series championship drought will come to an end, or another that's lasted 68 years.

Hysteria for one fan base, more heartbreak for the other.

Cubs vs. Indians in a winner-take-all Game 7.

As it should be.

"It's just correct and apt that we'd go seven games," Chicago manager Joe Maddon said.

Addison Russell hit a grand slam and tied a Series record with six RBIs, and Chicago took advantage of a huge early misplay in Cleveland's outfield as the Cubs, their offense finally revving, throttled the Indians 9-3 on Tuesday night in Game 6 to push this tense tug-of-war between baseball's two longest title drought holders to the limit.

The biggest, most nerve-racking day lies ahead.

"This is kind of fitting for these two franchises. This is storybook," Cubs catcher David Ross said. "They'll make movies about this one day."

Indians ace Corey Kluber, dominant while winning Games 1 and 4, starts again on short rest Wednesday night at home against big league ERA leader Kyle Hendricks.

Cleveland's hopes will rest with their best pitcher, the one guy they've been able to count on all season.

"We knew it wasn't going to be easy," said Jason Kipnis, who homered and had three hits. "We knew

they've got a great ballclub over there. They were lined up with their three-headed monster of a pitching staff. We're still very confident."

Kris Bryant homered to spark a three-run first inning, Russell hit the first Series slam in 11 years and Jake Arrieta worked into the sixth as the Cubs, down 3-1 back at Wrigley Field, are now rolling. One more win at Progressive Field would bring their first championship since 1908.

The Indians, trying for their first title since 1948, missed a second shot at closing out the Cubs. Cleveland is now forced to play another Game 7 after losing in 11 innings to the Florida

Marlins in 1997 in its last trip to the Series.

Not wanting to take any chances despite a comfortable late lead, Maddon used atomic-armed Aroldis Chapman for one out in the seventh, the eighth and one batter in the ninth. The lefty, who got the final eight outs in Game 5, threw just 20 pitches and will be on call for the season's final game when both managers won't hesitate to use any arm they've got.

The Cubbies, shut out twice earlier in this Series, brought their clubbies to Cleveland. Bryant had four hits and Anthony Rizzo added three, including a two-run homer.

Jazz's 3-point shooting does in Spurs, 106-91

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Utah point guard George Hill used the lessons he learned in three seasons with San Antonio to hand his former team a rare home loss.

Hill had 22 points and the Jazz made a season-high 15 3-pointers, handing the Spurs their first loss of the season 106-91 on Tuesday night.

"He had a great game," San Antonio veteran Manu Ginobili said. "For three quarters they played good solid basketball and in the fourth he just took over. Made some big shots, good plays off the pick-and-roll. He's a great player, we know he can do it."

Utah handed San Antonio only its second home loss since March 2015. The Spurs didn't lose their first home game last season until April 10 and finished 40-1 at the AT&T Center.

"Every loss is disappointing to me," said Spurs forward Kawhi Leonard, who had a game-high 30 points. "Just disappointed in our defensive effort. Our energy wasn't there in the first quarter. They were knocking down shots in the fourth quarter. They scored 33 in the fourth and that's not good either."

Hill made four straight baskets starting with about 6 minutes left in the fourth,

scoring 10 points to give the Jazz a 96-88 lead with 4 minutes remaining.

The Spurs rallied from an anemic first quarter to capture the lead, but Hill helped steady the young Jazz with a court presence he learned under San Antonio coach Gregg Popovich.

"Play like you've been there before," Hill said. "Coach Pop always instilled that into me my first three years here. Don't show really that much emotion, unless it's part of the game, but act like you've been there before. That's what I try to instill in the guys, move onto the next play every time."

Dandy dozen: Twelve players who could win World Series MVP award

One thing is certain Wednesday night: The Chicago Cubs or Cleveland Indians will finally end a long championship drought.

Much harder to predict is the player most likely to win World Series MVP honors.

After a back-and-forth struggle that's now gone the distance, both teams have several legitimate contenders heading into Game 7. Whoever takes home the trophy will become the first winner in franchise history.

Rarely have so many candidates stood out at once. Ari-

zona Diamondbacks pitchers Randy Johnson and Curt Schilling shared the 2001 award, exactly two decades after a trio of Los Angeles Dodgers split the prize: Ron Cey, Pedro Guerrero and Steve Yeager.

Perhaps co-MVPs are a possibility again — that's what happened in the NL Championship Series last month, when Cubs teammates Javier Baez and Jon Lester were both selected.

Here's a look at 12 players who could join a list of October royalty that includes Hall

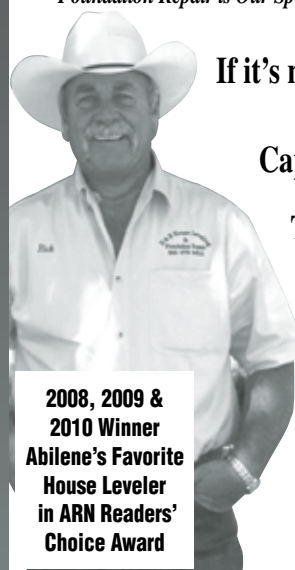

Bridge on a high level

The bidding:

Opening lead — ten of diamonds.
Proper technique in handling the
spade suit in this deal enabled South
to bring home a slam when a South
misstep would have proved fatal.
South started with a sure club
loser, two hearts to take care of and
the remote possibility of a trump
loser. He won the diamond lead in
his hand and immediately played a
club toward dummy's K-Q.
There were two good reasons to
tackle clubs first. If West had the ace
of clubs, he might err by not taking
it, in which case South's club loser
would be eliminated. Secondly, even
if West had the ace and took it, the
problem of how to deal with the los-
ing hearts would automatically be
solved, since the K-Q of clubs would
provide discards for South's hearts.
In practice, West took the ace of
clubs and returned a diamond, won
in dummy. The situation by now had
resolved itself into whether or not
South would lose a trump trick.
Obviously, there was no danger of
losing a trump unless one defender
had all four spades. If West had them,
a trump loser could not be avoided,
but if East had four trumps, they
could be trapped by proper play.
Accordingly, South did not error
by leading a trump to his king, which
would have been fatal. He cashed the
ace of spades first, on which West
showed out, and then led a low
trump, on which East played the ten.
After taking the queen, declarer
re-entered dummy with a heart, and
the K-Q of clubs were cashed, South
discarding two hearts. A trump lead
then picked up East's J-8.
South's management of the trump
suit is especially worthy of note. The
philosophy behind the ace-of-spades
play is that there is no hope if West
has four spades, and that what can't
be cured must be endured. East,
though, can be brought to terms if the
ace is played first.

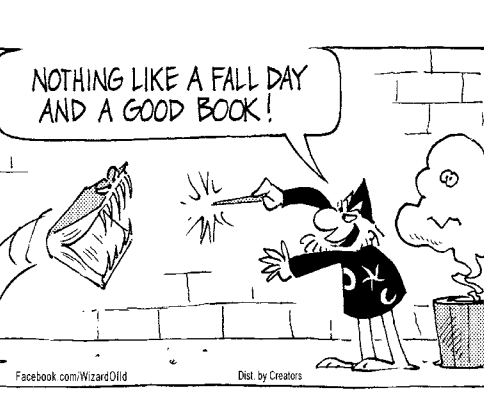


This Date In History

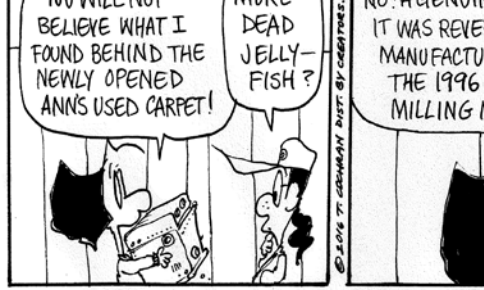
Today is Wednesday, Nov. 2, the 307th day of 2016. There are 59 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On Nov. 2, 1976, former Georgia Gov. Jimmy Carter became the first candidate from the Deep South since the Civil War to be elected president as he defeated incumbent Gerald R. Ford. On this date: In 1795, the 11th president of the United States, James Knox Polk, was born in Mecklenburg County, North Carolina. In 1865, the 29th president of the United States, Warren Gamaliel Harding, was born near Marion, Ohio. In 1889, North Dakota and South Dakota became the 39th and 40th states with the signing of proclamations by President Benjamin Harrison. In 1914, during World War I, Russia declared war on the Ottoman Empire. In 1936, the British Broadcasting Corp. inaugurated "high-definition" television service from Alexandra Palace in London. In 1947, Howard Hughes piloted his huge wooden flying boat, the Hughes H-4 Hercules (derisively dubbed the "Spruce

Goose" by detractors), on its only flight, which lasted about a minute over Long Beach Harbor in California. In 1948, President Harry S. Truman surprised the experts by winning a narrow upset over Republican challenger Thomas E. Dewey. In 1950, playwright George Bernard Shaw, 94, died in Ayot St. Lawrence, Hertfordshire, England. In 1963, South Vietnamese President Ngo Dinh Diem (nong ding ZEE'em) was assassinated in a military coup. In 1986, kidnappers in Lebanon released American hospital administrator David Jacobsen after holding him for 17 months. In 1994, a jury in Pensacola, Florida, convicted Paul Hill of murder for the shotgun slayings of abortion provider Dr. John Britton and Britton's bodyguard; Hill was executed in Sept. 2003. In 2000, an American astronaut and two Russian cosmonauts became the first residents of the international space station, christening it Alpha. Ten years ago: The Rev. Ted Haggard resigned as president of the National Association of Evangelicals after a man said they'd had sexual trysts together (Haggard later confessed he was guilty of sexual immorality). Gunmen in Iraq killed the Shiite dean of Baghdad University's school of administration and economics. Five years ago: The Congressional Gold Medal was awarded to some 19,000 Japanese-Americans who'd served in the 100th Infantry Battalion, the 442nd Regimental Combat Team and the Military Intelligence Service. One year ago: President Barack Obama toured a drug rehabilitation center and met with former inmates in Newark, New Jersey, where he called on the nation to ensure those regaining their freedom got a second chance instead of a return ticket to prison. NASA and its global partners celebrated the 15th anniversary of continuous residency at the International Space Station, where six U.S., Russian and Japanese crew members held a special dinner.

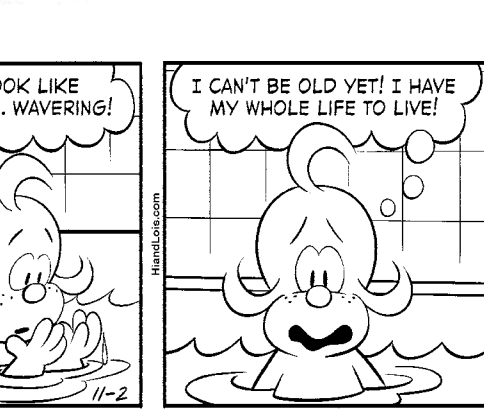
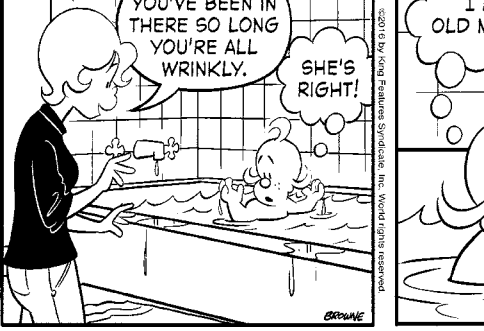

of Famers from Frank Robinson and Johnny Bench to lesser-known surprises like Pat Borders and David Eckstein.

COREY KLUBER

If there's a favorite going into Game 7, it's probably the Cleveland ace. Kluber is 2-0 with a 0.75 ERA and can become the first pitcher to win three World Series starts since 1968 MVP Mickey Lolich for Detroit. Set to make his second consecutive start on only three days' rest, the 2014 AL Cy Young Award winner has struck out 15 and walked one in 12 innings. If he throws another gem and the Indians win, Kluber is a lock. If he falters, the field is wide open.

ANTHONY RIZZO

After a slow start, Rizzo has come on late in the Series and is a big reason the Cubs have won two in a row. The first baseman is batting .364 with six runs, four RBIs and three doubles. He had three hits in Game 6, including a two-run homer. Another big night at the plate could win it for Rizzo.

FRANCISCO LINDOR

Just like Rizzo, the Indians' young shortstop is 8 for 22 in the Series. He's also walked three times, stolen a base and knocked in two runs.

AROLDIS CHAPMAN

The hard-throwing Cubs closer has taken on an expanded role with his team facing elimination. Chapman had not entered in the seventh inning since 2012 before doing it in Games 5 and 6. He pitched a career-high 2 2/3 innings Sunday night to save a 3-2

win that sent the Series back to Cleveland. Then he got four outs in Game 6 before exiting in the ninth with Chicago comfortably ahead. He has a 1.42 ERA and nine strikeouts in 6 1/3 innings and has thrown 62 pitches in three days. But he said he's "100 percent" ready for Game 7.

JASON KIPNIS

After growing up a die-hard Cubs fan outside Chicago, the Cleveland second baseman has been a major thorn in their side. Kipnis is hitting .308 with two homers, four RBIs and five runs.

JAKE ARRIETA

The 2015 NL Cy Young Award winner had a spotty postseason history — until this World Series. He is 2-0 with a 2.38 ERA in two road starts, pulling the Cubs even both times. He took a no-hitter into the sixth inning of Game 2 and was handed a large lead early in Game 6. He has allowed five hits and struck out 15 in 11 1/3 innings — and said he'll be available out of the bullpen in Game 7 if needed.

CODY ALLEN

While bullpen mate Andrew Miller has garnered much of the attention this postseason, Allen has been even more dominant during the World Series. Cleveland's closer has racked up 10 strikeouts and a save in four scoreless innings. If the game is close tonight, expect to see Allen on the mound in a high-leverage situation.

BEN ZOBRIST

After helping Kansas City to a title last year, Zobrist is having another strong Series, this time for the Cubs. He is hitting .391 with four runs, three walks and two extra-base hits.

ANDREW MILLER

Not to be forgotten is Miller, the ALCS MVP and perhaps the biggest

single reason behind Cleveland's postseason run. The 6-foot-7 lefty is 1-0 with a 1.69 ERA and eight strikeouts in 5 1/3 innings during the Series. He pitched in three of the first four games but has sat out the past two. That means Miller will be well-rested for Game 7 and could be called on by the middle innings for a particularly long outing.

KRIS BRYANT

Probably the favorite for NL MVP this season, Bryant began the Series in a 1-for-15 slump. But he homered in Game 5 to get Chicago going and did it again two days later as the Cubs won again. The 24-year-old slugger had four hits in a Game 6 romp and suddenly is batting a respectable .273. He did make a pair of errors at third base.

ADDISON RUSSELL

The 22-year-old Cubs shortstop did most of his damage in Game 6, but what a night it was. Russell hit a grand slam that broke things open and tied a World Series record with six RBIs thanks to a pop-fly double that dropped between two Indians outfielders. He is hitting .250 with eight RBIs.

KYLE HENDRICKS

A great performance in his Game 7 start for Chicago could conceivably make Hendricks the MVP. The right-hander, who led the majors with a 2.13 ERA this season, pitched 4 1/3 scoreless innings for a no-decision in Game 3. He came up huge in Game 6 of the NLCS, beating Clayton Kershaw and the Dodgers 5-0 to give the Cubs their first pennant since 1945.

Maddon came to get him in the sixth, the right-hander got several pats on the back from Chicago's infielders and Cubs fans saluted him with a standing ovation.

Tomlin was one strike from getting out of the first unscathed when everything fell apart.

He had Bryant down 0-2 when he hung a waist-high curveball that Chicago's third baseman, who came in just 2 for 17 in the Series but had homered in Game 5, cracked nearly halfway up the bleachers in left field, a 433-foot shot that sent a shockwave through standing-room-only Progressive Field.

There was a bigger one to come.

Rizzo and Ben Zobrist followed with singles before Tomlin got Russell to hit what appeared to be a routine out. However, right fielder Lonnie Chisenhall and rookie center fielder Tyler Naquin, unable to hear each other over the roaring crowd, looked at each other and let the ball drop onto the grass for a double.

While they scrambled to recover it, Rizzo scored easily and Zobrist beat a relay throw to the plate, bowling over Indians catcher Roberto Perez as a size-

able contingent of Cubs screamed with delight.

"It was just loud at there," Naquin said. "It was kind of one of those in-betweeners. Lonnie got a good break, I got a break, it's just one of those deals. In the moment, me being the center fielder, I need to take charge on that. That's my mistake."

Although it was early, with Arrieta on the mound, Chicago's lead felt more like 30-0 than 3-0.

Russell, who dressed up like a Ninja turtle on Halloween, then put a fright into Indians fans with his shot to deep left-center.

With two on, Indians reliever Dan Otero placed a 2-0 pitch over the heart of the plate to Russell, who launched it over the wall spent much of his home-run trot howling.

The Cubs were loud all night, and with one more win they'll be champions.

"I hope it's not difficult to sleep. It's every kid's dream. It all comes down to Game 7," Russell said.

FALL CLASSICS

Bryant and Rizzo became the first 3-4 hitters to combine for seven hits in a Series game. ... Kipnis went 3 for 4 with a single, double and home run. He has two in this Series, joining Willie Stargell and Roy Campanella as the only players to accomplish

that. Cleveland's pitchers have 59 strikeouts, tied for the fourth most in Series history. The 2001 Yankees had 70.

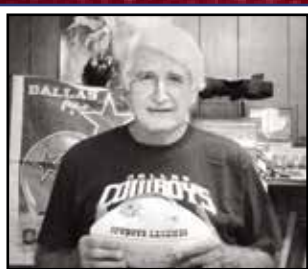
