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Landfill pact approved

County nears end of financial obligation toward new facility

Howard County Commissioners approved an updated agreement between the city of Big Spring and the county to split the county's remaining share of the expense for closing the landfill in two payments instead of one.

Currently the sum stands at \$500,000, but the amended agreement allows the county to split it into two \$250,000 payments. The new landfill is expected to be open in 2018.

Approval of the updated interlocal agreement regarding the landfill was one of a number agreements between local taxing and/or governmental entities passed by one motion Monday afternoon when com-

ATHENS, Greece — President Barack Obama opened his final foreign trip as president Tuesday with reassuring words in Greece about the U.S. commitment to NATO even as he prepares to hand off to a Donald Trump administration, saying Democratic

Without mentioning Trump by name, Obama told Greek President Prokopis Pavlopoulos that a strong NATO is of "utmost importance" and would provide "significant continuity even as we see a

transition in government in rope because of his tough talk the United States."

Pavlopoulos, for his part, thanked Obama for U.S. support of the Greek people in a time of social and economic crisis, and said he was confident that Trump "will continue on the same path." Trump's election has gener-

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

treaty alliances. Yet they may be greeted with skepticism: For months throughout the campaign, Obama repeatedly assured world leaders in public and private that Trump would not be elected, only to see him emerge victorious from last week's election. Obama also met Tues-

day with Greek Prime Minister Alexis Tsipras, and offered a welcome message of support for the Greeks as they struggle with both economic woes and a huge influx of refugees. Obama pledged to keep pressing his view that "austerity alone cannot deliver prosperity and that it is going to be important both with respect to debt relief and other accommodative strategies to help the Greek people in this period of adjustment."

Obama and Tsipras were to hold a joint news conference later in the day, and Pavlopoulos was hosting an official dinner for Obama at the

presidential mansion in the evening. Obama is making the

first visit to Greece by a sitting U.S. president since Bill Clinton in 1999. Security was tight, with major roads shut down along Obama's motorcade route and a ban on public gatherings and demonstrations in swaths of central Athens and a southern suburb near a seaside luxury hotel where Obama was staying. Boats were also banned from sailing near the coastline at the hotel's location.

More than 5,000 police were deployed in the capital's streets for the two-day visit. Leftwing and anarchist groups have planned protest demonstrations for Tuesday afternoon, while an armed anarchist group has called for "attacks and clashes" to disrupt Obama's visit. Clinton's visit, which came during the height of U.S. intervention in the wars ensuing from the breakup of Yugoslavia, was marked with extensive violent demonstrations.

Wednesday,

Obama is scheduled to tour the Acropolis and give a major speech about democracy and globalization before flying on to Berlin. From Germany, Obama will travel to Peru for an Asian economic summit before returning to Washington on Satur-

Obama said he was looking forward to visiting the Acropolis because "if you come to Greece you've got to do a little bit of sightsee-Greece's government

has hailed Obama's visit as being of "huge importance" for both Greece and Europe. The country's left-led coalition government has been struggling to pull Greece out of six years of a vicious financial crisis that has devastated its economy and left more than a quarter of the workforce unemployed. Despite the U.S. election, the government has pinned its hopes on the U.S. president to help persuade some of the country's more reluctant international creditors, such as nificant debt relief.

Without a cut in its debt, Athens says, it cannot hope to recover economically — an argument also supported by the International Monetary Fund.

Greece has been relying on emergency loans from three consecutive multi-billion euro bailouts from other European Union countries using the euro currency, and the IMF, since 2010. While the United States has not been involved in Greece's bailout, Athens has long seen it as an ally that could apply pressure on creditors.

The U.S. has praised Greek efforts to overhaul its economy but has repeatedly stressed the country must continue with painful reforms. The country's bailout funds are disbursed following reviews by international debt inspectors of mandated reforms.

The government will also be looking for recognition of the country's role in Europe's refugee crisis, which saw hundreds of thousands of

refugees pass through Greece from Turkey on their way to the more prosperous countries of the European north, and for U.S. pressure on the rest of Europe to help shoulder the burden. Following the closure of Balkan land borders and the reluctance of some European countries to host refugees, more than 60,000 people are stranded in Greece, most living in often poor conditions in overcrowded camps dotted around the country.

Rights organizations have urged Obama to use his visit to highlight these people's plight and Europe's response to the crisis.

Obama should "shine the spotlight not only on abysmal conditions for

Some Texas Muslims note concerns after Trump election

DALLAS (AP) — Most mornings, Aysha Khan takes the DART train to get to school. But after Donald Trump's victory in the presidential election, her parents asked her to drive.

"They were worried for me," said Khan, a 21-yearold graduate student at the University of Texas at Dallas. "They were scared for me to go outside, as someone who wears a hiiab."

The Dallas Morning News reports Khan's parents weren't the only ones who were scared. This past week, frightened by the sweeping victory of a man who at one point called for a national database to track Muslims, young Muslim Americans across Texas described feeling alienated from the only country they've known as home.

"Being an American is a very prominent part of my identity," said Khan, whose parents emigrated from Pakistan. "It's shaped my values and my beliefs. The fact that half the nation doesn't think I'm American enough — that hurts."

According to a study released in September, hate crimes against American Muslims have skyrocketed over the last two years to a level not seen since the aftermath of the Sept. 11 attacks. Khan and others attribute much of that spike to Trump's rheto-

"We're going to have to do certain things that were, frankly, unthinkable a year ago" regarding Muslim communities, Trump said last year. He also called for a ban on Muslims entering the country and falsely claimed that thousands of them celebrated when the twin towers fell.

Since Nov. 8, there have been reports of widespread harassment against Muslims and other minority groups in schools across the country. In Plano, one Muslim student reported that a group of students called him a terrorist and used a racial slur to refer to his African-American friend.

For Zainab Ghwari, a community organizer in Sugar Land, the election results were a discomfiting reminder of the way many Americans perceive her. According to a Pew Research Center study, only 1 percent of adults in Texas identify as Mus-

"I think in our community, we really underestimated the lack of empathy from, to be very blunt, the white Caucasian population," Ghwari said. "I feel heartbroken today." A clear majority of white men and white women

voted for Trump, while men and women from other ethnic minority groups overwhelmingly supported Hillary Clinton. Roughly 67 percent of U.S. Muslims identify as Democrats, up from 42 percent a decade ago, according to the Council on American-Islamic Relations.

Ghwari's parents immigrated to the United States in the mid-1980s. Her father is from Jordan, her mother from Morocco. Growing up in Houston, home to the largest Muslim population in Texas, Ghwari said she worked hard to answer questions from strangers who didn't understand her religious beliefs. She works with the Muslim American Vote, a Houston-based group dedicated to increasing voter turnout in the community.

She said she's used to feeling like an outsider, but not to the degree she's experienced in the past week.

"I already knew there was the fear, but I didn't know there was the hate, too," Ghwari said. "When people look at me, all that they can see is a foreign woman."

Rather than having to engage with celebrating

Trump supporters, Aicha Fokar, a senior at Texas Tech University in Lubbock, decided to skip class the morning after the election.

"I decided to avoid a situation where things could get out of control," she said. "For my own sake, I wanted to minimize interactions."

Still, Fokar said, she plans to continue wearing her hijab and praying in public spaces, although she has friends who have stopped doing both. She knows even prayer can incur suspicion among non-Muslims. "Physically, we can be identified as Muslim.

There's no avoiding it," Fokar said. "But I don't plan on taking off my headscarf. A lot of my sisters are refusing to change anything themselves — we're going to die fighting, and holding onto our ideals." In his victory speech last Wednesday morning,

Trump called for unity among Americans of all religions and pledged he would be "president for all Americans."

But his strong stance against Syrian refugees, and his willingness to entertain radical ideas about how Muslim Americans should be treated, have Khan questioning her future in Trump's America. As a woman, she said, she was horrified by Trump's comments about sexually assaulting women.

"I feel like I'm in solidarity with every woman today," she said.

But her visibility as a Muslim woman sets her further apart.

Although she's getting her master's degree in public administration at UTD, Khan said she finds herself reconsidering the trajectory of her career.

"I've dedicated my life to public service, and I intend to work in the public sector one day," Khan said. "I want to dedicate my entire life to helping people. But it feels like they don't want me here."

Lawmakers pre-file bevy of bills ahead of 2017 session

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Lawmakers have pre-filed more than 500 bills on the first day to propose legislation before the Texas Legislature reconvenes in January.

Among the frenzy of would-be laws submitted in both chambers on Monday were several high-profile abortion proposals.

One sure to spark heated debate would prohibit aborting fetuses with abnormalities after 20 weeks of pregnancy. Current Texas law suspends a post-20-week abortion ban when fetal abnormalities are detected, or if the mother's life is threatened

Other bills sought to offer pre-kindergarten for all Texas 4-year-olds, cut the franchise tax paid by businesses and exempt the state from daylight saving time.

During the last session in 2015, state legislators filed more than 6,200 bills and approved 1,300-plus new laws.

The next legislative session begins Jan. 10.

Texas student dies after falling from bus when door opens

EDINBURG, Texas (AP) — South Texas authorities say a middle school student has died after he fell from a moving bus when its rear, emergency door swung open.

The bus was one of three taking Harlingen students on a field trip Monday to the University of Texas campus in Edinburg.

It's not clear if the boy may have opened the door or if it malfunctioned. He was taken to a hospital where he died.

Harlingen school district spokesman Shane Strubhart tells The Brownsville Herald that no other students were hurt and that parents of the student on the trip are being called.

2 sentenced to prison for disrupting Southwest flight

AMARILLO, Texas (AP) — Two California men convicted of disrupting a Chicago-bound Southwest Airlines flight have been sentenced to prison.

Jonathan Khalid Petras and Wisam Imad Shaker were sentenced Monday after their June convictions in Amarillo, Texas, on charges of interfering with a flight crew and aiding and abetting.

U.S. District Judge Sidney Fitzwater sentenced the 21-year-old Petras to seven months in prison.

The 23-year-old Shaker got five months in prison. Both could have been sentenced to up to 20 years in prison each.

An affidavit says six men boarded Flight 1522 in San Diego last August and were seated together when they became aggressive and used obscene eventually diverted the plane to Amarillo.

DALLAS (AP) — The president of the Chili's restaurant chain says the manager who took away a veteran's free Veterans Day meal has been "removed" from the job.

In a statement issued Monday, Chili's President Kelli Valade also said she personally apologized to Ernest Walker for the manager's actions and thanked him for his service to the country.

Ernest Walker posted a video to Facebook on Friday of the manager removing his meal at a Chili's in the Dallas suburb of Cedar Hill.

The Army veteran wrote that the meal was removed after another diner questioned the uniform Walker was wearing.

AAA predicting biggest Thanksgiving travel rush in 9 years

DALLAS (AP) — The slowly improving economy could boost travel over the Thanksgiving holiday to levels not seen in nine years.

AAA forecasts that 48.7 million Americans will travel, the busiest Thanksgiving period on U.S. roads and skies since 2007, the year before the global financial crisis plunged the U.S. economy into a deep recession.

The auto club AAA said Tuesday that it expects 1 million more Americans to venture at least 50 miles from home, a 1.9 percent increase over last

The forecast was assembled at research firm IHS, which said it considered jobs, household net worth, the stock market, prices for gasoline and airline tickets, and other factors.

The researchers did their number crunching in mid-October, about three weeks before the surprising outcome in the presidential election.

The AAA forecast predicts that from Wednesday, Nov. 23, through Sunday, Nov. 27, about 43.5 million Americans will take long car trips, 1.9 percent more than last year. AAA expects 3.7 million will travel by air, a 1.6 percent increase. Bus and train trips will grow less than 1 percent, the auto group

An airline-industry trade group is a bit more bullish. Airlines for America predicts that air travel will rise 2.5 percent over last year's holiday, although the group considers Thanksgiving travel spanning a 12-day period that begins Nov. 18.

Judge to hear more testimony about Bergdahl search mission

FORT BRAGG, N.C. (AP) — A judge will hear more arguments Tuesday about whether injuries to soldiers on a search mission should be allowed as evidence that U.S. Army Sgt. Bowe Bergdahl endangered comrades by walking off his post in Afghanistan.

On Monday, the judge, Army. Col. Jeffery Nance, also agreed to delay Bergdahl's trial by several months until May 15, 2017.

Prosecutors asked for the delay because of the slow pace at which they're getting approval to turn over classified evidence. Prosecutors are arguing that two wounded sol-

diers' injuries should be allowed as evidence to show that Bergdahl's disappearance effectively put other military members in harm's way.

Bergdahl is charged with desertion and misbehavior before the enemy, the latter of which carries a maximum penalty of life in prison.

U.S. Air Force Maj. John Marx testified about a firefight that occurred after he and several others joined about 50 members of the Afghan National Army on a search for Bergdahl.

They were attacked by enemy fighters after setting up a checkpoint near a town in Afghanistan on July 8, 2009.

Marx testified about fighting alongside U.S. Army National Guard Sgt. 1st Class Mark Allen, who was shot in the head during the firefight.

Prosecutors said Allen suffered a traumatic brain injury that has left him in a wheelchair and unable to communicate. Another soldier had hand injuries and required surgery because of a rocket-propelled grenade.

Marx, who said the mission's sole purpose was to search for Bergdahl, testified that he was next to Allen as bullets flew around them.

"I looked at him, then I see a trickle of blood coming down his head," Marx testified. Asked where Allen was wounded, Marx pointed at his temples and said: "Right through his head."

Bergdahl, dressed in a white shirt and blue pants, appeared stoic as he listened.

Marx and two others involved in the firefight said they came from another part of Afghanistan to take part in a hastily planned search mission. They had been embedded with Afghan soldiers to help train

Prosecutors have said evidence of the injuries will help them show that Bergdahl endangered his comrades, one of the elements of the misbehavior before the enemy charge.

Defense attorneys have argued that Bergdahl was not responsible for the injuries, writing in a motion earlier this year that: "Allen's injuries were

directly caused by the Taliban, not by SGT Bergdahl."

Benjamin Franklin's gravestone develops crack from pennies

PHILADELPHIA (AP) A fundraising campaign has been launched to save the damaged gravestone of Benjamin Franklin at the Christ Church Burial Ground in Philadelphia.

The Christ Church Preservation Trust tells The Philadelphia Inquirer that the marble ledger tablet marking Franklin's final resting place has recently developed a significant crack.

The ritual of tossing pennies onto Franklin's grave has been blamed for causing the crack.


Tens of thousands of coins are thrown onto the marker each year in tribute of Franklin's famous adage, "a penny saved, is a penny earned."

Franklin, who died in 1790, is one of seven signers of the Declaration of Independence buried at the two-acre graveyard across from Independence

The trust has received grants to restore the gravestone but is seeking an-



All-Star OF Desmond turns down qualifying offer from Rangers

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) All-Star outfielder Ian Desmond has turned down a \$17.2 million qualifying offer from the Texas Rangers.

The Rangers announced Monday that Desmond had turned down the qualifying offer. The free agent can still negotiate with the AL West champions.

If Desmond signs with another club before the amateur draft next June, the Rangers would receive a draft pick as compensation at the end of the first round.

Desmond last winter turned down a \$15.8 qualifying offer from the Washington Nationals, the team for which he was a shortstop the previous seven seasons. Desmond signed an \$8 million, one-year deal with Texas during spring training and converted to the outfield.

Desmond hit .285 with 22 homers and 86 RBIs in 156 games for Texas.

Prescott over Romo for now; how far can Cowboys go with rookie?

FRISCO, Texas (AP) — The issue is no longer whether Dak Prescott will start ahead of a healthy Tony Romo

Now the question is how far the Cowboys can go with a rookie quarterback after they tied a franchise record with their eighth straight win and a few hours later ended up with the NFL's best record when New England lost to Seattle.


Prescott's performance in the fourth quarter of a wild 35-30 win at Pittsburgh stole any of the surprise there might have been with owner and general manager Jerry Jones declaring afterward that Romo would be the backup Sunday at home against Baltimore (5-4).

It will be a few days shy of a year since the last time the 36-year-old Romo was active for a game. And it has been 10 years since Romo, who broke a bone in his back in a preseason game, wasn't the Dallas starter.

The team's longest same-season winning streak since Roger Staubach took Dallas to the Super Bowl 39 years ago makes the decision easy.

"It's just going with the obvious," Jones said. "I get asked about it every time I open my mouth. It's not hard. It's not hard at all. Tony would make the same decision."

Prescott directed two 75-yard touchdown drives in the fourth quarter with the Cowboys (8-1) trailing the Steelers by a point each time. While

fellow standout rookie Ezekiel Elliott finished both with touchdown runs, Prescott made several big throws.

On the winning drive that started with 42 seconds left after the Steelers went ahead, Prescott completed a 13-yarder to Jason Witten one play before another completion to the tight end ended with a facemask penalty that put the Cowboys in field-goal range before Elliott's winning run with 9 seconds remaining.

Dallas trailed most of the game in part because of a lost fumble by

"That's one of the most important parts of that position is to be able to handle the adversity of it," coach Jason Garrett said. "From series to series, from quarter to quarter, half to half and throughout the ballgame, you've just got to keep banging away."

Elliott's numbers are getting more attention because he's the NFL rushing leader (1,005 yards) and has a shot at Eric Dickerson's rookie record (1,808 yards in 1983). But Prescott is completing 67 percent of his passes with 14 touchdowns and two intercep-

The 23-year-old from Mississippi State — a fourth-round pick after the Cowboys couldn't pull of a trade for Paxton Lynch, who went to Denver in the first round — has road wins over a pair of Super Bowl champions in Green Bay's Aaron Rodgers and the Steelers' Ben Roethlisberger.

And Prescott essentially outdueled Roethlisberger, who threw for 408 yards and executed a fake-spike touchdown pass to put the Steelers ahead in the final minute.

"You see what a veteran quarterback can do," Jones said. "But you also see what Dak can do. That was a pretty nice little template to look at right there."

A month ago, the Cowboys figured to have a touchy subject looming. Not now, says Jones.

"There is no fragileness about this, with the team or the coaches," Jones said. "Dak is earning his way. Tony has earned his way. Both of them can play quarterback well enough to win

And the Cowboys have upgraded the backup job, with Romo replacing Mark Sanchez.

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

in a variety of ways during the play in an effort to find the best defense. Without signals, and without the use of other standard agreements

designed to overcome the natural advantage of the declarer, it would be next to impossible for the defense to

function effectively Take this case where South is in

four hearts and West leads the king of diamonds, on which East plays the five. What should West do next?

If he continues with a low diamond, East wins with the queen and returns a spade, and the contract goes down one. But if West cashes the ace of diamonds at trick two, or does anything else, the defense collapses, because there is then no way for West to score more than one spade How can West possibly know that

his best play at trick two is a low diamond? Certainly, it is an unusual and seemingly risky play, but it is far from a shot in the dark. For West, who is searching for a

clue to the most effective defense, it should not be difficult to figure out that East signaled possession of the queen of diamonds by playing the five on the king. Ordinarily a five, a relatively low card, would not be construed as a positive signal.

But when West examines the first

trick, he notes that the 4-3-2 are missing. It is surely reasonable for him to assume that East has one or more of these cards and hence is signaling that he has the queen. Since West urgently needs a spade lead from East, he underleads the ace and Tomorrow: It pays to count your tricks.



The U.S. Postal Service said it had lost \$5.1 billion in the fiscal year ending Sept. 30.





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


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
