Social Security **Hike Explained**

Beginning January 1, 1954, the beial security tax contribution rom an employee's pay was in-reased from 1½ percent to 2 per-pert. The employee is the second seco from an cent. The employer's tax contribution was also increased from 14

Percent. "This increase in the tax con-tribution is in accordance with the tax schedule set up when the So-cial Security Act was changed in 1950, and is not a 'new' tax'' says John R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo social security of-fice. This tax schedule provides for periodic tax increases in an-ticipation of future obligations of the program, but the next in-crease is not until 1960. The social security tax for self-employed persons covered by the law was also increased beginning with 1954. The tax changed from 24 percent to 3 percent. As the self-employed pay their social se-curity tax but once each year, and that at the time of filing Federal income tax return, they paid the rate of 24's percent on their 1953 income. This was due not later than March 15, 1954, the income tax deadline. The increas-ed rate of 3 percent will be on 1954 self-employed income, and it will be due with Federal income tax on March 15, 1955.


