Cal Farley's Boys Ranch CEO to speak at local club

A local study club will host the CEO and president of a Texas boys ranch and childcare provider for families that need assistance as well as for children with emotional wounds.

On Wednesday, Feb. 1, the 1953 Hyperion Club will be

hosting Dan Adams, president and CEO of Cal Farley's Boys Ranch at a community-wide presentation as he presents the mission of the ranch.

"This is for anyone that would like to come out and learn about this ranch," said 1953 Hyperion Club member Janell Davis. "We have some flyers out around and

we have also invited the two Rotary Clubs as well as the retired teachers and the other Hyperion Clubs."

The ranch, located northwest of Amarillo, is a community open to at-risk children ages 5 to 18.

The children are cared for by mentors, houseparents, and caseworkers to restore

children back to their families, "develop their potential, and help them become principled, contributing members of society upon graduation or completion of their individual therapeutic plans".

"This ranch has really changed a lot of lives," said Davis. "It was started by a guy named Cal Farley in Am-

arillo when he noticed that many young boys were not being properly taken care of and he wanted to give those kids a shirttail to hold onto. A friend of his had a small ranch that he was able to get and that's when it started,

Inaugural things to watch: The speech, the dress and more

WASHINGTON — From a morning stop at church through the swearing-in to the last dance of the evening, it's going to be an inaugural marathon on Friday. Donald Trump will take Washington by storm, no matter what the weather. (Which, by the way, looks like rain.)

Some things to watch for on Inauguration Day:

35 or 39?
 Trump's oath of office is the only essential on Friday; all the rest is window dressing. The Constitution sets out a 35-word oath for the new president. Some presidents make it 39 by tacking on "so help me God." There are conflicting stories about when the ad lib started. The National Archives says George Washington added the words when he took the oath at his 1789 inaugural. Some say the first eyewitness account of a president using those words came at Chester Arthur's inauguration in 1881. Historian Jim Bendat says Washington's use of the phrase is a myth, but every president since 1933 has done it.

THE SPEECH
 Trump's inaugural address will set the tone for the launch of his presidency. Will he go the traditional route and offer a message of unity to a divided nation, play the role of disrupter of the established order, or blend a little of both? This won't be his usual off-the-cuff address. Aides say Trump has taken a big role in writing the speech and has been practicing at Trump Tower. Expect him to keep it short, around 20 minutes or so.

30 missing in central Italy avalanche that buries hotel

MILAN (AP) — An avalanche buried a four-star spa hotel in a mountainous earthquake-hit region of central Italy, leaving at least 30 people missing, authorities said Thursday.

The civil protection agency said that they were working to get rescue vehicles to the Hotel Rigopiano through roads covered in snow, joining initial rescue efforts overnight by alpine rescue teams.

The ANSA news agency quoted a rescuer as saying that there were fatalities, but details weren't immediately available.

Italian media said that the avalanche covered the three-story hotel in the central region of Abruzzo on Wednesday.

The hotel is about 45 kilometers (30 miles) from the coastal city of Pescara. Earthquakes hit the region on Wednesday, including one with a 5.7 magnitude, but it wasn't immediately clear if the temblors triggered the avalanche.

Mountain rescue teams reached the hotel by skis around 4 a.m. (0300 GMT), SKY TG24 reported. The sta-

tion said that one victim had been removed so far.

Video footage showed rescuers with shovels digging through a wall of snow, and at least one man being led through the cleared path.

Collapse of Tehran high-rise on fire kills 30 firefighters

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) — A high-rise building in Tehran engulfed by a fire collapsed on Thursday, killing at least 30 firefighters and injuring some 75 people, state media reported.

The disaster struck the Plasco building, an iconic structure in central Tehran just north of the capital's sprawling bazaar.

Iran's state-run Press TV announced the firefighters' deaths, without giving a source for the information.

Local Iranian state television said 30 civilians were injured in the disaster, while the state-run IRNA news agency said 45 firefighters had been injured.

Firefighters battled the blaze for several hours before the collapse. Police tried to keep out shopkeepers and others wanting to rush back in to collect their valuables.

The building came down in a matter of seconds, shown live on state television, which had begun an interview with a journalist at the scene.

A side of the building came down first, tumbling perilously close to a firefighter perched on a ladder and spraying water on the blaze.

Trump plans for Scottish resort spark new conflicts concern

NEW YORK (AP) — Donald Trump has vowed his company will do "no new foreign deals" while he is president. But he's left "new" and "deals" open to interpretation.

Now those words are drawing scrutiny as his company confirms plans to expand its golf resort near Aberdeen, Scotland, raising concerns about conflicts of interest.

A spokeswoman for the resort says the expansion is not a new deal, but just another construction phase that was included in the broad plan approved by the local government in 2008.

Some lawyers who specialize in government ethics aren't convinced.

Richard Painter, who served as chief ethics lawyer for President George W. Bush, said there are so

many pending issues before local governments at each stage of a real estate project, it's like a new deal every time.

Even before taking office, Trump has changed the presidency

WASHINGTON (AP) — Donald Trump enters the White House on Friday just as he entered the race for president: defiant, unfiltered, unbound by tradition and utterly confident in his chosen course.

In the 10 weeks since his surprise election as the nation's 45th president, Trump has violated decades of established diplomatic protocol, sent shockwaves through business boardrooms, tested long-standing ethics rules and continued his combative style of replying to any slight with a personal attack — on Twitter and in person.

Past presidents have described walking into the Oval Office for the first time as a humbling experience, one that in an instant makes clear the weight of their new role as caretaker of American democracy.

Trump spent much of his transition

making clear he sees things differently: Rather than change for the office, he argues, the office will change for him.

"They say it's not presidential to call up these massive leaders of business," Trump told a crowd in Indianapolis in December. That was after he negotiated a deal with an air conditioning company to keep jobs in the state, a move many economists derided as unworkable national economic policy.

"I think it's very presidential," he declared. "And if it's not presidential, that's OK. That's OK. Because I actually like doing it."

but now it has numerous avenues to help people."

IT'S (NOT) JUST LUNCH

Washington ate alone after his 1789 inauguration. Trump will go straight from his swearing-in to a lavish luncheon of Maine lobster and Angus beef for 200 in the Capitol's Statuary Hall. It's not just about lunch, though. Good relations between the new president and the Republican-led Congress will be key to the success of the Trump presidency. Early maneuvering has shown Trump and GOP legislators to be on different pages at times about important issues such as taxes and health care. So amid the toast-making and the gift-giving of the day, the legislators and new president will be feeling one another out.

POWER MARCH

Start your stopwatch. More than 8,000 people will march in the 1.5-mile inaugural parade down Pennsylvania Av-

enue, from the Capitol to the White House. That's actually a relatively restrained dose of inaugural pomp. Trump's team wants to keep the parade to 90 minutes so the new president has time to do some work. The longest parade, with 73 bands and 59 floats, lasted more than four and half hours at Dwight Eisenhower's first inauguration in 1953.

FIRST STEPS

Trump aims to squeeze in a little work on his first day in office, perhaps in between the parade and the evening balls. What to watch for: His aides mention possible executive actions and perhaps the swearing-in of some members of his Cabinet.

BIG LEAGUE?

Trump has tweeted that "record numbers" of people are pouring into Washington for his inauguration. That's doubtful. There are still hotel rooms for rent. And, contrary to Trump's claims, stores still have plenty of ball gowns to sell. No one believes this inaugural will come close to the estimated 1.8 million people who attended Barack Obama's first inaugural. But with no official arbiter of crowd counts, expect a post-inaugural tussle over how many people really showed up.

DISSENTERS AND BIKERS

Protesters turn out

for any inauguration. This year, one of the biggest pushbacks against Trump will be the Saturday women's march, which could draw 200,000 or more people. There will be plenty of action on Friday, though, with some demonstrators aiming to shut down or cause delays at security checkpoints going in to the swearing-in ceremony. And then there are the Bikers for Trump, promising to come in throngs and serve as "a wall of meat" if needed to protect Trump's supporters.

CELEB WATCH

Trump says he's got the "biggest celebrities in the world" coming to town for his inauguration. Yes, there are A-list celebrities in town — but you may need to check out non-inaugural venues to find them. Trump will have singer Jackie Evancho singing the national anthem at his swearing-in. Performers at his inaugural balls include the Radio City Rockettes, The Piano Guys, 72-year-old Tony Orlando and 81-year-old Sam Moore, from the soul duo Sam and Dave. Over at the nonpartisan Creative Coalition bash, the headliner is Grammy-winning Blues Traveler, and hosts will include Tim Allen and John Leguizamo.

Saturday's women's march, organized by women dismayed at Trump's election, will

have Scarlett Johansson, America Ferrara, Amy Schumer, Frances McDormand and Zendaya, among others. Thursday's "Peace Ball" for liberal activists promised Solange and Esperanza Spalding.

FASHION POLITICS

There's always intense interest in what the new first lady will wear, both for the swearing-in and to the inaugural balls. This year, it's not simply a matter of fashion. It's political. A number of designers have said they don't want to dress Melania Trump because they disagree with her husbands' policies. The

president-elect has shrugged off such talk and suggested his wife wouldn't even want to be dressed by some of those who are demurring. Musicians who have agreed to play the inaugural have faced a backlash from Trump critics. Watch to see if the first lady's designer does, too.

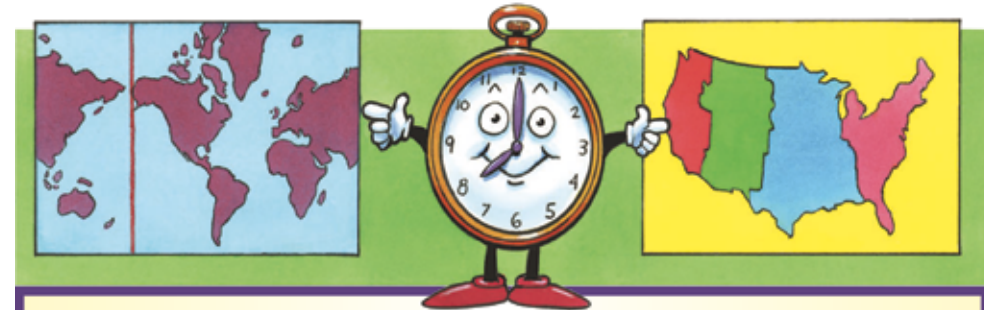

WHAT TIME IS IT?

The answer to that question depends upon where you are in the world. At midday in Chicago, your watch might read 12 p.m., Friday, January 15, 2010, whereas in Sydney, Australia, it would read 5 a.m., Saturday, January 16, 2010.

The difference in time around the world has to do with the International Date Line and time zones. The International Date Line is an imaginary line in the middle of the Pacific Ocean that divides the earth into two days. Generally places in the eastern hemisphere are a day ahead of places in the western hemisphere.

Earth is divided into time zones. The United States has several, including Eastern, Central, Mountain and Pacific Standard Time. Generally, the farther west the area, the earlier in the day it is. At 7 p.m. Central Time in Chicago, it is 6 p.m. Mountain Time in Denver and 5 p.m. Pacific Time in Los Angeles.

Most clocks have two arrows. The short arrow is known as the little hand and tells the hour. The long arrow is known as the big hand and tells the minute. When the little hand is on 11 and the big hand is on 12, for example, it is 11 o'clock. Write in the time under each clock face pictured.

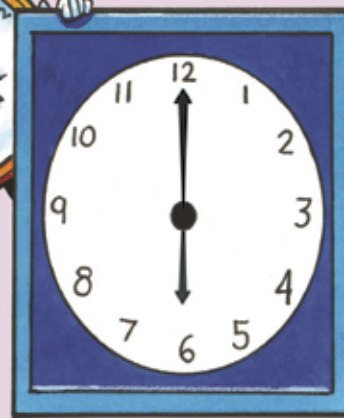

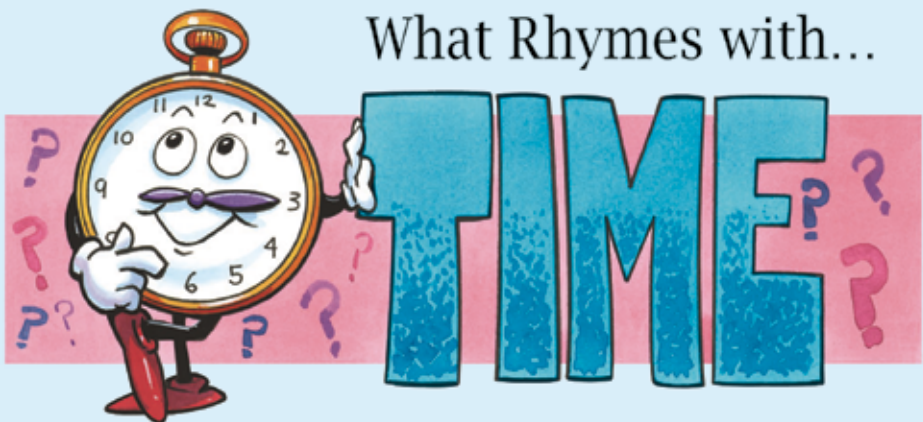

Big 12 look ahead: Baylor preps for surprising TCU

The Associated Press

Some things to watch this week in the Big 12:

GAME OF THE WEEK-END: No. 6 Baylor (17-1, 5-1 Big 12) at surprising TCU (14-4, 3-3). The Bears have won both games since falling last week at West Virginia in their first-ever contest as the No. 1 team in the AP poll. While the Frogs are coming off a 75-69 loss at Texas Tech, they have already surpassed last season's win total under first-year head coach and for-

mer TCU guard Jamie Dixon. **LOOKING AHEAD:** A brutal stretch continues for Texas (7-11, 1-5), which goes to No. 2 Kansas (17-1, 6-0) on Saturday after consecutive losses to No. 7 West Virginia and No. 6 Baylor. Kansas State lost both games last week after getting into the Top 25 for the first time this season, but had a season-high 96 points to beat Oklahoma State. The Wildcats host West Virginia (15-3, 4-2), which is coming off a surprising overtime loss at home to Oklahoma (8-9, 2-4). The Sooners go home

to play Iowa State (11-6, 3-3). Oklahoma State, the only Big 12 team without a conference victory, goes to Texas Tech in a matchup of first-year Big 12 head coaches.

INSIDE THE NUMBERS: Baylor's Johnathan Motley became the seventh Big 12 player since the league started play 20 years ago with a 30-point, 20-rebound game. Motley had 32 points and 20 rebounds against Texas on Tuesday... Motley's 12 career double-doubles are the most among active Big 12 players. ... Kansas State, TCU and

Texas Tech all have identical records — 14-4 overall, 3-3 in Big 12 play. Iowa State (11-6) is also 3-3 in league games. ... Of the 30 league games so far, 23 (77 percent) have been decided by 10 points or less.

PLAYER TO WATCH: Oklahoma State junior Jeffrey Carroll matched a career high with 24 points Wednesday against Kansas State. It was his fourth 20-point effort in five games, and eighth this season. Among active Big 12 players, his teammate Phil Forte has the most career 20-point games. Forte's 22 are

seven more than Iowa State's Monte Morris.

ON THE WOMEN'S SIDE: Second-ranked Baylor and 12th-ranked Texas both are 7-0 in conference play. Each has five more games to play before they go head-to-head Feb. 6 in Waco, and then will meet in Austin two weeks after that. ... No. 22 Kansas State carries a four-game winning streak into Saturday's game at Iowa State, which has lost four in a row. The Cyclones are coming off a season-low 42 points in a 26-point loss at Baylor.

Hall gives call to two with Texas ties

Former Ranger Rodriguez gets in on 1st ballot

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Ivan Rodriguez said he barely slept for three days waiting to find out whether he would get enough votes for election to baseball's Hall of Fame.

Once Pudge was secure as just the second catcher behind Johnny Bench to get in on the first ballot, the 14-time AL All-Star said he wasn't bothered by the slim margin. And Rodriguez shrugged off one of the reasons it was so close — allegations from former Texas teammate Jose Canseco in a 2005 book that he injected Rodriguez and other Rang-

ers with steroids.

"It doesn't matter," Rodriguez said Wednesday night in a news conference at the ballpark he called home for 13 of his 21 seasons. "I'm going to be in Cooperstown in July. That's all that matters. I'm very happy with that."

Based on numbers, it could have been a landslide.

Rodriguez led catchers in games (2,543), hits (2,844) and extra-base hits (934). He is the only major leaguer to win 13 Gold Gloves and have a career average of at least .295. A teenager when

he debuted with the Rangers in 1991, the 45-year-old supplanted Pedro Martinez as the youngest Hall of Famer.

"I'm very happy and honored to say that I'm going to be right next to my favorite catcher growing up, my hero, Johnny Bench," Rodriguez told an audience that included several members of his family. "And would love in July if I could sit right next to him before I step in front of the microphone."

Rodriguez won his only World Series with Florida in 2003 and played for six

teams, including five seasons with Detroit. The 1999 AL MVP left no doubt which cap will be on his plaque — the decision is up to the Hall, but in his case there is little debate. It will be the second with a Texas "T" after Nolan Ryan's in 1999.

"I'm starting right from the beginning, since 16 years old, when I didn't know how to speak the language, I don't know how to say 'yes', or any of that," said Rodriguez, the fourth native of Puerto Rico in

Ex-Astro Bagwell gets long-awaited nod

HOUSTON (AP) — Jeff Bagwell struggled to describe how he felt soon after being elected to the Hall of Fame in his seventh year on the ballot.

"I don't even know what to say," he said after Wednesday's vote announcement. "There's no greater thing you can get personally than the Hall of Fame. You can do some stuff team-wise and all that kind of stuff, but personally this is a big deal. I'm not trying to downplay it. It's just — I don't know how to react."

After missing the 75 per-

cent needed for election by just 15 votes last year, the Houston Astros slugger led this year's class with 86.2 percent of the vote. He will be joined for induction into Cooperstown on July 30 by Tim Lincecum and Ivan Rodriguez, who were also elected Wednesday, and Commissioner Bud Selig and retired Kansas City and Atlanta executive John Schuerholz, who were voted in by a veterans committee in December.

The 1994 National League MVP and a four-time All-Star, Bagwell spent his entire career with Houston.

The first baseman holds Astros records of 449 home runs and 1,529 RBIs. In 15 seasons, he had a .408 on-base average, a .540 slugging percentage and batted .297.

Bagwell joins longtime teammate Craig Biggio, who was elected in 2015, as the only players to go into the Hall as Astros.

"Craig and I made a conscious effort to play with the Astros our entire career, and I'm very, very proud of that and I know Craig is, too," Bagwell said. "No matter what ever happens, Craig and I are able

to say two things now: we played our entire careers with the Astros and now both of us are in the Hall of Fame, too."

Biggio raved about his friend and teammate.

"He put up incredible numbers offensively, but he was also a smart player, a really good defensive player, a great baserunner and he played the game the right way," Biggio said. "I'm so very proud to have played with him for so many years. We were able to change the culture in

No. 2 Baylor women cruise to win over ISU

WACO, Texas (AP) — Iowa State coach Bill Fennelly was ready to go ahead and play his team against second-ranked Baylor. The outcome certainly seems inevitable.

"I think they're bigger than our men's team. That's by far the best team we've played. It's not even close," Fennelly said after the Cyclones' 68-42 loss Wednesday night. "I wish we could just take a shower and go play again and get it over with. ... Maybe they can just come on the charter with us. Let's play tomorrow and be done with it."

Nina Davis scored 17 points, Kalani Brown had 16 and the Lady Bears won their 16th consecutive game in a surprisingly-low scoring contest.

In a game matching the Big 12's two highest-scoring teams, Baylor (18-1, 7-0 Big 12) was held nearly 25 points below its national-best 92.6 per-game average.

"They want you to play their tempo and I think we did for the most part and that's because they made us," Baylor coach Kim Mulkey said. "We were just never in the flow or had continuity, so give those guys credit."

And the Lady Bears still won by 26 as Iowa State was held to a season low in points after

scoring 79 a game before that.

They meet again Feb. 1 in Ames, Iowa. Both have three games to play before then.

The Lady Bears took control with a 10-1 run in a 95-second span early in the second quarter, soon after Iowa State (10-8, 1-6) had missed shots on three consecutive possessions following Baylor turnovers with a chance to take the lead. Freshman forward Lauren Cox, who had two turnovers, had two baskets in the big spurt.

Cox finished with 12 points and eight rebounds.

Bridget Carleton had 17 points and Jadda Buckley 15 for Iowa State, which shot only 23 percent (13 of 56).

Seanna Johnson, who entered third game third in the Big 12 with 17.5 points a game, went 0-for-7 shooting and the senior guard was held scoreless for the first time in her career.

BIG PICTURE

one, the contract was defeated when declarer lost two trumps, a diamond and a club.
Where a spade was led or shifted to later in the play, declarer won and led the ace and another heart. This resulted in the loss of two heart tricks and down one.

But one alert declarer, his ears tuned to the bidding, lost only one trump trick and so made four hearts. He reasoned that West could hardly have an opening bid without the king of hearts. Therefore, when West shifted to a spade at trick two after leading the diamond ace, this South won the spade with the jack and returned the queen of hearts!

Whether West covered with the king or not, he could score only one trump trick, and the contract was home.
The successful declarer clearly made the best play when he led the queen of hearts, even though that card was not backed up by the jack or ten. He reasoned that when the hearts are divided 2-2, it did not matter which heart he led. But when West has three hearts including the king, the queen play guards against the possibility that East's singleton is the jack or ten.

The bidding:
West North East South
1♦ 3♥ 3♥ Pass 1♥
Pass 3♥ Pass 4♥
Opening lead — ace of diamonds.
Declarer often obtains valuable information about the opponents' hands from the bidding. Since a great part of the skill in the play of the hand rests upon deducing how the defenders' cards are divided, such knowledge can be the key to producing the best result.
This deal occurred in a pair event. At most tables the final contract was four hearts, and in every case but

This Date In History

Today is Thursday, Jan. 19, the 19th day of 2017. There are 346 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:
On Jan. 19, 1977, on his last full day in office, President Gerald R. Ford pardoned Iva Toguri D'Aquino, an American convicted of treason for making English-language radio broadcasts from Japan aimed at demoralizing Allied troops in the Pacific Theater during World War II. (Although she was popularly referred to as "Tokyo Rose," D'Aquino never used that name, and was believed to be one of a group of female broadcasters.)

On this date:
In 1807, Confederate Gen. Robert E. Lee was born in Westmoreland County, Virginia.
In 1861, Georgia became the fifth state to secede from the Union.
In 1867, the song "The Daring Young Man on the Flying Trapeze" by Gaston Lyle, Alfred Lee and George Leybourne was first published in London.
In 1915, Germany carried out its first air raid on Britain during World War I as a pair of Zeppelins dropped bombs onto Great Yarmouth and King's

Lynn in England.

In 1937, millionaire Howard Hughes set a transcontinental air record by flying his monoplane from Los Angeles to Newark, New Jersey, in 7 hours, 28 minutes and 25 seconds.

In 1942, during World War II, Japanese forces captured the British protectorate of North Borneo. A German submarine sank the Canadian liner RMS Lady Hawkins off Cape Hatteras, North Carolina, killing 251 people; 71 survived.

In 1955, a presidential news conference was filmed for television and newsreels for the first time, with the permission of President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

In 1960, the Treaty of Mutual Cooperation and Security between Japan and the United States of America was signed by both countries in Washington, D.C.

In 1966, Indira Gandhi was chosen to be prime minister of India by the National Congress party.

In 1970, President Richard M. Nixon nominated G. Harrold Carswell to the Supreme Court; however, the nomination was defeated because of controversy over Carswell's past racial views.

In 1987, Guy Hunt became Alabama's first Republican governor since 1874 as he was sworn into office, succeeding

George C. Wallace.

In 1992, German government and Jewish officials dedicated a Holocaust memorial at the villa on the outskirts of Berlin where the notorious Wannsee Conference had taken place.

Ten years ago: Former Rep. Bob Ney (nay), R-Ohio, was sentenced to 2 1/2 years in prison for his role in a lobbying scandal. (Ney was released from a halfway house in Aug. 2008 after serving nearly a year and a half of his prison sentence.) Denny Doherty, a member of the 1960s folk-rock group The Mamas & the Papas, died near Toronto at age 66.

Five years ago: Six U.S. Marines were killed in a helicopter crash in southern Afghanistan. Texas Gov. Rick Perry abruptly quit the Republican presidential race. One of the world's most popular file-sharing sites, Megaupload.

Some Abilene students learn about aerospace technology

ABILENE, Texas (AP) — It's not just "3, 2, 1, blastoff" at the Academy of Technology, Engineering, Math & Science, though rocket science is among the school's offerings.

The Abilene Reporter-News reports aerospace engineering, a subspecialty within the engineering track at the specialized high school on East Highway 80, was launched this year. The school is part of the Abilene Independent School District.

Whether it's learning about the force needed to send a rocket into the sky or how an airplane keeps from crashing, students are tackling many real-world problems.

They'll also have the opportunity for deeper-level study. Texas State Technical College and NASA have made programs available to the aerospace engineering students — or those who simply have an interest in space and science.

"We're taking 30 students to

Waco for the Challenger Learning Center," said Tracy Long, an engineering teacher at ATEMS. "They'll actually do a space mission where half of them will be mission control and the other half will be in the shuttle. After it's done, they'll switch roles and do it again."

The Challenger Learning Center, hosted by the TSTC campus in Waco, is part of the Challenger Center for Space Science Education, an international not-for-profit education organization founded by the families of the astronauts who died during the Challenger space shuttle mission.

The center also will host students from the Brownwood Independent School District in February, according to a news release from TSTC.

The Waco-based center is the third of its kind in Texas.

Aerospace engineering involves a great deal of preparation. For senior Josh Murphy, this involves learning in a cock-

pit. But instead of visiting an actual aircraft, Murphy gets to learn sitting at a computer desk.

Another program first at ATEMS is the school's participation in the Texas High School Aerospace Scholars program. Instructional specialist Jennifer Yates has spent the past two years as a technical reviewer with the Johnson Space Center-affiliated program, but she'd never had any students apply to participate.

This year, ATEMS had three juniors accepted: Jaimalee Cordova, Kia Smith and Moise Ngendahayo.

The students work independently on several projects across engineering, technology, math and science modules, Yates said. As a reward for their hard work, the highest-performing participants — roughly 400 from around the state — get a one-week, expenses-paid trip to work with interns and engineers to complete a space mission at the Johnson Space Center in Houston.

Harden, Rockets beat Bucks

HOUSTON (AP) — James Harden and the Houston Rockets used their defense to get back on track.

Harden had 38 points, eight assists and six rebounds, helping the Rockets beat the Milwaukee Bucks 111-92 on Wednesday night.

Houston had dropped three for four, but it recorded a season-high 12 blocked shots and held Milwaukee to 39.8 percent shooting.

"That was the key to the game," Harden said. "I think we're realizing that in order for us to get to where we want to go, we have to get stops. When we get stops, we are 10 times better."

Harden drilled a straight-away 3-pointer with six minutes left to give Houston a 13-point lead and shimmied his shoulders down the court in a celebratory dance as the Bucks called timeout.

Giannis Antetokounmpo had 32 points, 11 rebounds, six assists and three blocks for Milwaukee, which struggled to score in the first half. Jabari Parker scored 15 points on 5-for-15 shooting, and reserve Michael Beasley had 14 points and eight boards.

Antetokounmpo was visibly frustrated after he was called for goaltending on a

chase-down block of Harden as the game slipped away late in the fourth quarter.

"I've got to do a better job of playing harder, especially in the fourth quarter," Antetokounmpo said. "We could have had that game today, but we gave it away."

Houston shooting guard Eric Gordon recaptured his touch after struggling from the field while playing on a tweaked ankle in the Rockets' 109-103 loss in Miami on Tuesday night.

The Rockets played without sharp-shooting power forward Ryan Anderson, who was sidelined by the flu for the second straight game. They missed his long-range presence, going 4 for 20 from beyond the arc in the first half before finishing 14 for 44.

Bucks coach Jason Kidd said Houston's late success behind the 3-point line helped the Rockets pull away.

"At the beginning of the game, we made a conscious effort and did a really good job," Kidd said. "But you have to have some pride and it has to be a team effort. Tonight, we just didn't give it."

Milwaukee had a five-point lead at the end of the first quarter, but was out-

scored 30-12 in the second. The Rockets allowed a season-low 39 first-half points and led by 13 at the break.

Montrezl Harrell had 12 points, eight rebounds and five blocks for the Rockets, who host NBA-leading Golden State on Friday night. Harden, Patrick Beverley and Clint Capela each added two blocks.

In their only previous matchup this season, the Rockets defeated the Warriors 132-127 in a double-overtime thriller in Oakland on Dec. 1.

HIGH PRAISE

After their scoring duel, Antetokounmpo called Harden the best player in the league.

"He's tough to guard, and the guys around him makes him even tougher to guard," he said. "He's doing a great job of find his teammates and being unselfish."

Evans scores 20 as Raiders down TCU

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) — Keenan Evans scored 20 points, including two free throws with 15 seconds left, in Texas Tech's 75-69 win over Texas Christian on Wednesday night.

Zach Smith had 19 points and seven rebounds and Justin Gray 18 points and six rebounds for the Red Raiders (14-4, 3-3 Big 12).

"In this league, your best players have to show up," Texas Tech coach Chris Beard said. "It's almost like your big three have to do it every night. You really need a fourth player. I don't know who our big three are, because we have a big 11."

Texas Christian (14-4, 3-3) was led by 22 points and six rebounds from Vlad Brodziansky — the reigning Big 12 Player of the Week — and 16 points from Kenrich Williams. Alex Robinson had 11 points.

The Red Raiders finished 25 of 31 on free-throw attempts and the Horned Frogs, which committed 25 personal fouls to Texas Tech's 11, finished 5 of 9.

"We fought through," Horned Frogs coach Jamie Dixon said. "The numbers speak for themselves. We're not going to make excuses.

We've got to go get it done. I've told our guys we can't leave room for error."

With 20.1 seconds left, Williams converted a 3-point play for the Horned Frogs, bringing them to within three, 72-69.

Smith then made one free throw before Evans connected on both attempts to put the game away.

Texas Christian won the rebounding margin 31-27 and each team committed nine turnovers. The Horned Frogs made just two of their last 11 shots.

Despite trailing by as many as 14 points early in the first half, the Horned Frogs cut the deficit to eight by halftime.

While the lead did not change in the first half, it changed four times in a tight second half.

the Hall after Roberto Clemente (1973), Orlando Cepeda (1999) and Roberto Alomar (2011). "Having trouble ordering food and communicating and all that to be a big leaguer in '91 and play with players,

that helped me grow up fast."

Rodriguez, now a special assistant to Rangers general manager Jon Daniels, got the call at home and shared some emotional moments with his family. His nearly 30-minute news conference was filled mostly with the megawatt smile that helped

make him a fan favorite.

While his offensive numbers were strong — including a .332 average and career-high 35 homers in his MVP season — Rodriguez's arm stood out when he came up.

Rodriguez led the AL in caught stealing percentage nine times and at 42 percent had the

best rate for any catcher with at least 480 games since the stat was first tracked in 1974.

"Being able to shut down the running and blocking and throwing guys out and trying to kill the other team's rally, I think that's one of the things that I feel most proud of," he said. "I know offensively I had a great career, but my main game was defense and that's why I take a lot of pride in being a defensive catcher."

The Rangers made their first three trips to the playoffs with Rodriguez behind the plate in 1996, '98 and '99. But they lost nine straight games to the Yankees after winning the first.

His title with the Marlins came in his first year after leaving the Rangers, but he returned for part of the 2009 season.

Rodriguez remembers mandatory English class as a 17-year-old minor leaguer and that he was supposed to be a

temporary replacement for the injured Geno Petralli when he got called up from Double-A Tulsa for his big league debut. He never went back down.

"I feel most proud to be in the Hall of Fame as a first-timer," said Rodriguez, the 52nd player elected on his initial appearance. "It's not the second time or the fourth time. To be there in one of one is an honor."

Houston. Our goal was to win, and Baggy was a major reason for our success."

As one-third of Houston's famed 'Killer B's' with Biggio and Lance Berkman, he helped build the Astros from a last-place team to the first club from Texas to reach the World Series in 2005.

They were swept by the Chicago White Sox in what would be the last of his six postseason trips.

Berkman echoed Biggio's sentiments about how deserving Bagwell is of baseball's highest honor.

"This is long overdue. Jeff is one of the top, three or four players that I ever played with or against," Berkman said. "When I think of Baggy, I think of two things. The first is professional. He came to play every day and never took an at-bat off. You can't say that about everyone. The second thing I think of is what a complete player he was. He was an amazing fielder and baserunner and had an innate grasp of the fine nuances of the game."

Bagwell admitted to feeling numb as he spoke to reporters at an airport for a few minutes before being whisked away to a plane that would take him to New York for a news conference with Raines and Rodriguez on Thursday. He said leading up to the announcement that he probably would feel relief more than anything else when he knew the outcome of this year's vote. On Wednesday he

said that the last few weeks had weighed on him.

"The anxiety of going through this has been hard," he said. "Just to get this over with, I'm excited. I have no idea what I'm doing here right now — here talking about being in the Hall of Fame. That's cool and for a lot of people it means a lot and for mean it really does mean a lot. I just think I just have to take a little bit of time to recognize what is going on."

He repeatedly de-

scribed his day as "weird" and "strange" and shared the feeling he had when he signed a baseball for his longtime agent Barry Axelrod on Wednesday afternoon.

"I signed a ball today that said 'HOF 17' and that was weird," Bagwell said. "I've never signed anything like that before. I've signed 'MVP' and 'Rookie of the Year' and all that but I've never signed 'HOF.' You pretty much can't go any farther than that. So it was pretty cool."
