

Zoning request, election to top city council meeting

A final vote on two separate rezoning requests for properties in the city and a calling for the 2017 city elections will be on tap when Big Spring City Council members meet on Tuesday night.

Early on in the meeting, which begins at 5:30 p.m. in the city council chamber at 307 East 4th Street, council members are expected to tackle two separate requests for rezoning property within the city. Public hearings were held for both requests at the last city council meeting.

Local business owner James Massingill of M&M Construction requested the city rezone a 16.52 acre property located off of Farm Road 700, about 200 feet northwest of the intersection of FM 700 and

Baylor Boulevard, from light commercial to heavy commercial. Massingill is having to relocate his 45-year-old

oil field construction business in north Howard county because it is positioned right in the center of where the north Highway 87 bypass will be constructed. Massingill told city council members he will be storing his heavy equipment and fuel only on the site. Also if approved Tuesday, a second zoning request from the owner of 1704 Wasson Drive, located

across from Comanche Trail Park, will move the 9.133 acre tract of land from single-family dwelling and planned development to agricultural. "This particular case of taking someone from one

area of housing down to ag, it seems almost backwards and it did so to us until we determined what exactly was going to happen to the property and the reason behind it," said Terry McDaniel, chairman of the Planning and Zoning Commission, during the public hearing held earlier this month. "The individual who owns this property wishes to have this in ag use so they can preserve it for agricultural uses for the reminder of time. The individual also informed us there is a possibility that it will stay that way even after her death."

Both requests passed in the first reading by city council members.

The city council is also excepted to **call** for the 2017 election. Up for election is District 1, served by Raul Marquez Jr. and District 3, served by Justin Myers. Filing to run for a position began last Thursday.

Between 1942 and 1977, Big Spring was the site of Army and Air Force facilities that trained cadet pilots and bombardiers including Webb Air Force Base and the Big Spring Army Air Forces Bombardier School. Saturday night, the 19th annual Silver Wings Ball raised money to preserve and promote that slice of Big Spring history in the form of Hangar 25 Air Museum.

"This is our big fundraiser of the year. All of the fundraising that we do today, the proceeds go to continuing our mission at Hangar 25 Air Museum," said Hangar 25 Museum

Administrator Amber Stokes. "It helps with our programming, our veterans' programs, our exhibits, and just keeping the museum fresh and going through the years. It just helps to keep a big part of the Big Spring history that was Webb Air Force Base and the Big Spring Bombardier/Pilot Training School. This ball is what we really depend on every year for the next year, and the next year, etc."

Stokes said the event aims to sell about 200 seats each year.

"This year, we were right at it. I think we had three seats left," she said. "We try to fill the 200 and get as close to that as possible, and not go over 200 seats."

Music, dancing, dinner, and silent auctions were on the agenda for the

evening. "We have the South Plains Jazz Band that will be playing," Stokes said. "We have a silent auction that has about 28 different items that have been donated to us from different stores around Big Spring. The silent auction has some pretty neat items. One of the big ones that we kept a secret, we have an authentic certificate-signed Tony Dorsett jersey, and it's beautifully framed. Nobody knows that's what's

Opening his first official

week in office, President Donald Trump warned business leaders Monday that he would impose a "substantial border tax" on companies that move their manufacturing out of the United States, while promising tax advantages to companies that produce products domestically.

"All you have to do is stay," he said during a morning meeting in the White House's

Roosevelt Room. Tesla CEO Elon Musk and Marillyn Hewson of Lockheed Martin were among the executives who attended the meeting. The gathering kicked off

a jam-packed day for the new

president, including an evening reception with lawmakers from both parties and a sit-down with union leaders.

The president also planned to sign multiple executive orders in the Oval Office. Trump had pledged to quickly





use his executive authority to withdraw the U.S. from the 12-nation Trans-Pacific Partnership trade pact agreed to under the Obama administration. He's also expected to sign an order implementing a federal government hiring freeze.

Conservatives are also eager for Trump to sign an order reinstating a ban on providing federal money to international groups that perform abortions or provide information on the option.

The regulation, known as the "Mexico City Policy" or, by critics, the "global gag rule," has been a political volleyball, instituted by Republican administrations and rescinded by Democratic ones since 1984.

Trump ran for office pledging to

overhaul U.S. trade policy, arguing that massive free-trade agreements have disadvantaged American workers. Since winning the White House, he's aggressively called out companies that have moved factories overseas, vowing to slap taxes on products

they then try to sell in the U.S.

"Some people say that's not free trade, but we don't have free trade now," Trump said Monday.

The president also reiterated his campaign pledge to lower taxes for companies, as well as the middle class, "anywhere from 15 to 25 per-

He also called for cutting 75 percent of regulations, though he insisted that doing so would not compromise worker safety.

Trump's outreach effort comes after a tumultuous first weekend in the White House that included lambasting news organizations for correctly reporting on the size of the crowds at his inauguration and mass protests against his presidency on the follow-

Trump delivered a more unifying message Sunday and sought to reassure Americans he was up to the daunting task ahead.

Speaking in the White House East Room during a swearing-in ceremony for top aides, the president warned his staff of the challenges ahead but declared he believed they were ready.

"But with the faith in each other

and the faith in God, we will get the job done," he said. "We will prove worthy of this moment in history. And I think it may very well be a great moment in history."

Trump said his staff was in the White House not to "help ourselves" but to "devote ourselves to the national good."

"This is not about party, this is not about ideology. This is about country, our country. It's about serving the American people," he said. Earlier Sunday, Trump offered a

scattershot response to the sweeping post-inauguration protests, first sarcastically denigrating the public opposition and then defending the right to demonstrate a short time later. "Watched protests yesterday but was under the impression that we

just had an election! Why didn't these people vote? Celebs hurt cause badly," Trump tweeted early Sunday morning. Ninety-five minutes later, he struck a more conciliatory tone. "Peaceful protests are a hallmark of

our democracy. Even if I don't always agree, I recognize the rights of people to express their views," the president tweeted, still using his personal account.

Trump also spoke with Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, who accepted an invitation to visit the White House in early February. The prime minister said he is hoping to forge a "common vision" with the newly inaugurated U.S. president that could include expanded settlement construction and a tougher policy toward Iran.

Trump also announced that he's set up meetings with Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau and Mexican President Enrique Pena Nieto.

"We're going to start some negotiations having to do with NAFTA," he said of his meeting with Pena Nieto.

Mexico is part of the free trade agreement with the U.S. and Canada. Trump said he also will discuss immigration and security at the border. He has promised to build a wall along the length of the southern border and insisted that Mexico will pay for it.

Later in the week, he'll address congressional Republicans at their retreat in Philadelphia and meet with British Prime Minister Theresa May.



to record 9th Super Bowl trip

Bill Belichick has done something neither Chuck Noll, Tom Landry nor Bill Walsh ever managed. Same for Tom Brady, besting the likes of Terry Bradshaw, Roger Staubach and Joe Montana.

Together, Belichick and Brady have put themselves into a record seven Super Bowls. And they made the New England Patriots the NFL's first franchise to play in nine Super Bowls with a 36-17 win over the Pittsburgh Steelers on Sunday night in the AFC championship game.

That victory helped the Patriots break from the NFL's pack of royalty, the teams who seemingly take turns making the league's championship games into their personal finish lines.

Now the Steelers, Dallas Cowboys and Denver Broncos — all tied with eight Super Bowl appearances apiece - must wait another year before trying to give the Patriots company. For now, the Patriots will be busy

packing for Houston and their latest Super Bowl on Feb. 5 against the Atlanta Falcons and a chance at making more his-

Here's a look at the franchises that have played in — and won - the most Super Bowls:

BELICHICK WAY

The Patriots had two Super Bowl berths to their credit before Belichick took over, but then he rewrote record books for the team and the league. Belichick and Brady already had the most visits for a coach-quarterback duo before beating the Steelers. Belichick now stands alone as a coach with his seven Super Bowl berths, breaking a tie with Don Shula (six). Belichick and Brady are 4-2 in the Super Bowl, helping New England reach .500 in its eight trips. A win in Houston would tie the Pats with San Francisco and Dallas for second all-time with five wins.

HERE WE GO

The Steelers have the most wins in the big game and are 6-2 in their visits. Noll and Bradshaw made the Steelers the first

franchise to win four Super Bowl titles — in the span of six years starting in 1975. Ben Roethlisberger then helped coach Bill Cowher win a Super Bowl ring by beating Seattle in 2006.

Big Ben later teamed up with coach Mike Tomlin to beat Arizona for the Steelers' sixth Super Bowl championship in 2009, and they missed out on the franchise's seventh by losing to

Green Bay in 2011. COWBOY UP

Thanks to Landry, the Cowboys made a habit of heading to Super Bowls with five trips starting in 1971. Landry and Staubach went together four times, winning titles in 1972 and again in 1978. America's Team didn't get back until new owner Jerry Jones and coach Jimmy Johnson returned the Cowboys to championship status with back-to-back Super Bowl wins in 1993 and 1994. After a split, Jones brought in Barry Switzer, and he coached Troy Aikman and the Cowboys back to Super Bowl champs in 1996. Dallas is

ATLANTA (AP) — While the raucous beats of Welcome To Atlanta" blared through the Georgia Dome, the Falcons partied like it was 1999.

How appropriate.

That was the last time they made it to the Super Matt Ryan and Julio Jones teamed up for another

dynamic performance, leading the Falcons to the big game for only the second time in franchise history with a 44-21 rout of the Green Bay Packers in the NFC championship game Sunday. The Falcons led 24-0 at halftime and tacked on

another touchdown early in the second half, essentially turning the dome into the world's largest dance club for the rest of its final game, the deafening crowd relishing a shot at only the second major

sports championship in Atlanta's history. "I'm sure the city won't sleep tonight, including myself," said Jonathan Babineaux, the team's longest-tenured player.

The Falcons (13-5) advanced to the Feb. 5 title game in Houston, where they will face Tom Brady and the New England Patriots. They blew out Pittsburgh 36-17 for the AFC championship, earning their record ninth trip to the Super Bowl.

The Patriots opened as a 3-point favorite over the neophyte Falcons, whose only other Super Bowl appearance came 18 years ago. They lost to Denver in John Elway's final game.

Ryan threw for 392 yards and four touchdowns, not to mention his first rushing score since 2012 on a 14-yard run in which he pump-faked a defender and tumbled into the end zone.

"We've worked hard to get to this point," Ryan said. "But the challenge is still in front of us."

In an interesting twist, the Falcons' last victory over the Patriots was a resounding 41-10 triumph in 1998, a game that signaled the emergence of the Super Bowl-bound "Dirty Birds."

Since then, New England has won four straight over the Falcons, most recently in 2013.

The Patriots will have their hands full with Jones, who hauled in nine catches for 180 yards and two touchdowns despite sitting out most of the week of practice with a lingering toe injury.

He had a 5-yard catch for a touchdown with just 3 seconds left in the first half, giving the Falcons a commanding 24-0 lead.

But Jones showed all his talents on Atlanta's second offensive snap of the second half . He shook off LaDarius Gunter's attempt to grab him on a cut toward the sideline, hauled in the pass from Ryan, broke Gunter's diving attempt at tackle, and defiantly knocked away Damarious Randall's with a brutal stiff-arm for a 73-yard touchdown that finished off the Packers (12-7).

Some other things we learned from the Falcons'

quarterback hurries.

Despite expectations of a high-scoring shootout, the Falcons shut out the Packers until the third quarter. It was an especially impressive performance considering the youth of the Atlanta defense, which started four rookies and four secondyear players on defense.

"It's funny because some people say the defense is too young," said Falcons defensive end Dwight Freeney, who is 36. "I can look at it from the other side. Those guys are young and have energy and can run. You get them going on the right page and understanding the things they need to understand fast, we can be dangerous." Rookie nickel back Brian Poole led Atlanta with seven tackles and two

FOXBOROUGH, Mass. (AP) — There's this football game planned for Feb. 5 in Houston. Let's hope it turns out much better than most of the postseason matchups the NFL has provided this year.

To say Sunday's championship games were duds is being kind. Blame the two losing teams, the Packers and Steelers, who were so helpless that they looked like they should have been done playing last month. All credit to the Patriots and Falcons, of course, who could give fans an all-time great shootout in two weeks.

But don't count on it considering how eight of the 10 playoff contests were, well, no contest.

Wild-card weekend was everything except wild. Routs galore. Inept performances by the undermanned Raiders and Dolphins, inconsistent Giants, and they-don't-belong-there Lions.

It didn't improve any with the mismatches on the first day of the divisional round: Houston had no business being on the same field as New England, and only the Patriots' sloppiness kept that game relatively close for a while. Atlanta passed Seattle dizzy and cruised. The respite from such lopsided and at times barely watchable matches

came the next day with a classic Packers-Cowboys game. It was worth waiting for from beginning to end — the kind of product that entrances everyone – and was followed by a tight Steelers-Chiefs game

that seemed to bode well for the conference finals. Then, deflation. Sure, it was sweet for the folks in Georgia and New England, and they deserve to celebrate. The Patriots (16-2) are seeking even more history, including Tom Brady going for a record fifth Super Bowl crown by a quarterback. The Falcons (13-5) are an exciting offensive machine with an improving defense and a coach likely to entertain in Dan Quinn.

Oddsmakers expect a close one, too, making the Patriots merely a 3-point favorite.

"It's an honor to get to go and play in this game," Patriots receiver Julian Edelman said Sunday night. "This is what you fight for. This is what you train for. This is what you get hurt for. This is what you get yelled at for, and prepare for, and go through the ebbs and flows of a season."

Unfortunately, the NFL this month has seen far too many ebbs. The conference championships punctuated that, which was surprising because





Contract Bridge

Famous Hand



North dealer.

The bidding:

North East South West

1 ♥ Pass 2 ♦ Pass

3 ♣ Pass 3 NT

Opening lead — king of diamonds.

It is not at all surprising that in every country where bridge is played — and that means practically every

every country where bridge is played
— and that means practically every
country in the world — different
methods of bidding have developed.
Nowhere is this more noticeable than
in the world championships staged
every year.

Take this deal from the U.S.-Italy

match in 1957. At the first table, Italy's Walter Avarelli and Giorgio Belladonna held the North-South cards. They were playing the Roman Club system, which features many unusual conventions.

Avarelli opened the North hand with one heart. He could not bid one club because that would have indicated either a very powerful hand or 4-3-3-3 or 4-4-3-2 distribution!

Belladonna responded two diamonds instead of one spade because in the Roman system the shorter suit is normally mentioned first when responder has a good hand.

Avarelli then bid three clubs,

Avarelli then bid three clubs, promising a five-card suit, and Belladonna bid three notrump. South's spade suit, oddly enough, was never mentioned. All three suit bids were contrary to the American style, which calls for the longer suit to be bid first. West led the king of diamonds and set the contract one trick, scoring four diamonds and a spade.

At the second table, with Boris Koytchou and Harold Ogust North-South for the U.S., the bidding went:

North East South West

↑ Pass Pass Dble

Here the bids were all natural,

and West (Guglielmo Siniscalco) wound up in two diamonds doubled. His overcall was certainly normal, but he scored only four diamond tricks, a spade and a heart to finish down two, minus 300.

So Italy lost 400 points on the

deal, which proves virtually nothing other than that the language of bidding is far from universal.

Today's Highlight in History: On Jan. 23, 1933, the 20th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, the so-called "Lame Duck Amendment," was ratified as Missouri approved

In 1950, the Israeli Knesset approved a resolution affirming Jerusalem as the capital of Israel. In 1964, the 24th Amendment

to the United States Constitution, eliminating the poll tax in federal elections, was ratified as South Dakota became the 38th state to endorse it. In 1968, North Korea seized

the Navy intelligence ship USS

Pueblo, charging its crew with

being on a spying mission. (The crew was released 11 months later.) In 1977, the original TV miniseries "Roots," based on the Alex Haley novel, began airing

on ABC. In 1989, surrealist artist Salvador Dali died in his native Figueres, Spain, at age 84.

In 1995, the Supreme Court, in McKennon vs. Nashville Banner Publishing Co., ruled that companies accused of firing employees illegally could not escape liability by later finding a lawful reason to justify the dismissal.

In 1997, a panel of experts gathered by the National Cancer Institute concluded that "each woman should decide for herself" whether to start having mammograms as early as her 40s — a recommendation that infuriated the American Cancer Society.

Ten years ago: In his State of the Union address, President George W. Bush implored Congress to give his plan to send more U.S. troops to Iraq a

chance to work A new rule requiring U.S. airline passengers to show a passport upon their return from Mexico, Canada or the Caribbean took effect. E. Howard Hunt, who helped organize the Watergate break-in, leading to the downfall of Richard Nixon's presidency, died in Miami at age 88.

Five years ago: Republican presidential contenders Mitt Romney and Newt Gingrich clashed repeatedly in heated, personal terms in a crackling campaign debate in Tampa, Florida.

One year ago: A blizzard with hurricane-force winds brought much of the East Coast to a standstill. Gracie Gold bounced back from a shaky short program with a flawless free skate to win her second U.S. Figure Skating title at the championship in St. Paul, Minnesota.



19 die amid apparent winter tornadoes. other storms in South

ALBANY, Ga. (AP) — Chuck Stafford was watching the Atlanta Falcons rout the Green Bay Packers for the NFC title Sunday afternoon in the mobile home park in Albany where he's lived for more than 31 years when the weather started getting bad.

Stafford, 74, had gotten up to go to the restroom during a commercial when the storm hit. He said the wind started blowing and the mobile home started shaking. "I grabbed hold of my washer and dryer, got my legs spread apart and hunched over," Stafford said. "I guess I picked a good time to go to

The force of the winds blew the windows out of Stafford's trailer and glass was everywhere, but he survived the storm that has killed 19 people across the Southeast, including 15 in south Georgia alone.

Early Monday, Stafford was back at the trailer park with his sister, hoping to get in to look at his belongings. Meanwhile, fire and rescue crews kept residents out as they searched the debris looking for people who might have become trapped when

Dougherty County Coroner Michael Fowler said that a total of four people died Sunday in the county that includes Albany.

Some 60 miles away, Coroner Tim Purvis in south Georgia's Cook County confirmed seven people died at the mobile home park in the rural community of Adel, where about half of the 40 homes were leveled. Debris lay about not far from mobile homes largely untouched but emptied of survivors and cordoned off by police.

Elsewhere, shredded siding from mobile homes, a house stripped of exterior walls but left standing, even a piano blown outdoors, all bore evidence of the power of the powerful storms system that tore across the Deep South during two days, killing four in Mississippi on Saturday.

The 15 killed in south Georgia included two deaths each in the counties of Berrien and Brooks. In South Carolina, the National Weather Service has confirmed that two tornadoes struck over the weekend, injuring one woman who was trapped in a mobile home that was damaged near Blackville. The weather service says a tornado touched down about 3:45 p.m. Saturday in Barnwell County and moved into Bamberg County. The other occurred in Orangeburg County a few minutes later.

Weather experts say tornadoes can hit any time of year in the South — including in the dead of winter. Even north Florida was under the weekend weather threat.

While the central U.S. has a fairly defined tornado season — the spring — the risk of tornadoes "never really goes to zero" for most of the year in the Southeast, explained Patrick Marsh of the Storm Prediction Center in Norman, Oklahoma.

He said 39 possible tornadoes were reported across the Southeast from early Saturday into Sunday evening — none immediately confirmed. Of that, 30 were reported in Georgia, four in Mississippi, and one each in Louisiana and South Caro-

January tornado outbreaks are rare but not unprecedented, particularly in the South. Data from

the Steelers and, in particular, the Packers had performed so well in their previous two outings.

Maybe that was a big part of the letdown Sunday. Green Bay and Pittsburgh made so many mistakes almost from the outset that they never gave themselves a chance to reach Houston. Perhaps they simply ran out of steam, while their opponents had a wild-card bye that kept them fresher.

Seemingly much fresher.

"If this has taught us anything, it's how important home-field advantage is," Aaron Rodgers said. "Being able to sleep in your own bed and practice and not have to travel and have the fan support, it makes a big difference. We've played in three of these now and all on the road. It's tough to win on

For the Steelers, it's nearly impossible to win in Foxborough, where they are 1-5 since 2002; Brady was injured for the one Pittsburgh victory in 2008.

They might not have won against Boston College with the kind of showing they made this time.

"A lot of guys were feeling good about this game, the game plan and everything else," right tackle Marcus Gilbert said. "Then the whole climate changed, we weren't moving the ball, we weren't converting third downs. Then they scored and we were behind, we tried to play catch-up, and that's when bad things happen. You aren't going to win football games like that.

"There is no next game, so I can't say we need to work on it. It's a disappointing way to end the sea-

Just as, for the most part, it's been a disappointing postseason. Perhaps what the Falcons and Patriots bring to Houston will make folks forget that.

1 dead, multiple injured in San Antonio shopping mall shooting

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A robbery inside a San Antonio shopping mall ended with shots fired on Sunday, leaving one person who tried to intervene dead, three others shot and another two people taken to hospital with non-shooting injuries, police and fire officials said.

Police Chief William McManus said two suspects robbed a jewelry store at the Rolling Oaks Mall on

"What we have here is a robbery gone really, really bad," McManus said.

After the suspects fled the store, a man, described by McManus as a "good Samaritan" tried to stop the two men.

One of the robbers then fatally shot the man, Mc-

A second individual, who was carrying a licensed concealed weapon, then shot and wounded the robber who had killed the person who intervened, Mc-

Police said the second robber, who initially fled the scene, was arrested Sunday night. Additional details about the arrest or suspect were not imme-

McManus called the fatal shooting "absolutely senseless." The victim's name was not immediately released by authorities.

The other robber who fled the mall fired his weapon, injuring a man and a woman. These two individuals, along with the injured robber, were taken to local hospital, said San Antonio Fire Chief Charles Hood.

Whitehead, Desmond receive medals from library association

NEW YORK (AP) — Colson Whitehead's latest honor is a thank-you from the country's libraries.

Whitehead's "The Underground Railroad" has won the Andrew Carnegie Medal for Excellence in Fiction, a \$5,000 prize presented by the American Library Association. His novel about a runaway slave and the very real railroad used as a path to freedom has already won the National Book Award and is a finalist for the \$75,000 the PEN/Jean Stein Book Award. On Sunday, the library association also told The Associated Press that the nonfiction medal was given to Matthew Desmond for "Evicted: Poverty and Profit in the

American City."

Runners-up, each of whom receive \$1,000, included Michael Chabon for "Moonglow" and Zadie Smith for "Swing Time" in fiction, and Patricia Bell-Scott for "The Firebrand and the First Lady" and Patrick Phillips for "Blood at the Root" in non-

The medals were established in 2012 and are sponsored by the Carnegie Corporation of New York, along with the library association's Booklist publication and the Reference and User Services Association. Previous winners include Doris Kearns Goodwin, Donna Tartt and Anthony Doerr.

Ex-exec admits stealing \$850K from health care giant UPMC

PITTSBURGH (AP) — A former executive with Pittsburgh-based health care giant UPMC has admitted he stole nearly \$850,000 from the company by arranging to hire his wife and a friend as ghost

Federal prosecutors say 48-year-old Ronald Locy faces up to a decade in prison after pleading guilty last week to embezzlement in connection with health care.

The Pittsburgh Post-Gazette reports (http://bit. ly/2kigAxI) Locy, of Georgetown, Texas, was a senior director in the claims department for UPMC Health Plan.

Prosecutors say Locy's wife received more than \$785,000 from 2005 to 2013 even though she never worked for the health plan.

Authorities say bogus documents, including performance reviews, were entered into the health plan's database because of Locy. Another person was placed on the payroll for \$61,000.

Prosecutor wants school shooting case moved to adult court

URBANA, Ohio (AP) — An Ohio prosecutor says he will ask that a school shooting case be moved to the adult criminal justice system.

Authorities say a 17-year-old shooter fired a 12-gauge shotgun in the Friday morning attack at a high school in West Liberty, 45 miles northwest of Columbus.

Two students were wounded, one critically.

The suspect was initially held in a juvenile center on a charge of felonious assault.

Champaign County Prosecutor Kevn Talebi (tuh-LEE'-bee) says the teen will face a number of additional charges, including attempted murder.

Talebi says moving the case to common pleas court is appropriate because of the nature of the charges and also for the safety of the community.
