

State settles Western Texas governor echoes Trump Union for \$5 million with 'sanctuary city' crackdown

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton announced Tuesday a \$5 million settlement with Western Union to protect consumers from wire fraud scams.

The deal, which involves 49 states and the District of Columbia, resolves an investigation into complaints by people who used Western Union's wire transfer service to send money to third parties who were involved in schemes to defraud them.

In addition to the settlement with the states, Western Union agreed to pay \$586 million to a fund that the U.S. Department of Justice will administer to provide refunds to wire fraud victims nationwide, including approximately 39,000 consumers in Texas.

"This settlement serves as a cautionary tale that scam artists are always looking for new ways to fool people into wiring them money, including schemes purportedly involving family members, romantic interests, lotteries and contests," Attorney General Paxton said. "Western Union has agreed to

Day" event was scheduled months ago but took on a more defiant tone - and attracted much larger turnout than usual - after Trump last week banned immigrants from seven Muslim-majority nations from traveling to the U.S. The event's organizers said they brought private security with them for the first time because of heightened political tensions, but only a few protesters showed up to greet them.

At the same event in 2015. one Republican legislator instructed her staff to ask Muslims visiting her office to take a loyalty pledge to the U.S.

No Republicans spoke at the rally, and Democrats criticized Abbott for not using the spotlight of his State of the State address to sav where he stands on Trump's immigration ban. Abbott also didn't mention Trump's plan to build a wall along the border of Mexico.

"The new administration in Washington has shown the potential to finally secure the border," Abbott said. "But as (former University of Texas football coach) Darrell Royal said: 'Potential just means you ain't done it yet."

Opposition to sanctuary cities is one area where Abbott and Trump clearly see eye-toeye. Abbott instructed lawmakers to send him a bill by June that punishes local governments that don't cooperate with federal immigration authorities.

Texas crackdown А could be even tougher than Trump's: Abbott wants to not only withhold taxpayer money to cities that don't arrest or detain immigrants in the country illegally, but also the power to remove locally elected officials from office if they don't comply.

"To protect Texans from deadly danger, we must insist that laws be followed," Abbott said.

Travis County Sheriff Sally Hernandez, who runs the jails in the state capital of Austin, the state's most liberal city, plans to stop honoring all federal immigration detainers on Wednesday and only comply with holds for murder, aggravated sexual assault and human trafficking. Abbott says he is immediately cutting off grant funds that totaled \$1.8 million last year and has asked state agencies for a list of other state dollars sent to the county, one of the biggest in Texas.

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

Canada shooting victim dreamed of water for Guinea village

CONAKRY, Guinea (AP) - Relatives of a Guinea man killed in this week's shooting at a mosque in Canada say he was working on a project to bring drinking water to his home village at the time of his death.

Alpha Barry, an uncle of victim Mamadou Tanou Barry, says the 42-yearold accountant frequently sent financial and other aid to relatives in this West African nation while caring for two children of his own in Canada.

On Sunday night, he was among six people killed in the attack on the Quebec Islamic Culture Centre. Another Guinean, Ibrahima Barry, was also among the dead.

Alpha Barry says the unfinished water project involved installing a 100-meter-deep well in his remote village outside Labe, Guinea's second-largest city located hundreds of kilometers (miles) inland from the capital, Conakry.

EU, Mexico to speed up trade talks amid Trump fallout

BRUSSELS (AP) — The European Union said Wednesday that it will speed up talks with Mexico on a new trade agreement amid signals from U.S. President Donald Trump that he intends to renegotiate major international trade pacts including one with Mexico.

EU and Mexico trade chiefs have agreed to hold negotiations on April 3-7 and June 26-29. They will also meet between rounds to push for further progress.

EU Trade Commissioner Cecilia Malmstrom and Mexican Economy Minister Ildefonso Guajardo said in a statement that "we are witnessing the worrying rise of protectionism around the world. Side by side, as like-minded partners, we must now stand up for the idea of global, open cooperation."

Trade between the two more than doubled between 2005 and 2015 from 26 billion euros to 53 billion euros (\$28 billion-\$57 billion), but their current trade pact dates from 2000.

In Brussels, top EU officials have also expressed concern that the policies of the new U.S. administration will undermine relations between Europe and the United States.

"We follow with growing anxiety

how the recent, and the announced steps, would affect the strategic trans-Atlantic relationship," European Commission Vice-President Maros Sefcovic told reporters after a meeting of the EU executive's top policy officials.

He said the EU has "never been so overwhelmed by calls from around the world" to show leadership on free and open trade, climate talks and development aid.

"I am convinced that the U.S. never had a better ally than a united Europe. We should treasure this relationship and not forget about it," Sefcovic said.

South African protesters say EU is dumping low-cost chickens

PRETORIA, South Africa (AP) -Workers and managers in South Africa's chicken industry have marched to the office of the European Union delegation, alleging their livelihoods are in jeopardy because of allegedly illegal dumping of EU chicken meat in the local market.

The protest in Pretoria on Wednesday follows plans by RCL Foods and other chicken producers to cut several thousand jobs, citing the impact of low-cost chickens from Europe. Protesters want the South African government to impose tariffs on chicken imports from Europe to help protect the local industry.

EU trade officials deny any dumping, saying EU imports are legal.

Pennsylvania mayor accused of disturbing graves

SHAMOKIN, Pa. (AP) - Authorities have accused a Pennsylvania mayor of disturbing 14 graves with the construction of a cellphone tower in the cemetery where he serves as board president.

Investigators say Shamokin Mayor Bill Milbrand allowed a construction crew to build the tower over the graves.

The mayor has denied the charges and said he had little involvement in directing the project, which he says will generate money for the upkeep of the cemetery. Some of the graves date to 1919. Milbrand tells The Associated Press on Wednesday that he can't comment until he speaks to a lawyer.



New development in store for Austin's South Congress Avenue

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Dramatic changes are coming to South Congress Avenue, setting up a transformation that some Austinites say threatens the funky fabric of one of the city's best-known destinations.

The Austin American-Statesman reports a wave of upscale shops, restaurants, offices and boutique hotels is headed to the area — displacing some of the homegrown businesses that many patrons and merchants say have given South Congress the eclectic character that has become synonymous with the city's identity.

The new development is being driven by market forces that include rising property values and higher rents as the area has grown ever more popular with tourists.

Two mixed-use projects and two high-end hotels are among the planned projects that signal more change for a street that within a few decades has transformed from a seedy red-light district into a mix of mostly local shops, music venues, hotels and restaurants that have helped give Austin its "weird" vibe.

The next stage of evolution is raising questions about whether South Congress can stay true to its roots or whether it will morph into a homogeneous row of highend national chains.

Numerous mom-and-pop businesses have come and gone since 2000 as rents have continued to rise and developers have bought up properties to build new, pricier projects.

"The whole feel of that street is definitely changing," said Steve Wertheimer, owner of the Continental Club, a landmark music venue on South Congress for decades. "I hear a sucking sound every day with the soul being slowly drained out of this area. The local folks, who made this street so attractive by breathing new life back in the area, are having a difficult time remaining here. Increasing rents and taxes, along with (parking issues) are taking a toll on merchants' bottom lines and their livelihoods."

Boy Scouts allows transgender kids into boys-only programs

Texas mulls changing science standards questioning evolution

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The Texas Board of Education is hearing arguments over changing state science curriculums that critics say are designed to challenge the theory of evolution and leave students wondering whether a higher power created the universe.

After Tuesday's public hearing, the board will hold preliminary votes later this week on whether to alter classroom standards in place since 2009. Texas is a large textbook market, so what it teaches can influence content nationwide.

A committee of science teachers and academics wants the Republican-controlled board to scrap requiring high school students to consider "all sides" of scientific theories such as evolution. Those opposing the standards say they let religious ideology take precedence over science.

Supporters counter that the curriculum encourages critical thinking. It's endured despite past federal court rulings opposing teaching creationism.

Texas truck driver accused in fatal Oklahoma wreck kills self

DALLAS (AP) — A Texas truck driver accused of causing a 2014 crash in Oklahoma that killed four college softball players has died by suicide at his home.

The prosecutor in the Oklahoma case, Murray County District Attorney Craig Ladd, confirmed to The Oklahoman that 55-year-old Russell Staley died just days before a scheduled court hearing.

Tarrant County medical examiner's office records show Staley died Friday of a gunshot wound at his home north of Fort Worth, Texas.

Staley was scheduled for trial in March on four counts of manslaughter in the deaths of the softball players from North Central Texas College. The Oklahoma Highway Patrol determined Staley lost control of his semitrailer on Interstate 35 near Davis, Oklahoma, crossed the center line and crashed into the team's bus.

DALLAS (AP) — A New Jersey woman whose son was asked to leave his Boy Scouts troop after leaders found out he is transgender said she has mixed emotions about the organization's decision to allow transgender children who identify as boys to enroll in its boys-only programs.

The Boy Scouts of America announced Monday that enrollment in its boys-only programs will now be based on the gender a child or parent lists on his application to become a scout, rather than the gender listed on the child's birth certificate. Eight-year-old Joe Maldonado was asked to leave his scout troop in Secaucus, New Jersey, last fall after parents and leaders found out he is transgender. The organization's statement did not specifically mention Joe's case, but said it changed the policy because of the larger conversation about gender identity taking place around the country.

"For more than 100 years, the Boy Scouts of America, along with schools, youth sports and other youth organizations, have ultimately deferred to the information on an individual's birth certificate to determine eligibility for our single-gender programs," the statement said. "However, that approach is no longer sufficient as communities and state laws are interpreting gender identity differently, and these laws vary widely from state to state."

Kristie Maldonado, Joe's mother, said she had mixed emotions Monday night when a Boy Scouts representative called to tell her the organization would allow her son to reenroll in his troop. Maldonado said she would like her son to rejoin the Secaucus troop, but only if the scout leader who threw him out of the troop leaves.

She said Joe, who will turn 9 on Wednesday, has spoken See **SCOUTS**, Page 5

Texas jailers charged with selling drugs to county inmates

GATESVILLE, Texas (AP) — Two jail guards for a sheriff's office near Waco have been arrested on charges they sold drugs to county inmates.

The Killeen Daily Herald reports 25-year-old Kevin Arzate and 34-year-old Paul Robert Picetti each was charged with delivery of a controlled substance.

Authorities say the arrests of the men, who worked for the Coryell County sheriff's office, came after an undercover operation into the sale of illegal contraband.

The sheriff's office was joined by the Texas Rangers in the investigation. Both men were arrested last week.

Coryell County online jail records show Arzate and Picetti are no longer being held.

Those concerns are shared by Jimmy Haddox and Eric Massey, who opened Wet Salon on South Congress 17 years ago. Soon, it will be torn down to make way for a mixed-use project. Haddox said Wet will move to another site farther south on Congress.

The investors setting their sights on the area, Haddox said, "will lose the funky and fun integrity of South Congress once they drive the small businesses out."

Inez Escamilla owns Ignite Fitnez, a fitness center on South Congress that, along with several other businesses, is being displaced by a planned mixed-use project.

"I just feel like everything that has made Congress hip and funky is going to be gone," said Escamilla, who will move her gym to a new project being built on St. Elmo Road south of Ben White Boulevard.

The ongoing wave of change on South Congress is just the latest evolution for the avenue.

During the 1920s and 1930s, South Congress was a major highway into Austin, and the thoroughfare became home to dozens of tourist stops, diners and service stations.

In the 1960s, many of the motor courts closed or fell into disrepair. By the mid-1980s — when Guero's Taco Bar was still a feed store and the now swank Hotel San José was a run-down flophouse — prostitutes and drug dealers were as likely to stroll the avenue as shoppers. There was even an adult movie theater into the 1990s.

If the 1980s were a low point for the avenue, the 1990s marked the beginning of its renaissance. Secondhand stores and vintage shops moved in, drawn by affordable rent, and the area became a magnet for out-of-towners in search of the Austin experience.

In recent years, the transformation continued, with shopping and dining becoming more upscale, boutique hotels opening and trendy national retailers moving in.

Today, the district has something for everyone: The Continental Club, one of the city's top live music venues; casual and fine dining; high-end fashion and jewelry stores; vintage apparel; antiques and rare books; a soda fountain and old-time confections; novelty toys; folk art and curios from around the globe. You'll also find a store with every costume imaginable, from the Addams family to Zorro.

Now, an influx of planned projects will further expand the avenue's offerings. The list includes:

• A mixed-use project including retail, office and restaurant space on South Congress just north of Academy Drive. Several local businesses, including Doc's Motorworks and Wet Salon, will be torn down to make way for the development. A number of the businesses, including Wet, Texas National Outfitters, Ignite Fitnez and Parts & Labour, have already found new homes on South Congress or elsewhere. • Saint Vincent, a new three-story project with shops and offices at the former St. Vincent de Paul thrift shop site at South Congress Avenue and East Gibson Street. • Kimber Modern, a 34-room hotel that will include retail, event space and parking, being developed on Elizabeth Street, behind Guero's Taco Bar. Rob Lippincott, who co-owns Guero's, also owns the hotel site. • Hotel Magdalena, an upscale 89room hotel at Academy Drive and Music Lane, which will include a restaurant, bar and event space. It's

being launched by hotelier Liz Lambert, who also operates the nearby Hotel San José. Hotel St. Cecilia and the Austin Motel.

Lambert says she wonders about the future of South Congress.

"I don't know if the block will be able to retain the unique identity it has had until now, I don't think anyone does," said Lambert, who also owns the neighboring Jo's Coffee known for its "i love you so much" mural. "It's also possible that its identity evolves in a good way. I don't think change is inherently bad."

"Obviously some of the future is determined by the real estate market, and that concerns people because we don't always know who the new people are who are coming in,' Lambert said. "Coming from a company that's been in this area for close to two decades, thing we can do is talk about

change, to explore what elements of it are inevitable and what elements we can influence."

As the South Congress area has gentrified, it has become more expensive to own or rent commercial property there.

Rising rents are leading to departures of some longtime residents, including Hill Country Weavers, a varn and fiber arts shop that occupied two bungalows at South Congress and East Milton Street for 22 years.

"The building sold, and my rent was going to triple," said owner Suzanne Middlebrooks, who recently moved the business to a larger space on Manchaca Road. "I love South Congress it's a very creative, inspiring place. But as the rents go up as they are, you need some deep pockets to make sense of it. It's really hard for a small local business to make it work.³

Matt Green, a local developer, said some rents in the area are topping \$60 per square foot. Green, managing partner in Austin for the Kor Group, is developing the planned Saint Vincent mixed-use project on South Congress.

Wertheimer has witnessed the avenue's evolution for 30 years and experienced its escalating rents and property values firsthand.

"Unless you are an owner-occupant or have a friendly and very understanding landlord, it's going to be really difficult for someone local, in the vein of the type of businesses that have been on South Congress all these years, to survive," Wertheimer said.

Wertheimer said his property value soared nearly 40 percent from 2015 to 2016 and his property taxes jumped almost 35 percent, rising to \$10,294 from \$7,634 in 2015.

> Avenue since the mid-1920s, when his great-grandfather opened a barber shop.

His grandfather and brother later opened a hardware and paint store, and eventually the family bought the entire block of 1700 South Congress. Today, the block is home to local retailers including Farm to Market Grocery, Big Top Candy Shop, Avenue Barbershop and Monkey See, Monkey Do.

"I'm a fourth generation, and we have seen the changes firsthand. In the mid-'80s to the mid-'90s there were spaces on the block I could not lease, and we had problems with prostitutes and drug dealers all the way through the '90s," he said.

Today, Helgren faces a different challenge: "How do we keep the local culture? We're not interested in any type of tear down or redevelopment. But as property taxes increase, that's the hardest thing — finding the right balance to be able to have a local and eclectic tenant that can pay the rental rate. We're doing our best to make that happen."

When Helgren's longtime tenant antique store Off the Wall decided late last year to close its storefront, Helgren said national chains were interested in the space.

But he said he opted to charge lower rent to enable local artisan boutique Parts & Labour, which is being displaced by a new South Congress development, to take the space.

"We were blindsided when we learned our space was being torn down," said Lizelle Villalpando, Parts & Labour co-owner. Helgren, she said, worked with Parts & Labour to make the move work.

"He told me, 'I want to do everything I can to keep South Congress the South Congress that we love," said Villalpando, who is relocating the store in March. "It was the best possible thing that could have happened to us."

thing else, but that's not necessarily a bad thing. It's maturing."

Lazarus was a pioneer on South Congress when he and two partners opened Vespaio 18 years ago.

The changes taking place now on South Congress are part of a natural evolution in a growing city like Austin, Lazarus said — and a boost for its economy and tax base. Through the years, Vespaio and its sister restaurant have made a livelihood for hundreds of employees, he said.

In addition, 40 South Congress businesses alone generated \$731,521 last year in property tax revenue for the city and county, according to the Travis Central Appraisal District. That's an increase of 114.7 percent from five years ago, and a 400 percent increase from a decade ago, based on appraisal district values for those properties in 2011 and 2006 respectively.

Brandon Hodge, president of the South Congress Merchants Association, said the avenue's future is promising, and said that despite changes over time, it has largely kept its local character and flavor.

"We tend to get concerned over short-term changes, but when you step back and look at South Congress as a whole, it is overwhelmingly composed of locally owned businesses. I think you can still count the chains on one hand," Hodge said. Hodge owns a novelty/toy store — Monkey See, Monkey Do — and Big Top Candy Shop on South Congress.

Hodge said the "unique collaboration" of businesses on South Congress will "continue fighting to maintain that funky flavor that we all established together."

Wertheimer leased the Continental Club, now a historic landmark, for a decade before buying it 20 years ago. He said he purchased it for \$200,000, "and I thought I'd overpaid." The property was valued at \$425,735 last year by the Travis Central Appraisal District.

Asked if he would ever consider selling the Continental Club, he said: "There's nothing that would make me even think about it. It's precious to me. So much of the fabric of what I fell in love with in this town is disappearing. South Congress to me was the last vestige of what Austin used to look like. I cannot imagine that street without a Continental Club down there. I'm trying to save what I can save."

Blair Helgren shares a similar view of South Congress. His family has owned businesses on South Congress Will the vibe survive?

Despite the ongoing changes, some South Congress business owners say they are optimistic their neighborhood can weather the next stage without losing its character.

"I do love the funky, keep-it-weird street South Congress is, but it seems change, gentrification and maturation is inevitable," said Alan Lazarus, co-owner of Vespaio and Enoteca restaurants on the avenue. "I don't think things can ever stay the same. It's just evolving into some-

Shoppers who frequent South Congress are hopeful Hodge is right, and that the vibe will live on.

On a recent weekday afternoon, a steady stream of passers-by paused to snap photos in front of the "i love you so much' mural outside Jo's Coffee.

"The locals will keep it funky," said Mary Pat Wehmeyer, 21, a native Austinite. "People are moving here for the funkiness and quirkiness."

publicly about the incident. She called him a "ham" and noted he had a big birthday party on Saturday with the mayor of Secaucus in attendance.

"I'm so grateful. I really am that they're accepting and that there won't be any issues. They (other transgender youth) won't have to go through what my son went through," Maldonado said by phone Monday. "It's a big change for everybody that all are accepted now ... I'm so delighted that they finally called and they did say this, but I'm still angry."

Maldonado said the decision to remove her son from the troop made him feel different, and she wanted to make sure he knew the troop made a mistake.

The Boy Scouts said the enrollment decision goes into effect immediately.

"Our organization's local councils will help find units that can provide for the best interest of the child," the statement said.

Zach Wahls, co-founder of the groups Scouts for Equality, called the decision historic.

"The decision to allow transgender boys to participate in the Cub Scouts and the Boy Scouts is an important step forward for this American institution," he wrote in a statement posted to social media. "We are incredibly proud of Joe Maldonado - the transgender boy from New Jersey whose expulsion last year ignited this controversy — and his mother Kristie for their courage in doing what they knew was right. We are also proud of the Boy Scouts for deciding to do the right thing."

Roger's Retro Reviews: 1984

In April of 1984, I turned 15 years nation's enemies in the endless war old. I was a freshman in high school. Now, 32 years later, two recent events led me to pick the movie "1984," based on the George Orwell classic dystopian novel, as my retro review.

First, its star, the great John Hurt in the lead role of Win-

ston Smith, recently died. Hurt's stellar career also included classics such as "A Man For All Seasons," "The Elephant Man," "Alien," and the Harry Potter series. Second, Amazon recently announced that the novel "1984" has once again found pur-

chase atop its best-seller list; an achievement ap-

parently made possible by comparisons in some minds with the Trump presidency.

In the movie, in April of 1984, Smith lives and works in the nation "Airstrip One," the former United Kingdom, which is ruled by the all-encompassing Ingsoc Party. His job is as a censor in "MiniRec" (the Ministry of Records), where he alters or destroys news reports to reflect the Party in a favorable light. For example, when one article reports that the weekly 30-gram-per-week chocolate ration will be reduced to 25, Smith changes it to read that the ration is being increased from 20 to 25 grams per week.

Smith and the other inhabitants of Airstrip One are required to attend hate rallies, in which images of the

are displayed; these are Eurasia and Eastasia. One is always the hated enemy and the other is a trusted ally, but throughout the movie their status flip-flops seemingly at random.

Also shown during the rallies is the despised perpetual traitor Goldstein (John Boswall) spouting anti-Party propaganda to frenzied boos and jeers of the audience. The rallies end with the looming, mustachioed face of the beloved Big Brother (Bob Flag), and all is well. Smith is also a "thought criminal"; that is, he has forbidden thoughts, which he records in a hidden diary in his apartment.

A seemingly chance encounter in the hallway introduces him to the beautiful young Julia (Suzanna Hamilton), and the two begin a secret love affair, using the room over the pawn



green hills, trees, and open spaces.

The barrage of news broadcasts, in which residents of Airstrip One are treated to contradictory reports, convicted thought criminals confessing



shop owned by Mr. Charrington (Cyril Cusack); but their idyllic love nest is raided by the Thought Police, and Smith is taken to the Ministry of Love for "rehabilitation" (read: "torture") to purge his mind of his thought crimes. His torturer is O'Brien (Richard Burton in his last film role).

The movie effectively contrasts the world of Airstrip One, with its filthy, run-down buildings, overalluniformed workers, and cafeterias providing slop to eat and gin to drink; with Smith's fantasy world of bright,

their crimes, and reports that Smith has, himself, altered into their present untrue form, are constantly in the background

"1984" is an important film in that it raises questions about truth and propaganda. How do we know what is true when we get all our information from outside sources? It's not an easy film to watch. There is very little excitement or action; if that's what you're after, then "1984" isn't the film for you.

Something like "V for Vendetta"

(which also starred Hurt, incidentally) explores a lot of the same themes as "1984" while providing a much more entertaining backdrop. Also, the "Star Trek: The Next Generation" episode "Chain of Command" (1992) includes scenes pulled practically straight from the movie ("There are four lights!").

While I recognize the importance and artistry of this movie, I can't say that it's a movie I enjoyed watching, and it's not something I'm eager to watch again. Seven stars out of 10, for its ideas rather than its watchability.

Super Bowl:

Ex-coaches and players marvel at Brady's success

HOUSTON (AP) – Marv Levy, the only coach in NFL history to take a team to four consecutive Super Bowls, looks at what Bill Belichick and Tom Brady have done together with the New England Patriots and marvels.

"Really, it is remarkable that they keep going back, and they maintain the focus and dedication necessary to do it," the former Buffalo Bills coach said. "It just becomes, quote, old hat. It's just almost unfathomable what they've accomplished. So they sure do deserve great credit, and it shows you that the draft isn't perfect. Sixth-rounder at quarterback. Many will rate him the greatest quarterback ever. It's an amazing streak they have going."

Consider this: Belichick and Brady not only are the NFL's most successful coach and quarterback duo, they've nearly lapped their closest competition. They are preparing for their record seventh Super Bowl on Sunday, while only three other coaches reached the Super Bowl with the same quarterback as many as four times.

Chuck Noll and Terry Bradshaw went 4-0 in Super Bowls in the span of six years. Tom Landry went 2-2 with Roger Staubach and the Dallas Cowboys. Joe Montana is a perfect 4-0 in the Super Bowl, though only three of those rings came with coach Bill Walsh.

And then there's Levy, who teamed with Jim Kelly to take the Buffalo Bills to the Super Bowl between 1991 and 1994, losing each time.

Putting together an extended run of excellence requires some key ingredients:

Levy had general manager Bill Polian and owner

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

The armchair analyst is usually a magnificent cardplayer; he rarely makes the wrong play after seeing all 52 cards. Certainly declarer would have fared better on this deal had he been given the privilege of a peek at the opposing cards. As it was, though, he fell prey to an exceedingly clever trap laid by East.

The deal occurred in a top-flight

rubber-bridge game. West led the spade deuce against five diamonds, and East won with the ace! East then returned the six of spades (!), which declarer ruffed

After South played the Q-J of diamonds and learned of the 4-1 trump division, he shifted his attention to clubs, playing the king. East ducked and won the next club with the ace. East then returned the king of spades. South ruffed, reducing his own hand and dummy's to one trump while East had two trumps left. Eventually South went down two as

a result of East's shrewd defense. Had South known that East had started with both top spades, he would, of course, have discarded a club at trick two and made the contract. However, ruffing the spade was entirely normal, as West could have had the king, and the 4-1 trump division was as yet undisclosed.

East disguised his hand beautifully with his first two plays. Had he played the A-K of spades instead of the A-6, declarer would have made the contract easily. But East, who knew that the trumps would break poorly for declarer, led back a low spade in the hope that South would take a normal trump break for granted.



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

Today is Wednesday, Feb. 1, the 32nd day of 2017. There are 333 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On Feb. 1, 1942, during World War II, the Voice of America broadcast its first program to Europe, relaying it through the facilities of the British Broadcasting Corp. in London. On this date:

In 1790, the U.S. Supreme Court convened for the first time in New York. (However, since only three of the six justices were present, the court recessed until the next day.)

In 1865, during the Civil War, Union forces led by Maj. Gen. William T. Sherman began the Carolinas Campaign as they invaded South Carolina. Abolitionist John S. Rock became the first black lawyer admitted to the bar of the U.S. Supreme Court.

In 1922, in one of Hollywood's most enduring mysteries, movie director William Desmond Taylor was shot to exclusively of Japanese-Americans, was authorized.

In 1946, Norwegian statesman Trygve Lie (TRIHG'-vuh lee) was chosen to be the first secretary-general of the United Nations.

In 1960, four black college students began a sit-in protest at a Woolworth's lunch counter in Greensboro, North Carolina, where they'd been refused service.

In 1979, Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini (hoh-MAY'-nee) received a tumultuous welcome in Tehran as he ended nearly 15 years of exile.

In 1982, "Late Night with David Letterman" premiered on NBC (airing at 11:35 p.m.

In 2003, the space shuttle Columbia broke up during re-entry, killing all seven of its crew members.

Ralph Wilson in Buffalo, and points to Patriots owner Robert Kraft and Belichick as the key in New England because they know what type of players they want on the roster. Belichick hasn't shied away from brash personalities, bringing in wide receiver Randy Moss and even giving defensive lineman Albert Haynesworth and wide receiver Chad Johnson chances. Moss stuck around much longer than expected and prospered before being cut loose during the 2010 season. Wide receiver Chris Hogan languished on the Buffalo squad the past four years only to tie for the league lead averaging 17.9 yards per catch this season. Since Kraft took over, this is the Patriots' eighth Super Bowl twice what Denver and Pittsburgh have managed — with four championships. "Total organization wins," Levy said. "It starts with their owner Robert Kraft, who I think has been a great owner. Their personnel department, their scouting staff, their coaching staff. Total organization wins, and as much credit as Brady and Bill Belichick deserves, it's the others that are in there."

Lady Buffaloes gave everything they had for as long as they could Tuesday — but the game went on a little longer. The Lady Buffs unleashed a furious defense in the second half, which helped them overcome a double-digit deficit and send their game against Irion County into overtime. But all that extra effort, it seems, left Forsan with little more to give in the extra four minutes, as Irion County outscored the Lady Buffaloes, 8-0, to secure the win.



DRIVE TO WIN AGAIN

Making one Super Bowl appearance is tough enough that four franchises have yet to do coach since the NFL put in a salary cap starting in the 1994 season to win four Super Bowls. Noll, the man Belichick is tied with, won his four rings with Pittsburgh in the 1970s. Figuring out how to fit salaries in a budget wasn't an issue for Chicago's George Halas or Curly Lambeau and Vince Lombardi with the Green Bay Packers — the only other coaches with five or more NFL championships.

Montana credits the Patriots with building around Brady and a core of players in an era when big paydays await after winning a Super Bowl ring.

CHEMISTRY

Since Belichick and Brady went to their first Super Bowl together in 2002, others in the NFL have tried to tap their formula for success, luring away coordinators as head coaches or hiring personnel men to run their teams. Yet, Brady and Belichick have a chance to become the first men with five Super Bowl rings while the Falcons are still looking for their first.




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Trump taps conservative Judge Neil Gorsuch for Supreme Court

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Donald Trump has nominated Neil Gorsuch, a fast-rising conservative judge with a writer's flair, to the Supreme Court, setting up a fierce fight with Democrats over a jurist who could shape America's legal landscape for decades to come.

At 49, Gorsuch is the youngest Supreme Court nominee in a quartercentury. He's known on the Denverbased 10th Circuit Court of Appeals for clear, colloquial writing, advocacy for court review of government regulations, defense of religious freedom and skepticism toward law enforcement.

"Judge Gorsuch has outstanding legal skills, a brilliant mind, tremendous discipline and has earned bipartisan support," Trump declared, announcing the nomination in his first televised prime-time address from the White House.

Gorsuch's nomination Tuesday was cheered by conservatives wary of Trump's own fluid ideology. If confirmed by the Senate, he would fill the seat left vacant by the death last year of Antonin Scalia, long the right's most powerful voice on the high court.

With Scalia's wife, Maureen, sitting in the audience, Trump took care to praise the late justice. Gorsuch followed, calling Scalia a "lion of the law."

Conservative Gorsuch emulates Scalia minus the rough edges

WASHINGTON (AP) — If confirmed by the Senate to the Supreme Court, Neil Gorsuch would fill the seat of the man he seeks to emulate as a judge.

He would be the first justice to serve alongside a colleague for whom he

worked. Gorsuch described his former boss, Justice Anthony Kennedy, Tuesday as one of the judges who brought him up in the law.

President Donald Trump nominated Gorsuch to fill the seat of Justice Antonin Scalia, who died nearly a year ago. Trump said he was delivering on his pledge to choose someone in Scalia's mold.

Gorsuch, a federal appeals court judge in Denver for the past 11 years, said he adheres to Scalia's approach to the law, evaluating the Constitution and laws by how they were understood when they written. He also shares with Scalia a flair for writing.

But unlike the sometimes irascible Scalia, Gorsuch approaches his work with a courtly manner more reminiscent of Kennedy.

Israeli forces begin evacuation of West Bank outpost

AMONA, West Bank (AP) — Israeli forces began an operation to evacuate settlers from a West Bank outpost on Wednesday whose slated destruction could rupture Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's narrow coalition, dominated by ultranationalists who support settlements.

Unarmed police in blue sweatshirts and black baseball caps made their way up the hill around midday Wednesday. On the hilltop, youngsters erected makeshift barricades from smashed tiles, rusty metal bars and large rocks to slow their advance. Some protesters threw rocks at security forces, while others set fire to tires and trash piles.

Activists gathered in homes, praying, singing religious songs and dancing. Residents have said they plan to resist their evacuation peacefully. Some chained themselves to heavy objects and locked their doors.

A few residents left their homes with young children in the arms.

Bilha Schwarts, 24, came along with her husband and nine-month-old daughter to support the residents. "If they want it they can take it, we will not fight. We will leave but we will come back," she told *The Associated Press*.

Senator: Army Corps told to approve Dakota pipeline easement

BISMARCK, N.D. (AP) — The Army Corps of Engineers was ordered to allow construction of the Dakota Access pipeline to proceed under a disputed Missouri River crossing, North Dakota Sen. John Hoeven said. It's the latest twist in a months-long legal battle over the \$3.8 billion project.

The Standing Rock Sioux, whose opposition to the project attracted

thousands of supporters from around the country to North Dakota, immediately vowed to again go to court to stop it.

Hoeven announced late Tuesday that the acting Secretary of the Army, Robert Speer, had directed the Army Corps of Engineers to "proceed" with an easement necessary to complete the pipeline. Hoeven said he also spoke with Vice President Mike Pence, just a week after President Donald Trump signed an executive order signaling his support for the project.

A spokesman for the U.S. Army did not immediately respond to requests for comment Tuesday night. Hoeven spokesman Don Canton said that Speer's move means the easement "isn't quite issued yet, but they plan to approve it" within days.

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
