
Singing telegrams and decadent Valentine's treats are quite the hit at Gale's Bakery this month.

Kenya court blocks closing of world's biggest refugee camp

NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) — A Kenyan court ruled Thursday that the government must not close the world's largest refugee camp and send more than 200,000 people back to war-torn Somalia, a decision that eases pressure on Somalis who feared the camp would close by the end of May.

Kenya's internal security minister abused his



power by ordering the closure of Dadaab camp, Judge John Mativo said, adding that the minister and other officials had "acted in excess and in abuse of their power, in violation of the rule of law and in contravention of their oaths of office."



had challenged the government's order to close the camp, which has operated for more than a quarter-century.

Kenya's government quickly said it will appeal the ruling. "Being a government whose cardinal responsibility is first to Kenyans, we feel this decision should be revoked," spokesman Eric Kiraithe said.

The judge called the discriminatory, order saying it goes against the Kenyan constitution as well as international treaties that protect refugees against being returned to a conflict zone.

President Uhuru Kegovernment nyatta's has not proved Somalia is safe for the refugees to return, the judge said, also calling the orders to shut down the government's refugee department "null and void."

Somalia remains under threat of attacks from homegrown extremist group al-Shabab. Some Kenyan officials have argued that the sprawling refugee camp near the border with Somalia has been used as a recruiting ground for al-Shabab and a base for launching attacks inside Ke

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
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



The History of Valentine's Day Cards

Whether you are five or 15, you have probably exchanged Valentine's Day cards with your friends and classmates. It is a practice that started long ago in the Middle Ages when people told or sang their feelings to one another.

Around 1400, actual written Valentine's Day cards began to appear. Made of colored paper, inks and watercolors, these were done by hand in various styles. While rebus valentines used tiny pictures in place of some words, for example, pinprick valentines were pricked with a needle to look like lace.

Eventually the process of making Valentine's Day cards was moved into factories where workers painted black and white pictures on them and added real lace and ribbons. In the mid-1800s, paper lace was introduced, and by the late 1800s, all cards were made by machine. Today, while some valentines are still handmade, the majority is machine made.







Big 12 to withhold 25 percent of revenue share from Baylor

The Big 12 Conference said Wednesday it will withhold millions of dollars in revenue from Baylor until an outside review determines the university and athletic department are complying with Title IX guidelines and other regulations in the wake of a campus sexual assault scandal.

The league said it would withhold 25 percent of future revenue distribution payments to Baylor. Big 12 Commissioner Bob Bowlsby said Baylor has already received a \$10 million payout for part of 2016-17 and the league expects a total payout of \$34 million for each of its 10 schools. The league will withhold 25 percent of the remaining projected \$24 million payout — or about \$6 million this year.

The Big 12 said its board of directors voted unanimously to withhold the money. Baylor did not take part in the vote.

"By taking these actions the board desires to ensure that the changes that were promised are actually made and that systems are in place to avoid future problems," said David Boren, the University of Oklahoma president and Big 12 board chairman. "The proportional withholding of revenue distribution payments will be in effect until the board has determined that Baylor is in compliance with conference bylaws and regulations as well as all components of Title IX."

Baylor is not being fined; the money is being placed in escrow pending a third-party verification of Baylor's reform efforts. But the sanction is the first by the Big 12 since the school in Waco, Texas, was hit by a wave of complaints that it repeatedly or intentionally mishandled assault allegations, many of them involving football players.

Baylor fired coach Art Briles last year and parted ways with university President Ken Starr and athletic director Ian McCaw after an investigation by a law firm found allegations of sexual assault brought to the school were not dealt with appropriately.

The nation's largest Baptist university still faces at least six federal and state lawsuits as well as a federal civil rights investigation into claims the school and football program ignored, mishandled or tried to cover up reports of sexual or physical abuse and other criminal misdeeds across campus for years. One court filing last week alleges more than 50 acts of rape by more than 30 football players over a fouryear period, and that Baylor football promoted a culture of "sex, drugs and violence."

Most of the allegations stem from a highly successful time for the football program: From 2008-2015 under Briles, Baylor went from perennial doormat in the Big 12 to a championship contender, winning consecutive football titles in 2013-14. Baylor hired Mack Rhoades away from Missouri to be its new athletic director last year and brought in former Temple coach Matt Rhule to take over the football program.

Baylor was given 105 recommenda-

tions for reforming its Title IX process by Pepper Hamilton, the firm that handled the initial investigation. Interim President David Garland said the university considered the recommendations a "mandate."

"Baylor already had planned to hire an outside auditor to audit the implementation of our enhanced practices, and we welcome the Big 12 Conference's request of an independent review," Garland said in a statement. "While the withholding of conference distributions is an unexpected financial event, we do not deem these ac-


tions to materially impact the overall financial position of the university. We pledge our full cooperation, and we will work with the Big 12 Conference to conduct the audit as expeditiously as possible."

Bowlsby said earlier this week Baylor has made "significant progress" on the recommendations from Pepper Hamilton.

Bowlsby said the conference was limited in what actions it could take against Baylor because it does not have an investigative arm and its bylaws do not necessarily cover the school's alleged transgressions. He said the Big 12 would rely on the findings of the federal Office of Civil Rights, which enforces Title IX, and the NCAA to determine possible time to time," Bowlsby said in a telephone interview. "It's not a clear-cut process. I would say as you start to see comments come up about legal services being arranged (for football players) or there being some measure of documented cover up or steps to keep the lid on things, as came out last week , that's when my antenna start going up because you begin to think about extra benefits for studentathletes and I'm sure the antenna is going up at (NCAA headquarters) in Indianapolis."

When the NCAA sanctioned Penn State in 2012, using the findings of the Freeh Report, the Big Ten followed with sanctions of its own that included ineligibility for the conference football championship game and a fine equal to the school's conference bowl revenue payout, approximately \$13 million.

Leonard scores 32, Spurs beat Sixers 111-103

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Kawhi Leonard shook off a calf injury and delivered another stellar performance.

Leonard scored 32 points, Tony Parker added 18 and the San Antonio Spurs beat the Philadelphia 76ers 111-103 on Wednesday night.

"He's got the whole package," teammate Manu Ginobili said. "He's the main reason we're getting all these wins when we're not playing well."

Leonard was back in the lineup after missing one game because of a quad contusion. He shot 9 of 18 and hit all 11 free throws for his 16th 30-point game.

"I think we were playing a little hesitant at times on the floor, just not being aggressive and being direct enough in what we wanted to do," he said.

Sixers coach Brett Brown was impressed.

"I think Kawhi is one of those unique players we're seeing grow before our eyes," Brown said. "He might be the best two-way player in the NBA."

Jahlil Okafor had 20 points and eight rebounds, and Dario Saric also scored 20 for Philadelphia, which has lost five straight games.

The Sixers were again without star center Joel Embiid.

The rookie missed his seventh straight game because of a left knee contusion.

Philadelphia is 13-18 with Embiid, 5-16 without him. The Spurs bounced back following a loss at Memphis and improved the NBA's second-best record to 40-12.

After trailing the entire game, the Sixers pulled within 87-85 on a pair of free throws by Okafor with 7:35 left. But San Antonio went on a 16-5 run to put it away.

Danny Green's 3-pointer made it 103-92 with 2:14 to go and sent fans to the exits.

"I'm totally impressed with the Sixers," Spurs coach Gregg Popovich said. "We didn't play a good 48 minutes. We played good the last three, four, five. We didn't move that well. We didn't get that many assists. We held the ball. We turned it over. It was very disappointing."

LaMarcus Aldridge had 15 points and 10 rebounds, and Dewayne Dedmon added 10 points and 11 boards.

HIGH PRAISE

Brown said of the Spurs: "It's the Holy Grail of sport. ... To attain annual success for 18, 19 years, that's the Holy Grail. That's culture. That's what you dream about building here."

TRADE RUMORS

Okafor, the No. 3 overall pick in the 2015 draft, has been mentioned in several trade rumors and could be heading somewhere before the trade deadline later this month. "I'm here now," Okafor said.

TIP-INS

Spurs: Leonard has now scored in double figures in 81 straight games — the longest such streak by a Spurs player since Tim Duncan's 91 straight in 2002-03. ... Popovich said Brown is the "most incredible positive force I've ever been around."





Today's Highlights History:

On Feb. 9, 1942, the U.S. Joint Chiefs of Staff held its first formal meeting to coordinate military strategy during World War II. Daylight-saving "War Time" went into effect in the United States, with clocks moved one hour forward. The SS Normandie, a former French liner being refitted for the U.S. Navy at a New York pier, caught fire (it capsized early the next morning).

In 1773, the ninth president of the United States, William

Henry Harrison, was born in Charles City County, Virginia. In 1825, the House of Representatives elected John Quincy Adams president after no candidate received a majority of electoral votes.

In 1861, Jefferson Davis was lected provisional president of

British actor Ian Richardson, who portrayed immoral politician Francis Urguhart in the satirical TV drama "House of Cards," died in London at age 72.





Judges' response to Trump criticism: Silence

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Donald Trump's unusually personal criticism of federal judges has drawn rebukes from many quarters, including from Supreme Court nominee Neil Gorsuch, but not from the judges themselves.

And that's not likely to change, even if the tweeter in chief keeps up his attacks on judges. Bolstered by lifetime tenure, independent judges should not respond to criticism, no matter how harsh or that its source is the president, said a former judge, a law school dean and a constitutional law professor.

Judges "should basically give the tweets the attention they deserve, which means they should be ignored. This is basically a childish tantrum from someone who didn't get his way. And the judiciary should go about its business and decide cases, including cases involving him," said Vanderbilt University law professor Suzanna Sherry.

Trump's style may be different and his language more coarse, but the comments themselves are not the "threat to judicial independence that some commentators have made them out to be," said University of Pennsylvania law school dean Theodore Ruger.

Former U.S. District Judge Paul Cassell said judges would find themselves in unfamiliar territory "if they start critiquing the Twitter feed of the president."

Price nears Senate confirmation as Trump health secretary

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republicans are ready to overpower Democrats and push another of President Donald Trump's Cabinet nominees

through the Senate, the man who will help lead the GOP drive to erase and replace the health care law.

The Senate voted 51-48 Wednesday to short-circuit Democratic delaying tactics against Rep. Tom Price, R-Ga., Trump's choice for health secretary. Final approval of Price seemed certain, a vote that would elevate the long-time proponent of dismantling President Barack Obama's health care law and reshaping and curbing Medicare and Medicaid. Those goals, for many Republicans, are high on the GOP agenda.

The debate over Price was coming in a week that has so far seen Democrats, eager to show liberal constituents that they are taking a stand against Trump, ferociously but unsuccessfully opposing two nominees for top administration jobs.

Over solid Democratic opposition and two GOP defections, it took a tie-breaking vote by Vice President Mike Pence for the Senate to approve wealthy GOP donor Betsy DeVos on Tuesday to head the Education Department. Under the Constitution, one of the duties of a vice president is to break tie votes in the 100-member Senate.

On Wednesday, the chamber confirmed Sen. Jeff Sessions, R-Ala., to be attorney general. That debate was bitter, fueled by Democratic accusations that Sessions lacked a devotion to civil rights laws and wouldn't stand up to Trump.

Chance and challenge: Japan Inc worried but hopeful on Trump

TOKYO (AP) — President Donald Trump's salvos on trade and currency are rattling Japan Inc., but many here hope Prime Minister Shinzo Abe can sell him a "win-win" package of job creation and investment when they meet this week, averting a return of

the Japan-bashing of the 1980s.

Abe moved early to build a personal rapport with Trump, meeting him in New York short-

ly after he was elected. With Japan's largest export market at stake, its businesses need him to keep at it.

Japan's status as the cornerstone U.S. ally

in the Pacific was reassuringly reaffirmed in a recent visit by U.S. Defense Secretary Jim Mattis. Tokyo has reiterated its commitment to spending more on its own security and buying more military aircraft and other equipment from the U.S.

That won't directly affect trade figures, however, which are measured by the private sector.

Japan logged the second largest trade surplus with the U.S. last year, at \$68.9 billion dollars. That's way below China's, at \$347 billion, and on a par with the surpluses run by Germany and Mexico.

Winter storm could drop a foot of snow on Northeast US

BOSTON (AP) — A densely populated swath of the Northeast was preparing for winter's harshest thump yet, a fast-moving storm that could bring more than a foot of snow, strong winds and coastal flooding.

Some places were poised to experience an atmospheric yo-yo: Philadelphia and New York hit 60 degrees on Wednesday, were expecting at least a half-foot of snow on Thursday and were bracing for bitter cold temperatures Thursday night.

"This is going to be a big punch," said Benjamin Sipprell, a meteorologist with the National Weather Service in Taunton, Massachusetts. "It's originating in the Ohio River Valley and starts cranking as it comes across Appalachia."

The storm was expected to hit eastern Pennsylvania and northern New Jersey with rain early Thursday morning, before changing over to snow in time for the morning commute.

The weather service predicted some parts of the Boston area and eastern Maine would get 12 to 18 inches of snow, New York City 8 to 12 inches and the Philadelphia area 4 to 8 inches.

Company to resume work to finish Dakota Access pipeline

CANNON BALL, N.D. (AP) — With the green light from the federal government, the company building the Dakota Access oil pipeline said Wednesday it plans to resume work immediately to finish the long-stalled project. Opponents of the \$3.8 billion project meanwhile protested around the country in an action some dubbed their "last stand."

The Army on Wednesday granted the developer of the four-state oil pipeline formal permission to lay pipe under a Missouri River reservoir in North Dakota, clearing the way for completion of the disputed project.

"We plan to begin immediately," Vicki Granado, a spokeswoman for developer Energy Transfer Partners, said in an email to The Associated Press Wednesday night.

Work had been stalled for months due to opposition by the Standing Rock Sioux, but President Donald Trump last month instructed the Army Corps of Engineers to advance pipeline construction.

The tribe fears a pipeline leak could contaminate its drinking water. ETP says the pipeline is safe.

7 months in, expanded Panama Canal still faces challenges

COCOLI, Panama (AP) — Loaded with more than 6,000 cargo containers, the ship Ever Living prepared for the final leg of its journey through the newly expanded Panama Canal when things hit a snag: The last of the massive steel lock doors failed to open all the way.

The pilots controlling the ship and the captains of the tugboats tethered to huge vessel opted to continue guiding it through the narrowed passageway, passing nerve-wrackingly close to the side of the locks to avoid running into the stuck door.

"These are things that shouldn't happen," tugboat captain Mauricio Perez said. "Sometimes the only thing we can do is pray."

A little over seven months after authorities launched a much-ballyhooed, \$5.25 billion canal expansion to accommodate many of the world's largest cargo vessels, they have yet to fully work out a significant kink: With little margin for error, ships are still scraping the walls and prematurely wearing out defenses designed to protect both the vessels and the locks themselves.

The Associated Press traveled on a recent voyage by a tugboat guiding the Ever Living through the canal's Cocoli locks toward the Pacific Ocean. Along the way there were multiple


