Commissioner to discuss resolution in opposition of Texas Senate Bill 2 Monday

Howard County Commissioners will consider signing a resolution in opposition to Texas Senate Bill 2 and revenue caps when they meet Monday.

Under the proposed bill filed by state Senator Paul Bettencourt, R-Houston, city and county governments could not raise taxes above 4 percent before triggering a rollback election. Currently the rate is at 8 percent.

According to Katheryn Wiseman, the bill will increase pressure on the already stretched budgets of local governments.

Wiseman said the real issue is unfunded mandates. With each legislative session, the state continues to place more rules and regulations on local entities without any funding to help implement those requirements. These unfunded mandates are forcing a larger burden on the local tax payer to pay for them, Wiseman said.

As an example, Wiseman said the state requires the county to have an indigent defense fund. In 2016, the county spent \$228,000 providing for legal representation for indigent residents. This year, the state has issued only \$29,000

"We want to remind our legislatures that as they continue to make laws and regulations while not providing funding, the citizens are the ones that pay for their decisions," Wiseman said.





organization did raise \$170,000 for their 2016 campaign. Church shootings leave holes in the fabric of Charleston

CHARLESTON. S.C. (AP) — The bullet holes in the fellowship hall at Emanuel AME church have been patched, but the holes in the fabric of life in Charleston re-

Sharonda Coleman-Singleton is absent from Goose Creek High School, her exhortations still ringing in the ears of girls who ran track for her. At the library, there's no one to give just the right guidance, to find the right book, as Cynthia Hurd did. The strong voice of Emanuel's pastor-legislator. Clementa Pinckney, does not resound, here or at the capitol in Columbia.

Dylann Roof, killer of these worshippers and six others at one of the South's first African-American churches, is headed to death row after an agonizing and therapeutic trial. But if justice has been served, the community has not moved on; the shots that rang out on June 17, 2015, still resonate.

They are amplified by the unfinished case of a

police officer charged with murder in the death of a black driver. Efforts go on to build a museum to tell the stories of more than three centuries of African-American struggles, and to place this community's recent suffering in context.

And at Emanuel, churchgoers still assemble for Bible study on most Wednesdays, vowing that love and faith will prevail.

r. Paul Bennett of Sulphur Springs was an Army dentist in Viet Nam. Occasionally

"We had a connection," says Thuan. "I knew I was in love with him. He didn't know it because I didn't tell him. And he was in love with me and never told me. Then six years later we met and the feelings were still there. He could never forget about me and I could never forget about him."

Thuan thinks she's very fortunate. "When I moved here, the people were very kind to me. They immediately accepted me. I got my realtor's license and went to work selling real estate and helping Paul in his office. I got to know many people. Joint library concerns To the Editor:

My Fellow Citizens,

I am writing to express my concern over the possible closure, downsizing, or joint Howard College venture with our library. I recognize funding the library can be costly and there are concerns with regards to the building, but libraries are historically one of the most important buildings in any community. All libraries are public spaces dedicated to protecting access to information, promoting life-long learning, and upholding the democratic values of an informed populace—and these are just a few among many of the core components through which the American Library Association explain such institutions' value.

For the Howard County Library in particular, an estimated 1,400 people a week pass through our library doors, and, in particular, the genealogy and microfiche areas are very popular. One of the most important parts of the library are the computer labs, which serve around 10,000 members of the community each year. Often, you can find a book club, art club, or a scouts meeting in the evening, as libraries take their shape from the community to which they belong.

My personal favorite is the Summer Reading Program, which encourages a life-long love of reading in the children of the county. I don't know anyone who hasn't benefited from this program, though some may see its personal contributions only indirectly.

One of my biggest concerns is that our library doesn't have a full-time director, and, as a result, the library is going to lose its accreditation. This means that the library would be put on probation for three years, and if the library fails to meet any other standard, we will lose accreditation. This will result in the loss of state services such as the interlibrary loans, state grants, summer reading program, and TexShare, which is a research database provided to patrons free of charge. What does a shared director or joint library do to address these issues?

I am urging everyone to contact their county com-

missioners to voice your opinions. The library is the heart and soul of our community, so please help me prevent such a valuable community resource from fading away. Together we can work to find solutions, but we must speak up before it's too late.



Opponents of Trump's travel ban look to

score another win

WASHINGTON (AP) — Opponents of President Donald Trump's travel ban sought Friday to rack up another legal victory against the measure, believing they have the administration on the defensive after a federal appeals court refused to reinstate the order.

As government attorneys debated their next move, they faced unsympathetic judges on both coasts.

The San Francisco-based 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals sided Thursday with the states of Washington and Minnesota in refusing to reinstate the ban, opening the possibility that the case could advance to the U.S. Supreme Court. On Friday, a federal judge in Virginia also seemed inclined to rule against the administration in a different challenge.

For his part, Trump said Friday that he is considering signing a "brand new order" while the ban is held up in court.

Speaking to reporters on Air Force One as he flew to Florida for the weekend, the president said he expected his administration to win the legal battle over his original directive. But he said the White House was also weighing other alternatives, including making changes to the order, which suspended the nation's refugee program and barred all entries from seven Muslim-majority countries.

Trump says he might give travel ban a tweak or a makeover

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Donald Trump says he might give his refugee and immigration travel ban a second try, either as a revision or as a new order, as he contends with an appeals court ruling that prevents the ban from being enforced.

Trump said he expected to win the legal battle over his original directive even though options were being considered by the White House.

Advisers were debating the next step in response to the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruling that upheld a restraining order on the travel ban. The White House directive had suspended the nation's refugee program and barred all entries from seven Muslim-majority countries.

A White House official initially suggested the administration would not ask the Supreme Court to overturn

that order. But chief of staff Reince Priebus scrambled to clarify to reporters that "every single court option is on the table," including a high court appeal or "fighting out this case on the merits" in a lower court.

Trump's executive order was hastily unveiled at the end of his first week in office. While the White House boasted that Trump was fulfilling a campaign promise to toughen vetting procedures for people coming from countries with terror ties, the order caused chaos at airports in the U.S. and sparked protests across the country.

Poland's PM suffered "nothing serious" in car crash

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Poland's Prime Minister Beata Szydlo is in stable condition and can carry out her government duties as "nothing serious happened to hor" when her lim

ous happened to her" when her limousine was involved in a car crash, her spokesman said Saturday.

However, Rafal Bochenek said Szydlo, 53, was undergoing tests, including X-rays, and will remain "for some

time" in a government hospital in Warsaw, where she was brought on her own request. He could not immediately confirm whether she will attend the weekly government meeting

on Tuesday.

Dr. Andrzej Jakubowski, who first examined Szydlo after the crash Friday night, said she suffered some slight injuries and was in some pain, but that the prognosis was good. TVP INFO, a state TV program, said she suffered bruises to her chest from her seat belt.

The accident occurred shortly before 7 p.m. Friday in the southern town of Oswiecim, Szydlo's hometown, where she was arriving for the weekend

Her car was in the middle of a threecar convoy going at some 50 kilometers (30 miles) per hour on the town's main road when a small Fiat car they were overtaking suddenly turned left and into her limousine, causing it to hit a tree, according to local police spokesman Sebastian Glen.

Trump hugs ally Japan after easing US-China tensions

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Donald Trump, fresh off patching up ties with China, reassured Ja-

pan's leader Friday that the U.S. will defend its close ally. Together, the pronouncements illustrated a shift toward a more mainstream Trump stance on U.S. policy toward Asia.

Welcoming Prime Minister Shinzo Abe to the White House with a hug, Trump said he wants to bring the post-World War II alliance with Japan "even closer." While such calls are ritual after these types of meetings, from Trump they're sure to calm anxieties that he has stoked by demanding that America's partners pay more for their own defense.

Abe, a nationalist adept at forging relationships with self-styled strongmen overseas, was the only world leader to meet the Republican before his inauguration. He is now the second to do so since Trump took office. Flattering the billionaire businessman, Abe said he would welcome the United States becoming "even greater."

He also invited Trump to visit Japan this year. Trump accepted, according to a joint statement.

Other leaders of America's closest neighbors and allies, such as Mexico, Britain and Australia, have been singed by their encounters or conversations with Trump.

Powerful quake kills at least 6 in southern Philippines

SURIGAO, Philippines (AP) — A powerful nighttime earthquake in the southern Philippines killed at least six people and injured more than 120, with officials combing through cracked buildings and nearby towns Saturday to check on the damage and other possible casualties.

The magnitude 6.7 quake roused residents from their sleep late Friday in Surigao del Norte province, forcing hundreds of people to flee their homes. The quake was centered about 16 kilometers (8 miles) northwest of the provincial capital of Surigao at a relatively shallow depth of 10 kilometers (6 miles), said Renato Solidum of the Philippine Institute of Seismology and Volcanology.

Nearly 100 aftershocks have been felt, officials said. Evacuation centers accommodated wary residents overnight, but many returned home Saturday, Welfare Secretary Judy Taguiwalo said, adding that officials were continuing to assess the damage in Surigao and outlying towns.

Provincial information officer Mary Jul Escalante was being interviewed by ABS-CBN TV network when another aftershock struck. "Oh sir, there's an aftershock," she said. "I'm shaking, we have a phobia now."

At least six people were killed, mostly after being struck by falling debris and concrete walls, provincial disaster-response official Gilbert Gonzales said. At least 126 others were injured in Surigao, where the quake knocked out power and forced the closure of the domestic airport due to deep cracks in its runway, officials said.

Mexico gets Trump's trade ire. Japan and Germany, a pass

WASHINGTON (AP) — When President Donald Trump rages about unfair trading practices, he usually directs his ire at China and Mexico.

By comparison, Japan and Germany get off easy.

The focus on China is understandable: The U.S. trade deficit in goods with China (\$347 billion last year) is five times bigger than any other.

The U.S. trade gap with Mexico (\$63.2 billion), though, is smaller than the ones with Japan (\$68.9 billion) and Germany (\$64.9 billion).


Still, when it comes to Trump's rhetoric, "the volume on Mexico is three times as high," says Gary Hufbauer, senior fellow at the Peterson Institute for International Economics.

More whales strand in New Zealand, bringing total to 650

WELLINGTON, New Zealand (AP) — A new pod of 240 whales swam aground at a remote New Zealand beach on Saturday just hours after weary volunteers managed to refloat a different group of whales following an earlier mass stranding.

In total, more than 650 pilot whales have beached themselves along a 5 kilometer (3 mile) stretch of coastline over two days on Farewell Spit at the tip of the South Island. About 335 of the whales are dead, 220 remain stranded, and 100 are back at sea.

Department of Conservation Golden Bay Operations Manager Andrew Lamason said they are sure they're dealing with a new pod because they had tagged all the refloated whales from the first group and none of the new group had tags.


Dong said he's been practicing the piano for most of his life so far.

At the end of the show, standing ovation prompted an encore.




A Dog's Purpose

Everything is seen through Bailey's eyes, so little details like "What are the ramifications of



This is going to be a little different from my normal review, because the delight of watching "A Dog's Purpose"

isn't its stellar plot its overarching narrative; but it's main conceit more on that in a minute – and the little minutiae

of Bailey's perspective on everything he experiences. The latter is much better seen in person. Also, there have been some allegations of film makers mishandling dogs during filming. I believe those have been largely debunked as of this writing, and I won't delve into them (any more than this mention) in this review. The former – the movie's main conceit – is this:

Bailey lives out his dog's life, gradually weakens and dies, and then is reincarnated into other puppy bodies. In each life, he (or she!) tries his best to connect with, assist, and just love his human compan-

His second life, for example is as a female German shepherd named Ellie (Gad voices all of Bailey's reincarnations), who becomes a police canine officer, partnered by Officer Carlos (John Ortiz) of the Chicago PD. Carlos is a bit strict and standoffish, and Ellie can sense that he's lonely, but doesn't know why. The audience sees a picture of Carlos with a woman who is now distinctly absent in his life. Ellie is insistent in her presence, and is rewarded with a place on the foot of Carlos' bed as he sleeps. Other stuff happens, and Ellie dies.

There are other reincarnations. Bailey (by other names) also lives with a young depressed black female college student named Maya (Kirby Howell-Baptiste) and Wendi (Nicole LaPlaca) an impoverished, abused young woman, before reconnecting with some old friends.

Other characters in the movie include Ethan's grandparents (Gabrielle Rose and Michael Bofshever), Maya's boyfriend/husband Al (Pooch Hall), Wendi's boyfriend Victor (Primo Allon), and Ethan's friend Todd (Logan Miller). As I mentioned, a large part of the fun in "A Dog's

Purpose" is seeing the ideas the writers have about how the world would look from a dog's perspective;

of course the cat wishes it could be a dog, so Bailey feels obligated to give it "dog lessons," which basically devolve into Bailey chasing the cat around a lot. He's in heaven when the hot dog vendor's cart is overturned sending delicious meat everywhere, but is in agony later: "I think I ate too many meat Of course, it's not all fun and games. Bailey is a

contemplative dog, and wonders about, as the title suggests, his purpose in life. There are sad times, and lonely times, and (for Bailey) boring times along with the good.

On the downside, this is a bit too sweet for my taste. It pulls all the heartstrings, has an uplifting message, etc. etc., but all that stuff is a little too much for me. I guess you could say I enjoyed the movie despite all the treacle rather than because of

"A Dog's Purpose" is a good family movie. There might be a little much sadness and darkness for



very young kids (with the deaths of the dogs, and scenes of abuse, and a gun battle in

the police segment), but it relied a bit too much on the emotional manipulation for me to give it a perfect score. Eight stars out of 10.

Let me introduce myself, my name is Sandrena Koning. I'm the current news reporter at *The Big* Spring Herald.



BBB offers tips for spring break travelers

If you are looking for an alternative to staying in a hotel, HEATHER renting someone's home, condo or apartment may be appealing. Vacation rental websites make it easy to connect directly with property owners who

advertise their rentals online. However, BBB warns consumers to watch out for fake rental listings that aren't actually available or don't exist at all.

Last year, BBB received nearly 1,200 complaints against vacation rentals nationwide. According to data reported to BBB Scam Tracker, Texans reported losing \$28,800 last vear to rental, travel and vacation-related scams. Scammers contacted victims by phone or through online classifieds, and most victims used a wire transfer service or credit card to make a payment.

BBB offers the following tips to ensure you're planning your vacation with a trustworthy business:

•Research last-minute travel deals. Bargains on airfare or a hotel may be tempting, but be cautious when booking on an unknown travel website or through an online advertisement. Common travel-related complaints to BBB reported trouble with reservations, online advertisements and incorrect charges. Before booking any reservation, make sure to read the company's cancelation and refund policy.

•Consider travel insurance. Travel insurance is designed to cover such things as trip cancelations or medical emergencies. The U.S. Travel Insurance Association maintains a list of licensed travel insurance companies. Certain travel companies have different policies and levels of coverage based on whether you purchase the car rental, flight or hotel. Ask questions, and always read the fine print to see what's covered.

•Pay with a credit card. Paying with a credit card—rather than by cash or check gives you additional protection if something were to go wrong with the travel reservation.

•Verify reservations. Whether you're staying in a hotel, rental or at a resort, call to confirm all arrangements. Don't only rely on a receipt or confirmation email. Get all details of your vacation in writing, including contact information, travel itineraries and booking confirmations.

•Ask about mandatory "resort fees." Hotels often come with resort fees, usually for services like Internet, fitness facilities and access to the pool. But the extra fees can add to the per night cost of your stay, and are mandatory, regardless of whether or not you use the services. Before you book a hotel reservation online, call the hotel and ask if a resort fee is included in the total cost.

•Be alert for travel scams. Unsolicited mail, email and websites offering deeply discounted travel packages could leave you out of a vacation and money if you're not careful. Watch out for scams saying that you have "won a trip." If you've really won a free vacation, a legitimate business won't ask you to pay any upfront or processing fees.

US stock indexes extend climb into record heights

U.S. stock indexes extended their climb into record territory Friday morning, powered by rising energy prices. Oil and gas companies led the gainers as the price of crude oil headed higher. Investors kept their focus on strong fourth quarter earnings and corporate deal news.

KEEPING SCORE: The Dow Jones industrial average rose 73 points, or 0.4 percent, to 20,245 as of 11:22 a.m. Eastern Time. The Standard & Poor's 500 index gained 6 points, or 0.3 percent, to 2,313. The Nasdaq composite index added 14 points, or 0.3 percent, to 5,729. The three indexes were pushing further into record territory after closing at new highs on Thursday.

TRUMP & EARNINGS: Investors have focused on companies quarterly results lately as they size up corporate America's growth prospects. Earnings were running about 6.7 percent higher as of Wednesday, with about 60 percent of S&P 500 companies having reported their quarterly results. That would mark the second-consecutive quarter of earnings growth after a losing streak of five straight quarters. Beyond earnings, investors are also eying Washington D.C. for signs the Trump administration will deliver on the promised business-friendly policy proposals that helped drive



Music community honors Randy Travis in song

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — A near fatal stroke couldn't take away the signature baritone of country star Randy Travis, and dozens of his friends, from Garth Brooks to Kenny Rogers, used their voices and his songs to honor the legend.

Travis watched from the side of the stage Wednesday in Nashville, Tennessee, as country stars from multiple eras sang his classics, from "Forever and Ever, Amen" to "Three Wooden Crosses." Performers included Wynonna, Alabama, Chris Young, Travis Tritt and Jeff Foxworthy.

By the end, he had joined in the celebration by singing "Amazing Grace" and leading others in singing "Will the Circle Be Unbroken."

Travis, whose multiplatinum debut album "Storms of Life" in 1986 made him a star, suffered a stroke in 2013 that initially took away his ability to speak or read.

But he's been steadily recovering his voice through rehabilitation, said his wife Mary Travis.

"We sing a lot in the car," said Mary Travis, backstage beside her husband. "We sing a lot at home. Music is his soul. Music is just what he is

She said that it's clear that her husband still remembers how to sing and play the guitar, but the stroke caused a condition called aphasia that makes it difficult for him to communicate.

"He knows all the words and he can chord every single song with his left hand," Mary Travis said.

Travis, who wore a yellow jacket embroidered with flowers, was all

smiles as he watched the performers, who each ended their performances with a hug or a handshake for the singer.

The concert was held to raise proceeds for a new foundation set up in his name to help stroke victims.

Travis suffered from a viral infection of the heart and was in a coma when the stroke occurred. He spent over five months in the hospital and underwent two brain surgeries, but battled back through years of rehabilitation. During his recovery,

many of his fellow singers including the Oak Ridge Boys, Alabama, Josh Turner and Jamey Johnson, would come for visits to sing for him and pray for him, said Mary Travis. Tanya Tucker said every

NBC's Bob Costas being replaced by Mike Tirico at Olympics

NEW YORK (AP) — Mike Tirico is taking over from Bob Costas as the prime-time host of NBC's Olympics coverage starting next winter in South Korea.

Costas, who has been the on-air concierge to NBC's Olympics 11 times starting in 1992, said he decided on his own a year ago that the time was right for a change.

"This is entirely on my terms

and I like it that way," Costas said Thursday. He said he wants to do some commentary on special events — maybe even the Olympics — and long-form programming, likening his new role to what former news anchor Tom Brokaw does at NBC. He also wants to broadcast more baseball to get his fastball back, saying he listened to old tapes and realized he wasn't doing that as well as he used to.

"I'm not retiring, I'm just transitioning," he said.

The 50-year-old Tirico had been considered an heir apparent since joining NBC Sports from ESPN last year. He helped with the network's coverage of the Rio Olympics last summer.

The Olympics role requires the host to set the stage for the night's telecast, guide viewers

on switches to different venues, handle news if it breaks and conduct on-air interviews. It was a job popularized by ABC's Jim McKay in the 1970s. Costas and Tirico both paid tribute to McKay Thursday, with Tirico recalling a time he sat next to him on a plane and pumped the veteran for stories about the Olympic experience.

Costas' decision denies him a victory lap in Pyeongchang in 2018, although he may not miss the Winter Olympics. In Sochi, Russia, in 2014, Costas was sidelined for six days because of an eye infection.

"I hope I enhanced people's enjoyment and understanding of the events," he said, "and I hope that I presented a sense of the drama, the theater, the excitement and, when appropriate, acknowledged all of the issues involved."

He said his favorite Olympics memory was in Atlanta in 1996, when Muhammad Ali, despite his Parkinson's disease, was a surprise torchbearer who lit the flame at the stadium.

"Somehow even in that condition he was just as charismatic and magnetic as he's always been," Costas said.

Costas and Tirico, 50, have a tie that goes way back. They both graduated from Syracuse University, where Tirico was the first recipient of a scholarship in Costas' name.
