Construction starts Monday on reliever route

Starting Monday, TxDOT (Texas Department of Transportation) will be begin the first phase of construction of the northern section of U.S. Highway 87 reliever route, according to officials.

"During the first phase of construction, contractors will be widening the shoulder of US 87 near I-20," said

public relations officer for the Abilene District in a news release. "Lanes will be restricted to one lane in each direction during this time." The southern section of the

route — named the William B. Crooker Memorial Highway, was completed in the summer of 2016. Crooker was a long-time Howard County

years with the Ports-to-Plains Alliance, a group of cities and businesses which promotes a trade corridor from Mexico to Canada. U.S. Highway 87 falls along that route and Crooker was active for decades to make sure the trade corridor route followed through Big Spring. "The project will continue

Mary Belle Turner, TxDOT involved for a number of western end of Big Spring from I-20 for approximately eight miles, tying in to FM 700 and US 87 on the north end of Big Spring to complete the full relief route," Turner stated. "The route will alleviate congestion issues for downtown Big Spring while facilitating safer, more efficient freight and traffic flow." With the completion of the

project, TxDOT aims to make

destinations more accessible, whether that be downtown Big Spring or elsewhere, Turner added. "Travelers will be able to

access downtown Big Spring via Business US 87, or continue at speed along the relief route to their destination," she stated.

GOP lawmakers hear from leaders on move to remake health law

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republican leaders on Thursday described plans for replacing President Barack Obama's health care law to House GOP lawmakers, promoting a conservative approach dominated by tax breaks and a transition away from today's Medicaid program. With their drive to reshape the nation's health

care system off to a sputtering start, House Speaker Paul Ryan, R-Wis., and other leaders were describing detailed options and gauging the rankand-file's receptiveness in a private meeting. Lawmakers also heard from Health and Human Services Secretary Tom Price, a former GOP congressman from Georgia.

The briefing came hours before a weeklong recess that will send Congress home to energized



would be expanded and refundable tax credits, paid in advance, would be available to millions of Americans. With refundable credits, even people with low or no income would receive checks from the IRS.

On one of the most contentious issues, Republicans would gradually change Medicaid, which helps poor and disabled people afford health care. While it now guarantees coverage for everyone who qualifies, the options being discussed include giving money to the states generally based on the number of Medicaid beneficiaries with adjustments for the type of care they need, and states would have more power to decide who qualifies for Republicans would provide extra money to both

the 31 states that expanded Medicaid coverage under Obama's law and the 19 others — mostly dominated by the GOP — that refused to do so. That

disbursement of funds has caused major rifts between GOP-led states that increased their Medicaid coverage and don't want to lose that money,

and states that didn't expand but want extra funds

The GOP plans also include federal contributions to states for high risk pools, where people with illnesses that are expensive to cover could purchase policies.

And because of many Republicans' opposition to abortion, the retrofitted medical system would block Planned Parenthood from receiving federal payments, which comprise nearly half its annual \$1.1 billion budget.

Democrats defending Obama's law oppose all of the GOP ideas, saying they'd leave many people unable to afford health coverage.

lobbyists who described House leaders' plans said they strongly resembled a broad outline that Ryan released last summer as a campaign document for Republican candidates to tout to voters. Most spoke on condition of anonymity because the proposals hadn't been released publicly.

In a significant departure from Ryan's summertime proposal, the options being discussed Thursday would not address Medicare, which helps pay for guaranteed health care for the elderly. Ryan has backed reshaning it into

Around the Earth





Steers look sharp in scrimmage against Permian

The Big Spring Steers put on a great performance in their scrimmage against the Permian Panthers last night.

Because it was only a scrimmage, there was not an official score. But the Steers did go on a 9-0 run, holding Permian scoreless up until the 8th inning.

There was no denying that the Steers had a lot of success at the plate, but it was their fielding that set the tone of the game.

"One of the things that gave us early success was confidence, and that starts with our pitching." said head coach Daniel Carrillo. "As pitchers for the Steers, they are our tempo-setter. We feed off of them, and they came out and pounded the zone which allowed our defense to play."

However, the same could not be said about the Panthers. They struggled to get any kind of batting streak going and only averaged around 4 at bats per inning.

The Steers showed a lot of hustle and energy against Permian's offense, including two double plays, or what they like to call "defensive home

With the rhythm and teamwork Big Spring displayed, we should be in for a great season.

The team has a new motto for this year, "Bring the boat." In other words, don't tell me how bad the water is. Just bring the boat.

"If you get a bad call from the official, or it's a really windy day... etc., don't tell me about it," explained Carrillo. "We just have to battle through it and figure it out."



Aldridge, Leonard help Spurs rout short-handed Magic, 107-79

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) It's hard for LaMarcus Aldridge to explain why, but he was out of rhythm during the first five games of San Antonio's current road trip.

His shot wasn't falling consistently and something just seemed off.

But the Spurs' power forward found his groove Wednesday night, shooting 10 of 13 from the floor for a game-high 23 points to spark a 107-79 win over the short-handed Orlando Magic as both teams headed into the All-Star break.

"I work hard and I get in the gym, so I'm not worried about not working hard," Aldridge said. "It just happens, but I stuck with it and played more comfortable tonight."

A big reason for that might have been the matchup issues Magic faced against the 6-foot-11 Aldridge without Serge Ibaka to help out. Orlando traded its power forward to Toronto on Tuesday for Terrence Ross and a 2017 first-round draft pick.

That left a smaller Jeff

Green to try to match up on Aldridge early, and then the Magic attempted to put center Nikola Vucevic on him but he couldn't step out and guard Aldridge on the perimeter. Aldridge hit his first two shots and scored eight of the Spurs' first 12 points in the first six minutes of a game that was never close.

"For sure, especially when I miss the easy ones," Aldridge said when asked if making the first couple of shots made it easier for him. "I make the first couple and then I start playing like myself and start taking shots that I take. Tonight I looked more

like myself." The Spurs (43-13), second in the Western Conference, looked like on the floor. Ross did

themselves in every way, playing lock-down defense and unselfishly on offense. San Antonio limited the Magic to 39.5 percent shooting and forced them into 17 turnovers.

The Spurs moved the ball and consistently made the extra pass to find the open man. That was often on the interior as Kawhi Leonard, Dewayne Dedmon and Aldridge took advantage of an Orlando team that didn't have enough big bodies to match up.

Leonard finished with 22 points and Dedmon added 10 points and 11 rebounds to help the Spurs lead by as many as 30 points.

"In some ways it wasn't a fair fight," said Spurs coach Gregg Popovich, whose team is 4-2 on its current road trip that continues in Los Angeles next week after the break. "They lost Serge and didn't have a replacement here for him. So they were a little bit overmatched and that certainly helped us

The Magic (21-37), who have made a concerted effort to shift to a smaller lineup in midseason, looked even more disjointed offensively than normal without their second-leading scorer

not dress because Ibaka had not completed his physical in time to make the trade official.

Orlando's offense had no rhythm, with leading scorer Evan Fournier having an off night with nine points on 6-of-11 shooting and four turnovers. Vucevic led three Magic players in double figures with 16 points and 10 rebounds as the team fell to 9-18 at home.

"They have the kind of defense that forces you into 1-on-1 play and we're more of a ballmovement team when we're at our best, not an isolation team," Orlando coach Frank Vogel said. "We tried to force into spots that weren't there and were careless with our turnovers and it was very, very cost-

Napoli passes physical, set for 3rd Texas stint

DALLAS (AP) — Mike Napoli has passed his physical, clearing the way for an \$8.5 million, one-year deal and his third stint with the Texas Rang-

Two people with knowledge of the situation told *The Associated Press* that the deal was done and that Napoli will be introduced Thursday. They spoke on condition of anonymity Wednesday night because the Rangers had not announced the agreement.

While not saying who, the team announced a news conference at its Arizona spring training complex before workouts Thursday morning to announce a free-agent signing.

Napoli was seen in Surprise, Arizona, on Wednesday, when he was set to take a physical. He will get a \$6 million salary this year, and the agreement includes an \$11 million club option for 2018 with a \$2.5 mil-

lion buyout. In his return to the Rangers, who have won the AL West title the past two seasons, Napoli figures to play first base and provide a big bat in the middle of the lineup. He previously played with Texas in 2011 and 2012, then spent the final two months of the 2015 season in Texas before going to Cleveland as a free agent.

Napoli hit a career-high 34 homers last season, when "Party at Napoli's" became a team rallying cry for the AL champions.

In his first season with the Rangers in 2011, Napoli hit .320 with 30 homers in 113 regular-season games and had 10 RBIs in the World Series. He was the starting catcher for the AL All-Star team in 2012, though he also played first base during that two-year span in Texas before going to the Red Sox as a free agent. He played some

left field in 2015. Texas already has room on its 40man roster after putting first baseman Prince Fielder and reliever Jake Diekman on the 60-day disabled list this week.

Mitch Moreland won a Gold Glove as the Rangers' primary first baseman last season, but became a free agent and agreed to a \$5.5 million, one-year deal with Boston. Fielder is signed through 2020 and remains on the roster even though he was forced to quit playing last summer after his second neck surgery.

Texas also lost big hitters Carlos Beltran and Ian Desmond as free agents.

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

both the bidding and the club return of the tricks to make the contract. Obviously, this can't be done unless

he can find a way to avoid losing a club trick. One possible solution is to draw

the missing trumps and then cash the A-K-Q of diamonds. If the opposing diamonds are divided 3-3, dummy's queen of clubs can be discarded on South's fourth diamond. But if declarer relies solely on this line of play, he winds up down one because the diamonds break 4-2 However, if South plays a bit more

carefully, he can make the contract. After taking the ace of clubs at trick four, he should cash all of his trumps, discarding the club six on dummy's fifth trump to reduce his hand to the Q-7-5-2 of diamonds. On dummy's last trump, West, holding the J-10-8-6 of diamonds

and king of clubs, cannot discard safely. A club discard would make dummy's queen a trick, while a diamond discard would allow declarer to score four diamond tricks

Observe that by adopting this method of play, declarer preserves his chances of making the contract if the diamonds are divided 3-3, and at the same time increases his chances significantly by catering to the possibility that West has four or more dia-

On Feb. 16, 1862, the Civil War Battle of Fort Donelson in Tennessee ended as some 12,000 Confederate soldiers surrendered; Union Gen. Ulysses S. Grant's victory earned him the moniker "Unconditional Surrender Grant.'

(Demjanjuk was found guilty of war crimes and crimes against humanity, but the conviction ended up being overturned by the Israeli Supreme Court.)

In 1996, 11 people were killed in a fiery collision between an Amtrak passenger train and a Maryland commuter train in Silver Spring, Maryland. Former California Governor Edmund G. "Pat" Brown died in Beverly Hills, California, at age


In 1998, a China Airlines Airbus A300-600R trying to land in fog near Taipei, Taiwan,

The Ten years ago: Democratic-controlled House issued a symbolic rejection of President George W. AUBURN HILLS, Mich. (AP) — Reggie Jackson snapped out of his scoring slump and helped the Detroit Pistons head into the All-Star break with a win.

Jackson scored 22 points, Jon Leuer added 20 and the Pistons beat the Dallas Mavericks 98-91 Wednesday night.

"Shots just went in, and coach kept calling my number," Jackson said after shooting 8 for 12 from the field, including 3 for 4 on 3-pointers. "(Dallas) just kept having coverages where they really didn't come off our wings, nor did they want to leave Andre (Drummond). I was iust a recipient of the coverage they played."

It was Jackson's first 20-point game since he had 24 at Miami on Jan. 28. He reached double digits just four times in nine games since, averaging 8.9 points during that stretch.

"I thought he played well tonight, and we needed it," Pistons coach Stan Van Gundy

Jackson had 12 of his points in the first half, when the Pistons roared out to a 62-35 lead. "We had no energy,"

Dallas center Dirk Nowitzki said, "no bounce about ourselves. It was one of the worst halves we've played all season, and you could tell in the second we had a lot more bounce."

Nowitzki led the way in the third quarter, scoring 13 of his gamehigh 24 points, to help the Mavericks rally.

"We burned the first half at halftime." Dallas coach Rick Carlisle said. "The second half has got to be the norm

for us. The first half was an embarrassment, and we all know it and we all own it. It cost us the game, it's pretty clear."

Dallas pulled within eight midway through the fourth quarter, but the Pistons held them off the rest of the way until Deron Williams hit s 3-pointer in the final seconds to provide the final score. Nowitzki also had 10 rebounds. Harrison Barnes added 16 points, Seth Curry had 13 and Williams 12.

The Pistons never trailed, taking a 10-0 lead to start the game, making 52.1 percent of their shots in the first half. However, Dallas outscored Detroit 56-36 in the second half.

Kirk takes 1st-round lead at Women's Australian Open

ADELAIDE, Australia (AP) — Playing for the fourth consecutive week, Katherine Kirk wasn't showing any signs of fatigue after shooting an 8-under 65 at Royal Adelaide to take a two-stroke lead after the first round of the Women's Australian Open on Thursday.

The Australian player birdied four of the first five holes on the front nine and three of four in the middle of the back nine at Royal Adelaide. "There are low numbers to be had out there," Kirk

said after her morning round. "A lot of birdie opportunities, and I was just fortunate I got off to a good start and kept the momentum going." Tied for second with 67s were Marissa Steen and

Jane Park of the United States, South Korean Chella Choi and Min Lee of Taiwan, who was the only afternoon golfer to make any inroads on the leaderboard. Canada's Brooke Henderson was four strokes be-

hind after carding 69. Michelle Wie, using a new putting grip and stance over the ball on the green, shot 70 and No. 1-ranked Lydia Ko had a 71.

No. 2-ranked Ariya Jutanugarn of Thailand, the LP-GA's player of the year and a five-time winner in 2016, shot 72 and defending champion Haru Nomura of Japan had a 75, both in tougher afternoon conditions when the wind increased and the greens firmed up.

"Four birdies, no bogeys, I'm pretty happy and hopefully will shoot another similar round tomorrow," said Henderson, who played with Ko. "The crowds were awesome. I hardly ever see that many people on the Thursday round, especially when we tee off (early) in the morning."

Ko was frustrated on the greens, but ended the day on a good note when she birdied the ninth, her last. "I hit my drives good, which is really important


around a course like this, but just the putts did not drop," Ko said. "It was good to see a putt drop on the final hole and hopefully that will give me good momentum going into tomorrow."

Five-time champion Karrie Webb had a 76. She was 3-over after bogeying the first hole — her 10th — but then went double-bogey, bogey, birdie, birdie, par to complete her round.

"A couple of late birdies at least made lunch taste better, but it wasn't real good out there today," said Webb.

Steen was in the first group out, and took advantage of it during her round which included an eagle on the third.

"The wind was low, the greens were rolling really pure. I was joking that I didn't see a blade of grass out of place out there the whole day," Steen said. "I didn't trip once. I either hit every green or was right on the fringe where I was still able to putt, so I gave myself a lot of chances and took advantage when I had wedges in my hands."
