BSISD trustees to discuss outsourcing food service

Big Spring ISD trustees will discuss the option of outsourcing the district's food service program to a management company when they meet Thursday night at the high school board room.

"In an effort to evaluate the efficiency of its overall operations, the Big



Spring Independent School District has requested proposals from food service vendors," said Superintendent Chris Wigington in a press release. "There is a possibility that the district will contract out its food service; however, at this time, no decision has been made. Ultimately, the Big Spring ISD will do what is in the best interest of our stu-

Currently, Big Spring ISD's food service department employs 52 positions that are responsible for providing breakfast and lunch meals to nine district campuses.

Discussion on the matter is listed at the top of the agenda for Thursday's meeting scheduled for 5:15 p.m. in the high school board room, 707 11th Place. Anyone in the public who wishes to address trustees on this or other matters concerning the school district, should fill out a form before

Wind conditions should ease, helping crews battle wildfires

HUTCHINSON, Kan. (AP) -Winds are expected to slow down Wednesday, but weather conditions are still not ideal for emergency crews battling wildfires in four states that have killed six people and destroyed hundreds of square miles of land.

Bill Bunting, forecast operations chief for the Oklahomabased Storm Prediction Center, said Tuesday that the powerful wind gusts that fanned the wildfires in Kansas, Colorado, Oklahoma and Texas should ease to about 10 to 20 mph on Wednesday. He said temperatures should peak in the 70s, with afternoon humidity low.

"These conditions will make it somewhat easier for firefighting efforts, but far from perfect. The fires still will be moving," Bunting told The Associated Press. "The ideal situation is that it would turn cold and rain, and unfortunately that's not going to happen."

In addition to those four states, conditions were ripe for fires in Iowa, Missouri and Nethe middle of the country overnight, spawning dozens of suspected tornadoes, according to the National Weather Service.

Kansas wildfires have burned about 625 square miles of land and

WikiLeaks CIA files: Are they real and are they a risk?

WASHINGTON (AP) — WikiLeaks has published thousands of documents that the anti-secrecy organization said were classified files revealing scores of secrets about CIA hacking tools used to break into targeted computers, cellphones and even smart

The CIA and the Trump administration declined to comment on the authenticity of the files Tuesday, but prior WikiLeaks releases divulged government secrets maintained by the State Department, Pentagon and other agencies that have since been acknowledged as genuine. In another nod to their authenticity, the chairman of the House intelligence committee, Rep. Devin Nunes, R-Calif., said he was very concerned about the release and has sought more information about it. The hacking tools appeared to exploit vul-

nerabilities in popular operating systems for desktop and laptop computers developed by Microsoft. They also targeted devices that included Apple's iPhones and iPads, Google's Android cellphones, Cisco routers and Samsung Smart TVs. Some of the technology firms said they

were evaluating the newly released docu-

Some questions and answers about the latest WikiLeaks dump and its fallout:

WHERE DO THESE DOCUMENTS COME

WikiLeaks said the material came from "an isolated, high-security network" inside the CIA's Center for Cyber Intelligence, the spy agency's internal arm that conducts cyber offense and defense. It said the documents were "circulated among former U.S. government hackers and contractors in an unauthorized manner, one of whom has provided WikiLeaks with portions of the archive." It did not make it clear who was behind the leak, leaving several possibilities: espionage, a rogue employee, a theft involving a federal contractor or a break-in of a staging server where such information may have been temporarily stored.

HOW MANY FILES WERE LEAKED? WHAT PERIOD DO THEY COVER?

WikiLeaks said 7,818 web pages and 943 attachments were published, but were just the first part of more material to come. WikiLeaks said it has an entire archive of data consisting of several million lines of computer code. The documents appear to date between 2013 and 2016. WikiLeaks described them as "the largest-ever publication of confidential documents on the agen-

ARE THESE LEGITIMATE CIA DOCU-

A spokesman for the CIA said the agency would not comment "on the authenticity or content of purported intelligence documents." Trump administration spokesman Sean Spicer declined comment as well. But WikiLeaks has a long track record of assembling and releasing secret files from the U.S. and other governments. Security experts who reviewed the material said the documents appeared to be authentic. Jake Williams, a security expert with Georgia based Rendition Infosec, who has dealt previously with government hackers, said that frequent references in the files to operation security gave them the stamp of legitimacy. "It rings true to me," Williams said.

WHAT DO THESE DOCUMENTS CON

The files describe CIA plans and descriptions of malware and other tools that could be used to hack into some of the world's most popular technology platforms. The documents showed that the developers aimed to be able to inject these tools into targeted computers without the owners' awareness.

The files do not describe who the prospective targets might be, but the documents show broad exchanges of tools and information between the CIA and National Security Agency and other federal intelligence agencies, as well as intelligence services of close allies Australia, Canada, New Zealand and the United Kingdom.

The purported CIA documents range from complicated computer coding to organizational plans to sarcastic comments about the tools' effectiveness. Some of the tools were named after alcohol references, including Bartender, Wild Turkey and Mar garita. Others referenced recent popular movies, including "Fight Club" and "Talla dega Nights." One hacking tool, code-named "RickyBobby," after the character who is a race car driver in "Talladega Nights," was purportedly used to upload and download

The documents also include discussions about compromising some internet-con nected televisions to turn them into listening posts. One document discusses hacking vehicle systems, appearing to indicate the CIA's interest in hacking recent-model cars with sophisticated on-board computer sys-

HOW ARE TECHNOLOGY FIRMS RE SPONDING TO THESE REVELATIONS?

Microsoft said it was looking into the reports that its operating systems were potentially vulnerable to many of the malware and other hacking tools described in the purport ed CIA documents. The maker of the secure messaging app Signal said the purported tools described in the leaked documents appeared to affect users' actual phones, but not its software designs or encryption protocols. The manufacturer of the popular Telegram mobile messaging app said in a statement that manufacturers of cellphones and their operating systems, including Apple, Google and Samsung, were responsible for improving the security of their devices.

he succumbed to smoke after getting out of his vehicle. Two SUVs crashed into the truck, injuring six people, state trooper Michael Racy said.

Most of the state's charred land is in Clark County, where 30 structures were damaged, said Allison Kuhns, a county emergency management office spokeswoman. About half of those structures are near Englewood, one of two communities evacuated. Kuhns said there also have been significant cattle losses as entire ranches were engulfed.

That fire started in Oklahoma, where it burned an estimated 390 square miles in Beaver

County. Officials said a separate blaze scorched more than 155 square miles of land in neighboring Harper County, Oklahoma, and was a factor in the death of a woman who had a heart attack while trying to keep her farm near Buffalo from burning.

Oklahoma Gov. Marv Fallin on Tuesday declared a state of emergency in 22 counties due to the wildfires.

The largest evacuations elsewhere were in Reno County, Kansas, where 10,000 to 12,000 people voluntarily left their homes Monday night, said Katie Horner, a state Department of Emergency Managespokeswoman.

Several hundred more Judge Richard Peet, people evacuated their homes in Russell, Ellsworth and Comanche counties, in central

A wildfire in Gray County, also in the Texas Panhandle, killed three ranch hands trying to save cattle, said the county's head administrator. One of the three apparently died of smoke inhalation Monday night and the other two were badly burned and died on the way to hospitals, he said.

Forest Service spokesman Phillip Truitt said as many as four firefighters were hurt battling the fires Monday. He provided no details their conditions Tuesday morning.

In northeastern Colorado near the Nebraska border, firefighters battled a blaze that burned more than 45 square miles and was 50 percent contained Tuesday. Officials said

least five homes and 15 outbuildings, with no serious injuries. Dry conditions and

strong winds had put the region at risk for wildfires. All of eastern Colorado is classified as either moderately or abnormally dry along with

the fire had destroyed at major parts of Kansas. almost all of Oklahoma and some of northern Texas, according to the U.S. Drought Monitor.

volving crew boss Lyle (Burton Gilliam) over what makes a suitable work song, Taggart (Pickens) the overseer informs the crew that there are reports of quicksand ahead, and sends Bart (Little) and Charlie (Charles Mc-Gregor) ahead on a handcart to check it out.

There is indeed quicksand, and Taggart rides up, rescuing the handcart but abandoning the men to the quicksand's gooey clutches. After Bart and Charlie manage to escape, Bart conks Taggart on the head with a shovel.

Cut to the office of one Hedley Lamarr (Korman), advisor to the governor, who needs to clear the way for an alternate route for the railroad – right through the quiet, unsuspecting town of Rock Ridge. Taggart convinces Lamarr that he and his thugs can drive off the townsfolk with a bit of frontier violence.

In return, Lamarr orders Bart

Taggart and his men indeed wreak some mayhem in Rock Ridge, and at a town meeting, the townsfolk decide to write to the governor demanding he appoint a sheriff to keep the peace in their

Governor William J. Lepetomane (Brooks) is a bumbling fool, more interested in his scantily clad secretary's assets than anything having to do with governing. He tasks Lamarr with finding a suitable sheriff; naturally Lamarr uses the opportunity to select a sheriff who will be so offensive to the townsfolk that they vacate the town and allow the railroad to proceed unchecked. Guess who Lamarr picks?

If you've never seen "Blazing Saddles" before, I'm sorry. You should stop whatever you're doing, go rent it, look it up on Netflix (it's streaming), or dig up a VHS cassette of the movie and dig your VCR out of the attic. This is a hilarious movie, and it's a bit more than that as well. It's an important movie. It's a

movie that doesn't shy away from depictions of racism, but rather shows it openly and mocks it unmercifully. You will hear the Nword in "Blazing Saddles," but it's not a movie for which you can possibly use that utterance as any kind of evidence of racist mindset on the part of its cre-

"Blazing Saddles" is a wholly, unabashedly, and obviously a satire of racist attitudes and the inequitable practice of racism in our society.

That said, it's not a perfect movie. A lot of the humor is lowbrow, slapstick, lowest-commondenominator stuff. That's not to say it's not hilarious – it is. It's just not something you want to watch with your young kids or grandparents.

Also, the whole movie comes across as a tad cartoony. All of it, the good, the bad, and the ugly, is presented in a fun, jokey way that might serve to lessen the impact of the truly awful things it's actually portraying. The racists, the corrupt politicians, are all jokes in this movie, and in reality they aren't actually jokes. In "Blazing Saddles," the KKK robes have a smiley face and "Have a Nice Day!" on the back.

I understand that the goal is to make fun of these things as ridiculous, but perhaps in doing so it presents them as less foul than they actually are.

"Blazing Saddles" is my favorite Western of all time. It's hilarious, socially important, and a fun story. Nine and a half stars out of

"One Mile Under" by Andrew Gross (F GRO A) is a Ty Hauch Novel.

During routine trip down the rapids, whitewater guide Dani Whalen finds a body washed up on the river's edge, and it turns out to be a close friend.

Her friend's death is quickly ruled an accident by local enforcelaw ment, but Dani is convinced that something far more sinister has occurred.

She takes her case to the local police chief and her ex-stepfather, but he repeats the company line and claims the case is not worth an investigation. Dani secretly builds her case. When a hot-airballoon operator who says he saw something up in the air that day to back up her claims is killed in a fiery crash, Dani threatens to take her suspicions public thus goading the police chief into tossing her in jail. When Dani's father reaches Ty Hauck and says his daughter is in trouble, Ty doesn't hesitate to moor this boat and get involved. Ty and Dani become ensnared in a sinister scheme running deep beneath the surface of a quiet town that has made its own deal with the devil to survive.

In the deadly square-off between giant energy concerns and beaten-down ranches and farmers, there is one resource even more valuable than oil in this drought-stricken region: water.

With allegiances constantly in doubt and no one above suspicion, only Bennett can save the president and the country before the assassins' deadly kill shot hits its mark.

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Texas judge puts poison plan for feral hogs on hold.

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - A Texas state District Court Judge has put a hold on a Texas Department of Agriculture rule change that would allow the use of a poison to help curtail the state's estimated 2.5 million feral hogs.

The Austin American-Statesman reports that the judge issued a restraining order on Tuesday.

The company Wild Boar Meats LLC asked for a restraining order to stop the emergency rule proposed by State Agriculture Commissioner Sid Miller.

The rule would allow the state to use warfarinbased poison to kill the hogs.

But the company argued in its request for an injunction that the poison would impose a burden on ranchers trying to graze animals in nearby pastures and will cause economic damage to the hunting and meat processing industries in the state.

Texas deputy fired for not checking on inmate found hanged

HOUSTON (AP) — Investigators say a Texas deputy on jail infirmary duty has been fired after an internal review determined an inmate was not properly monitored before he was found hanged.

The Harris County Sheriff's Office on Tuesday said the deputy, whose name wasn't released, didn't conduct face-to-face checks of the inmate in a timely manner.

The case has been referred to prosecutors.

A sheriff's statement said deputies on Feb. 13 found Vincent Dwayne Young hanging by a bed sheet in his private cell. Doctors couldn't revive him. The Houston Chronicle reports sheriff's officials say Young, who faced a weapons charge, was undergoing detoxification.

An autopsy determined the cause of death was hanging, the manner was suicide.

The sheriff's statement says new protocols include random audits comparing written staff records with security video.

Texas: ex-Border Patrol agent guilty Emergency crews struggled of attempted enticement

LAREDO, Texas (AP) — Prosecutors say an ex-Border Patrol agent in South Texas faces up to life in federal prison for trying to arrange sexual encounters with two girls.

Salvador Contreras pleaded guilty Tuesday in Laredo to attempting to entice a minor to engage in sexual activity.

Authorities say the 50-year-old Contreras, who was a senior Border Patrol agent in Del Rio, resigned following his December arrest in the undercover online investigation.

Prosecutors say Contreras thought he was communicating with a woman who had two daughters, ages 8 and 14, and would make the girls available for sex. The person was an undercover officer.

Prosecutors say Contreras was arrested when he traveled to Cotulla to meet the children.

Sentencing is pending. Contreras faces at least 10 years in prison.

Texas House panel hears '1st step' in Monday when his tractor-trailer fixing school finance

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Debate has begun on a bipartisan bill pumping \$1.6 billion extra into classrooms as part of major changes to how Texas funds public education.

Sponsored by Houston Republican Rep. Dan Huberty, the proposal increases per-student funding about \$200 to \$5,350, while adding money for transportation and educating dyslexic students.

It also tweaks the current "Robin Hood" system to decrease funding that school districts in wealthy areas share with poorer districts.

Huberty's Public Education Committee heard the bill Tuesday, calling it a "first step" toward fixing school finance.

Lawmakers aren't required to overhaul the school finance system because Texas' Supreme Court declared it flawed but constitutional last

Wildfires in 4 states kill 6, force thousands from homes

HUTCHINSON, Kan. (AP) — Tuesday to contain wildfires that have scorched hundreds of square miles of land in four states, killing six people and forcing thousands of others to flee their homes ahead of the windwhipped flames.

Fires burned in parts of Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas and Colorado, and warnings that conditions were ripe were issued for Iowa, Missouri and Nebraska, even after powerful thunderstorms moved through the middle of the country overnight, spawning dozens of tornadoes, according to the National Weather Service.

Kansas wildfires have burned about 625 square miles of land and killed one person. The Kansas Highway Patrol said Corey Holt, of Oklahoma City, died jackknifed as he tried to back up because of poor visibility on southern Kansas highway, and he succumbed to smoke after getting out of his vehicle. Two SUVs crashed into the truck, injuring six people who were taken to hospitals, state trooper Michael Racy said.

The vast majority of the state's burned land is in Clark County. where 30 structures were damaged, said Allison Kuhns, a spokeswoman for the county's emergency management office. About half of those structures are near the small city of Englewood, which was one of two communities evacuated. Kuhns said there also have been significant cattle The proposal should pass the House but could losses and that entire ranches were engulfed.

The fire originated across the

state border in Oklahoma, where it burned an estimated 390 square miles in Beaver County. Officials say a separate fire has scorched more than 155 square miles of land in neighboring Harper County and taken the life of a woman who had a heart attack while trying to keep her farm near Buffalo from burning.

The largest evacuations elsewhere were in Reno County, Kansas, where 10,000 to 12,000 people voluntarily left their homes Monday night, said Katie Horner, a spokeswoman for the state's Department of Emergency Management. She said 66 people from the area were in shelters Tuesday in Hutchinson, 40 miles northwest of Wichita.

Among them was Shelley Wilson, who fled Monday with her disabled son and pets from a blaze that was encircling her farm outside of Hutchinson. She returned later that night with her adult daughter to retrieve her tractor.

"I don't know if I have a home to go home to," Wilson said at the shelter Tuesday as her daughter did her best to lighten her mood. "In case I needed to rebuild, I wanted to at least have my tractor."

Retiree Sheryl Stessen said she grabbed her cat and bolted from her apartment on the outskirts of Hutchinson when she saw the fire quickly go from looking like a puff of smoke to a big, orange ball.

"Most of us are generally grumpy," she said Tuesday. "I just want to go home."

Several hundred more people evacuated their homes in Russell, Ellsworth and Comanche counties, in central Kansas. The Kansas fires forced the

closure of some roads, including

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two short stretches of Interstate 70, the main highway that cuts across the state from Colorado to Kansas City.

In the Texas Panhandle, three fires have burned more than 195 square miles of land and killed at least four people. One of the blazes near Amarillo threatened about 150 homes, while a larger fire in the northeast corner of the Panhandle near the Oklahoma border was only 5 percent contained as of Tuesday morning, according to Texas A&M Forest Service. That larger fire was responsible for a death on Monday, authorities said Tuesday without providing further details.

A wildfire in Gray County, also in the Texas Panhandle, killed three ranch hands who were trying to usher cattle away from the flames, said Judge Richard Peet, the county's head administrator. One of the three apparently died of smoke inhalation Monday night and the other two were badly burned and died on the way to hospitals, he said.

Forest Service spokesman Phillip Truitt said as many as four firefighters were hurt battling the fires Monday. He provided no details on their conditions Tuesday morning.

In northeastern Colorado near the Nebraska border, firefighters lost ground to a blaze in rural Logan and Phillips counties. They had the blaze 90 percent contained Monday evening, but only 50 percent contained Tuesday, despite working overnight to douse hot spots and flare-ups. The fire has burned more than 45 square miles of land and destroyed three homes. Nearby residents were warned to be ready to evacuate if the fire advances.

Five years ago: Syria's deputy oil minister (Abdo Husameddine) announced in a video that he had defected from President Bashar Assad's regime.


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



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Nowitzki tops 30,000 points

DALLAS (AP) — Dirk Nowitzki ducked his head into a mob of teammates, with Dallas owner Mark Cuban clutching the side of his jersey before the Mavericks superstar found coach Rick Carlisle for The celebration of 30,000 points came a lot faster

than most would have imagined — except maybe the man who has watched from the bench for nine of Nowitzki's 19 seasons.

"Watching Dirk the last couple of days, there was no doubt this was going to happen tonight," Carl-

Nowitzki scored the 20 points he needed for 30,000 in barely more than a quarter despite coming in with just five 20-point games this season, and the Mavericks celebrated with their second straight easy home win over the Los Angeles Lakers, a 122-111 victory Tuesday night.

The 7-foot German became the sixth NBA player and the first international one to reach the milestone, joining four Hall of Famers and a future one in Kobe Bryant. Nowitzki is one of three to score all 30,000-plus with one team. The others are Karl Malone (Utah) and Bryant (Lakers).

Nowitzki scored Dallas' first eight points in slightly more than two minutes, matched the best first quarter of his career with 18 points and reached the hallowed mark on a 15-foot fadeaway jumper from the baseline over Larry Nance Jr. with 10:58 remaining in the second quarter.

The 38-year-old scored all of his 25 points — one shy of his season high - in the first half to send the Mavericks on their way to a 31-point lead in the third quarter.

"I made the first one and it was a 2, and then I made the first 3 and thought, 'Why not?'" said Nowitzki, who made his first six shots and had 11 rebounds in 24 minutes. "I threw another one up and it went in, and then the next three came right after that and I was just trying to ride it from there."

Dallas extended a franchise record with its 14th straight win over the Lakers, who got 13 points, 18 rebounds and 10 assists from Julius Randle in their eighth straight loss.

"I was a Kobe fan," said Randle, who grew up in the Dallas area. "I hated Dirk growing up. As I got older and wiser, obviously, I was really able to appreciate his greatness."

After the signature shot for 30,000, Nowitzki added a 3-pointer for 23 points in the first 14 minutes before the game was stopped as teammates mobbed the wide-smiling star near midcourt.

Nowitzki waded through the huddle to get to the bench for more hugs and hand slaps, then returned to the court to acknowledge the standing ovation.

The 2007 MVP was 9 of 12 from the field, 3 of 3 from beyond the arc and 4 of 4 on free throws before halftime. He missed his only shot of the second half.

"For me, this was a 13:02 microcosm of one of the greatest careers in the history of this game," Carlisle said. "Meticulous preparation, total commitment, unbelievable competitive spirit and a real flair for the moment."

Nowitzki finished the night at 30,005 points and has said he plans to play a 20th season. If so, he could have a shot at fifth-place Wilt Chamberlain, who has 31,419. Kareem Abdul-Jabbar is the career leader at 38,387.

With his ABA career included, Julius Erving is the seventh player to reach the mark.

Fans arrived with T-shirts draped over their seats

that read "30K" behind a silhouette of Nowitzki's signature one-legged fadeaway jumper. And they stood each time the Mavericks brought the ball up the court when Nowitzki was two points away.

While the game was stopped, a short video tribute was played, followed by testimonials from former teammates and fans, even some Germans, during subsequent breaks in the game.

Jason Kidd, the point guard with Nowitzki on Dallas' only championship team in 2011 and second

in the NBA in career assists, joked that he should have passed more. Steve Nash, his best friend from the early years of his career, wondered what "ball hog" was in German.

The only glitch was Nowitzki's first attempt at 30,000, an airball on another fadeaway jumper 10 seconds into the second quarter.

"Every milestone makes you reflect a little bit," Nowitzki said. "It's been an amazing ride and a couple more baskets are coming and then it's time to ride off into the sunset."

TIP-INS

Lakers: D'Angelo Russell and Jordan Clarkson led LA with 22 points apiece. ... Randle had his third triple-double of the season. ... The Lakers outscored Dallas 37-19 in the fourth quarter.

Mavericks: Seth Curry scored 18 points, followed by Yogi Ferrell with 16, Wesley Matthews with 15 and Harrison Barnes with 14. ... Nerlens Noel had 11 points and 12 rebounds. ... G Quinn Cook had 10 on the last day of his 10-day contract. ... The Mavericks led 70-52 at the half. It was their first 70-point half since scoring 72 in the first half of a 130-128 loss to Houston in Game 3 of a first-round playoff series in 2015.

NOWITZKI NUGGETS Nowitzki had his 20th career half with at least 25 points. It was his first 25-point half since Nov.

16, 2008. The 18-point quarter was his highest since scoring 20 in the third quarter against New Orleans on Jan. 11, 2014.
