

BSISD food service employees voice concerns

District officals are researching cost savings of outsourcing food service program to private contrator

It was standing room only at the Big Spring ISD board of trustees meeting Thursday night as a crowd showed up to voice their concerns on the possibility the district could outsource its food service program to a private contractor.

"Six years ago when I went to work for the food service, we had a staff of 70. In order to save money, the decision was made not to fill the vacancies that occurred. Now we have a staff of 49," said Anna, a food service employee who addressed the board. "After learning of this cutback, we didn't riot, strike, or threaten. We just took a deep breath, tightened our belt, and went back to work to produce a quality product in a safe, clean, sanitary, welcoming, friendly atmosphere because we love our jobs, need our paychecks, care about the kids, and care about the district.

"Our hours were cut to 5 $\frac{1}{4}$ less than a year later," Anna continued. "Again we didn't strike or threaten, we just tightened our belts another notch and went back to work to continue to produce a quality product ... because we still love our jobs, still need our smaller paycheck than ever, and we still care about the children and the district."

Anna said the food service department seems to bear the largest burden when it comes to cuts in the budget. Workers are worried about cuts in wages, loss of sick time, built up retirement funds, and hours.

"If you vote to bring in one of these companies to operate our food service, it will be at the food service workers' expense. It's wrong," she said. "This company will not care about us the workers, the students, the district, or the city of Big Spring. They have nothing invested. The only thing that will concern them is the bottom line.

They don't only talk about it, they show examples of what can happen if you don't wear a seatbelt, if you drink and drive and impaired judgement. What it does and how it impacts families. How it affects you directly and your friends at school. It's pretty straightforward.

"They show some graphic pictures of accidents that have happened with distracted driving. They do a pretty thorough job," Ferguson continued. "The SAFE group actually puts on the presentation."

They want it to be as profitable as they can make it without a care about the ones that are financially crippled to achieve it. There are so many ways to balance a budget without one department carrying the largest budget.'

Following the public address by food service workers at the meeting, Superintendent Chris Wigington addressed the crowd.

"We are in the initial stage of looking at this. The questions that you are asking are questions that we have as well," he said. "We do not by any means want you to lose hours. We don't want you to lose pay. We don't want you to lose your job. Those questions that you asked us tonight are questions that we are going to get answers to."

Food service programs are paid through state monies and are set up to be self-sustaining in theory, however, that is not usually the case, Wigington said. Over the last eight years, the district has subsidized the program by \$2 million of local tax payer dollars.

"As stewards of the tax payers money, we have to look at other options," Wigington said to the crowd. "At food service there is a hundred moving parts. I get that. I completely understand that. We are going to look at every part. We're not going to say we are opening up and you're out and they are in. That is not what this is about. This is about doing what is right by you, by the school district, and by the

tax payers."

No decision on the issue has been made Wiginton added.

"We had two companies show up this morning," he said. "They are the only two companies interested in here. Both those companies and I think told some of you on campus today you will not lose your job...We know you do a great job. We know you love our kids, and we would never trade that for anything, but we are going to make sure you are taken care of. You have my word on that."

In other business trustees:

 Canceled the May 6 board of trustee elections because all three positions were unopposed. Incumbents Julie Harris and Manny Chavira will return to serve in District 3 and District 6 respectively. Thomas Olague will step into his first term serving in the District 1 position when he takes the oath of office in May.

 Approved the school calendar for the 2017-2018 school year.

 Heard the steep decline in student enrollment has slackened a little. Wigington reported the district is down 144 student from this time last year. Previous monthly reports put the student enrollment report as 200 students down from this time last year. Enrollment numbers figure into state funding allocations.

• Earmarked \$6,000 to start a foundation which will allow donors to the district to receive tax dedication on their donations, according to Wigington.

Court unanimously ousts South Korea's leader for corruption

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) – South Korea's Constitutional Court removed impeached President Park Geun-hye from office in a unanimous ruling Friday over a corruption scandal that has plunged the country into political turmoil and worsened an already-serious national divide.

The decision capped a stunning fall for the country's first female leader, who rode a wave of lingering conservative nostalgia for her late dictator father to victory in 2012, only to see her presidency crumble as millions of furious protesters filled the nation's streets.

Two people died during protests that followed the ruling. Police and hospital officials said about 30 protesters and police officers were injured in the violent clashes near the court, which prompted Prime Minister Hwang Kyo-ahn, the country's acting head of state, to plead for peace and urge Park's angry supporters to move on.

The ruling opens Park up to possible criminal proceedings — prosecutors have already named her a criminal suspect — and makes her South Korea's first democratically elected leader to be removed from office since democracy replaced dictatorship in the late 1980s.

It also deepens South Korea's political and security uncertainty as the country faces existential threats from North Korea, reported economic retaliation from a China furious about Seoul's cooperation with the U.S. on an anti-missile system, and questions in Seoul about the new Trump administration's commitment to the countries' security alliance.

The legislation, which would replace much of former President Barack Obama's health law, was approved by two House committees on Thursday. Republicans are hoping to move quickly to pass it, despite unified opposition from Democrats, criticism from some conservatives who don't think it goes far enough and several health groups who fear millions of Americans would lose coverage and benefits.

The bill would prohibit for a year any funding to Planned Parenthood, a major provider of women's health services, restrict abortion access in covered plans on the health exchange and scale back Medicaid services used by many low-income women, among other changes.

Washington Sen. Patty Murray, the top Democrat on the Health, Labor, Education and Pensions Committee, said the legislation is a "slap in the face" to women. She said it would shift more decisions to insurance companies.

"You buy it thinking you will be covered, but there is no guarantee," Murray said.

Democratic AGs mount fight against Trump travel ban

SEATTLE (AP) — In stepping up legal challenges to President Donald Trump's revised travel ban, Democratic attorneys general are trying to use the court system to thwart the executive branch in the same way their GOP counterparts did under President Barack Obama.

Washington state Attorney General Bob Ferguson said Thursday he was asking a federal judge to find that his order last month halting the old travel ban applies to the new one, too.

Ferguson's action came a day after Hawaii launched its own lawsuit. Washington, Minnesota, Oregon, New York and Massachusetts planned to file a new complaint challenging the revised travel ban Monday.

"My message to President Trump is: Not so fast," Ferguson said.

Did you ever wonder? Samson's wedding feast

t the time of Samson, the Philistines ruled Israel. Let's review who the Philistines were. When we first learn of the Philis-

L tines, they were a seafaring people of Aegean and Greek descent. They had settled on the Mediterranean coast of what is now Israel. They were a very fierce tribe of people.

The names Philistine and Palestine are probably a combination of Egyptian and Hebrew. It means "rolling or migratory," from their seafaring origin. The land the Philistines had conquered is roughly modern Gaza, and adjoins Egypt's northern border.

When we hear of them next, they soundly whipped some of the Hebrew

people who tried to escape the slavery of Egypt before God arranged the Exodus.

By the time of the Judges of Israel, the Philistines had grown into a large and powerful body of people. They became more or less grouped with the Canaanite tribes.

As a young man, Samson traveled to the Philistine city of Timnah, and he was attracted to a young Philistine woman. He asked his parents to make the necessary wedding arrangements for him.

At that time, brides were more or less purchased from the father. Remember that Jacob worked for

seven years for each of his wives, Leah and Rachael?

Samson's parents understood that he was to be a man of God. They tried to dissuade him from marrying outside the Hebrew family. But Samson was determined.

His parents did not realize that God was stirring up Samson to be a fierce warrior and leader of the Hebrews.

As Samson and his parents traveled to Timnah, Samson was alone by a vineyard. A young lion sprang out from the vines and attacked Samson.

The Spirit of the Lord came upon Samson, and he tore the lion apart with his bare hands. But he did not mention this even to his parents.

In Timnah the bride price was settled and arrangements were made for the wedding to take place the next year.

When he went back the next year for the wedding, Samson turned aside to look at the lion's carcass. Bees had built a nest in the carcass and there was honey.

Samson scooped out some honey with his hands and shared it with his parents, but he still did not tell about the lion.

Samson arranged a seven-day feast before the wedding. Thirty Philistine men were his honored guests. As they ate and drank, Samson boasted that he had a riddle which none could answer. "If you can't answer, you must give me 30 linen garments and 30 sets of clothes." The Philistines agreed.

He replied, "Out of the eater, something to eat; out of the strong, something sweet."

When they had not solved the riddle in three days, the Philistines said to Samson's bride-to-be, "Coax the answer from Samson or we will burn you and your father's household to death."

She cried and begged Samson to trust her and confide the answer to the riddle. Finally on the seventh day he told her the answer.

On the seventh night of the feast, the Philistine men were able to answer, "What is sweeter than honey? What is stronger than a lion?"

Immediately Samson knew he was betrayed, "If you had not plowed with my heifer, you would not have solved my riddle" (Judges 14:14-18 paraphrased).

The Spirit of the Lord came upon him giving him strength. He went to nearby Ashkelon and killed thirty Philistines. Samson gave the garments to the Philistines and left Timnah. His intended wife was given to one of the Philistines who had attended the party.

Reflections: No longer ashamed

ast week Casey Affleck won the Best Actor Oscar for his performance in "Manchester By The Sea." When the movie received numerous Oscar nominations, we decided to

watch it. The movie looked romantic. What could be more romantic than sunrise over the bay, New England houses lining the shore and boats gently resting in the harbor?

But "Manchester By the Sea" is no romance. It is a tragedy that slowly unfolds through flashbacks in the mind of Lee Chandler, the main character played by Affleck, as he wrestles with his brother's death and guardianship of his brother's son.

To fulfill his brother's dying wish, he must move back to Manchesterby-the-Sea, the site of his shame.

As the movie unfolds we eventually learn the depth of Lee Chandler's shame, a shame so deep that he despises himself. His personal sense of shame prevents him from receiving love, acceptance and forgiveness from others. Lee Chandler is incapable of loving or being loved. He is a tortured soul.

The Bible has 198 references to "shame" and to being "ashamed." We first see evidences of shame after Adam and Eve willfully disobey God's command. When God created man and woman, the Bible says, "Adam and his wife were both naked and they felt no shame" (Genesis 2:24). But, after their



sin, they are ashamed and hide themselves from one another and from God.

This is what sin does. We not only feel guilt for our sins, we also experience shame, guilt's more devastating accomplice. This is what happened to Lee Chandler. His shame causes him to hide in Boston, bitter, alone, cynical, and angry. Sadly, in Lee's case, he is not able to overcome his shame to receive the love of others or of God.

God comes looking for us. just as He searched for Adam and Eve who trembled with shame in their hiding place. He comes to remove our shame and restore our relationship to God and to one another. God gently and tenderly clothed them as we clothe our children.

For this reason, God sent His son to search for us and to die for us. Jesus said, "The Son of Man came to seek and to save that which was lost." And Hebrews exhorts us to fix our eyes upon Jesus, "the author and perfecter of faith, who for the joy set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God' (Hebrews 12:2).

All our guilt and all our shame can be removed when we accept God's redemptive love through His Son, Jesus Christ. His sacrifice is greater than our sin. We can again love God, ourselves, and others.

The Lord's desire

atthew 8:1-4, "When he came down from the mountain, great crowds followed him. And behold, a leper came to him and knelt before him, saying, 'Lord, if you will, you can make me clean.' And Jesus stretched out his hand and touched him,

saying, 'I will; be clean.' And immediately his leprosy was cleansed. And Jesus said to him, 'See that you say nothing to anyone, but go, show yourself to the priest and offer the gift that Moses commanded, for a proof to them'" (ESV).

This short episode recorded by Matthew does not go into great detail, but it does present great principles that can be expounded upon through further studies in Scripture. We will consider these principles under the following headings – the leper's need, the Lord's desire, and the cleansing.

The Leper's Need

Leprosy was a general term used to describe all sorts of skin conditions and diseases. You can read all the details about in Leviticus 13 and 14. The hardest part for someone afflicted with this, in my opinion, would be the isolation. Until your skin cleared up, you were considered unclean and required to quarantine yourself so that no one else would be affected. If someone came into contact with you during this period, then they would be unclean also. Therefore most people purposefully avoided lepers.

We are not told how long this man had been afflicted. How long had it been since he had physically felt the touch of another person? What kind of despair would that bring about in someone's life? This man had a need, and he definitely recognized that fact.

We have a need as well. We may all have various physical needs, but everyone has the same spiritual need – to be cleansed from our sins. The Bible uses the metaphor of sin being a stain or blemish, even a dark, crimson blood stain. Romans 3:23, "for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (ESV). Romans 6:23a, "For the wages of sin is death" (ESV). Do you realize your need to be cleansed? Do you ignore the Bible's teaching concerning sin? Do you try to cover up sin in your life? You might be able to hide it from others for a while, but you cannot hide it from God!

The Lord's Desire

The leper makes the statement, "If you will." That word can be translated as "to wish, desire, or will." Jesus does not hesitate. He expresses his desire that the man be healed. What a wonderful thought! We deserve God's wrath, however his desire is to heal us, to deliver us, to save us. 1 Timothy 2:3-6, "This is good, and it is pleasing in the sight of God our Savior, who desires all people to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth. For there is one God, and there is one mediator between God and men, the man Jesus Christ, who gave himself as a ransom for all, which is the testimony given at the proper time" (ESV). God has extended his grace in the person of Jesus. Have you come to him like that leper did?



BERLIN (AP) — Pope Francis says the church must study whether it's possible to ordain married men to minister in remote communities facing priest shortages.

In an interview published Thursday with Germany's Die Zeit, Francis stressed that removing the celibacy rule is not the answer to the Catholic Church's priest shortage. But he expressed an openness to studying whether so-called "viri probati" - or married men of proven faith — could be ordained.

"We must consider if viri probati is a possibility. Then we must determine what tasks they can perform, for and he spent one of his

Brazilian Claudio Hummes, a longtime friend of Francis and former head of the Vatican's office for clergy, is reportedly pressing to allow viri probati in the Amazon, where the church counts around one priest for every 10,000 Catholics.

Francis has shown particular openness to receiving concrete proposals for ordaining married men as well as his own pastoral concern for men who have left ministry to marry.

He has maintained friendship with the Argentine widow of a friend who left the priesthood to marry, Friday mercy missions last year visiting with men who had left ministry to start families. He has also said that while he favors a celibate priesthood, celibacy technically can be up for discussion since it's a discipline of the church, not a dogma. The church allows exceptions to some the rule. Priests in the eastern rite Catholic Church are allowed to

Cardinal be married, as are married Anglican priests who convert to Catholicism.


> But, he pointed out that periods of crisis are an opportunity to grow, saying a believer who doesn't experience that remains "infantile."

Francis also repeated his warning of the dangers of rising populism in western democracies, saying "populism is evil and ends badly as the past century showed." In the interview, Francis also confirmed Colombia was on his travel itinerary for 2017, as well as India and Bangladesh. He ruled out Congo, which had been rumored, but mentioned Egypt as a possibility. Francis also recently said he hoped to visit South Sudan.

The Howard College men's basketball team made their way to Wolfforth, Texas where they met up with the McLennan Highlanders last night to battle for a win in the first round of the Region V Tournament.

With the Highlanders entering this game with a 29-1 record and averaging 90 points per game, the Hawks knew that they needed to play solid defense against the high-scoring McLennan team in order to keep the game under their control. So, that is exactly what they did.

Howard College came out on the court with an intense defensive presence and was able to hold the Highlanders scoreless for the first five minutes of the first half, setting the tone of the game right off the bat.

With under 13 minutes remaining until halftime, Srdjan Budimir knocked down a three pointer to bring the score to 10-2, Hawks lead.

Despite the high momentum and energy the Hawks maintained, the Highlanders would not go half, and they were able to stay on the Hawks' heels. Jake Hutchings, forward for the Hawks, went off scoring five unanswered points to bring the halftime score to 26-22, Hawks.

Hutchings would put the Hawks up by two, followed by a bonus foul against McLennan. This brought Dante Scott, Hawks guard, to the free throw line for two shots with only four seconds remaining in the game. Scott would miss his first shot, but sank the second to ensure the victory over McLennan and advance the Hawks to the second round of the Region

Your two-notrump bid indicates a semibalanced hand of about 16 to 18 high-card points (with a balanced hand you might have opened one notrump originally). It invites partner to continue to three notrump with suitable values

A two-club bid over one notrump would misrepresent both your distribution and high-card values.

2. Two spades. You must let partner know that you have five spades rather than just four. At the same time, by rebidding your spades, you tell partner that you also have at least five clubs, since you would not have opened one club initially with more spades than clubs. Once partner becomes aware of your distribution,

he has numerous options available to him, including bidding or trying for a game in spades or clubs, passing two spades or taking a simple preference back to three clubs.

Thunder beats Spurs, 102-92

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) - Oscar Robertson is the only player ever to have more triple-doubles in a season than Russell Westbrook.

Westbrook had his 31st triple-double of the season to help the Oklahoma City Thunder beat the San Antonio Spurs 102-92 on Thursday night. He had 23 points, 13 rebounds and 13 assists to match Wilt Chamberlain's 1967-68 campaign for the second-most in a season.

Robertson had 41 during the 1961-62 season. Westbrook said he is honored to be among the greats.

"It's a blessing, man," he said. "You come out every night and compete and try to compete at a high level. Whenever you are mentioned with guys like that, it's always a blessing. I don't take it for granted."

Victor Oladipo scored 20 points, and Enes Kanter added 14 points and 10 rebounds to help the Thunder snap a four-game losing streak.

"It means that we're on the right track," Westbrook said. "Obviously, throughout seasons, there's times when you go through adversity. The strongest teams stick together through adversity, and tonight, we were able to stick together." Kawhi Leonard scored 19 points for the Spurs, but he took a hit in the head and neck area on a drive to the hoop by Oladipo in the third quarter, and he didn't play in the fourth quarter. Spurs coach Gregg Popovich was unsure how serious the injury was. "He got hit in the mouth, or in the cheek, or in the head or something," Popovich said. "I'm not sure which. So the trainer thought he should sit."

San Antonio dropped two games behind the Golden State Warriors in the race for the best record in the NBA. The Spurs host the Warriors on Saturday.

Westbrook scored 15 points in the first half, and the Thunder led 56-49 at the break. Pau Gasol had 16 points in the half for the Spurs.

Oladipo hit two 3-pointers and converted a 3-point play during a run that helped the Thunder take a 73-63 lead. Oklahoma City led 82-71 at the end of the third quarter.

Westbrook clinched the triple-double on a rebound with 7:17 to play. He made a 3-pointer with just under six minutes remaining to push the lead to 96-80. An alley-oop pass from Westbrook to Oladipo put the Thunder up 18 with just over three minutes left.

DALLAS (AP) - Tony Romo remained with the Cowboys as the first day of free agency wrapped up Thursday, although the quarterback essentially said goodbye to Dallas fans in a video posted on Twitter.

Romo wasn't released when the NFL opened for business after being told he would be, with reports surfacing hours before players could officially join other teams that the Cowboys were seeking a trade to try to get something for their former 10-year starter.

Not long after news broke that Houston had traded Brock Osweiler to Cleveland, which led to instant speculation that the Texans would target Romo, Dallas' franchise leader in passing yards and touchdowns posted the video from the workout room in his house.

"I just wanted to come to tell you it's been a crazy 48 hours here," Romo said as Bob Dylan's "The Times They Are A-Changin" played in the background. "Me and my family felt the outpouring of support and love from all of you.

"It's been overwhelming and it doesn't go unnoticed. I want to say thank you and we have a lot to think about going forward, but we'll see what happens."

Romo, who turns 37 next month and missed most of the past two seasons with injuries, lost the starting job to rookie Dak Prescott while recovering from a back injury sustained in the preseason.

The four-time Pro Bowler conceded the job to Prescott in November when the Cowboys were on a franchise-record 11-game winning streak, Romo played just one series in a meaningless regular-season finale at Philadelphia, throwing a 3-yard touchdown pass to Terrance Williams.

The Cowboys were the top seed in the NFC at 13-3, but lost to Green Bay in the divisional round despite a fourthquarter rally that cemented Prescott as the quarterback of the present and future

Osweiler's departure leaves fourthyear pro Tom Savage atop the depth chart in Houston. He's followed by Brandon Weeden, one of the backups who couldn't get the job done in Dallas in 2015 when Romo missed 12 games with a twice-broken left collarbone and the Cowboys finished 4-12.

If the Cowboys trade Romo, they take the full \$19.6 million salary cap hit this season, but won't have any dead money next year. With a release, they can spread the cap hit just about in half over two seasons.

Romo was 78-49 as the starter in Dallas, but couldn't match the playoff success of Hall of Famers and multiple Super Bowl winners Roger Staubach and Troy Aikman. He was 2-4 in the postseason, winless on the road and never got the Cowboys to the NFC championship game.

The Cowboys have already started looking for another backup, hosting 15-year veteran Josh McCown on a free-agent visit Wednesday. Vice president of personnel Stephen Jones has said Dallas is interested in re-signing Kellen Moore, who was Romo's backup when he broke his right ankle in a training camp practice and missed the season. Prescott was the No. 3 quarterback before Moore's injury.

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Popovich wouldn't Leonard's injury for his team's winning streak ending at nine games.

"They beat us anyway," he said. "If Kawhi would have played in the fourth, if they would have continued to do what they were doing and we continued to do what we were doing, they would have won anyway. We never make excuses. We got our butts kicked."

Tony Parker, Manu Ginobili and Kyle Anderson sat out for the Spurs. Ginobili rested, Parker had back stiffness and Anderson had a sprained right knee.
