

Suggestion on how To Prepare and **Exhibit Item**

Ear and Head Samples

In selecting crops such as ear corn or grain sorghum heads, it is very essential that the specimens full tops and the length of tops farm products. The first three be taken from the field, Special attention must be given to uniformity, type, purity, color, disease free condition and freedom from insects or weather damage.

Grain Sorghum heads should be harvested with long stems by which they can be hung to dry, The heads should be plump ripe, well filled, good color and have a circumference-length ratio,

size and compactness typical of

the variety, The tips of ears of corn or the heads of grain sorghum should never be clipped. Ear and head samples should be meatly wrapped in paper to retain color and condition until time to set up exhibit. The exhibitor must remember that uncured ears of corn or sorghum heads are not in

market condition and will be scored against very heavily in judging. should be prepared with very fine wrapper leaves. stalks. A bundle, on the other hand, should be prepared with stalks that are of the size usually found in bundles under natural conditions. It is not correct to try to select small tillers from which to wholey prepare bundles. A for-

age bundle although umform, should be as natural as possible, and about 5" in diameter, The exhibitor must remember that a forage bundle or bale is not for seed and the seed must not be mature. Drying should be done in a dry, dark room. Bundle should be carefully wrapped in paper or cloth and handled in

such a way as to avoid loss of leaves and color. Small Grain and Seeds In selecting wheat, oats, barley rye millet or almost any relatively small seeded crop it is a good plan to hand pick the sample which in most shows is a gallon.
