

Food2Kids receives a \$5,000 grant

It's not too controversial a statement to say that kids need to eat.

Thanks to a \$5,000 charitable grant from the Illinoisbased Grainger Foundation, local school kids will be eating a little bit better. Food2Kids Big Spring Inc., the recipient of the grant, will use the funds to provide food during weekends to needy kids who rely on school-provided lunches Monday through Friday.

"This grant will be used to purchase more food for the children in area schools supported by Food2Kids Big Spring Inc.," said Muffet Bomar, president of the board of directors of the local Food2Kids group. "These programs currently serve five schools in Big Spring and distribute approximately 300 sacks a week to local children. This represents a significant and ongoing need. We are grateful to the Grainger Foundation for its generosity."

Trump tax plan leaves Congress, Ryan with heavy lift

Associated Press WASHINGTON (AP) — President Donald Trump's plan to overhaul the U.S. tax code leaves much of the heavy lifting to Congress, while ignoring years of hard work by the guy who will have to do a lot of that lifting: House Speaker Paul Ryan.

The one-page pro-



posal outlined by the Trump administration Wednesday has something for everyone massive tax cuts for businesses and a bigger standard tax deduction for middle-income families, lower investment taxes for the wealthy, and an end to the federal estate tax for the superrich — like the president and his family.

The changes to the tax code are the most concrete guidance so far on Trump's vision for spurring job growth and fulfilling his promise to

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"That's the heavy lift," said Rep. Dave Brat, R-Va.

Rep. Chris Collins, R-N.Y., said, "There's no question, when you lower the marginal rates, you're going to have to take away a lot of the deductions."

Which ones? "We have to have that discussion," Collins said.

Ryan and fellow House Republicans have been working for years on a plan that tries to lower tax rates for businesses and individuals without adding to the debt. Tax policy has been at the forefront for Ryan, a believer in supplyside economic theory who has served as the chairman of the powerful Ways and Means and Budget committees.

Trump's plan to cut

against the proposed tax, saying it would lead to higher prices for consumer goods. Exporters, who would be exempt from the tax, love it. Ryan maintains it would help make American businesses more competitive. Treasury Secretary Steve Mnuchin said of the tax: "We don't think it works in its current form." He did say the administration would work with House Republicans to make the new tax more acceptable.

Meanwhile, Trump's plan would cut the top corporate income tax rate from 35 percent to 15 percent. The top tax rate for many small business owners would be reduced from 39.6 percent to 15 percent.

But the plan offers no details on how Trump would offset these massive tax cuts, potentially adding trillions of dollars to the national debt over the next decade. The plan says simply, "Eliminate tax breaks

For individuals and families, Trump's plan more closely resembles a blueprint released by House Republicans last year. The administration wants to reduce the number of tax brackets to three from seven, but it has yet to determine the income levels for people who would be put in each bracket. The top income tax rate would be reduced from 39.6 percent to 35 percent.

"We will be back to you with very firm details," Cohn said.

percent About 70of taxpayers take the standard tax deduction when they file their taxes. Trump's plan would double it to \$24,000 for married couples, which could provide significant tax cuts for low-and middleincome families. But again, it's impossible to know for sure without details about which income levels would be assigned to which tax

by eliminating deductions, exemptions and credits. However, with a higher standard deduction, far fewer taxpayers would itemize their deductions.

7 current, ex-employees of Texas dealership ran crime ring

EL PASO, Texas (AP) – Police in El Paso say seven current and former employees of an auto dealership have been arrested for running a series of illegal schemes that included taking vehicles from the lot and stealing tires.

Authorities said in a news release that managers of a Toyota dealership in El Paso were unaware the seven men were engaged in criminal activity that also included overbilling vendors and operating illegal insurance scams.

The men face charges that include theft and engaging in organized criminal activity. They range in age from 32 to 51 and all live in El Paso.

The investigation by the police department's financial crimes unit began in May when it was determined two vehicles were missing.

At least 1 dead as twin-engine plane crashes into Texas pond

HUNTSVILLE, Texas (AP) – Authorities say one person is dead after a twin-engine airplane crashed into a Central Texas pond after the pilot reported engine trouble and a possible fire.

Sgt. Erik Burse of the Texas Department of Public Safety says the body of the pilot has been recovered from the wreckage near Huntsville, about 60 miles (96 kilometers) north of Houston.

The Federal Aviation Administration says the Cessna 421 crashed around 10:40 a.m. Tuesday. Emergency personnel arrived to find the plane upside-down in the water.

FAA spokesman Lynn Lunsford says officials believe the plane, which records show is capable of carrying at least six people, was flying from Conroe to College Station.

Doctor: George HW Bush dealing with chronic bronchitis

HOUSTON (AP) - A doctor who is treating former President George H.W. Bush says while the nation's 41st president has recovered from pneumonia, he is still dealing with the effects of chronic bronchitis.

In a statement issued Tuesday, Dr. Clint Doerr, a pulmonologist at Houston Methodist Hospital, said he still expects the 92-year-old Bush will be discharged by the end of the week.

HOUSTON (AP) An American woman detained during a business trip to China was convicted of spying and sentenced Tuesday to 3 ¹/₂ years in prison, raising the possibility that she may be allowed to return home soon.

Phan Phan-Gillis has faced an uncertain fate since March 2015, when she disappeared from her group traveling in southern China. She was later accused of espionage, which carries a possible death sentence. A United Nations panel has said her detention violated international norms, and the U.S. has long pressed China to resolve the case fairly.

Her Chinese lawyer Shang Baojun told The Associated Press Wednesday that a deportation order has been issued, and that she should be released "very soon." He said authorities don't usually inform the lawyer of the deportation date.

The U.S. State Department confirmed that she had been sentenced. While Phan-Gillis' trial was closed to the public, a representative from the American Consulate in Guangzhou was allowed to attend the public announcement of the verdict against her, the State Department said.

The Chinese Embassy in Washington did not respond to a message about her case.

Phan-Gillis is of Chinese descent, but was born in Vietnam and is an American citizen who lived in Houston and worked as a business consultant. Known by friends as "Sandy," she made numerous trips to China for business and as a volunteer to promote cultural and business exchanges. She disappeared from the rest of her group during a trip in March 2015 to promote business opportunities in Houston. It took her husband. Jeff Gillis. almost two weeks to confirm through American consular officials that she had been detained by Chinese state secu-

China sometimes releases foreigners as an apparent sign of goodwill. Last year it allowed Kevin Garratt, a Canadian citizen held for two years and accused of spying, to return home after Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau mentioned Garratt to top officials in Beijing.

In Phan-Gillis' case, John Kamm, founder of Dui Hua, credited the Trump administration and particularly Secretary of State Rex Tillerson, who visited Beijing last month. Kamm said he was told by "people who were in the room" that Tillerson pressed Phan-Gillis' case in private meetings.

Texas House orders study before using poison on feral hogs

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Texas Agriculture Commissioner Sid Miller's planned "feral hog apocalypse" won't be happening anytime soon.

That's after the maker of poisoned hog bait pulled its product from use in Texas.

In a Tuesday statement, Miller blamed "lawyers, environmental radicals and the misinformed" for the decision by Scimetrics.

Kaput Feral Hog Bait is laced with warfarin, a blood-thinner that in large doses causes hemorrhaging.

Miller said he respected the company's decision but called it "just another kick in the teeth for rural Texas."

The Texas House had passed a bill calling for more study on controlling feral hog populations with the help of pesticides. The bill is pending in the state Senate.

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He said he couldn't give more details about the spying conviction because "it is related to state secrets," but that

DeVos tours Virginia school to stress needs of military kids

MANASSAS, Virginia (AP) Education Secretary Betsy DeVos on Tuesday highlighted the need to help the children of military families transition into new schools as their parents are moving

from one assignment to the next. DeVos visited Ashland Elementary School Manassas, in Virginia,

mark the Month of the Military

Child. During a tour of the school she read a book to children about a mother who serves in the military.

She donned a pair of toy bifocals like those invented by Benjamin Franklin and watched students refurbish a computer.

During the election cam-President Donald paign, Trump criticized the Obama administration for neglecting U.S. veterans and vowed to improve their care and benefits. DeVos' visit to Ashland highlighted the administration's commitment to veterans.

DeVos said military families need extra support when they relocate to a different city or country and their children must enroll in a new school. The school offers video chats with deployed parents, support groups and community resources.

DeVos praised "the way in which this community has cared for these children who are so often transitioning from school to school and from locale to locale.'

principal Andy School Jacks said parents who are stationed overseas or away from their families need to be certain that their children are doing well in school.

"While they are serving our country and protecting us, we have to be behind them, supporting them all the way so that they never worry about the education of their children," Jacks said. "Being away, especially parents that are being deployed, they are very concerned what's happening back there."

Prince William County school officials said 35 percent of Ashland's student body is connected with the military.

During a roundtable discussion at the school library, one mother at the school, Lt. Colonel Rojan Robotham, raised the issue of making child care available and affordable for families.

Trump's administration has proposed major budget cuts that would eliminate several after-school programs targeting mostly low-income families, saying they have proven to be ineffective.

The plan has prompted criticism from teacher unions and other groups.

with a military schedule," Robotham told DeVos. "So I am hoping if not yourself or Ivanka Trump - somebodytakes it on and really solves it for us. 'cause it's a need."

"I hear that," DeVos answered.

Sr. Master Sgt. Sam Look said that enlisted and junior personnel may not always afford to settle in affluent neighborhoods with good public schools, so it is important to have school-choice options.

"This school is a complete blessing, but not all schools that we have to go to as we transition from base to base are this good," Look said. "When we don't have choices. when you can't afford to put your kids in a better schools or live in better neighborhoods, that becomes problematic."

But proponents of public schools worry that giving taxpayer money to charter and private schools will defund traditional public schools.

Outside the school, DeVos was greeted by a small group of protesters holding signs, "We (love) public education" and "Vouchers only help the rich." Nearby, several other activists showed up to support her.

Railroad companies: Don't take prom pics, selfies on tracks

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) - Transportation officials and railroad companies are sounding a warning: Active railroad tracks are a bad backdrop for prom pictures or selfies.

With the season for graduations and prom portraits underway, North Carolina's transportation and public school agencies this month are urging high school yearbook staff advisers to reject student photos taken on or near railroad tracks.

They're emphasizing that railroad selfies can be as dangerous as stopping for a snap in the middle of an interstate or airport runway.

"You put your life at risk by trespassing on railroad tracks," said Paul Worley, the rail division director at North Carolina's Transportation Department. "We photographers, need school administrators and parents to educate students about the potential danger of taking photos on railroad tracks." North Carolina officials say 21 people were killed while trespassing on railroad tracks last year, but none of the deaths was due to risky photography, said Margaret Cannell, head of the North Carolina division of the railroadbacked safety group Operation Lifesaver. Railroad tracks are private property and walking on or hanging around them can be dangerous, Cannell said.

"People expect a train to be really loud, but they're quieter than ever before," The News & Observer of Raleigh quoted Cannell as say ing. "So you won't al ways hear a train approaching."

Nationwide, 511 people died last year while trespassing on railroad tracks, a 13 percent increase over 2015, Operation Lifesaver said.

A 19-year-old Texas woman was killed by a train last month while having photos taken of her on the tracks in a bid to launch a modeling career.

Fredzania Thompson stepped out of the way of an approaching train about 60 miles (about 100 kilometers) northwest of Houston, but she was struck when she stepped into the path of a second train coming in the opposite direction, authorities said. Trying to drive home the message, Omaha, Nebraska-based railroad Union Pacific this spring extended its campaign to steer people away from railroad tracks with a series of animated videos about the potential dangers. The short videos highlight the risks of taking a selfie on railroad tracks or posing for high school senior pictures on or near train tracks. The videos are designed to be easily shared on Twitter, Facebook, YouTube and other social media sites.

Trump signed an executive order Wednesday that aims to reduce the federal government's role in K-12 education.

Trump is giving Education Secretary Betsy DeVos just short of a year -300 days - to identify areas where Washington has overstepped its legal authority in education, and modify and repeal regulations and guidance from her department, if necessary. A report will be returned to the White House and eventually made public, officials said.

complained Trump that the government over the years has forced states and schools to comply with "federal whims." He said the order will help restore local control over education. "We know that local communities do it best and know it best," Trump said, surrounded by governors, members of Congress and teachers. "The time has come to empower parents and teachers to make the decisions that help their students achieve success." Republicans have long chafed at federal government involvement in education, asserting that states and local governments, school boards and parents are best positioned to decide what students learn. 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
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

Spurs, Raptors try to move on to second-round showdowns

LeBron James and the champs are ready for their next challenger. James Harden and the Rockets are getting revved up in Texas.

With their opponents waiting, Toronto and San Antonio will try to set up a pair of second-round showdowns in the two Game 6s on the schedule Thursday night.

The Raptors can finish off the Milwaukee Bucks and move on to a rematch with the Cleveland Cavaliers, while the Spurs can knock out the Memphis Grizzlies and secure a Lone Star State tussle with the Rockets.

Gregg Popovich and the Spurs value rest as much as any organization, and there won't be much if they lose Thursday and are forced to play a Game 7 back home on Saturday night. They would then host the Rockets in Game 1 on Monday night, a short turnaround before having to chase Houston's shooters all over the perimeter.

So the Spurs will be driven to get their elusive first victory in Memphis this season.

"They're coming to kill us. They're trying to put us out of our misery," Grizzlies coach David Fizdale said. "If you don't know anything about them, they're killers. So we understand that, but we also have to come out with a mentality to impose our will on the game."

Game 1 of the Eastern Conference semifinals in Cleveland also is Monday, and the Cavaliers will get plenty of over the last three years, with rest after sweeping Indiana in the first round. The Raptors were already on fumes by the time they faced the Cavaliers in last year's East finals after having to go seven games in the first two rounds, so would love to make things a little easier on themselves now.

"It's something that is in our minds, going on the road and understanding how they may feel and we've got go out there and really treat it like a Game 7," All-Star guard DeMar DeRozan said. "I hate to keep saying that over and over again, but that is the only way we can treat it because that's how they are going to treat it."

The Raptors are 0-3 in Game 6 with a chance to win a series all the losses on the road. If Milwaukee wins Thursday, Game 7 in Toronto would be Saturday.

A look at the two game on Thursday:

Raptors at Bucks, Toronto leads 3-2. Game 6, 7 p.m., TNT.

NEED TO KNOW: Toronto has won two straight after getting blown out in Game 3, in large part because of the emergence of Norman Powell, who scored a career playoff-high 25 points in Game 5. The 6-foot-4 guard has also added athleticism since joining the starting lineup in Game 4 to help handle the transition-happy Bucks. Milwaukee is on the brink of elimination and the Raptors will be tough to beat if they get another strong night from complementary players Powell and Serge Ibaka.

KEEP AN EYE ON: The opening five minutes. The last three games have been won by the team that has set an early tone. The Bucks will get an energy boost from playing at home, though the more playoff-tested Raptors have proven that they can slow down their more athletic opponent at the Bradley Center. Coach Jason Kidd's young team must find a way to be aggressive early without getting sloppy.

Comeback Kid: Brantley drives in 3; Indians beat Astros 7-6

CLEVELAND (AP) - Michael Brantley missed Cleveland's run to the World Series.

So it's understandable why he's enjoying his comeback from shoulder problems that forced him to miss most of last season.

Brantley drove in three runs and the Indians defeated the Houston Astros 7-6 on Wednesday night.

"I'm excited to be out there with my teammates and help them," he said. "Watching from the sidelines, it was tough last year but being out there every day and having fun with the boys and playing baseball again, it's all I could ask."

Brantley, who played in only 11 games last season after having two operations on his left shoulder, had an RBI double in Cleveland's three-run first inning and added a two-run single in the fifth.

"He's such an unheralded player,' Houston manager A.J. Hinch said. "After missing most of last year, getting Brantley back is like signing a middleof-the-order bat as a free agent. Just an all-around good hitter."





Carlos Santana had a two-run double in the sixth for the Indians, who have won six of eight.

Trevor Bauer (2-2) allowed four runs in six innings and won his second straight start despite giving up tworun homers to Evan Gattis and Brian McCann. The right-hander is 6-0 in six career starts against Houston.

Cleveland's Andrew Miller worked out of a bases-loaded jam in the seventh by striking out Carlos Correa and Mc Cann.

Houston scored two in the eighth off Bryan Shaw, but Cody Allen recorded the final four outs for his fourth save.

Lance McCullers (2-1) gave up five runs in five innings for Houston, which has still won 10 of 13.

Hinch decided to hold Jose Altuve out of the lineup after his star second baseman collided with teammate Teoscar Hernandez on Tuesday.

Brantley injured his shoulder late in the 2015 season and had surgery for a torn labrum. He returned a month into last season, but the shoulder soreness persisted and he didn't play after May

After repeated minor league rehab appearances were cut short, Brantley had biceps tendinitis surgery in August.

Brantley finished third in the AL MVP voting in 2014 and was fourth in the league's batting race the following season. He's batting .318 with four homers and 15 RBIs in 17 games.

"Getting him back in name is one thing but getting him back as the player he was, that's pretty impressive on his part," Indians manager Terry Francona said.

Run-scoring doubles by Brantley and Jose Ramirez and a sacrifice fly by Edwin Encarnacion sparked Cleveland's first.

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) - Delino DeShields provided a spark at the top of the lineup. Ryan Rua and Shin-Soo Choo topped off a big finish with some late long balls.

Rua hit his first career grand slam and Choo connected for a three-run homer in Texas' eight-run eighth, leading the Rangers to a 14-3 rout against the Minnesota Twins on Wednesday night.

Before the game got out of hand, the Rangers went ahead to stay when Joey Gallo took a couple of hits on a tiebreaking trip around the bases.

"That was a pretty weird sequence but I'll take it," Gallo said. "And take the lead, that's nice."

Gallo was hit by a pitch leading off the sixth against Taylor Rogers (1-1). The young Texas slugger scored on a wild pitch by another reliever to make it 3-2, and was struck on the back of the right shoulder by catcher Chris Gimenez's throw after the ball ricocheted hard off the brick backstop.

Elvis Andrus added a two-run single and eventually scored on a passed ball in Texas' four-run sixth, which included only two hits.

"We've been searching for runs,' manager Jeff Banister said. "Prior to later innings, we'd only had two hits with runners in scoring position. But with that, guys continued to grind through. ... I think they were really rewarded late with the approaches that they've had."

DeShields, in the leadoff spot for only the second time this season

was 2 for 3 with three walks, three runs scored, two stolen bases and an RBI.

Texas, after falling behind 2-0 on Eduardo Escobar's homer in the second off Cole Hamels, set season highs with 14 runs and 14 hits. Rougned Odor's two-run single in the fifth tied the game.

"We kind of danced around there early," Twins manager Paul Molitor said. "Odor got them going with the big two-out single, and we just couldn't push the right buttons after that."

Hamels (2-0) allowed three runs and seven hits over 6 2/3 innings.

Twins starter Hector Santiago, a day after his grandmother died and before going on MLB's bereavement list, threw a season-high 104 pitches over five innings. The lefty allowed two runs and six hits, struck out six and walked four.

"I talked to him after the game, praised him for the effort he gave us," Molitor said. "You know it's got to be on your mind."

Santiago said he spent a lot of time over the last couple of days talking with family to set up his grandmoth er's funeral, which will be Sunday.

"Trying to get everybody over the hump, and trying to have a better day," he said. "But it wasn't too bad. Today, I wasn't as efficient as I wanted to be. I threw some good pitches that guys laid off of."

Parent's Corner Seeing past the clouds

ack in 1986, I was in Hawaii and toured the USS Arizona Memorial at Pearl Harbor. I was in awe as I looked upon the scene before me, and remembered what had happened that day, Dec. 7, 1941, when the Japanese attacked and destroyed our fleet there.

I later read an account entitled, "Reflections on Pearl Harbor" by Admiral Chester Nimitz. He said he was attending a concert in Washington, DC and was paged to a phone call from President Franklin Delano Roosevelt,

who informed him that he had been named the Commander of the Pacific Fleet. Admiral Nimitz left immediately and prepared to go to Hawaii to assume his new command. He landed at Pearl Harbor on Christmas Eve, 1941, and found, to his dismay, a spirit of total despair, dejection, and defeat.

The next morning, Christmas Day 1941, he was given a boat


tour of the destruction wrought on Pearl Harbor by the Japanese. Big sunken battleships and Navy vessels cluttered the waters in every direction.

As the tour boat returned to dock, the young helmsman of the boat looked at him and asked, "Well Admiral, what do you think after seeing all this destruction?" Admiral Nimitz's reply shocked everyone within the sound of his voice when he said, "Either the Japanese made three of the biggest mistakes an attack force could ever make, or God was taking care of America. Which do you think it was?"

Shocked and surprised, the young helmsman asked, "What do mean by saying the Japanese made the three biggest mistakes an attack force ever made?" Nimitz explained: "Mistake number one: The Japanese attacked on Sunday morning. Nine out of every ten crewmen of those ships were ashore on leave. If those same ships had been lured to sea, and been sunk,

we would have lost 38,000 men instead of 3,800.

"Mistake number two: When the Japa nese saw all those battleships lined in a row, they got so carried away

sinking them they never once bombed our dry docks opposite those ships. If they had destroyed our dry docks, we would have had to tow every one of those ships to America to be repaired. As it is now, the ships are in shallow water and can be raised. One tug can pull them over to the dry docks, and we can have them repaired and at sea by the time we could have towed them to America. And I already have crews ashore anxious to man those ships.

"Mistake number three: Every drop of fuel in the Pacific theater of war is in top of the ground tanks five miles away over that hill. One attack plane could have strafed those tanks and destroyed our fuel supply. That's why I say the Japanese made three of the biggest mistakes an attack force could make or God was taking care of America."

I'll always remember what I read in that book. It is still an inspiration. Did you know that Admiral Nimitz was a Texan, born and raised in Fredericksburg, Texas; he was an optimist and able to see a silver lining in a situation and circumstance where everyone else saw only despair and defeatism. President Roosevelt had chosen the right man for the right job.

We desperately needed a leader that could see silver linings in the midst of the clouds of dejection, despair and defeat. Today, we are experiencing some of these same kinds of feelings and we must rally our positive thoughts and emotions, and never forget that there is a reason that our national motto is: IN GOD WE TRUST.
