Three people have been arrested on warrants related to the case of the recent death of a 12-year-old who was killed when a stolen gun discharged while several stolen firearms were being unloaded from a vehicle.

The Howard County Sheriff's Office issued four warrants and made three arrests in the case of Jose Hernandez,

12, who was fatally struck by a bullet fragment during the illegal activity.

included around 28 stolen guns among other property, according to Sheriff Stan Parker at a press conference held earlier this week. In a press conference held

Tuesday, Parker said the Hernandez was killed after a gun being offloaded from a truck fired going through the tailgate. Fragments struck Hernandez and a second person. Hernandez was previously reported as a runaway

to the Big Spring Police Department and was believed to be living with one of the suspects involved with the crime, Parker said.

"Due to the complexity of this investigation, we are awaiting for final autopsy and forensic lab reports," stated the news release. "Once we receive this information we will complete the case and

Run for the Wall arrives Saturday

The roar of military veterans, friends, and family riding motorcycles will be coming into town Saturday morning when participants in the southern route of the 2017 Run for the Wall makes a brief stop in Big Spring.

An estimated 700 to motorcyclists and their entourage are expected to arrive around 10 a.m. Saturday for a wreath laying ceremony at the Big Spring Vietnam Memorial. The memorial is located behind the SouthWest Collegiate Institute for the Deaf campus.

The public is encouraged to come out and welcome the convoy as they make their annual journey east toward Washington D.C. to participate in Memorial Day ceremonies on May 29.

The mission of Run for the Wall is to bring awareness of prisoners of war and missing in action military personal from all wars. Participants began the route in Ontario, Calif., on May 13. Once in Washington D.C., many of the riders will join the Rolling Thunder parade, a caravan of motorcycles that will ride slowly from the parking lot of the Pentagon, crossing the Memorial Bridge to the Vietnam Wall. Rolling Thunder is an advocacy group to bring full accountability for prisoners of war and missing in action service military members for

all U.S. Wars. Local Vietnam era veteran Jerry Groves took the trip with Run for the Wall in 2014 after several years helping to organize the local stop

Trump, dogged by questions at home, makes first trip abroad

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Donald Trump's maiden international trip, a five-stop marathon across the Middle East and Europe, has long loomed as a crucial first test abroad for the president.

That was before he fired his FBI director — and the chain reaction of scandal that followed.

Now, with the eyes of the world upon him, the president will embark on his big trip carrying the baggage of dire troubles at home. As he tries to calm allies worried about his "America First" message, he'll be followed by fallout from his firing of FBI Director James Comey and the

appointment of a special counsel to probe the president's campaign ties with Russia.

"There has never been a president taking his first international trip being dogged by scandal like this," said Larry Sabato, head of the University of Virginia Center for Politics. "He's already a president viewed skeptically by much of the world. And while the pictures from the trip may be great, the White House can't change the headlines that will follow him wherever he goes."

Trump's trip was always going to be dramatic. U.S. allies have been rattled by his warnings about pulling back from the world.

He is tasked with urging a united front against terror by appealing to some of the same corners of the Muslim world he has tried to keep out of the United States with his travel ban.

Last week, he added new layers of complication by disclosing classified intelligence to a longtime adversary.

Still, the White House once hoped the trip, wrapped in the pomp and circumstance of diplomatic protocol, could offer a chance at a reset after a tumultuous first four months in office.

Trump's advisers saw it as an opportunity for the United States to boldly reassert itself on the world stage and resume a leadership role that the administration believes was abdicated by President Barack Obama.

Trump's powerful senior adviser, his son-in-law Jared Kushner, led a West Wing team to craft the agenda, laden with religious symbolism.

Still, Trump hasn't been eager to seize the opportunity. It's been more than a half-century since any president waited as long to take his first foreign trip.

The itinerary, which begins Saturday in Saudi Arabia, is a startlingly ambitious excursion for a president who dislikes travel and has displayed a shaky grasp of foreign affairs.

He tweeted Friday morning: "Getting ready for my big foreign trip. Will be strongly protecting American interests - that's what I like to

Each stop comes with high stakes. In Saudi Arabia, the president whose campaign was marked by heated anti-Muslim rhetoric and whose administration has tried to enact a travel ban from several Muslim-majority countries — will deliver a speech to the Islamic world meant to be a clear contrast with the vision Obama laid out in his first trip to the region.

In Israel, Trump will meet with Israel Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, looking to smooth over fresh tensions.

Israel was in an uproar earlier this week after U.S. officials confirmed Trump shared highly classified intelligence about the Islamic State group with senior Russian officials visiting the White House.

The information, about an IS threat related to the use of laptops on aircraft, came from Israel and there were concerns a valuable Israeli asset could be in danger, a U.S. official said, requesting anonymity to discuss the sensitive material.

National Security Adviser H.R. McMaster added to the alarm by refusing to declare the Western Wall a part of Israel. U.S. policy holds that ownership of the holiest site where Jews can pray, as with the rest of Jerusalem, is subject to Israeli-Palestinian negotiation.

In Rome, the president will call upon Pope Francis, the popular, liberal-minded pontiff. Trump denounced Francis during the campaign, calling him "disgraceful" for questioning his faith.

In Brussels, Trump will attend a meeting of NATO, the World War II-era alliance which Trump has repeatedly mused about abandoning because member states weren't paying their fair share. He recently has shifted to reassure wary allies that he remains committed to the pact.

And in Sicily, the president will meet with the other leaders of the G7, a gathering of Western economic powers. Key parts of the group are unsettled by Trump's unpredictability and his willingness to cheer on nationalist sentiment.

Trump's itinerary is heavy with religious symbolism. He'll visit the birthplace of Islam, the Jewish homeland and the Vatican. Officials say the message is "unity."

"He strongly believes that it is the strength of the faith of people in these religions that will stand up and ultimately be victorious over these forces of terrorism," Secretary of State Rex Tillerson

Administration officials believe the unexpected move of going to Saudi Arabia first was meant to underscore the seriousness of the United States' commitment to fighting extremist groups like the Islamic State.

Trump, whose denunciations of Iran have been welcomed by the Saudis, wants to frame the conflict not as one between the West and Islam, but simply between good and evil, according to his aides.

While some Middle East leaders will likely greet Trump warmly, he could receive a far cooler reception in Europe. Though Pope Francis has said he'd "never make a judgment about a person without hearing him out," others on the continent have sharply criticized Trump.

That includes France's newly elected President Emmanuel Macron, who denounced Trump's musings on abandoning the Paris climate treaty, a likely point of contention in Sicily.

Trump's inauguration sparked thousands of protesters to fill the streets of several European capitals, chaotic scenes that could be repeated during his stops in Rome, Brussels and Sicily.

"Welcome to the White House abroad," said Ari Fleischer, President George W. Bush's former press secretary.

"This is a great opportunity for the president to change the subject, to make real news. But the downside is that it could be dominated by domestic-style questions. ... Every first trip is over-scrutinized. The whole world is watch-

Groves said. "People need to support the Vietnam veterans. There was a time when being in the military was not a good thing. We need to support them and we need to support all veterans, especially this time of year because Memorial Day is set aside for those who gave their life for this country."

Seeing the Vietnam Wall for the first time brought up a wave of mixed emotions, Groves said.

"I have two friends on that wall," he said. "It got really close. If you go to that wall and you have a name on that wall and you can't get emotional about

that, there is something wrong with you or you're dead."

Remembering those fallen friends is what Memorial Day is all about, he

"That's exactly why we do this every year, to remember not only the men and women who were killed in Vietnam but also the men and woman who gave their life for our freedom from the Revolutionary War all the way to today and what is happening now. It's all encompassing."

On Saturday, the public is asked to park either on the north side parking lot of the Big Spring Memorial or in the vacant lot across from the memorial. The public is asked not to park on the street to allow the motorcycle caravan access to the memorial.

further charges relating to the death of Hernandez will be filed with the District Attorney's Office."

The three individuals who have been arrested are Christopher Andrew Yanez, 24; Cindy Machado Lopez, 20; and Cody Alan Wingo, 28. All three were arrested on warrants for firearm smuggling with three or more firearms. One other suspect, Kimberly Kay Carson, 31, has been issued a warrant, but has yet to be located.

Firearm smuggling of more than three firearms can be charged as a *bigspring*second degree felony. If convicted, the suspects involved could potentially

receive up to 20 years in prison and a fine up to \$10,000.



Angels unaware ast week we drove my old pickup from Still nothing.

Colorado to Texas. My daughter learned to drive on the truck when she was 16. She is now grown, married, and the mother of three children. It has hauled and towed "stuff" to and from Minnesota, Montana, Colorado, South

Dakota, and Georgia. We are still using it, 155,000 miles and going strong, or so we thought.

We stopped in Amarillo at a truck stop for the usual: gas, snacks, and a bathroom. When we hopped back in the truck, it wouldn't start. The battery was strong and the starter spun the engine, but it would not fire.

So, there we were. Stranded at a fuel pump 450 miles from home on a Saturday morning. I tried to call an auto shop. Most are closed on Saturday, and those that are open are already

busy. Our insurance agreed to send a tow truck. But where should we have them tow us? How long before we could get it fixed? Where would we stay? My wife did what men won't do. She went to other

travelers, especially those who looked like they had seen the underside of a hood, and asked for help. I sat in the driver seat, helpless and confused. Then Rafael showed up, young, bright-eyed and smiling. Rafael did not speak English. I don't speak Span-

ish, except for a few words and phrases that I usually mispronounce. But sign language works where words fall short. He motioned. I opened the hood and cranked on the engine. Nothing. He took an empty water bottle and went around the gas pumps siphoning off the left over gas in each one and tried to prime the engine through the air intake. He then climbed under the truck and banged on the gas tank, trying to shake the fuel pump into action.

He then opened the fuse box under the hood, pushed and prodded on the relays and fuses. I turned the key and the engine sprang into life. Apparently the fuel pump relay had vibrated loose. After a helpless hour and a half, we were back on the road again. I tried to pay Rafael, but he would accept nothing. I tried to thank him with my best Spanish. He was just happy to help. I mentioned "Jesus Cristo" and he beamed. I don't know where Rafael came from. I don't


know where he went. He drove away in a big truck towing a fifth wheel RV. Rafael might not qualify as an angel according to the Bible. But he was an angel to us. It seemed, somehow, God sent him at just the right time. Angels show up throughout the Bible. Our tech-

nological and scientific Western world dismisses them. The book of Hebrews says, "Do not forget to show hospitality to strangers, for by so doing some people have shown hospitality to angels without knowing it" (Hebrews 13:2). I wish we could have shown hospitality to Rafa-

el. Instead, we were the strangers in need, and he helped us. It seemed as if he were God's messenger, or "mechanic," at just the right time in just the right place. Just when we might think that our world is sliding into selfishness, violence and corruption, an angel shows up.

I hope somewhere, someplace, sometime we might qualify as God's "angel" to somebody else, especially someone who doesn't look like us, dress like us or speak our language.

Saul is rejected

aul became a strong king, mighty in battle because God was with him. His son Jonathan was also a valiant warrior. Under their leadership, the Israelites made large gains against the Philistines, and the Hebrews occupied more of the Promised Land. In battles they defeated the Moabites, Ammonites, Edomites, the kings of Zobah, and the Philistines.

As Saul grew in reputation and power, he exhibited the characteristics of a human king as Samuel had warned. He made unwise decisions and demanded that his soldiers obey under penalty of death. He depended on his own knowledge and strength instead of asking the Lord to lead

Samuel brought the word of the Lord to Saul. "I will punish the Amalekites for what they did to Israel when they waylaid the Hebrews who came up from Egypt" (1 Sam 15:2). This was around one hundred years after the Exo-

dus; but the Lord is slow to judge and punish...giving much time for repentance. "Now go, attack the Amalekites and totally destroy everything that belongs to them. Do not spare them; put to death men and women, children and

infants, cattle and sheep, camels and donkeys"

FILLER

(1Sam 15:3). God's judgment on the Amalekites was total destruction! However, following his own wisdom, Saul spared Agag, the Amalekite king, and the best of the livestock. And Saul set up an image of himself in Car-

mel, by the Mediterranean Sea near Lebanon. The word of the Lord came to Samuel, "I am grieved that I have made Saul king, because he has turned away from me and has not carried out my

When Samuel came to Saul, Saul was very pleased with himself. He greeted Samuel, "The Lord bless you! I have carried out the Lord's instructions." Samuel answered, "What then is this bleating of sheep in my ears? What is this lowing of cattle that I hear?" (1Sam 15:13,14).

Saul tried to place the blame on his soldiers, but Samuel would hear none of it!

Saul had fought the battle and did some of what God had said. He had planned to sacrifice the animals to the Lord. Saul considered that good enough!

1 Samuel 15:22-23 states a very poignant precedent that most of us read but do not take to heart... we read right across it!

"Does the Lord delight in burnt offerings and sacrifices as much as in obeying the voice of the Lord? To obey is better than sacrifice, and to heed is better than the fat of rams. For rebellion is like the sin of divination (fortune telling) and arrogance (selfesteem) like the evil of idolatry."

God asks us to love Him. He waits so patiently, even though we run thoughtlessly out in the world. We take it lightly when we knowingly fail to do what He asks. We turn to our Sovereign God saying, "I am sorry." Then a month or even a week later we do the same thing again! This shows we were insincere.

This passage is telling us to study our Bible so that we know what the Lord our God has asked of those who want to be His people. Too many of us only want to be His people on Judgment Day! While we live in this world, we pretend we are gods and do our own will as Saul did.

Samuel said, "You have rejected the word of the Lord, and the Lord has rejected you as king over Israel!" Then Samuel slew Agag as God had ordered. Saul paid a heavy price for his arrogance and selfwill. What will we pay?

Faith allows us to touch Christ's hem

who had suffered from a discharge of blood for twelve years came up behind him and touched the fringe of his garment, for she said to herself, 'If I only touch his garment,

I will be made well.' Jesus turned, and seeing her he said, 'Take heart, daughter; your faith has made you well.' And instantly the woman was made well" (ESV). I would encourage you to read the parallel passages (Mark 5:25-34; Luke 8:43-48) since they give us some additional background to this woman and her affliction.

I am reminded of the leper at the beginning of Matthew 8. When we discussed that passage, we noted that,

under the Law of Moses, that man would not have experienced physical contact with another person (without making that person unclean) for the entire time he showed evidence of leprosy. This woman would be in a similar situation (Leviticus 15:25-30).

Try to imagine the isolation. With the leper, his

atthew 9:20-22, "And behold, a woman affliction was outwardly displayed and more noticeable to others. With this woman, maybe she had tried to hide it so that others would think that everything was "normal" with her.

Sin does the same thing to people – it isolates us. Some sins are more easily discerned by others and some sins are more easily concealed from others. Sin will eat away at the conscience (if it hasn't been completely hardened), and often will drive us away from the ones we love because of our guilt. Others may deny sin altogether and continue as if nothing is wrong. Ultimately, however, we must acknowledge our sins and come to an understanding of the consequences of our sins which is isolation, or separation, from God.

In Mark's account, he tells us that the woman had been to many doctors and had spent all her money trying to get better. People do the same with the effects (symptoms) which come about on account of sin and guilt. Some people self-medicate – turning to alcohol or drugs to try to escape the hurt, frustration, or anger that they feel. Some people go to doctors and psychologists/psychiatrists for antidepressants or other prescriptions to try and cope.

I am not dismissing that there are legitimate

times when these may be necessary (not the alcohol and drugs part!), however, the root of many of people's problems may be that they have issues. They are bleeding to death spiritually and may never even realize it. The emptiness in their heart, the guilt in their conscience, and the sickness in their soul can only be healed by the Great Physician – Jesus Christ!

And just like with this woman, there is something to do; there is action to be taken. Jesus told her that her faith is what made her well. Of course we know that Jesus healed her, but her faith (believing the evidence and trusting in the power of Jesus which led her to take action) allowed her to access the healing that was available nowhere else.

It is the same for us today. Believe the evidence that we have in God's word. Put your trust in the power and the promises of God. Let those things drive you into action to obey the commands of Jesus that we find in the Bible. You cannot save/heal yourself. It is only through faithful obedience that we are saved by God's grace.

Pope embraces Huntington's afflicted in bid to end stigma

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope Francis embraced weeping mothers, fathers and children with Huntington's Disease on Thursday as he sought to remove the stigma of an incurable genetic disorder that causes such devastating physical and psychiatric effects that its sufferers are often shunned and abandoned.

One by one, Francis blessed and greeted each of the 150 people with Huntington's, as well as their family members and caregivers, who traveled from around the world for the hour-long audience in the Vatican audience hall. Organizers said the meeting marked the first time a world leader had recognized the plight of those who suffer from Huntington's.

"May none of you ever feel you are alone," Francis told the crowd of about 1,700. "May none of you feel you are a burden. May no one feel the need to run away."

"You are precious in the eyes of God. You are precious in the eyes of the church."

Many of the families came from South America, where Huntington's is 1,000 times more prevalent than in the rest of the world. It is particularly prevalent in Venezuela, where the

affected gene was first identified 25 years ago and where the stigma has led to such isolation that carriers have intermarried for generations, leading to greater numbers of sick.

One Colombian woman in the front row, Dilia, has had four of her 11 children die of Huntington's, while four others are sick with it. Brenda, a 15-year old from Francis' native Buenos Aires, was up on the stage and got a special hug from the pope. The

teen's father died from Huntington's-related ailments, and Brenda was abandoned by her mother when she herself was diagnosed.

The disease causes cells in parts of the brain to die, resulting over time in involuntary movements, personality and mood changes and slurred speech. Many people suffer from psychiatric problems, including depression and anxiety.

Often the social stigma and superstition associated with Huntington's forces families to keep their relatives hidden — isolation that then can be compounded by poverty and discrimination. In some parts of Latin America, sufferers are thought to be possessed by the devil.

Organizers said the audience marked the start of a global awareness campaign, "Hidden No More," which aims to also encourage scientific research into the disease, which has no treatment or cure. The catalyst for the audience with the pope was Elena Cattaneo, an Italian researcher and senator for life, who in June of 2016 wrote to Francis asking that he meet with a single Huntington's sufferer, to serve as a representative for the global Huntington's community.

The response from the Vatican was to ask why only one, when so many people suffer, she said.



This Date In History Today is Friday, May 19, the

139th day of 2017. There are 226 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History:

On May 19, 1927, the silent movie "Wings," a World War I drama starring Clara Bow, Charles "Buddy" Rogers and Richard Arlen, had its world premiere in San Antonio, Texas, where it had been filmed. ("Wings" would go on to win the first Academy Award for best picture.)

On this date:

In 1536, Anne Boleyn, the second wife of England's King Henry VIII, was beheaded after being convicted of adultery. In 1780, a mysterious dark-

ness enveloped much of New England and part of Canada in the early afternoon. In 1913, California Gov. Hiram Johnson signed the Webb-Hartley Law prohibiting

"aliens ineligible to citizenship" from owning farm land, a measure targeting Asian immigrants. particularly Japanese. In 1935, T.E. Lawrence, also known as "Lawrence of Arabia,"

died in Dorset, England, six days after being injured in a motorcycle crash.

In 1943, in his second wartime address to the U.S.

Congress, British Prime Minister Winston Churchill pledged his country's full support in the fight against Japan. In 1958, British actor Ronald

California, at age 67. In 1962, actress Marilyn Monroe sang "Happy Birthday to You" to President John F. Kennedy during a Democratic

fundraiser at New York's

Colman died in Santa Barbara,

Madison Square Garden. In 1967, the Soviet Union ratified a treaty banning nuclear and other weapons from outer space as well as celestial bodies such as the moon. (The treaty entered into force in Oct. 1967.)

In 1977, in what became known as the "Girl in the Box" case, 20-year-old Colleen Stan, hitchhiking her way to a party in northern California, was abducted by a couple she'd accepted a ride from and imprisoned as a sex slave for the next seven years.

In 1981, five British soldiers were killed by an Irish Republican Army landmine in County Armagh, Northern Ireland.

In 1992, in a case that drew much notoriety, Mary Jo Buttafuoco (buh-tuh-FYOO'koh) of Massapequa, New York, was shot and seriously wounded by her husband Joey's teenage lover, Amy Fisher. Vice President Dan Quayle sparked controversy by publicly criticizing the CBS sitcom "Murphy


Brown" for having its title character, played by Candice Bergen, decide to become a single mother.

In 1994, former first lady Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis died in New York at age 64.

Ten years ago: Group of Eight financial officials wrapped up two days of talks in Germany by calling for more aid, increased debt relief and responsible lending to Africa.

President Barack Obama and other G-8 leaders held economic talks at Camp David, where they declared that their governments needed to both spark growth and cut debt. Chen Guangcheng (chehn gwahngchung), a blind Chinese legal activist, was hurriedly taken from a hospital and put on a plane for the United States, closing a nearly monthlong diplomatic tussle that had tested U.S.-China relations.

The Rangers swept through an eight-game home stand against three teams, only their second time in franchise history to do that. Their overall winning streak, which started with an 11-0 win at San Diego on May 9, is the longest in the majors this season.

"We win a couple of games and I think that momentum carried over, and kept carrying over, and you keep winning and winning and you don't want to lose," shortstop Elvis Andrus said. "It's always great when you keep finding a way."

The Rangers have their longest winning streak since 12 in a row in July 2011. The only time they have won more was their team-record 14 straight in May 1991, and their only other eight-game undefeated home stand was in May 2005.

Philadelphia led 2-0 before Robinson Chirinos and Rougned Odor had consecutive two-out RBI singles off reliever Joely Rodriguez (1-2) in the fifth. Rua followed with his third homer, lining a shot that just cleared the 8-foot wall in right field.

Perez (2-5) struck out eight with no walks in seven innings. The Rangers had scored two or fewer runs for the lefty in his previous six starts.
