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Vehicles vandalized by graffiti during the night

sprayed with paint, some with vulgar drawings and words, were posted on the Big Spring Crime Watch Facebook page this morning. According to one resident whose car was vandalized, around four to five vehicles were targeted in the area. The man, who requested to remain anonymous, said the incident occurred sometime last night. A post to the Facebook page stated some buildings were also vandalized.

The Big Spring Police have been notified, according to the resident the Herald spoke with this morning.

"It has grown from a few thousand at the first event to between thirty and fifty thousand people," said Johnson.

This year's lineup is looking to be even bigger than the last, with artists like Ronnie Milsap, Great White, Quiet Riot, and Mark Mc-Kinney already scheduled to headline the

two-day event. Other bands that have been confirmed are Spur 327, Buzzkill, and State Limbo.

An event that draws in crowds this massive takes nearly a year's worth of work and planning to cultivate.

"We start planning a few days after the previous year's event," said Ida Chavira, volunteer and vice-president of the Big Spring Downtown Revitalization Association.

While it's still a little too early to confirm some details of the event, Chavira says they have "good plans" in store for the upcoming event.

Johnson went on to explain how important events like this are in drawing people to the downtown area. The attention that down-

town receives during an event like this helps create interest in what downtown Big Spring has to offer, according to Johnson.

"What we're doing here gets people excited and helps create the environment to make it happen," said Johnson.

In addition to the live music, the event has vendors with unique foods and crafts, as well as carnival-type rides for the Kid-Zone.

The event is free to the public thanks to the sponsors and volunteers who help put it together and is set to take place June 23 through June 24 in downtown Big Spring

Putin denies involvement in hacking, hails Trump

ST.PETERSBURG, Russia (AP) — President Vladimir Putin insisted Thursday that the Russian state has never engaged in hacking and said Moscow will wait out the current political storm in the U.S. to forge constructive relations with President Donald Trump, whom he praised as a straightforward person with a "fresh set of eyes."

The Russian leader acknowledged the possibility that some individual "patriotic" hackers could have mounted some attacks amid the current cold spell in Russia's relations with the West, but scoffed at allegations that hackers could influence the outcome of elections in the United States or Europe. Speaking at a meeting with senior editors of

Astros pound Twins 17-6 to complete sweep

MINNEAPOLIS Carlos Correa stood slack-jawed in the dugout as George Springer rounded the bases a second time Wednesday.

Correa was unable to comprehend the force Springer must have needed to send the second-longest homer in the majors this season into the concourse above the second deck spacious Target Field.

The Minnesota Twins were just as stunned by the power the Astros unleashed throughout the series.

Springer reached base in all six plate appearances and hit two of Houston's season-high six home runs to lead the Astros to their seventh straight victory, 17-6 over the Minnesota Twins on Wednesday.

"I was in shock," Correa said of Springer's second homer, a 473foot moon shot that trails only a 481-footer

Correa, Alex Bregman, Evan Gattis and Marwin Gonzalez also went deep for the Astros, who scored 40 runs in the three-game sweep to set a franchise record. They had 19 hits on Wednesday and 37 in



brings really expensive and nice telescopes out here," said Alton. "Some of the lenses are a foot across. The high dollar telescopes are really fine scopes and you can really see a lot with them. If you've ever taken a pair of binoculars and looked at the moon, it's crazy, but it pales in comparison as to what they are bringing us to look through."

The telescopes will be set up at the State Park Pavilion starting around 8 p.m, although Alton encourages

visitors to arrive early due to limited parking. Depending on the weather, visitors should be able to view the moon, Jupiter, a pass of the Hubble Space Telescope, and for night owls, a viewing of Saturn a little after 10 p.m.

"These deep sky galaxies..it is just mind boggling when you take the time to look," said Alton. "All these weird hues and colors. There is no way you can see them with the naked eye. It's just awesome to look at. It's these folks' passion. That's the cool thing, to educate people about the heavens and to get folks interested."

While the West Texas weather can sometimes be a little finicky, Alton said the party is usually well attend-

"Literally 24 years ago it was so crowded I could barely find enough places for people to park," said Alton. "But it is still a well-attended event. Like any outdoor event, Mother Nature makes it tricky. This is a neat group of people to be coming out this many years. A lot of West Texas nights in the heat of it – they just keep coming. They just love to get more people interested in their love."

While the event is free of charge, donations to the Big Spring State Park are accepted. Flashlights and tennis shoes are also encouraged.

"It is dark so wear tennis shoes," said Alton. "Make sure to bring a flashlight. It is pitch black when you get back to your cars. There also is limited parking so if (visitors) are able to team up and save the number of vehicles, that would be good."

Big Spring State Park's Stargazing party will begin at sunset (8 p.m. or earlier) on Saturday, June 3 at the Big Spring State Park, 1 Scenic Drive. For questions, call 432-263-4931.

"It's a fun family thing," said Alton. "You can bring your kids or your grandkids. For the younger ones, this could spark their interest in science and really take them somewhere.'

leading international news agencies, Putin also alleged that some evidence pointing at Russian hackers' participation in cyberattacks — he didn't specify which — could have been falsified in an attempt to smear Russia.

"I can imagine that some do it deliberately, staging a chain of attacks in such a way as to cast Russia as the origin of such an attack, Putin said. "Modern technologies allow that to be done quite easily.' intelligence U.S.

agencies have accused Russia of hacking into Democratic Party emails, helping President Donald Trump's election victory, and the Congressional and FBI investigations into the Trump campaign's ties with Russia have shattered Moscow's hopes for a detente with Washington.

Putin said the "Russophobic hysteria" makes it "somewhat inconvenient to work with one another or even to talk."

"It's having an impact, and I'm afraid this is one of the goals of those who organize it are pursuing and they can finetune the public sentiments to their liking trying to establish an atmosphere that is going to prevent us from addressing common issues, say with regard to terrorism," the Russian leader said.

Putin said Russia had been encouraged by Trump's campaign statements in which he lamented Russia-U.S. ties being at a historical low and promised to improve them.

He added that Moscow still hopes to forge a constructive dialogue with Trump.

Putin predicted "this will end, sooner or later," adding that "we are patient, we know how to wait and we will wait."

The Russian presi-

dent praised Trump as "a straightforward person, a frank person." Putin added that while some see Trump's lack of political background as a disadvantage, he sees it as beneficial because "he has a fresh set of eyes."

Asked if Russian hackers could try to shape the outcome of German parliamentary elections later this year, Putin said: "We never engaged in that on a state level, and have no intention of doing so."

He noted that Russia can work constructively with any German leader, adding that he had good ties with German Chancellor Angela Merkel despite some differences.

meddling Russian was also a concern in France, with Putin publicly expressing his sympathy for President Emmanuel Macron's rivals in the campaign. Macron's aides claimed in February that Russian groups were interfering with his campaign, and a document leak hit Macron's campaign in the final hours of the French race. Moscow has strongly denied all allegations of election meddling.

Putin argued that hackers, wherever they come from, can't sway election outcomes because the public mood cannot be manipulated that easily.

"I'm deeply convinced that no hackers can radically influence another country's election campaign," he said. "No hackers can influence election campaigns in any country of Europe, Asia or America."

added Putin that while the Russian state has never been involved in hacking, it was "theoretically possible" that Russia-West tensions could have prompted some individuals to launch cyberat-

"Hackers are free peo-

ple, just like artists who wake up in the morning in a good mood and start painting," he said.

"The hackers are the same, they would wake up, read about something going on in interstate relations and if they have patriotic leanings, they may try to add their contribution to the fight against those who speak badly about Russia.

relations Russia's with the West have been at post-Cold War lows over the Ukrainian crisis.

The U.S. and the EU have slapped Moscow with sanctions over its annexation of Ukraine's Crimean Peninsula and support for pro-Russian insurgency in eastern Ukraine.

Putin said Thursday that economic restrictions against Russia have had "zero effect."

He predicted that the current strain in relations will ease, because "it's counterproductive and harmful."

Touching on tensions in the Pacific, Putin said Russia's military deployments on a group of Pacific islands also claimed by Japan have been caused by concerns about the U.S. military buildup in the region.

The four islands, called the Northern Territories in Japan and the southern Kurils in Russia, were seized by the former Soviet Union at the end of the World War II, preventing the two countries from signing a peace treaty.

Putin said the U.S. will likely continue to build up its missile shield in the region even if North Korea agrees to curb its nuclear and missile programs, in the same way it has continued to develop missile defenses in Europe despite a deal with Iran that curbed its nuclear program in exchange for lifting international sanctions.

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Investors press Exxon on disclosure of climate change impact

Investors holding 62 percent of shares voted at the company's annual meeting favored more disclosure around the impact of global policies aimed at limiting global warming to 2 degrees centigrade. The vote is a defeat for Exxon and a victory for environmentalists and shareholder activists, who saw support for their proposal had refused to increase grow from 38 percent a Chairman and CEO

Darren Woods said the matter will be reconsidered by the Exxon board.

The climate-change resolution was submitted by the New York state retirement fund. It asked the company to analyze the impacts on Exxon's oil and gas reserves and resources in case demand for fossil fuels drops because of climate-change policies.

Edward Mason, an official with the Church of England's endowment and a former British diplomat, said Exxon

meaningful disclosure of its vulnerability to climate-related regulation in the face of scientific consensus about the severity of the prob-

Addressing some Exxon directors by name, Mason said, "Members of the board, do you leave your understanding of climate change at the door when you attend Exxon Mobil board meetings?"

Woods said Exxon believes that the risks related to climate change "are serious and warrant action, thoughtful action." But he suggested that the company is already doing enough to protect shareholders by, among other things, assuming a "proxy cost of carbon" when predicting energy demand and planning new projects.

"Our outlook assumes increasingly stringent climate policy," Woods said. "At the same time, it assumes growing energy demand through 2040 including substantial demand for oil and gas ... We are confident in the commercial viability of our portfolio."

Exxon did not disclose the votes of individual shareholders, but both sides had targeted

Attorney General's office earlier this month. Court testimony by city officials say discussions about spending taxpayer money often happen in private. The city's Neighborhood Network program board

decides in private how to award about \$100,000 a year for beautification projects and other improvements. Earlier this year, courts found the program was used to benefit a redistricting measure that would've disenfranchised Hispanic voters.

Investigator: Deadly shooting began when fugitive confronted

DALLAS (AP) — A private investigator says a shooting at a Texas car dealership that left three men dead involved two investigators who had confronted a fugitive wanted in Minnesota on several felony charges.

Stew Peters, a bail investigator with the private Minnesota-based company U.S. Fugitive Recovery and Extradition, said Wednesday the two men had tracked 49-year-old Ramon Michael Hutchinson to a Nissan dealership in Greenville, about 50 miles (80 kilometers) northeast of Dallas.

Peters says Hutchinson had been sought since March when he failed to appear for court in Hennepin County, which includes Minneapolis.

Hutchinson was wanted on charges that included assaulting a law enforcement officer.

He identified Fidel Garcia Jr. as one of the private investigators who was killed. He couldn't confirm the name of the second investigator.

Abbott won't rule out 'bathroom bill in special session

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Texas Gov. Greg Abbott won't rule out including a North Carolina-style "bathroom bill" targeting transgender people if he chooses to call lawmakers back to work for a special legislative session.

Abbott said Wednesday he's still waiting for the state comptroller to certify a budget approved during the regular 140-day session that just concluded.

Abbott said he's still going through hundreds of bills passed by lawmakers as he considers signing some and vetoing others.

The governor says once that's finished, he'll make an announcement "as soon as feasible." He didn't repeat previous assertions that he'd announce a decision later this week.

Asked about reviving the bathroom bill, Abbott replied, "It is premature to say what, if anything, will be on a special session call."

Heated immigration debate led to Texas lawmakers' scuffle

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — A Hispanic Texas lawmaker who a Republican colleague threatened to shoot "in self-defense" after the Democrat pushed him said Tuesday that the altercation was a boiling point in a session where minority members were powerless to stop conservative legislation they say is discriminatory.

Tensions erupted on the floor of the Texas House of Representatives on Monday when Republican state Rep. Matt Rinaldi told Democrats he called U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement agents about demon-

strators in the gallery holding signs that read "I am illegal and here to stay."

Hundreds of immigrant-rights activists many of whom were Hispanic — had jammed the state Capitol on the final day before the Texas Legislature adjourned until 2019. Some came from as far as Arizona to protest a "sanctuary city" crackdown that will allow police starting September to ask people during routine stops whether they're in the U.S. legally.

Democratic state Rep. Poncho Nevarez did not deny pushing Rinaldi, who wrote on Facebook that he told Nevarez after being threatened that "I would shoot him

said he was "sick of" the attitudes toward Hispanics in the Legislature and was taking a stand.

"Another legislator sidled up to me yesterday and said, 'Those aren't Americans un there " said Nevarez, referring to the protesters in the gallery.

"I think there are some people in some moments that bring out racism. They want to believe that they're not racist because when they deal with me I'm one of the 'good' ones. But I'm just one of the folks up there," he said of the protesters.

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A phone message left at Rinaldi's office

Nathan Torres

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was not returned Tuesday but GOP colleagues rebuked accusations of racism. Rinaldi wrote on Facebook that he was under the protection of state troopers.

CNN sacks Kathy Griffin over Trump video as backlash builds

And a commercial endorsement deal was canceled just weeks after she landed it. Squatty Potty, a Utahbased company whose products include toilet stools and other bathroom accessories, said it was suspending an ad campaign that featured Griffin.

The space agency announced Wednesday that the red-hot mission would be named after Eugene Parker, professor emeritus at the University of Chicago. It's the first NASA spacecraft to be named after a researcher who is still alive, noted the agency's science mission chief, Thomas Zurbuchen.

Scheduled to launch next summer from Cape Canaveral, the Parker Solar Probe will fly within 4 million miles of the sun's surface — right into the solar atmosphere. That will be considerably closer than any other spacecraft, and eling mission.

The purpose is to study the sun's outer atmosphere and better understand how stars like ours work.

spacecraft NASA have traveled inside the orbit of Mercury, the innermost planet.

"But until you actually go there and touch the sun, you really can't answer these questions," like why is the corona — the outer plasma-loaded atmosphere — hotter than the actual surface of the sun, said mission project scientist Nicola Fox of Johns Hopkins University's Applied Physics Laboratory.



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



Opening lead — queen of diamonds. In deals where counting the opposng distribution turns out to be the key to success, it is not immediately apparent to declarer that counting

For example, take this case where South is in six notrump. Declarer's first thought when dummy appears is that if East has the heart king, 12 tricks are assured, and there is also a chance for an overtrick if the clubs

will be necessary.

South therefore wins the diamond opening with dummy's ace, leads the heart queen and finesses. When West takes the king and returns the diamond ten, however, the ten of clubs suddenly becomes South's only possible source of a 12th trick

Since there are several divisions of the opposing clubs besides a 3-3 break that will enable declarer to make a trick with the ten, it now becomes important for him to learn as much as he can about the distribution of the unseen hands

To begin with, South is already aware that East failed to follow to West's second diamond lead, revealing that West started with five diamonds. When declarer next cashes three top spades and his three remaining hearts, discarding a diamond from each hand, he discovers that West also began with exactly three hearts and at least three spades. Adding this to the five diamonds West held originally, South concludes that West cannot possibly have more than South now knows for a certainty

that he will make four club tricks and the slam. He cashes dummy's K-O of clubs, and, after West follows suit, it becomes clear that West's original distribution was 3-3-5-2.

So declarer continues with dummy's four of clubs and, when East follows with the eight, confidently finesses the ten to make the slam

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

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


