
The 84th annual Big Spring Cowboy Reunion and Rodeo will kick off the last day of competition with a parade in downtown Big Spring.

"We would love to have everyone come and and be a part of a long standing parade which is being held in honor of one of our county's finest, Quail Dobbs," said Derek Wash, a member of the rodeo committee.

The late Dobbs was a wellknown and award winning rodeo clown who was very active in promoting the Big Spring Rodeo, especially after

he retired from the circuit. Dobbs lived in Coahoma and served as a Howard County Justice of the Peace for a

number of years. The parade begins at 10 a.m. Saturday in downtown Big Spring. It will start off at 10th and Main Street heading down 10th Street, then turn right on Scurry St. From there, the parade will head down Scurry St. and turn right again on 4th St. where it will proceed for one block and turn right on Main St. It will then head back to 10th St. to conclude.



Entries will be taken the day of the parade. Entries should show up at 10th Street and Main.

Rodeo competition resumes at 8 p.m. tonight at the Guardian Oilfield Services Rodeo Bowl at the corner of FM 700 and Business 20 West.

Tickets are available in advance or at the gate. Advance ticket prices are \$10 for adults and \$6 for children. For anyone who buys them at the gate, it's \$12 for adults and \$8 for children. Advance

Dora **Roberts** Rehab **Center gets** upgrade to facilities

The Dora Roberts Rehabilitation Center recently finished some major upgrades to their facilities, adding a second pool and expanding their physical therapy gym for more space. Thanks to a generous grant from the G.C. Broughton, Jr. Foundation, the center has not only upgraded features of their facility, but have been able to build an entire new therapy pool to be dedicated solely for patients undergoing physical therapy. "The \$700,000 grant, received in early 2016, has provided great benefit to the community by allowing the center to accomplish much needed improvements in three key areas," said Penny Phillips, project director for the Dora Roberts Rehabilitation Center. "These beautiful facilities were made possible through the generous support of the G.C. Broughton, Jr. Foundation." The rehab center held an open house on Thursday to display their new features off to the residents of Big Spring. Plenty of people showed up to see what the grant allowed the center to upgrade. Jean Broughton-Powell of the G.C. Broughton, Jr. Foundation Board was also present and spoke about what the new facilities means to her and the community. "The people of Big Spring will have a facility that they can be proud of, enjoy, and be safe, with excellent PT (physical therapy) and a fine place to work at," said Broughton-Powell. "The PT will have their own pool now so everybody else can use the big pool. It was a long project but we saw a need in our community for it." The new therapy pool features a



south of Interstate 20. It lasted probably about five hours." Photos of hail spread

through social media mostly from Sand Spring and Coahoma. Hail was also reported in north Howard County in the community Luther and along Highway 350.

The is the second hail storm to hit the Permian Basin this week. On Monday, strong winds and hail from severe thunderstorms blew through the Odessa/Midland area causing isolated damages to businesses, vehicles, uprooting trees, and downing power lines, according to the National Weather Service re-

port. Winds were clocked as strong as 68 miles per hour at the Odessa-Schlemeyer Field. However, Strobin said weather conditions for similar storms should lesson through the summer months but West Texas will need to be prepared for another hot summer. Hundred degree weather is expected to return to Howard County beginning today.

According to the National Weather Service. today's high forecast is to reach 105 and 108 on Saturday. A heat advisory is in effect.

"Hot temperatures are expected this afternoon," stated a release on the National Weather Service website. "All but the highest elevations are expected to have highs at or above 100 degrees, with many locations exceeding 105 degrees. A heat advisory is in effect.

"Thunderstorms are possible again this afternoon and evening across the Western Low Rolling Plains. Permian Basin, and lower Trans Pecos," the release continued. "Any storms that do develop will have a good chance of becoming severe. Frequent lightning, large hail, and damaging winds will be the main hazards accompanying these storms."

Very hot temperatures are expected through the weekend in Howard County with highs hovering in the low 100 degrees throughout the week, according to the National Weather Service.

investigate Russian involvement in the 2016 presidential election and possible collusion by Trump campaign associates with the Russians, but there has been no indication that Mueller told Trump to fire Comey.

"I am being investigated for firing the FBI Director by the man who told me to fire the FBI Director! Witch Hunt," the president wrote in his tweet.

In another tweet earlier Friday, Trump writes, "After 7 months of investigations & committee hearings about my 'collusion with the Russians,' nobody has been able to show any proof. Sad!"

Deputy Attorney General Rod Rosenstein submitted a widely circulated memo to the president last month raising concerns over Comey's performance, but Trump later asserted that he had already made the decision himself to fire Comey.

The White House confirmed that Mueller was among the candidates Trump interviewed to replace Comey. A day later, Rosenstein appointed Mueller, who was at the helm of the FBI during

the Sept. 11 attacks, as special counsel.

Friday's tweets are the latest in a week of angry social media responses by the president over a report by The Washington Post that Mueller was looking into whether Trump obstructed justice.

In a series of statements on Twitter Thursday, Trump repeated his assertion that Mueller's investigation into Russian interference in the 2016 campaign is a "WITCH HUNT" based on the "phony" premise of possible collusion between Russia and a cadre of Trump campaign associates.

The president complained the probe is unfair and wondered why his defeated Democratic opponent wasn't getting the same scrutiny.

"Why is that Hillary Clintons family and Dems dealings with Russia are not looked at, but my non-dealings are?" he asked.

"They made up a phony collusion with the Russians story, found zero proof, so now they go for obstruction of justice on the phony story. Nice," Trump wrote in his first tweet. "You are witnessing the single greatest WITCH HUNT in American political history - led by some very bad and conflicted people! #MAGA."

The Twitter attacks came

as Vice President Mike Pence hired a personal lawyer to represent him in the intensifying investigation. Pence's office confirmed he had retained Richard Cullen, a former Virginia attorney general and U.S. attorney for the Eastern District of Virginia, to assist "in responding to inquiries" from Mueller.

Mueller's investigation appeared to be reaching a broadening circle of current and former officials.

The Washington Post reported Wednesday that the investigators were looking into possible obstruction of justice.

brand new chairlift and even an under-

water treadmill for low impact therapy. "A particularly exciting feature is

the new underwater treadmill allowing therapists greater treatment options for patients needing therapeutic temperatures and low impact rehabilitation," said Phillips.

In addition to the new physical therapy pool, the old pool had some upgrades to bring it up to par with the other new features. The pool received a complete rebuild "greatly improving safety, cleanliness and air quality."

The rehabilitation center also upgraded their physical therapy gym, adding an expansion to the east side of the facility.

"This new enlarged gym space allows the therapists to treat greater numbers of patients more efficiently and privately," Phillips added. The new facility will help the crew more effectively treat their patients and allow the patients to make better progress with better equipment. The rehabilitation center was able to make these upgrades with the help of a grant from the G.C. Broughton, Jr. Foundation in the amount of \$700,000 which was received early last year. "You really can't express all the things she's (Broughton-Powell) been able to do with the G.C. Broughton Foundation to help our community," said Phillips. According to Phillips, the center plans to make some more minor upgrades in the future so they can continue to increase the quality of the facility for the patients.

# Scalise has more surgery as authorities track shooter's path

Associated Press WASHINGTON (AP) -Still in critical condition and undergoing repeated surgery, GOP House Whip Steve Scalise "will be in the hospital for some time," according to the facility where he is recovering from a gunshot.

His House colleagues paid tribute to him at their annual charity baseball game, while law enforcement tracked the path the shooter traveled to his ballfield carnage.

Investigators studying

impressions" in the months leading up to the attack. Authorities also were going over a cellphone, computer and camera taken from Hodgkinson's white van, which was parked near the ballfield.

So far, investigators have not linked Hodgkinson to any radical groups, said a law enforcement official who spoke on condition of anonymity because the official was not authorized to discuss the investigation publicly.

As congressional Republicans and Democrats joined Thursday night in their annual baseball game, played this year in Scalise's honor, word came from the hospital that he remained in critical condition, but had "improved in the last 24 hours." MedStar Washington Hospital Center said Scalise had surgery Thursday related to his internal injuries and a broken bone in his leg, and "will require additional operations." Colleagues who visited Scalise sounded generally upbeat, but spoke more in terms of hopes than the confident predictions of the immediate aftermath a day earlier.

congressman, said as many others did that Scalise is a fighter. "I'm prayerful he will pull through, and I hope he does," he said.

Scalise was fielding ground balls at second base Wednesday when he was shot at a practice for the annual Republicans-Democrats baseball game. Richmond, who plays for the Democratic team, said he had visited the hospital multiple times.

Scalise, 51, suffered a rifle wound in his left hip that shattered bones, tore organs and caused severe bleeding. He is the House's No. 3 GOP leader. "He's in some trouble," said President Donald Trump, who had visited late Wednesday. "He's going to be OK. We hope."



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

# Did you ever wonder? **David's sin and Bathsheba** ar with Israel's neighbors was an on-

going thing for many years. 2 Sam 11:1 begins, "In the spring, at the time when kings go off to war..." The climate conditions and the agricultural nature of the

times have a direct bearing on this statement.

Israel gets almost all of their moisture in the winter, and in the mountains it is very cold and uncomfortable outside. After being inside for several months, men were full of energy and enthusiastic to be outside.

One source mentioned that if an army marched before the harvest of their enemy, they could survive on the grain in their enemy's fields. This meant that they must leave their own harvest to the very old and

very young men, their women, and their servants. David was known as a warrior. Maybe he had an injury that was not sufficiently healed. Maybe he intended to show confidence in Joab as general of the army.

At any rate, David was restless and walked on his porch in the evening, looking out over his domain. Around Jerusalem the land is mountainous, and houses were built on a slope. A house would have two levels, maybe three.

Bathtubs were rare. Usually a bath meant standing in sort of basin while servants poured pails of water over their master's body.

David observed Bathsheba in such a bath on her roof, and he lusted for her. He sent a servant to fetch her; of course, she could not refuse an audience with the king.

David slept with her and she became pregnant. Now, David had a problem. Not wanting to be found out, he had her husband brought home from the battle. David expected Uriah to sleep with his wife and never know that the baby was not his.

However, Uriah was a gallant man. He refused to enjoy the comforts of his home while his comrades

were on the battlefield. So David sent him back to the battle with a letter for Joab.

"Put Uriah in the front line where the fighting is fiercest. Then withdraw from him so he will be struck down and die" (2 Sam 11:15). This Joab did, and Uriah fell in battle.

Now Bathsheba was free to marry David. When her time of mourning was over, David had her brought into his house. They were married and Bathsheba bore a son.

God sent Nathan, the prophet, to David. Nathan said, "A traveler came to visit a rich man. And though the rich man had many sheep, he took the only ewe lamb of his poor neighbor and prepared it for the traveler's meal."

David became very angry and said, "As surely as the Lord lives, the man who did this deserves to die!"

Nathan replied, "You are the man! Now, therefore, the sword will never depart from your house. Out of your own household I will bring calamity upon you. Before your very eyes I will take your wives and give them to one who is close to you" (2 Sam 12:1-12 paraphrased).

David confessed before Nathan that he had sinned against the Lord. Nathan replied, "The Lord accepted your confession of sin, but your punishment remains. The child will die" (2 Sam 12:13-14).

Bathsheba's child became ill, and for seven days David pleaded with God. But he died on the seventh day.

Then David bathed and put on fresh clothes. His servants asked, "Why did you mourn only until the child died?"

David replied, "Until then there was the possibility that God would be gracious to me and let him live." David loved and trusted God!

# Are there apostles today?

here are some within contemporary religious groups who call themselves apostles. However, when we read the New Testament, we see that those specified as Apos-

tles were a small, distinct group of men with certain, common characteristics. So, it is appropriate to ask the question, "Are there still apostles today?"

In our study of Matthew's Gospel, we have come to the beginning of Chapter 10. There Matthew writes, "And he called to him his twelve disciples and gave them authority over unclean spirits, to cast them out, and to heal every disease and every affliction. The names of the twelve apostles are these: first Simon, who is

called Peter, and Andrew his brother; James the son of Zebedee, and John his brother; Philip and Bartholomew; Thomas and Matthew the tax collector; James the son of Alphaeus, and Thaddeus; Simon the Cananaean, and Judas Iscariot, who betrayed him" (verses 1-4, ESV).

These 12 men were chosen from among the disciples of Jesus. The word "disciple" simply means follower or learner. From the very beginning of his ministry, Jesus' fame spread and he had great crowds following him (Matthew 4:24-25). Many of these people came to him to be physically healed and some only sought him out because he had fed them. Jesus would go off to an isolated place to get away from the crowds, and when he did, it was his disciples who would follow and listen to his teachings (Matthew 5:1ff).

Fast forward to the night before his death, and we see Jesus giving encouragement and instruction to the Apostles. After Judas leaves to make arrangements to betray him (John 13:21-30), Jesus promises the 11 that once he has gone back to the Father, they will receive the Holy Spirit, and he would teach them all things and bring to their remembrance all that Jesus said to them (John 14:26). The Spirit would bear witness about Jesus as well as the Apostles (John 15:26-27), and the Spirit would guide the apostles into all the truth (John 16:13).

After betraying Jesus, Judas killed himself (Matthew 27:3-5). After Jesus' resurrection and just prior to his ascension, he told the 11 that they would receive power when the Holy Spirit had come upon them (Acts 1:8). At the end of that chapter, Matthias is chosen to replace Judas. They also acknowledge that this is the Lord's choice (Acts 1:24). Then, at the beginning of Acts 2, we see the 12 Apostles filled with the Holy Spirit just as Jesus had promised.

The Apostles were also unique in the fact that they could impart, or give, the ability to perform miracles to others by laying their hands on them. In Acts 8, Philip was preaching in Samaria and many believed and were baptized (Acts 8:12). Philip could perform miracles (Acts 8:6-7) since he had the Apostles lay hands on him (Acts 6:5-6), but he did not have the ability to pass this gift to others. That is why Peter and John would go down to Samaria (Acts 8:14-18).

Saul of Tarsus would also be chosen by Jesus on the road to Damascus (Acts 9:1-19). He would become a great witness for the Lord. He would later be called Paul. He was an Apostle just like Peter and the others. He had seen the resurrected Savior and he had been filled with the Holy Spirit. He could also impart the miraculous gifts by laying his hands on others (Acts 19:6).

There is not one example in the New Testament of any individual who had miraculous gifts ever laying their hands on others and imparting gifts to them. So we must conclude that once the last Apostle died (understood to be John at the end of the first century), then no one else would have received miraculous power. After all of those individuals were gone, then the time of miracles would come to an end. By that time, the New Testament scriptures had been written and copied and brought together. Miracles were no longer needed since their primary purpose was to confirm the words spoken by the Apostles and early church evangelists and ministers (see Mark 16:20 and Hebrews 2:1-4).

There are no apostles today. As followers of Christ, we continue to devote ourselves to the Apostles teachings (Acts 2:42) and we have their writings (New Testament) which are inspired (Godbreathed [2 Timothy 3:16-17]) by the Holy Spirit. That is all we need to make us wise unto salvation through faith in Jesus Christ (2 Timothy 3:15).

# Reflections: **There's nothing like being a father** n Father's Day 1999, Phil Mickelson and Kite when he lost in a playoff for the Tour Cham-

Payne Stewart stood on the final hole of the U.S. Open at Pinehurst. Mickelson had a 25-foot birdie putt to

tie for the lead. Stewart's ball was 15 feet from the cup for par.

Mickelson's birdie putt came to rest 6 inches from the hole. Payne Stewart stood over his 15-foot putt with a w.w.j.d. ("What Would Jesus Do?) bracelet on his wrist, a gift from his son a few months earlier. The putt broke to the right and dropped into the center of the cup making Stewart the 1999 US Open champion.

Mickelson had left his wife, Amy, at home, expecting the birth of their

daughter at any moment in order to compete. He carried a pager in case she went into labor. Winner of 13 PGA tour events, he had never won a major.

Payne Stewart joined the PGA tour a decade before, a charismatic playboy wearing knickers and a tam-o-shanter hat. He burst on the scene with a swagger, chewing bubble gum, caustic and arrogant. In 1989, he refused to shake hands with Tom pionship. But something happened to Payne Stewart in the mid-'90s. His golf game suffered. His best friend, Paul Azinger, struggled with cancer. When Stewart came to faith in Jesus Christ through the influence of his children, his conduct and values changed.

One of the most memorable photos in sports history is the image of Payne Stewart taking Phil Mickelson's face in his hands and looking intently into his eyes trying to encourage his competitor in defeat. Knowing what Mickelson was going through at home, Stewart said. "Phil, there's nothing like being a father!" Amanda Mickelson was born the following day.

Four months later, Payne Stewart was killed when his private jet crashed in a field near Mina. S.D. More than 3,000 people attended his funeral at First Baptist Church, Orlando, Fla. His wife, Tracey, spoke. "When I met Payne, I thought he was the most beautiful man I had ever seen in my life," she said. "After 18 years of marriage, he was still the most beautiful man I had ever seen, not because of the way he looked on the outside anymore, but because of what he was on the inside." Everyone at

Phil Mickelson went on to win 42 events on the PGA tour, including five majors: three Masters, the PGA, and the British Open. He has never won the US Open. This week, with age cutting short his chances of winning the one event that has eluded him, Mickelson chose to risk missing the US Open in order to attend his daughter's graduation at Pacific Ridge High School in Carlsbad, Calif. Amanda, now 18 and the school president, will deliver the valedictorian address. Mickelson said it was not a hard decision.

"It's a tournament that I want to win the most," Mickelson said. "The only way to win is if you play and have a chance. But this is one of those moments where you look back on life and you just don't want to miss it. I'll be really glad that I was there and present."



# Amid uproar, Southern Baptists CHURCH condemn 'alt-right' movement

PHOENIX (AP) — Southern Baptists on Wednesday formally condemned the political movement known as the "alt-right," in a national meeting that was thrown into turmoil after leaders initially refused to take up the issue.

The denomination's annual convention in Phoenix voted to "decry every form of racism, including alt-right white supremacy as antithetical to the Gospel of Jesus Christ" and "denounce and repudiate white supremacy and every form of racial and ethnic hatred as a scheme of the devil."

Tuesday night, Southern Baptist officials who oversaw the resolutions had refused to introduce a different repudiation of the "alt-right," which emerged dramatically during the U.S. presidential election, mixing racism, white nationalism and populism.

Barrett Duke, who leads the resolutions committee, had said the original document contained inflammatory and broad language "potentially implicating" conservatives who do not support the 'alt-right" movement.

Introducing the new statement Wednesday, Duke apologized "for the pain and confusion that we created," but said the committee had been concerned about potentially giving the appearance of hating their enemies. Duke said the committee members "share your abhorrence of racism" and were grateful for the chance to "speak on 'alt-right' racism in particular and all racism in general."

A late-night call went out for convention participants to return to the assembly hall, where Steve Gaines, the president of the Southern Baptist Convention, won approval to consider a new resolution on the topic Wednesday.

"It shows we're willing to bring issues to the floor, real issues," said Mark Croston, national director of black church partnerships for the Southern Baptist-affiliated Lifeway Christian Resources. "We're not intimidated or afraid to speak out, even though it brings up dirty laundry from the past."

The Southern Baptist Convention, based in Nashville, is the largest Protestant denomination in the country, although its membership has been shrinking, most recently dropping to 15.2 million members.

Leaders have been trying to diversify, repeatedly condemning racism in formal resolutions from past meetings, rejecting display of the Confederate flag and electing more black officers. As of 2014, the denomination was about 85 percent white, according to the Pew Research Center.

Duke later apologized personally to McKissic for now his original proposal was handled. McKissic was not consulted when leaders were drafting the new statement, but said he was encouraged by the outcry from white and black Christians that brought the issue to a vote. "We're turning the corner," McKissic told reporters. "I see the heart of the majority." At the same time, several prominent Southern Baptists, including former presidents of the denomination, signed on as evangelical advisers to the Republican's campaign. They remain among the president's most steadfast supporters. When Trump won with 80 percent of the white evangelical vote, Moore faced a backlash within the denomina-That landslide tion. support for Trump left black evangelicals feeling alienated and disappointed given their concerns about Trump's past treatment of blacks, his rhetoric about Mexicans and his promised policies.

The resolution was adopted after a short but emotional discussion.

"We are saying that white supremacy and racist ideologies are dangerous because they oppress our brothers and sisters in Christ," said the Rev. Russell Moore, who leads the Ethics & Religious Liberty Commission, the Southern Baptist public policy arm. "If we're a Jesus people, let's stand where Jesus stands."

Charles Hedman of Capitol Hill Baptist Church in Washington, said far-right groups had been distributing racist material outside the convention hall Tuesday night. He said some pastors had told him they would have to leave the denomination if the convention failed to denounce white supremacy Wednesday.

"We must stand strong," Hedman said. "We must all issue an apology that we didn't act on this yesterday."

The initial proposal that Southern Baptists had rejected came from a prominent black Southern Baptist pastor, the Rev. William McKissic of Arlington, Texas. His resolution repudiated "retrograde ideologies, xenophobic biases and racial bigotries of the 'alt-right' that seek to subvert our government."

After McKissic made an unsuccessful plea for reconsideration from the floor of the Phoenix meeting late Tuesday, pressure began building online and at the convention for the Southern Baptists to say something.

Several Southern Baptists were panicked, contending that silence would be misinterpreted as support for white supremacy. The denomination was formed in the 19th century in defense of slave-



## **Bidding quiz**

You are the dealer, both sides vulnerable, and have opened One Heart. Partner responds One Notrump. What would you now bid with each of the following five hands

1. ♠ A972 ♥ Q10753 ♠ AK ♣ Q2 2. ♠ AJ63 ♥ AK942 ♠ 93 ♣ KQ 3. ♠ AK ♥ AQJ953 ♦ 8 ♣ A942 ♥ J98643 ♦ AKJ5 ♣ AJ6 - ♥ AKJ76 ♦ KQ84 ♣ KQ52

1. Pass. Before discussing your rebid, it might be best to consider what is indicated by partner's notrump response. Partner will normally have six to 10 points in high cards and lack of support for hearts. Partner also denies holding four spades, and may not have balanced distribution.

Once the meaning of the notrump response is understood, it becomes unlikely that there can be a game in the combined hands, since they cannot contain the 26 points usually required for game. As there is no reason to believe that the partscore will play better in a suit contract, you

should pass.**2. Two notrump.** If partner has eight, nine or 10 points, there are enough points in the combined hands for game, so you extend an invitation to him to carry on to three notrump. The two-notrump rebid in this

sequence shows 16 to 18 points. Partner then goes on or not, depending on whether he is on the high or low side of his initial response.

3. Four hearts. Game in hearts is likely to be made once partner has kept the bidding open. Responder needs little more than one or two key cards for 10 tricks to be made. The important thing to avoid is a jump to only three hearts, which is merely invitational and not forcing. Three clubs (forcing) is a reasonable alternative rebid.

4. Two diamonds. Game is unlikely unless partner can volun-tarily support hearts. If he passes two diamonds, indicating a relatively poor hand and lack of heart support the chances are that it is the best final contract. You should have no qualms about mentioning diamonds in preference to rebidding your weak six-card heart suit. Partner should be given a choice in the matter of selecting the best playable trump suit.

5. Three diamonds. The jumpshift forces partner to speak again and commits the partnership to game. Since he did not bid one spade over one heart, he is bound to have satisfactory trump support for at least one of your three suits.

You plan to show all three suits, if necessary. Whichever one partner eventually supports will become the trump suit







# McIlroy hits it all over the place at US Open

ERIN, Wis. (AP) - Rory McIlrov spraved the ball all over the place. Casting aside his own advice, he decided to stay for another day at the U.S. Open.

McIlroy hit just five of 14 fairways on his way to a 6-over 78 in the first round. He got a close look at some of Erin Hills' notoriously thick fescue, but he wasn't alone.

"You cannot play this golf course if you're not in position off the tee, and I wasn't in position," McIlroy said. "Obviously, I paid the price for it today.'

He had plenty of company. Jason Day also tangled with fierce fescue and had two triple bogeys in his round of 79. Dustin Johnson hit nine of 14 fairways and was 3 over Thursday. Pat Perez swung and missed completely in the tall grass behind the 15th green.

"I just played bad golf, man," Day said with a chuckle.

The USGA said Tuesday that overnight storms and more rain in the forecast were making some of the native grasses lay down, which would create such dense rough that it would be virtually unplayable. So it decided to trim the thickest rough on the fourth, 12th, 14th and 18th holes.

The plan drew an indignant response from McIlroy, who usually is quite good off the tee

"Really? We have 60 yards from left line to right line," he said. "You've got 156 of the best players in the world here, if we can't hit it within that avenue, you might as well pack your bags and go home."

Fast forward to Thursday, and it sounded as if McIlroy had decided to try again.

"I know if I hit fairways around here, the course is still soft enough you can get it close and give yourself a lot of looks for birdies," he said.

McIlroy got off to a nice start with an eagle on the par-4 No. 2, but that was his biggest highlight. He was 6 over on the back nine, including double bogeys on 15 and 17.

The 2011 U.S. Open champion didn't hit another fairway after No. 10.

"They should be wide enough for me to hit it into,"

into them. Yeah, it was just one of those days. I was just a little bit off."

While McIlroy brushed aside concerns about the long

fescue in the days before the Open, Kevin Na caused a bit of a stir when he posted a video to his Instagram account complaining about the long stuff at Erin Hills.

But Na had little trouble in the first round. shooting a 4-under 68.

"I think people some of the guys took my social media post kind of the wrong way," Na said. "If you read my post, it says I love the design. I was just trying to show what we have in some spots. And fairways are generous. I said all that. But I guess people don't like to read.

"But I just tried to show what it is. And there some are spots where they're really

he said. "I just didn't hit it brutal. And I was just trying to show that."


