

Four indicted on gun smuggling charges

In a press conference held

Four people were indicted by the Howard County Grand Jury Thursday for firearm smuggling charges from a case related to the death of a 12-vear-old boy.

Christopher Yanez, Kimberly Kay Carson, Cindy Machado Lopez, and Cody Alan Wingo were all indicted in the 118th District Court on separate charges of firearm smuggling, which is a second-degree felony. According to information from Howard County District Attorney's office, all four remain in jail. On May 10, 12-year-old Jose

Hernandez was taken to Scenic Mountain Medical Center with what was described as a gunshot wound, according to a press release at the time from the Howard County

Sheriff's Office.

May 16. Howard County Sheriff Stan Parker said the cause of death was found to be a bullet fragment that hit Hernandez while he and other individuals were unloading weapons that had been reported stolen.

"We discovered at the time of the shooting, two people from Big Spring had actually broken into a residence in another county south of San Angelo, and in that burglary they took a lot of household items as well as 28 guns," said Parker during the conference. "When they brought those guns back into Big Spring they picked up Jose Hernandez and they went to a residence north of town and began unloading them."

According to Parker, it was at this time that a gun went off, sending a bullet through the tailgate of the pickup that didn't hit anyone directly but fragments from the bullet and truck hit two people, one of them being Hernandez.

Trump tweets mock video of him beating CNN, sparks criticism

BRIDGEWATER, N.J. (AP) - President Donald Trump crowned his weekend rage against the news media with a mock video that shows

him pummeling a man in a business suit — his face obscured by the CNN logo — outside a wrestling ring.

It was not immediately clear who produced the brief video, which appears to be a doctored version of Trump's 2007 appearance on World Wrestling Entertainment Inc. The 28-second clip was posted on Trump's official Twitter account Sunday morning, with the message: "#FraudNewsCNN

#FNN."

Trump, who has branded the media as the "opposition party" and CNN as "fake news," stayed on the attack later in the day, stating on Twitter

that "the dishonest media will NEVER keep us from accomplishing our objectives on behalf of our GREAT AMERICAN PEOPLE!"

On Monday, he continued the attacks on Twitter: "At some point the Fake News will be forced to discuss our great jobs numbers, strong economy, success with ISIS, the border & so much else!"

Bruce Brown, executive director of the Reporters Committee for Freedom of the Press, condemned the video as a "threat of physical violence against journalists." He said Trump's tweet was "beneath the office of the presidency."

A White House aide insisted the tweet should not send a chill across the media landscape.

"I think that no one would perceive that as a threat," homeland security adviser Tom Bossert said. "I hope they don't. But I do think that he's beaten up in a way on cable platforms that he has a right to respond to."

The White House strategy has been to pull no punches when it comes to addressing its critics. On Monday, Trump counselor Kellyanne Conway on Twitter accused Democratic Rep. Ted Lieu of talking "nonsense" when the California lawmaker tweeted to Conway that the media's role "is not to be 'patriotic.' It is to tell the truth."

Conway tweeted that the "role of the media has been to retract false stories & fire liars. "Truth' = patriotic vets died so you can talk nonsense."

White House officials traveling with Trump during his weekend stay at his New Jersey golf club did not immediately respond to questions about the video. It appeared to be a doctored version of an appearance Trump made on a World Wrestling Entertainment Inc. show called "Battle of the Billionaires" in 2007, in which Trump appears to attack WWE CEO Vince McMahon.

McMahon's wife, Linda, who founded and built the company with her husband, now heads the Small Business Administration for Trump and was a donor to his campaign.

The video was posted several days ago by a Reddit user with the title, "Trump takes down fake news." It was not clear whether that was where it originated or how Trump found it. Still, the user wrote Sunday about being "honored" Trump had tweeted the video. The user who posted the video has a history of posts using anti-Muslim and anti-immigrant language.

The president's verbal shots against news outlets and individual members of the media have grown increasingly personal in recent days even as lawmakers in both parties say the insults only threaten to undermine his political agenda.

CNN accused Trump of engaging in "juvenile behavior far below the dignity of his office."



Gov. Chris Christie is blistered over his day at the beach

TRENTON, N.J. (AP) — Gov. Chris Christie got blistered online Monday after he was photographed sunning himself on a New Jersey beach that he had closed to the public over the Fourth of July weekend because of

a government shutdown. Christie defended his use of the beach, saying he had previously announced his vacation plans and the media had simply "caught a politician keeping his word."

The Republican was photographed Sunday by NJ.com at Island Beach State Park lounging in a beach chair in sandals, shorts and a T-shirt. He and his family had the sun and sand to themselves.

"I didn't get any sun today," Christie told reporters at a news conference later in the day in Trenton. Then, when told of the photos, his spokesman told NJ.com that what the governor said was true because Christie was wearing a baseball hat. The deeply unpopular governor then returned by helicopter to the state-owned governor's beach house, flying right into the middle of a growing storm of his own making. He was widely mocked online as selfish and arrogant, with memes using the image of Christie in his beach chair. Some commenters ridiculed the portly Christie over his weight. "SON OF A BEACH," screamed London's Daily Mail. "Let them eat funnel cake." blared a headline

in the Trentonian newspaper over the weekend after Christie ordered the shutdown but disclosed his plans to use the official beach house anyway.

Christie's lieutenant governor, who is running in November to succeed him, said Christie's beach time was "beyond words."

"If I were governor, I sure wouldn't be sitting on the beach if taxpayers didn't have access to state beaches," said Republican Lt. Gov. Kim Guadagano. "We need to end the shutdown now. It's hurting small businesses and ordinary New Jerseyans."

Christie ordered the shutdown of nonessential state services over the holiday weekend, including parks, beaches and motor vehicle offices, in a stalemate over his demand that Horizon Blue Cross Blue Shield be overhauled so that the state can tap into the nonprofit insurer's surplus to finance drug treatment.

Christie, who is head-

the George Washington Bridge political revenge scandal, after he threw his support to Donald Trump, and after his own presidential campaign fizzled.

Christie has blamed a top Democratic lawmaker for the shutdown, with the state plastering CLOSED signs at parks with Assembly Speaker Vincent Prieto's picture and office phone number.

"That's the way it goes," Christie said Saturday about his family's use of the beach home. "Run for governor, and you can have the residence."

Later, after he was photographed on the beach, he sarcastically called it a "great bit of journalism."

"They actually caught a politician being where he said he was going to be with the people he said he was going to be with, his wife and children and their friends," Christie said in an interview with the New York Fox TV station. "I am sure they will get a Pulitzer for this one." Christie's Horizon proposal has perplexed some conservatives, who are fighting the legislation. Union groups that typically align with Democrats, such as the state's largest teachers union, also oppose the idea.

Forecaster says budget cuts Missing North Texas girl found dead in Dallas; 2 arrested DALLAS (AP) - A missing 13-year-old North could hurt hurricane predictions Texas girl who was reported abducted and a man

have both been found dead inside a Dallas home, authorities said Sunday.

Shavon Randle had been missing for several days and was identified as one of two people dead inside the house in Dallas' Oak Cliff area, Eric Jackson, special agent in charge of the Dallas FBI, said. He said the investigation was continuing and had no other information about the deaths.

"We didn't have the positive result we were looking for, but being able to let Shavon's family know that we've located her was our goal," Jackson said. "We're going to continue our investigation and anyone we find that were involved in this heinous crime against Shavon, we will bring you to justice and we will hold you accountable."

The area around the small one-story home was cordoned off Sunday morning. Investigators placed evidence markers around the front yard and people in hazardous materials suits could be seen entering and leaving the home.

The girl was reported abducted Wednesday from a home in Lancaster, about 15 miles (24.14 kilometers) south of Dallas.

Lancaster police then issued an Amber Alert after receiving the missing person call. Police said a relative told officers she received a call from an unknown man who said the girl was being held against her will and had threatened to harm her.

Lancaster police and FBI agents arrested two men Saturday, Devontae Owens, 24, and Laguon Wilkerson, 30, during their search for her. Both are held on \$500,000 bond and charged with aggravated kidnapping.

Authorities have said two other men are being questioned and another man was being sought.

Injured hiker evacuated by helicopter from El Paso mountain

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — Authorities in El Paso have rescued a 69-year-old hiker who fell about 30 feet into a canyon about a mile up in the Franklin ricanes — which has Mountains.

El Paso Fire Department officials say they were dispatched Sunday morning to Red Rock Canyon after fellow hikers called 911 to report a hiker had suffered serious injuries in the fall. A rescue team arrived about 30 minutes later and summoned a helicopter because of the extent of the hiker's injuries.

The injured person was evacuated and taken to a hospital about two hours after the initial call and a search and rescue team escorted the rest of the hiking party off the mountain.

The operation involved about 25 people from the El Paso fire and police, Texas Parks and Wildlife and nearby Fort Bliss.

Woman's body washes ashore at Padre Island National Seashore

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) - Authorities believe a woman found dead near the edge of the surf on the Padre Island National Seashore in South Texas is a drowning victim.

The body was spotted Saturday by a Turtle Patrol team on a part of the beach that's closed to vehicles about 2 miles (3.22 kilometers) north of the Malaquite Visitor Center.

MIAMI (AP) — Recent progress in forecasting the intensity of hurlagged behind storm track forecasting could be undermined by proposed cuts in federal funding for tropical weather research, says the retiring chief of a team of U.S. hurricane specialists.

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration launched the Hurricane Forecast Improvement Program in 2009 with a \$13 million budget. Funding has shrunk to less than half that, and President Donald Trump's proposed budget includes further cuts to NOAA and the National Weather Service.

"It's hanging on really by a thread in terms of filled tubes that send weather data as they fall through hurricanes helped improve forecasts of storm tracks and led NOAA to buy a "hurricane hunter" jet that's still used today. He also helped develop new GPS dropsondes that showed how eyewall winds vary.

Before his June 30 retirement, ending a 35-year NOAA career that included 83 flights breaching hurricane eyewalls, Franklin discussed forecasting with The Associated Press:

Hurricane track forecasts have steadily improved partly because the weather elements that direct a storm's path are easy to see, Franklin said. For example, a high-pressure area over the Atlantic known as the Bermuda High, which can nudge

are difficult to observe even with advanced dropsondes, drones and satellites, Franklin said.

"We've always been able to see many or most of the steering factors or steering features in the atmosphere, and we get better at it all the time," he said.

"But when it comes to intensity, what's going to make a tropical depression strengthen into a hurricane — now you're talking about all kinds of things going on in the atmosphere on very small scales. You're talking about the interface between the ocean and the atmosphere. How much heat is going to get extracted from that ocean? That's a big driver for intensification."

Improved forecasts, however, can be a double-edged sword, Franksuch as storm surge flooding, some people still expect hurricanes to stick to a predicted track, even though forecasts include a range of potential outcomes.

"I find this surprising because there's still so many bad forecasts out there — ours included yet we see it over and over: people don't have a good grasp on just what the forecast uncertainties still are," he said.

The hurricane center issued its first advisories for potential tropical cyclones in June, alerting the U.S. Gulf Coast and Venezuela's Caribbean coast to strong winds and heavy rains a full day before tropical storms Bret and Cindy were officially named. Franklin said those advisories reflect both forecasting improvements and the hurricane center's emphasis on potential risks for communities in a storm's path.



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

Sanchez homers in 8th, White Sox beat Rangers 6-5

CHICAGO (AP) — The Texas Rangers had a lead late, and again the bullpen failed to hold it.

Reliever Jose Leclerc (1-2) gave up a two-run home run with two outs in the eighth to Chicago's Yolmer Sanchez and the White Sox beat the Rangers 6-5 on Sunday.

It was a sloppy, error- and walk-filled game in which both teams gave the other numerous chances. The White Sox committed a season-high four errors, including two on

the same play that allowed a run to score.

"It was not the cleanest game," Chicago manager Rick Renteria said.

The Sox also nearly let the Rangers off the hook after taking the lead, loading the bases in the ninth before David Robertson (4-2) struck out Carlos Gomez to end the game.

Even that final strikeout was sloppy, as the ball got away from catcher Kevan Smith. He could have just thrown to first to finalize the game, because Gomez didn't run, but Smith instead

grabbed the ball and dove to touch home plate before Joey Gallo could score from home.

The Rangers are tied for most blown saves in the American League with 17.

"It was one pitch, one moment — good hitters put good swings on hanging breaking balls," Rangers manager Jeff Banister said.

Actually, Banister said, the four pitches earlier in the inning that set up the gamewinning home run were just as problematic when Chicago's Todd Frazier walked, after getting behind in the count 0-2.

Frazier is the first Yankee since 1913 to double and homer in his first major league game.



Dear Annie: I am over 70 years old and in failing health. My stepbrother, "Tom," is 58. Although he is still working, I am sure that he will soon have to stop because over the past few years, he has become steadily more obese, and the doctors seem unable to find a cause or remedy, nor do they really seem to care. He now weighs almost 700 pounds. I love my brother and am worried about what will happen to him when I am gone. I have always been reasonably slender, and my brother doesn't seem to eat much more than I do, and he certainly doesn't eat cake, pies or other junk food, nor does he eat large portions.

around, it seems as if obesity is becoming more and more of a problem in the U.S. What happens when obese people are unable to work but are too young to receive their Social Security benefits? What happens when they become too old and infirm to care for their own basic needs? I can't understand why the medical profession doesn't assign a higher priority to the treatment of obesity in this country. Why can't more people understand that it isn't just a problem of overeating? -- Concerned **Brother**

to me as if Tom could have hypothyroidism, which slows down the metabolism. The most important thing you can do for your brother is encourage him to seek the opinion of another doctor. Offer to take him to the appointment yourself if it would help. Finally, be sure to take care of yourself, too. I'm sure Tom is as worried about his elder brother as you are about him. Dear Annie: I'm a psychiatrist. For several decades, I've treated patients for attention deficit hyperactivity disorder. You recently ran a letter from "Missing My Space Cadet." He was concerned about his wife, who, after being prescribed an "amphetamine medication" for ADHD, became laser-focused on work and was no

longer fun-loving. She was also described as sleeping and eating lots more on days when she didn't take it.

As you said, she may be abusing her medication, but another possibility (more likely, in my opinion) is that the prescribed dose is simply too high for her. Most patients -- and more than a few prescribers -- do not realize that with ADHD medications, there is usually a fairly small difference between the dose that does nothing and the dose that has unwelcome side effects or that the correct dosage can vary quite widely from person to person. Thus, rather than simply prescribe a standard dosage, doctors must conduct a single-case experiment for every patient. This requires

close communication between doctor and patient. But if both of them aren't careful, the patient can continue to be prescribed the wrong dosage.

For this reason, I think your advice that the husband and wife should go together to the next appointment was very much on target. My guess is that the problem could be easily solved by lowering the dosage considerably. Unless the woman is taking more than the prescribed dosage, the word "abuse" is not applicable. -- A Psychiatrist in New York **Dear Psychi**atrist: Input from medical professionals such as you is always helpful. You've raised a great point. I've passed this information along to "Missing My Space Cadet." Thank you.

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

There were 11 first-time starters last season in San Diego, the last year the winning league received home-field advantage in the World Series. Under baseball's new labor contract, the Series now starts in the ballpark of the pennant winner with the better record.

Catcher Gary Sanchez, injured second baseman Starlin Castro and pitchers Dellin Betances and Luis Severino also were picked from the Yankees. Cleveland is sending pitchers Corey Kluber and Andrew Miller, shortstop Francisco Lindor and outfielder Michael Brantley.

"I'm just happy for Cleveland," said the Indians' Terry Francona, who will manage the AL. "I think the fans and the city — everybody should be proud."

Marlins outfielder Giancarlo Stanton was picked as a reserve and plans to defend his Home Run Derby title on July 10. Judge also has been invited, and Los Angeles Dodgers rookie Cody Bellinger, who leads the NL with 24 homers, has said he will participate.

"It is going to be amazing," Stanton said. "Either way, the week was

going to be cool, but this makes it even cooler."

The NL-leading Dodgers will send Bellinger, Kershaw, shortstop Corey Seager and closer Kenley Jansen to Miami, but nobody from Los Angeles was elected for the starting lineup by fans. Jansen was upset with his own fanbase for letting down Seager and third baseman Justin Turner.

"I'll say it loud and clear again: It's the Dodger fans' fault," Jansen said. Among other strong candidates overlooked were Carlos Carrasco, Jacob deGrom, Gio Gonzalez, Ivan Nova, Roberto Osuna, Anthony Rizzo, Travis Shaw, Andrelton Simmons, Justin Upton and Alex Wood.

Rosters were cut from 34 per league to 32 under the new labor deal, and online voting determines the last spot on each roster. Elvis Andrus, Xander Bogaerts, Didi Gregorius, Logan Morrison and Mike Moustakas are the AL candidates, and Justin Bour, Bryant, Anthony Rendon, Mark Reynolds and Turner are on the NL ballot.

The AL had won four straight and went 11-3 in the years the All-Star Game determined World Series home field. Marlins Park is the third of four straight NL ballparks to host the All-Stars and will be followed by Washington in 2018.



Maria Menounos reveals brain tumor battle, quits E! News

NEW YORK (AP) — Maria Menounos says she has been diagnosed with a benign brain tumor and has announced her resignation from E! News.

Menounos tells People magazine that she underwent surgery last month to remove a golf-ball-sized tumor discovered in February. Menounos says 99.9 percent of the tumor was removed during the seven-hour procedure on June 8. She says there's a small chance that it could come back.

E! says Monday that Menounos is leaving the network after three years. The cable network says it believes Menounos will tackle her health struggles "with the same fierce dedication she is known for."

The 39-year-old says her face is still numb from the surgery but should be back to normal soon.

Menounos is also caring for her mother, who has stage-four brain cancer.

Amtrak train cars derail in Washington state; minor injuries

STEILACOOM, Wash. (AP) — Several people suffered minor injuries after parts of an Amtrak passenger train derailed in Washington state, authorities said.

The locomotive and the baggage car of the Amtrak Cascades train derailed Sunday about 45 miles (72 kilometers) south of Seattle near the town of Steilacoom, Amtrak and the Pierce County sheriff's office said.

The train, which was carrying 267 passengers, derailed near the Chambers Bay golf course, which was the site of the 2015 U.S. Open.

Mitchell Crowley, of Redmond, told the Seattle Times that he was on one of the four cars that went off the track.

"I was in the farthest back, didn't go very far off the rails," the 18-year-old said. "I did get to have that exciting experience: Brake, brake, brake and tipping over."

Crowley said the car he was on tipped about 15 degrees.

All passengers were evacuated and provided with alternate transportation, the company said. The train runs between Vancouver, Canada, and Eugene-Springfield, Oregon.

The cause of the derailment is under investigation, Amtrak said.

The railroad tracks on which the locomotive derailed was reopened shortly before 6 p.m. for service at limited speeds, Amtrak said.

The Gig Harbor Police Department said one of its patrol boats was helping environment officials put in pollution-control booms to block fuel from the derailment from leaking into a nearby body of water. The department posted a photo Sunday afternoon on its Twitter account showing the work.

Logue says he has the New York Police Department, FYI and others involved.

He asks that whoever may be with Jade to "just drop her off."

He says she'll be taken back "with hugs and no questions asked."

Jade Logue was last seen in Brooklyn on June 26. She is transgender and was previously known as Arlo Logue.

New York City police say there are no updates on the case as of early Monday.

Tesla says its Model 3 car will go on sale on Friday

NEW YORK (AP) — Electric car maker Tesla says its much-ballyhooed Model 3 car for the masses will go on sale on Friday.

CEO Elon Musk made the announcement Monday on Twitter.

The car is to start around \$35,000 and with a \$7,500 federal electric car tax credit, could cost \$27,500. Tesla says the five-seat car will be able to go 215 miles (133 kilometers) on a single charge and will be sporty, accelerating from zero to 60 miles per hour in under six seconds.



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
