HCVFD receives training simulator

Public invited to demo, celebration next week

The Howard County Volunteer Fire Department (HCVFD) just got a major upgrade, adding a new training simulator that will help firefighters gain their certification faster and saving the county some money in the process. After approval from the commissioners

court during a meeting held a few weeks ago, the volunteer fire department was able to purchase a refurbished Fire Engineer Training Simulator. "It's a training simulator, it allows us to put



firefighters in real fire fighting conditions where they're operating the fire engines

under pressures and different hoses," said Tommy Sullivan, Howard County Volunteer

Fire Chief. "The simulator will simulate busted hoses, loss of a fire hydrant, losing water to the fire engines. It keeps the firefighters on their toes and teaches them how to pump the truck and how to react to the things that are happening." According to a press re-

lease from the Volunteer Fire Department Interna-

tional, the new system is a state-of-the-art, computer-controlled machine, and it will be able to help train the "intricacies and mission



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

ber, had the idea of bringing it back to Howard County.

"It didn't make sense to us that we were taking 2 to 3,000 people out of our community and going to support another community," Reid told the Rotarians.

Since then, Reid said, organizers have turned the event into a scholarship vehicle for students of both schools.

"Over the past three years, we've been able to award \$67,000 scholarships," he said.

Qualifications for the scholarships are simple. A student must be a senior at one of the schools; must have participated in the game in some way, such as playing in the game, cheerleading, or being in the band; and be in good standing throughout the school year.

Once all scholarship applications are returned, the committee compiles two lists — one for Coahoma students and one for Forsan — and then begins to order the applications from top down, Reid said.

"As we are able to raise money...we just line them up as far as we go.," he explained. "We take a Forsan kid and Coahoma kid, and we just go down until we run out of money."

Reid pointed out Howard College also gives the first two student recipients a \$1,000 scholarship each.

Money raised through donations, ticket sales, T-shirt merchandise, and concessions stands all go towards scholarships or youth activities, Reid said. "We really try to push our pre-game

tickets," he said. "The more money that we can sell through T-shirts or with tickets before the game, it let's us know kind of somewhat before the game where our money is. We want to love on and recognize as many kids as we can during the game. If we can kind of get an idea of where those numbers are, then we able to recognize those kids while we do that."

As for the event itself, Dietz told the crowd it's an experience that has an impact on both communities.

"It's a tremendous event. Just putting this on stage. It means it a whole bunch to our kids," he said. "Small town Coahoma, we don't always get to play on this stage. We don't always get to play in a big stadium in front of these people. A lot of our games on Friday nights are played on grass in front of about half of the amount of people we play in front of in this thing. "So to be able to start the year and

start the season in this setting and this environment, and have this kind of atmosphere around the game, it's a big boost to Texas high school football and it makes kids more interested in the game," he continued. And the event is more than just a

good old West Texas football game, Reid said, but a reason for two communities to come together and support their youth.

"Even if you are not about football, we want this to be an event that you just don't want to miss the show, because any way you support that, you help kids not only from Forsan and Coahoma but Big Spring. Big Spring gets the concession sales," he said. "The (Big Spring) Band Boosters are able to take that money and put them towards their programs. You are helping our local kids by coming any way, shape, or form."

Pregame tickets and T-Shirts can be purchased at Back in Motion, 1113 S. Scurry during normal business hours; or by visiting the Howard County Bowl Facebook Page. Pregame tickets are \$6 for adults and \$4 for students. All tickets cost \$8 at the gate. The Howard County Bowl will be at 7:30 p.m. Friday, Sept. 1, at Memorial Stadium, located on the Howard College Big Spring campus, 1001 Birdwell Lane.

critical procedures" that firefighters may encounter.

The HCVFD will host an event on Friday, Aug. 18, at its training facility in Coahoma to demonstrate the machine to the public.

"Were going to have the pump simulator set up with the fire engine, and then we're going to demonstrate flowing it," said Sullivan. "It's open to the general public to come out and they can see it, and celebrate with us being able to get this. They can see what it's like to be a fire engineer."

The machine is set to be delivered to the fire department next Friday, Aug. 18, when they are hosting the event.

According to Sullivan, the simulator will not only save money for the department in training it's firefighters and on the annual pump test, but it will also be able to create revenue from training additional firefighters from other departments.

"It's part of our certification,

there's so many hours you have to do pump operations and stuff. So it allows us to train our firefighters in house," Sullivan said. "Also this simulator — we have to do an annual pump test on all our fire trucks, so this machine will be able to test the trucks, and we won't have to bring someone in *mail at reporter@bigspringherald*. to do it for us. It'll save us about com

\$10,000 a year by doing that."

Add to that savings the ability to train firefighters from outside the county, Sullivan said. This could add up to another \$5,000 in savings for the department for each class of ten students.

"We will probably be able to start that service in October," Sullivan stated. "After that media day, I am going to have ten of my officers that are going to be going through training to learn how to operate this simulator so we can have our certification to be trained with this machine."

Brand new, the simulator would cost around \$65,000 however the department was able save money because it was slightly used.

"This one is less than a year old and the people that had it didn't want it anymore. The trailer will also have special graphics with the Howard County Volunteer Fire Department logo on it," Sullivan said. "I thank the Commissioners Court for allowing us to get this important piece of equipment that will help my firefighters get better and save us some money too."

The event is set for August 18 from 1 to 4 p.m. at 210 North 1st Street in Coahoma and Sullivan encourages the public to come out and see the new equipment.

China, which claims the South China Sea virtually in entirety, has protested such repeated U.S. military operations, which President Donald Trump's administration has continued partly to reassure allies locked in territorial rifts with Beijing. Tensions escalated a few

years ago when China began to build seven reefs, including Mischief, into islands, including three with runways, which the U.S. and China's neighbors fear could be used to project Beijing's military might and potentially obstruct freedom of navigation. China has reportedly installed a missile defense system on the new is-

The U.S. is not involved in the long-seething disputes in the busy and potentially oil- and gas-rich waters involving China, Brunei, Malaysia, the Philippines, Taiwan and

Washington, Vietnam. however, has declared it in its interest to ensure that the conflicts are resolved peacefully and that freedom of navigation and overflight remain unhampered. An estimated \$5 trillion in annual trade passes through the water-

In the latest sail-by, U.S. military officials notified Philippine counterparts of the maneuver, a Philippine official told the AP, adding Filipino forces were not involved.

Philippine marines stationed in a marooned ship on a disputed shoal may have monitored the U.S. Navy operation because they are based near Mischief Reef, which is also claimed by the Philippines, the official said.

U.S. Pacific Fleet spokeswoman Lt. Cmdr. Nicole Schwegman said all Navy operations "are conducted in accordance with international law and demonstrate that the United States will fly, sail, and operate wherever international law allows."

"That is true in the South China Sea as in other places around the globe," she

The disputes and North Korea's recent intercontinental ballistic missile tests were high on the agenda of an annual gathering of Asia-Pacific foreign ministers last weekend in Manila.

Although China opposes inclusion of the sea disputes in international conferences, partly to prevent the U.S. and other Western governments from intervening, U.S. Secretary of State Rex Tillerson, Australian Foreign Minister Julie Bishop and Japan's new top diplomat, Taro Kono, expressed concern over aggressive actions in the waters.

They sought compliance with an arbitration ruling last year that invalidated China's claims in the South China Sea. China has ignored and dismissed the ruling as a sham.

Washington's critical actions came as it courts the help of China, North Korea's ally, in taming Pyongyang's nuclear weapons ambitions and ending its missile tests.

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Immigrant mom to stay in US while child treated for cancer

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement officials are allowing an immigrant mother facing deportation to Mexico to stay in the U.S. for another six months while her daughter is treated for cancer at a Texas children's hospital.

ICE officials told The El Paso Times that this is the third permit they've granted Maria Elena de Loera in the past two years.

"I'm happy because I'm going to be able to stay with my daughter," she said.

De Loera sought asylum in the U.S. in 2014, after her husband was killed in Mexico. Her daughter, Alia, had been diagnosed with bone cancer by the time immigration officials denied her asylum request in 2015.

De Loera's requests for a temporary stay of removal in 2015 and 2016 were granted, but her request this year initially was denied.

Her attorney, Linda Rivas, said the initial de-

nial may be an indication of a change in approach under President Donald Trump's administration. "This really indicated a shift in the new admin-

istration and their goals and policies because, in the past, we have not seen them deny this petition and now they did," Rivas said. "

That, to us, is easy to speculate that the new leadership was the reason that this had to be so hard fought." Rivas and local religious leaders met with ICE

officials this week to request the deportation delay. It's unclear what will happen once the six-month

period is over, Rivas said.

"The fact that this was denied the first time and so hard fought, to actually get an approval, I think ICE is sending a clear message," Rivas said. "This

may be very difficult to repeat."

"It feels good to know that my mom is going to stay," Alia said.

Education Agency says some Houston schools must improve

HOUSTON (AP) — The Texas Education Agency has warned the state's largest district to make improvements at some schools or possibly have managers appointed to run the whole district.

The Houston Chronicle reports officials with the Houston Independent School District say they're aware of TEA's concerns about "chronically underperforming" schools.

A statement Tuesday says the HISD, with about 215,000 students and 283 campuses, is working closely with state education officials to make improvements.

The initial warning about 13 schools came Monday. District officials said Wednesday that state officials now say only eight campuses, plus two charter schools, must improve.

The TEA could appoint managers for HISD if even one of the schools that have struggled, for at least the past three years, receives failing accountability marks in 2017 and again in 2018.

Ex-Texas Gov. Mark White, 77, remembered at Houston funeral

HOUSTON (AP) — Former Gov. Mark White has been remembered as a dedicated and caring Texas leader by someone who later held the same elected position — George W. Bush.

The nation's 43rd president spoke Wednesday at White's funeral at Second Baptist Church in Houston. White, who battled kidney cancer, died Saturday at age 77.

Bush praised White, who served in the 1980s, as a good and decent man who "envisioned a Texas where all children were educated."

Gov. Greg Abbott and ex-Gov. Rick Perry were among the hundreds of mourners.

Luci Baines Johnson, a daughter of ex-President Lyndon B. Johnson, said White may have retired from public office but never retired from public service.

White was to lie in state Thursday at the Capitol Rotunda, with burial at the Texas State Cemetery.

Man convicted of notorious dragging death gets court review

HOUSTON (AP) — A man on death row for the notorious slaying nearly 20 years ago of a black man chained to the back of a pickup truck and dragged along a bumpy rural East Texas road will get his claim of innocence and poor legal representation reviewed by an appeals court.

The 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals late Tuesday said it would review a claim from John William King that lawyers were deficient in presenting a case for innocence during his trial for what became one of the nation's most shocking hate crimes since the Civil Rights era.

King's appeal said that only a few pieces of circumstantial evidence that could be innocently explained tied him to the scene of a fight that resulted in 49-year-old James Byrd Jr. being chained at his ankles to the bumper of a truck in June 1998 and fatally dragged outside Jasper, about 125 miles (201 kilometers) northeast of Houston.

King, now 42, was the first of three white men convicted of capital murder for the hate slaying. Each was tried separately.

King's attorney, A. Richard Ellis, raised five claims to the 5th Circuit, four of them focusing on what he said was King receiving ineffective legal help at his 1999 trial in Jasper. The fifth claim contended a federal district judge who rejected King's appeal denied him due process and a fair hear-

ing.

The 5th Circuit rejected all but the claim questioning the trial attorneys' effectiveness regarding some of the state's evidence in the case. King's appeals attorney described the trial lawyers' response to the evidence as "confusing and disjointed," according to the court.

The evidence in-

cluded a cigarette lighter engraved with a Klan symbol and King's prison name, "Possum," along with cigarette butts found at the crime scene and King's sandals stained with Byrd's blood. Other evidence at his trial included letters in which King wrote about launching a racist gang and tattoos on King's body that prosecutors said showed he hated blacks.

King's lawyers called three witnesses who testified for less than an hour at the guilt-innocence portion of the trial. The attorneys appeared to concede the conviction and hoped to save his life in the punishment phase. Jurors decided he should die.

King's lead defense attorney, Haden "Sonny" Cribbs, died in June. His trial co-counsel, Brack Jones, declined comment Wednesday.

The appeals lawyer, Ellis, based in Mill Valley, California, did not immediately respond to a message left by The Associated Press.

The 5th Circuit gave Ellis 30 days to submit a brief on his claim. State attorneys then will have 15 days to respond.

The second participant in Byrd's killing, Lawrence Russell Brewer, 44, was executed in

2011. Evidence at their trials showed Brewer, previously convicted of cocaine possession, and King, a convicted burglar from Jasper, met in a Texas prison where they got involved in a KKK splinter group and adorned themselves with racist tattoos.

The third man, Shawn Berry, 42, is serving life in prison. Evidence showed that after King was released from prison, he returned to Jasper, became friends with Berry and moved in with him. Brewer later joined them.

Evidence and trial testimony showed the

three men offered Byrd a ride in the early morning hours of June 7, 1998, and they all drove about 10 miles (16 kilometers) into the wooded county before stopping along an isolated logging road. A fight broke out and the outnumbered Byrd was tied to the truck bumper with a 24 1/2-foot logging chain. Three miles (4.8 kilometers) later, what was left of his shredded remains was dumped between a black church and cemetery where the pavement ended on the remote road. more than 10 people have drowned in the last four years.



Trump hits McConnell for Senate crash of Obama health repeal

WASHINGTON (AP) President Donald Trump rebuked his own party's Senate leader on Wednesday for the collapse of the Republican push to repeal and replace the Obama health care law, using Twitter to demand of Senate Majority Leader Mitch Mc-Connell, "Why not done?"

Trump was firing back at the Kentucky Republican for telling a home-state audience this week that the president had "not been in this line of work before" and had "excessive expectations about how quickly things happen in the democratic process."

The exchange came less than two weeks after the Senate rejected repeated attempts by McConnell to muscle legislation through his chamber scuttling President Barack Obama's health care law. The House approved its version in May, but its Senate failure — thanks to defecting GOP senators — marked the collapse of the party's attempt to deliver on vows to erase Obama's statute it's made since the law's 2010 enactment.

"Senator Mitch McConnell said I had 'excessive expectations,' but I don't think so," Trump tweeted. "After 7 years of hearing Repeal & Replace, why not done?"

Trump had repeatedly used Twitter to pressure McConnell to find the votes to approve the health care bill, even saying hours after its failure that GOP senators "look like fools." But his tweet Wednesday was an unusually personal reproach of the 33year Senate veteran. McConnell is deeply respected by his GOP colleagues and Trump will need him to guide the next major Republican priority through the chamber — a tax system overhaul.


For his part, McConnell's statement was surprising because he is generally among the capital's most guarded politicians. When it comes to criticizing Trump, he's seldom gone further than saving he wishes he would stop tweeting, and usually refused to chime in when Trump made widely condemned comments during last year's presidential campaign.

McConnell told the Rotary Club of Florence, Kentucky on Monday that people think Congress is underperforming partly because "artificial deadlines, unrelated to the reality of the complexity of legislating, may not have been fully understood." He added that 52 is "a chal-

lenging number," a reference to the GOP's scant 52-48 Senate majority. "You saw that on full display a couple of week ago," when McConnell was unable to muster a majority to push three different Republican health care bills through the chamber. That drew a tweet Wednes-

day from Dan Scavino Jr., the White House social media di-

"More excuses," wrote Scavino, one of Trump's more outspoken loyalists. "@SenateMajLdr must have needed another 4 years - in addition

This is the first year Republicans have been in a position to scuttle Obama's law because they control the White House and Congress, making last month's crash of their bill acutely painful for the party.

Also joining the fray was Fox News Host Sean Hannity, a close Trump ally.

"@SenateMajLdr No Senator, YOU are a WEAK, SPINE-LESS leader who does not keep his word and you need to Retire!" Hannity tweeted.

In addition, Rep. Mo Brooks, R-Ala., who is challenging Sen. Luther Strange for the GOP nomination for his Senate seat, responded angrily to Trump's endorsement of Strange. On his campaign website, Brooks said, "Mitch McConnell and the Swamp managed to mislead the President last night."

The conservative Brooks has criticized McConnell before, accusing him of doing a poor job of crafting a health care bill that could pass the

Ex-disc jockey in groping case says Swift photo is awkward

DENVER (AP) - Aformer disc jockey accused of groping Taylor Swift while posing for a photograph with her before a concert acknowledged Wednesday that the image is "weird and awkward," but he insisted that he touched Swift in the ribs, not in the rear, as she alleges in a lawsuit.

During testimony at the civil trial, Swift's attorney Douglas Baldridge repeatedly asked David Mueller why his right hand was behind Swift in the 2013 photo

Mueller said his hand was touching Swift's skirt after he put his arm around her and their arms got crossed.

"My hand was at ribcage level and apparently it went down," Mueller said.

In the image, shown to jurors during opening statements, Mueller's hand is behind Swift, just below her waist. Both are smiling.

One of Mueller's lawyers, Gabriel McFarland, told jurors that the photo does not show Mueller's hand under

Swift's skirt and that the skirt was not rumpled.

Baldridge, however, said several people noticed the pop star was upset after with Mueller.

Her bodyguard Greg Dent has testified in a deposition that he had seen Mueller lift Swift's skirt, the lawyer told ju-

In addition, Baldridge quoted a deposition by photographer Swift's Simbeck, Stephanie who said Swift uttered "that guy" had grabbed her behind.

Dent and Simbeck are listed as possible witnesses at the trial.

Mueller has Swift, claiming he was falsely accused and then fired over her allegation. He is seeking at least \$3 million.

Swift has countersued, claiming she was sexually assaulted. She is seeking a symbolic \$1, saying she wants to serve as an example to other women who have been assaulted.

On Tuesday, Mueller testified that one of his radio station bosses, Hershel Coomer, said he had met Swift earlier before the show and that "he told me that he had his hands on her butt."

GOP senator suggests brain tumor affected McCain vote

Sen. Ron Johnson suggested that fellow Republican Sen. John McCain's brain tumor and the after-midnight timing of the vote were factors in the Arizona lawmaker's decisive vote against the GOP health care bill.

In a radio interview Tuesday with AM560 "Chicago's Morning Answer," Johnson answered questions about the collapse of the years-long Republican effort to repeal and replace Barack Affordable Obama's Care Act, his criticism of the process and Mc-Cain's dramatic vote.

In the early morning hours July 28, the Senate narrowly rejected the legislation, with McCain joining Sens. Lisa Murkowski of Alaska and Susan Collins of Maine, delivering a serious blow to President Donald Trump's agenda.

McCain, who had been diagnosed with brain cancer, had re-

turned to the Senate that week for the critical votes, lifting GOP hopes and then dashing them. "He has a brain tu-

mor right now. That

vote occurred at 1:30

in the morning. Some of that might have factored in," Wisconsin's Johnson said. That surprised the

interviewer, who asked, "Really?" and wondered whether the senator's illness and the late night affected his judgment. Johnson said he didn't want to speak

for any other senator, "I don't know exactly what. ... I really thought John was going to vote yes." Responding to Johnson, McCain spokes-

woman Julie Tarallo said Wednesday, "It is bizarre and deeply unfortunate that Senator Johnson would question the judgment of a colleague and friend. Senator McCain has been very open and clear about the reasons for his vote." Amid questions

about his comments, Johnson issued a statement on Wednesday, saying: "I'm disappointed I didn't more eloquently express my sympathy for what Sen. McCain is going through. I have nothing but respect for him and the vote came at the end of a long day for everyone."

Shortly after his vote, McCain said he opposed the bill because it fell short of the Republican promise to repeal and replace the 2010 law with meaningful reform. McCain returned to Arizona after the vote for radiation and chemotherapy treatments for his brain cancer.

Though Johnson ended up backing Majority Leader Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., on all four key health care votes last month, he was a repeated annoyance for party leaders on the issue.

A week before debate on the bill began in late July, Johnson signaled he might vote against the measure after accusing McConnell of "a real breach of trust." Johnson said McConnell had told moderate GOP senators that Medicaid cuts imposed by the

This Date In History

Today is Thursday, Aug. 10, the 222nd day of 2017. There are 143 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History:

On August 10, 1977, postal employee David Berkowitz was arrested in Yonkers, New York, accused of being "Son of Sam," the gunman who killed six people and wounded seven others in the New York City area. (Berkowitz is serving six consecutive 25-years-to-life sentences.)

In 1680, Pueblo Indians launched a successful revolt against Spanish colonists in present-day New Mexico.

In 1792, during the French Revolution, mobs in Paris attacked the Tuileries (TWEE'luh-reez) Palace, where King Louis XVI resided. (The king was later arrested, put on trial for treason, and executed.)

In 1821, Missouri became the 24th state.

In 1846, President James K. Polk signed a measure establishing the Smithsonian Institution. In 1874. Herbert Clark

Hoover, the 31st president of the United States, was born in West Branch, Iowa.

In 1921, Franklin D. Roosevelt

found slain at their temple outside Phoenix, Arizona. (Two teen-agers were later arrested; one was sentenced to life in prison, while the other received 281 years.)

In 1993, Ruth Bader Ginsburg was sworn in as the second female justice on the U.S. Supreme Court.

Ten years ago: Three men being lowered into a southern Indiana coal mine were killed when a nylon sling attached to the bucket the men were riding in got caught, causing the bucket to tip and sending them plummeting more than 500 feet to their deaths.

Five years ago: A man in an Afghan army uniform shot and killed three American service members in southern Afghanistan; the Taliban claimed the shooter joined the insurgency after the attack.

One year ago: During a raucous campaign rally outside Fort Lauderdale, Florida, Republican Donald Trump accused President Barack Obama of being the "founder" of the Islamic State group. (Trump later said he was "being sarcastic" before adding, "but not that sarcastic, to be honest with vou.")





One year ago: During a raucous campaign rally outside Fort Lauderdale, Florida, Republican Donald Trump accused President Barack Obama of being the "founder" of the Islamic State group. (Trump later said he was "being sarcastic" before adding, "but not that sarcastic, to be honest with vou.")

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AP Exclusive: Maggot case gives rare look at neglect probes

ROME, N.Y. (AP) — In his bed at a New York state group home for the severely disabled, Steven Wenger lay helpless against a silent in-

A slimy, wriggling clump was growing around the hole in his throat near his breathing tube. Nurses peered closer and made a discovery almost unheard of in modern American health care: maggots.

For Wenger, unable to walk, speak, or breathe without a ventilator since a car accident 26 years ago, it was the first of two infestations of the larval flies in his throat over successive days last summer, resulting in repeated trips to an emergency room and a state investigation that found days of neglect by caretakers. And if The Associated Press had not obtained a confidential report on the case, it's unlikely anyone in the outside world would have known anything about it.

That's because in New York and most other states, details of abuse and neglect investigations in state-regulated institutions for the disabled, addicted and mentally ill are almost never made public, even with the names blacked

As a result, it's easier to check the health record of a neighborhood restaurant than to find out about lapses in care in state institutions and group homes that people may be considering for their loved ones' around-the-clock

The suspect in car attack near Paris is an Algerian national

PARIS (AP) — A police source says the suspect in an attack on soldiers near Paris is a 37-year-old Algerian man who was legally living in France.

The man, Hamou Benlatreche, was known to French police over minor crimes but has never been convicted in court, the officer told The Associated Press Thursday. He spoke anonymously because he was not allowed to speak on an ongoing investigation.

French media, who reported the same name, say the suspect was living in the suburb of Bezons, north of Paris, where police searched a building on Wednesday night.

The suspect rammed his car into a group of soldiers Wednesday, injuring six of them. He was arrested by police following a highway manhunt and was hospitalized with bullet wounds.

Yemen's civil war turns country into cholera breeding ground

SANAA, Yemen (AP) — Collapsing on sidewalks and constantly vomiting, some of the Yemeni villagers barely make it to the tiny health center where doctors spread carton sheets in the backyard and use trees to hang bags of IV fluids for patients.

They are part of a stream of hundreds of suspected cholera victims that continues to converge on the center from the impoverished town of Bani Haydan in Yemen's northern Hajja province. Just hours after being infected, vomiting and diarrhea cause severe dehydration that can kill without rapid intervention.

Yemen's raging two-year conflict has turned the country into an incubator for lethal cholera: Primitive sanitation and water systems put Yemenis at risk of drinking feces-contaminated wells are dirtied by runoff from rainfall on piles of garbage left uncollected for weeks; farmland is irrigated with broken sewers due to

lax oversight and corruption; medical intervention is delayed due to unpaid government employees and half of the country's health facilities are out of service.

The cholera outbreak in Haiti has killed more than 9,000 people since 2010, but Yemen has seen the largest outbreak of the disease ever recorded in any country in a single year. The United Nations and international aid organizations say they are shocked at the speed and scale of the outbreak.

"It's a cholera paradise," said George Khoury, head of Office at the UN Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs in Yemen. "It's a recipe for disaster."

Hurricane Franklin makes landfall on Mexico's coast

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Hurricane Franklin roared ashore on Mexico's central Gulf coast early Thursday, threatening to pound a mountainous region prone to flash floods and mudslides with torrential rains and heavy winds.

Franklin strengthened into the first hurricane of the Atlantic season on Wednesday and its landfall as Category 1 storm early Thursday was its second on Mexican territory in three days. As a tropical storm, Franklin made a relatively mild run across the Yucatan Peninsula earlier in the week.

Authorities in Veracruz ordered classes canceled at public schools as a precautionary measure. Schools are frequently used as storm shelters in Mexico.

The U.S. National Hurricane Center said Franklin later weakened to a tropical storm Thursday morning with maximum sustained winds near 70 mph (113 kph). Additional weakening was forecast and Franklin was expected to dissipate by late Thursday or early Friday.

Franklin's center was about 75 miles (121 kilometers) south of Tuxpan, Mexico, and the storm was moving a little south of west near 15 mph (24 kph).

Study: Trump actions trigger health premium hikes for 2018

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Trump administration's own actions are triggering doubledigit premium increases on individual health insurance policies purchased by many consumers, a nonpartisan study has found.

The analysis released Thursday by the Kaiser Family Foundation found that mixed signals from President Donald Trump have created uncertainty "far outside the norm," leading insurers to seek higher premium increases for 2018 than would otherwise have been the case.

The report comes with Re-

publicans in Congress unable to deliver on their promise to repeal and replace the Obama-era Affordable Care Act. Trump, meanwhile, insists lawmakers try again. The president says "Obamacare" collapsing, but he's also threatened to give it a shove by stopping billions of dollars in payments to insurers. Some leading Republicans are considering fallback measures to stabilize markets.

Researchers from the Kaiser foundation looked at proposed premiums for a benchmark silver plan across major metropoli-

tan areas in 20 states and Washington, D.C. Overall, they found that 15 of those cities will see increases of 10 percent or more next year.

The highest: a 49 percent jump in Wilmington, Delaware. The only decline: a 5 percent reduction in Providence, Rhode Island.

Free-speech debate swirls as officials block on social media

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) -An emerging debate about whether elected officials violate people's free speech rights by blocking them on social media is spreading across the U.S. as groups sue or warn politicians to stop the practice.

The American Civil Liberties Union this week sued Maine Gov. Paul LePage and sent warning letters to Utah's congressional delegation. It followed recent lawsuits against the governors of Marvland and Kentucky and President Donald Trump.

Trump's frequent and often unorthodox use of Twitter and allegations he blocks with dissenting views has raised questions about what elected officials can and cannot do on their official social media pages.

Politicians at all levels increasingly embrace social media to discuss government business, sometimes at the expense of traditional town halls or in-person meetings.

"People turn to social media because they see their elected officials as being available there and they're hungry for opportunities to express their opinions and share feedback," said Anna Thomas, spokeswoman for the ACLU of Utah. "That includes people who disagree with public officials."

Club pros enjoying the spotlight at PGA Championship

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) -Alex Beach played a practice round with Luke Donald, walked off the ninth green and signed autographs.

The club pro from New Jersey is savoring every moment of his first PGA Championship.

And deservedly so. About a year ago at this time, he was in a hospital.

"It took a long time to fight back," Beach said Wednesday, "but to be here a year and some change later, it feels very special.'

So while Jordan Spieth, Phil Mickelson and the rest of golf's glamour names likely will dominate the headlines later in the week, the eve of the season's final major championship belonged to Beach and the 19 other professionals who scratched their way into the field at Quail Hollow.

Suspended Fox host suing reporter over alleged lewd texts

NEW YORK (AP) — Suspended Fox News host Eric Bolling on Wednesday sued the reporter who broke the story that he had allegedly sent lewd text messages to colleagues.

Bolling filed a \$50 million defamation lawsuit in state Supreme Court in Manhattan against Yashar Ali, a **Huffington Post contributing** writer. The cable news host said Ali damaged his reputation through what the court papers call the "highly reckless publication of actionable false and misleading statements about the plaintiff's conduct and character."

Bolling was suspended over the weekend pending an internal investigation that a Fox spokesperson said is underway.

Ali wrote last week that Bolling is accused of sending unsolicited photos of male genitalia to co-workers over several years. On Wednesday, the report-

er tweeted that he stands by his story and will protect his sources. Ali also wrote that he is not going to stop reporting on Bolling "or anyone else. I've had family members killed/jailed in Iran, a volved in the legal action.

lawsuit isn't going to scare me."

Huffington Post editor in chief Lydia Polgreen, a former top New York Times editor, tweeted in support of Ali Tuesday night. "Yashar Ali is a careful and meticulous reporter," Polgreen wrote, adding that the publication stands by his reporting and that it has "no hesitation about standing by him financially in this case." Huffington Post is owned by Verizon thanks to its 2015 purchase of

Bolling's lawyer, Michael J. Bowe, said in a statement: "This anonymously sourced and uncorroborated story is false, defamatory, and obviously intended to destroy this good man's career and family. We will defend Eric aggressively in court, where actual facts, based on evidence, testimony, and crossexamination, will belie these anonymous accusations."

Bolling tweeted that he "will continue to fight against these false smear attacks! THANK YOU FOR CONTIN-**UED SUPPORT.**"

Texas doctor gets 35 years in prison for \$375M medical fraud

DALLAS (AP) — A 60-yearold Dallas-area doctor has been sentenced to 35 years in prison for helping defraud Medicare and Medicaid out of almost \$375 million.

A federal judge also ordered Dr. Jacques (ZHAWK) Roy on Wednesday to pay more than \$268 million in restitution. A jury in April 2016 convicted the Rockwall physician of nine of 10 counts of defrauding a health care benefit pro-Dr. Rudy Haddad

Roy owned Medistat Group Associates in the Dallas sub-
