## Highlights and Sidelights FROM YOUR State CAPITOL

Gov. John B. Connally says he is giving a great deal of thought to the appointment of a successor to former Railroad Commissioner William J. Murray Jr.

Connally says he hopes to find a replacement before the Senate adjourns on May 24, so his choice can be confirmed.

The governor stated he also is working hard on appointments to the "Committee of 25." This is a committee which will be charged with an extensive study of education beyond the High School. He has personally interviewed every candidate. Aim is to pick people who have the respect of the public and the teaching profession.

**CONNALLY ACCOMPLISHMENTS**

Governor Connally can claim a record of accomplishment with the 56th Legislature, which has carried out the following items on his list the governor laid out in his messages to the Legislature:

1. A bill authorizing the Texas Water Development Board to acquire water storage space in federal or local reservoirs is ready for Connally's signature.
2. Revision of the antiquated state Code of Criminal Procedure probably will go to a Senate-House conference committee to iron out differences.
3. Loan regulation bill is near final passage.
4. A constitutional amendment removing the ceiling on welfare grants has passed the Senate and is ready for House action.
5. Padre Island National Seashore bill has been signed into law.
6. Proposed constitutional amendment repealing the poll tax passed the Senate and awaits House action. A bill to set up a registration system to replace the poll tax and a revision of the election code are close to final form in conference committees.
7. A tax package - mainly increases in sales taxes on cars and clothes and a year-long extension of the corporation tax - has been signed into law.
8. A Senate-passed bill limiting governors to two elected terms now awaits House action.
9. Municipal annexation bill, which sets some limits on the powers of cities to annex territory, is ready for his signature.
10. Measure creating the Texas Tourist Development Agency has been signed into law.

"Looking Through The Knot Hole"

With Myrtle

Hello there Jane, I hear you are making plans to fix up the old place. Before you get too far along, I would like for you to go to Willson & Nichols Lumber and see the many new things that will help.

So many people are getting tired of painting the outside of the house every two years. You know the wind in this country acts as a sander on paint. Well, now there is a new aluminum siding that lasts forever and comes finished in seven lovely colors. One picture shows a house in white siding, trimmed with Wepco aluminum storm doors and storm windows in blue, or you might use a mint green siding with white trim. John told me of a very attractive white house using the black storm windows. This new siding has the new pile on application that eliminates breaking and bending. This cuts installation time, reduces costs and allows for easy replacement. There is a vertical and a horizontal siding. One is used for the more traditional house with English type windows. The other for modern, with big clear windows.

We need to get things cleaned up and painted up before the hot weather sets in. The storm windows and doors at Willson & Nichols come in several colors. It will rain but until it does, we must water the yard and I looked at the new sprinklers and was impressed with one called "Dial A Rain", the sprinkler with a heart. It is the only Oscillating sprinkler with uniform water coverage. My neighbor has one and it really does get the job done. There are several other types sprinklers that are nearly as good, and if you need new hose or nozzle, they are at John's store.

Well I am a gardener and there is no stopping place for me in the tool department, just let me tell you about a few: of course I spend the summer with a hoe in my hand, but there are many things to help make growing flowers and vegetables easier.

First let's buy a perforated peg board to hang things on. Put it in the tool house or garage. There are 6 kinds and sizes in spades. The small trowel for moving small plants, the big digger spade and hoes, rakes, grass brooms and a Dandelion digger. Please, get at those pests, before the seed blow over into my yard.

Actually there are 36 chrome hand tools and the cultivators. These Ames tools have been in use around homes since 1774 and they sell very reasonably. Ames also makes dozens of different shears, such as the pruners for big trees and shrubs. By the way, you need to get those spring blooming shrubs trimmed now, there are grass and hedge clippers. There are hanger hooks to put things on, also a storage hose reel. This would be a good buy. It will save pulling the hose as it is on wheels.

John has the big forks and things for the big farmer. Everyone needs the Mactack hoe, I call it my "grubbing hoe", a MUST for dividing those Iris, that is a NOW job too. And while you are at Willson & Nichols pick up a roll of grass-stop, a steel edging that makes lawn care easier, keeps the grass out of the flower beds.

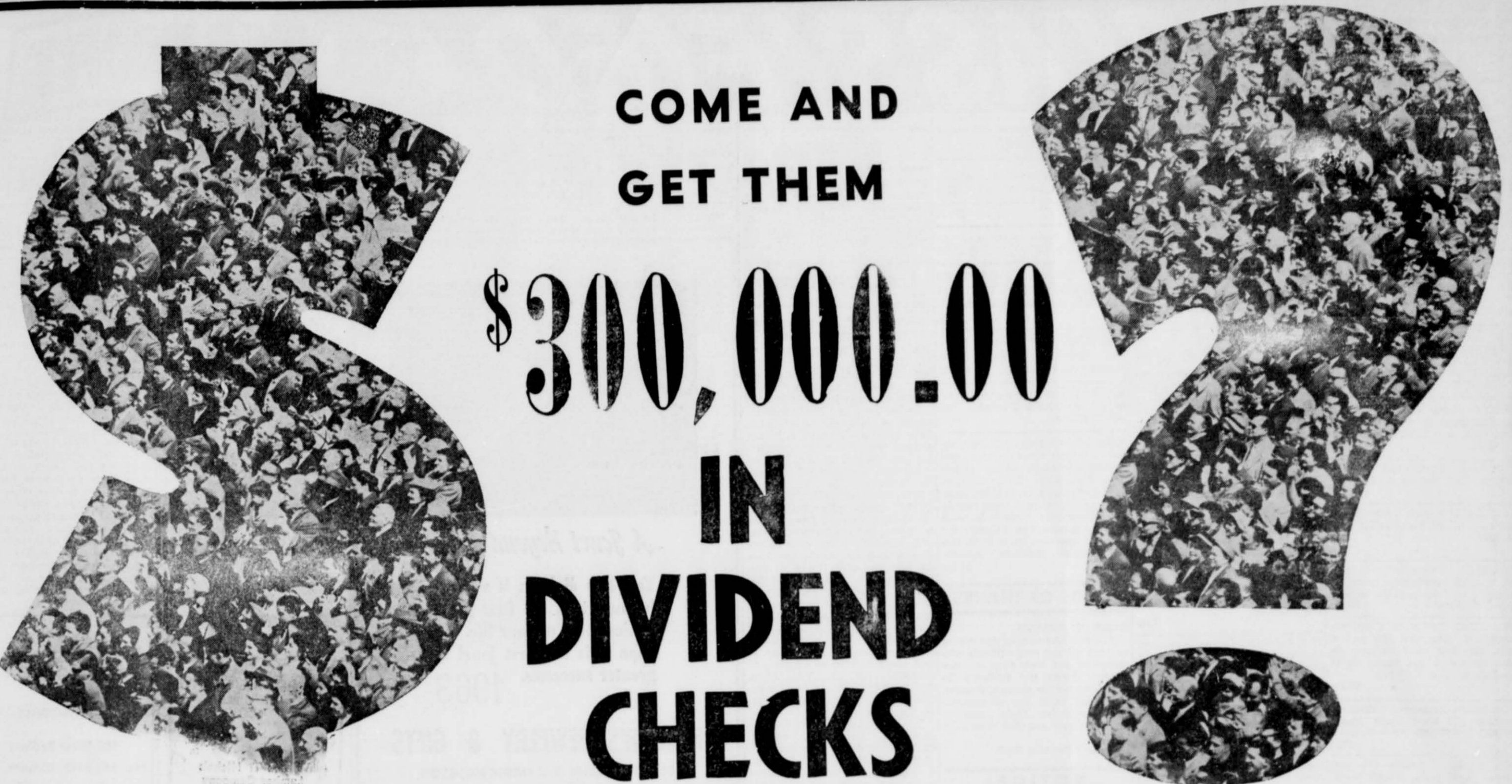

## LEGAL NOTICES

No. 188 AN ORDINANCE REGULATING AND DEFINING THE SPEED LIMITS OF MOTOR VEHICLES WITHIN THE CITY OF DIMMITT, TEXAS, AND PROVIDING FOR PENALTIES DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF DIMMITT, TEXAS: Section 1. This entire ordinance is and shall be deemed an exercise of the police power of the State of Texas, and of the City of Dimmitt, Texas, and for the public safety and protection of the City and of the Citizens thereof and all of the provisions herein shall be construed for the accomplishment of that purpose. Section 2. From and after the passage and first publication hereof, it shall be unlawful for any person to drive or operate a motor vehicle upon any street, roadway, or highway in the City Limits of the City of Dimmitt, at a greater rate of speed than 20 miles per hour, except where speed zone signs are erected indicating a higher or lower rate of speed, in which case the speed indicated by the speed zone shall be the maximum speed permitted, and it shall be unlawful for any person to operate a motor vehicle in excess of the speed limit indicated on any official speed zone sign. Section 3. Any person violating any provision of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum of not less than \$1.00 and not more than \$100.00. Section 4. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed. Section 5. An immediate necessity and emergency exists by reason of the public safety and welfare of the citizens and convenience of the citizens of this City and this ordinance shall take effect immediately and shall be enforced from and after its passage and first publication.
