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Video of BSPD officer sparks internal investigation

The Big Spring Police Department has opened an internal investigation into an arrest made over the weekend.

On Sept. 23 2016, the BSPD was informed about an arrest made by one of their officers. The investigation surrounds a video posted to social media over the weekend of a BSPD officer arresting a woman. The video shows the officer attempting to get the woman to stand up after handcuffing her and eventually dragging her to the police car.

"We have viewed a social media video that shows our officer making an arrest on an adult female and then pulling her to the side of his police unit," read a press release issued by the BSPD this morning.

According to BSPD Police Chief Chad Williams, an internal administrative investigation has been initiated. No further information has been released as of Monday morning.

At press time, the video hasd been viewed more than 112,000 times.

Council to vote on tax rate, budget, Tuesday

At their meeting Tuesday evening, the Big Spring City Council plans to vote on a resolution adopting the new Fiscal Year 2017-2018 tax rate, and another approving the city's budget for the fiscal year.

The meeting is scheduled for 5:30 p.m. Tuesday at the Big Spring City Council Chambers, 307 E. Fourth St.

The proposed tax rate is 84.2320 cents per \$100 valuation, which should represent a 6.56 revenue increase over last year's rate.

Of that tax rate, 70.6778 cents per \$100 valuation are regular ad valorem property tax rate; while the remaining 13.5542 cents per \$100 valuation are earmarked to repay general obligation bonds and certificates of obligation. A general obligation bond issued in 2007 will require 5.8988 cents per \$100; a certificate of obligation dated the same year will require 0.2744 cents per \$100. Another certificate of obligation from 2010 will cost taxpayers 2.6748 cents per \$100 valuation; while another general obligation bond issued in 2016 will require 4.7062 cents per \$100 to make this year's payments.

According to the resolution to adopt the new rate, the tax increase will raise the taxes on a \$100,000 home by about \$51.85 over last year's

The council will also vote on approving the 2017-2018 budget.



The new budget totals about \$52.7 million, about \$19.7 million of

Trump relishes feud with the NFL, reviving issue with tweets

WASHINGTON (AP) President Donald Trump is indulging in his favorite kind of drama — personal, aggressive, culturally volatile and entirely of his own making.

And his feud with the NFL shows no signs of abating, with the president tweeting early Monday morning: "The issue of kneeling has nothing to do with race. It is about respect for our Country, Flag and National Anthem. NFL must respect this!"

Trump's spat with athletes comes as the president prepares to sell a tax overhaul plan and revive health care legislation — his party's top legislative priorities.

But instead of publicly prioritizing policy and courting votes, the provocateur president spent three days attacking the NFL players who kneel during the national anthem to protest police brutality. On Friday night, during a rally in Huntsville, Alabama, Trump said: "Wouldn't you love to see one of these NFL owners when somebody disrespects our flag to say get that son of a bitch off the field right now, out, he's fired, he's

Trump also rescinded a White House invitation for basketball player Stephen Curry, a star player on the NBA champion Golden State

president's sparked a massive show of defiance this weekend, with more than 200 NFL players protesting by choosing not to stand for the national anthem and many coaches locking arms with the players.

Speaking to reporters on Sunday night in New Jersey, Trump said players and coaches locking arms was a display of "solidarity" that he approved of. But he pushed back against the suggestion that his critique could inflame racial tensions, arguing: "I never said anything

Top Republicans added billions of extra dollars and eased coverage requirements to their effort to repeal the Obama health care law, as party leaders labored Monday to stave off defeat in a Senate showdown this The updated measure

would add \$14.5 billion and mean added funds including for states Alaska, Arizona, Kentucky. Maine and Texas. All are home to dissident senators whose support leaders need to push the measure through the narrowly divided Senate.

The revamped proposal gives states more freedom to charge higher premiums for older and seriously ill people and to sell skimpy, lower-cost policies.

The initial version, by GOP Sens. Bill Cassidy of Louisiana and South Carolina's Lindsey Graham, required federal approval for such ac-

It would also let states raise limits President Barack Obama's Affordable Care Act has placed on consumers' out-ofpocket costs.

Such changes might appeal to conservative Sen. Ted Cruz, R-Texas, who said Sunday he didn't support the measure and said it needed added steps to drive down premiums. The rewriting came

as Republicans gird for a final, uphill push to deliver the party's longtime promise to obliterate Obama's 2010 law. In an embarrassing crash, Senate rejected three earlier versions this summer. A vote must occur this

week for Republicans to have any chance of prevailing with their narrow margin. Next Sunday, protec-

According to GOP figures, the legislation's grants would provide 14 percent more money for Arizona than under Obama's law; 4 percent more for Kentucky; 49 percent more for Texas; 3 percent more for Alaska and 43 percent more for Maine.

Some extra money is specifically directed at sparsely populated states.

The numbers are misleading, partly because they omit GOP Medicaid cuts from clamping per-person spending caps on the program, House, said Matt spokesman for Senate Minority Leader Chuck Schumer, D-N.Y. In a statement, Schumer said the measure would "throw our health insurance system into chaos."





Austin pilot sentenced to 3 years for drug smuggling flight

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — A Texas pilot whose suspicious flight pattern from Oregon to Arizona drew law enforcement attention must serve three years in federal prison for the drug-smuggling trip.

Wayne Douglas Brunet in June pleaded guilty to possession with intent to distribute marijuana. The 65-year-old Austin man was sentenced Friday, plus must forfeit his 1969 Piper Comanche and pay a \$5,000 fine.

Investigators say Brunet had more than 200 pounds of marijuana in the single-engine plane when he was arrested in March after a late-night landing at Llano Municipal Airport, about 70 miles northwest of Austin. Authorities had tracked Brunet's plane from Medford, Oregon, then to Holbrook, Arizona, to refuel. Brunet briefly landed or tried to land at two other small Texas airports, but officers were present and he took off.

Killeen boy seriously injured in hit and run accident

KILLEEN, Texas (AP) — A 5-year-old Texas boy has been taken to the hospital with serious injuries after a hit-and-run accident Sunday afternoon.

A Killeen Police spokesman said witnesses told officers that the boy was hit around noon by a silver Dodge Charger with black diagonal stripes.

Witnesses say the Charger stopped a few houses down after hitting the boy. A late-model red Ford Mustang or Dodge Challenger stopped alongside the other car, and after a few moments both fled

2 Texas officers injured in crash chasing road rage suspect

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — Two Texas police officers have been taken to the hospital with serious injuries after crashing during a vehicle pursuit of a person involved in a road rage incident.

Fort Worth Police spokesman Officer Brad Perez told The Fort Worth Star-Telegram Sunday that the officers were responding to a call around 3 p.m. for a road rage incident during which a suspect allegedly displayed a gun at another vehicle.

Perez says there was "some type of accident" that involved the officers crashing their patrol car into a brick wall at a Wells Fargo Bank and the suspect's car being disabled as well. Perez said the suspect took off on foot after the accident. The suspect, who was not identified, was in custody as of 4:30 p.m.

Federal, Texas officials testing boats displaced by Harvey

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Federal and state officials have teamed up to recover and test around 300 boats that were displaced, overturned or sunk when Harvey passed through Southeast Texas, causing record floods in its wake.

In a statement Saturday, the Texas General Land Office said it is working with the U.S. Coast Guard to test the vessels for oil leaks. Commissioner George P. Bush, son of former Florida Gov. Jeb Bush, says that the hurricane's destruction will "require a long recovery."

Fuel spillage from the overturned boats threatens the environment and fishing industry along the Texas coastline.

Congressman to flood victims: 'God is telling you to move'

DALLAS (AP) — The chairman of the House Financial Services Committee says victims of repeat flooding should consider Harvey's devastation a sign from on high.

U.S. Rep. Jep Hensarling, a Republican from Dallas, said on CNBC during a segment on flood insurance Thursday that U.S. taxpayers should not have to foot the bill for at-risk homes that have flooded over and over again.

He said, "At some point, God is telling you to move." Hensarling says homeowners in floodprone areas should make their properties more resilient or move out of the flood zone. Earlier this month, President Donald Trump signed a bill providing \$15 billion for Hurricane Harvey disaster relief, which incorporated an extension of the federal flood insurance program.

EPA removes waste at Texas toxic sites, won't say from where

WASHINGTON (AP) The Environmental Protection Agency says it has recovered 517 containers of "unidentified, potentially hazardous material" from highly contaminated toxic waste sites in Texas that flooded last month during Hurricane Harvey.

The agency has not provided details about which Superfund sites the material came from, why the contaminants at issue have not been identified and whether there's a threat to human health.

The one-sentence disclosure about the 517 containers was made Friday night deep within a media release from the Federal Emergency Management Agency summarizing the government's response to the devastating storm.

At least a dozen Superfund sites in and around Houston were flooded in the days after Harvey's record-shattering rains stopped. Associated Press journalists surveyed seven of the flooded sites by boat, vehicle and on foot. The EPA said at the time that its personnel had been unable to reach the sites, though they surveyed the locations using aer-

ial photos. The Associated Press reported Monday that a government hotline also received calls about three spills at

the U.S. Oil Recovery Superfund site, a former petroleum waste processing plant outside Houston contaminated with a dangerous brew of cancer-causing chemicals. Records obtained by the AP showed workers at the site reported spills of unknown materials in unknown amounts.

Local pollution control officials photographed three large tanks used to store potentially hazardous waste completely underwater on Aug. 29. The EPA later said there was no evidence that nearby Vince Bayou had been impacted.

PRP Group, the company formed to clean up the U.S. Oil Recovery site, said it does not know how much material leaked from the tanks, soaking into the soil or flowing into the bayou. As part of the post-storm cleanup. workers have vacuumed up 63 truckloads of potentially contaminated storm water, totaling about 315,000 gal-It was not immediate-

ly clear whether those truckloads accounted for any of the 517 containers cited in the FEMA media release on Friday. The EPA has not responded to questions from AP about activities at U.S. Oil Recovery for more than a week.

About a dozen miles

east, the San Jacinto River Waste Pits Superfund site is on and around a low-lying island that was the site of a paper mill in the 1960s, leaving behind dangerous levels of dioxins and other long-lasting toxins linked to birth defects and cancer. The site was completely covered with floodwaters when the AP surveyed it on Sept. 1.

prevent taminated soil and sediments from being washed down river, about 16 acres of the site was covered in 2011 with an "armored cap" of fabric and rock.

The cap was reportedly designed to last for up to 100 years, but it has required extensive repairs on at least six occasions in recent years, with large sections becoming displaced or having been washed away.

The EPA has not responded to repeated inquiries over the past two weeks about whether its assessment has determined whether the cap was similarly damaged during Harvey.

The companies responsible for cleaning up the site, Waste Management Inc. and International Paper, have said there were "a small number of areas where the current layer of armored cap is thinner than required."

"There was no evidence of a release from any of these areas," the companies said, adding that sediments there were sampled last week.

The EPA has not yet released those test results to the public.



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

He won the heart lead with the ace, ruffed a heart and cashed the A-K-Q of diamonds, discarding the J-6 of clubs. He then ruffed a club, a heart, a club and his last heart.

By this time, nine tricks had been played, and South had won them all. The lead was in dummy, and South's last four cards were the A-K-J-8 of spades, while West was down to the Q-10-9-7 of spades.


Declarer led a club from dummy and ruffed with the eight. West overruffed with the nine but had to surrender the last three tricks!

Strangely enough, even four spades could have been stopped had West been sufficiently inspired to start off with the king and another club. A club continuation by East would then have settled South's

has thrown nine touchdown passes and just three interceptions. His passer rating is 162.2, up from 129.2

"I feel good," Hill said. "Confidence in the offense and confident in what we are doing and the understanding of it all and what it takes off the field, too. I feel good, especially after a game like this."

Last November, the Horned Frogs were held to six points in a loss to Oklahoma State and six points in a loss to Kansas State. This season, the Horned Frogs are rolling. A week after gaining 619 yards in a 56-36 win over SMU, TCU's offense controlled the game against Oklahoma State.

Oklahoma State defensive coordinator Glenn Spencer said Hill played a key role in Saturday's result.

"I was impressed with him," Spencer said. "During the week, I had mentioned that Hill was playing with a lot of confidence, and I thought I was right in saying that. He has kind of gelled in their system a little bit."

Darius Anderson has emerged as a star at running back. He ran for 89 yards against yards and two touchdowns against SMU, and then ran for 160 yards and three scores against Oklahoma State, including a 42-yard touchdown bolt in the fourth quarter that put the Horned Frogs in control for good.

"For only being a sophomore, he's really giving us what we need," TCU coach Gary Patterson said. "If you want to win championships, you've got to throw it, but you've got to run the football — especially when you go on the road."

Baylor almost completely ruined the weekend for football fans in the Sooner State, but third-ranked Oklahoma did just enough to gut out a 49-41 win over the winless Bears.

"Yeah, I think it was a good reality check for us," Oklahoma quarterback Baker Mayfield said. "We say it all the time around here: all gas, no brakes. So you can never let your foot off the pedal, especially playing a team like that because they can score in a second. Doesn't matter their record or anything."

The Sooners lowered the boom with their running game. Abdul Adams had 11 carries for 164 yards, including a 99-yard touchdown run. Trey Sermon ran 12 times for 148 yards and two touchdowns, all in the fourth quarter. It was a strong running performance from an Oklahoma team that lost running backs Samaje Perine and Joe Mixon to the NFL from last year's team.

"The guys we have in the backfield, they're not slouchy either," Mayfield said. "They're special guys. No, not everybody knows who they are and they haven't had the same amount of reps as Joe and Samaje did, but those guys are talented too. That's why they're at the University of Oklahoma."

Raiders' 27-24 win over Houston that snapped the Cougars' 16-game home winning streak. "He's one of the best

playmakers, if not the best playmaker, in the country," Shimonek said. "I've said on numerous occasions he's one of those guys if I throw the ball behind the line of scrimmage he can take it to the house. That gives me confidence being able to throw it to him.

"He can make something happen with it and he catches basically everything I throw in his direction."

In the opening three games for the Red Raiders (3-0), Shimonek and Coutee have hooked up for 446 yards and four scores on 28 catches, averaging 15.9 yards per grab.

"I think Keke and Nic have a great rapport," Texas Tech coach Kliff Kingsbury said. "They connected when we needed them."

The 100-yard performance was the fifth of Coutee's career and second-straight this season.

Shimonek finished 29 of 45 for 321 yards with two touchdowns and an interception. The interception was his first of the season after going 107 pass attempts without being picked off.

Houston (2-1) owned the nation's longest active home winning streak. The last home loss for the Cougars was Nov. 8, 2014, against Tulane, 31-24.

"This one stings," Houston coach Major Applewhite said. "We have to get over it and move on and understand there are eight games left to play."

The loss snaps a sevengame winning streak for the Cougars against teams from Power 5 conferences. The last loss came to Vanderbilt 41-24 in the BBVA Compass Bowl on Jan. 4, 2014.

that nobody's won here in 16 games," Kingsbury said. "Big time, Top 10 programs come in here and it's a tough place to play. It's hot; they've got a great stadium. I coached here for four years. Kyle Postma replaced Allen midway through the fourth quarter. Postma was 8 of 13 for 100 yards and a score. Postma - the leading rusher for the Cougars - also had four carries for 52 yards, including a nine-yard

touchdown run. "(Postma) was going to give us the best opportunity at that point when the complextion of the game changed and started to get that way coverage wise," Applewhite said. "I thought he did a great job. Came in, took care of the football and led us on some scoring drives."

Allen has started all three games this season for Houston.

"Every job is open," Applewhite said when asked about the quarterback position moving forward.

Neither Allen nor Postma were made available to the media following the game.

THE TAKEAWAY

Texas Tech: The Red Raiders have started 3-0 for the fifth time in the last seven seasons and are 11-2 against nonconference opponents under Kliff Kingsbury.

Houston: The Cougars offense struggled mightily against Texas Tech. Allen has turned the ball over six times in his first three games as the Cougars' starting quarterback. Allen has thrown four interceptions and fumbled twice.

INJURY UPDATE

Texas Tech junior defensive back Vaughnte Dorsey was injured on kickoff coverage midway through the fourth quarter and was removed on a stretcher.

The injury, with 7:26 left in the fourth quarter, happened on the Houston sideline. The injury came after the Red Raiders had taken a 27-10 lead.

Kingsbury confirmed after the game, Dorsey had suffered a head injury and would be taken to a precautionary check-

You go over there and check out what's going on. He seemed to be OK,' Kingsbury said. "It's awful to see that. You start praying."

Dorsey did give thumbs up to the crowd as he was carted out of the stadium.

"From the feedback I got from the trainers, I think that was positive," Kingsbury said about the thumbs up. "I don't want to go into details but I felt positive about that."
