Howard commissioners adopt 2017-2018 tax rate

Howard County commissioners for-

mally adopted the county's tax rate for Fiscal Year 2017-2018 at their regularly scheduled meeting Tuesday after-

Commissioners held two public hearings on the rate – 44 cents per

\$100 valuation – in previous weeks, but no one from the public showed up to make comments or ask questions. Reading the tax ordinance, How-

ard County Judge Kathryn Wiseman broke down the total tax rate by the various funds it would

finance.

"We, the commissioners of Howard County

do hereby elect or adopt the tax rate on each \$100 worth of property located within the county of Howard made taxable by law for the tax year

2017, as follows: In our General Fund

is 0.314459; our Road and Bridge Fund is 0.058925; our Special Road and Bridge Fund is 0.041075; the Interest and Sinking Debt Service Fund is 0.025541; that comes to a total tax rate of 0.44," she said. The 44 cents per \$100 valuation rate

is the same as the current tax rate: however, shifting property values mean that the county should take in about \$250,000 more than last year, which will be used to replenish its General Fund, which was depleted by projects this year. Commissioners unanimously ap-

proved the new rate, after a motion to approve by Precinct 4 Commissioner John Cline, and a second by Precinct 1 Commissioner Oscar Garcia. In other business, District Clerk

Colleen Barton presented commissioners with a request from the office of Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton to place a secure wireless Internet connection in the Howard County Courthouse.

"They would like to put in a router and the wiring. They would pay for

GOP, White House prepare to roll out tax cuts

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House and congressional Republicans are finalizing a tax plan that would slash the

corporate rate while likely reducing the levy for the wealthiest Americans, with President Donald Trump ready to roll out the policy proposal

The grand plan to rewrite the nation's tax code would be the first major overhaul in three decades, delivering on a Trump campaign pledge and providing a sorely needed legislative achievement. It also is expected to eliminate or

reduce some tax breaks and deductions. The plan would likely cut the tax rate for the wealthiest Americans, now at 39.6 percent, to 35 percent, people familiar with the plan said Monday. They spoke on condition of

In addition, the top tax for corporations would be reduced to around 20 percent from the current 35 percent, they said. It will seek to simplify the tax system by reducing the number of income tax brackets from seven to three.

anonymity ahead of a formal announcement.

Trump has said he wanted a 15 percent rate for corporations, but House Speaker Paul Ryan has called that impractically low and has said it would risk adding to the soaring \$20 trillion national debt.

The White House and congressional leaders planned an allout blitz later this week to build support for the plan, which is now Trump's top legislative priority as the GOP has struggled to repeal and replace Democrat Barack Obama's health care law. The political stakes are high for Trump, who has

promised to bring 3 percent economic growth and expanded jobs through tax cuts. Trump was meeting at the White House on Tuesday morn-

ing with members of the tax-writing House Ways and Means



Committee, including its chairman, Rep. Kevin Brady, R-Texas, and the committee's top Democrat, Rep. Richard Neal of Massachusetts.

Vice President Mike Pence was expected to hold events in Michigan and Wisconsin on Thursday to promote the tax plan with business leaders. The plan being assembled lays out

"pro-growth tax reform," Brady told reporters on Capitol Hill. It will fix a tax code that is "so complex, so costly and so unfair," he said. Brady predicted the plan "will deliver the lowest tax rates on businesses in modern history."

Details will be filled in later by the committee, and legislation will be put forward after the House and Senate enact their budget frameworks,

Brady said.

Republicans are divided over the potential elimination of some of the deductions, underscoring the difficulty of overhauling the tax code even with GOP control of the House and Senate.

House Republicans planned to hold a retreat Wednesday at Fort McNair, Maryland, a few miles from the White House, to discuss the proposal, with briefings led by Brady and Rep. Peter Roskam, R-Ill. Pence was expected to Trump planned to address the plan

in a speech the same day at the Indiana State Fairgrounds in Indianapolis. Cabinet members and other top administration officials were fanning out on Thursday to talk about the benefits of overhauling the tax system. "The tax reform I think is very criti-

cal and he knows that," said Christopher Ruddy, the CEO of NewsMax and a longtime Trump friend. "And

that's why he'll push really hard for it. But he's got something big going for him here. The Republicans need to run on something next year and it's tax cuts. So even if they don't want to be particularly helpful to him, I think they're going to give him this. If he has the tax cuts signed, I think it's going to be very helpful for him."

Touching with his conservative base, Trump planned to discuss the tax plan at dinner Monday night with representatives of several conservative, religious and anti-abortion Outside Republican groups and

business interests are also planning a major push to advocate for the tax framework. Corry Bliss, the executive director

of the American Action Network, a conservative advocacy group, said it planned to spend \$12 million — atop

the \$8 million it spent laying the groundwork for the tax overhaul — to help win passage of the plan.

"There's an understanding among outside groups, among members, among Republicans across the country that there is a desperate need to cut middle-class taxes," Bliss said, noting "excitement and relief" among outside groups that it was "finally time" to push the tax package in Con-

Republicans control Congress but they are split on some core tax issues. They're in agreement on wanting to cut tax rates and simplify the byzantine tax system but they're divided over whether to add to the government's ballooning debt with tax cuts. The GOP also is at odds over eliminating the federal deduction for state and local taxes.

it, maintain it... It's just for their office," Barton said. "I've spoken with Commissioner (Craig) Bailey about it. He looked over the memorandum, and thought that he might like to see some changes

Bailey said he's been in contact with the Attorney General's office, and they plan to make some tweaks to the proposal and send a revised version to the commissioners in the near future. "The AG has asked us to provide them a place

which would allow them to put in a secure service that would interface with their lines, instead of using our wi-fi here at the courthouse," he said. "They want to make sure that it would be secure." According to the proposal, the router would be

kept inside a locked box, and county officials would not have access to it, to maintain the security of the system for the state. Bailey he had a few concerns about the wording of the proposal.

"I did, yeah," he said. "That we would be either responsible or semi-responsible for the security of that network when, in fact, we have nothing to do with that network. The other issue that I had was, there was a comment regarding sharing the cost; and, after visiting with the AG, we won't have to do that, but I wanted to put that inside the contract amendments." Commissioners tabled action on the proposal un-

til they received the amended contract. "I'll make some contract modifications and send it

back to them, then we'll get it approved and sign it, if it meets everybody's wants, needs, and desires,"

Equifax CEO retires in the wake of damaging data breach By KEN SWEET said in a statement that chief security officer from May 13 through By KEN SWEET

NEW YORK (AP) — Equifax CEO Richard Smith is retiring effective immediately as the credit reporting agency tries to clean up the mess left by a damaging data breach that exposed highly sensitive information about 143 million Americans.

The shake-up nounced Tuesday comes after Equifax disclosed that hackers exploited a software flaw that the company didn't fix to heist Social Security numbers, birthdates and other personal data that provide the keys to identify theft. Smith will also step

down from the chairman post. He had been Equifax's CEO since 2005. Paulino do Rego Barros Jr. was named interim CEO, while board member Mark Feidler was appointed non-executive chairman. Barros most recently served as president of the Asia Pacific

will conduct a search for a permanent CEO, considering both internal and external candidates.

While the company

Smith was retiring, Equifax said in a regulatory filing that it has not entered into any other arrangement or agreement with Smith in connection with his retirement. He will however, serve as an unpaid adviser to help with the transition process.

The company said in the filing that Smith will not receive his annual bonus, and his other potential retirementrelated benefits won't be awarded until Equifax concludes an independent review of the data

"The cybersecurity incident has affected millions of consumers, and I have been completely dedicated to making this right," Smith said in a statement. "At this critical juncture. I believe it is in the best interests of the company to have new leadership to move the company forward."

Although many analysts had applauded Equifax's performance under Smith, he and the rest of his management Equifax said that it team had come under fire for lax security and its response to the

Smith's departure follows the abrupt retirement of Equifax's chief security officer and chief information offi-

Equifax had tried to appease incensed lawmakers, consumers and investors on September 15 with the unceremonious retirement of its

and chief information officer who were responsible for managing and protecting the company's technology. But that wasn't

enough, with lawmakers drawing up bills that would impose sweeping reforms on Equifax and its two main rivals, Experian and TransUnion. and Equifax's stock in a downfall that wiped out one third-of the Atlanta company's value — a \$5.5 billion setback.

Appeals court allows more of Texas 'sanctuary cities' law

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — A federal appeals court has partially lifted a judge's order that blocked much of a Texas law targeting "sanctuary cities."

Monday's ruling by three-judge panel of the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals panel allows more of the law to take effect, and says that the law could survive with some language changes.

The law requires Texas cities and counties to comply with federal immigration officials' requests to detain people who are suspected of being in the country illegally and jailed on non-immigration of-

U.S. District Judge Orlando Garcia blocked much of the law on Aug. 31, a day before it was to take effect. The state asked the New Orleans-based 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals to let the law take effect ahead of oral arguments set for November.

Houston residents move to new emergency shelter at mall

HOUSTON (AP) — The American Red Cross moved more than 250 people from a Houston convention center to a new emergency shelter in an empty department store almost a month after Hurricane Harvey displaced thousands.

Storm victims began relocating from the NRG Center to the Greenspoint Mall on Friday, The Houston Chronicle reported .

The mall may be able to house storm victims for a longer period of time than other venues, Red Cross

It's often a challenge to keep shelters open long enough to allow displaced residents to get back on their feet, said Gregory Smith, the Red Cross site director for the mall shelter.

"The beauty of this facility is that it's no longer a commercial facility," Smith said. "We don't have a timeline for when we have to move."

Smith said flood victims' recoveries will determine how long the new emergency center at the mall will remain open.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency is working through thousands of aid applications and many displaced residents at the shelter aren't sure when they will be able to leave.

"A lot of us are still waiting on FEMA," said Jermaine Anderson, who has been living at the shelter. "It's been a trying, long process. We don't know when we're getting into apartments. It's been a month since the flood, a lot of people are still displaced and we don't know anything. Where are we going to go?"

Fort Worth police spokesman Officer Brad Perez says the suspect, 21-year-old Christopher Anderson, was being held Monday on charges of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon, evading arrest and unlawful possession of a firearm.

Anderson was arrested after Sunday's wreck that injured two Fort Worth officers. Perez says one officer remained hospitalized Monday while the other was discharged. Details on the officers weren't re-

(AP) — Attorneys for a woman accused of leaking a classified U.S. report want a judge to free her from jail pending trial, arguing prosecutors have added no new charges months after they warned the woman may have stolen additional secrets.

Reality Winner, a former Air Force linguist with a top secret security clearance, worked as a government contractor in Augusta until June, when she was charged with copying a classified report and mailing it to an online news organization.

U.S. Magistrate Judge Brian K. Epps has scheduled a hearing Friday to reconsider releasing 25-yearold Winner on bond. He ordered her jailed in June after prosecutors said Winner may have taken more than a single classified report. They said Winner had inserted a portable hard drive into a top-secret Air Force computer before she left the military last year.

Winner's defense lawyers argued in a court filing Saturday that prosecutors have not accused Winner of any additional crimes more than three months later. They noted several other cases in which defendants accused of leaking multiple secret documents were freed

But the Justice Department announced Winner's arrest on the same day The Intercept reported it had obtained a classified National Security Agency report suggesting Russian hackers attacked a U.S. voting software supplier before last year's presidential election. The NSA report was dated May 5, the same as the document Winner is charged with leaking.



'Rock bottom': Weiner gets 21 months in prison for sexting

NEW YORK (AP) - Anthony Weiner's sexting compulsion cost him his seat in Congress, his shot at becoming New York mayor and his marriage, and may have even denied Hillary Clinton the presidency. On Monday, it cost him his freedom.

Weiner, 53, dropped his head into his hands and wept as a federal judge sentenced him to 21 months behind bars for illicit online contact with a 15-year-old girl, his tears flowing long after the gavel came down on a case he called his "rock bottom."

As his parents but not his wife looked on in the courtroom, the New York Democrat was given until Nov. 6 to report to prison for misconduct that included getting the North Carolina high school student to strip and touch herself on Skype and Snap-

In handing down the sentence, U.S. District Judge Denise Cote cited a need in such a highly publicized case to "make a statement that can protect other minors."

The judge said Weiner's habit of exchanging sexually explicit messages and pictures with young women shows a "very strong compulsion" — so strong that "despite two very public disclosures and the destruction of his career on two occasions, he continued with the activ-

Calling himself "a very sick man for a very long time," Weiner tearfully apologized to the teen and sought to assure the judge he had finally learned his lesson. He has been undergoing therapy.

"I stand before you because I victimized a young person who deserved better," he said, adding, "Your Honor, I'm not asking that you trust that my recovery is real. I ask you for the opportunity to prove that it is real." Wearing a wedding band,

he also spoke of his devotion to the 5-year-old son he has with his wife, Huma Abedin, formerly Clinton's closest aide. The couple is going through a divorce.

But prosecutor Amanda Kramer urged the judge to give Weiner a significant prison sentence to end his "tragic cycle" of getting caught sexting.

Weiner's habit led him to resign his House seat in 2011, doomed his 2013 run for mayor, and rocked Clinton's 2016 presidential campaign during the closing days of the race, when FBI agents investigating his contact with the teen came across emails on his laptop between Abedin and Clinton.

That discovery promptthen-FBI Director James Comey to announce in late October 2016 that he was reopening the probe of Clinton's use of a private computer server. Two days before Elec-

tion Day, the FBI declared there was nothing new in the emails. But in a recent interview, Clinton called Comey's intervention "the determining factor" in her defeat.

Weiner, once he has completed his prison sentence, must undergo internet monitoring and enroll in a sexoffender treatment program. He also was fined \$10,000.

After the sentencing was over, he sat crying for several minutes in the courtroom. He left the courthouse without speaking to reporters.

Weiner's behavior in all its lurid detail — including his online alias "Carlos Danger" and a selfie of his bulging underwear — turned him and his last name into an irresistible punchline for late-night comics and mortified his wife again and again.

In her new memoir, "What Happened," Clinton revealed that Weiner's wife "looked stricken" and burst into tears upon learning her husband had triggered Comey's "October surprise."

"This man is going to be the death of me," Abedin was quoted as saying.

Police kill man in Vegas hospital who grabbed stun gun

LAS VEGAS (AP) — Police said Monday that a suspect in custody in a Las Vegas hospital emergency room was fatally shot by an officer after the man was left alone and lifted a stun gun out of a jail guard's bag that had been left near the suspect. The unidentified man had been

arrested on a felony arrest warrant and was taken to University Medical Center because he was incoherent after his arrest and could not be kept in jail, Las Vegas police Capt. Kelly McMahill

The 4:15 a.m. shooting happened when a hospital security officer and a nurse entered the

small room where the suspect was and the suspect pointed the stun gun at him, McMahill said.

The security officer left the room to get help and found a police officer who went into the room and saw the man pointing the stun gun at the nurse. The officer fired once as the suspect was turning toward him, McMahill said.

McMahill did not say whether the security officer was armed when entered the room. Security video reviewed by investigators showed the suspect taking the stun gun from the guard's bag, McMahill said.

The man was declared dead shortly after the shooting. Police did not identify him, the officer,

the jail guard, the security officer or the nurse.

The man had been arrested shortly before 11 p.m. Sunday on the warrant on an unspecified charge after he allegedly threatened suicide, said he had a gun and was "going to blast it out with cops," McMahill said.

Police officers found him unconscious near a bus stop in a business neighborhood about 2.5 miles (4 kilometers) from the Las Vegas Strip. He was taken to the hospital after jailers determined he was too incoherent to be admitted at the Clark County Detention Center.

The stun gun was inside an equipment bag also containing

In March, police were dispatched to Samson's home. Samson told police the woman was trying to enter his house despite his attempts to break off contact. He told officers he was afraid of her because she had struck him in

In the 2016-2017 school year, the average black student in Little Rock went to a school that was roughly 14 percent white, 14 percent Hispanic and 68 percent black, according to Arkansas Department of Education data.

Twenty years ago, a black student in Little Rock would have gone to a school that was 27 percent white, 1.7 percent Hispanic and 70 percent black, historical data from the National Center for Educa-

tion Statistics show. "One of the important lessons we should take away from Little Rock is just how hard and difficult desegregation has been," said Ohio State University historian Hasan Kwame Jeffries. "Little Rock does a lot of foreshadowing. It anticipates the efforts by Southern states to find public money to defray the cost and expense of sending white children to private schools. This becomes part of the agenda for the next half-century." Nationally, the numbers are similarly stark. The average black student nationwide in 1980 went to a school that was 36 percent white. In the 2014-2015 school year, a black student would have gone to a school that was 27 percentwhite. Overall enrollment in public schools has been

according to NCES. In 2004, 58 percent of students enrolled were white, compared to 17 percent black and 19 percent Hispanic. In public schools were 49.5 percent white — less than half for the first time since such data was first collected – 16 percent black and 25 percent Hispanic.

He and his classmates came face-to-face with Southern opposition after integrating Central. The first day of school was only the beginning of the hardships they would endure.

Green described the experience as "like going to war every day." Threatening phone calls came to their homes nightly. Students threw acid on them at school.

"For all of us, we decided that this was a year that we were going to support each other," said Green, now 76, and the first member of the Little Rock Nine to graduate from Central. "The principal of the school told me at one point ... that I didn't have to come to the ceremony, that they would mail me my diploma."

Green ignored his suggestion, knowing the magnitude of his accomplishment. Sitting in the audience at graduation with his family was the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., then in the throes of the civil rights





Gonzalez had two hits and scored twice in an eight-run fourth when only one run was earned. Gonzalez had a two-run single that chased starter Andrew Cashner (10-11), then two innings later hit his 23rd homer.

Houston second baseman Jose Altuve, the AL leader with 199 hits and a .348 batting average, left in the eighth inning after he was hit by a 95 mph fastball. The team said X-rays were negative and Altuve had a bruised forearm.

HOUSTON — The Texans couldn't close out their game against New England, but Houston is encouraged by the marked improvement of rookie quarterback Deshaun Watson in his second NFL start.

Watson threw for 301 yards with two touchdowns and two interceptions and ran for 41 yards in Houston's 36-33 loss to New England on Sunday.

"Each rep, each snap I take in practice, meetings on the game field is always a rep I try to get better at and try to get some experience," he said. "Just continue that each and every week."

Watson started the season backing up Tom Savage, but took over at halftime of Houston's season opener when Savage struggled against the Jaguars.

The 12th overall pick in the draft has looked incomfortable creasingly leading the offense as he's gained more experience.

"He does a lot of things well for a young player," coach Bill O'Brien said. "He's a very smart player. It would be hard for me to tell you he did this thing better



Second-hand high Take this case where West leads the queen of hearts, ducked all around. A second heart puts the lead in dummy, and a club is led. What should East do? First, let's see what happens if East plays low. South plays the queen, and West is faced with a no-win situation. If he takes the ace, he loses the entry to his heart suit, and declarer ends up with 10 tricks after driving out the club king at his next opportunity. And if West doesn't take his ace, South has nine tricks. Now let's see what happens if East puts up the king when the first club is led. After it holds, East returns a heart, and the contract goes down as soon as West gains the lead with the club ace. So the question is how can East know that this is the time not to play second-hand low? The answer lies in the fact that most notrump contracts fail because the defense establishes a long suit and then is able to run it. This objective is defeated if the suit cannot be eashed after it becomes established. In the present case, East cannot tell what side entry his partner may have, but he should reason that playing the club king cannot cost if South has the A-Q. If West has the ace, though, the king play preserves his entry until the hearts are established.




