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Trump to travel to 5 countries in Asia in November

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House announced Friday that President Donald Trump will take a five-nation trip to the Asia Pacific region in November as the U.S. seeks to curb North Korea's growing nuclear threat.

The White House said Trump will travel to Japan, South Korea, China, Vietnam and the Philippines from Nov. 3-14, a trip that will also include a stop in Hawaii. It will be Trump's first visit to the region as president, and it comes as North Korea moves closer to its goal of having a nuclear-tipped missile that could strike the U.S.

The White House said Trump's visit

would "strengthen the international resolve to confront the North Korean threat and ensure the complete, verifiable, and irreversible denuclearization of the Korean Peninsula."

Trump has offered fiery rhetoric and a tough stance against the North's nuclear weap-

gram, declaring in a speech to the United Nations General Assembly last week that the U.S. would "totally destroy" North Korea if provoked. North Korea responded with pledges to take the "highest-level" action against the United States and warned that it might conduct the "most powerful" atmospheric

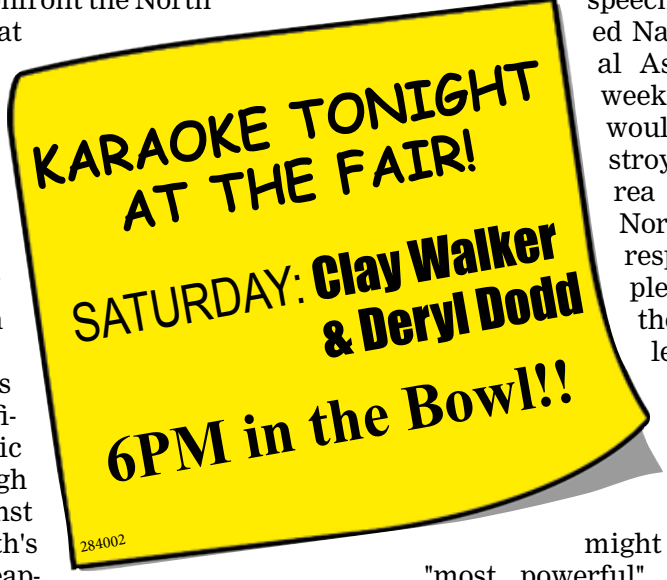
hydrogen bomb test in the Pacific Ocean.

Trump is also expected to discuss trade and economic ties to the region and will attend the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation summit in Vietnam and the Association of Southeast Asian Nations summit in the Philippines.

Even as Washington and Beijing grapple with that security crisis in North Korea, Trump has pressed China for more balanced trade with America.

Trump has been openly critical of China's large trade surpluses with the United States and last month ordered an investigation into whether

Volunteers prep for United Way Empty Bowls event

According to Bias, who has worked in the non-profit sector for 10 years, United Way fundraisers like Empty Bowls seem to bring people together for a greater purpose. She and her board members are responsible for getting together and planning events to raise funds.

"I'd like to let everyone know that we appreciate their support and it's wonderful to know that people are willing to do their part to make Big Spring better," said Bias.

Stampede on crowded Indian pedestrian bridge leaves 22 dead

MUMBAI, India (AP) — A stampede broke out on a crowded pedestrian bridge connecting two railway stations in Mumbai during the Friday morning rush, killing at least 22 people and injuring 32 others, Indian officials said.

Police were investigating what caused the stampede on the bridge, which led some commuters to leap over the railing. Others were crushed or fell underfoot and were trampled.

"There were too many people on the bridge, and the people were in hurry and wanted to move out," said Brijesh Upadhyay, one of the many caught in the crowd. "There was nobody helping, it was very suffocating, and we just wanted to get out of there — and fell on each other."

One rescuer told Indian broadcaster NDTV that the stampede trapped dozens in the narrow passage, forcing rescuers to break the railing to pull people out.

Mumbai police official Gansham Patel said some falling concrete had hit part of the bridge railing, leading people to surge forward out of panic at the thought that the bridge was collapsing.

Commuters also often complain about hawkers selling their wares on the narrow overpass, which connects

two commuter railway stations, Elphinstone and Parel.

Heavy rains meant the bridge was even more crowded than usual, as some sought shelter from the downpour under the canopy covering the bridge, said lawmaker Shaina Nana Chudasama of the governing Bhartiya Janata Party.

Hospitals were treating 32 injured people, including 19 women and 13 men.

As Mumbai police appealed to citizens to donate blood to help the injured, Prime Minister Narendra Modi expressed his condolences to the families of those killed.

"Prayers with those who are injured," Modi tweeted.

Kishore Thakkar, another witness, said the bridge became overcrowded as people stopped, waiting for the rain to ease. "But then came a heavy push by people, causing some people to fall down and get crushed by the surge of passengers."

He complained that government rescuers did not respond quickly to alerts sent by phone. "Local people had pulled out most of the victims by the time the police and government rescuers arrived," Thakkar told TV news channel ABP.

Tabrez Mukadam, a relative of a day worker who died in the stampede, said such accidents happen too often in India.

"These were all common

people, laborers, day workers. There has been talk about this bridge for a long time now as it is crowded during non-peak times also. All this time the government ignored it, and today we see this accident."

Separately in the southern city of Bangalore, two people

were killed in another stampede by hundreds of people jostling to obtain coupons for free food offered by a local philanthropist, police said. The philanthropist has been detained for questioning.

Deadly stampedes are fairly common in densely populated India, where many cities

are unequipped to deal with large crowds gathering in small areas, with few safety or crowd control measures.

In October 2013, a stampede in Madhya Pradesh state in central India killed more than 110 people, mostly women and children.

2 days, 2 dangerous rock falls stun Yosemite park climbers

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Two days of cracking, thundering falling rock at Yosemite National Park have left one man dead, two people injured, and even experienced climbers stunned by the spectacle.

A massive new hunk of granite broke off Thursday at the park's mountaineering mecca of El Capitan, injuring an older man and sending out huge plumes of white dust.

"There was so much smoke and debris," said climber Ryan Sheridan, who had just reached the top of El Capitan when the rock let loose below him. "It filled the entire valley with smoke."

The slide came a day after a giant slab of

granite plunged from the same formation, killing a British man on a hiking and climbing visit and injuring his wife.

"It was in the same location of the previous rock fall," Sheridan told The Associated Press by cellphone from the mountain. "A larger rock fall let loose, easily three times the size," Sheridan said.

One person was injured and was flown to a hospital, park ranger and spokesman Scott Gediman said. There was no immediate word on the person's condition.

Officials did not identify the person, but an older man with cuts and scrapes on his face and head was being treated by paramedics after the slide.

Meanwhile, the man

killed Wednesday was identified as Andrew Foster, 32, of Wales. The park didn't identify his wife but said she remained hospitalized.

The park indicated that seven rock falls actually occurred during a four-hour period Wednesday on the southeast face of El Capitan. However, it was rare for such a collapse to kill anyone, longtime climbers said Thursday.

Rocks at the world-renowned park's climbing routes break loose and crash down about 80 times a year. The elite climbers who flock to the park using ropes and their fingertips to defy death as they scale sheer cliff faces know the risk but also know it's rare to get hit and killed by the rocks.

"It's a lot like a lightning strike," said Alex

Honnold, who made history June 3 for being the first to climb El Capitan alone and without ropes. "Sometimes geology just happens."

The last time a climber was killed by a rock falling at Yosemite was in 2013, when a Montana climber fell after a rock dislodged and sliced his climbing rope. It was preceded by a 1999 rock fall that crushed a climber from Colorado. Park officials say rock falls

overall have killed 16 people since 1857.

Football and racial fault lines

According to an account my son came across a while ago: “Football is one of the most powerful institutions in American society. It is so powerful that it claimed an entire day of the week. It said, ‘This day is ours. We own it.’ Not only did football take a day of the week, but the previous owner was God.”

Though a failed fan myself (no less a figure than Jack Kemp advised me to give up trying to master the rules), I am an American, and accordingly can hardly miss the fact that football is one of most unifying aspects of American culture. The games have become the one thing that most Americans, especially men, can comfortably discuss. No matter what region of the country you're visiting, you are bound to hear men who find themselves thrown together asking “Did you see the game?” Animated analysis, crowing and/or cringing follows. Black and white, immigrant and native born, men and (mysteriously) women, adults and children, liberals and conservatives — huge swaths of the country speak the same idiom and share the experience of football. Super Bowl Sunday is close to a national sacrament.

You think it's easy to maintain national cohesion? It isn't. That's why demagogues since time began conjure external enemies and scapegoat minorities — which is not to say that enemies are always imaginary. In our time, the things that divide us are all too obvious. We are increasingly self-segregating by income and education. Due in part to choice and in part to his-

tory's overhang, we continue to live in racially distinct enclaves. Democrats and Republicans despise one another to the point where they avoid living in the same neighborhoods or dating each other. Many parents now frown on their children marrying “outside the faith” — by which they mean not Catholic or Protestant but Republican or Democrat. And speaking of faith, in actual houses of worship, things haven't changed much since Martin Luther King Jr. called 11 a.m. Sunday morning “the most segregated hour” in American life.

So it would seem downright reckless to tamper with football — the one cultural touchstone that unites us, however tenuously.

Reckless is our president's calling card. Or perhaps that's too generous. He didn't just suggest that the black players who knelt during the national anthem be fired. He called them “sons of b——.” Football had some troubles before, but now we have a national concussion.

Who could blame people for noticing that when it came to Tiki-torch neo-Nazis in Charlottesville, Donald Trump strained to stress that some were very fine people, but black athletes who protest police brutality get this treatment?

Colin Kaepernick forfeited the benefit of the doubt when he donned a Che Guevara T-shirt. But it doesn't require much imagination to see that other black athletes felt backed into a corner. As David French wisely noted: “At one stroke, thanks to an attempted vulgar display of strength, Trump changed the playing of the anthem and the display of the flag from a moment where all but the most radical Americans could unite to one where millions of well-meaning Americans could and did legitimately believe that the decision

to kneel represented a defense of the ideals of the flag, not defiance of the nation they love.”

One reason some conservatives have seen a silver lining to Trump is immigration. They worry that our national identity is being frayed by the burden of assimilating large numbers of newcomers and trusted that Trump would crack down on illegal immigration and even reduce legal immigration. But if you're worried about national unity, surely maintaining mutual respect and decency between American citizens who are already here is the bare minimum one expects of a political leader. People say that Trump's crudeness doesn't matter, that it's stylistic. But that's only part of the issue. It's far more damaging that he's dangerously divisive.

Police treatment of young black males, so-called “mass incarceration,” crime, whether the criminal justice system is biased — these are matters the left has attempted to exploit, and in fact, has successfully exploited for decades. That's not a reason for the right to do likewise. We owe a duty to black Americans to take their concerns seriously. Even if it were the case that no black man had ever received unfair treatment at the hands of the police — and that is far from the case — it would be the job of patriotic Americans to make that argument in respectful tones to blacks who feel aggrieved, not to taunt them and invite contempt for their views.

American life is still strewn with racial sensitivities. Decency demands that we attempt to soothe, not inflame, them.

The national anthem protests - Do facts matter?

Where was the angry left when Supreme Court Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg called the national anthem protests “dumb and disrespectful”?

Let's focus on the “dumb” part. NFL player Colin Kaepernick, who started the protests, did so over the supposed widespread instances of police brutality against blacks. Kaepernick said, “I am not going to stand up to show pride in a flag for a country that oppresses black people and people of color. ... There are bodies in the street and people getting paid leave and getting away with murder.” According to the Centers for Disease Control, since 1968 police killings of blacks have declined nearly 75 percent. According to The Washington Post, almost 500 whites were killed by cops in 2015, an average of more than one a day. Two hundred fifty-nine blacks were killed by the police. Most suspects killed by police had a weapon.

Now for some perspective. Do you know anyone who has been struck by lightning? Neither do most people. Yet each year an average of about 300 Americans are killed or injured by lightning. That's approximately 40 more than the number of blacks killed by the police in 2015. Is there an “epidemic” of Americans being struck and injured by lightning? We don't know the number of black men injured by lightning every year, but let's assume the number is 7 percent of the total people struck by lightning, mirroring the percentage of the black male population in America. That brings the average number of black men injured by lightning to about 21.

Out of the 965 people killed by the police in 2015 (as of Dec. 24), the Post reported (on Dec. 26) that “less than 4 percent” involved an unarmed black man

and a white cop, the fact pattern most commonly referred to by anti-police activists like Black Lives Matter. Last year, The Washington Post put the number of unarmed black men killed by the police at 17, less than the number of blacks likely struck by lightning. Twenty-two unarmed whites were killed by the police. Any death that results from police misconduct is one death too many, but the point is that police killing of a suspect is rare, no matter the race of the suspect or the cop. And a police shooting of an unarmed black male is still more rare.

But blacks are routinely and disproportionately being stopped, pulled over and/or arrested due to police misconduct, right?

No, not according to numerous studies, many by the government. Take traffic stops. In 2013, the National Institute of Justice, the research and evaluation agency of the Department of Justice, published a study of whether the police, as a result of racial bias, stop blacks more than other drivers. The conclusion? Any racial disparity in traffic stops is due to “differences in offending” in addition to “differences in exposure to the police” and “differences in driving patterns.”

According to Philippe Lemoine, writing in National Review, a white person is, on average, more likely to have interactions with the police in any year than a black person, 20.7 percent vs. 17.5 percent. It is true that a black person is more likely to have multiple contacts with the police. But according to the data, multiple contacts with the police are rare, as well. Lemoine writes that 1.2 percent of white men have more than three contacts with the police in a year versus 1.5 percent of black men.

But what about the experience of a black person with the police versus that of a white person? The DOJ's Bureau of Justice Statistics regularly studies this, too. Every year, the BJS surveys a representative sample of 70,000 people. Among the questions,

the survey asks whether respondents had contact with the police in the last 12 months. If the answer is “yes,” the survey asks a number of follow-up questions, including about use of force.

Let's concentrate on cases involving use of force.

Lemoine writes: “Only 0.6 percent of black men experience physical force by the police in any given year, while approximately 0.2 percent of white men do. ... Moreover, keep in mind that these tallies of police violence include violence that is legally justified.” And keep in mind the much higher levels of crime by mostly black males. It is estimated that half of all homicides are committed by, and mostly against, black males.

In 1995, the federal government looked at 42,500 defendants in the nation's 75 largest counties. A government statistician, Patrick A. Langan, found “no evidence that, in the places where blacks in the United States have most of their contacts with the justice system, that system treats them more harshly than whites.” So much for the so-called “institutional racism” in the criminal justice system.

Recently, in Illinois, in a kids' 8-and-under football league, the entire team, which appeared to be all black, including the coach, took a knee during the national anthem. Asked why, one third-grade player parroted Kaepernick, saying, according to the coach, “Because black people are getting killed, and nobody's going to jail.”

Facts don't matter. The coach, presented with a teachable moment, fumbled it away.

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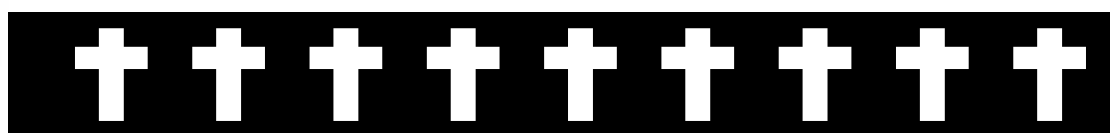

If their earthly parents didn't love and want them, then why would some heavenly being want to adopt them and call them his child?

Others are burdened with shame and guilt. It could be shame for some indiscretion which people found out about. It may be the guilt of knowing that a choice that was made cost someone else their life - the choice to drive under the influence or the choice to abort an unborn child. If people find out some of the things they have done in their life, they wouldn't like them or might look down upon them. If people would do that, then they wonder if God will accept

them.

We looked last week at the invitation Jesus extended in Matthew 11:28. Jesus promises rest from the load which has been such a burden. He then offers another option in verses 29 and 30 - Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light (ESV).

Let's look briefly at the offer Jesus makes by focusing on the verbs. First, he says, "Take..." There is something that an individual must do in response to the Lord's invitation. A yoke is something used to join two things together so they may work in unison.

In response to the invitation, we must be willing to be joined together with Christ. That means whatever way Jesus goes, then we will go; whatever Jesus says, we will say; whatever Jesus does, we also will do.

The next verb Jesus uses is learn. If we are going to go where he goes, say what he says, and do what he does, then we have to learn what all of that is. One of the last commands Jesus gave to his disciples is found in Matthew 28:19-20. Go there-

fore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you.

And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age (ESV). To be a follower of Christ involves learning from him.

The third verb he uses is find.

Why is there so much violence in the world? Why does North Korea continue to fire missiles and threaten the world with nuclear war? Why do terrorists continue to kill innocent men, women and children? Why does war continue in Afghanistan, Syria and Iraq? Why do earthquakes, hurricanes, tornadoes and tsunamis strike?

My grandfather fought in the "War to End All Wars" from 1914 to 1918. But twenty years later the world was engulfed in another global conflict and the "War to End All Wars" became known, and largely forgotten, as World War I. Since

WWII America has been at war in Korea, Vietnam, the Gulf War, Bosnia, Iraq, Afghanistan and several others lesser known places.

James explained violence this way: "What is the source of quarrels and conflicts among you? Is not the source your pleasures that wage war in your members? You lust and do not have; so you commit murder. You are envious and cannot obtain; so you fight and quarrel." (James 4:1-2).

Jesus was under no illusion regarding our circumstances. He said, "You will be hearing of wars and rumors of wars. See that you are not frightened, for those things must take place, but that is not yet the end. For nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom, and in various places there will be famines and earthquakes. (Matthew 24:6-7). "In this world you will have tribulation, but

be of good courage, I have overcome the world." (John 16:33).

It is difficult to imagine the violence and cruelty of the first century. Crucifixion was common under Roman rule. More than 2,000 Jews were crucified and displayed on Galilean roads about the time Jesus was born following a revolt led by Judas ben Hezekiah. As far as we know every one of the Apostles, except John, was martyred. In spite of this, they lived their lives with hope, joy and peace.

Often persecuted and suffering for his faith in Christ, the Apostle Paul gave us this instruction: "Finally, brethren, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on

these things." (Philippians 4:8)

It is easy to give in to the relentless stream of negative news: wars, violence, abuse and natural disasters. Many see dark clouds gathering on the horizon with little hope for the future. But faith can withstand the most dismal circumstances.

For every act of violence we can find a thousand acts of kindness. The overwhelming floods in Texas, Florida and Puerto Rico unleashed a greater flood of human kindness, courage and sacrifice. The same can be said for every terrorist attack and every war. God is present. Goodness will triumph. He will not leave us nor abandon us. The righteous will not be forsaken. Nothing can destroy the life of the spirit in Christ Jesus.

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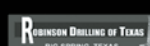
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Bulldog cross country update

Texas holds off Iowa State 17-7 to open Big 12 play

AMES, Iowa — Iowa State was supposed to be better. Texas was supposed to be vulnerable.

In the end, neither team looked like they were ready to compete for a Big 12 title on Thursday night — but it was the Longhorns who survived the conference opener.

Shane Buechele threw for 171 yards and a score, and Texas beat Iowa State 17-7.

Chris Warren III added a rushing TD to help the Longhorns (2-2) improve to 13-2 against the Cyclones (2-2). Iowa State gained just 256 yards — and only 10 on the ground.

"The defensive performance was phenomenal," Texas coach Tom Herman said. "To hold a team to 10 yards on the ground, to get the turnovers and fourth-down stops that we did in their stadium was impressive." Warren had an 11-

yard touchdown run and Toneil Carter caught a 22-yard TD pass from Buechele to give Texas a 14-0 half-time lead.

The game — which was about as ugly as one can get four weeks into the season — hinged on a pair of plays in a 21-second span late in the third quarter that went the Longhorns' way.

Texas appeared to fumble away a kickoff deep in its own territory, but the runner was ruled down on replay. Iowa State then took an apparent fumbled backward pass into the end zone, but the officials ruled the ball was going forward after a review.

Jacob Park threw for 246 yards and had a career-high three interceptions for Iowa State, which had scored at least 40 points in each of its first three games.

"They brought a lot

Texas Rangers break ground for new \$1.1B stadium

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — The Texas Rangers have held a groundbreaking ceremony for their \$1.1 billion retractable-roof stadium that is scheduled to open in time for the 2020 season.

Major League Baseball Commissioner Rob Manfred joined Rangers ownership and city officials for the ceremony Thursday across the street from the current stadium where the team has played since 1994.

Manfred says baseball has a long tradition of hosting special events in communities that make commitments like Arlington has made for the new stadium. He said the new Globe Life Field will be perfect for events like an All-Star game

or World Baseball Classic final. The Rangers twice hosted World Series games (2010 and 2011).

The All-Star game was played at the current stadium in 1995.

BOSTON — The Boston Red Sox stumbled on their way to an AL East title — and got a pretty scary look at what's waiting for them if they get there.

Major league batting leader Jose Altuve had three of Houston's 17 hits, Carlos Correa had four and the Astros chased Red Sox starter Eduardo Rodriguez in the second inning on Thursday night to win 12-2 and keep Boston from clinching the division title.

"We ran into a buzz saw tonight," Red Sox

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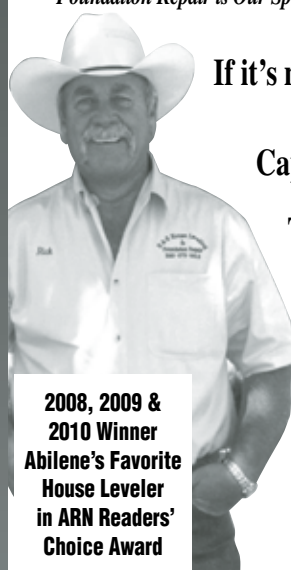

Bidding quiz

You are South, neither side vulnerable. The bidding has been:
West North East South
1♦ 1♠ Pass ?
What would you bid with each of the following five hands?
1. ♠KJ6♥1054♦83♣AJ1096
2. ♠KQ52♥AQ874♦6♣QJ3
3. ♠Q764♥J5♦A82♣AQ73
4. ♠J9♥AQ73♦KJ94♣AJ6
5. ♠83♥A64♦KS♣AKQ874

1. Two spades. Before discussing the appropriate action to take, it is necessary to first discuss what partner's one-spade bid means. An overcall on the one-level is often based on a hand that does not qualify as an opening bid. It is made primarily for the purpose of competing for a partscore, and also to take bidding space away from the opponents. The suit that is bid nearly always consists of at least five cards headed by two or more honors, and the number of likely winning tricks takes precedence over the high-card content of the hand. The point-count range lies between eight and 16 points.
In the given case, a raise to two spades is strongly preferred to a bid of two clubs, which would not be forcing and would tend to deny spade support. The raise encourages partner to consider bidding game if he is close to the upper end of the range for his overcall.
2. Four spades. Assuming partner has a normal overcall — say as little

as ♠AJxxx♥xx♦Qxx♣Kxx — it is unlikely that four tricks will be lost. Game therefore should be bid directly. A lesser bid could result in missing a good game contract.
3. Three spades. Here a game is less certain, and whether it is makeable depends on how strong partner's overcall was. Partner is being asked, in effect, to go on to four if his spade bid was around opening-bid strength, and to pass if his overcall was in the minimum range. Alternatively, many players have an agreement that a cuebid of the opponent's suit here, a bid of two diamonds — would impart a similar message.
4. Three notrump. Game should be undertaken at once, and the best denomination would appear to be notrump. To jump to only two notrump would invite, not command, partner to go on. The best way to show your all-around strength and balanced distribution is to bid three notrump directly.
Of course, if partner's hand is unsuitable for notrump or game, he may retreat to four spades or name some other suit.
5. Three notrump. Clubs should not be mentioned because there is no good reason to think that five clubs would be easier to make than three notrump. With six probable club tricks plus the heart ace, it is not likely the opponents can stop you from scoring at least nine tricks at notrump.

This Date In History

Today is Friday, Sept. 29, the 272nd day of 2017. There are 93 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On September 29, 1982, Extra-Strength Tylenol capsules laced with deadly cyanide claimed the first of seven victims in the Chicago area. (To date, the case remains unsolved.)

On this date:

In 1789, the U.S. War Department established a regular army with a strength of several hundred men.

In 1829, London's reorganized police force, which became known as Scotland Yard, went on duty.

In 1902, William Topaz McGonagall, affectionately considered Britain's possibly worst-ever poet, died in Edinburgh, Scotland.

In 1910, the National Urban League had its beginnings in New York as The Committee on Urban Conditions Among Negroes.

In 1938, British, French, German and Italian leaders concluded the Munich Agreement, which was aimed at appeasing Adolf Hitler by allowing Nazi annexation of Czechoslovakia's Sudetenland.

In 1943, General Dwight D. Eisenhower and Italian Marshal Pietro Badoglio signed an armistice aboard the British ship HMS Nelson off Malta.

In 1957, the San Francisco-bound New York Giants played their last game at the Polo Grounds, losing to the Pittsburgh Pirates, 9-1. The Brooklyn Dodgers played their last game before moving to Los Angeles, losing to the Phillies 2-1 in Philadelphia.

In 1967, author Carson McCullers died in Nyack, New York, at age 50.

In 1977, the Billy Joel album "The Stranger" was released by Columbia Records.

In 1978, Pope John Paul I was found dead in his Vatican apartment just over a month after becoming head of the Roman Catholic Church.

In 1987, Henry Ford II, longtime chairman of Ford Motor Co., died in Detroit at age 70.

In 2005, John G. Roberts Jr. was sworn in as the nation's 17th chief justice after winning Senate confirmation.

Ten years ago: President George W. Bush signed a bill to prevent a government shutdown, but lambasted Democrats controlling Congress for sending him the stopgap measure while they continued to work on more than a dozen spending bills funding the day-to-day operations of 15 Cabinet departments. Actress Lois Maxwell, who starred as Miss Moneypenny in 14 James Bond movies, died in Fremantle, Australia, at age 80.

Five years ago: Omar Khadr, the last Western detainee held at the U.S. military prison in Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, returned to Canada after a decade in custody. Former New York Times publisher Arthur Ochs Sulzberger died at the age of 86.

One year ago: A New Jersey Transit commuter train slammed into the Hoboken station, killing one person and injuring more than 100 others.

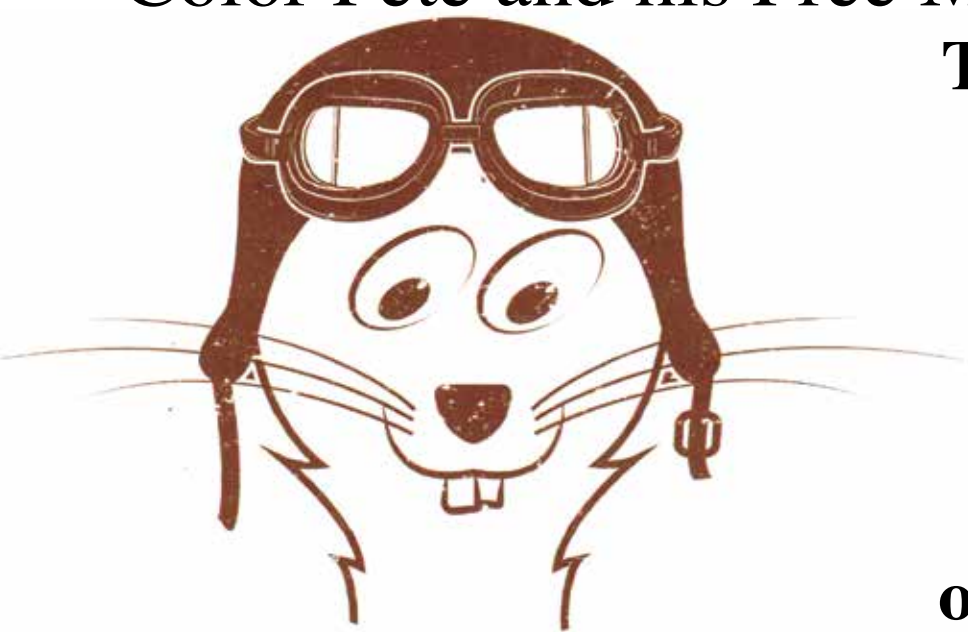

manager John Farrell said.

If the standings don't change, the Red Sox and AL West champion Astros would meet in the ALDS. The Red Sox were guaranteed no worse than a tie for the division title when the Yankees lost 9-6 to Tampa Bay, lowering Boston's magic number to one.

"I'm pretty sure we'll see them again," Houston third baseman Alex Bregman said. "Now we've seen them once."

Boston needs one more win or Yankees loss to clinch the first back-to-back division titles in franchise history; otherwise, the teams would meet in a one-game tie-breaker in New York on Monday to see who needs to play in the wild-card game and who advances to the AL Division Series.

"The sooner the better," Farrell said. "But still we're not taking anything for granted."

Altuve had two singles and his 39th double to raise his batting average to .350. Brad Peacock (13-2) allowed two runs and four hits in five innings, striking out two and walking one as he tried to convince manager A.J. Hinch that he deserves a spot in the postseason rotation.

"I'm sure they'll tell me something in the

next couple of days," said Peacock, who is fighting to join the staff that will include Justin Verlander and Dallas Keuchel and potentially Collin McHugh, Charlie Morton and Lance McCullers. "They've got six good starters to choose from."

Marwin Gonzalez hit a three-run double in the first inning, and Alex Bregman hit a two-run homer off Rodriguez (6-7) in the second. Correa had an RBI double in the fourth, when the Astros scored four runs, and added a two-run homer in the seventh. Brian McCann also homered for Houston.

Mitch Moreland homered for Boston.

The Astros had already clinched the AL West title. They remain one game behind the Cleveland Indians in the chase for the best record in the league and home-field advantage through the AL Championship Series.

QUICK WORK

Rodriguez got in trouble early, loading the bases with one out in the first on a walk and two singles. After Evan Gattis struck out looking, Gonzalez hit a bases-clearing double into the right-center gap.

Rodriguez got the first two outs of the second before George Springer singled and Bregman hit an 0-2 pitch out to make it 5-0. After a visit by the pitching coach, the Red Sox left-hander

walked Correa and that was it. In all Rodriguez allowed five runs, six hits and two walks in 1 2/3 innings, striking out two.

"We've got to lead the way from the mound," Farrell said.

TRAINER'S ROOM

Astros: RF Josh Reddick (sore back) missed his fourth straight game. He had been expected to return on Thursday night, but Hinch said Reddick felt sore after the flight to Boston. "Any semblance of soreness or tentativeness on his part, and he's just not going to play. It's not worth it for one game until the soreness is gone," Hinch said.

Red Sox: RF Mookie Betts returned to the lineup after missing two games with inflammation in his left wrist. He was hitless in three at-bats.

UP NEXT

The teams play Game 2 of their four-game, season-ending series on Friday night. RHP Charlie Morton (13-7, 3.63 ERA), who has won two straight starts and three of four in September, will face Boston RHP Doug Fister (5-8, 4.87), who is winless in his last three starts as he faces his former team.

of pressure in the first half and had more guys on the line of scrimmage than there were blockers. It can put you in a tough situation," Iowa State coach Matt Campbell said.

THE TAKEAWAY

Texas: The Longhorns did what they've done so often against Iowa State, pushing the Cyclones around while dictating tempo through the ground game. Texas' rebuilt offensive line had issues with holding calls, and its entire offense looked discombobulated at times. But a win on the road in league play is never something to scoff at — especially when you're just four games into Herman's coaching tenure. "There's a lot of work on offense. But we're going to celebrate winning because it's hard to come by," Herman said.

Iowa State: It was as if the Cyclones saw Texas come out in their all-white road uniforms and froze. Almost none of the improvement Iowa State has made under second-year coach Matt Campbell was evident against the Longhorns. The first two touchdowns Texas scored came after penalties the Cyclones could've avoided, and questions about the play-calling — like why did star running back David Montgomery have just six carries in the first half? — lingered all night.

ELEVEN-UP

Buechele certainly spread the ball around, completing passes to 11 different receivers. Lil'Jordan Hum-

phrey led the way with four catches, and six Longhorns caught at least two passes. Buechele made a poor choice that led to an interception, but he was largely accurate, completing 19 of 26 passes against a talented Iowa State secondary. "Offensively we've got to get better, but I was really excited to get back on the field," Buechele said after missing the USC game.

WHERE'S MONTGOMERY?

Montgomery came into play with 321 yards and four TDs on 5.7 yards per carry. But Iowa State unsuccessfully tried to open things up with its passing game in the first half, which forced them to abandon the running game after it went down by 14 points. Montgomery finished with 34 yards on nine carries, while Park threw the ball 48 times. "I think Jacob got rattled a little in the game because of the pressure, and we didn't do a good enough job of protecting him," Campbell said.

KEY NUMBERS

Iowa State linebacker Joel Lanning — who was the quarterback when the Cyclones beat Texas 24-0 in 2015 — had 20 tackles. ... Warren finished with 44 yards rushing and Buechele had 42. ... Iowa State was 3 of 12 on third down and 0 of 2 on fourth. Texas's Malik Jefferson stuffed Park on a fourth-and-4 at the 50 midway through the fourth quarter. ... Factoring in sacks, Iowa State finished with just 10 yards rushing.

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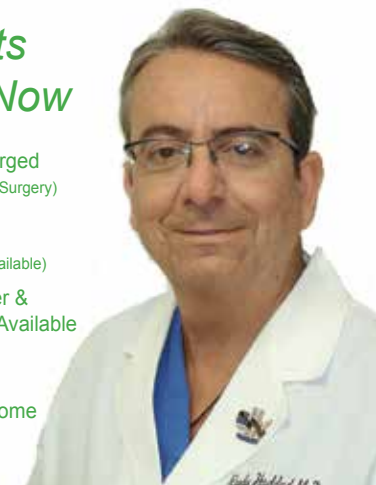
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
