





Bergdahl expected to plead guilty, avoid trial

than face trial marks another twist in an eightvear drama that caused the nation to wrestle with difficult questions of loyalty, negotiating with hostage takers and America's commitment not to leave its troops behind.

President Donald Trump has called Bergdahl a "no-good traitor" who "should have been executed."

The decision by the 31-year-old Idaho native leaves open whether he

will return to captivity for years — this time in a U.S. prison — or receive a lesser sentence that reflects the time the Taliban held him under brutal conditions.

He says he had been caged, kept in darkness, beaten and chained to a

Bergdahl could face up to five years on the desertion charge and a life sentence for misbehavior.

Freed three years ago, Bergdahl had been scheduled for trial in

late October. He had opted to let a judge rather than a military jury decide his fate, but a guilty plea later this month will spare

the need for a trial. Sentencing will start on Oct. 23, according to the individuals with knowledge of the case.

They weren't authorized to discuss the case and demanded anonymity. During sentencing, U.S. troops who were seriously wounded search-

ing for Bergdahl in Afghanistan are expected to testify, the individuals said.





hab had defeated Moab and placed a heavy annual tribute on them, the wool of two hundred thousand

sheep. So when Ahab

rebelled. After Ahab's death, his son, Joram, became king of Samaria. He

died, the king of Moab

worshipped Baal as his father had. Jehoshaphat, king of

Israel, joined with Joram, king of Samaria, to fight against Moab. After a march of seven days, they ran out of water for the men and animals. Although Joram worshipped Baal, he complained that the Lord

should have provided water for Jehoshaphat asked if there were no

prophet in Samaria to inquire of the Lord God for them. One of the offi-

cers remembered Elisha, so the kings went to consult Elisha.

Elisha said that he had no regard for the king of Samaria. It was because of his respect for Jehoshaphat, king of Judah, that he even answered.

The word of the Lord came to Elisha. "Dig trenches in this dry valley. You will see neither wind nor rain, yet this valley will be filled with wa-

This is an easy thing for the Lord, and He will also hand over to you the king of Moab." (2 Kings 3:17, 18 paraphrased) A hard rain in the surrounding

and fill the valley. To the Moabites, the sun glinting off the water looked red like blood. They thought that the armies of Is-

mountains caused water to run down

rael and Judah had quarreled and attacked each other. When they came down to investi-

gate, Israel and Judah attacked and overpowered them.

Trying to induce help from his god called Chemosh, the king of Moab offered his firstborn son, the crown prince, as a burnt offering. Of course there was no response from the false

The text here is a bit vague.

The Hebrew and Aramaic text seems to speak of the Lord's fury with Ahab and his dynasty.

Even after their prolonged infidelity to Him, God had performed miracles for them, and still they did not turn to Him. Now he removed Himself from them. When they were on the verge of com-

plete victory over Moab, the kings of Israel and Judah seemed to lose their nerve and their vision. They gave up the fight and went back home. Later the widow of one of the com-

pany of prophets came to Elisha. "You

know that my husband revered the Lord. Now he is dead, and his creditor is coming to take my two sons as his slaves." (2 Kings 4:1 Paraphrased)

Elisha asked what she had of value in her house. She had nothing except a little oil.

Elisha told her to go to her neighbors and borrow all the empty oil jars that she could find. She was to go inside and shut the door so they would have privacy. This was not a miracle

From their small jar that was almost empty, she and her sons poured enough oil to fill all the vessels she had borrowed.

to be witnessed by everyone.

When her sons told her there were no more jars, the oil stopped flowing!

Olive oil was very expensive at that time. Elisha told her to go and sell all the extra oil and pay her debts. She would have money left over for her family.

God works in our lives when we allow Him! Many times we can't look beyond our own assessment of a situation and trust God to make it work out for the best.

A bronze sculpture by Sylvia Shaw Judson in a private cemetery in Savannah, Georgia, became famous in 1994 with the publication of Midnight in the Garden of Good and Evil, a New York Times bestseller for 216 weeks, which was later made into a popular movie. The book featured a picture of the sculpture on the cover. The sculpture, known as the Bird Girl, became such a popular tourist attraction that it had to be moved and is now in the Telfair Museum in Savannah. The authorized replica of this statue was purchased by Jerry the Bennett Garden.



Packers, Rodgers visit Cowboys as Prescott seeks 2016 magic

FORT WORTH, Texas — TCU senior quarterback Kenny Hill and West Virginia's Will Grier took similar paths to the Big 12, and a head-tohead matchup in the only game nationally Saturday with two Top 25 teams.

Big 12 showdown: No.

8 TCU, No. 23 WVU

with former SEC QBs

Before becoming the starter last season for eighth-ranked TCU (4-0, 1-0 Big 12), Hill had to sit out a year after transferring from Texas A&M. Grier also first started in the SEC, five games as a redshirt freshman at Florida, before watching last year and now his debut this season with the 23th-ranked Mountaineers.

Grier and Hill are both good passers who can also run in high-scoring offenses — and are backed by the Big 12's top two rushing teams.

"(Hill) was fortunate to be able to be at A&M and play at a high level ... but then he had to go through some transition, which always kind of sets people back," West Virginia coach Dana Holgorsen said. "Not a whole lot different than what we would get out of Will Grier a year from now."

Now a junior like Hill was for his TCU debut a year ago, Grier has thrown for 344 yards a game with 13 touchdowns already at West Virginia (3-1, 1-0 Big 12).

"He's a smart quarterback, he knows what he's doing," TCU safety Niko Small said. "He's in a good offense for himself. He's a mobile quarterback. ... Just containing him will be the best thing for us."

Hill, who threw for 3,208 yards with 17 TDs and 13 interceptions last year, has been efficient this season for the Horned Frogs. He has thrown for 241 yards per game with nine TDs and only three picks.

"They're running the ball a good bit, they're not asking him to sit back there and throw the ball 90 percent of the time. He's got a lot of good people around him but he is managing it extremely well," Holgorsen said of Hill. "A very, very, very efficient quarterback at this point."

Some things to know when the two teams that came into the Big 12 together in 2012 play for the sixth time as conference foes:

RUN, RUN, RUN

TCU leads the Big 12 with 232.2 yards rushing per game, just ahead of West Virginia's 231 per game. Mountaineers senior Justin Crawford is the league leader at 113 per game, while Frogs sophomore Darius Anderson has emerged with top returning rusher Kyle Hicks already missing two games, and is third in the league at 106 yards per game. Crawford and Anderson are tied for the Big 12 lead with six rushing TDs each.

NOT AS CLOSE

The first three games between the Mountaineers and Frogs as Big 12 teams were all decided at the very end, twice in overtime. TCU won the 2012 game on the road in double overtime, West Virginia had an overtime win in Fort Worth the next year, and then the Frogs won on a gameending field goal in Morgantown in 2014. The home teams won more decisively the last two years, TCU by 30 points in 2015, and West Virginia by 24 last year.

SOME STREAKS/NUMBERS

Since a season-opening loss to Virginia Tech, the Mountaineers have scored at least 56 points while winning their last three games. ... ESPN College GameDay will broadcast from the TCU campus for the second time (the other was 2009 vs. Utah). It is the fifth time overall the Frogs have been part of GameDay broadcasts the past nine seasons. They have won every time. ... WVU's David Sills V has seven receiving TDs to tie for the national lead.

UNRANKED TO TOP 10

After opening the season unranked, TCU starts October in the AP Top 10. The Horned Frogs insist they aren't listening to the hype any more than they listened to the critics. Coach Gary Patterson makes sure they think that way. "He lets us know that the same people that will hype you up will tear you down," safety Niko Small said. "We try to make it not affect us whatsoever."

ARLINGTON, Aaron Rodgers has experience with what Dak Prescott is going through in his second year as quarterback of the Dallas Cowboys.

You are the dealer, neither side vulnerable, and have opened One Heart. Your partner has responded Two Clubs. What would you now bid with each of the following four hands?

1. **♠** A6 ♥ AKJ93 **♦** 63 **♣** A1084 2. ♠ AQ4 ♥ KQ987 ♦ K5 ♣ A62 3. ♠ 84 ♥ AK732 ♦ QJ4 ♣ A105 4. ♠ 7 ♥ AQ654 ♦ AJ75 ♣ AQ9

1. Four clubs. There should be little doubt at this point that there is a game in the combined hands. The only remaining question is whether there might be a slam. Partner's twoclub response can be based on as little as 10 points, but he also may have considerably more.

Although you have the values for a direct five-club bid, this action is not recommended because it uses up too much bidding space. Partner should be left room to investigate both small- and grand-slam possibilities.

Thus, the four-club bid (forcing) permits partner to cuebid four diamonds, in which case you can next bid four spades to show the ace, or four notrump (Blackwood) to check for aces and kings.

2. Three notrump. With 18 points facing partner's 10-plus points, the notrump game should be undertaken at once. The jump to three notrump promises a balanced hand of 18 or 19 points, with the unbid suits stopped.

The doubleton diamond king is treated as a stopper, because if the suit is led by your left-hand opponent, the king is sure to take a trick. A rebid of two notrump over two clubs would show a lesser hand of 13 or 14 points.

3. Three clubs. You cannot rebid two notrump, since you have no spade stopper, so the remaining choices are two hearts and three clubs. In general, it is best to avoid rebidding a five-card suit when another option exists, and here there is no reason not to raise partner's suit, which will usually be at least five cards in length. If partner next bids three hearts, you plan to carry on to four hearts; if he bids three notrump, you will pass; and if he bids three spades, you will bid three notrump.

4. Two diamonds. Here the suit in which the hand will play best is in considerable doubt, as is the level of

the final contract. By bidding two diamonds (forcing) now, and supporting clubs vigorously next, the excess over a minimum opening bid will be suitably pictured to partner. Your singleton spade will be implied at the same time, and may prove to be the key to reaching a good slam.

This Date In History

Today is Friday, Oct. 6, the 279th day of 2017. There are 86 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On Oct. 6, 1927, the era of talking pictures arrived with the opening of "The Jazz Singer" starring Al Jolson, a feature containing both silent and sound-synchronized sequences.

On this date:

In 1683, thirteen families from Krefeld, Germany, arrived in Philadelphia to begin Germantown, one of America's oldest settlements.

In 1884, the Naval War College was established in Newport, Rhode Island.

In 1892, British poet laureate Alfred, Lord Tennyson died in Surrey, England, at age 83.

In 1939, in a speech to the Reichstag, German Chancellor Adolf Hitler spoke of his plans to reorder the ethnic layout of Europe — a plan which would entail settling the "Jewish problem.' In 1949, U.S.-born Iva Toguri

D'Aquino, convicted of treason for being Japanese wartime broadcaster "Tokyo Rose," was sentenced in San Francisco to 10 years in prison (she ended up serving more than six). In 1958, the nuclear subma-

rine USS Seawolf surfaced after spending 60 days submerged. In 1960, the historical drama

"Spartacus," starring Kirk Douglas and directed by Stanley Kubrick, had its world premiere in New York. In 1973, war erupted in the

Middle East as Egypt and Syria launched a surprise attack on Israel during the Yom Kippur holiday. (Israel, initially caught off guard, managed to push back the Arab forces before a cease-fire finally took hold in the nearly three-week conflict.) In 1976, President Gerald R.

Ford, in his second presidential debate with Democrat Jimmy Carter, asserted that there was "no Soviet domination of eastern Europe." (Ford later conceded such was not the case.)

In 1981, Egyptian President Anwar Sadat was shot to death by extremists while reviewing a military parade.

win over Chicago in Week

Prescott had three TD passes in a 35-30 loss to the Los Angeles Rams, but the focus was on three straight punts to start the second half, followed by his third interception of the season after he threw four as a rookie. Plus, the Cowboys couldn't hold an 11-point lead in a game they were expected to win.

"We are not taking y'all's input or fans input into perspective, what they are seeing we are not doing," Prescott said. "We know what we are doing when we are doing it the right way to click. So we know how to get back to that. We are going to do it."

Things to consider in the sixth meeting over five seasons for these frequent playoff opponents, including a pair in the postseason won by the Packers:

THE HAUNTING: Cowboys linebacker Justin Durant pursued Rodgers as he rolled toward the sideline on the decisive throw to Cook, unable to get to the scrambling quarterback because of offensive lineman Lane Taylor on a play Durant said "should never happen."

"I didn't even watch the tape afterward," Durant said. "I was at an event or something with some people and they're running the game back on NFL Network. I'm like, 'Man, c'mon.' Guess you've got to just learn from it."

TOGETHER AGAIN?: The Packers could be closer to getting their starting offensive line back on the field at the same time. Left tackle David Bakhtiari (hamstring) and right tackle Bryan Bulaga (ankle) have each missed time to injuries, leaving Green Bay having to rely on a patchwork front in the win over Chicago. They played well, but the Packers are at their best with Bakhtiari and Bulaga.

SPEAKING OF PATCH-WORK: The Cowboys have had a shuffle of defensive players, most recently with All-Pro linebacker Sean Lee (hamstring) missing the LA game. Lee is likely to be a game-time decision, but LB Anthony Hitchens should make his season debut after a preseason knee injury. His return could mean a rotation with Jaylon Smith, who played more than expected the first four games of his career because of the Hitchens injury.

IN THIS CORNER: Green Bay cornerback Kevin King appears to have secured a starting job five games into his rookie season. At 6-foot-3, King has the size the Packers want for press coverage against receivers such as Dez Bryant. Veteran Davon House could also be nearing a return after missing time with a quad injury. How coach Mike McCarthy uses Damarious Randall bears watching after he was benched in the second half against the Bears over an "internal matter."

SO THAT EXPLAINS IT: The Packers are 3-0 at the \$1.2 billion home of the Cowboys: two wins over Dallas and the 31-25 victory over Pittsburgh in the 2011 Super Bowl. The first thing that comes to mind for coach Mike McCarthy is the locker rooms.

"They're big," he said. "It's the biggest head coaching locker room I've ever seen in my life. Everybody here could fit in there. So you have things like that."

competitive game up until the end here. So we know what we're getting ourselves into. They've had two weeks to prepare. We'll get their best shot and our players understand that."

The problem for the Jayhawks (1-3, 0-1) is that they've played plenty of teams competitively, only to let things get away from them when the fourth quarter arrives.

In their final game before a bye, a frantic second-half rally against No. 23 West Virginia got them within 42-34 midway through the fourth quarter. But the Mountaineers answered with two more touchdowns in the final minutes to make the outcome appear far more lopsided.

Jayhawks coach David Beaty doesn't believe his team is down, though.

"The one thing that I really thought was good was our guys spent a lot of time together this week," he said. "They've got great chemistry, it's a tight-knit football team, which is good. They're excited and ready to get back on the field and close the deal, close the deal this week.

"Both of us are coming in looking for our first Big 12 win, so it's a big game for both of us."

As the Red Raiders and Jayhawks prepare to meet with an 11 a.m. kickoff, here are some things to know:

BRINGING THE ENERGY

There were only about 15,000 fans in the stadium when the Jayhawks played the Mountaineers in another 11 a.m. kickoff, and deep pockets of empty seats were just about everywhere. That can make it difficult for teams to bring the enthusiasm.

"What we have to do is bring our own energy," Texas Tech wide receiver Dylan Cantrell said. "Probably won't have as many fans at the Kansas game, but that's exactly what we have to do is wake up early, get going, and bring our own energy."

BALL CONTROL

The Jayhawks tried to make their game against the highpowered Mountaineers shorter by running the ball, and Khalil 701 E. 2nd St.

Herbert wound up carrying 36 times for 291 yards and two touchdowns. Expect a similar approach against the Red Raiders and their powerful of-
