BSPD searches for two robbery suspects

Big Spring police are looking for two individuals who reportedly robbed a local 7-Eleven in the early hours of Thursday morning. The Big Spring Police Department issued a press release this morning detailing what they know so far about the robbery. "On the 19th of October 2017 at approximately 2:14 a.m., Big Spring Police Department officers were dispatched to the 7-11 located at 1209 E. 11th Place due to a robbery," the release said. "Upon arrival of officers were informed that two Hispanic males had entered the store, one armed with a small metal bar, and demanded all of the money in the cash register." According to the report, the suspects fled the store after the clerk gave them the money. One suspect was described as wearing a two-tone gray zip-up hooded sweatshirt; his face was covered with a bandana. The other suspect was described as wearing a black jacket with a gray shirt and bandana covering his face.

CISD to hold last bond election meeting

The last of three scheduled meetings over the upcoming \$4 million bond election geared toward infrastructure improvements and the purchase of artificial turf for the football, softball and baseball fields will be held Friday, Oct 20, at 9 a.m. in the Coahoma ISD cafeteria. During the meeting, CISD Superintendent Dr. Amy Jacobs will give an in-depth presentation on how the money will be used if the bond is approved by the voters in November, as well as the financial impact on property owners. If passed, the bond will add approximately \$7.50 per month or \$90 annually of additional taxes to a property owner who owns a home valued around

\$100,000. Taxes are expected to increase \$11.25 per month or \$135 annually for a home valued at \$150,000 and \$18.75 per month or \$225 annually for a home valued at \$250,000. All estimates are based on the district's current taxable values. For property owners over the age of 65 or disabled, their home property taxes will not increase if they have been granted the "Over 65" or "disabled" homestead exemption. This tax freeze is on the homestead only, and may be adjusted up if major renovations are done to the property after the exemption is granted. Kelly kept tragedy out of politics, but Trump brought it up

WASHINGTON (AP) — It's known as some of the saddest ground in America, a 14-acre plot of Arlington National Cemetery called Section 60 where many U.S. personnel killed in Iraq and Afghanistan are interred. On Memorial Day this year, President Donald Trump and the man who would be his chief of staff visited Grave 9480, the final resting place of Robert Kelly, a Marine killed Nov. 9, 2010, in Afghanistan.

"We grieve with you. We honor you. And we pledge to you that we will always remember Robert and what he did for all of us," Trump said, singling out the Kelly family during his remarks to the nation that day. Turning to Robert's father, then the secretary of homeland security, Trump added, "Thank you, John."

The quiet tribute contrasts with Trump's messy brawl this week with critics of his handling of condolences to Gold Star families who, like Kelly, have lost people to recent warfare. Trump brought up the loss of Kelly's son as part of an attack on former President Barack Obama, dragging the family's searing loss into a political fight over who has consoled grieving families better. Kelly has not commented on the controversy, but it was exactly the sort of public attention to a personal tragedy that the reserved, retired Marine general would abhor.

White House spokeswoman Sarah Huckabee Sanders acknowledged Kelly was "disgusted" that the condolence calls had been politicized, but said she was not certain if the chief of staff knew Trump was going to talk about his son publicly.

Trump sparked the controversy during an interview

Tuesday with Fox News Radio. Asked whether he'd called the families of Americans killed in Niger nearly two weeks before, Trump replied, "You could ask Gen. Kelly, did he get a call from Obama?"

The remark set many in the military community seething. Kelly is the most senior U.S. military officer to lose a child in Iraq or Afghanistan.

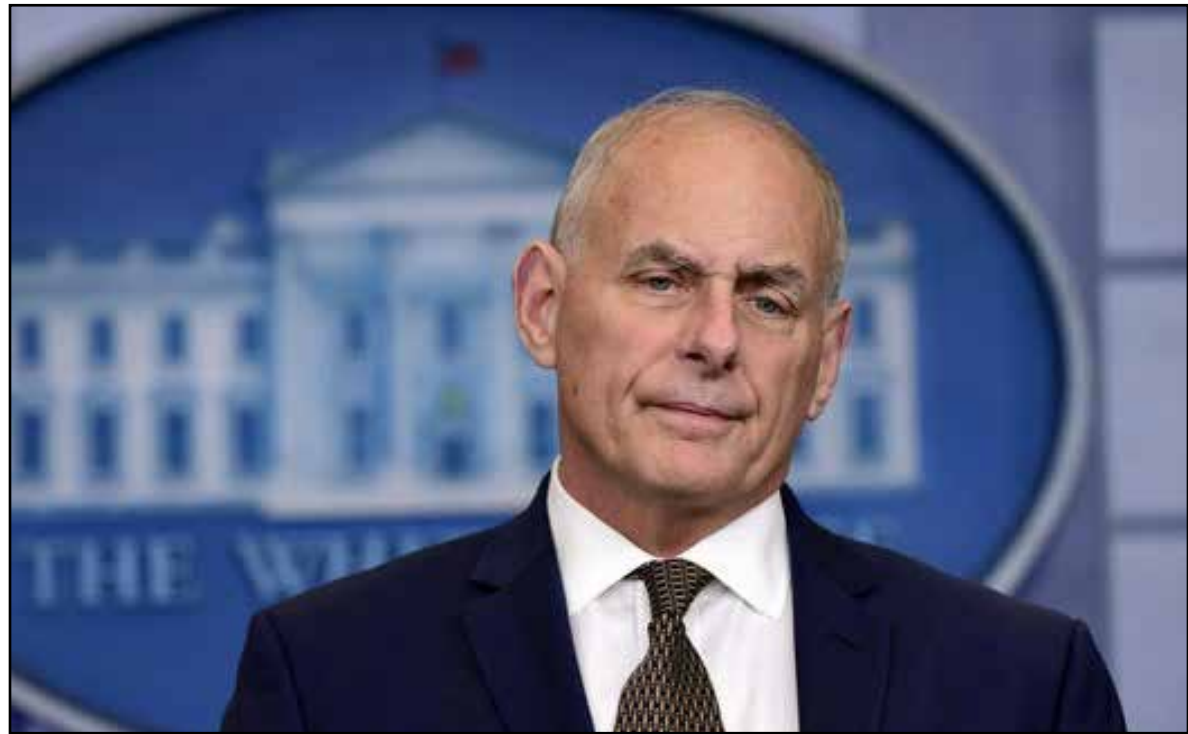
"I would be surprised if he comes in and starts allowing people to use his family as a tool," said Charles C. Krulak, a former Marine Corps commandant who has known John Kelly since the mid-1990s.

There was a sense among some that Trump's words were not an appropriate part of the national political dialogue.

"If there is one sacred ground in politics it should be the ultimate sacrifices made by our military," wrote Chuck Hagel, a defense secretary under Obama and before that, a Republican U.S. senator. In an email to The Associated Press, Hagel added: "To use General Kelly and his family in this disgusting political way is sickening and beneath every shred of decency of presidential leadership."

Trump has had a fraught relationship with grieving Gold Star families since the 2016 campaign, when he feuded with the parents of slain Army Capt. Humayun Khan, who was killed in Iraq in 2004.

Now the commander in chief, Trump ranked himself above his predecessors on such matters, insisting this week that he's "called every family of someone who's died," while past presidents didn't place such calls. But The Associated Press found relatives of soldiers who died overseas during Trump's presidency who said they never received calls from

him, and more who said they did not receive letters.

As for whether Obama called Kelly, White House officials said later that Obama did not call Kelly, but White House visitor logs show that Kelly and his wife attended the Obamas' lunch with Gold Star families.

The public controversy has to have been painful for Kelly, whose son had been awarded the Purple Heart. The White House chief of staff is a military veteran of more than four decades who has rarely discussed his son's death and refused to politicize it.

Robert Kelly, 29, was killed when he stepped on a land mine in Afghanistan's remote Helmand province. His father, aware that Robert Kelly accompanied almost every patrol with his men through mine-filled battlefields, had just days before warned the family of the potential danger, according to a report in The Washington Post. When

Gen. Joseph Dunford Jr. rang the elder Kelly's doorbell at 6:10 a.m. on November 9, 2010, John Kelly knew Robert was dead, according to the report.

Four days later, the grieving father with the four-decade military career asked a Marine Corps officer not to mention Robert's death during an event in St. Louis. There, without mentioning Robert, John Kelly delivered an impassioned speech about the disconnect between military personnel and members of American society who do not support their mission.

"Their struggle is your struggle," Kelly said.

"We are only one of 5,500 American families who have suffered the loss of a child in this war," Kelly wrote to The Post in an e-mail. "The death of my boy simply cannot be made to seem any more tragic than the others."

In March 2011, Kelly accompanied his boss, Defense Secretary Bob Gates, on a visit

to the Sangin district, in Helmand province — the scene of some of the most intense fighting of the war and where Robert Kelly had been killed.

As Gates' senior military assistant, Kelly stood silently among young Marines gathering under a harsh sun as Gates applauded what they had accomplished.

"Your success, obviously, has come at an extraordinary price," Gates said without mentioning names.

Ahead of Trump and Kelly's visit to Robert's grave on Memorial Day, Kelly's voice caught when he was asked on Fox & Friends to describe his son.

"He's the finest man I ever knew," Kelly said. Asked to elaborate, Kelly struggled at first. "Just is. Finest guy. Wonderful guy. Wonderful husband, wonderful son, wonderful brother. Brave beyond all get out. His men still correspond with us. They still mourn him as we do."

Judge orders government to allow abortion for immigrant

WASHINGTON (AP) — A judge has ordered the federal government to allow a pregnant 17-year old immigrant who entered the country illegally to undergo an abortion.

U.S. District Court Judge Tanya Chutkan ordered Wednesday that authorities either transport the woman or allow her to be transported by others to the clinic.

The case originated in Texas, where the unnamed woman is being held by federal immigration authorities, and was brought to the Washington court by the American Civil Liberties Union.

The woman has already received a court order permitting her to have the abortion, but officials refused to transport her or temporarily release her so supporters could transport her to the clinic.

In a testy exchange with government lawyers Wednesday, Judge Chutkan said she was "astounded" by the government's position.

Texas DA changes grand jury policy for officer shootings

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The district attorney in Austin says she won't pursue possible charges against local police officers involved in three shootings because of a change in how her office handles such cases.

Travis County District Attorney Margaret Moore said she'll only take cases to grand juries if she believes a shooting was unlawful or if the facts about what happened are in dispute, the Austin American-Statesman reported. The policy change is meant to expedite the resolution of cases.

Former District Attorney Rosemary Lehmborg took all lethal-force cases to grand jury. Travis County grand juries have seen dozens of cases regarding police officers using deadly force, but jurors have only indicted one officer in the past decade.

Prosecutors in Moore's office said they decided not to pursue a case against officers involved in the three recent shootings after "thorough factual and legal analysis."

Officers often have to wait months to testify before a grand jury, according to police officials. And community groups, including the local chapter of the NAACP, have said prosecutors should focus on possible cases of officer misconduct instead of taking every case to a grand jury.

"We have already agreed in our community, no matter whether they go forward or not, we have a responsibility as a civil rights organization to examine, critically, her basis for not going forward," said Nelson Linder, president of the Austin NAACP. "Clearly, I think there are certain cases that should not go, but we are going to look for a balance."

Prosecutors are currently reviewing how to handle nine other police shooting cases, said Dexter Gilford, who leads the Civil Rights Division at the Travis County District Attorney's Office. The policy change doesn't affect civil lawsuits or investigations of whether officers violated department policy.

Texas to loan Houston \$47M to replace bridges after Harvey

HOUSTON (AP) — The state of Texas will provide a \$47 million no-interest loan to Houston to replace eight bridges west of downtown that block the flow of floodwaters during heavy downpours, according to a newspaper report.

The city will forward the money from the Texas Water Development Board to the Harris County Flood Control District so that bridge replacements along Brays Bayou can begin in March.

The loan is just one piece to the long-delayed flood-relief plan known as Project Brays, according to the Houston Chronicle.

Other parts of the plan include widening most of the bayou, adding detention basins that can hold billions of gallons of water, and removing 15,000 homes and businesses from a 100-year flood plain.

Flooding regularly occurs in the area and thousands of the roughly 700,000 people living in the Brays Bayou watershed flooded again during Hurricane Harvey.

Sluggish federal reimbursements have been a key factor in dragging Project Brays out for two decades. Work that was originally scheduled to finish in 2014 now is expected to be completed in 2021. But it could take several more years without sufficient funding, county documents have shown.

"When you have people that flooded, they want everybody at the table helping to solve these problems," said Steve Costello, who oversees the city's flood-relief efforts. "This is the first time we're going to be able to say every sector of government is at the table helping resolve the flooding problems along Brays Bayou."

Man known as Houston area's 'Tourniquet Killer' set to die

HUNTSVILLE, Texas (AP) — A man who became known as the Houston area's "Tourniquet Killer" because of the way he strangled his victims was set for execution Wednesday evening.

Anthony Allen Shore confessed to killing four female victims from 1986 to 1995 after a tiny particle collected from under the fingernail of 21-year-old Maria del Carmen Estrada, whose body was dumped in a Houston Dairy Queen's drive-thru lane, was matched to his DNA. Estrada was killed in 1992.

If executed, the 55-year-old Shore would be the 21st inmate given a lethal injection this year in the U.S., one more than the total number put to death in 2016. He would be the seventh prisoner executed this year in Texas.

Another convicted killer, who is set to die in Texas on Nov. 16, has allegedly tried to get Shore to confess to one more crime. Larry Swearingen asked Shore to take the blame for the 1998 killing of 19-year-old Melissa Trotter, according to Montgomery County District Attorney Brett Ligon. Swearingen was convicted of her slaying and put on death row for it.

Ligon said investigators from his office spoke with Shore on Tuesday and he told them he decided to expose the scheme and not cooperate with Swearingen. The prosecutor said Swearingen tried a similar scheme before his trial for Trotter's killing.

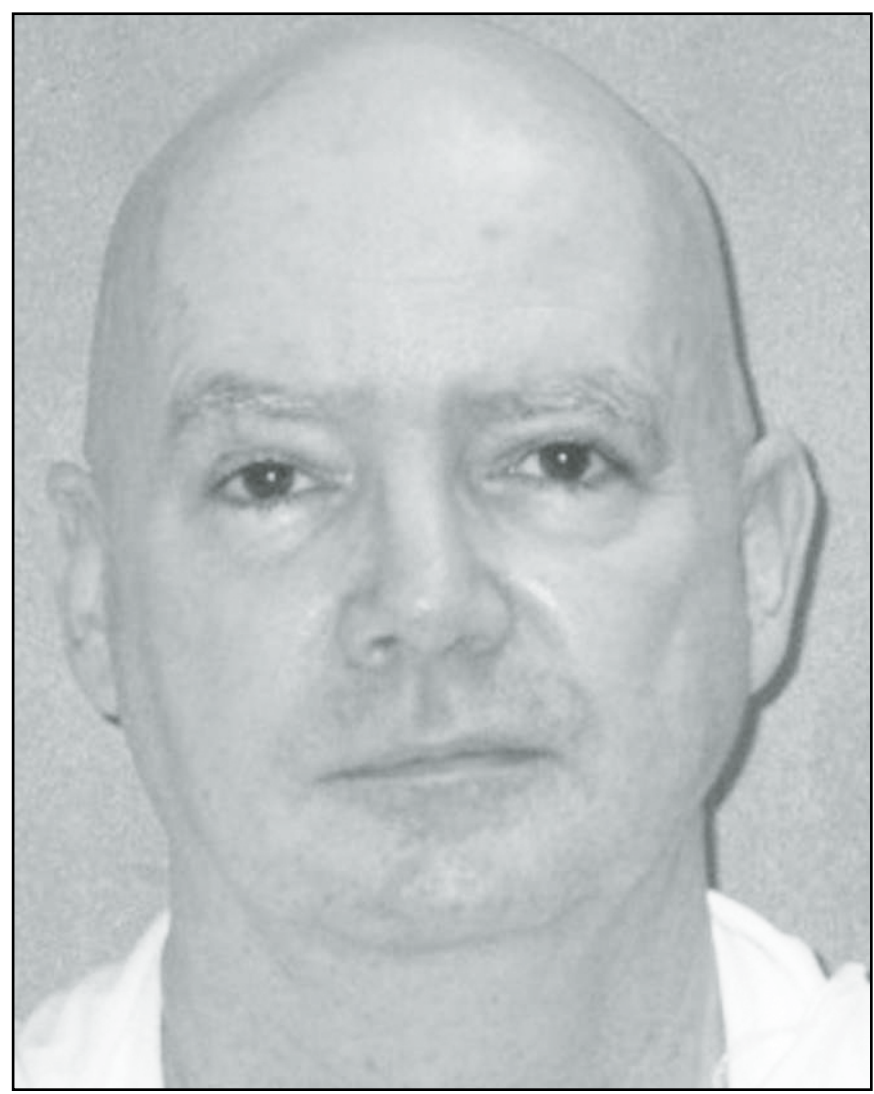
The 1992 slaying of Estrada went unsolved for more than a decade. In 1998, Shore received eight years' probation and became a registered sex offender for sexually assaulting two relatives, but it took five years before authorities made the DNA match tying him to Estrada's death.

"I didn't set out to kill her," Shore told police in a taped interview played at his 2004 trial for Estrada's slaying. "That was not my intent. But it got out of hand."

Estrada was walking to work the morning of April 16, 1992, when the former tow truck driver and phone company repairman offered her a ride that she accepted.

Shore blamed "voices in my head that I was going to have her, regardless, to possess her in some way."

Besides Estrada, he confessed to the slayings of 15-year-old Laurie Tremblay, who was

found beside a trash bin outside a Houston restaurant in 1986; 9-year-old Diana Rebollar, who was abducted while walking to a neighborhood grocery store in 1994; and 16-year-old Dana Sanchez, who disappeared in 1995 while hitchhiking to her boyfriend's home in Houston.

Sanchez was reported missing and her body was found after a caller to a Houston TV station provided directions to a field in north Harris County. Police believe Shore was the caller.

Three of Shore's victims were sexually assaulted. All of them were Hispanic. Shore is white.

"His crimes were predatory, and his victims the most vulnerable in society — women and children," Harris County District Attorney Kim Ogg said, describing Shore as "a true serial killer" who terrorized Hispanic females in Houston for years.

"For his brutal acts, the death penalty is appropriate," she said. Shore's lawyers told the ju-

rors who convicted him of capital murder in 2004 that Shore desired the death penalty and wanted it to be known, which they said went against their advice to him.

During the appeals process, lawyers appointed to represent Shore argued he suffered from brain damage early in life that his trial attorneys didn't discover and the brain injury affected his decision about wanting the death penalty. A federal appeals court earlier this year rejected the appeal, and two weeks ago the U.S. Supreme Court refused to review his case.

The six-member Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles on Monday unanimously rejected a petition that sought clemency for Shore.

"If he had his preference, I think he would prefer to live out his life on death row rather than be executed," Knox Nunnally, one of Shore's attorneys, said.

NFL will stage draft in Dallas next April

NEW YORK (AP) — The NFL draft is headed for Dallas.

Well, for AT&T Stadium in Arlington, Texas, which the Cowboys call home. It's the first time the draft will happen in an NFL stadium.

The Cowboys will host the 2018 draft from April 28-30.

Virtually every NFL city, plus the Pro Football Hall of Fame site

in Canton, Ohio, has expressed interest in holding the draft now that the league moves it around.

After decades in New York, the draft was moved to Chicago in 2015 and was held there again in 2016. It drew huge crowds, w-

hetting the NFL's appetite for taking bids to host it.

Last year, the draft

was in Philadelphia at the iconic Art Museum steps. It drew 250,000 fans for the first draft held outdoors.

"I really think we came up with an idea and concept that will deliver a unique expe-

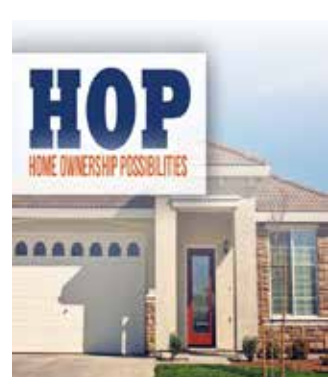
rience unlike anything seen at the NFL draft so far," said Cowboys executive Charlotte Jones Anderson.

The ring worked so well Astley decided to use it in his own shows. To keep people entertained between riders, Astley hired clowns, and later, jugglers, tightrope walkers and dancing dogs.

Astley's shows became quite popular, and he performed for many important people, including members of the royal court. He made a lot of money and is now called "the father of the modern circus."

Contract Bridge

Impulsive plays may be costly

The bidding:

Opening lead — ace of diamonds.

Some plays in bridge seem so clear-cut that they are often made without pause for thought. Yet anyone who has played the game for even a little while realizes that few plays — if any — should be made without adequate consideration.

For example, take this deal where South failed to make four spades. West had a difficult choice of leads and luckily hit on the only one that posed a threat to the contract: the ace of diamonds, which was then followed by the queen.

Declarer covered the queen with the king, ruffed by East. East returned a heart, and South had no choice but to play low, whereupon West took the king and cashed the jack of diamonds to score a one-trick set.

Despite West's inspired opening lead and continuation, declarer should have made the contract. In effect, he succumbed to an "automatic" play. Had he stopped to give the matter more thought, he would have seen that there was a surefire way to make 10 tricks.

South's mistake came at trick two, when he played dummy's king of diamonds on the queen. Instead, he should have allowed West's queen to hold the trick! The best West can then do is to lead another diamond for East to ruff.

This gives the defenders three tricks, but that's all they can get. South takes East's heart shift with the ace at trick four, ruffs a diamond high and draws trumps. He then discards dummy's queen of hearts on his fifth diamond, and the game is home.

Of course, it may be argued that ducking the queen at trick two adds to the risk of the king being ruffed (if West started with three diamonds). However, while the duck in that case loses a trick, it doesn't lose the contract. So while it's true that covering the queen may gain a trick, it also jeopardizes the contract, and it is therefore the wrong play.

This Date In History

Today is Thursday, Oct. 19, the 292nd day of 2017. There are 73 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Oct. 19, 1987, the stock market crashed as the Dow Jones Industrial Average plunged 508 points, or 22.6 percent in value (its biggest daily percentage loss), to close at 1,738.74 in what came to be known as "Black Monday."

On this date:

In 1216, John, King of England, died, more than a year after affixing his royal seal to Magna Carta ("The Great Charter").

In 1781, British troops under Gen. Lord Cornwallis surrendered at Yorktown, Virginia, as the American Revolution neared its end.

In 1789, John Jay was sworn in as the first Chief Justice of the United States.

In 1864, Confederate Lt. Gen. Jubal A. Early's soldiers attacked Union forces at Cedar Creek, Virginia; the Union troops were able to rally and defeat the Confederates.

In 1914, the U.S. Post Office began delivering mail with government-owned cars, as opposed to using contracted vehicles. The First Battle of Ypres (EE'-pruh) began during World War I.

In 1936, H.R. Ekins of the New York World-Telegram beat out Dorothy Kilgallen of the New York Journal and Leo Kieran of the New York Times in a round-the-world race on commercial flights that lasted 18 1/2 days.

In 1944, the U.S. Navy began accepting black women into WAVES (Women Accepted for Volunteer Emergency Service). The play "I Remember Mama" by John Van Druten opened at the Music Box Theater on Broadway.

In 1953, the Ray Bradbury novel "Fahrenheit 451," set in a dystopian future where books are banned and burned by the government, was first published by Ballantine Books.

In 1967, the U.S. space probe Mariner 5 flew past Venus.

In 1977, the supersonic Concorde made its first landing in New York City. The body of West German industrialist Hanns Martin Schleyer (SHLY-ur), who had been kidnapped by left-wing extremists, was found in Mulhouse, France.

In 1982, automaker John Z.

DeLorean was arrested by federal agents in Los Angeles, accused of conspiring to sell \$24 million of cocaine to salvage his business. (DeLorean was acquitted at trial on grounds of entrapment.)

In 1994, 22 people were killed as a terrorist bomb shattered a bus in the heart of Tel Aviv's shopping district. Entertainer Martha Raye died in Los Angeles at age 78.

Ten years ago: A three-year global manhunt for a Canadian schoolteacher suspected of sexually abusing Asian boys ended when police in north-eastern Thailand arrested Christopher Paul Neil. (Neil later pleaded guilty to sexually abusing a 13-year-old boy and was sentenced to three years and three months in jail; he was later convicted of holding the boy's 9-year-old brother against his will, and was sentenced to five years; he was released and returned to Canada in 2012.)

Five years ago: The Dow Jones industrial average had its worst day in four months, sinking 205.43 points, or 1.5 percent, to close at 13,343.51. The San Francisco Giants cut the Cardinals' lead in the National League Championship Series to 3-2 with a 5-0 victory over St. Louis.

One year ago: In the third and final 2016 presidential debate, Republican Donald Trump stunned the forum in Las Vegas by refusing to say he would accept the results of the election if he were to lose; Democrat Hillary Clinton declared Trump's resistance "horrifying." A man convicted of killing an Atlanta police officer and wounding a second officer with an AR-15 rifle was executed in Georgia. The Cleveland Indians won their first pennant since 1997, blanking Toronto 3-0 in Game 5 of the AL Championship Series. The Chicago Cubs routed the Los Angeles Dodgers 10-2 to even the NL Championship Series at 2-all.

VA seeks 'narrow' exemption to for-profit college ethics law

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Department of Veterans Affairs said Tuesday it would proceed with a narrow waiver to an ethics law banning VA employees from receiving benefits from for-profit colleges, saying most cases posed no actual conflicts of interest with private companies vying for millions in GI Bill tuition.

The VA's latest move comes after it abruptly dropped plans last week for a broader exemption.

Under the new plan, the VA said it would generally grant waivers only to those employees who take classes or receive payments for teaching at for-profit colleges. Government watchdogs had worried that suspending the law entirely would create financial entanglements with the private companies.

"There will be no blanket waiver, just a consistent approach to considering and granting

individual waivers for those employees who are eligible for them," said VA spokesman Curt Cashour.

The VA had originally sought to suspend the law, publishing a proposal in the Federal Register in September that was set to take effect this week for all 330,000 VA employees. The VA cited the lack of any "significant adverse comment," but abruptly backed off the plan after The Associated Press asked about rising opposition.

In particular, veterans groups and ethics experts said the VA's original proposal was rushed, betrayed the will of Congress and gave for-profit colleges an opening to improperly reward VA employees who steer veterans to the schools.

On Tuesday, the VA said it had no plans to publish a new proposal and would direct department leaders to issue more narrow waivers. The VA has estimated that thousands of employees

who took classes or taught at for-profit colleges could be exempted.

Some veterans groups and ethics experts said they still had questions about VA's latest plan, pointing to what they say is a requirement in the law for public hearings to be held when issuing waivers. The VA said the law is ambiguous and that it was reviewing whether or not hearings would be needed.

"We are still concerned," said Carrie Wofford, president of Veterans Education Success, a group that focuses on fraud and abuse of student veterans.

The ethics law, passed in 1966 in the wake of several scandals involving the for-profit education industry, calls for dismissal of any VA employee who receives "any wages, salary, dividends, profits, gratuities, or services" from a for-profit school in which a veteran is

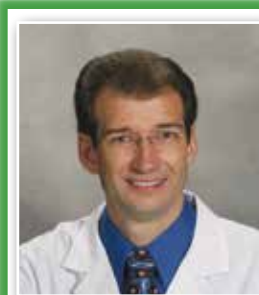

also enrolled using VA GI Bill benefits.

For-profit colleges have found an ally in President Donald Trump, who earlier this year paid \$25 million to settle charges his Trump University misled customers.

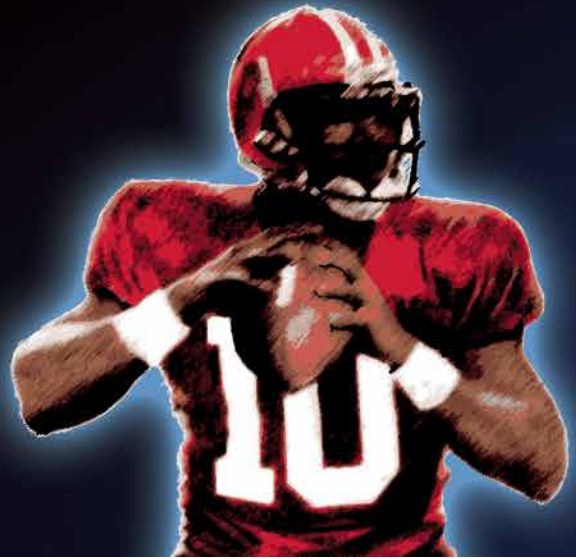

It's no secret that the Steers have had a rough go at this 2017 season. And while we mention their trials and tribulations every week, they still have a lot of learning and growing up to do, which is normal for a young and inexperienced team learning a brand new system. Yes, they fell 40-13 in a tough game to Snyder last week, and yes they are 0-7 on the season. But while there were a lot of mistakes made that comes with the process of change, there were still improvements in some areas that we have seen emerge every week. That is what the Steers look to build upon going into their match up against a extremely talented Wylie team.

"Well we didn't play very good, bottom line. We didn't play with a sense of urgency, and when we came out I thought we were going to pick it back up after we scored the first one. We made way too many mistakes, and we didn't execute the way we

should have, period. Even though we are young, that doesn't excuse that. Penalties were also a factor, but no more so than Snyder. Its just, we have to play better," said head football coach Mitch McLemore. "Here is the deal. You have to play with courage. This is a very tough game. It's tough at any level, and it's really tough when you are playing really really good teams like we are going to play this week. It's even tough when you are playing the teams who aren't where they want to be yet, but you have to be ready to go to battle. We have to find a way to do that."

While the score suggests otherwise, Big Spring played great defense in spurts. They held Snyder to a few field goals, forced them to punt multiple times, caused the Tigers to go three-and-out more than once and picked off Snyder's quarterback. It was the offensive execution where they really hurt themselves.

"I'll tell you the honest truth, what bothers me the

Coahoma Bulldogs look to add to their 4-game win streak vs. Idalou Wildcats

Coahoma's 34-0 district-opening win against the Stanton Buffaloes marked their fourth consecutive win, and they will look to keep their hot streak alive as they set their sights on the Wildcats of Idalou for their second district game of the season, which will take place in Idalou.

"That win was huge for us. Our number one and main focus last week was Stanton and going 1-0 to start district. We had a great non-district run before that, but I told the kids that none of that is of much significance now. It is all about district play and district seeding etc. so it was big time for us," said head football coach Fred Dietz. "The guys are self motivated, and they are excited about being at football practice. It's a fun time and our kids are really working hard. There is a lot of energy and excitement. Our goal is to win a district championship and they know that we really have an opportunity to complete for that and do it."

Last Friday, the Bulldogs defense had a strong showing vs. the Buffaloes. They held Stanton to only 76 rushing yards, 17 receiving yards, scored a safety, got three interceptions and recovered four of the Buffs' six fumbles.

"It was probably our best defensive game that we have played all year. The kids really played with a lot of passion and energy.

Defensive football is all about attitude, and we played it with the right attitude Friday night," said Dietz. "It was nice to see our kids really respond and tackle well, which was a key problem in our two losses this year, bad tackling. We have improved in that area, and we have preached two things to the kids defensively; to tackle and to create turn overs. We really did both of those things well on Friday, and it was the reason for our success."

Coahoma had a lot of success offensively as well with 214 rushing yards and 143 receiving yards. They were able to get it done on the ground, which comes as no surprise, but also had to pass more than they normally do as Stanton did their homework and did what they could do to try and limit the Bulldog's strong run game.

"We were pretty balanced. Stanton was kind of stacked in the box against us, which teams are going to do because they know that running the football is what we do and that's what our strength is, so they put as many bodies in there as they could," said Dietz. "It made us throw the football a little bit, which we are very capable of. That is the good thing about our team. We have some guys who are very capable of catching the football and we have more than one quarterback that can get it to them. It gives us

Forsan using bye week to rest and polish fundamentals

Last Friday, the Buffs began district play with a hard fought defeat from Hawley. It is in their plans to use this week, which is their bye week, to slow down a little bit, take a deeper look into the things they need to work on and build upon their strengths.

"Number one, we want to rest a little bit. We kind of throttled back some as far as hitting each other and things like that. Our goal with our bye week every year to go back and work on fundamentals, you know basic stuff like blocking schemes, tackling schemes and just making sure that we have the fundamentals covered," said head football coach Jason Phillips. "A lot of times, especially when you get into district, you're just game-plan, game-plan, game-plan and you don't get to work as much on fundamentals, so we like to utilize our time that we have this week on that."

Another focus for Forsan is to keep the players who play on both offense and defense as fresh as they can throughout the game so they can finish games just as strong as they start them.

"The number one thing that we have to improve on, is how we have a lot of players that play both ways, so its important that we find a way to not only get those guys into better condition, but we've got to get those guys off the field a little bit. Especially early in the game. I think our lack of depth is kind of hurting us a little bit, so we have also been focusing on that this week, and trying to give our two-way starters some more breathers. That way, we can be a little bit stronger in the fourth quarter. We really put more of an emphasis on that, and the guys have taken it upon themselves to condition better as well," said Phillips. "You know, I thought we played really well in spurts, both offensively and defensively. We played a really good first quarter, and

then the second quarter we kind of fell off. Then we came out and played a really good third quarter. We have just got to put it all together for four quarters. Teams like Hawley, Anson, Stamford and Post are really good teams and we match up well with them, but we have to match up with them for all four quarters and not just two."

Penalties also played a part in Forsan's loss to Hawley last week, which is something Forsan doesn't usually have too many issues with. The Buffs racked up a total of nine penalties, which cost them a total of 80 yards, compared to Hawley's three penalties for 39 yards.

"It was a big penalty night for us. That was

Q&A with Wylie head football coach Hugh Sandifer

How long have you been the head football coach at Wylie?
"This is my 32nd year."

How did it feel to get that huge triple-overtime win against Brownwood last week?

"It felt great obviously to get a win but the most important thing is that we are 1-0 in district. That was our goal going into that game, but that is behind us and its time to move on now."

What has this week's practice been like preparing for Big Spring?

"Well, we are working very hard and trying to improve our team where we can get better. We have been spending time obviously on Big Spring's offense and defense and preparing for that, so I think it's been going well."

Is there any difference in the way your team prepares for a 7-0 team vs. an 0-7 team?

"None whatsoever. That is one of the things that we really work on, is a maturity level and a respect level. We know that everyone we play is working as hard as we are, and we have to respect that and get ready for every opponent."

You have a lot of seniors on

your team. How has that impacted your team?

"We try to have a big senior class every year so that we have a lot of leadership on the team from the guys who have been around the program the longest. We try to really highlight those seniors and make it a special year for them, and also to let them lead the team so its huge for us to have a lot of upperclassmen."

Based on what you have gathered from film, what kind of offensive and defensive formations can Big Spring fans expect to see from the Bulldogs on Friday?

"I think we are pretty multiple on both sides of the ball. We try to be multiple offensively with the run and the pass game. I think defenses now a days have had to become more multiple due in ways due to all of the different formations they see from the opponent. I really don't think you can just say we run a certain type anymore, so it's pretty much just being able to adjust."

What has been a strength for your team this season?

"One thing is our depth. We have had numerous injuries and have played multiple games with five or six of our starters out. So, I think depth has been a huge part of our success this season."

most is how we dropped 9 footballs that were hit right in the receivers hands, three of which were touchdowns. I'm not talking about high throws or anything like that. I'm talking about on the routes that we have been developing and that we have practiced. I'm talking, they catch them... they score. Simple as that, and this happened three times. We just dropped them," said McLemore. "Of course I'm not mad at the guys, but we have got to make those plays. It changes the whole game, and it goes back to what I was saying about being ready to go. You've got to be ready to go."

Despite their offensive struggles, Big Spring quarterback, Abel Clark, still had a strong showing. He was under pressure for the majority of the game, but still managed to show his mobility and scrambled to make big plays. Both of the Steers' touchdown passes were from Clark scrambles while under pressure, and it is not hard to see the growth in this kid each week.

"There is no doubt he (Clark) is our offensive player of the week," said McLemore. "He kept a lot of plays alive for us, and being under pressure like that and being able to do that is hard as a sophomore. So, I am very proud of him."

Though there is still a lot to work on on the field, McLemore stresses how through all of the team's battles, the guys never stop pushing. They continue to hang onto the rope because they see the bigger picture, that everything they are implementing this season is a process and it takes a lot of time, learning, practice and work to get to where they want to be.

"This is my third rodeo with new

stuff like this. And I'll tell you, this schedule is ridiculous. I will tell you straight up. Our kids are beat up, they're tired and they're mentally beat up because of who we have been playing and all of the road trips," said McLemore. "But one thing is for sure, they have never failed to come to practice, and they have never failed to be respectful. I love them to death, and I know we are going to get there. Like I told someone the other day, I said 'it takes a long time when your kids have been down, whether it be from losing or people knocking them, or parents supporting bad decisions where it's always someone else's fault, it takes a long time to build up that trust.' So we are just working to get better at it, but we are not there yet. When we get there though, I'll tell you what, everyone else better look out."

As far as preparation for Wylie goes, the Big Spring coaching staff plans to build upon the positive things and focus solely on just getting better with the little things.

"We are not changing anything. That is the worst thing you can do. We've just got to get better at it, so that is our point of emphasis for this week, is just learning to do the little things right and being consistent. We cannot turn the football over, and we have got to protect our quarterback, open holes for our running back, and really play solid defense," said McLemore. "They're (Wylie) going to score. You know a team like that, with a great scheme, is going to score points. So, we have got to score some too. If we move the chains, and if we can take time off the clock, have long drives, good defensive stops, or make them go 10 or 12 plays on offense, then we have done a pretty good job. So, that is the game plan." The Big Spring Steers and the Wylie Bulldogs are set to kick off at 7:30 p.m. Friday night at Memorial Stadium in Big Spring.

Coahoma's dual threat behind the line

What do you get when you have a quarterback committee comprised of senior, Mason Moore, and sophomore, Zach Schneider? You get an offense that can attack you with a physical run game as well as an explosive air raid, that when executed, is a nightmare for defenses.

Moore, the starting quarterback for the Bulldogs, is their most accurate passer and can make big plays with his arm. His ability to manage the offense and read defenses gives Coahoma an edge in the passing game.

"When talking about spread offense and throwing the ball a lot, which is really what my background is, Mason is the guy on campus who is accurate and quick, and feels comfortable in the pocket," said Dietz. "He really gives us the ability to do those things from the pocket and from a spread offensive standpoint, where if you want to be throwing it a lot, he gives us that ability."

While Coahoma is very capable of attacking through the air, running the football is their identity. Anyone who has been to a Bulldog football game this season has witnessed their strong running game giving defenses heck, and it all starts with Schneider.

Schneider is used as both quar-

terback and running back, depending on what package they decide to go with. When Coahoma wants to run their quarterback, which they do quite often, that is when you will see Schneider behind the line. He has the ability to run with physicality and speed, which is his strength at the quarterback position.

"It's awesome to have guys who
