activities of the Kennedy administration, such as its covert efforts to upend Fidel Castro's government in Cuba. For historians, it's a chance to answer lingering questions, put some unfounded conspiracy theories to rest, perhaps give life to other the-

ories.

Despite having months to prepare for disclosures that have been set on the calendar for 25 years, Trump's decision came down to a last-minute debate with intelligence agencies — a tussle the presi-

The delay sparked a round of finger-pointing among agencies and complaints that Trump should have released all records.

dent then prolonged by call-

ing for still more review.

Roger Stone, a sometime Trump adviser who wrote a book about his theories on the assassination, urged Trump to review personally any material that government agencies still want to withhold. Trump should at least "spot check" any extensive redactions to make sure agencies are not "dabbling in acts of criminal insubordination," Stone said in a statement.

As for the unreleased documents, Trump will impress upon federal agencies that "only in the rarest cases" should JFK files stay secret

after the six-month review, officials said.

In the meantime, experts will be poring through a mountain of minutiae and countless loose threads in search of significant revelations.

In the chaotic aftermath of the assassination, followed two days later by the murder of the shooter, Lee Harvey Oswald while in police custody, FBI Director J, Edgar Hoover vented his frustration in a formerly secret report found in the files. It opened: "There is nothing further on the Oswald case except that he is dead."

But, reflecting on Oswald less than an hour after he died, Hoover already sensed theories would form about a conspiracy broader than the lone assassin.

"The thing I am concerned about, and so is (deputy attorney general) Mr. Katzenbach, is having something issued so we can convince the public that Oswald is the real assassin," he said.

He also reported: "Last night we received a call from our Dallas office from a man talking in a calm voice and saying he was a member of a committee organized to kill Oswald."

Hoover said he relayed that warning to Dallas police and was assured Oswald would be sufficiently protected. Oswald was shot dead the next day by Jack Ruby. A document from 1975 contains a partial deposition by Richard Helms, a deputy CIA director under Kennedy who later became CIA chief, to the Rockefeller Commission, which was studying unauthorized CIA activities in domestic affairs. Commission lawyers appeared to be probing for information on what foreign leaders might have been the subject of assassination attempts by or on behalf of the CIA.

A lawyer asks Helms: "Is there any information involved with the assassination of President Kennedy which in any way shows that Lee Harvey Oswald was in some way a CIA agent or agent" — here the document ends, short of his answer.

Among the files is a more than 400-page document that appeared to describe people being monitored as potential threats to Kennedy and his successor, Lyndon B. Johnson.

Officials described one such person this way: "Subject participated in pickets against JFK in 1961. Allegedly trained in guerrilla tactics & sabotage. Considered very dangerous by those who know him. Has visited USA & Cuba. Considered armed and dangerous."

Some suspicions missed the mark badly.

One document describes a person who sent a letter to Johnson in December 1963 stating "you're doomed." The document says: "Interviewed 1/23/64; friendly. Said letter was a joke. Not dangerous. Attending 5th grade."

The collection also discloses a Sept. 14, 1962, meeting of a group of Kennedy's senior aides, including brother Robert, the attorney general, as they discussed a range of options against Castro's communist government.

The meeting was told the

CIA would look into the possibility of sabotaging airplane parts that were to be shipped to Cuba from Canada. McGeorge Bundy, JFK's national security adviser, cautioned that sensitive ideas like sabotage would have to be considered in more detail on a caseby-case basis.

Much of Thursday passed with nothing from the White House or National Archives except silence, leaving unclear how the government would comply with a law requiring the records to come out by the end of the day—unless Trump was persuaded by intelligence agencies to hold some back.

White House officials said the FBI and CIA made the most requests within the government to withhold some information.

Trump ordered agencies that have proposed withholding material related to the assassination to report to the archivist by next March 12 on which specific information

meets the standard for continued secrecy.

That standard includes details that could cause "harm to the military defense, intelligence operations, law enforcement or conduct of foreign relations," Trump wrote in his order. The archivist will have two weeks to tell Trump whether those recommendations validate keeping the withheld information a secret after April 26.

The full record will still be kept from the public for at least six months — and longer if agencies make a persuasive enough case for continued secrecy.

The collection includes more than 3,100 records — comprising hundreds of thousands of pages — that have never been seen by the public. About 30,000 documents were released previously — with redactions.

Whatever details are released, they're not expected to give a definitive answer to a question that still lingers for some: Whether anyone other than Oswald was involved in the assassination.

The Warren Commission in 1964 concluded that Oswald had been the lone gunman, and another congressional probe in 1979 found no evidence to support the theory that the CIA had been involved. But other interpretations, some more creative than others, have persisted.

$APInterview: SEAL\ wants\ Bergdahl\ dishonorably\ discharged$

(AP) — Former Navy
SEAL James Hatch,
whose career as a commando ended when he
was shot while searching for Bowe Bergdahl,
said his feelings toward
the Army sergeant have
gone from "I would like
to kill him" to thanking
the soldier's lead attorney for working so hard
to defend him.

Hatch, who testified this week at Bergdahl's sentencing hearing on charges he endangered comrades by leaving his post in Afghanistan in 2009, has had eight years to think about the nighttime raid that ended with insurgent AK-47 spray ripping through his leg.

Sent home, he sank into a depression he nearly didn't survive. Through therapy, char-

ity work with dogs and a cathartic book-writing process, his thinking has evolved on more than a few things — including Bergdahl's fate.

In an interview with The Associated Press, the retired senior chief petty officer said he's still angry at Bergdahl but doesn't envy the military judge who must decide his punishment after sentencing resumes Monday.

"It has gone from 'I would like to kill him' to 'he should go to jail forever,' to where I'm at now, which is far more peaceful. Having spoken to others who are aware of more of the details of his walking off, and his treatment once he was captured, I am very happy that I do not have to choose what happens to him," Hatch

Still, he said, it's important that Bergdahl

not receive an honorable discharge.

"The most important thing to me personally is that I would hope that he would be dishonorably discharged, and therefore ineligible for the benefits that veterans that have served with honor are eligible for," Hatch said.

Bergdahl faces up to life in prison after pleading guilty to desertion and misbehavior before the enemy for leaving his post in Afghanistan in 2009, but the military judge has wide leeway to determine a sentence.

Hatch said he wants Bergdahl to have a fair hearing, and appreciates the hard work of all involved — even the defense. He had a cordial encounter with Bergdahl's lead attorney, Eugene Fidell, at breakfast in the hotel where both were staying this week.

"I shook his hand, and

I said: "Thank you for being a good American and taking care of that kid even though I don't care for him," he said. According to Hatch, after the two chatted awhile, Fidell "put his arm around me and said: 'Hey, your fly is open."

"How can you hate a guy like that?" Hatch said.

Fidell said his interactions with Hatch have been pleasant, calling him a patriot who sacrificed for the country.

"I think it would be wonderful if, after the case is over, Senior Chief Hatch and Sgt. Bergdahl could sit down one on one," Fidell said. "I know Sgt. Bergdahl would like to do that."

During testimony, Hatch spoke stoically about his own wound during a July 2009 search mission and the 18 surgeries he's had. But he cried when discussing the military dog, Remco, who died in the same barrage of gunfire. Hatch credits the dog's handler, another member of his team, with helping to save his life.

"I knew going into that line of work that was a possibility. That dog didn't have a clue," he told AP, explaining his strong emotions. "It is incumbent upon us to protect them. They provide us with their senses and their courage, but they don't understand bullets. We failed. I, in particular, I failed to protect that dog."

Another military dog, Spike, is the namesake of a nonprofit group Hatch started to support military and law enforcement canines. Hatch was Spike's handler when that dog died on a mission in Iraq.

Hatch, now 50, said the inspiration for Spike's K9 Fund came out of a dark time in the months after he returned wounded from the 2009 mission to find Bergdahl.

"I just was washing down my pain meds with booze," he said. "I wanted to be a zombie and I didn't want to be alive anymore." Police Norfolk, Virginia were called to his house because he was suicidal and "acting a fool with a gun," he said. Officers called men Hatch had served with, helped get him treated for depression. As a thank you, he helped raise money for the care of a police dog. Now, his charity — which he refers to as "my purpose"— also helps with medical expenses for families who take in re-

There is no GOP civil war

espite the unrequited longings of the left and certain vocal Republicans, there

is no civil war in the Republican Party, and there is not even widespread disaffection with President Donald Trump among rank-and-file GOP voters. But this is not

what you would

assume listening to Democrats and the mainstream media or frequenting the Twitter accounts of a number of high-profile Trumpdisdaining conservatives.

Sen. John McCain has been in a public feud with President Trump, as have Sens. Bob Corker and Jeff Flake, who both have announced that they will retire, lamenting the decline in dignity and manners that Trump has allegedly ushered in. And no less a Republican well-wisher than Hillary Clinton has declared that the GOP is imploding. President Trump, for his part,

obviously perceives matters differently, tweeting, "The meeting with Republican Senators yesterday, outside of Flake and Corker, was a love fest." Even sometime Trump critic Lindsey Graham praised the luncheon, saying that Trump was "upbeat," "lighthearted" and "funny as hell.'

With the liberal media gleefully showcasing these intramural squabbles and obsessing over Trump's every tweet and phone call, it's no wonder some might infer that Republicans are in hopeless disarray and headed for extinction. But outside their echo chamber and that of the denizens of NeverTrumpistan, I think we'll be fine.

Victor Davis Hanson, in a piece for National Review Online, cited data showing that despite perceptions to the contrary, Trump received roughly the same percentage of Republican votes as other previous GOP presidential candidates. Additionally, own experience tells me that the overwhelming majority of fellow Republicans and conservatives are supportive of Trump, even if they don't wholeheartedly embrace everything he may tweet or I've run into are that concerned about Trump's tweets — even those who would prefer he dial them down a notch — because they appreciate that he is speaking their language instead of the guarded language of the typical politician. Columnist Salena Zito offered a fascinating insight on this, saying, "The press takes him literally, but not seriously; his supporters take him seriously, but not literally." Though certain conservative Trump critics cringe at this, I dare say the rank-and-file Republican voter understands the difference and isn't sweating the small stuff provided we can move forward on policy and dismantle the Obama agenda. Trump supporters don't dis-

pute that Trump's bombastic style provides fodder for his critics, but they also understand that the political left has mercilessly savaged every other Republican president for decades. They believe that Trump is the first one, at least since Ronald Reagan, who gives the left a taste of its own medicine. This may be cringe-worthy to the Emily Posts of the conservative chattering class, but many of the rest of us are willing to overlook some of the distasteful in exchange for someone in our corner fighting back.

This is not to say that the Republican Party enjoys the greatest reputation these days, but that's more the fault of the recalcitrant moderates and the establishment wing than it is of Trump. Trump's most ardent conservative critics are the very ones who contributed to his rise in the first place — partly because they didn't perceive Obama's agenda as urgently destructive or they weren't willing to oppose him vigorously enough. And let's never underestimate the level of angst generated by the open-border advocates on the right who besmirched good-faith immigration hawks as nativists and racists. It's also hard to take seriously some (and I truly mean some, not all) never-Trumpers' insistence that they are the true conservatives when you often see them obsessing over Trump and you rarely see them criticizing the left; in fact, they frequently retweet liberals with approval.

what these critics don't grasp

Indeed, very few conservatives is that the Trump movement transcends Trump. It preceded him and will survive him. This does not necessarily mean in my view that populism will replace constitutional conservatism. But it does mean that rank-and-file conservatives are tired of their politicians talking a good game during their campaigns and losing their nerve in office and will now hold their candidates accountable.

As most recognize, Trump is not primarily ideological, though he does have a set of strong ideas on certain policies. I disagree with his protectionist bent, and I don't believe he should cater to the class warriors in promoting his otherwise attractive tax proposal. I also believe he could have been much more successful on Obamacare reform if he'd have tried to placate the bleeding hearts less via pre-existing conditions and mandated coverage and implement truly constructive market solutions.

But I am nt fretting those differences. I am trying to speak up about them and hoping in my small way to influence the movement in a conservative direction.

Precisely because Trump is not a rigid ideologue, the policies of the so-called Trump movement with certain exceptions, such as immigration — are not set in stone. Even on foreign policy, Trump has not shown himself to be a pure isolationist as some feared. He's a strong national ist and patriot, but so are most constitutional conservatives. In many areas, Trump is governing as a mainstream conservative.

So no, the GOP is not imploding; it is experiencing a realignment whose parameters have yet to be fully drawn, so let's quit panicking and be constructive forces to shape this movement into one that's conservative, dynamic and determined to fight the left with the same amount of energy it uses to fight us. If we do that, we have every reason to expect to hold on to our governing majority.

Forced childbirth vs voluntary abortion

'n April, the Trump administration took a stand against the brutal methods used to enforce China's one-child policy. The U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops denounced China for "acts of violence" against pregnant women, including "coerced sterilizations and forced abortions," and praised

president for cutting off funds for U.N. family planning efforts.

This administration does not try to force pregnant women to have abortions. Just the opposite: It tries to forces pregnant women to

have babies. And its methods bear an uncanny resemblance to those employed by the Chinese government. The evidence is on view in

the case of an unaccompanied 17-year-old from Central America who was detained after entering the country illegally in September. On Wednesday morning, after a furious legal battle, she got an abortion. But that outcome came only after weeks of efforts by the administration to prevent her from doing so. She has been held in a feder-

ally funded shelter since she was picked up. After discovering her pregnancy, she went through the process required under Texas law for a minor to get an abortion.

A state court ruled she was "mature and sufficiently informed" to decide for herself.

The Supreme Court has ruled that the constitutional right to privacy protects the right to abortion. Given those two realities, the case should have been closed.

But the administration doesn't like to be constrained by laws or the Constitution. It preferred that "Jane Doe," whose identity is protected, carry her pregnancy to term, and it did all it could to make her comply.

The Office of Refugee Resettlement sent her to an anti-abortion "pregnancy crisis center," where she was urged to change her mind. It told her mother about the pregnancy even though the girl said her parents had severely abused her. The government refused to let

her leave the shelter to get an abortion — though it offered to let her leave for medical treatment if she agreed to give birth. At each stage, it found ways to block her access. It may be argued that because

the teenager is here without authorization, the Constitution doesn't apply to her. But the Supreme Court has never taken such a position. It has ruled that even undocumented immigrants enjoy constitutional protection, including "due process of law."

The Justice Department said that because she is a minor and here illegally, it is entitled to impose its own preferences on her. If she wanted to have an abortion, it said, she had the option of returning to her home country

— though she said that doing so would expose her to more abuse. The district judge ruled in her favor, and on Tuesday, an

opinion, Judge Patricia Millett concluded that Doe, "like other minors in the United States who satisfy state-approved procedures, is entitled under binding Supreme Court precedent to choose to terminate her preg-

nancy." The administration said it should not be required to "facilitate" a procedure it finds abhorrent. But that was a bogus claim. The girl was not asking the government to pay for the operation. provide a doctor or transport her to the clinic. The only thing her lawyers asked of the government was "to stop blocking the door."

But the facilitation argument wouldn't stand up regardless. If she were an adult, Doe would be in the custody of Immigration and Customs Enforcement, which permits detainees to get abortions. If she were in federal prison, she would be allowed to get an abortion.

Doe asked for far less — and the Trump administration tried to deny her even that. Absent this court ruling, she'd have been confined and required to go to term, even though continuing her pregnancy presented much greater risks to her health than ending it. This was a simple choice: Compel the girl to give birth or let her get an abortion. The fact that she is undocumented doesn't change that reality.

Forcibly commandeering someone's uterus to advance the government's purposes may be standard procedure in China, but not in America. In both places, the issue is not whether any pregnant female should have a baby or get an abortion. It's who appeals court agreed. In her should decide.

Twitter to ban ads from Russia's RT, Sputnik

NEW YORK (AP) — Twitter says it will ban ads from RT and Sputnik, two state-sponsored Russian news outlets that the U.S. intelligence community has said tried to interfere with the 2016 U.S. presidential election.

The San Francisco company also plans to donate proceeds from RT, formally known as Russia Today, and Sputnik ads to support outside research on Twitter use in civic engagement and elections. This amounts to \$1.9 million the company expects to have earned since 2011.

Twitter, Google and Facebook are scheduled to testify at congressional hearings next week on Russian meddling in the 2016 election. Twitter also said this week it will disclose more information on political ads. Russian foreign ministry spokeswoman Maria

Zakharova told state news agency RIA Novosti that Twitter's move is "another aggressive step" aimed at blocking RT.

FORT BRAGG, N.C. (AP) Soldiers and an airman described a shattered hand and a head wound Thursday as prosecutors presented evidence that Army Sgt. Bowe Bergdahl's disappearance endangered those who searched for him.

The testimony came during the sentencing phase for Bergdahl, who faces up to life in prison after he pleaded guilty to desertion and misbehavior before the enemy. Bergdahl was held captive by Taliban allies for five years after abandoning his remote post in 2009.

Several witnesses described a search mission by U.S. and Afghan troops to comb two villages for information related to Bergdahl days after he disappeared.

Among the most vivid testimony came from Jonathan Morita, describing how his hand was shattered by a rocket-propelled grenade. He has since had multiple surgeries and is left without full use of his right hand.

"Right about here is where they sowed on my thumb where it was dangling off," he said, pointing to a picture of sutures displayed on a video monitor.

He said he can't bend his index finger and thumb and had to learn again how to write and brush his teeth with limited mobility in his dominant

hand.

He was with a halfdozen U.S. troops that were accompanying a larger group of Afghan soldiers on the July 2009 search mission when they were ambushed by insurgents using small arms, machine guns and explo-

pelled grenade hit Morita's rifle, shattering his hand. A second landed nearby, lodging shrapnel in his left elbow.

"I just thought I was going to definitely die right there in Afghanistan," said Morita, who earned the rank of sergeant before leaving the Army. After his injury during the fire-

fight, he said he "pulled out a Bible, read a quick verse" and then grabbed a handgun to return fire before a medical helicopter ar-Nearby, Master Sgt. Mark Al-

len suffered a head wound during the ambush. National Guard Staff Sgt. Jason Walters testified that Allen was trying to make a radio call when Walters saw him get hit by a bullet.

"I watched just as a cloud of his blood came out the side of his head." Walters testified.

Walters became emotional when he described tending to his friend's wound.

"I grabbed a pressure bandage, and started. Sorry ma'am," he told a prosecutor before pausing and resuming testimony. "I started treating his wound ... telling him to hang on."

Allen now uses a wheelchair and is unable to speak, requiring assistance for everyday tasks such as getting out of bed. Walters said it was difficult visiting Allen in a hospital after the de-

"Seeing him like that is something I don't wish anyone would have to see," he said.

Bergdahl acknowledged at his plea hearing that his actions triggered the search missions that resulted in the wounds, his lawyers argued Thursday that there's a limit to his responsibility for a lengthy chain of events including others' decisions and enemy fighters.

"Enemy forces were the direct cause of the horrific wounds to Master Sgt. Allen," said Army Maj. Oren Gleich, a defense law-


Allen's wife is expected to testify Monday. Gleich told the judge he believes it's appropriate for her to testify to the wound's effects on Allen himself, but the defense could object if prosecutors steer her toward testimony that goes too far into the impact on his family. The judge, Col. Jeffery R. Nance, said he would have to wait and see what the objections were before weighing in on the defense's stance.

Bergdahl, a 31-year-old soldier from Hailey, Idaho, has said he was caged by his captors, kept in darkness and beaten, and tried to escape more than a dozen times before President Barack Obama brought him home in 2014 in a swap for five Taliban prisoners at Guantanamo Bay.

Food bank receives **Chevron donation**

ODESSA (AP) — The West Texas Food Bank has announced a \$50,000 donation from Chevron that will be used to provide 1,480 emergency relief boxes to the Hurricane Harvey relief efforts and help the West Texas Food Bank provide services to its 19-county area.

More than 70 volunteers from the Chevron Mid-Continent Business Unit will gather from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Friday at the West Texas Food Bank location in Midland, 1601 Westcliff Drive in Midland.

Volunteers will create the boxes, which will weigh 30 pounds each and include 12 food items, a news release said.

The West Texas Food Bank will send the relief boxes to its sister food bank in Houston. The Big Orange Truck will leave the Permian Basin Nov. 2 and will arrive at the Houston Food Bank on morning of Nov. 3. Chevron's Houston employees and the Houston

Food Bank will unload and distribute the boxes to affected residents in Houston, the release said. The West Texas Food Bank spearheaded the col-

lection efforts in West Texas for victims of Hurricane Harvey.

It collected hundreds of thousands of pounds of food and supplies at its Odessa, Distribution Center. The food bank also backhauled donations from sister food banks around the state to the Odessa Distribution Center in order to use its own volunteer force to separate and process items donated to

The shipment of the Chevron emergency relief boxes to the Houston Food Bank will mark the 20th such trip the West Texas Food Bank has made to Southeast Texas.

2 Texas lawn-care workers die of carbon monoxide poisoning

LUCAS, Texas (AP) — Authorities say a father and son found dead inside their company van in North Texas died from carbon monoxide poisoning rather than what investigators initially believed was exposure to chemicals.

Collin County sheriff's Capt. Jim Moody identified the men Friday as 72-year-old Lyle John Powell and 49-year-old Ross John Powell.

Moody says the two were working Wednesday in a neighborhood in Lucas, northeast of Dallas, when they returned to the van and were quickly overcome by fumes from a generator.

The men died at the scene and a sheriff's deputy and at least three firefighters who responded to the emergency call also were overcome by fumes and were treated at a hospital.

Officials had said Thursday that they believed the men were handling chemicals when they suc-

A Texas native's research has become a play on desegregation

LONGVIEW, Texas (AP) — Elizabeth Michael Melton stars in "Unpacking Longview," a new play she says is about family legacies and public school desegregation in Longview.

Her hope is that the production spurs conversations about how moments from desegregation including the 1970 Longview Independent School District bus barn bombing — impacted residents on all sides in the city.

"Unpacking Longview" is based on Melton's doctoral dissertation research that began in 2015. She collected oral histories from parents, teachers, students and administrators connected to Longview ISD during desegregation.

It is a production of Artsview Children's Theater in partnership with Melton, who wrote and will perform the piece.

Free performances are scheduled at 4 p.m. on Saturday, Nov. 11, and at 2 p.m. on Sunday, Nov. 12, at the Mickey Melton Performing Arts Center that is named for her father, a longtime Longview ISD trustee for whom a road at the North Business Park also is named.



Caregiver of Indian girl found dead in Texas wants answers

NEW DELHI (AP) — A toddler whose body was recently found in a drain in suburban Dallas was cheerful, healthy and eating well a year ago when she met her new parents, according to the manager of the Indian orphanage from where Sherin Mathews was adopted.

Babita Kumari said she wants to know what happened to the 3-year-old girl, whose father has been jailed after telling police that Sherin had choked to death while drinking milk in the middle of the night. Wesley Mathews has told police Sherin needed a special diet involving meals at odd hours because she was malnourished.

Those claims puzzle Kumari, who managed the Mother Teresa Orphanage and Children's Home in the city of Nalanda in eastern India's Bihar state, where the girl had lived since infancy.

"Look at the photos of the child. Does she look malnourished?" Kumari said during a Thursday evening phone interview with The Associated Press.

"I have so many questions about what happened to her," Kumari said.

The girl, then named Saraswati, after the Hindu goddess of wisdom, was a happy, cheerful child who made everyone smile at the orphanage.

"We loved her laughter," Kumari said. "She was a smart

Mathews told police his daughter had developmental disabilities and was malnourished. He described a special diet regimen in which she had to eat whenever she was awake in order to gain

According to an arrest affidavit filed by Richardson police, Mathews said he had been trying to get the girl to drink milk in the garage of their home.

"Eventually the 3-year-old girl began to drink the milk. Wesley Mathews then physically assisted the 3-year-old girl in drinking the milk," according to the affida-

Mathews told police that Sherin choked and coughed and eventually he felt no pulse and believed the child had died. Investigators wrote that he "then admitted to removing the body from the

The affidavit does not whether say Mathews administered any medical aid to his daughter.

The child was already eating solid food and drinking milk from a cup when

she left the orphanage, Kumari remembers. She said Sherin squinted in one eye, but otherwise had nothing wrong with her when Mathews and his wife Sini Mathews adopted her in June

"Why did they have to make her eat or drink anything at that hour? Why was he forcing her?" Kumari asked. "If someone is forcing a drink into the mouth of someone who is crying and sobbing, then even an adult can choke.' India's foreign minister Sush-

she has asked the Ministry of Women and Child Development, which oversees adoptions, to thoroughly investigate the adoption process of Sherin Mathews. Swaraj said passports for chil-

ma Swaraj tweeted Friday that

dren adopted from India will now only be issued with the ministry's approval.

Sherin was sent to the orphanage in Nalanda by child welfare authorities when she was only a few months old. It has since shut down. Kumari said that was due to missing paperwork and that the orphanage plans to challenge the shutdown.





Did you ever wonder: Kings of Judah

or many chapters, the storyline of 2 Kings has dealt with the kings of Israel. Israel is the name taken by the ten tribes who rebelled against Solomon's son, Rehoboam. Later this group became known as Samarians.

To me this part is very confusing because the names are so similar and many of the kings did not rule long enough to make a lasting impression on history.

Chapter 11 begins with the kings of Judah, the southern part of the nation God had promised the Hebrews. For the most part Judah continued to serve God, but politics are another

Here it begins with Asa. God sent a prophet to him, "The Lord is with you when you are with Him. If you seek Him, He will be found, but if you forsake Him, He will forsake you. But as for you, be strong and do not give up, for your work will be rewarded." (2 Chronicles 15:2-7 paraphrased)

Asa did much good for Judah. He even banished his grandmother, Maacha, because she worshipped Asherah, the Canaanite goddess of fertility. Many people from Israel came to live in Judah because they saw that the Lord was with Asa.

There was no war in Judah until the 35th year of Asa's reign. But when Israel threatened war, Asa made a military alliance with Ben-Hadad, king of Aram.

A prophet came to King Asa saying, "Because you relied on the king of Aram and not on the Lord your God, the army of the king of Aram has escaped from your hand. For the eyes of the Lord range throughout the earth to strengthen those whose hearts are fully committed to Him." (2 Chronicles 16:7-9 paraphrased)

Asa became angry with God and would not repent. He was afflicted with a disease of the feet and he sought healing from the physicians instead of the Lord. As died in the 41st year of his reign.

His son, Jehoshaphat, became king of Judah. Jehoshaphat's heart was with the Lord. He sent priests throughout Judah to teach the people from the Law of the Lord. He appointed honest judges in each fortified city. The Lord blessed him with peace.

The fear of the Lord fell on the surrounding nations. And Jehoshaphat received much tribute from the surrounding nations.

Jehoshaphat had married a daughter of Ahab, thus creating a military alliance. Ahab was being harassed by Aram, and Jehoshaphat joined him in battle. Ahab was killed but the Lord spared Jehoshaphat.

Jehoshaphat received word that three nations had allied together to come against him. The Lord advised him to stand firm in his belief in God, and God would fight the battle for

The armies of these three nations traveled through the ravines to avoid detection. They became confused and

attacked each other.

Jehoshaphat made an alliance with Ahaziah, Ahab's son, to construct a fleet of trading ships. Again the prophet of the Lord said that because Jehoshaphat had allied with wicked Israel the Lord would destroy the

Do you see the pattern here? All of Israel was ordained to be a theocracy... God was their King. When the people asked for a human king so they would be like the other nations, God allowed it. God would be the head of the king.

However, very few of the kings acknowledged God as their leader. Most were affected by the elevation and power of being king, and they turned from Him. The Lord removed His mercy and grace from them.



I like it when ET and Yoda drop by for a visit with their pet ghost-dog. They are polite ghosts and witches and extra-terrestrials. They almost always say, "Thank you."

Halloween, of course, has its dark side. Our nightly news reports of abducted children and maps dotted with sexual predators have erased the naïve world of Halloween past. We are more aware that we live in a dangerous world where evil is real and present. Many churches are


more than a little uncomfortable with Halloween. On the one hand, it is enjoyable to community celebrate with imagination, fantasy and neighborly generosity. On the other hand, there are demonic and destructive forces at work in the world that kill and destroy. It is one thing to celebrate fall and indulge in imagination. It is another to celebrate the occult, witchcraft, the devil and demons.

Many struggle with addictions and impulses they seem unable to control. They find themselves on a collision course with destruction. Our world needs the deliverance from

Jesus once met a man filled with destructive demons. He lived among the tombs of the dead, often cutting himself with sharp stones. Local citizens tried to control him by putting him in chains, but he broke the chains and escaped back to his home among the graves. When Jesus ordered the demons that were destroying the man to leave him the demons entered a nearby herd of swine that immediately rushed into the sea and were drowned. The man was healed. When his neighbors found him, he was in his right mind, sitting with Jesus, no longer a threat to himself or to them. But it scared them. They asked Jesus to leave their country and not to come back. (Mark 5:1-20). Forces that we cannot understand or control always scare us.

This Halloween we will celebrate an occasion to enjoy our children and their imagination. We will celebrate the turning leaves, dry corn, pumpkins and harvest. Halloween can also serve as a reminder that in our struggles with the unseen forces of good and evil, both in our hearts and in the world, we have a Deliv-





MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — This time the Memphis Grizzlies came out raring to go, though they couldn't sustain the momentum.

The Grizzlies turned back a second-half rally by Dallas and closed with a late run to pull away and preserve a 96-91 victory on Thursday night.

Marc Gasol had 25 points and 13 rebounds, and Mike Conley added 22 points for the Grizzlies, who lost to the Mavericks 103-94 on Wednesday night in Dallas. The Grizzlies came out sluggish in the loss, but opened Thursday's game with a much better approach, building the lead to 22 in the first half and 20 in the third

quarter. Then almost saw it slip away.

"They made us play one-on-one, and then we got a little happy with that and stuck to it," Gasol said. "We got enough stops, especially at the end, to stop the bleeding."

The Grizzlies almost squandered away that second-half advantage. Wesley Matthews, who finished with 18 points, had four 3-pointers in the third to start the comeback. Then a fourth-quarter push gave the Mavericks an 86-84 lead with 3:56 left when J.J. Barea converted three free throws, capping an 18-8 run to open the quarter.

That was the last lead for Dallas, as Conley scored the next five points and had nine of the Grizzlies' next 10.

"We shouldn't have been in that position in the first place," Matthews said. "We put ourselves there. . (Wednesday) night we had them down 19 playing the way we did in the second half. What team do we want to be?"

Harrison Barnes led Dallas with 22 points and 11 rebounds. Dirk Nowitzki added points.

Memphis led 28-14 after one and 54-35 at halftime and seemed in control of the game, holding the Mavericks to 27 percent shooting. Dallas hit only one of its 13 3-point shots before halftime.

"The second quarter was a killer," Dallas coach Rick Carlisle said, later adding: "I loved the fight in three of the four quarters. I thought we played hard. The second quarter was what really did us in."

Astros even at 1

HOUSTON (AP) — As a couple of Astros loosened up in the outfield, the retractable roof at Minute Maid Park made its slow crawl Thursday, turning the bright sun into shade.

That might be the only way to keep balls from flying completely out of the yard at this power-packed World Series.

A day after Jose Altuve, Carlos Correa and Houston combined with the Los Angeles Dodgers for a Seriesrecord eight home runs in the Astros' 7-6, 11-inning win, the baseball world was still marveling over the moonshots.

So were the players who launched them.

"Actually, when I was getting off the plane with (Carlos) Beltran, I was talking to him, and I was like, what was going through your head when Altuve hit the homer? He was like,

in the dugout," Astros third baseman Alex Bregman said.

"Then I was like what about when Correa hit his, what about when they hit theirs? And they hit theirs," he said, laughing. "We were just going back and forth."

After a Major League Baseball season that set a record for the most home runs, the World Series is off to a flying

Already a whopping 11 homers — six by Los Angeles — as the sides split the first two games at Dodger Stadium. At this rate, they'd shatter the Series record of 21 in 2002 when Barry Bonds and Giants lost to the Angels in seven games.

The curveballing Lance McCullers Jr. starts Game 3 for Houston on Friday night against Yu Darvish, and the roof will be shut exactly how the Astros

Astros' World Series run lifts **Houston amid Harvey recovery**

HOUSTON (AP) — Paul Daulong hopes the Houston Astros jersey his daughter gave him after Hurricane Harvey's flooding devastated the family's home will be a good luck charm as his beloved baseball team tries to win its first World Series.

So far, it seems to be working.

Daulong started wearing the jersey after the Astros trailed the New York Yankees three games to two in the American League Championship Series. They won the next two games in Houston to advance to the fall classic against the Los Angeles Dodgers. He forgot to wear it during Game 1 of the World Series, which the Astros lost, but remembered to put it on for Wednesday's Game 2, which they won in extra innings.

"Normally I'm not real superstitious," he said this week from his dust-covered home, a gutted structure held up by exposed wooden beams but devoid of furniture and appliances. "But I'm wearing it now and I'm not taking it off."

The Daulongs and others in the Houston area impacted by Harvey have used the Astros' championship run as a source of inspiration to slog through difficult days filled with tiring repairs, bureaucratic red tape

and uncertainty about the future. "It gives you a positive note to start

thinking about," said Paul Daulong, 70. "It's been nothing, other than the last week they fixed the fireplace. So it's frustrating. With the Astros win-

ning, it makes you feel good." Amid the Astros' quest, the city has continued rebuilding from Harvey's devastating flooding, which inundated some areas with more than 50 inches of rain in late August. Officials have estimated that more than 136,000 homes and structures were damaged during Harvey in Harris

County, which includes Houston. Officials say it will be months before all of the debris covering many front lawns is removed. Nearly 100 people still remain in an American Red Cross shelter in Houston and nearly 9,000 families in Harris County who were displaced by Harvey are still living in hotels.

Mary Daulong, 69, said she and her husband — who are temporarily living in an apartment — have scheduled their rebuilding activities at their home around Astros' games.

"We would work here until it was dark. Now we cannot. Whatever time the Astros come on, is when we stop working here," she said.

Houston Mayor Sylvester Turner said in the aftermath of Harvey, the Worlds Series isn't just about the As-



1. Redouble. When partner opens the bidding and the next player doubles, you normally take one of the following actions: You pass, indicating a poor to moderate hand with no convenient call to make; you bid a suit, provided you have less than 10 high-card points; you bid one notrump to show a balanced hand of six to nine points; or you redouble to

show 10 or more high-card points. The redouble does not necessarily promise support for partner's suit, but instead announces that the douoler is caught between two good hands and that it might be possible to exact a substantial penalty. Usually the opener passes at his next turn in order to allow the redoubler to show

the true nature of his hand. **2. One notrump.** This is a typical one-notrump response indicating six to nine points and scattered values. If not be forcing.

you were to pass instead, you might find it impossible to show the type of hand you have at your next turn.

3. Pass. Lacking the appropriate values for any other call, you should take refuge in silence — despite your singleton diamond. The odds are that West will respond to his partner's double by bidding a suit. If West passes, your partner can still rescue himself from one diamond doubled

4. Three diamonds. This is a preemptive bid, pure and simple, indicating lots of diamonds and poor defensive values. The purpose of the pre-empt is to make it difficult for the opponents to exchange information. There is good reason to think that East-West might have a game in spades or hearts.

5. Redouble. Again you apply the principle discussed earlier to tell partner that you have at least 10 high-eard points. That takes precedence over bidding your clubs at this point.

It would be correct to bid two clubs over East's double if your ace of spades were a low spade. But because the spade ace brings your high-card count to 11 points, you should redouble rather than bid two clubs. Note also that if you did bid two clubs over the double, it would





On Oct. 27, 1947, "You Bet Your Life," a comedy quiz show starring Groucho Marx, premiered on ABC Radio. (It later became a tele-

vision show on NBC.) On this date:

History:

In 1787, the first of the Federalist Papers, a series of essays calling for ratification of the United States Constitution, was published.

In 1858, the 26th president of the United States, Theodore Roosevelt, was born in New York City.

1880, Theodore In Roosevelt married his first wife, Alice Lee.

In 1886 (New Style date), the musical fantasy "A Night on Bald Mountain," written by Modest Mussorgsky (MOH'-dest muh-SAWRG'skee) and revised after his death by Nikolai Rimsky-Korsakov, was performed in St. Petersburg, Russia.

In 1922, the first annual celebration of Navy Day took place.

In 1938, Du Pont announced a name for its new synthetic yarn: "nylon."

In 1954, U.S. Air Force Col. Benjamin O. Davis Jr. was promoted to brigadier general, the first black officer to achieve that rank in the USAF. Walt Disney's first television program, titled "Disneyland" after the yet-tobe completed theme park, premiered on ABC.

In 1962, during the Cuban Missile Crisis, a U-2 reconnaissance aircraft was shot down while flying over Cuba, killing the pilot, U.S. Air Force Maj. Rudolf

Anderson Jr. In 1978, Egyptian President Anwar Sadat and Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin (men-AH'-kem BAY'gihn) were named winners of the Nobel Peace Prize for their progress toward achieving a Middle East

accord. In 1980, opera star Beverly Sills gave her last public performance during a farewell gala at New York's Lincoln

Center. In 1992, Petty Officer Allen

Schindler, a gay U.S. Navy sailor, was beaten to death near Sasebo Naval Base in southwestern Japan by shipmate Terry Helvey, who pleaded guilty to murder and was sentenced to life in prison.

In 2004, the Boston Red Sox won their first World Series since 1918, sweeping the St. Louis Cardinals in Game 4, 3-0. Ten years ago: Despite sig-

nificant dissent in the ranks, United Auto Workers members narrowly passed a fouryear contract agreement with Chrysler LLC. The Boston Red Sox took a 3-0 World Series lead with a 10-5 win over the Colorado Rockies in Denver.

Five years ago: The eastern United States braced for high winds, torrential rains, power outages and even snow from Hurricane Sandy, which was headed north from the Caribbean toward a merger with two wintry weather systems. The San Francisco Giants, with a 2-0 victory, took a three-gamesto-none lead in the World Series against the Detroit Tigers.

One year ago: A jury in Portland, Oregon, delivered an extraordinary blow to the government in a long-running battle over the use of public lands when it acquitted all seven defendants, including group leader Ammon Bundy, who were involved in the armed occupation of a national wildlife refuge in 2014. Law enforcement officers dressed in riot gear evicted protesters from private land in the path of the Dakota Access oil pipeline, dramatically escalating a monthslong dispute over Native American rights and the project's environmental impact. Twitter announced it was cutting about 9 percent of its employees world-

the city on their shoulders and on their backs and in their mitts," said Turner. "The storm may have come, but it hasn't dampened our spirit, our enthusiasm."

Astros manager A.J. Hinch said the team understands its responsibility to represent Houston and bring awareness "to the things that are needed to rebuild our great city."

"It gives the city something to rally around and gives people something to cheer for that otherwise may not have a lot to be hopeful for," said Astros pitcher Justin Verlander.

Houston resident Tom Flores, 70, said while cheering on the Astros in the World Series won't make up for people losing their homes, it still gives people some hope.

"I got friends of mine who lost their home and everything but they are still Astros fans and this does take a little bit of the sadness off," he said.

Dodgers pitcher Yu Darvish, who wore a "Houston Strong" T-shirt in the days after the storm and made a donation to help those affected by it. He joked that he hopes it gains him some favor when he starts Game 3 on Friday night.

"I made a donation to help, to support Houston and I want people to get recovered and feel more energized," he said in Japanese through a translator. "And since I made that donation, maybe I can use a ball that doesn't have much pop in it."

Houston pitcher Lance McCullers said helping boost the city after the storm became a rallying point for the

"We still have pictures hanging in our lockers," he said. "It's still something we think about, because people here are hard-working people, and they went through something that a lot of people can't understand. A lot of people lost everything.

"So for us to be able to just play baseball for a couple of hours and for those people to be able to have a little bit of joy, to get away from what they were having to go through is pretty special."

An event like the World Series can be a powerful source of motivation for a community dealing with adversity, said Tim Bono, a lecturer in the Psychological and Brain Sciences Department at Washington University in St. Louis.


"It'll be important for people in Houston to continue to direct attention toward that and say, 'Hey, look how we all came together to cheer on our sports team. Let's continue to do that to support each other and to especially direct resources ... for those areas that still need our help in recovering from the aftermath of the hurricane," Bono said.

Paul Daulong said the Astros provided a good example for the community by going through their own rebuilding process after several losing seasons.

"We have totally put the Astros ahead of the problems that are occurring right now," he said. "We just gotta keep our heads up and make sure that just like the Astros are going to come through against the Dodgers, we'll make it back as well as we can."

HOUSTON (AP) — Once mocked, now fashionable, those rainbow jerseys of the Houston Astros are back in full bloom at the World Se-

The Astros won't be sporting them Friday night for Game 3 against the Los Angeles Dodgers. But they've become a fan favorite decades after they debuted, and Minute Maid Park undoubtedly will be peppered with the outof-the-box style.

Count model Kate Upton in that crowd. She liked the bright colors so much, she recently wore them on the field while celebrating with her fiance, Astros ace Justin Verlander.

No surprise, in fact. The man who designed them said the team was looking to play to a certain demographic.

"We were trying to appeal to

women," recalled Jack Amuny, who turns 80 next month. The revolutionary pattern was introduced in 1975 and the Astros wore a version with only minor tweaks until 1986. From the start, it caught the eyes of the baseball world: The pullover jersey featured various hues of red, orange stripes and yellow stripes, plus a navy blue star to the left of center.

They didn't have an official name — while rainbows seem to be the most popular way to describe them, they're also referred to as tequila sunrise because of the cocktail that features similar color scheme.

Nolan Ryan pitched his fifth no-hitter in them, Mike Scott and Larry Dierker also threw no-nos in the gear.

Though they haven't been the team's uniforms for more than 20 years, they're Houston's go-to throwback. The Astros have worn them 10 times since 1999, including on June 24 when Lance Mc-Cullers came off the disabled list and pitched.

"That's an iconic jersey for us, for the Astros organization," McCullers said Thursday. "Nolan, Scott, a lot of guys when you think of Astros baseball, you think of those guys, and that jersey."

There certainly weren't always such warm feelings about them. When they were released, some called the outfits the ugliest uniforms in the history of baseball.

Amuny, the freelance graphic designer who created the design for ad agency Mc-Cann Erickson, didn't exactly brag about his role in their inception.

"I got a lot of criticism about it and there was a lot of snickering," he said.

Amuny, who lives in suburban Houston, didn't receive much guidance when he began the project.

"My assignment was to design something different and I had no restrictions," he said. Since this was the early 1970s, all the work was done by hand, with Amuny cutting strips of paper and lining them up in a sequence of

hues from light to dark. "I'm a very conservative person and I was doing something that was really wacko in that no other major league team had a uniform where the top was a different color than the bottom," he said.

"So I think that was a little off. I was just trying to do something that was bright."

He also said the team hoped

to attract more female fans with the uniform redesign.

"The Astros I don't think at that time had a real good team and they were trying to fill that dome," Amuny said of the almost 68,000-seat As-

The only change the Astros made to Amuny's original design was moving the star from the center of the stripes.

And for the record, Amuny didn't get rich off the celebrated style.

"Back then I was charging about \$50 an hour, so it couldn't have been a whole lot of money," he said with a chuckle.

Not that he feels badly about that.

"It comes down to the satisfaction and the enjoyment of designing something that worked. That's the big kick I get out it," he said.

Besides, he has a nice little keepsake of his handiwork.

"I ordered one, a Nolan Ryan jersey, and he autographed it for me on the day

that he pitched a no-hitter with that jersey on," Amuny said.

Among those who liked the look was Steve Sax, a rookie with the Dodgers when they faced the rainbow-wearing Astros in the playoffs in 1981.

"I played for two franchises that had a lot of tradition, the Dodgers and the Yankees, and we didn't have uniforms like that," he said this week at Dodger Stadium. "No one did. That wide band and all those colors, that was very '70s and '80s. I know some people made fun of those Astro uniforms. I thought they were kind of cool."

He's far from the only one, with Esquire magazine calling them the best uniforms in a piece written before the start of the World Series.

"This is, hands down, the best baseball uniform of all time," the magazine wrote. "You killed it As-

tros, you killed it." Baseball uniforms aren't exactly high fashion, but the style is so loved that even a woman who spends her days on catwalks in places like Paris and Milan has embraced

the style. Celebrating with Verlander after Game 7 of the AL Championship Series last weekend, Upton stunned in a \$200 Mitchell & Ness reproduction of the warmup sweater the team wore bearing the design.

The navy button-up sweater with the signature stripes and "Astros" in white letters is so popular that it's sold out on


the company's web site. The team store at Minute Maid Park also sold out during the ALCS.

It's been a staple in the closet of nearly every Houston rapper over the years.


But the affinity for the jersey certainly isn't limited to the locals. Big Boi, one half of Atlanta duo Outkast, rocked it in a video in 1998 and New York-born rapper and producer Sean "Diddy" Combs donned one in a video in 2003.

Houston rapper Paul Wall had a custom Nolan Ryan replica made that features anaconda skin on the letters and logo. "We don't get a lot of love

outside of Houston from other cities or other artists, so when we see somebody from out of town wearing one of our Houston jerseys, we recognize it," he said. "When we saw Outkast representing wearing an Astros jersey, we were all excited about that."
