Current Big Spring Independent School District Superintendent Chris Wigington is set to replace Don Wood as superintendent of Bushland ISD. This is Wigington's fifth

year as superintendent for Big Spring's school district. Bushland ISD Board of Trustees voted 6-0 Nov. 15 to name Wigington as the lone finalist requires the board to wait 21 days before

"He was definitely one that rose to the top pretty quickly, through the process, just reviewing the applicants, and he remained at the top named through the whole process," Wood said. "Jumping in in the middle of the year, it's a great time for superintendents. You don't jump right into the hiring phase. You don't jump right into the budget phase, like when you jump into the new district in the middle of summer, like is traditional. You can kind of use the whole semester to kind of get acclimated to the district and learn more about the district, and then you get into the budget phase and hiring phase of the year. He'll have that behind him going in. So that's going to be an easier transition for him." "My experience with the

school board at BSISD, faculty, staff, and the community as a whole has been amazing," said Wigington. "Big Spring has a great group of kids and being part of BSISD is absolutely something I'll always remember."

Wigington went on to add that he feels he and fellow board members have created a culture of teamwork and

CHS FFA heads to Area

The Coahoma FFA ag issues team has been studying the topic of cloning animals for months and plans to show off that work at area competition set for Saturday at Howard "We all sat down and wrote our speech to-

gether at the beginning of the year and then we went through and revised and updated it," explained Aubrey Parum, a senior at Coahoma High School and team member. "Then we assigned our parts and we've been working on it since.

The team consists of Parum, seniors, Trey Brumley, Diana Gonzalez, Raegan Deel, junior Ethan Lopez, and sophomores Gage Hill and Garrett Anderson.

As part of that research, team members have been corresponding by e-mail with a company who researches and performs cloning. For the competition, three team members are assigned to debate "Pro" cloning and three are on the "Con" side with one person serving as the mediator.

With the current technology available, cloning an animal can cost \$85,000 or more, according to Gonzalez, who debates against the issue on the team.

"I think we can lower the cost," said Parum,, who presents on the pro cloning side. "I think that is something we can figure out in the future. It think it going to be cool when you can clone animals and keep the genetic line going. In our speech, we talk about bringing back extinct species. If I think we could do that, it would be pretty cool."

Gonzalez said cloning could be useful in the future to meet the demands of a growing worldwide population.

"As the population increases, we need to find ways to keep up with feeding people," she

"I think it could be more efficient," Parum added. "Certain genes do better than others. I think if we could take those genes and recreate it, we could reproduce faster." However,

His mother was from Jerusalem and she raised him to worship God. However, after his kingship

was firmly established he executed all the officials who were responsible for his father's

But he did not kill the sons of the officials as was customary. He remembered that the Lord has commanded, "You shall not put fathers to death for their children, and children shall not

be put to death for their fathers." (Deut 24:16) Amaziah, king of Judah, fought against Seir and was victorious, but he brought back idols of their gods. He set up the idols in Judah and caused the people to bow down to foreign gods.

Amaziah then fought against Israel/ Samaria and lost. He fled, but they followed and killed him. He was brought horse.

His son Uzziah became king of Judah at age sixteen. His mother was from Jerusalem. She taught him to love the Lord, and he reigned for fifty-

Uzziah made many repairs and improvements in Judah. But after he became powerful, Uzzaih became prideful. He became unfaithful to God.

King Uzziah, although he was not a priest, entered the Temple to burn incense. God had prohibited anyone but the priests to enter the sanctuary. While he argued with the priests,

leprosy broke out on his forehead. The leprosy continued and he lived in a separate house until he died. His son Jotham became King of

people continued to serve the idols. He did extensive repairs to the walls of Jerusalem; he built up other towns and built fortresses and towers. Jotham's army conquered the Am-

Judah. He followed the Lord, but the

monites. In one year the Ammonites paid him 300 talents of silver; that is

They paid him ten thousand cors each of wheat and barley; this is 62,000 bushels each of wheat and barley each year.

Jotham reigned for sixteen years. When he died, his son Ahaz became king of Judah. He served the idols and incurred God's anger.

The Lord handed him over to the Arameans, and they took many captives back to Damascus.

The Lord also gave Ahaz into the hands of Israel. They killed one hundred, twenty thousand Judean soldiers. They sacked the treasure of the Temple and king's palace, and took two thousand wives and children prisoners back to Samaria. A prophet of the Lord met the Sa-

maritans and warned that their treatment and their anger toward Judah were excessive. So they returned the loot and the captives to Judah.

The Philistines raided towns in the foothills of Judea. Ahaz was devastated; he requested help from Assyria. Their king, Tiglath-Pileser, accepted large gifts from Ahaz, but then turned on him. The Edomites also attacked Judah and carried off captives.

During this time, Israel had a succession of six kings who came to power not by birthright, but by violence. You can see how chaotic these times were...every strong man wanted a

chance to be king of Israel.

The last king of Israel was Hoshea. Shalmaneser, king of Assyria, laid siege against him; it lasted for three years. In his ninth year, Assyria completely overpowered Israel and carried away the educated people and skilled craftsmen.

They repopulated the land with people from other conquered nations. At this time Israel became officially known as Samaria.

Perhaps you say, "God was cruel and vengeful." But think back. How long did He have patience with them while they continued to serve foreign gods? Even though He loves His people, isn't it only right to punish wayward children?

very day we are bombarded with new allegations of sexual abuse and harassment by celebrities,

corporate executives and politicians. The list is long. Perhaps it started with Bill Cosby, then Harvey Weinstein, Kevin Spacey, Bill O'Reilly, Roger Ailes and others. The list is growing by the

How did we get into the mess? How did we sink so low?

It seems to be a "frog in the kettle thing." You know, if you place a frog in boiling water, it will immediately jump out and save itself. But if you place a frog in room temperature water, it will rest there as you gradually raise the heat until the frog eventually cooks and dies. It is unaware of the danger and does not jump out.

Maybe it was the mid-1950s that our sexual mores began to gradually change. Our commitment to marriage started to slip. Divorce and remarriage, multiple times, became acceptable. Consensual sex began to replace the covenant monogamous relationship that had guided sexual

I don't think there is any single source to blame. TV sitcoms gradually adopted the consensual sex standard and portrayed it easily and somewhat attractively. We went from Father Knows Best, The Nelson's, I Love Lucy and Leave It to Beaver to Friends (with benefits) Seinfeld and The Big Bang Theory and a whole slew of day-time soap operas. Movies portraying casual sex are too numerous to list. "Sleeping around" became entertaining and acceptable.

Fifty Shades of Grey was originally self-published as an e-book in 2011.

The book includes erotic scenes of bondage/discipline, dominance/submission and sadism/masochism. It became a best-seller around the world with 125 million copies sold by 2015, the fastest selling paperback of all time in the U.K.

Pornography, once only available in seedy newsstands, became a click away on laptops, PCs, iPads and tablets. Email inboxes were bombarded by invitations to smut.

Repeated moral failure on the part of national leaders undermined our moral standards further. Bill Clinton's sexual tryst in the oval office, chief among them. Of course, President Trump's recorded "locker room language" didn't help. The world and our culture will likely continue down this path. But God calls followers of Christ to a different path, a different standard, a healthier way of life.

The standard set by Jesus has always been the same. David P. Gushee, noted Christian ethicist stated it best: "What is the sexual ethics standard that applies to followers of Christ? Celibacy outside of life-time covenantal marriage, monogamous fidelity within life-time covenantal marriage. That norm applies to all Christians. It is demanding, countercultural, and essential to the well-being of adults and children."

Jesus was clear in setting the bar high when it came to sexual standards. "You have heard it said, 'You shall not commit adultery.' But I say to you, he who looks on a woman to lust after her has already committed adultery with her in his heart." (Matthew 5:27-28).

wrong? Is there such a thing as evil? Who gets to make these determinations? Is something wrong because I think it should be wrong or because I don't like it? If I feel that I am a "good" person, does that mean whatever is not like me

There must be a standard – a measuring stick. There is a standard to inform us these things. It is the word of God. God's word, the Bible, was given to men as they were guided (lit. "carried along") by the Holy Spirit (2 Peter 1:21). The Scriptures are "God-breathed" or

"God-spirited" which is source of the term inspired and inspiration (2 Tim-

So, in order to follow the Divine standard, one would need to put personal feelings and opinions aside and look to the Scriptures to distinguish good from evil. The Bible uses the word blasphemy to describe the act of demeaning speech. This word comes from two Greek words - one which meant "to injure" and the other which referred to a "rumor or saying". Blasphemy is

▼hat makes something purposefully trying to hurt someone through your speech even if you have to "make something up" to do it.

We have been looking at Matthew's record of Jesus' casting out a demon from a man. The Pharisees said that Jesus did it because he was using power from the prince of demons. Jesus called them blasphemers since the power to perform his miracles came from the Spirit of God. They were saying these false things and spreading this story in order to hurt Jesus' reputation and to turn the people away from him.

Matthew 12:30-32, Whoever is not with me is against me, and whoever does not gather with me scatters. Therefore I tell you, every sin and blasphemy will be forgiven people, but the blasphemy against the Spirit will not be forgiven. And whoever speaks a word against the Son of Man will be forgiven, but whoever speaks against the Holy Spirit will not be forgiven, either in this age or in the age to come (ESV).

This is why we must not only trust in our feelings. This is why we must know God's word - all of God's word and help others come to a knowledge of it as well. It should be our standard for right and wrong. If we willfully refuse to learn it and make judgments about good and evil based solely on our feelings and opinions, then we are thinking, saying, and doing what is hurtful to God's revelation. From what Jesus said, we do not want to stand before him at the judgment and face the consequences for such rebel-

Wentz, Prescott meet again, now with Eagles leading Cowboys

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) -Carson Wentz and the Philadelphia Eagles started fast just as they did a year ago and have sustained it this time.

Dak Prescott hasn't quite found the formula that carried the Dallas Cowboys to the best record in the NFC when he and Wentz were fellow rookie quarterbacks in 2016. Now Wentz has a chance to

push his team to the brink of the NFC East title on Sunday night against the defending division champions.

Win, and the Eagles (8-1) would be four games up with six to play in pursuit of their first division title since 2013.

Meanwhile, the second-place Cowboys (5-4) would be scrambling for a playoff spot while facing four more games without suspended star running back Ezekiel Elliott, who paired with Prescott for remarkable rookie seasons in 2016 while Wentz and the Eagles faded from contention.

"Any time you're playing a divisional rival it just seems there's more riding on it just because division title's the No. 1 goal," said Wentz, the NFL leader with 23 touchdown passes . "We definitely view this game as a big one, but at the same time it's the next game."

Prescott is without his friend and backfield mate, who decided this week not to pursue the legal battle and accept the remaining five games of his sixgame suspension over alleged domestic violence. Elliott had a federal appeals court hearing scheduled Dec. 1, four games into the ban.

The Cowboys could be without left tackle Tyron Smith again after replacement Chaz Green gave up five of Adrian Clayborn's Atlanta franchiserecord six sacks in the Falcons' 27-7 win last weekend.

Byron Bell replaced the benched Green against the Falcons and is likely to start if Smith, a four-time Pro Bowler

These days, nobody is standing taller.

Altuve won the American League MVP award Thursday, towering over New York Yankees slugger Aaron Judge by a wide margin and capping Houston's championship season with another piece of hard-

Giancarlo Stanton won the

NL MVP, edging Joey Votto of the Cincinnati Reds in the closest vote since 1979.

The 5-foot-6 Altuve drew 27 of the 30 first-place votes in balloting by members of the Baseball Writers' Association of Ameri-

"I was surprised that I won it," Altuve said. "I wasn't expecting

It was a landslide long in the making. Altuve has been in Houston since general manager Jeff Luhnow took a scorched earth approach to developing a winner. The Astros lost 100-

Harden, Rockets score 90 in 1st half and rout Suns 142-116

PHOENIX (AP) — James Harden looked up at the halftime totals Thursday night and couldn't believe what he saw, despite how well he and the Houston Rockets had shot

"I thought there was something wrong with the score," he said.

There wasn't. Harden scored 23 of his 48 points in the second quarter and the Rockets put up 90 in the first half on the way to a 142-116 rout of the Phoenix Suns.

Houston dominated with Chris Paul back in the lineup after he missed 14 games because of a knee injury. The Rockets made 61 percent of their first-half shots to match the second-most points in a first half in NBA history.

"Everybody was psyched up to get Chris back," Rockets coach Mike D'Antoni said. "Just one of those nights where we played well offensively. ... Chris played really

Houston finished 14 points shy of the franchise record for points in a game and improved to 8-1 on the road this season. The Rockets knocked down 21 of 44 3-point attempts, and Harden made all 18 of his free throws.

He is 37 for 37 from the foul line over the past two games,

an NBA record.

Harden, the league's leading scorer, had 33 points at halftime. Houston used a 13-1 run over the final 3:08 of the first quarter to take control and was never threatened after that, leading 45-23 going into the second.

Paul, who hadn't played since the season opener, got the start and didn't miss a beat, scoring 11 points and handing out 10 assists in limited action.

"I know I was gassed, especially early, but it was fun to get back out there with the guys," he said.

D'Antoni said before the game that getting the two stars, Harden and Paul, in sync will "take care of itself over the next week or so." D'Antoni planned to play Paul for 20 minutes — the point guard got 21 minutes of action and sat out most of the fourth quarter.

"The 20-minute restriction, first and foremost, I hate it," Paul said, "but I know they're trying to protect me." Ryan Anderson added 24

points for the Rockets, who have won seven of eight.

The Suns also shot well in the first half, getting 65 points before the break. They got the lead down to 14 with one of Troy Daniels' six 3-pointers in the second quarter, but the Rockets repeatedly scored with ease at the other end.

Daniels tied a Suns record for 3s in a quarter and led Phoenix with 23 points. Devin Booker added 18 points and 10 assists.

"I felt like it was a good experience for us to see what a high-caliber team looks like up close and personal," Booker said. "But we were on the wrong end of that."

The Suns have lost seven of eight.

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

1. Three clubs. A basic rule of bidding is that whenever the responder names a new suit, the opening bidder must bid again. In this case, for example, your initial one-heart response is 100 percent forcing, and partner must bid again even if he started with a rock-bottom minimum.

The same principle applies when responder, at his second furn to bid, again names a new suit. However, there is one important exception to this rule, and that is when the opening bidder rebids one notrump on the second round.

In that case, if responder wants to name a new suit and be sure that partner will bid again, he must jump to the three level. Since you have every reason here to believe that your side can make a game in some denomination, you must jump to three clubs to force partner to con-

2. Three notrump. With 14 highcard points and a notrump-type hand, you should go directly to game. There would not be much point to a three-club bid, as it is unlikely that game in either minor suit would prove a better proposition than game in notrump.

3. Pass. There is no good reason to disturb one notrump. Game is unlikely with only 10 high-card points facing a hand that can contain, at most, 14 points.


The only question to be resolved is whether one notrump or two hearts is the better partscore contract. Seven tricks at notrump figure to be made on high-eard power alone, while two hearts runs the risk that partner might have poor heart support, in which case a bad trump break could cost you the partscore.

4. Three diamonds. Again we have an opening bid facing an opening bid, but the best game contract is by no means clear at this point. Partner's assistance in choosing the best contract should therefore be enlisted by jumping to three diamonds (fore-

If partner next bids three hearts, indicating three-card support for your suit, you will happily carry on to four, while if he chooses diamonds or notrump as the best denomination, you intend to abide by his decision.



On this date:

In 1558, Elizabeth I acceded to the English throne upon the death of her half-sister, Queen Mary, beginning a 44-year reign.

In 1800, Congress held its first session in the partially completed U.S. Capitol building.

In 1869, the Suez Canal opened in Egypt.

In 1889, the Union Pacific Railroad Co. began direct, daily railroad service between Chicago and Portland, Oregon, as well Chicago San and Francisco.

In 1925, actor Rock Hudson was born Roy Harold Scherer Jr. in Winnetka, Illinois.

In 1934, Lyndon Baines Johnson married Claudia Alta Taylor, better known as Lady Bird, in San Antonio, Texas.

In 1947, President Harry S. Truman, in an address to a special session of

Congress, called for emergency aid to Austria, Italy and France. (The aid was approved the following month.)

Five years ago: Israel destroyed the headquarters of Hamas' prime minister and blasted a sprawling network of smuggling tunnels in the southern Gaza Strip, broadening a blistering four-day-old offensive against the Islamic militant group. A speeding train crashed into a bus carrying Egyptian children to their kindergarten, killing 48 children and three adults.

Houston won its first World Series earlier this month, and it needed its longest-tenured player to get there. Altuve batted a major league-best .346 in the regular season, hit 24 home runs with 81 RBIs, scored 112 times, stole 32 bases and showed a sharp glove at second base. Voting for these honors was completed before the postseason began.

It's been over a decade since Altuve signed with Houston from Venezuela — only after he was sent home from one tryout and told he was too short.

"They told me not to come back," Altuve said. "It was something me and my dad, he went with me that day, we were like, 'We have to go again. We have to try again."

"It's not a rule that you have to be 6-foot or you have to be really strong

to play baseball and become a good player," he added. Altuve beat out a player who

couldn't be more different. The 6-7 Judge won the AL Rookie of the Year award Monday after setting a rookie record with 52 home runs. Judge's moonshot homers dominated the highlights, and his No. 99 jersey was the top seller in baseball. Even Altuve has said he would have voted for
