

Santa to work magic for special needs kids Saturday

Good old Kris Kringle will be available to meet with children with special needs at Spring Creek Fellowship from 2 to 4 p.m. Saturday; while also taking pictures and listening to Christmas wishes for all kids in the Spring Town Plaza from 2 to 5 p.m.

Jim Billings of Spring Creek Fellowship said the church has organized a Santa visit for special needs youngsters three Christmases in the past.

"This will be our fourth year of doing it. We're going after the special needs kids, the ones that cannot, for some reason, mental or physical, they can't get into the mall where the big crowds are," he said. "We're inviting them into a smaller atmosphere where we'll have little treats for them to do, little activities for them, and they'll get to talk to Santa and Mrs. Claus with a one-on-one type thing."

The event is designed to be a family event, he said. Although the purpose is to give kids with special challenges a stress-free way to meet St. Nick, their brothers and sisters are also invited. "We want it for the whole family. We don't want to pick out just them," Billings said. "If they've got brothers and sisters, we want them to come along too."

Suspect in Virginia car attack faces upgraded charge

CHARLOTTES-VILLE, Va. (AP) — The man accused of driving into a crowd protesting a white nationalist rally in Charlottesville

faces a new charge of first-degree murder after a court hearing Thursday in which prosecutors presented surveillance video and other evidence against him.

an-Prosecutors nounced at the start of a preliminary hearing for James Alex Fields that they were seeking to upgrade the second-degree murder charge he previously faced in the Aug. 12 collision in Charlottesville that left 32-yearold Heather Heyer dead and dozens injured. The judge agreed to that and ruled there is

probable cause for all charges against Fields, including nine lesser felony counts, to proceed.

Fields' case will now be presented to a grand jury for an indictment.

Authorities say the 20-yearold, described by a former teacher as having a keen interest in Nazi Germany and Adolf Hitler, drove his speeding car into a group of counterprotesters the day of the "Unite the Right" rally that drew hundreds of white nationalist from around the country. The attack came after the rally in this Virginia college town had descended into chaos — with violent brawling between attendees and counterdemonstrators and authorities had forced the crowd to disband.

Virginia State Police helicopter, played by prosecutors in court, captured the moment of impact by the car and the cursing of the startled troopers on board. The video then showed the car as it reversed, drove away and eventually pulled over. The helicopter had been monitoring the violence, and prosecutors questioned Charlottesville Police Detective Steven Young about the video as it played.

Another surveillance video from a restaurant showed the car head slowly in what Young testified was the direction of the counterprotesters, who were not in view of the camera. The car reversed before speeding forward into the frame again.

After that footage, a man in the crowd shouted an expletive and cried out, "Take me out." He and others left the courtroom.

Fields, of Maumee, Ohio, Surveillance footage from a sat quietly in a striped jumpsuit with his hands cuffed during the hearing.

His attorney Denise Lunsford did not present evidence or make any arguments at the hearing, although she did cross-examine the detective.

Fields was photographed hours before the attack with a shield bearing the emblem of Vanguard America, one of the hate groups that took part in the rally, although the group denied any association with him.

A former teacher, Derek Weimer, has said Fields was fascinated in high school with Nazism, idolized Adolf Hitler, and had been singled out by officials at his Union, Kentucky, school for "deeply held, radical" convictions on race.

During her cross-examination of Young, Lunsford asked if searches of Fields' computer, phone or social media revealed any evidence that he was part of Vanguard America or any other white nationalist group. Young said, "No."

Young also testified that he was among the first officers to respond to the scene where Fields pulled over. No weapon was found in the car, he said.

Lunsford asked the detective what Fields said as he was being detained.

Fields said he was sorry and asked if people were OK, according to Young. When Fields was told someone had died, he appeared shocked and sobbed, Young said.

Young said authorities had identified 36 victims of the car attack, including Heyer - a number higher than officials have previously given. Some have significant injuries and now use wheelchairs, Young said.

Fields would have faced between five to 40 years in prison for a second-degree murder conviction. First-degree murder carries a penalty of 20 years to life in prison.

Charlottesville General District Court Judge Robert Downer Jr. also presided over preliminary hearings Thursday for three other defendants. Charged in cases related to the August rally are Richard Preston, who is accused of firing a gun, and Jacob Goodwin and Alex Ramos, who are accused in an attack on a man in a parking garage that was captured in photos and video that went viral.

The judge certified the charges against all three men. All those cases will also head to a grand jury.

Jason Kessler, the main organizer of the Unite the Right rally, was in court to watch the proceedings. When he arrived Thursday, a small crowd of angry protesters outside the courthouse chanted, "Blood on your hands."

GOP leaders finalize tax bill amid uncertainty in Senate

Associated Press WASHINGTON (AP) Congressional Republicans were set to unveil their sweeping tax package Friday amid uncertainty about whether they have the votes to pass it in the Senate and deliver to President Donald Frump his first major legislative victory. Sen. Marco Rubio, R-Fla., was a potential holdout. He wrote on Twitter Friday morning that he was still dissatisfied with the size of a tax credit that low-income families can claim for their children. "The #workingclass is always forgotten in D.C. We need to add more #taxcuts for #workingclass parents especially those earning 20k- 50K," Rubio wrote. At the White House, Frump said he was confident that Congress would pass the legislation as early as next week. The package would give generous tax cuts to corporations and the wealthiest Americans — Trump among them — and more modest tax cuts to low- and middle-income

families. "We're putting in a tremendous child tax credit and it is increasing on a daily basis," Trump said. "I think that we are going to be in a position to pass

Freedom Caucus predicted the vast majority of their members would support the package.

up-and-down The turns came after House and Senate Republican leaders forged an agreement in principle on the most sweeping overhaul of the nation's tax laws in more than 30 years. Republican leaders predicted swift passage next week, sending the bill to Trump for his signature.

During debate on the Senate version of the bill, Rubio proposed a change that would have made the entire \$2,000 credit available to families, even if they owe no income tax, but it was soundly defeated. To pay for the expanded credit, he proposed to slightly scale back a steep cut in the corporate income tax rate.

A few days after the earlier Senate vote, Rubio tweeted a link to a news story that said GOP leaders were indeed considering scaling back the corporate tax cut — but not to pay **BSISD** Continued from Page 1

Members of a House-Senate conference committee were signing the final version of the legislation Friday. They have been working to blend different versions of the tax package passed by the House and Senate.

Rubio's potential defection pushes the Republicans' razor-thin majority in the Senate closer to the edge.

Senate Republicans could still pass the package without Rubio's vote, but they would be cutting it extremely close. An original version was approved 51-49 — with Rubio's support. The Senate turmoil erupted after a key faction of House Republicans came out in favor of the bill, boosting its chances. Members of the conservative House

At the White House, Trump said Thursday he was confident that Rubio will get onboard.

"He's really been a great guy and very supportive. I think that Sen. Rubio will be there," said Trump, who belittled Rubio during the 2016 GOP presidential primaries, calling him "little Marco."

package The tax would double the perchild tax credit from \$1,000 to \$2,000. The bill makes a portion of the credit — \$1,100 — available to families even if they owe no income tax. They would receive the money in the form of a tax refund, which is why it's called a "refundable" tax credit. Rubio wants to increase this amount but wouldn't say by how much.

"Given all the other changes they made in for an expanded child tax credit.

"They freaked out when I proposed small reduction in Corporate tax cut to pay for cut for working families. Now this?" Rubio tweeted.

The final package slashes the corporate rate from 35 percent to 21 percent. The initial Senate and House bills had set it at 20 percent.

Sen. Rob Portman, R-Ohio, said Senate negotiators got the best deal they could on the overall child tax credit. House GOP negotiators were proposing a \$1,600 tax credit.

University of Houston fraternity indicted for hazing

HOUSTON (AP) — The parent organization of a University of Houston fraternity was indicted on a hazing charge Thursday that alleges pledges were deprived of adequate food, water and sleep during a three-day event where one student was body slammed and sustained a lacerated spleen.

The indictment names Tennessee-based Pi Kappa Alpha International Fraternity Inc. and stems from alleged incidents that occurred in November 2016. A conviction on the misdemeanor could result in fines of up to \$10,000.

The organization released a statement saying it "does not control any chapter or its members or their activities," but that it also doesn't tolerate hazing, maltreatment "or any activities that do not treat individuals with dignity and respect."

The indictment focuses on one student pledge who was allegedly rolled around in vomit, spit and feces. The student also was forced to run in darkness carrying a glow stick while being blindsided by fraternity members tackling him, according to Harris County prosecutors.

"Brotherhood and collegiate good times should be safe, and hazing is not," District Attorney Kim Ogg said. "It is also illegal, and that should be recognized by the dozens of fraternities and sororities on college campuses all over the Houston area."

Ogg said an official representative of the fraternity will have to be present for court hearings. The indictment was handed down by a grand jury in Houston.

In its Thursday statement, Pi Kappa Alpha International Fraternity Inc. said the hazing alleged in the indictment "occurred in the context of activities" of a now former chapter that was a "separate, unincorporated association" of University of Houston students.

The organization said it suspended the chapter's charter in August, after it received allegations of hazing.

The university has already suspended Pi Kappa Alpha from its campus until 2023. The school said takes its responsibility seriously to train fraternities and sororities be safe and to adhere to laws and university policies against hazing.

Houston businessman arrested in \$32M securities fraud case

HOUSTON (AP) — Federal prosecutors say a Houston businessman has been indicted in a \$32 million investment scheme linked to a software development company he founded.

Officials say 62-year-old Ray Charles Davis was arrested Thursday. Davis was indicted Dec. 7 on one count of securities fraud and 20 counts of wire fraud.


The indictment says Davis made false statements to investors regarding the financial condition of Behavioral Recognition Systems Inc. Authorities estimate investors were defrauded out of \$32 million.

Prosecutors say Davis also embezzled \$11 million from the company.

Davis, if convicted on all counts, faces a maximum 420 years in prison.

His defense attorney, Dick DeGuerin of Houston, said his client is not guilty and the charges are greatly exaggerated.

AP Aerospace Writer CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — A record-tying eighth planet has been found in a faraway solar system, matching our own in number.

Even more amazing, machines and not humans made the discovery. NASA joined with Google on Thursday to announce the finding.

This eighth planet orbits the star known as Kepler-90. Like Earth, this new planet, Kepler-90i, is the third rock from its sun. But it's much closer to its sun — orbiting in just 14 days — and therefore a scorching 800 degrees Fahrenheit (427 Celsius) at the surface. In fact, all eight planets are scrunched up around this star, orbiting closer than Earth does to our sun.

This is the only eight-planet solar system found like ours — so far — tying for the most planets observed around a single star.

Our solar system had nine planets until Pluto was demoted to a dwarf planet in 2006 by the International Astronomical Union, a decision that still stands. Some astronomers, however, suspect there could be a large ninth planet out there: an elusive Planet X the size of Neptune but much farther out.

The Kepler-90 system also could have a ninth planet or more, according to the researchers. It is 2,545 light-years away; a light-year is 5.8 trillion miles.

Google used data collected

by NASA's keen planet hunter, the Kepler Space Telescope, to develop the machine-learning computer program. It focuses on weak planetary signals — so feeble and numerous it would take humans ages to examine.

While machine learning has been used before in the search for exoplanets — planets beyond our solar system — it's believed to be the first time an artificial neural network like this has been used to find a new world.

"This is a really exciting discovery, and we consider it to be a successful proof of concept to be using neural networks to identify planets, even in challenging situations where the signals are

Wind farm agreement highlights New Mexico businesses, labor

Masked men steal lobby ATMs from 5 Houston hotels

HOUSTON (AP) — Houston police believe the same group of masked men is responsible in the thefts of ATMs from the lobbies of five hotels over the past six days, including four in the last four nights.

Police Robbery Division Lt. Cathy Richards said Thursday that in all five heists — the last three at Marriott hotels — the cash machines were not secured to a floor or wall and the gang simply carried them to a vehicle waiting outside.

"These guys go straight in the front door and out the front door," she said. "They target these hotels in the middle of the night when there is low visibility. Five of them in a few short days."

Witnesses say between four and 10 men took part in the heists. They barge in and flee in less than three minutes.

The series of thefts began Dec. 9 at a hotel near Bush Intercontinental Airport on the city's far north side. Two nights later, on Monday, a hotel miles away on the southwest side was hit. Then the three Marriott hotels, one in Houston's Galleria area, another on the west side and the third again near the airport, were robbed Tuesday, Wednesday and early Thursday.

Although no one has been hurt, in one heist a man warned hotel employees: "Don't do anything and you'll get home tonight."

In the most recent theft, about 1:15 a.m. Thursday, one of the men displayed a machete "which was basically saying, do not do anything at all," Richards said.

The hotels don't own the machines and authorities are working with the ATM companies to determine how much cash they may have contained. She said the thieves likely don't know how much is inside. "These guys are just betting on there being something in there,"

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — The state attorney general's ofand advocacy fice groups have brokered an agreement with a utility that is planning to build a massive wind farm near the Texas-New Mexico border to ensure that businesses and vendors will have a shot at being hired once construction begins.

Xcel Energy and its subsidiary Southwestern Public Service Co. are seeking regulatory approval to build two new wind farms — one on the New Mexico side of the border in Roosevelt County and the other in Hale County, Texas.

The Sagamore Wind Project would be the largest wind farm in New Mexico, providing more than 520 megawatts of power once it comes online in 2020. That's enough to provide electricity to about 194,000 homes per year.

Under the agreement unveiled Thursday, 30 percent of plant costs would ideally involve subcontractors, vendors and labor from New Mexico.

Attorney General Hector Balderas said small businesses often feel left out. The proposed wind farm could result in as much as \$57 million going toward business and labor costs in New Mexico.


"I think New Mexico can raise the standard of living. We have some of the most abundant solar and wind resources so it's important that we all work together," he said, adding that measuring and tracking the effects of the project on the local economy will boost transparency around the utility's efforts.

The agreement includes language that provides for regular updates and meetings with an adviser about the project's progress. A separate agreement was reached earlier this week that addresses concerns about the benefits of the project for New Mexico customers. The New Mexico Public Regulation Commission will consider that agreement next week, with a final decision expected in March.

The utility is working on similar agreements with stakeholders in Texas, where regulators also will have to sign off.

Black women seek rewards from Democrats after Alabama race

Associated Press WASHINGTON (AP) — Once again, black women showed up for Democrats, with nearly all of them voting in Alabama for new Sen. Doug Jones, just as they did for Democratic candidates up and down the ballot in other states over the last few months.

The same women, having proven their loyalty by voting 98 percent for Jones, now wonder whether the Democratic Party will return the favor by sharing some of the party's political power, handing over places at the negotiating table and pushing legislation that speaks to their unique issues.

"Black women showed up and showed out," said Kimberlè Crenshaw, cofounder of the African American Policy Forum. In "any other context, people who get it 98 percent right, they'd be at the head of the class. It's time for black women to be at the head of the political class."

Black turnout was Northam, and in New Jersey, where 94 per-Gov. Phil Murphy.

Those women also swept other candidates into office, including Lt. Gov. Justin Fairfax, the first black candidate to be elected statewide in Virginia since Gov. Doug Wilder in 1989.

"Let me be clear: We won in Alabama and Virginia because #BlackWomen led us to victory," said Tom Perez, chairman of the Democratic National Committee. "Black women are the backbone of the Democratic Party, and we can't take that for granted. Period."

In Montgomery, Alabama, 70-year-old Annette Brown said she sometimes considers voting Republican, but there was no way she was going to vote for firebrand Roy Moore.

"I've been a Democrat all my life, and I'm sure not going to switch for this election. Sometimes I feel like swinging, but not for Moore," she said.

> Black women have their own unique voting-mobilization strategy, said Barbara Arnwine, president of the Transformative Justice Coalition.

"That strategy is what I call 'my momma,'" Arnwine said. "You see, Vera Arnwine, when she knows an election is coming up, she gets on the phone. She calls everybody she knows. And she says. 'Are you voting? Are you registered? ... You better get out there and do it.' So this is what we do and it's just so powerful."

Tuesday's election continued the trend of black women over-performing for Democratic candidates.

In the 2016 presidential race, 94 percent of black women voted for Democrat Hillary Clinton while 53 percent of white women voted for Donald Trump. In 2008 and 2012, black women voted at a higher rate than any racial or gender group, each time giving President Barack Obama 96 percent of their vote.

ly have been the backbone of the vote-mobilization efforts, but they rarely get the credit, said LaTosha Brown, a Selma, Alabama, native and co-founder of the Black Voters Matter Fund. In Alabama, black women were on the ground working without much fanfare, just as they've done all the way back to the civil rights movement, she said.

"Black women stand and have continuously been standing in the gap, and been providing an enormous amount of leadership because we don't just bring our own issues. We bring our community with us," she said.

In addition to voting, black women are running for office, testing whether the Democratic Party will stand behind them in the 2018 elections and beyond. Stacey Abrams is running to be Georgia's first black governor. In Virginia, Vangie Williams hopes to become the state's first black congresswomen.

Gov. Jenean Hampton of Kentucky and Connecticut state Treasurer Denise Nappier, a Democrat. Black women are mayors of seven of the nation's 100 largest cities and hold 271 state legislature seats, according to the Center for American Women and Politics at Rutgers University's Eagleton Institute of Politics.

Black women say they now need to be compensated for their devotion. Democrats also need to share some of their positions of power with black women on the ballot and inside political party machines on local, state and national levels.

Sen. Kamala Harris of California, who is the only black woman in the Senate and is already being mentioned as a 2020 presidential candidate, said Democrats and progressives need to go office," she said Thursday on Twitter.

Rep. Shelia Jackson Lee, a Texas Democrat, said she and other black women Democrats plan to put together a package of legislation that will speak to black women's issues and present it to Democratic leadership with a message.

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

Official records show that Israel was carried into captivity in Assyria by Sargon II in 709 BCE. Judah was carried into exile in Babylon in 586

infighting between factions. The Babylonian leadership became weak, and they were conquered by the Persians.

Babylonian captivity had been cruelty and harsh servitude. Persian policy was to allow the government of a conquered nation to continue to function. They were a weak, vassal nation that was heavily taxed. But Persia also had a policy of allowing their subjects to worship their own god, which was unusual for the time.

King Cyrus offered the Judeans a choice of returning to Judah or remaining in Persia. Under Persian rule, many Jewish people had established businesses and owned property. Only a small portion chose to make the 500 mile journey back to Judah.

King Cyrus planned to build a temple to God in Jerusalem. He suggested that the people who stayed in Persia contribute gold, silver, goods and livestock. He sent back all the They had consequently adopted idol

Law in Babylon. The king chose him to lead the people home to Jerusalem. Ezra kept careful records of the people who returned and of the contributions of the people who stayed in Persia.

Zerubabel was appointed governor of all Israel and Judah. Jeshua, the priest, and Zerubabel were in charge of construction of the Temple.

The Judeans feared attack by the people who had been settled in Israel in their absence. But they had the altar rebuilt and dedicated in time to celebrate the Feast of Tabernacles.

They hired masons and carpenters. They traded food, drink and oil to the people of Sidon and Tyre for cedar logs. They also had to train priests and Levites to minister at the Temple.

The Jewish people who had been left behind from the captivity had intermarried with the foreigners brought in by the Assyrians and Babylonians. worship. The Judeans just back from exile considered them Samaritans,

The Samaritan's provincial government feared that their power would be diminished with the rebuilding of the Temple. The Samaritans wrote a letter to Artaxerxes, the current king of Persia, asking him to send soldiers to punish the Judeans. Work on the Temple and the city wall was halted.

When Darius became king of Persia, a letter was sent to him from Jerusalem. It asked him to search for the scrolls of King Cyrus giving them permission to rebuild Jerusalem and the Temple.

King Darius issued a directive that the people were to support, not hinder, the rebuilding of Jerusalem. In the second year the Judeans were able to celebrate the Passover and the Feast of Unleavened Bread at their proper time.

Lecomte returns as No. 2<u>1 Baylor tops</u> Texas Southern 99-68

WACO, Texas (AP) — Manu Lecomte's wrap on his injured left thumb will come off eventually, assuming it heals.

Baylor coach Scott Drew chuckled while wondering whether that was a good thing.

"Maybe we need to wrap his hand all the time," Drew said after Lecomte scored 22 points in his return after missing a game, helping the 21stranked Bears to a 99-68 victory over winless Texas Southern on Thursday night. "He was really good tonight."

With the wrap on his non-shooting thumb, the Bears point guard was 7 of 11 from the field, made all five free throws and had a game-high six assists in the 46th consecutive home win over an unranked nonconference opponent for the Bears (8-2).

It was their third straight win since losing to No. 3 Wichita State on the Waco campus. Baylor improved to 11-0 against Texas Southern as the teams met for the fourth straight year.

Nuni Omot matched Lecomte with 22 points in the first game since scoring a career-high 30, and Jo Lual-Acuil had 18 points and two blocks with his Sudanese parents watching. In town for his graduation Saturday, his mom and dad hadn't seen him in four years.

"I was nervous for the game, just because my mom has never seen me play," said Lual-Acuil, who was born in Sudan before moving to Uganda and Australia as a child. "No words can really explain how I'm feeling, for when I did see them. It was definitely and a day I'll always remember."

Trae Jefferson scored 24 points for the Tigers (0-10), who are playing every November and December game away from home third for the straight year.

This year, the schedule for former Indiana coach Mike Davis' Southwestern Athletic Conference team has included No. 12 Gonzaga and 13th-ranked Kansas along with Ohio State, Syracuse and Oregon. "I think we lose

money when we

play home games," Davis said. "I want our guys to get out and play on the road so we can get used to playing against real good competition. That's the only way to get better. It's worked for us the last three years."

Lecomte, who missed a win over Randall when the Bears played at nearby Fort Hood for the third straight year, had a four-point play when he got fouled on a corner 3 to spark an 11-2 run for a 35-24 lead late in the first half.

The 5-foot-11 native of Belgium had another 3-pointer and five points in a 17-0 spurt for a 62-37 lead in the second half. Lecomte was 3 of 6 from long range.

BIG PICTURE

Texas Southern: It doesn't mean much for the Tigers to lose most or all

a special moment of their nonconference games. They play a schedule that looks like something from Davis' days with the Hoosiers, and they haven't played at home in November or December since 2014. Texas Southern has still won at least 22 games twice in the previous three seasons and made the NCAA Tournament as SWAC tourney champion three of the past four years.

Baylor: The Bears' dominance showed up best in the shooting percentages for both teams. Baylor matched a season high at 66 percent to 41 percent for Texas Southern. The Bears were 10 of 18 from long range (57 percent). Since losing to the Shockers, Baylor has beaten three overmatched opponents by an average of 27 points.

OUTSIDE TO INSIDE

Omot did most of his damage inside after setting career highs for 3-pointers and attempts (6 of 8) against Randall, going 10 of 12 from the field and 2 of 3 from beyond the arc. He didn't shoot a free throw after two more career bests (12 of 17) in the Fort Hood game.

CLOSE CALLS

The Bears set the school record for shooting percentage for the second time this season — by two-hundredths of a percentage point (66.12 percent to 66.10 percent in a 107-66 win over Central Arkansas in the opener). They came up short on the other close call, missing by a point what would have been consecutive 100-point games for the first time since 1989. Baylor beat Randall 105-82.

Cowboys' Prescott concedes that things changed minus Elliott

FRISCO, Texas (AP) — Now that Ezekiel Elliott is near the end of a six-game suspension over domestic violence allegations, Dak Prescott doesn't mind acknowledging that things changed for the Dallas Cowboys.

Prescott was more defiant while



the Cowboys were losing their first three games without last year's NFL rushing leader and the quarterback's backfield mate during their remarkable rookie seasons that fueled a 13-3 record.

Dallas (7-6) won the past two without Elliott and has to keep winning to stay in the wild-card race. The last game before Elliott's return is Sunday night at Oakland (6-7).

"It's a different team," said Prescott who had eight turnovers without a touchdown pass in the first three games without his fellow star.

"I think that's the first (thing) you got to recognize is it's not the same and things are going to be different and play-calling is going to be different. But for what I've learned I guess is everybody is embracing their role, their new role, different role or maybe it's the same role.'

A loss would put a damper on Elther way.

"I know he's excited, and I've kept up with him on text," tight end Jason

Witten said. "One thing I know about Zeke through his first year and half I've been around him is he loves football. He'll have to bear down here and help us make this push."

The Cowboys scored just 22 points in the first three games without him and were outscored 72-6 in the second half, when they grew used to wearing down opponents with Elliott's physical running style.

After those five interceptions and three lost fumbles, Prescott became more comfortable even through some sluggish starts for the offense. He threw for a career-best 332 yards and three touchdowns in last week's 30-10 win over the New York Giants.

"He's done a good job of getting through a dry spell," Cowboys offensive coordinator Scott Linehan said. "He really worked on his game, from fundamentals to everything else and it just shows he's going to be here for the long haul."

> Alfred Morris and Rod Smith have split snaps at running back in Elliott's absence. Morris has started four of the five games, but Smith has an edge in playing time with 158 snaps to Morris' 136.

> "Zeke Elliot is a very good player, and when he is available to us, he makes a positive difference to our team," coach Jason Garrett said. "In a lot of ways those opportunities for those other guys get minimized, but that doesn't diminish our confidence in them."

Smith has rushed for a touchdown in three

straight games and took a short pass 81 yards for a touchdown against the Giants. Morris has gotten the bulk of the carries and ran for a season-best 127 yards against Washington.

Morris, who turned 28 earlier this week, is a free agent after this season. The player said he isn't thinking about it right now, but Elliott's absence may have been the showcase he could parlay into a better opportunity in the offseason.

"He's just got that style in the run game where he can carry the load," Linehan said. "He can be a 20plus carry guy, and that's where he's going to have his best production."

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

This excellent problem, published in the British Bridge Magazine many years ago, was composed by Paul Lukacs, Israeli expert.

West should begin by ruffing the queen-of-diamonds lead in dummy (it would be wrong to discard a spade or a heart). He then draws both missing trumps, ending in dummy, and leads the deuce of spades.

If South follows suit with the five or six or shows out of spades, West plays his seven and is sure to score the rest of the tricks regardless of which suit North returns after winning the seven of spades.

If South produces the eight, nine or ten of spades on the deuce lead from dummy, West wins with the king, returns to dummy with a trump and leads the three of spades toward his hand, planning to play the jack if South follows low.

By adopting this line of play, declarer makes the contract in each of the following six cases:





Today is Friday, Dec. 15, the 349th day of 2017. There are 16 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in

History: On Dec. 15, 1939, the Civil

War motion picture epic "Gone with the Wind," star-Vivien Leigh and ring Clark Gable, had its world premiere in Atlanta. On this date:

In 1791, the Bill of Rights, the first ten amendments to the U.S. Constitution. went into effect following ratification by Virginia. In 1864, the two-day Battle of Nashville began during the Civil War as Union forces commanded by Maj. Gen. George H. Thomas attacked Confederate troops led by Gen. John Bell Hood; the result was a resounding Northern victory. In 1890, Sioux Indian Chief Sitting Bull and 11 other tribe members were killed in Grand River, South Dakota, during a confrontation with Indian police. In 1938, groundbreaking for the Jefferson Memorial took place in Washington, with D.C. President Franklin D. Roosevelt taking part in the ceremony. In 1944, a single-engine plane carrying bandleader Glenn Miller, a major in the U.S. Army Air Forces, disappeared over the English Channel while en route to Paris. In 1965, two U.S. manned spacecraft, Gemini 6A and Gemini 7, maneuvered toward each other while in orbit, at one point coming as close as one foot. In 1967, the Silver Bridge between Gallipolis (gal-ihpuh-LEES'), Ohio, and Point Pleasant, West Point Pleasant, Virginia, collapsed into the Ohio River, killing 46 people. In 1971, the Secret Service appointed its first five female special agents. In 1978, President Jimmy Carter announced he would grant diplomatic recognition to Communist China on New Year's Day and sever official relations with Taiwan. In 1989, a popular uprising began in Romania that resulted in the downfall of dictator Nicolae Ceausescu (chow-SHES'-koo). In 1995, European Union leaders meeting in Madrid, Spain, chose "euro" as the name of the new single

European currency. In 2001, the Leaning Tower of Pisa, Italy, was reopened to the public after a \$27 million realignment that had dragged on for over a decade.

Ten years ago: Pakistani President Pervez (pur-VEHZ' Musharraf moo-SHAH'-ruhv) lifted a six-week-old state of emergency. International climate talks in Bali, Indonesia, culminated in a last-minute U.S. compromise and an agreement to adopt a blueprint for fighting global warming by 2009. Celine Dion concluded a five-year engagement at Caesars Palace in Las Vegas. Five years ago: A day after the massacre at Sandy Hook Elementary School in Connecticut, Newtown, investigators worked to understand what led the 20-year-old gunman to slaughter 26 children and adults after also killing his mother and before taking his own life. In his Saturday radio address, President Barack Obama declared "every parent in that America has a heart heavy with hurt" and said it was time to "take meaningful action to prevent more tragedies like this.' One year ago: A federal jury in Charleston, South Carolina, convicted Dylann Roof of slaughtering nine black church members who had welcomed him to their Bible study. In an unexpected reversal, President Barack Obama declined to sign a renewal of sanctions against Iran but let it become law anyway, in an apparent bid to alleviate Tehran's concerns that Washington was backsliding on the nuclear deal. Colorado's Mike MacIntyre was selected The Associated Press college football Coach of the Year after leading the Buffaloes to a 10-3 record and their first bowl game since 2007. Italy OKs living wills amid long-running euthanasia debate

ROME (AP) — Italy's Senate gave final approval Thursday to a law allowing Italians to write living wills and refuse artificial nutrition and hydration, the latest step in the Roman Catholic nation's long-running and agonizing debate over euthanasia and end-of-life issues.

As soon as the 180-71 vote was tabulated, cheers erupted outside parliament among a small group of right-to-die activists who saw the bill as a victory after several highprofile euthanasia cases prompted criminal prosecu-

_____tions.

"Of course, we are still missing the legalization of euthanasia that we'll propose to the next parliament," said spokesman Marco Cappato of the right-to-die movement.

Cappato is currently on trial in Milan for having helped bring Fabbio Antoniani, a well-known Italian disc jockey known professionally as DJ Fabo, to Switzerland earlier this year to die in an assisted suicide clinic. Antoniani was left paralyzed, blind and unable to breathe on his own after a 2014 car accident.

A day before the Senate passed the bill, the Milan courtroom heard Antoniani's pre-recorded anguished testimony of how he couldn't bear to live another day, comments that reportedly brought even the prosecutor to tears.

The law's passage Thursday comes as the Vatican itself has taken up end-of-life issues anew. A series of conferences have emphasized the need for palliative care and reinforced Catholic doctrine, which requires only "ordinary" care be provided to the dying, not "extraordinary" care that extends life at all costs.

In a November speech taken by Italians as an endorsement of the pending legislation, Pope Francis repeated the church's opposition to euthanasia but also rejected the "therapeutic obstinacy" sometimes practiced by doctors even when the benefits of heroic therapies for patients are debatable, negligible or non-existent.

While church teaching considers artificial nutrition and hydration to fall under the "ordinary care" that must be provided to the dying, the parliamentary debate over the living will and its provision that Italians could refuse food and water generated relatively little Catholic opposition.

The absence of unified Catholic criticism was notable, given the Vatican had previously been vocal in criticizing cases of assisted suicide

— most significantly when the Italian church refused to give a Catholic funeral to Piergiorgio Welby, a poet whose 2006 assisted suicide helped galvanize the right-dodie movement in Italy.

There was, however, opposition. Lawmakers from the center-right Forza Italia party voted against the bill, with Sen. Maurizio Gasparri saying it essentially introduced euthanasia into Italy.

Proponents said the bill merely entitled Italians to determine their own end-of-life care.
