You've heard of Christmas in July, but how about a little Independence Day in December?

Members of the Downtown Revitalization Association, the group who puts on the annual Funtastic Fourth Celebration in downtown Big Spring,

has announced the headlining musical acts for the 2018 festival.

"We're going to have Rock Night, featuring Skid Row, on June 29; and we're going to have Country Night on June 30, and it's featuring Eric Paslay," said DRA spokesman Allan Johnson. "Those are our headliners. That's really all we've got so far. We've got some other things in the works."

Johnson briefly ex-

plained the decisionmaking process the DRA uses to choose the bands each year.

"We've got an agency we work with. We have a group of people and

we get together and everybody discusses what we want that's in our price range," he said. "We're looking for big names. Eric Paslay is really big time in the country music business. He's a national headliner right now, so that's a major coup for us. We're trying to bring people into Big Spring. It's for tourism reasons. We're going to use local artists too, to open up for them."

Skid Row is a heavy metal band formed in 1986, originally hailing from New Jersey. Among the band's best-known songs are "18 and Life," "Youth Gone Wild," and "I Remember You." Skid Row received an American Music Award for "Favorite Heavy Metal/Hard Rock New Artist" in 1990; and was nominated but

Singer files sex assault complaint against former Trump aide

WASHINGTON (AP) — A singer and potential congressional candidate says she has filed a sexual assault complaint against President Donald Trump's former campaign manager for hitting her twice on her buttocks during a Washington gathering in No-

Joy Villa, a Trump backer who wore a "Make America Great Again" dress at the Grammys this year, said Tuesday she plans to meet with detectives in Washington next week about the complaint against Corey Le-In a phone interview from Tampa, Florida,

Villa said she was initially reluctant to come forward because she was worried about any backlash. But she said she called Washington's Metropolitan Police Department on Christmas Eve after a friend who witnessed the incident spoke about it publicly, and other

friends urged her to come forward.

"I didn't know him at all," Villa said about Lewandowski. "I only knew him by reputation. He broke my trust."

She said she saw him at a gathering at the Trump International Hotel on the day after Thanksgiving, and said Lewandowski struck her "extremely hard" even after she told him to stop. She said she felt it was "disgusting and shocking and demeaning."

Villa, who is considering a run for a Florida congressional seat, said she initially thought

O'Rourke was recently endorsed by the League of Conservation Voters, an environmental group which maintains an "Environmental Scorecard" to rate members of Congress on environmental and clean-energy issues.

An El Paso native, O'Rourke worked in the Internet Service Provider industry in New York and El Paso before beginning his political career as a member of the El Paso City Council, where he served from 2005 to 2011. He was elected to Congress in 2012, defeating fellow Democrat Silvestre Reyes, the incumbent, in the primary before defeating Republican challenger Barbara Carrasco in the general election.

In the House of Representatives, O'Rourke has served on the Committee on Armed Services, including the Subcommittee on Emerging Threats and Capabilities, and the Subcommittee on Strategic Forces; and the Committee on Veterans' Affairs, including the Subcommittee on Disability Assistance and Memorial Affairs, and the Subcommittee on Oversight and Investigations. There are five Democrats, six Re-

publicans, and one Independent running for the Senate seat in 2018. Democrats vying for the position include O'Rourke, Pavel Goberman, Sema

Hernandez, Edward Kimbrough, and Dustin Webb. Republicans include incumbent Ted Cruz, Stefano De Stefano, Bruce Jacobson Jr., Dan Mc-Queen, Mary Miller, and Geraldine Sam. Independent Bob McNeil will represent the American Citizen Party in the election.

it was sexual harassment, but police told her that touching someone on any body part that is sexual in nature constituted sexual assault. She said she was told it was classified as a misdemeanor.

"I was initially fearful to come forward with this," she said, adding that she did not want to bring shame or embarrassment on Lewandowski's fam ily or hers.

"I did nothing wrong," Villa said. "I realized if he's not going to respond or apologize to me, I think it's the right thing to do."

Lewandowski did not respond to an email seeking comment.

Villa made news earlier this year when she wore a dress displaying Trump's campaign slogan at the Grammys. She explained her decision to wear the dress in an Instagram post, writing, "You can either stand for what you believe in or fall for what you don't." She added, "agree to disagree."

This is not the first time Lewandowski has faced police charges. In March 2016 he was charged with misdemeanor battery for an altercation involving a female reporter after a news conference in Florida. The charges were later dropped.

FEMA's disaster trailer tab: up to \$150K, 18 months of use

Associated Press FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — The federal government typically spends up to \$150,000 apiece — not counting utilities, maintenance or labor — on the trailers it leases to disaster victims, then auctions them at cut-rate prices after 18 months of use or the first sign of minor damage, The Associated Press has learned.

quiring disposal of used trailers, but an official confirmed to AP that it's a longstanding internal policy and that seldom are the housing units given to another family in need after the initial 18-month "Because of the challenges associated with dam-

aged units, and the costs of life-cycle maintenance, and because we are required to maintain a ready reserve for disasters, FEMA, by practice, doesn't return used units to our reserve inventory," said Jenny Burke, a spokeswoman for the U.S. Department of Homeland Security, which oversees FEMA.

Burke was unable to explain why FEMA leases new units for only 18 months before consigning them to the General Services Administration's on-

The agency's experience after Hurricane Katrina in 2005 could provide one explanation for a strict policy governing what kind of housing can go to storm victims. Some 144,000 FEMA trailers became symbols of the troubled federal response after some victims who lived in them for years won millions of dollars from lawsuits claiming the units leached high levels of cancer-causing formaldehyde.

FEMA spokesman Bob Howard stressed the units being used now are much higher quality than those and don't have formaldehyde problems, meeting

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Man arrested in Phoenix killings of estranged wife, 2 kids

PHOENIX (AP) — A man is accused of shooting and killing his estranged wife and their two children at a Phoenix apartment complex before getting into a Christmas Day shootout with officers, authorities said Tuesday.

Police responded Monday afternoon to a report of gunfire and found a woman dead in the parking lot. Officers later found the bodies of a 10-month-old girl and an 11-year-old boy inside the apartment.

Police tried to talk to Anthony Ross, 45, who barricaded himself inside the unit where he used to live, Sgt. Jonathan Howard said. Several hours later, he indicated he had killed the two children and began shooting at officers, authorities said. After a brief gun battle, he was taken into custody.

Ross, who was visiting Phoenix for the holidays, was not hurt, Howard said. One officer was injured by shrapnel and taken to the hospital in stable con-Authorities have not released a motive or the

names of the woman and children. Police were investigating the shooting that they described as a domestic violence incident.

It was not clear if Ross had a lawyer who could speak on his behalf.

Tactical units on Monday escorted residents from the area, and some clustered outside a convenience store for hours until the standoff ended. Others returning home weren't allowed in.

"It's kind of crazy, just because it's supposed to be a holiday for your family and getting together," Sierra Scott, whose mother lives at the apartment complex, told Phoenix news station KSAZ-TV.

T.I. helps mothers with last-minute Christmas shopping

ATLANTA (AP) — Rapper T.I. spent Christmas Eve spreading holiday cheer among some single mothers, helping them with their last-minute shopping for gifts.

In a video T.I. posted on social media, the Grammy-winning artist entered an Atlanta-area Target on Sunday and called for all single mothers present to follow him. He strolled through the store alongside several mothers, went to the cash register with them and then paid for their Christmas presents.

T.I. says he spent \$20,000 within a 30-minute stretch. He had to leave after that because of a

This isn't the first time T.I. has surprised shoppers by paying for their gifts. He appeared at metro Atlanta stores around Christmas in past years to help mothers in need, including making two different stops at Walmart stores in 2016.

Minnesota couple delivers Christmas Day baby on side of road

CHISAGO CITY, Minn. (AP) — A Minnesota couple delivered their baby on the side of a road while rushing to the hospital on Christmas Day, just two minutes after the mother's water broke.

Taylor and Hannah Lindeman told the Star Tribune that they were forced to pull over along Highway 8 at the edge of Chisago City and Wyoming to wait for an ambulance.

Taylor Lindeman says they were on the way to a St. Paul hospital in minus-2 degree (minus-19 Celsius) weather, but the baby "had other plans." Hannah Lindeman gave birth to a daughter, Poppy, in the car's front passenger seat.

Woman stunned to find electric bill listed as \$284 billion

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Media face challenges in rush to sexual misconduct reckoning

NEW YORK (AP) — Talk-show host Tavis Smiley isn't just upset with PBS for firing him on sexual misconduct charges. He's upset about his depiction in the Smiley believes that if he

hadn't talked publicly about romantic relationships with subordinates at his company, the behavior that led to his downfall, the public would make little distinction between him and those who have been accused of sexual assault or rape. Conflation of different forms of

"Both of those behaviors need to be confronted and eradicated without question, but they shouldn't be conflated, right?" he Actress Minnie Driver called

Damon tone-deaf. Actress Alyssa Milano, who began a cultural movement by urging other women who have been harassed to proclaim #MeToo on social media, tweeted in reply that victims are hurt by all forms of misconduct. All are evidence of misogyny. Still, as the rush of stories

about misbehavior slows down — if it slows down — the point Damon raises will loom larger.

Feral hog poison field tests in Texas, Alabama in 2018

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Feral swine do more than \$1.5 billion a year in damage around the country, and scientists are taking what could be a big step toward controlling them.

They are field-testing poison baits made from a preservative that's used to cure bacon and sausage.

The tests will cover two major habitats where feral hogs are common during seasons when they're most likely to go for bait, said Kurt VerCauteren, feral swine project leader for the U.S. Department of Agriculture Wildlife Services. Tests will start early in 2018 in dry west Texas and continue in humid central Alabama around midsummer.

The bait Vercauteren is working on uses the meat preservative sodium nitrite. It can keep an animal's red blood cells from pulling in oxygen. Pigs make very low levels of an enzyme that counteracts it, so it's more deadly to them than to humans or most domestic animals. Swine that gobble up enough sodium nitrite show symptoms similar to carbon dioxide poisoning: They become uncoordinated, lose consciousness and die within 90 minutes after eating it.

The prospect of a new way to fight the beasts

is good news to Samuel "Sammy" Williams, who farms about 2,000 acres (3,220 hectares) of cotton, corn and peanuts in Alabama near Georgia and Florida.

Williams said he's killed nearly 200 feral hogs a year for the past four years, but those that survived still damaged his crops. Swine love corn and peanuts and will root up cotton fields for weed tubers, he said. They also make "wallow holes" 4 to 6 feet (1.2 to 1.8 meters) across — though communal wallows can be much bigger.

"I saw one 20 to 25 feet (6 to 8 meters) across, and the hogs had knocked down a couple acres of corn right around that hole," he said.

Hogs did so much damage to a neighbor's 30-acre (12-hectare) hav field that the neighbor offered it free for Williams' use. He took the offer and installed an electric fence — but fencing all his fields isn't practical.

Hogs also can spread dozens of diseases. Their rooting and wallowing can destroy pretty much any terrain, fouling waterways and exposing banks to erosion. Invasive plants often take over uncultivated areas rooted up by hogs, VerCauteren noted.

And hogs will eat just about anything. They compete with deer and turkey for acorns and also eat fawns and eggs, not to mention quail and sea turtle

Forty-one states joined USDA's feral swine control program in 2014, after Congress appropriated \$20 million a year. New York and Idaho since left it after going two years without any confirmed sightings of feral hogs, program manager Dale Nolte said. He said five other states — Washington, Maryland, Minnesota, New Jersey and Wisconsin — are believed free of feral swine, and are in a twoyear evaluation period to be sure.

The program included \$1.5 million a year for toxic-bait research. The federal government has previously approved

a feral hog bait that uses the blood-thinner warfarin, but no states have approved it so far, VerCau-VerCauteren, who works out of Fort Collins.

Colorado, worked on the sodium nitrite bait with scientists at Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, Auburn University and in Australia and New Zea-If the field trials work well, the new bait might get

federal approval in 2020, opening the way for states to approve it. But at least for the first several years, landowners will have to get the USDA to set up the bait and feeders.

"It's not going to be on the shelves of Home Depot," VerCauteren said.

It won't replace trapping, helicopter hunts and other methods, but should be a powerful addition to the anti-hog arsenal, VerCauteren said.

Much of the work so far has involved finding a way to get pigs to eat sodium nitrite, which tastes nasty and breaks down quickly in the presence of air or water. Researchers had to microencapsulate the powder to hide the taste, and find a coating that would both stand up to chewing and keep the chemical stable from the time the bait is made until it hits a pig's gut. They worked up a hog-tasty formula for bait in which to mix it.

Researchers also had to make sure other animals couldn't get into the bait feeders, and that hogs killed by sodium nitrite were safe for scavengers.

They're working on making bear-proof boxes, using cameras and sound recognition so only pigs can get in, but that's probably a couple of years away, Vercauteren said.

"Right now we just won't use the bait where there are bears," he said.

MOSCOW (AP) — The Kremlin hinted Tuesday at possible legal repercussions for Russian opposition leader Alexei Navalny over his calls for a boycott of the March presidential election. President Vladimir Putin's spokesman, Dmitry

Peskov, wouldn't comment on the Election Commission's decision to bar Navalny from running but said the "calls for boycott ought to be carefully studied to see if they are breaking the law."

As expected, Russia's top election body on Monday formally barred Navalny from a presidential run. Navalny, an anti-corruption campaigner and Putin's most prominent rival, promptly put out a video statement saying that the ban shows "Putin is terribly scared and is afraid of running against me." He called on supporters to stay away from the vote in protest. Meanwhile, Putin's backers convened Tuesday

afternoon to formally nominate him for presidency after he announced that he will run as an independent candidate. Prominent lawmakers, film actors, musicians

Soviet-era exhibition hall to endorse him. Putin did not attend because of other engagements, Peskov said.

Putin, who has been in power for 18 years and is expected to easily win another six-year term, has so far refrained from campaigning. Navalny, meanwhile, has been aggressively seeking votes all year, reaching out to the most remote parts of the country. Peskov rejected suggestions

that Navalny's absence from the ballot could dent the legitimacy of Putin's possible re-election. Russian law doesn't specifically prohibit someone from

calling for an election boy-

cott, but authorities last year blocked access to several websites that did so. Navalny rose to prominence in 2009 with investigations into official corruption and became a protest leader when hundreds of thousands took to the

fraud. A few years later, and after several short-term spells in jail, Navalny faced two separate sets of fraud charges, which were viewed as political retribution aimed at stopping him from running for office. In his only official campaign before his first conviction took effect, Navalny garnered 30 percent

Macron gets tough as France struggles to deal with migrants

PARIS (AP) — It's getting colder,

the clock is ticking and regional authorities are scrambling to meet President Emmanuel Macron's deadline: get migrants off France's streets and out of forest hideouts by year's end.

That won't likely



happen, and Macron's government is now tightening the screws: ramping up expulsions, raising pressure on economic migrants and allowing divisive ID checks in emergency shel-Critics contend that Macron's in-

creasingly tough policy on migrants though wrapped in a cloak of goodwill — contradicts his image as a humanist who defeated an anti-immigrant populist for the presidency, and has crossed a line passed by no other president in the land that prides itself as the cradle of human rights. From snowy Alpine passes to the

borders with Spain or Germany, migrants keep making their way to France. In Paris alone, police have evacuated around 30,000 people camping on sidewalks in the last two years.

No one doubts that

France's system of dealing with migrants needs fixing, with a perennial housing shortage and long wait times in applying for asylum.

"Living in the street. Living in a tent. Some-

times you get food.

Sometimes you not get

food," said Samsoor Rasooli, a 25-yearold Afghan standing in line since 6 a.m. to apply for asylum at a Paris facility, where some spend the night on the sidewalk, strewn with filth, to keep their place. The door closed at mid-day, the 100 places allotted that day for applicants filled.

"It's winter. I can't sleep in the street," Rasooli said.

Asylum opens the way for temporary housing, but only one-third of the 95,000 applicants this year were accepted, government officials say. The huge makeshift camp in the

English Channel port city of Calais, dismantled last year, was emblematic of the problems. Its residents were dispersed around France, but others keep coming in hopes of reaching Britain, and are finding a rude welcome. France's highest administrative body said the migrants have been subjected to inhuman and degrading conditions, and an investigation ordered by the interior minister found that it was "plausible" that police used excessive force against migrants, as Human Rights Watch maintained.

A bill overhauling asylum and immigration policy will be debated in the spring, notably expediting asylum demands but also doubling to 90 days the time a person without papers can be held in a holding center,

the last step before expulsion — an approach the government says is "balanced" and "efficient."

Macron said in a speech in July in Orleans before a group of new citizens that he wanted people "off the streets, out of the woods" by the end of 2017. "I want emergency lodgings everywhere."

While his words conveyed humanity, the underlying message bites. Macron has made clear he wouldn't

accept economic migrants in France, wants those who don't qualify for asylum expelled and doesn't want them even trying to come to France. The French president has been roll-

ing out a multi-pronged approach that stretches

to Africa, with points set up in Chad and Niger to pre-select those certain of gaining asylum — and weed out potential economic migrants. At home, Interior

Minister Gerard Collomb has ordered prefects, regional representatives of the state, to crack down on illegal immigration, "act quickly" to expel those who fail to gain asylum

and report results within weeks, according to a November order cited by

the newspaper Le Monde. A newer set of orders in December rang alarm bells. Collomb told regional authorities to set up "mobile teams" to run checks in emergency housing to ascertain the status of migrants. Emergency shelters are considered bedrocks of the French tradition of open arms to those in need and have long been considered untouchable, even by security authorities.

The accent on security in dealing with immigration has appalled even some who support the centrist Macron.

Leonard, Aldridge lead healthy Spurs past Nets, 109-97

SAN ANTONIO — The Spurs' first game with every player healthy and available went as the team expected.

There was some hesitation and a rash of early turnovers, but they grew comfortable as the game progressed.

Kawhi Leonard scored 21 points, LaMarcus Aldridge added 20 and San Antonio beat Brooklyn 109-97 on Tuesday night, its 15th straight win at home over the Nets.

"(The rash of injuries is) very unusual for us, but we still have a month and a half until the rodeo (road trip) starts," Spurs veteran Manu Ginobili said. "This is a good time to get everybody playing, everybody feeling good. Get Kawhi and Tony (Parker) back to their usual selves, back to their rhythm, feeling good and I think we are accomplishing that. Slowly, because they haven't been back for so long, but they are really showing progress."

San Antonio is third in the Western Conference at 24-11 despite being without Leonard and/or Parker for 30 games this season.

Aldridge has led the team during the duo's absence and his resurgent season has not slowed with their return. The 6-foot-11 forward was 7 for 15 from the field and had nine rebounds against Brooklyn.

"You know, obviously, watching (Aldridge and Pau Gasol) play and see them do the things they do for our team is great, and it inspires everyone on the bench, me, even guys play-

ing," Leonard said. "But just with me, just taking it slow and trying not to skip any steps, like I said before, so I can be healthy down the road."

Playing in just his fifth game, Leonard was 8 for 17 from the field in scoring a season high. He made his first appearance in the fourth quarter, scoring four points in three minutes. "When Kawhi checked into the game

in the fourth quarter, that wasn't a welcome sign," Nets coach Kenny Atkinson said. "It just changes the game. He makes such a difference. Defensively, it's just unbelievable. I felt like he was guarding our whole team at times." Playing with a full roster for the

first time led to some indecision, as the Spurs scored just 19 points in the opening quarter while trying to involve all their scoring options. "We went to being too careful," said

reserve guard Patty Mills, who scored 11 points. "That caused us to turn the ball over." San Antonio had nine of their 12

turnovers in the first half, but offset that by holding Brooklyn to 36 percent shooting.

Gasol added 15 points, Parker had 14 and Ginobili had 11.

The Nets kept pace early despite injuries to their top two point guards, D'Angelo Russell and Jeremy Lin.

Caris LeVert led Brooklyn with 18 points and Allen Crabbe added 15.

"I like the process. The results weren't great offensively but we did some good things," Atkinson said.

DALLAS — J.J. Barea has fresh memories of San Antonio scoring the final 13 points in a recent Dallas loss, and Atlanta getting the last five with the score tied in the Mavericks' most recent game.

The diminutive guard was happy to have a key role in a different ending for the last-place team in the Western Conference.

Barea scored 20 points, including a clinching layup in the final seconds, and the Mavericks ended another six-game winning streak by the Toronto Raptors with a 98-93 victory on Tuesday night.

The Mavericks held De-Mar DeRozan and the Raptors to season lows in shooting percentage as Toronto lost for just the second time in 14 games, with each loss coming after six straight

"I was thinking about our problems closing out, last three minutes, I was like, (hoping) it doesn't happen again," said Barea, who tied the team high with four assists. "Something we've got recent six-game winning to learn. We've got to do a better job of getting some important buckets at the end."

Dirk Nowitzki scored 18 points and fellow German Maxi Kleber had 15 points and matched his rookie season bests with five blocks and eight rebounds. Harrison Barnes had 16 points and 10 boards.

Kyle Lowry led Toronto with 23 points but didn't score in the fourth quarter, while DeRozan couldn't get going at all after averaging 37 points on a three-game road winning streak that ended.

Hounded by Dallas defensive specialist Wesley Matthews most of the game, DeRozan scored eight points while shooting 19 percent (3 of 16). His previous low was 20 percent (1 of 5) in his only other singledigit game this season two points in a 112-78 win

DeRozan, who averaged

32 points during the most

streak. "Missed a lot of floaters, easy things. One of them nights."

Jonas Valanciunas had 17 points and 11 rebounds for Toronto, and Ibaka added 12 points and 12 boards.



DALLAS — Cowboys owner Jerry Jones says coach Jason Garrett will return for an eighth full season after Dallas missed the playoffs in a year marred by the six-game suspension of star running back Ezekiel Elliott.

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

Point count is without question a valuable crutch to lean on when trying to reach the best contract. But other key factors can prove even more useful to experienced players.

Consider this case where South got to six diamonds on the sequence shown. True, each player had only 13 high-card points opposite his partner's 13, and it usually takes more high-card strength than that to make

But North went out of his way to pinpoint both his high-card strength and his 5-4-3-1 distribution, and his graphic description of both did not fall on deaf ears.

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Although South could not see his partner's hand, he recognized that North had five spades and four hearts because he had bid spades first. South also inferred from partner's thirdround leap to five diamonds that he had at least three diamonds therefore could not possibly have more than one club.

And so, while it might seem that South should have been more deeply concerned about his three club losers before undertaking a slam with his minimum-looking hand, the fact is that he was resting on very solid ground when he decided to bid six. As pays off so often in bridge, South gave much more credence to what he heard than what he saw.

It is quite likely that many pairs, including some long-standing partnerships, would fail to reach this excellent slam. The chief reason might be North's failure to describe his 5-4-3-1 pattern, which is the crux of the matter, or possibly South's failure to recognize the message his partner was imparting. In any case, the deal highlights the enormous value of close partnership rapport.

Today is Wednesday, Dec. 27, the 361st day of 2017. There are four days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

1927, the On Dec. 27, musical play "Show Boat." with music by Jerome Kern and libretto by Oscar Hammerstein II, opened at the Ziegfeld Theater in New York, beginning a run of 572 performances.

On this date:

In 1831, naturalist Charles Darwin set out on a roundthe-world voyage aboard the HMS Beagle.

In 1892, the cornerstone was laid for the Cathedral of Saint John the Divine in New York City.

In 1904, James Barrie's play "Peter Pan: The Boy Who Wouldn't Grow Up" opened at the Duke of

York's Theater in London. In 1932, New York City's Radio City Music Hall first opened.

In 1945, the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund were formally established.

In 1947, the original version of the puppet character Howdy Doody made his TV debut on NBC's "Puppet Playhouse." In 1949, Queen Juliana of

the Netherlands signed an act recognizing Indonesia's sovereignty after more than three centuries of Dutch rule.

In 1968, Apollo 8 and its three astronauts made a safe, nighttime splashdown in the Pacific.

In 1970, the musical play "Hello, Dolly!" closed on Broadway after a run of 2,844 performances. In 1979, Soviet forces

seized control Afghanistan. President Hafizullah Amin (hah-FEE'-zoo-lah ah-MEEN'), who was overthrown and executed, was replaced by Babrak Karmal. In 1985, Palestinian guer-

rillas opened fire inside the Rome and Vienna airports; 19 victims were killed, plus four attackers who were slain by police and security personnel. American naturalist Dian Fossey, 53, who had studied gorillas in the wild in Rwanda, was found hacked to death.

In 1995, Israeli jeeps sped out of the West Bank town of Ramallah, capping a seven-week pullout giving Yasser Arafat control over

90 percent of the West million Bank's one Palestinian residents and one-third of its land.

Ten years ago: Opposition leader Benazir Bhutto, 54, was assassinated in a gun and suicide-bomb attack in Pakistan following a campaign rally. Kenya held an election pitting incumbent president Mwai Kibaki kih-BAH'-kee) against opposition candidate Raila Odinga (RY'-luh oh-DING'-uh); both candidates ended up claiming victory in a vote that observers said was seriously flawed. (Kenya was racked by weeks of ethnic violence; Kibaki and Odinga ended up forming a coalition government.)

Five years ago: An Indianborn man, Sunando Sen, was shoved to his death from a New York City subway platform; suspect Erika Menendez later pleaded guilty to manslaughter and was sentenced to 24 years in prison. (Authorities say Menendez pushed Sen because she thought he was Muslim; Sen was Hindu.) Retired Army general Norman Schwarzkopf, 78, died in Tampa, Florida. Character actor Harry Carey Jr., 91, died in Santa Barbara, California.

One year ago: Japanese Prime Minister Shinzo Abe (shin-zoh AH'-bay), accompanied by President Barack Obama, visited Pearl Harbor in Hawaii, where he offered his "sincere and everlasting condolences to the souls of those who lost their lives" in Japan's 1941 attack; Abe did not apologize, but conceded his country "must never repeat the horrors of war again.' Actress Carrie Fisher died in a hospital four days after suffering a medical emergency aboard a flight to Los Angeles; she was 60. Cavaliers superstar LeBron James was voted AP Male Athlete of the Year after bringing the NBA title to Cleveland. Today's Birthdays: Actor
