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Main break shuts down several mall businesses

A water main leak in the neighborhood north of the Spring Town Plaza mall has been causing issues for mall businesses and area residents since Wednesday afternoon; but according to reports from Evita's Fine Mexican Cuisine, a restaurant in the mall. the water is once again flow-

The Herald first became aware of the outage when Jeremy Grimes, manager of the Cinemark Cinema 4 movie theater, located in the

mall, posted the following statement in the Big Spring Trading Post Facebook page Wednesday evening:

"Ladies and gentlemen, I apologize but due to the water getting cut off at the mall due to the water main repairs throughout city, Cinemark Cinema 4 has to shut down till further notice. We will open as soon as the repairs have been fixed and water is restored. We are unable to remain open without operating restrooms, hand washing sinks, and water to adequately clean.

"We apologize for the incon-

In an interview Thursday, Grimes reported that the water was still out. "They have not given us

any type of time frame," he said. "It could be later on this afternoon, it might me later tonight. There may be a chance that if it hits 5:30 and I still haven't heard anything. I might have to shut it down for the day again. We'll see how that goes. Right now I don't know."

The theater did indeed remain closed Thursday, and Grimes again posted to Big Spring Trading Post Thursday evening.

"Ladies and Gentlemen of Big Spring. I have been trying all day but alas, we are still having to remain closed for the entire day at Cinemark Cinema 4," he wrote. "We have not been given a good ETA from the City as to when this will be done but I do know that it will not be today.

"I sincerely apologize for the inconvenience."

Big Spring Public Works Director Johnny Wommack explained the situation. 'We've got a leak over be-

hind the mall," he said. "To

Recycling made easy by new Big **Spring based** company

Over the last ten years, our planet's human inhabitants have produced more plastic than during the whole of the last century, and enough plastic is thrown away each year to circle the earth four times. While that's just one shocking statistic of many and plastic waste is only part of a much larger problem, companies like Howard County Recycling are working to become part of the solution. HCR is a Big Spring based company that started as an idea exchanged between two local residents, Chris Mason and Jake Willoughby.

"I decided to do this because there is a need for it here and currently, there isn't anywhere to take recyclables," said part owner/operator of HCR Chris Mason. "I figured this would be great for our city in the long run and save people time while also helping the environment."


Beginning in February, when HCR is officially open for business, they'll offer what is referred to as "curbside recycling," which is just like a regular curbside garbage pickup service. HCR will provide residents with a large recycle bin that they can fill and place on their curb for easy pickup.

"We'll pick up 2 to 4 times a month as needed and collect recycled materials in bulk and then Jake and I will take it to San Angelo Friends of the Environment (S.A.F.E.) recycling center in San Angelo, Texas," said Mason. "We'll offer 10 gallon, 32 gallon, 55 gallon, and 95 gallon bins for rent to businesses and area residents.'

According to Mason, on a small scale, recycling can help reduce trash that is often left out in the open and helps reduce what goes into our landfill. During certain times of the year, trash overflow goes into alleyways. Recycling would offer a way to relieve stress on the city when it comes to trash pick-up. It's something that can be seen in excess around Christmas time for example, but trash overflow is an issue throughout the year. Consumers are using more product than ever before and the metric ton of trash output in the U.S. has grown exponen-

tially in the past 15 years or so. Mason went on to describe the benefits See HCR, Page 3

Trump disparages African countries, Haiti with vulgarity

WASHINGTON (AP) — In bluntly vulgar language, President Donald Trump questioned Thursday why the U.S. would accept more immigrants from Haiti and "shithole countries" in Africa rather than places like Norway, as he rejected a bipartisan immigration deal, according to people briefed on the extraordinary Oval Office conversation.

Trump's contemptuous description of an entire continent startled lawmakers in the meeting and immediately revived

not specifically deny using the

word "shithole."

Trump later went on to argue: "Never said anything derogatory about Haitians other than Haiti is, obviously, a very poor and troubled country."

Referring to a report in the Washington Post, that he said "take them out" in reference to Haitians, Trump said that never happened.

The White House did not immediately respond to questions about the president's tweets.

Trump's comments Thursday came as two senators presented details of a bipartisan compromise that would extend

protections against deportation for hundreds of thousands of young immigrants and also strengthen border protections, as Trump has in-

The lawmakers had hoped Trump would back their accord, an agreement among six senators evenly split among Republicans and Democrats, ending a monthslong, bitter dispute over protecting the "dreamers." But the White House later rejected it, plunging the issue back into uncertainty just eight days before a deadline that threatens a government shutdown.

Dick Durbin of Illinois, the

Senate's No. 2 Democrat, explained that as part of that deal, a lottery for visas that has benefited people from Africa and other nations would be ended, the sources said, though there could be another way for them to apply. Durbin said people who would be allowed to stay in the U.S. included those who had fled here after disasters hit their homes in places such as El Salvador, Guatemala and Haiti.

Trump specifically questioned why the U.S. would want to admit more people from Haiti. As for Africa, he asked why more people from "shithole countries" should be allowed into the U.S., the sources said.

The president suggested that instead, the U.S. should allow more entrants from countries like Norway. Trump met this week with Norwegian Prime Minister Erna Solberg.

Asked about the remarks, White House spokesman Raj Shah did not deny them.

"Certain Washington politicians choose to fight for foreign countries, but President Trump will always fight for the American people," he

Trump's remarks were remarkable even by the standards of a president who has been accused of racism by his foes and who has routinely smashed through public decorum that his modern predecessors have generally em-Trump has inaccurately

claimed that Barack Obama,

the nation's first black president, wasn't born in the United States. He has said Mexican immigrants were "bringing crime" and were "rapists." He said there were "very fine people on both sides" after violence at a white supremacist rally in

Charlottesville, Virginia, left

one counter-protester dead.

House Democratic Whip Steny Hover of Maryland "President Trump's comments are racist and a disgrace." But it wasn't just Democrats objecting. Republican Rep. Mia Love

of Utah, the daughter of Haitian immigrants, Trump's comments "unkind, divisive, elitist and fly in the face of our nation's values." She said, "This behavior is unacceptable from the leader of our nation" and called on Trump to apologize to the American people "and the nations he so wantonly maligned." Trump has called himself

the "least racist person that you've ever met." The sources spoke on con-

dition of anonymity because they weren't authorized to publicly describe the conversation. One said lawmakers in the room were taken aback by Trump's remarks. The Trump administration

announced late last year that it would end a temporary residency permit program that allowed nearly 60,000 citizens from Haiti to live and work in the United States following a devastating 2010 earthquake.

Trump has spoken positively about Haitians in public. During a 2016 campaign event in Miami, he said "the

Haitian people deserve better" and told the audience of Haitian-Americans he wanted to "be your greatest champion, and I will be your champion."

Lindsey Graham, R-S.C., described to Trump also includes his \$1.6 billion request for a first installment on his long-sought border wall, aides familiar with the agreement said. Cybersecurity firm: US Senate in Russian hackers' crosshairs

PARIS (AP) — The same Russian government-aligned hackers who penetrated the Democratic Party have spent the past few months laying the groundwork for an espionage campaign against the U.S. Senate, a cybersecurity firm said Friday.

The revelation suggests the group often nicknamed Fancy Bear, whose hacking campaign scrambled the 2016 U.S. electoral contest, is still busy trying to gather the emails of America's political elite.

"They're still very active — in making preparations at least — to influence public opinion again," said Feike Hacquebord, a security researcher at Trend Micro Inc., which published the report. "They are looking for information they might leak later."

The Senate Sergeant at Arms off which is responsible for the upper house's security, declined to com-Hacquebord said he based his re-

port on the discovery of a clutch of suspicious-looking websites dressed up to look like the U.S. Senate's internal email system. He then cross-referenced digital fin-

gerprints associated with those sites to ones used almost exclusively by Fancy Bear, which his Tokyo-based firm dubs "Pawn Storm." Trend Micro previously drew in-

ternational attention when it used an identical technique to uncover a set of decoy websites apparently set up to harvest emails from the French presidential candidate Emmanuel Macron's campaign in April 2017. The sites' discovery was followed two months later by a still-unexplained publication of private emails from several Macron staffers in the final days of the race.

Hacquebord said the rogue Senate

sites — which were set up in June and September of 2017 — matched their French counterparts.

"That is exactly the way they attacked the Macron campaign in France." he said.

Attribution is extremely tricky in the world of cybersecurity, where hackers routinely use misdirection and red herrings to fool their adversaries. But Tend Micro, which has followed Fancy Bear for years, said there could be no doubt.

"We are 100 percent sure that it can attributed to the Pawn Storm group," said Rik Ferguson, one of the Hacquebord's colleagues. Like many cybersecurity compa-

nies, Trend Micro refuses to speculate publicly on who is behind such groups, referring to Pawn Storm only as having "Russia-related interests." But the U.S. intelligence community alleges that Russia's military intelligence service pulls the hackers' strings and a monthslong Associated Press investigation into the group, drawing on a vast database of targets supplied by the cybersecurity firm Secureworks, has determined that the group is closely attuned to the Kremlin's objectives.

If Fancy Bear has targeted the Senate over the past few months, it wouldn't be the first time. An AP analysis of Secureworks' list shows that several staffers there were targeted between 2015 and 2016.

Among them: Robert Zarate, now the foreign policy adviser to Florida Senator Marco Rubio; Josh Holmes, a former chief of staff to Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell who now runs a Washington consultancy; and Jason Thielman, the chief of staff to Montana Senator Steve Daines. A Congressional researcher specializing in national security issues was also targeted.

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
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

Reflections: Something about that name

hen my daughter was little, I rocked her to night the same There Jesus, Is Something About That Name. One line in song says, "Kings and kingdoms shall all pass away, but there is something about that My daughter is now grown and the mother of three. Some-

times she sings that same song to my grandchildren. My wife and I just returned from

Israel, a trip we chose to launch our 50th year of marriage. We spent several days in Jerusalem, walking through the Garden of Gethsemane, looking on the Holy City from the Mount of Olives, visiting the Pool of Siloam and the Western Wall. We sat on the Southern steps to the temple and walked the Via Dolorosa.

Everywhere we went we were shoulder to shoulder with tourists from all over the world, tourists who had come to walk where Jesus walked. We met a young man from New Zealand, another from Colombia, entire groups from Indonesia, China and Korea. They came from Africa, South America and Europe. They were Catholic, Orthodox, Protestant, Nondenominational. They came from everywhere. Tour buses lined up on the streets of the city, in spite of the political tensions reported in the news. They came because "there is something about that Name."

We visited the Trans-Jordan site, just above the Dead Sea, the most likely place where Jesus was baptized by John. A barbed wire fence runs down the middle of the Jordan River separating Israel from Jordan. Armed guards are visible. On the other side of the river, beyond the barbed-wire in 1243. It was taken over by the Otto fence, a group of Orthodox believers were baptizing, joyfully and with passion. Separated by politics and boundaries, we could not speak to them or touch them, but, like us, they were drawn to that site because Jesus was there.

In Jerusalem most of the actual places where Jesus walked are buried, beneath many layers. The temple of His day, built by Herod, was destroyed in 70 AD. Only the supporting walls remained, including the western wall where hundreds gather to pray every

In the 2nd century the Roman Emperor Hadrian rebuilt Jerusalem as a pagan city with a temple to Jupiter. After 325, Emperor Constantine rebuilt the city as a Christian center. Islamic rulers conquered the city in 638, the Crusaders in 1099. It was conquered by Saladin in 1187. Its walls were destroyed in 1219 then repaired

man Empire in 1517. Jerusalem has been conquered, destroyed and re built numerous times.

When Neil Armstrong visited Israe following his landing on the Moon, he walked up the steps to the Temple en trance. He asked his guide, archeolo gist Meir Ben Dov, if these were the same steps Jesus walked on. Ben Dov confirmed that they were. "I have to tell you," Armstrong said, "I am more excited stepping on these stones than I was stepping on the moon."

The very stones of the city, with the numerous archeological digs, bear witness to history. Kings and king doms have come and gone. But the name of Jesus remains. 2000 years after Jesus first walked the streets of Jerusalem, His name continues to transform people of every language culture and nation who trust in Him.

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Do you really want to know?

hat was, or is, your favorite subject in school? Math was always mine and the sciences were close behind. Whatever it was, your marks for that subject were likely better than the grades

you received in classes that you did not care for.

There are

many factors to learning. One of the more important factors, if not the most important, is a willingness and desire to learn. I enjoyed be-

I enjoyed being able to work out mathematical equations. I didn't care so much about English literature or Early Ameri-

can Poetry or writing papers. It is slightly ironic that my current occupation requires a great deal of reading and not an insignificant amount of writing. I guess that goes to show you that attitudes (hearts) can change.

That goes with spiritual learn-

ing as well. If your heart is not in it, then it is not going to happen. If you are not focused on

spiritual matters, then you will not learn spiritual lessons. When the heart of a person is only concerned with physical, temporal, and worldly pursuits, even if a spiritual lesson "hit them right between the eyes," they would not understand it.

Jesus stated it like this in Mat-

thew 13:13-17, This is why I speak to them in parables, because seeing they do not see, and hearing they do not hear, not do they understand. Indeed, in their case the prophecy of Isaiah is fulfilled that says: "You will indeed hear but never understand, and you will indeed see but never perceive. For this people's heart has grown dull, and with their ears they can barely hear, and their eyes they have closed, lest they should see with their eyes and hear with their ears and understand with their heart and turn, and I would heal them." But blessed are your eyes, for they see, and your ears, for they hear. For truly, I say to you, many prophets and righteous people longed to see what you see, and did not see it, and to hear what you hear, and did not hear it (ESV).

There are some who completely refuse to consider spiritual matters. In fact, they outright deny

anything beyond the natural, material sphere in which we exist. You may know someone like this. Trying to help them learn of spiritual matters is next to impossible. They don't believe in God, and at some point they determine to never entertain such a thought, because they realize how that would fundamentally change their lives.

Others, like Jesus said, have just grown dull. They become like a car that is parked in a garage and never run for years. It will require some repair and overdue maintenance before they can exercise their spiritual muscles once again. They still believe in God (at least they say they do), but they are more focused on their job, earning money, and pursuing pleasure and finding fulfillment in this life.

We should all have a spiritual eye and ear checkup. Am I focused on spiritual things, or am I only concerned with the here and now? Is the thought of reading the Bible more one of delight or drudgery? Are your eyes blessed because they see beyond this physical realm and, by faith, see into the eternal?


Kerby ended the quarter with a field goal as the teams headed into the locker room with the score at 30-13 in favor of the Wolves.

(AP) - A look at the upcoming week around the Southeastern Conference: GAME OF THE WEEKEND: Texas A&M at No. 24 Tennessee: Just a couple of weeks ago, Texas A&M was ranked fifth in the country to match its highest position ever in the Top 25. Now they're unranked and are the only SEC team without a conference win. That puts the Aggies (11-5, 0-4 SEC) in a desperate position heading into Saturday's game at No. 24 Tennessee (11-4, 2-2), which has won two straight. Injuries and suspensions impacted Texas A&M's roster at the start of SEC play, but the Aggies also have been hurt by bad luck. In their

last two games, they lost 69-68 to LSU on a 3-pointer in the final second and fell 74-73 at No. 21 Kentucky. LOOKING AHEAD: Is Auburn for real? Auburn has put itself in great position to earn its first NCAA Tournament berth since 2003. The Tigers are unbeaten in SEC competition and have won 13 straight games, their longest winning streak since 1999-2000. Auburn (15-1, 3-0 SEC) has won three straight SEC games

by double figures, the first time it's

done that since 2009. Before now, Au-

burn hadn't even won three straight

SEC games by any margin since the

2015 SEC tournament. Auburn plays

three of its next four games on the road, including a Saturday matchup at Mississippi State, which hasn't lost at home all season.

NUMBERS GAME: Florida's Egor Koulechov has shot 13 of 20 from 3-point range in Florida's four SEC games to help the Gators move atop the league standings. He scored the Gators' first 13 points Wednesday in a 71-54 victory over Mississippi State LSU (11-4, 2-1) already has exceeded its win total from last season, when the Tigers finished 10-21. ... Ole Miss coach Andy Kennedy became the 23rd coach in SEC history to win 100 conference games when the Rebels beat Mississippi State 64-58 last weekend. Kennedy has a 100-90 record in SEC games over 12 seasons.

PERFORMER: LSU's **IMPACT** Tremont Waters delivered one of the most spectacular shots of the season Saturday with his off-balance 3-pointer in the final second to give the Tigers a one-point win at Texas A&M. That shot continued the 5-foot-11 guard's remarkable freshman season. Waters leads the SEC in assists (6.1) and ranks fifth in the league in scoring (16.8). He's a major reason why LSU is outperforming preseason

1. Pass. There is no good reason to bid again over three notrump, despite your 5-5-2-1 distribution. Granting that such hands generally play better in a suit, the fact remains that you've told partner about your preference for suit play, and he has said he's not

2. Six notrump. This is a matter of simple arithmetic. Partner's jump to two notrump announced 18 or 19 points, and you have 15. The combined total is 33 or 34 points, which means that bidding a slam is mandatory. Your three-club bid was designed to find out if partner had three-eard support for spades, and now that he said he hasn't, you have no reason to doubt that notrump is the best denomination.

3. Four diamonds. A slam is notrump.

clearly imminent here also, but this time there is a good possibility that diamonds will prove a superior medium for the slam.

It is certainly reasonable to assume that partner has precisely two spades because of his failure to bid three spades at his last turn. He is therefore highly likely to have five diamonds for his bidding to date. If that is the case, he may find it easier to make six diamonds than six notrump.

Your four-diamond bid is, of course, forcing. If partner bids five diamonds over four, you plan to carry on to six 4. Four clubs. This is a tough

choice, but the odds favor suit play over notrump. There are two important differences between this hand and the first one.

Your distribution in the former case was 5-5-2-1; here it 6-5-1-1, which is decidedly less satisfactory for notrump purposes. Also, in the first hand you had nine high-card points, giving your side more than the 26 normally needed to make three notrump, while here you have only six points, leaving you a point or two short of 26. In terms of pure probabilities, game is more likely in one of your suits — where your distribution can play a role

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

This Date In History

Today is Friday, Jan. 12, the 12th day of 2018. There are 353

days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History:

On Jan. 12, 1948, the U.S. Supreme Court, in Sipuel v. Board of Regents of University of Oklahoma, unanimously ruled that state law schools could not discriminate against applicants on the basis of race. On this date:

In 1773, the first public museum in America was organized in Charleston, South Carolina.

In 1828, the United States and Mexico signed a Treaty of Limits defining the boundary between the two countries to be the same as the one established by an 1819 treaty between the U.S. and Spain.

In 1915, the U.S. House of Representatives rejected, 204-174, a proposed constitutional amendment to give women nationwide the right to vote. The silent film drama "A Fool There Was," which propelled Theda Bara to stardom with her portrayal of a predatory vamp, premiered in New York.

In 1932, Hattie W. Caraway became the first woman elected to the U.S. Senate after initially being appointed to serve out the remainder of the term of her late husband, Thaddeus.

In 1945, during World War II, Soviet forces began a major, successful offensive against the Germans in Eastern Europe. Aircraft from U.S. Task Force 38 sank about 40 Japanese ships off Indochina.

In 1959, Berry Gordy Jr. founded Motown Records (originally Tamla Records) in Detroit.

In 1976, mystery writer Dame Agatha Christie died in Wallingford, England, at age

In 1986, the shuttle Columbia blasted off with a crew that included the first Hispanic-American in space, Dr. Franklin R. Chang-Diaz.

In 1987, Anglican Church

envoy Terry Waite arrived in Lebanon on his latest mission to win the release of Western hostages; however, Waite ended up being taken captive himself, and wasn't released until 1991.

In 1998, Linda Tripp provided Independent Counsel Kenneth Starr's office with taped conversations between herself and former White House intern Monica Lewinsky.

Ten years ago: President George W. Bush, visiting Bahrain, said he was cheered by news that Iraq's parliament had approved legislation reinstating thousands of former supporters of Saddam Hussein's dissolved Baath party to government jobs, calling it "an important step toward reconciliation."

Five years ago: The NHL's four-month lockout finally ended as the league and the players' association completed signing a required memorandum of understanding. Miss New York Mallory Hagan won the Miss America pageant in Las Vegas.

No. 17 Texas A&M women hand No. 6 Tennessee 1st loss, 79-76

as (AP) — No. 17 Texas A&M trailed No. 6 Tennessee by two points late in overtime when Aggies guard Danni Williams, with three free throws upcoming, did her best to keep her composure.

"I thought I was going to throw up," Williams admitted afterward with a grin. "I knew I just needed to breathe and relax, and treat them like everyday free throws."

Williams coolly sank all three and scored seven points total in overtime, and the Aggies toppled the Lady Vols 79-76 on Thursday night to hand Tennessee its first defeat of the season.

The Aggies (14-4, 3-1 Southeastern Conference), who led 69-62 with 6:41 left in regulation, missed 18 consecutive shots from the field late in the game before recovering in the extra period thanks to Williams' clutch free throw

She made all five of her attempts from the line in overtime, including when she was fouled on a 3-point attempt with the Aggies trailing 76-74 and 7.8 seconds remaining.

"Yes, we were dead tired and, yes, I probably should have subbed more," Texas A&M coach Gary Blair said. "But this team is used to playing those kinds of minutes, and every possession was so important."

Following a timeout, Ten-

COLLEGE STATION, Tex- nessee had the ball on its end of the court with a chance to win, but Evina Westbrook threw a pass along the left side that bounced out of bounds in front of the Lady Vols bench, resulting in a turnover.

> "You've got to at least get a shot off there, and we didn't," Tennessee coach Warlick said. "It's another learning opportunity for us."

> Williams was fouled with 0.4 seconds left and made both free throws. She and Khaalia Hillsman each scored 22 points to lead A&M, and Chennedy Carter added 21.

> Mercedes Russell led the Lady Vols (15-1, 3-1) with 21.

> "It was a battle," Hillsman said of her touted showdown with Russell in the paint. "Just back and forth."

> So was the game. The lead changed 17 times and the teams were tied on 10 occasions in an edge-of-your-seat

> "We'll go back and get better," Warlick said. "Hats off to A&M, they battled and they got the win. Both teams were getting after it. It was a fun game, and our young kids will learn from this."

> Texas A&M won against a top-10 team for the first time since Nov. 30, 2014, when the Aggies defeated No. 8 Duke 63-59 in College Station.


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Feds say Texas failed to properly educate disabled students

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The U.S. Department of Education says Texas for years violated federal law by denying students with disabilities access to proper public education.

Thursday's announcement comes after an investigation in which agency officials visited Texas and determined that the state put an illegal cap on the number of youngsters receiving special education

U.S. Education Secretary Betsy DeVos said in a statement, "Far too many students in Texas had been precluded from receiving supports and services" mandated by federal law.

Gov. Greg Abbott immediately ordered a special education overhaul, giving the Texas Education Agency a week to produce a draft corrective plan.

The federal investigation followed 2016 Houston Chronicle reporting that Texas, in 2004, quietly instituted an arbitrary, 8.5-percent enrollment cap on the number of students eligible for special education instruction.

Texas sales tax collections up as Harvey recovery continues

DALLAS (AP) — Financial experts say Texas sales tax collections for the last few months of 2017 increased by double digits compared to a year earlier partly because of the surge in rebuilding and other recovery from Hurricane Harvey.

Moody's Investor Service issued a report Thursday showing December 2017 sales tax collections increased by 12.3 percent over December 2016. Collections from Aug. 31 through the end of 2017 rose 10.2 percent over collections in 2016. Sales tax is the largest source of general operating

funds for Texas. Gov. Greg Abbott's office had estimated as much as \$150 billion in damage from Harvey, which made landfall Aug. 25 in South Texas.

The report says rebounding oil prices that dipped the last two fiscal years also contributed to the tax collections increase.

Texas governor has record \$43M for likely cakewalk race

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Republican Texas Gov. Greg Abbott raised \$9-plus million through the end of last year and now has a record war chest of \$43.3 million to fund a November re-election bid that's not expected to be competitive.

Abbott's campaign announced Thursday that its cash on hand totals now exceed any statewide candidate in Texas history, around double what Abbott had when launching his first gubernatorial run in 2013. The Democrats spent months searching for a viable gubernatorial candidate and their primary now features former Dallas County Sheriff Lupe Valdez and Andrew White, son of former Texas Gov. Mark White.

Texas court hears case that could end local plastic bag bans

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Texas' highest civil court is discussing a border city's ban on plastic bags and could ultimately decide to end such prohibitions

The Laredo Merchants Association is challenging its city's ban on distributing single-use plastic bags at grocery stores and other shops.

The association argued before the Texas Supreme Court on Thursday that existing state law on solid waste disposal supersedes the local ordinance designed to prevent litter. Many Texas cities have plastic bag bans, including Austin. A lower court sided with Laredo, but that was reversed on appeal, prompting state Supreme Court arguments.

Texas mayor, 3 others charged in \$150M health care scheme

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A South Texas mayor and three other men have been indicted on federal charges that they conspired to fraudulently bill Medicare for more than \$150 million in hospice and home health services.

Federal prosecutors announced Wednesday that Rio Bravo Mayor Francisco Pena and the others each are charged with conspiracy to commit health care fraud. Additional charges include one of obstructing a health care investigation filed against the 82-year-old Pena.

One of the men owned a collection of health care entities for which Pena, a licensed physician, served as the medical director.

Authorities say kickbacks and bribes were paid to medical directors, including Pena, for certifying that patients qualified for services when they actually did not.

DALLAS (AP) — While Texas cities vying to land Amazon's second headquarters have been vocal about why they think they should win, they've resisted releasing copies of their proposals.

Requests by The Associated Press for information related to the proposals were met with replies including arguments that such information can be kept secret because it would give an advantage to competitors.

Some cities did release employees' emails relating to the bids. A release of emails from Houston offered clues, including a draft of the proposal's two-page executive summary that said it could offer cash and tax incentives from the city, county and state totaling about \$268 million. Amazon received 238 propos-

als after issuing the request in September and has said it will announce a decision this year. Here's a look at some of the

Houston's letter to the attorney general adds that it takes no position with respect to the public availability of the requested information but that the city has notified the "third parties whose proprietary information has been requested" that they must submit to the attorney general a legal briefing justifying withholding the information.

Amazon said in its request for proposals in September that "certain aspects" of the project and details about the company "are confidential, proprietary and constitute trade secrets." An Amazon spokesman declined to comment.

TEXAS LAW ON THE RE-LEASE OF INFORMATION Experts in Texas say that the

law makes it nearly impossible to get such information.

Kelley Shannon, executive director of the nonprofit Freedom of Information Foundation of Texas, said that a 2015 ruling from the Texas Supreme Court lowered the threshold for arguing competitive bidding as an exemption from disclosure under the Texas Public Information Act. She said the ruling now allows any company doing business with the government to claim the exemption.

She also said a governmental entity previously had to show that a decisive advantage would be given, but now it's any advantage.

"The people of our state can't really follow the money anymore," Shannon said, adding, "Taxpayers have a right to see how their money is being spent."

Joe Larsen, a First Amendment attorney in Houston and board member of the Freedom of Information Foundation, said it was difficult to get such information even before that ruling, noting that governmental bodies could use the exemption dealing with economic development negotiations, which was also cited by cities in relation to the Amazon request.

Larsen said that not revealing the details of such bids is "basically just shoving the public out of a fundamentally important matter involving the finances of a governmental body."

WHAT EMAILS REVEAL

Most of the cities did release employees' emails related to the bid, including those from Houston that reveal some information about their bid.

One email released from the city includes a draft of the executive summary of Houston's Amazon proposal, which says it will be offering cash and tax incentives that total about \$268 million. It says the city, county and the state are prepared to offer the "competitive package of incentives."
