
nior, Ranen Wilson, has accomplished a monumental feat by obtaining membership into the Texas All-State Choir four consecutive years in a row. He attained the highest

honor any high school musician could ever achieve in the state of Texas. Making the Texas All-State Choir just one time is impressive enough but doing it four times back-to-back is something very few students in the state will ever do.

"Last month I had an audition for Texas Music Educators Association (TMEA) All-State Choir and ended up making first chair," said Wilson. "This isn't common among music students, and I'm the first person in BSHS historv to make state all four years in a row."

Wilson's win this year is unique in that he competed at a "large school" level, which is a category for students of 5A and 6A schools only. His past 3 years of competition have been on a "small school" level, a category for 1A,2A,3A, and 4A schools.

"Students from schools aren't allowed to compete on a small school level, but it can be the other way around," said Wilson. "People from larger schools sometimes say that because

we're from small schools, we can't possibly measure up to them, but this year, I competed at the their level and got first chair."

There are between 60 and 70 thousand students who audition for TMEA every year and out of that, about 1,700 make it. This number includes various choirs, bands, and orchestras.

In Texas, only about 35 people total have made it to state all four years in a row, and now Wilson is included in this number.

"I've been part of choir since the 6th grade, but it wasn't until I was a freshman in high school, and my current choir teacher Mr. Garcia encouraged me to enter a competition that I won, that I really started to get into choir more. I guess you can

## After lower open, US stocks bounce back after Monday plunge

NEW YORK (AP) — U.S. stocks are reversing course Tuesday morning after sharp losses in the first few minutes of trading, raising hopes of a halt to a global sell-off in the stock market. The early gains follow the market's

steepest drop in six and a half years. Major indexes in Asia and Europe tumbled following Monday's

1,150 point drop in the Dow Jones industrial average. Investors remain fearful that signs of rising inflation and higher interest rates could bring

an end to the bull market and the economic recovery that has boosted stocks in recent years. Trading was choppy in the early go-

ing Tuesday, likely to be one of the most watched days on the markets in years. The Dow Jones industrial average fell 567 points at the open but roared back and was up 146 points, or 0.6 percent, to 24,491 at 10:00 a.m. The Standard & Poor's 500 index rose 31 points, or 1.2 percent, to 2,680 after a 4.1 percent drop Monday. The Nasdaq composite added 84 points,

or 1.2 percent, to 7,052. The Russell 2000 index of smaller-company stocks gave up 5 points, or 0.3 percent, to 1,485.

Big dividend companies including utility and real estate companies fell, as bond yields increased after a sharp drop on

Monday. Technology and industrial com-

panies and retailers moved higher, a possible sign of confidence the U.S. economy will keep growing.

The market mood turned decidedly fearful on Monday when the Dow Jones industrial average posted its biggest percentage decline since August 2011, driven by fears the U.S. Federal Reserve will raise interest rates faster than expected due to a pickup in wages. Those stemmed from the U.S. jobs report on Friday. That has fed into widespread concerns

that markets were stretched following a strong run over the past year that pushed many indexes to record highs. Some also question the possible role of computerdriven algorithmic trading in the precipitous declines or even the ramifications of See **STOCKS**, Page 3



## Philly Super Bowl parade plans to include dramatic surprises

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Philadelphia officials are revealing plans for Thursday's Super Bowl parade and say fans should expect some dramatic surprises along the five-mile route.

The news conference got underway Tuesday around the Vince Lombardi Trophy. It's still covered in fingerprints after Nick Foles led the Philadelphia Eagles to their first Super Bowl victory with a 41-33 win over the New England Patriots Players and team officials will parade up Broad

Street from near the team's stadium to City Hall and on the Benjamin Franklin Parkway to the steps of the Philadelphia Museum of Art. Democratic Mayor Jim Kenney urges revelers to

# Showtime for SpaceX's big new rocket with sports car on top

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — SpaceX's big new rocket stood ready to blast off on its first test flight Tuesday, as crowds began gathering at daybreak for the afternoon launch debut. As the sun rose at Kennedy Space Center, bright

lights illuminated the Falcon Heavy, gleaming white on the same launch pad used by NASA nearly 50 years ago to send men to the moon. The Heavy is set to become the world's most pow-

erful rocket in use, with double the liftoff punch. It's equipped with three boosters and 27 engines designed to provide about 5 million pounds of thrust. To add to the excitement, SpaceX chief Elon

Musk has his cherry-red Tesla Roadster on board. He's striving to put the car into a perpetual solar orbit reaching out as far as Mars, the focus of all his rocket efforts as he aims to establish a city there in years to come. Musk — who also heads up the Tesla electric

carmaker — said he wanted to add some dramatic flair by launching his sports car into space. Normally the payloads on test flights include non-valuable items like steel or concrete slabs or mundane In the driver's seat of the convertible is "Star-

man," a dummy in a spacesuit, with one hand on the steering wheel. David Bowie's "Space Oddity" will be playing on the soundtrack at liftoff. The launch was expected to attract thousands —

a crowd not seen since NASA's last space shuttle flight seven years ago. While the shuttles had more liftoff muscle than the Heavy, the all-time leaders in both size and might were NASA's Saturn V rockets, which first carried astronauts to the moon in 1968.

Scores of journalists packed the space center to witness not only the launch, but the return to land

of two of the Heavy's three first-stage boosters, strapped side by side by side for take-Just minutes after

liftoff, the two outer boosters — recycled from previous Falcon 9 flights — will attempt vertical landings at nearby Cape Canaveral Air Force Station. The central core booster will continue upward, then also peel away and target a touchdown on a floating platform in the Atlantic, just offshore. If it reaches orbit, the Roadster will spend several

hours traveling through the highly charged Van Al-

len radiation belts encircling Earth. That will be a risky time as well, according to Musk, because the fuel necessary for the ignition of the final thruster to send the car on its proper path toward Mars could freeze up, or the oxygen could vaporize. In addition, the car will be zapped repeatedly by radiation. No matter what happens — a rocket explosion at the pad or some other calamity — Musk told reporters Monday his company has done everything pos-

sible to maximize success and he's at peace at whatever happens. He's had plenty of experience with

rocket accidents, from his original Falcon 1 test flights to his follow-up Falcon 9s, one of which exploded on a nearby pad during a 2016 ignition test. While it will be "a really huge downer if it blows up," Musk said, the hope is that any failure comes far enough into the Heavy's flight "so we at least learn as much as possible along the way." The Heavy already has customers eager to launch hefty satellites, including the U.S. Air Force. An explo-

Musk said he'll consider it a win if the rocket at least clears the launch tower.

As for his car, he said with a chuckle, it's the least of his worries.

He's already making plans for an even bigger, mightier rocket that will carry astronauts, not just cargo like the Heavy, along with the infrastructure that would be needed to set up camp on the moon and asteroids, and eventually build the city he envisions on Mars.

the rise and fall in the value of virtual currencies, notably bitcoin. "If investors look at underlying

earnings growth and the fundamentals of the global economy, there is reason for optimism," said Neil Wilson, senior market analyst at ETX "However once this kind of stam-

pede starts it's hard to stop." Among the biggest losers Tuesday

was Tokyo's Nikkei 225 stock average, which ended 4.7 percent lower. Hong Kong's Hang Seng skidded 5.1 percent and South Korea's Kospi declined 1.5 In Europe, the British FTSE 100 in-

dex fell 2.4 percent while the CAC 40 in France fell 2.8 percent and Germany's DAX was down 2.7 percent.

Though many stock indexes are close to where they started the year, the losses mark a reversal of fortune following a sustained period of gains, a pullback that some market pros have been predicting for some time.

Stephen Schwarzman, the chairman and CEO of financial firm Blackstone, warned recently of a potential "reckoning" in markets.

A 10 percent drop from a peak is often referred to as a "correction" while a bear market is generally defined as a 20 percent or so drop in indexes. The S&P 500, for example, is one of the major fallers, was down 7.8 percent since its latest record high on Jan. 26 as of Monday's close.

"Seemingly the only hope for the markets at

the moment is that investors suddenly decide that the sell-off has been a bit overdone," said Connor Campbell, a financial analyst at Spreadex.

Despite the sea of red in global stock markets, there are hopes that the retreat won't last long given that global economic growth has picked up and the financial system is more robust since the financial crisis.


"That is not to say that we won't see further falls in coming days, but in an environment where growth is good and earnings are expected to rise globally, there are decent underpinnings," said James Knightley, chief international economist at ING.

On Monday, the Dow finished down 4.6 percent while the S&P 500 sank 4.1 percent, to 2,648.94. The last fall of that size came in August 2011 when investors were fretting over Europe's debt crisis and the debt ceiling impasse in Washington that prompted a U.S. credit rating downgrade.

Still, while some financial assets became more attractive to investors as perceived havens of value. Gold, for example, was up 0.4 percent at \$1,343 an ounce.

The U.S. dollar remained resilient despite the stock market sell-off, which at one stage Monday saw the Dow shed 1,597 points. The euro was up 0.3 percent at \$1.2435 while the dollar rose 0.3 percent to 109.38 yen.

#### Searchers find second set of human remains in West Texas pit

(AP) — A West Texas sheriff says the skeletal remains of a second person have been found in a pit as part of an investigation into two teenagers missing since 2015.

Midland County Sheriff Gary Painter says the remains were found Saturday as investigators were searching a second pit on private land after receiving a tip early last

NEW YORK — U.S. stocks are continuing to sink Monday afternoon as banks and health care and energy care companies slip. 

The devices were originally intended to help people with disabilities and were little known and little sold until the Las Vegas shooting. They fit over the stock and pistol grip of a semi-automatic rifle and allow the weapon to fire rapidly, some 400 to 800 rounds per minute, mimicking a fully automatic firearm.

The federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives reviewed the devices and approved them in 2010, ruling they did not amount to machine guns that are regulated under the National Firearms Act that dates to the 1930s.

Richard Vasquez was assistant chief of the ATF's technology bureau and led the review of bump stocks. He stands by the agency's 2010 ruling, which relied on a key difference between semi-automatic and fully automatic firearms: While semi-automatic firearms require a separate and independent pull of the trigger to fire a bullet, fully automatic firearms can fire multiple rounds with a single trigger pull. ATF determined bump stocks didn't convert a semiautomatic firearm into one that is fully auto. "It's a proper determination. Everybody wants to

jump the gun and say that ATF made a mistake," said Vasquez, who left the agency in 2014. "ATF didn't make a mistake."

The federal agency is reviewing its ruling, something Vasquez and others caution is a dangerous move without Congress first changing the law to specifically make such devices illegal.

"If ATF is allowed to write a regulation to change the definition of this device, instead of a law, it's going to give all government agencies authority to change their regulations, which could affect us in a wide variety of ways," Vasquez warned.

Legislation in Congress has remained in limbo despite early signs from a bipartisan mix of lawmakers and advocates who voiced alarm that such a device was deemed legal and on the market. Even the National Rifle Association sounded open to great regulation of bump stocks.

Joyce Malcolm, a professor at George Mason University's Antonin Scalia School of Law, said the bans likely would withstand a legal challenge, but she wonders about more practical matters: How might they be enforced?

"I don't see a real constitutional issue. I just wonder about actually getting these devices out of circulation for people who already have them," she said.

It's not known how many of the devices are in circulation. At the time of the Las Vegas shooting, gun dealers said they rarely had customers wanting to buy one — but then couldn't keep up with the demand in the days and months afterward. The leading manufacturer of bump stocks, Texas-based Slide Fire Solutions, briefly stopped selling them, posting a notice on its website that it had suspended sales to keep up with demand. It has since resumed sales.

Massachusetts, which has some of the nation's strictest gun laws, enacted its ban a month after the Las Vegas shooting, pushed through a Democraticcontrolled Legislature and signed into law by a Republican lieutenant governor. New Jersey followed suit last month with a measure signed into law by outgoing Republican Gov. Chris Christie. About a dozen other states are considering similar bills.

"This is a very familiar story. The Congress cowers in the face of the NRA, and the states act," said John Feinblatt, president of Everytown for Gun Safety, which advocates for tougher gun laws.

Connecticut, home to some of the world's most legendary gun makers, is among the other states considering bans.

Rep. William Tong, a Democrat and House chairman of the Connecticut Legislature's Judiciary Committee, called it a commonsense measure that puts public safety first.

"The federal government has demonstrated that, given the composition of the Congress right now, it's not possible to pass commonsense gun laws," he said. "Connecticut can't wait."

Gun-rights advocates say the efforts undermine the Second Amendment and will do little to stop criminals.

"Anti-gun Democrats love to ban things. That is their answer," said Erich Pratt, executive director of Gun Owners of America, who added bump stocks have rarely, if ever, been used in a crime before the Las Vegas shooting. "This is their chance to say, 'Hey, we're doing something. Look at us. We're doing something.' It's not going to do anything."

# Natalee Holloway's mom sues over TV series about daughter

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. — The mother of Natalee Holloway, a U.S. teenager who vanished during her senior trip to Aruba in 2005, is seeking at least \$35 million from the producers of what she contends was a fake television documentary about

Beth Holloway said in a federal lawsuit filed Friday that the deception surrounding "The Disappearance of Natalee Holloway" was so complete she was even tricked into providing a DNA sample to match against what producers claimed were remains that could be those of her long-missing

The whole show was a ruse that subjected Beth Holloway to "agonizing weeks" of uncertainty and waiting that "completely and utterly destroyed" her, according to the suit filed in Birmingham.

Holloway, a schoolteacher in north Alabama, is seeking \$10 million in compensation and \$25 million in punitive damages against Oxygen Media,

WAKING UP: The stock market has been unusually calm for more than a year. The combination of economic growth in the U.S. and other major economies, low interest rates, and support from central banks meant stocks could keep rising steadily without a lot of bumps along the way. Experts have been warning that that wouldn't last forever, and after big gains in the first three weeks of January, that stretch might be over.

SURVEY SAYS: Stocks perked up somewhat after a strong report for the service sector. every month for the eight years. **BITCOIN** WOES: Bitcoin prices and futures continued to sink. According to Coindesk, the price of bitcoin fell 13 percent to \$7,082. 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
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## Former sports doctor sentenced to 40 to 125 years in prison

CHARLOTTE, Mich. The former sports doctor whose serial sexual abuse of girls and young women upended the gymnastics world was sentenced Monday to a third prison term of 40 to 125 years for molesting young athletes at an elite Michigan training center.

Larry Nassar listened to dozens of victims for two days last week and was almost attacked by a man whose three daughters said they were abused. His final sentence comes after he pleaded guilty Twistars, a gymnastics club that was run by a 2012 U.S. Olympic coach.

Nassar's conduct "robbed these girls and women of one of the most truly important human qualities: trust," Judge Janice Cunningham

The sentence is largely symbolic because the 54-yearold is already assured of spending the rest of his life in prison. Before serving either of his two state sentences, he must first serve 60 years in federal prison for child pornography crimes.

Besides the sentence delivered Monday in Eaton County, Nassar was also sentenced last month to 40 to 175 years for similar conduct in another county. Those sentences would be served at the same

In a brief statement before he was sentenced, Nassar attempted to apologize to his victims.

"It's impossible to convey the breadth and depth of how sorry I am to each and every one," he said.

In all, more than 260 women and girls have reported being molested by Nassar, who worked for Michigan State and USA Gymnastics, the sport's governing body, which also trains Olympians.

Some of the cases date back to the 1990s. The judge said the abuse "spans the country and the world."

On Friday, Randy Margraves was tackled by sheriff's deputies before he could pummel Nassar in court. He said he wanted just a minute in a locked room with the "demon."

"This cannot be a lawless society. I know that," Mar-

The scandal has rocked Michigan State, which has been accused of repeatedly

missing opportunities to stop Nassar, who had a campus office and was a revered figure in sports medicine. Lou Anna Simon resigned

as the university's president on Jan. 24 and athletic director Mark Hollis followed two days later.

The scandal has also pushed out many leaders at the top of competitive gymnastics.

The Olympic coach, John Geddert, was suspended last month by USA Gymnastics until it completes its investigation. And all of the agency's board members recently stepped down at the demand of the U.S. Olympic Committee. The longtime leader of USA Gymnastics, Steve Penny, quit last March.

"We would not be here had the adults and authorities done what they should have done 20 years ago. We have taken care of one perpetrator. We have not taken care of the systems that allowed him to flourish for 20 years."

#### Woman with \$559M Powerball ticket wants to stay anonymous

CONCORD, N.H. — A New Hampshire woman who says she has a Powerball ticket that won a \$559.7 million iackpot wants a court order allowing her to stay anonymous, saying she made a "huge mistake" in signing the ticket without consulting a lawyer first.

The woman, identified as Jane Doe, filed a complaint last week in Hillsborough Superior Court in Nashua saying she signed the back of the ticket following the Jan. 6 drawing, the nation's eighthlargest lottery jackpot. She thought she was required to do so as directed by information on the state lottery commission's website.

Under New Hampshire law, a lottery winner's name, town and prize amount are public information. But after the woman contacted a lawyer, she learned that she could have shielded her identity by instead writing the name of a

The woman hasn't turned in her ticket yet, but she showed lottery officials a photocopy of the front. She said lottery officials told her they would be compelled to disclose her identity if someone filed a Right to Know request. Her lawyers argue her privacy interest outweighs the insignificant public interest in disclosing her name.

"While we respect this player's desire to remain anony-

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mous, state statutes and lottery rules clearly dictate protocols,' N e w



Hampshire Lottery Executive Director Charlie McIntyre said in a statement. Lottery officials consulted with state lawyers and said they must process the winning ticket "like any other," he said.

The woman described herself as a life-long New Hampshire resident and "engaged community member."

"She wishes to continue this work and the freedom to walk into a grocery store or attend public events without being known or targeted as the winner of a half-billion dollars," the complaint said. "She wishes to remain in New Hampshire and give back to the state and community that has given so much to her."

The filing says she has set up a trust and plans to contribute a portion of her winnings to charity.

William Shaheen, whose law firm is representing the woman, had written a blog post shortly after the drawing urging the winner not to sign the ticket immediately because of the confidentiality rules.

New Hampshire is one of a handful of states that allows trusts to anonymously claim lottery prizes. In 2016, a New Hampshire family that won a \$487 million Powerball jackpot remained anonymous as lawyers for their trust claimed it.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — After playing more than 50,000 minutes, Dirk Nowitzki has certainly made a name for himself.

Even if it's still hard to spell sometimes.

On a night when his last name was botched on the back of his jersey, the Dallas forward became the sixth player in NBA history to reach 50,000 career minutes. He finished with 12 points but the Mavericks collapsed down the stretch in a 104-101 loss to the Los Angeles Clip-

Nowitzki said he didn't notice until after the game that his name was misspelled on his uniform. "I actually just saw it," he

explained. "I had no idea. It happens. I guess it sums up our season."

Danilo Gallinari had 28

points, including the goahead free throws with 24 seconds left, and the Clippers scored the last 13 points of the game to rally past a Mavs team that went scoreless over the final 4:42.

Tobias Harris had 19 points for Los Angeles, and Lou Williams added 15 off the bench.

"This felt like a steal game, because we didn't play well and they shot the heck out of the ball," Clippers coach Doc Rivers said. "To steal a game like this, you feel like you got two games."

With the Clippers up by one after Gallinari's free throws, DeAndre Jordan won a jump ball with 4.5 seconds remaining and tipped it to Avery Bradley for a fast-break layup that made it 104-101.

Yogi Ferrell had a chance to tie it with 0.4 seconds to play, but he stepped out of bounds before his shot bounced off the rim.

"When you're playing from in front, you've got to protect the ball and get good shots and we struggled to do both," Dallas coach Rick Carlisle

Wesley Matthews led the Mavericks with 23 points and Devin Harris added 16 off the bench.

tutes a vast improvement over immediately cashing the A-K of clubs. However, good as it is, the fact remains that there is an even better safety play available — one that also makes allowance for the possibility of a 4-0 split.

Accordingly, when he leads a club at trick two and West plays either the eight, nine, ten or queen, South should duck completely! If East follows suit, six club tricks become automatic; if, as in the actual deal, East shows out, declarer also scores six club tricks. Once West produces a club at trick two, whatever its size, South can ensure 11 tricks by allowing him to hold the trick.

A first-round finesse of the jack is certainly a good safety play, but permitting West to win the first club lead is a super safety play.










for the second straight year, all but assuring that they will miss the playoffs with consecutive losing seasons for the first time since Nowitzki's first two.

The slide out of contention means little to the context of Nowitzki's career: a 7-footer who changed the game with his 3-point shooting, the first foreign-born player to reach 30,000 points and the distinction with Kobe Bryant (Lakers) as the only players to spend 20 seasons with the same franchise.

"I think the reality is that when you see this kind of consistency of greatness, there's a tendency to take it for granted," said Rick Carlisle, in his 10th season as Nowitzki's coach. "And we must be careful about taking this for granted. We're seeing a generational player that's changed the game."

Nowitzki still starts — Carlisle pretty much declared earlier this season that he will start as long as he's playing — but often sits at the end of close games. He's probably the fourth scoring option, behind Harrison Barnes, Wesley Matthews and even rookie point guard Dennis Smith Jr.

But the 39-year-old played the first 54 games, an important measure for him to feel he's contributing. Nowitzki, the

only 7-footer to win the 3-point contest that's part of All-Star weekend, is in position for the best shooting percentage of his career from beyond the arc. The number of attempts isn't far off from his prime either.

"I wish he can play forever," said Washington coach Scott Brooks, who was at Oklahoma City when the Thunder lost to the Mavericks in the 2011 Confer-Western ence finals and beat them in the first round the next year. "You know the time is winding

time is winding down, you don't know how many more years he has. He probably has maybe six or seven more left in him," Brooks said, trying to keep a straight face.

Nowitzki has already said he is considering a 21st season. Barring a dramatic improvement through a trade, the draft or free agency, that likely means another year of helping turn Smith into a point guard that can guide a champion the way Nowitzki credits Jason Kidd for doing in Dallas.

Assuming the Mavericks stay near the bottom of the West standings, they'll have another high draft pick after getting Smith at No. 9. That will be another young player who sees the work Nowitzki does away from the court to stay in shape, and a 13-time All-Star who is frequently the last player to quit shooting after practice.

J.J. Barea spent his first five seasons with the Mavericks and was still a relatively young guard at 26 when the Mav-

ericks won the title.

"I used him a lot," said Barea, who returned to Dallas three years ago. "If I work half of what he does, I'm going to be all right. These guys, they really didn't get him at his best like I got him. But they still see how hard you've got to work to be able to.

play out there with us."

Nowitzki doesn't mind admitting that practice isn't quite as fun as it used to be.

"But once the ball goes up, it's still great," said the 2007 MVP, who has career averages of 21.4 points and 7.7 rebounds. "I still love to compete. I still love to be out there for the guys and trying to help them with my experience and spread the floor for them and maybe getting some timely scoring here and there."

Always big on self-deprecation, Nowitzki quips that he can't help the younger players by showing them any moves. He doesn't have to be joking to acknowledge that his patented one-legged fadeaway jumper isn't nearly as dangerous as it was when he was Finals MVP.

What Nowitzki can offer is work ethic

and experience, not to mention longevity. He became the sixth NBA player to reach 50,000 minutes Tuesday night at the Los Angeles Clippers.

"It's been two decades of fun and com-

peting," Nowitzki said. "Getting to 20 years is special. There's not a lot of guys that have done it. Not a lot of guys have done it with one franchise. I'm proud of that, but want to finish the season strong."

Nowitzki always finds a way to steer the conversation back to the present — and future.
