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Locals arrested for murder, tampering with evidence

A Big Spring man has been arrested for a murder which occurred Friday.

According to a Big Spring Police Department press release issued Wednesday, Raul Romo, 20, has been booked for first-degree murder, while his mother, Brenda Valdivia, 37, has been arrested for tampering with physical evidence, a third-degree felony, in connection with the fatal shooting of Jaime Barboza, 47. The release indicates that po-

lice officers responded to a report of an unattended death at 705 1/2 Abrams, Friday at about 8:15 a.m. When they arrived on the scene, the officers located Barboza in his bedroom at the address, his home. The apparent cause of death was a gunshot wound to the head.

Barboza was discovered by a coworker who was picking him up for work.

Through the ensuing investigation, Big Spring Police's Criminal Investigation Division and the Texas Rangers narrowed the suspects to Romo and Valdivia. Valdivia was reportedly Barboza's girlfriend. Both have been arrested and booked into the Howard County Detention Center pending arraignment. Investigators believe that both

Valdivia and Romo were at Mr. Barboza's residence on Abrams

Historic bricks laid by ex-slaves in Houston reinstalled

HOUSTON (AP) — Thousands of bricks laid by ex-slaves at Freedmen's Town in Houston are being returned to the historic spot after removal in 2016 for storm drain

Houston Mayor Sylvester Turner says

city crews on Wednesday began re-installation of road bricks in the neighborhood that in the 1860s became home to former slaves.

Turner says the bricks, laid on the final day of Black History Month, were re2016, then cleaned and stored. Preservationists raised concerns about possible damage to the more than 3,600 bricks. Re-installation was

other weather-related issues delayed the work. Harvey on Aug. 25 hit South Texas, leading to storms and flooding that inundated parts of Houston.

Texas man gets prison for hatecrime assaults on gay men

PLANO, Texas (AP) — A Texas man has been sentenced to federal prison for hate-crime assaults on gay men.

A federal judge sentenced Chancler Encalade to 10 years in prison Tuesday. Previously, Nigel Garrett was sentenced to 15 years in prison for his part in the crimes. Cameron Ajiduah (ah-JEED'-wah) had pleaded guilty but withdrew it and chose not to accept his plea deal. He and codefendant Anthony Shelton are set for an April 13 trial in federal court in Plano, Texas.

Encalade and Garrett have said the four of them used a dating website for gay men to arrange to meet their victims in the victims' homes. Once there, Encalade and Garrett said, they would bind their victims with tape, assault and abuse them for being gay. then steal items from their homes

Feral chickens causing problems in parts of entrai

BASTROP, Texas The Capital of Texas Zoo counts peacocks, hippos, panthers, tigers and camels as residents at its facility in western Bastrop County. And soon it might be welcoming into its fold many of the freeranging Farm Street chickens, whose constant clucking, cawing and feculence have driven many Bastrop residents to their wits' end.

The Austin American-Statesman reports the city's animal services division is putting final touches on a contract

that would hire outside help to trap and rehome many of the fowl that have strutted too far from the Farm Street Historic Chicken Sanctuary, a 1,500-foot stretch of road where the chickens have enjoyed legal protection for nearly a decade.

But the flock's overpopulation — the city estimates their numbers have grown to between 100 and 200 birds, mostly gamy wild jungle fowl has sent many of the birds scavenging and roosting well outside the sanctuary's boundaries, between

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Exxon Mobil withdraws from Russia deal due to sanctions

MOSCOW (AP) — U.S. oil company Exxon Mobil says it will withdraw from its joint venture with Russia's state-controlled Rosneft due to U.S. and European sanctions against the coun-Mobil

Exxon signed a deal with Rosneft, Russia's biggest oil producer, in 2011 that aimed to drill in difficult terrain, like Russia's Arctic waters. It com-

bined Exxon's high level of technology with Rosneft's access to the area.

The deal came under strain, however, after the U.S. sanctioned Russia in 2014 over the invasion of Ukraine and the Crimean Peninsula. The sanctions did not affect existing deals in the energy sector, but prohibited any business with Rosneft CEO Igor Sechin, an influential oligarch in Russia.

That created a series of hurdles for the partnership. Exxon has applied for a waiver but without success. Last year, the U.S. Treasury fined Exxon \$2 million for signing new deals with Sechin in 2014. Exxon sued the U.S. government to stop the fine.

The deal has come under extra scrutiny because Rex Tillerson, the current secretary of state, was the Exxon CEO who had struck the deal and has had reportedly good personal ties with

As America's top diplomat, Tillerson



has insisted the sanctions will stay in place until Russia reverses course in Ukraine and gives back Crimea. Still, the Russian deal on his watch raises significant questions about his ability to credibly enforce the sanctions and to persuade European countries to keep doing so. The situation was escalated further

last year, when the U.S. expanded sanctions against Russia for allegedly interfering in the U.S. presidential Exxon said in a note to its earnings

report late Wednesday that it had

made the decision to end the partner ship in late 2017. "The corporation expects it will for-

mally initiate the withdrawal in 2018, at a cost of about \$200 million, it said.

Rosneft said in a statement that it "will continue the independent development of these projects," and that it supports Exxon Mobil's eventual re turn, should the law allow that.

"Technically, if they're outside the train tracks, they're outside the sanctuary — they're fair game," said Troy Walters, the city's lone animal protection officer.

Walters had originally connected with the Capital of Texas Zoo during the 2011 Bastrop Complex Fire as numbers of homeless domestic and nondomestic animals quickly outmatched the county's animal shelter's capacity. By then, Hicks for more than 15 years and offered to house the more exotic creatures that the fires displaced.

So when Hicks got word that Walters was grappling with chicken overpopulation, he reached out. He's got a tall perimeter fence around his zoo's 28 acres, he said, "so coyotes and predators can't get in. So the only thing that can get them is a raccoon, and we try hard to keep the raccoons out, but we are a rural zoo."

The straying Farm Street chickens, or however many of them the city is able to round up, would join Hick's collection of 500 animals, which already include several different species of such birds as peacocks, guinea fowl, geese, a parrot and a small bevy of chickens.

"There's not a playbook. I don't know if we're going to trap at one location for one day, two days or seven days and then move it," Walters said. "There's going to be plenty of fish to catch."

"I have a strong sneaking suspicion we're going to catch quite a few of them at once," he said.

The city also has homes lined up other than the zoo — rural homesteads open taking in fowl outside the city limits, where they can maintain their free-range lifestyle. Any in taking some of the trapped chickens will be vetted by the city to prevent any of the roosters from falling into the hands of cockfighters.

"We're not going to let people come forward and say, 'I only want the roosters,' that's a red flag," Walters said.

The city began hatching its chicken-trapping plans after the Bastrop City Council held a town hall meeting on the matter in November. For hours, council members and city staff heard from dozens of residents, many frustrated with the roosters' indiscriminate crowing and torn-up landscaping and who pushed for changes to the city's sanctuary ordinance.

Other residents, like Jane Campos, who's lived along Farm Street for 57 years, were quick to emphasize the flock's charm and reminded the council of their long history in Bastrop. Many say the fowls' ancestry dates back to the 1800s.

"They have a very large economic impact to the city that is positive," Campos said. "It's bringing people to Bastrop. We see them every day, asking where the chickens are and when they can see them."

The Farm Street Historic Chicken Sanctuary was created after many Farm Street resi-

dents demanded that

the city protect the fowl.

The Bastrop City Council passed the "chicken ordinance" resolution in 2009, which designated the sanctuary and the fowls' protected, freeranging status.

City code categorized the Farm Street fowl in the ordinance as "chickens that are not owned by an individual and that generally run at large in the vicinity of the" sanctuary.

Without any natural predators, other than the occasional car that revs down the street, their numbers blossomed and their territory has grown. Correspondingly, some residents' perception of them has shifted from

"Let me tell you what life is like in our home," Jennifer Leisure, who's been living in the neighborhood for over 20 years, said at the town hall. "Roosters — lots of them, six to eight of them - crow at 5 a.m., 7 a.m., midmorning, 2 in the afternoon, and into the evening. It is extremely loud. There are roosters and chickens by my front porch, and they have made a mess of all my flowers and landscaping. Furthermore, chicken poop is everywhere. The excessive noise level and it's impossible to sit on my front porch."

Walters is expecting to trap about 20 birds in the coming months, and he'll play it by ear. If complaints don't subside, he'll go back out and deploy more traps, he said. "We just basically

have to make a good judgment on it," he said.



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US awards \$73M contract for border wall work in New Mexico

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. — The U.S. government has awarded a Montana-based company a contract worth more than \$73 million to design and build replacement fencing along 20 miles (32 kilometers) of the U.S.-Mexico border in southern New Mexico, officials confirmed Wednes-

Existing vehicle barriers west of the Santa Teresa port of entry will be replaced with taller bollard-style barriers under the contract awarded in January to Barnard Construction Co. Inc. Bollard walls typically consist of sturdy, vertical posts that are spaced to provide visibility to the other side but are difficult to walk

Regional Customs and Border Protection officials said there was no timeline for when work might start, and the construction company did not respond to email and phone requests inquiring about project de-

News of the contract came after a federal judge in California sided this week with President Donald Trump on a challenge to building his promised border wall. The court rejected arguments that the administration overreached by waiving laws requiring environmental and other reviews before construction could

The administration has issued three waivers since August — two to build in parts of California and one in part of New Mexico. Work is already underway on a 30-foot (9.1-meter) high barrier in Calexico, California.

As for the work planned at Santa Teresa near New Mexico's state line with Texas, federal officials have said the area remains an active route for human smuggling

and drug trafficking. Officers in the El Paso sector are responsible for a sprawling desert territory that spans a portion of West Texas and all of New Mexico.

In recent days, officers working at the El Paso port of entry made nearly a dozen drug busts and seized 100 rounds of 9mm ammunition being smuggled south into Mexico.

In 2016, officers in the sector arrested more than 25,000 immigrants suspected of trying to enter the country illegally and seized around 67,000 pounds (30,400 kilograms) of marijuana. While less marijuana was seized during the 2017 fiscal year, just as many arrests were recorded.

In announcing plans to bolster barriers in the Santa Teresa area, Homeland Security Secretary Kirstjen Nielsen said in a Federal Register notice posted in January that the goal was to deter illegal crossings.

Critics on Wednesday questioned the \$73 million contract, which is being funded with operations and maintenance money budgeted through the Army Corps of Engineers.

Kevin Bixby, executive director of in Las Cruces, New Mexico, called the spending a travesty and raised concerns about the potential effects on wildlife that live along the international border.

"The wall will not stop people from crossing, but it will cause real harm to our state's wildlife, such as mule deer and Mexican wolves, and further militarize our border communities," he said in an email.

Bids from prospective contractors were solicited online prior to federal officials announcing in January that a waiver had been approved for the New Mexico project. Barnard Construction Co. was among three bidders and was quietly announced as the winner Jan. 23.

While there is no indication of when work could begin, the contract calls for the project to be complete by Feb.

Recent talk has arisen about educators' ability to carry a firearm in order to be able to protect the students and staff in schools. However, due to the many risk factors associated with it, teachers should not be able to legally carry a weapon on school campuses. Gunmen finding their way into the school is the issue. Both the individual and the weapon are at fault for these traumatic events. Without a gun, they are no longer a gunman but just an individual with emotional or mental health issues. If action is taken to prevent these incidents, there will be no need for weapons

Teachers are educators, not police/security guards. Educators are responsible for giving students knowledge about components to be used to become successful in adulthood. Those individuals go through years of provide the students with that opportunity, not how to handle a firearm and when it's appropriate to use it. Even with months to years of

training, teachers still may not be capable of properly using it. Many teachers have even expressed they have no desire

to carry a gun. It would also cause an uncomfortable environment not only for the students, but other teachers that are not carrying. There would be more fear and distraction of the fact that their is weapon in the classroom. Teachers already carry a big responsibility and have a full schedule, adding gun training would only increase their burden and stress levels.

Teachers may demonstrate professionalism in the classroom, but that does

not always mean they are stable. Students can be difficult and frustrating for teachers most of the time. Some teachers get agitated to a point of anger when students talk when told not to, which is understandable. With the right amount of agitation, those select few teachers have the potential to lash out. Combining that with being able to have access to a gun can turn fatal. Most teachers are stable and have high tolerance level, but those other few have a possibility of causing damage.

Students are also bullied and tormented to their breaking point. Those students may go in search for the weapon and when they find it, they will have the intentions of using it to harm those that hurt them. Every individual has their level of tolerance, but when their limit is reached they will direct their rage towards others. With guns in their vicinity, their altered mentality will turn to them as the only resolu-

If teachers were allowed to have weapons, they would most likely be stored in a locked drawer in their desks. Storing the weapon in a locked drawer will be safe to keep from getting into students possession, but it also causes complications for the teachers. When there is an immediate danger situation that calls for the use of the firearm, the teacher has to work quickly to retrieve it. During this time, the intruder may have already invaded the classroom, leaving the weapon with no purpose.

Although a locked gun case can cause issues, using a holster is not an appropriate alternative either. Holstering a gun gives the students an opportunity to steal the gun and with the right amount of power, the students can overpower the teacher. Students in possession of a gun will end in more lives being taken. Weapons being encased are not helpful in a dangerous situation, and holstered are not safe for the classroom.

The idea of guns being allowed in the classroom will have other problems to follow. Teachers, even after months of training, may not be capable of using a firearm or have the mental capacity. Students are still kids, although some may be mature and knowledgeable, others may not be.

Schools are teaching institu-

tions, not police departments. Teachers shouldn't have to worry about the burden and responsibility of carrying a gun. There are other alternatives to these situations like gun reform, which will decrease the amount of school shootings and the need for teachers to carry weapons. The amount of negative feedback outweighs the positive, which is why teachers shouldn't be allowed to carry.





made up 2018, there have been a total of 18 firearm related incidents in schools. Two of those incidents began with a student taking the firearm from the educator and shooting it "unintentionally." According to politifact. com, in 2018 alone there have been 27 killed on a school campus

use a firearm if necessary, sat outside the building as an armed gunmen mercilessly fired at the students and staff, killing 17 and in-

juring 12. Twenty-two percent of school shooters have said that they were bullied, and they hit their breaking point. The staff on campus could have a mental breakdown, and allowing them to carry a firearm already gives them an advantage. Many think that giving guns to the staff will be safer for the students, but one out of every five American adult has been diagnosed with some sort of mental illness in the last year. This is the equivalent to teenage statistics stating that one out of every five American teenager has been diagnosed with a mental disorder at some point in their adolescent years. A shocking statistic like this needs to be taken into account when considering the

implications that firearms in our

schools could have.

By allowing weapons on campus, the protection rate lowers, and the chances of another school shooting are more probable. A single school shooting is far too many. 

Rockets start fast, beat Clippers 105-92 for 14th straight

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Doc Rivers said. Houston Rockets really didn't need an exclamation point to their dominating first quarter Wednesday night. James Harden provided one anyway.

The Rockets had already blown past the Clippers when Harden juked Wesley Johnson so badly, the defender stumbled and fell flat to the floor. Harden looked down at him for a long moment before calmly drilling a 3-pointer to give Houston a 31-7 lead.

Houston's 14th consecutive victory was in hand early and the Rockets went on to win 105-92.

Harden scored 17 of his 25 points in the first quarter, but claimed he wasn't trying to stare down the floored Johnson.

"I was just trying to figure out what he was doing," Harden said. "I didn't know.

"I was looking at him and he was looking at me," Harden said. "I was thinking, 'What are you doing?' I was going to shoot it, but I was waiting to figure out what was going on. I was confused. And then I shot it."

The Clippers had played the previous night in Denver, while

the Rockets had the day off. "I'm thinking, "This is not a good matchup," Clippers coach

"You could see it early. We were just dead. That's the slowest game that we've played in eight weeks. I tried every lineup but it just wasn't there. You could see it on their faces, but there was nothing you could do about it."

The Clippers rallied from 19 points down to beat Denver the previous night, but could not overcome their dismal start, never getting closer than eight

Not against a confident Houston team that is absolutely rolling. The Rockets (48-13) matched their longest winning streak of the season and remained a halfgame ahead of Golden State for the NBA's best record.

"We just feel like we can win every game right now," said Rockets coach Mike D'Antoni.

Clint Capela and Eric Gordon each scored 22 points for the Rockets, who made 13 3-pointers. Capela added 14 rebounds.

Tobias Harris led the Clippers with 24 points, with Montrezl Harrell added 22. Lou Williams and Milos Teodosic each scored

The Clippers missed 16 of their first 19 shots, had 11 turnovers and trailed by as many as 27

points in the first quarter. Los Angeles shot 22.7 percent (5 of 22) for the period and trailed 34-12 at the end of the quar-

"Offensively, we can score," Harden said. "That's not the problem. Defensively when we're able to communicate and move our bodies and help each other out, we're at another level."

Davis, Pelicans rally past Spurs after Aldridge injury

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — The New Orleans Pelicans took advantage of yet another Spurs injury to tighten the Western Conference playoff race even further.

Anthony Davis had 26 points and 15 rebounds, and New Orleans rallied in the final two minutes to beat San Antonio 121-116 on Wednesday night, adding to the Spurs' misery after losing LaMarcus Aldridge to an injury in the first half.

"We had that a little bit down the stretch today, we felt sorry (for ourselves)," San Antonio veteran Manu Ginobili said. "We said OK, we are missing a lot of guys and we stopped executing when we needed it the most."

New Orleans overcame a 15-point deficit and won its seventh straight to move within a half-game of San Antonio, which dropped a game behind Minnesota for third in the West.

"We just kept battling," New Orleans coach Alvin Gentry said. "We weren't playing the greatest. I thought we were kind of a half a step slow in everything we were doing and they were attacking us. We were having trouble controlling the dribble penetration but we just kept plugging away and plugging away."

San Antonio, which has been without superstar forward Kawhi Leonard for all but nine games this season, lost Aldridge to a sprained right ankle late when he landed awkwardly while defending a driving hook shot by Davis with three minutes left in

the second quarter. The injury would prove critical down the stretch for the Spurs, who've lost five of six. The team did not immediately disclose how long Aldridge will be

Jrue Holiday finished with 25 points and Rajon Rondo added 13 points and 12 assists for the Peli-

Rudy Gay had 19 points for the Spurs and Dejounte Murray scored 18.

The Spurs surged to a 60-51 lead at the half, and Holiday said Gentry's halftime speech "lit a fire" under the Pelicans.

New Orleans responded by outscoring San Antonio 70-56 in the second half, including a 34-21 ad-

vantage in the fourth quarter. "We were beating ourselves," Davis said. "A lot of turnovers and bad shots. A lot of stuff was coming easy for them. In order for us to win this game we

had to buckle down defensively." Davis' alley-oop dunk gave New Orleans its first lead at 114-113 with just under 2 minutes left.

Charles A. 1932, In Lindbergh Jr., the 20-monthold son of Charles and Anne Lindbergh, was kidnapped from the family home near Hopewell, New Jersey. (Remains identified as those of the child were found the following May.)

In 1940, "Native Son" by Richard Wright was first published by Harper & Brothers.

In 1954, four Puerto Rican nationalists opened fire from the spectators' gallery of the U.S. House of Representatives, wounding five members of Congress. The United States detonated a dry-fuel hydrogen bomb. codenamed Castle Bravo, at

Bikini Atoll in the Marshall Islands. In 1961, President John F. Kennedy signed an executive order establishing the

Peace Corps. In 1968, Johnny Cash married June Carter at the First Methodist Church Franklin, Kentucky.

In 1971, a bomb went off inside a men's room at the U.S. Capitol; the radical Weather group Underground claimed responsibility for the predawn blast.

In 1981, Irish Republican Army member Bobby Sands began a hunger strike at the Maze Prison in Northern Ireland; he died 65 days

In 1990, the controversial Seabrook, New Hampshire, nuclear power plant won federal permission to go on line after two decades of protests and legal struggles.

Ten years ago: President George W. Bush, speaking at his Texas ranch, declined to promise more U.S. troop withdrawals from Iraq before leaving, underscoring the need for a strong military presence during Iraqi provincial elections. The USS New York, an amphibious assault ship built with scrap steel from the ruins of the World Trade Center, was christened at Avondale, Louisiana. New York's famed Plaza Hotel reopened after a three-year, \$400 million renovation.

Five years ago: President Barack Obama, still deadlocked with Republican congressional leaders, formally enacted \$85 billion in acrossthe-board spending cuts a few hours before the midnight deadline required by Actress Bonnie law. Franklin, who played divorced mom Ann Romano on the long-running sitcom "One Day at a Time," died in Los Angeles at age 69.

One year ago: Former Montana Rep. Ryan Zinke was sworn in as secretary of the Interior Department by Vice President Mike Pence hours after being confirmed by the Senate by a vote of 68-31. The president of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences, Cheryl Boone Isaacs, told The Associated Press that the two accountants responsible for the best-picture flub at the Academy Awards (in which "La La Land" was initially named the winner instead of "Moonlight") would never work the Oscars again. Paula Fox, author of "Poor George" and "Desperate Characters," died in New York at age 93.



AP Sports Writer TOKYO (AP) — The schoolchildren have had their say: A pair of futuristic digital characters will be the mascots for the Tokyo 2020 Olympics and Paralympics.

Organizers unveiled the winning designs at a school in Tokyo on Wednesday.

A total of 205,755 classes at 16,769 elementary schools took part in selecting three short-listed designs, with their classes casting a single

vote. The winning pair, clad in the 'ichimatsu" checkered pattern of the Games' official logo, re-

ceived 109,041 votes.

"The Tokyo 2020 Olympic and Paralym-

pic Games finally have their mascots," said Ryohei Miyata, head of the mascot selection panel. "This means a lot, especially in Japan. I cannot wait to see these two characters coming to life in the stadiums, on the streets and on TV."

The selection process was introduced to get students enthusiastic about the games while also ensuring transpar-

The original logo was scrapped due to plagiarism allegations.

The designer of the winning mascots is Ryo Taniguchi, who graduated as an art major from Cabrillo College in California, and is currently active as a character designer/illustra-







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
