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

The city has a contingency plan in place for this type of event, said Big Spring's Public Works Director Johnny Womack.

"We, the city, are starting this weekend to make sure every storage facility we have is topped full of water," Womack said. "In fact, we may overrun some of them to make sure they're completely full so that when they kill our water supply Tuesday night, we should have enough water until they get it back on."

While normal use shouldn't be a problem, Womack asks that city residents exercise a little common sense during the shutdown.

"Everybody should have water. All that we're asking is don't waste water. Don't go out Wednesday and decide to water your yard and wash all your cars at the house," he said. "We're just asking for everybody to conserve so we can feel comfortable we have enough water.'

Big Spring Fire Chief Craig Ferguson said the fire department will also be ready for the shutdown.

"We've got all the city tanks completely full, or we will have. We're keeping all our trucks up and running and full. We are partnering with the Howard County Volunteers to use any tankers that they have. The Street Department has a couple of good-sized water tankers that are on trailers that we can fill up and use just in case. And the main thing is, just pray that we don't have anything," Ferguson said. "If we had something that looked like it was going to be an ongoing...say, a structure fire, we'd go ahead and call (Howard County Volunteer Fire Department) Chief (Tommy) Sullivan with the Volunteers. They've got two 5,000-gallon tankers. They'd go ahead and bring those in, so we'd have those standing by right there in case we needed them. Let's go extreme; if by some kind of chance we ran out of that water, what we could do is we would go to Comanche Trail Lake, for example, and we could siphon out of that and into one of the tanks, and shuttle it to wherever the fire is."

Womack said the city also plans to use the opportunity provided by the lack of water flowing into the water treatment plant to do some much-needed maintenance of its own.

"Since there's no water coming into the plant, we're going to do some maintenance things ourselves that we've been needing to do but been putting off," he said. "Now that there's no water coming in, we can do some repairs for ourselves as well."

Hawks win big against Midland College





Opening lead jack of spades. This deal occurred in the 1984 World Team Olympiad in the qualifying-round match between the two teams that for the previous had dominated quarter-century bridge, the United States and Italy. On this occasion, the Americans easily won the 20-deal encounter, with the hand shown contributing significantly to the victory. When Bobby Wolff of the U.S. was declarer at three notrump, he won the spade lead with the king and led a heart to the queen. East won and returned a spade to West's ace, and a third spade was taken by dummy's queen.

Wolff now crossed to the heart ace and led the diamond queen, covered by the king and ace. The jack of hearts was then cashed, producing this position:



Next came the nine of hearts, East and South each discarding a club while poor West found himself in dire straits. If he parted with a diamond or a club, South would score the game-going trick in whichever suit West discarded. And if he let go of a spade, declarer could afford to lose a diamond to the ten to guarantee the contract.

In practice, West discarded a diamond, whereupon Wolff cashed the diamond jack and finished with 10 tricks in all.

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At the other table, the play to the matter, especially in first six tricks was identical. But after the Q-K-A of diamonds, the Italian these days leading declarer did not cash his hearts. Instead he elected to finesse the nine of diamonds, and when West won and cashed his spades, South was down one to give the U.S. a 480point gain on the deal.

Gordon, Paul lead Harden-less Rockets past Mavericks 105-82

DALLAS (AP) — When the Houston Rockets' MVP candidate needs a night off, they can simply elevate the NBA's Sixth Man of the Year to the starting lineup.

Or turn the ball over to an eighttime all-NBA point guard.

That's why they have the best record in the league - as Houston showed without James Harden on Sunday night. Eric Gordon scored 26 points and Chris Paul had 24 points and 12 assists as the Rockets beat the Dallas Mavericks 105-82.

Harden sat because of a sore left knee, but the team had plenty of 3-point shooting even without him.

"What's that? Thirty points a night?" Paul said of Harden's absence. "But it just gave other guys an opportunity to step up."

Houston, which had its 17-game win streak snapped Friday in Toronto, broke the game open in the third quarter after leading by only one at the break. The Rockets hit their first six 3s of the period amid a 22-10 run. They finished 17 for 45 from beyond the arc, with Gordon going 6 for 11.

Paul either scored or assisted on the first 20 points of the quarter and finished the quarter with 12 points and five assists as Houston outscored Dallas 32-16.

"He orchestrated a great game, but he has done that for about 15 years," coach Mike D'Antoni said.

Houston clinched a playoff spot with the win. When asked about that achievement after the game, Gordon said: "I'd much rather have that No. 1 seed."

On that front, the Rockets moved 1¹/₂ games ahead of Golden State for the best record in the NBA after the

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Warriors lost to Minnesota earlier Sunday. Houston also holds the tie breaker on Golden State should the teams finish with identical records.

Houston also swept the four-game season series from the Mavericks for the second year in a row.

Dwight Powell led the Mavericks with 20 points, one short of his career high, on 9-of-11 shooting. Harrison Barnes added 14. Dallas shot just 35 percent from the field, a figure that looks even worse in the context of Powell's night.

A TON OF BRICKS

Dallas finished 33 for 94 from the field. Barnes shot 4 of 16, Dennis Smith was 2 of 12, and J.J. Barea was 2 of 9, though he had 13 assists.

From 3-point range, the Mavericks made a season-low five shots on 31 attempts, and even Dallas' normally reliable free-throw shooting was off The team averages 77 percent from the line but hit just 11 of 18 (61 per cent) Sunday.

"They are a great team, even with out Harden," Mavericks coach Rick Carlisle said. "They did what they had to do, and we just couldn't make enough shots."
