With regard to downy mildew and head smut, each hybrid was labeled as to the percent of infection. MDMV ratings were given as "very tolerant, tolerant, intermediate, susceptible and very susceptible.'

'THE information we have obtained from these tests should be mutually beneficial to both producers and commercial seed companies," pointed out the pathologists. "And it should be valid for all grain sorghum producing areas.

With this information, producers will know the disease reaction of the hybrid they select. Of course, they need to consider only those disease ratings for the diseases that occur in their fields. For example, if downy mildew is a problem, a hybrid should be selected that has a high yield potential and The US Dept. of Agriculture is resistant to that particular
