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BSISD cancels Tuesday program over shooting threat rumor

A rumored shooting threat targeting Big Spring High School might have been just

the Big Spring Independent School District to cancel a planned pre-K program at the high school Tuesday. According to Big Spring

Human Resources Director George Bancroft, BSISD is taking steps to calm fears generated by the rumor. "We investigated the rumor,

that: rumor. But it prompted Independent School District and did not find any evidence of there being any truth to the rumor," he said. "We had some police on campus today to just kind of calm people's fears, and we did cancel a

program at the high school. The pre-K students were supposed to come do a program at the high school."

Council ponders disposal of demolition waste By ROGER CLINE to tear down half as many

Discussion about disposal

of debris remaining after the demolition of dilapidated dwellings led the docket at the Big Spring City Council meeting Tuesday evening. The council met in their

chambers at 5:30 p.m. Tues-Discussion on what to do

with the demolition leftovers arose when District Six Councilman Jim DePauw questioned an item on the Consent Items list for the meeting - the final reading of an ordinance approving the \$25,000 fund for demolishing dilapidated structures in town. DePauw questioned why the remnants were being sent to an out-of-town landfill, rather than using the Big Spring landfill. "We're setting

\$25,000. We're doing a budget amendment for \$25,000. So it depends on what size houses you have to haul off, and where you take that waste,"

your costs are going to dou-

ble. You're going to be able

houses. So I think we want to get as much bang for our buck, and tear down as many down, and put it all in our own landfill, instead of hauling it out of town." Big Spring Public Works

Director Johnny Wommack said transporting the demolition trash to an out-of-town landfill and paying for its disposal would be significantly more expensive than disposing of it locally. "Somewhere between

\$7,000 to \$10,000, depending on where they're taking it," City Manager Todd Darden said the local landfill charges

a \$45 per ton fee for an enterprise fund, which the city would have to pay to dispose of the debris, as well as the cost to tear down the houses and haul them to the landfill. Other city council mem-

bers, including District 2's Carmen Harbour, District 3's Terry McDaniel, and District 5's Raul Benavides, seemed to agree with DePauw's assessment.

Gunman wounds 2 Dallas police officers, store employee

DALLAS (AP) — A man who shot and critically wounded two Dallas police officers and hurt an employee at a home improvement store led law enforcement on a high-speed car chase before he was captured in a late-night arrest. The two officers and the store loss-prevention

officer underwent surgery for their injuries after the shooting Tuesday afternoon at the Home Depot store in the north of the city, Dallas Police Chief U. Renee Hall said late Tuesday. She asked for continued prayers for their recovery. Authorities on Wednesday identified the in-

jured officers as Crystal Almeida and Rogelio Santander, both with the police force for three years. They are in critical condition, as is the Home Depot employee who also was shot. All three underwent surgery. Dallas police Sgt. Michael Mata told KDFW-TV

that Santander is "gravely, gravely ill" and that Almeida is "severely injured" but "fighting hard." "It's going to be a tough day today," Mata said.

Police arrested Armando Luis Juarez, 29, on charges of aggravated assault on a public servant and felony theft. He was taken into custody shortly before 10 p.m. "We got our man," Dallas Mayor Mike Rawl-

Rawlings said he remains "upset at the lack of respect for our police in this city and in our country." In 2016, four Dallas police officers and a transit

officer were shot dead by a sniper in an ambush that came toward the end of a peaceful protest over the police killings of black men in other cit-Juarez was arrested in January on a charge of

The district issued a press release about the rumor Monday: "There has been activity on social media in the last 24 hours alleging that a student or students have threatened to do harm to students on the BSHS campus. According to one post, a student made a threat within hearing of a teacher. This allegation has been thoroughly investigated by the campus administration, and local law enforcement has been consulted. No evidence has been found that any student or students have made threats of the any nature, let alone those alleged in the social media post. We have no reason to believe students are in any danger at school tomorrow. The Big Spring ISD administration will continue to be vigilant in protecting its students and staff." BSISD also issued an update Tuesday morning:

"After further investigation overnight, there still has been no evidence found to substantiate the rumor of a student threatening gun violence on the high school campus today or any other day. In response to the heightened concern caused by the rumor, the Big Spring Police Department will be present on campus today, and the scheduled program for our pre-Kindergarten students has been cancelled. We hope to be able to reschedule that program. Please know that the Big Spring ISD's primary concern is always the safety of our students and staff."

HOUSTON — Former President George H.W. Bush was "responding and recovering" to treatment at a Houston hospital on Tuesday for an infection that had spread to his blood, according to a family spokesman.

Bush has been hospitalized since Sunday, a day after attending the funeral of his wife, Barbara, who died last week at age 92. The couple was married 73 years, longer than any other U.S. presidential couple.

In a brief post on Twitter, family spokesman Jim McGrath said he could "happily" echo his report from Monday that the 93-year-old former president was "responding to treatments and appears to be recovering." George H.W. Bush

had used a wheelchair and an electric scooter for mobility since developing a form of Parkinson's disease, and he has needed hospital treatment several times in recent years for respiratory problems and other infections.

McGrath wouldn't elaborate Tuesday on the specifics of Bush's condition, saying only that he would issue updates "when we have something to update." Late Monday, McGrath described Bush as eager to get well so he could get to his summer home Kennebunkport. Maine.

"He's the most goaloriented person on this planet," McGrath said. "I wouldn't bet against

Oral arguments finished in Texas Redistricting Case

Both sides in the lawsuit presented oral arguments to SCOTUS on Tuesday.

AUSTIN - Today, the Supreme Court heard oral arguments in the Texas Congressional and State House redistricting cases. State Rep. Eddie Rodriguez is a named plaintiff

in the lawsuit on behalf of Travis County voters. He also serves as Policy Chair for the Mexican American Legislative Caucus, a co-plaintiff in the litigation. Renea Hicks, Rep. Rodriguez's attorney and former solicitor general of Texas, delivered arguments on behalf of the Rodriguez plaintiffs and all other plaintiffs in the Texas Congressional case. Rep. Rodriguez is in Washington D.C. for the hearing and will be available for comment.

State Rep. Eddie Rodriguez issued the following statement regarding the redistricting case:

"Today in the chambers of the United States Supreme Court, we continued the fight for the idea that all people are entitled to equal representation in their government.

"It's been a long road. As a lead plaintiff in the Texas Congressional redistricting case, I've worked with my attorney for seven years against Republican state officials who didn't blink at spending millions of taxpayer dollars during a tough economic time on defending the political advantage their party built around a foundation of racial discrimination. During that time, millions of Texans had their ability to cast a meaningful vote for candidates of their choosing curtailed by gerrymandered districts.

"We believe in the strength of our arguments and the justice of our cause. We have prevailed in federal court before and know the Texas Legislature is guilty of intentional discrimination. We also recognize that without intervention by the Court, there is nothing stopping Republicans from drawing discriminatory maps after the next census and using delay tactics to hold up the process at the expense of Texas taxpayers yet again.

Iran says if US exits deal, it likely will too

NEW YORK — Iran's top diplomat warned the Trump administration on Tuesday that a U.S. withdrawal from the nuclear deal would undermine talks with North Korea by proving that America reneges on its promises, telling The Associated Press that Iran would "most likely" abandon the deal

In a wide-ranging interview, Foreign Minister Mohammad Javad Zarif said his country would no longer be bound by international obligations imposed as part of the landmark 2015 accord, freeing up Iran to resume enrichment far beyond the deal's strict limits. He said any move by President Donald Trump to re-impose sanctions lifted under the deal would "amount to basically killing the

"If the United States were to withdraw from the nuclear deal, the immediate consequence in all likelihood would be that Iran would reciprocate and withdraw," Zarif said. He added: "There won't be any deal for Iran to stay in."

As Trump prepares for a high-stakes summit North Korean leader Kim Jong Un aimed at resolving nuclear weapons concerns, Zarif emphasized that U.S. credibility was at stake. He said Iran would welcome lower tensions on the Korean Peninsula, but that Trump was showing the world that the U.S. is "not a trustworthy, reliable negotiating partner."

"They're prepared to take everything that you've given, then renege on the promises that they have made in the deal," Zarif said. "That makes the United States a rather unlikely partner in any international agreement. And unfortunately this track record is not just limited to the nuclear deal. It includes the Paris climate agreement, the Trans-Pacific Partnership, and a lot of other freely undertaken commitments of the United States."

Iran has been working feverishly to frame Trump's expected withdrawal as a major blot on the United States, just as America's closest allies in Europe try to persuade the president not to rip it up. As Zarif spoke in New York on Tuesday, Trump was meeting at the White House with French President Emmanuel Macron, who has been leading an effort by France, Britain and Germany to find "fixes" to the deal that would satisfy Trump's objec-

Few expect such a solution can be found by May 12, the date on which Trump has said he'll leave the deal if there's no fix agreed to with the Europeans. U.S. and European officials say they've made major progress on two of Trump's demands — on nuclear inspections and Iran's ballistic missiles program. But talks have stalemated on

demand: that the deal be extended perpetuity, rather than letting restrictions Tehran to "sunset" after sev-

eral years. "No one knows what I'm going to do on the 12th, although Mr. President, you have a pretty good idea," Trump said, referring to Macron. He said if he does withdraw, he would look to see "if it will be possible to do a new deal with solfoundations, because this is a deal with decayed foundations."

In a bleak warning to Tehran. Trump added that if Iran ever threatens United countries have ever paid."

Iran has outright rejected any changes to the deal, arguing that it's unfair to impose more demands beyond what Tehran agreed to already. Trump's strategy relies on the assumption that if the U.S. and the Europeans unilaterally agree to new demands, Iran will back down and voluntarily comply in order to continue enjoying the benefits. Under the 2015 deal brokered by President Barack Obama and world powers, Iran agreed to nuclear restrictions in exchange for billions in sanctions relief.


And even if a so-called addon deal with the Europeans is achieved, there is no guarantee it will satisfy Trump. His closest aides have said they can't predict with certainty what conditions would be enough to keep him in the pact.

Iran has long insisted its nuclear program was peaceful and not oriented toward building weapons. Yet in the interview, Zarif suggested that those concerned that Tehran was ing toward a bomb would have much more to fear if it were no longer bound by limits on its enrichment and processing.

"It would be a completely different situation, from the perspective of those who made a lot of noise about Iran's nuclear program to begin with," he

He also pointed out that if Trump upends the nuclear deal, Iran could also choose to leave the global Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty, which is aimed at stopping the spread of nuclear weapons. Iran signed that treaty decades ago, and though Zarif said Iran's government isn't advocating an exit, it is "one of the options that is being advocated by some" in Iran.

Addressing the conflict in Yemen, he said Iran is urging "everybody" to stop attacking civilian areas — including the Houthis. The Iran-backed Shiite rebels control much of Yemen and have been lobbing missiles at Saudi Arabia, which is leading a coalition fighting the Houthis with support from the U.S.

The United States and others insist that Iran is illicitly funneling missiles and other weapons to the Houthis, a charge that Tehran has repeatedly denied. U.S. Ambassador to the U.N. Nikki Haley has paraded missile parts ostensibly recovered in Saudi Arabia in front of reporters and U.N. Security Council diplomats, arguing that they bear markings and other characteristics proving their Iranian origin.

"I'm not saying Ambassador Haley is fabricating, but somebody is fabricating the evidence she is showing," Zarif

As Trump pushes to withdraw U.S. troops from Syria as soon as possible, Zarif gave no signs that Iran plans to do the same. The Iranian military advisers and Iran-backed Shiite militias aiding Syrian President Bashar Assad are a profound concern for the United States and its closest Mideast ally, Israel.

"We are there as long as that objective needs our presence, and as long as the Syrian government asks us to be there," Zarif said.

Carlos Lara told reporters that a detective was tipped to the suspect's presence by some construction workers and confronted Reinking, who lay down on the ground to be handcuffed. He carried a black backpack with a silver semiautomatic weapon and .45-cali-

ber ammunition. formally Reinking was charged late Monday with four counts of criminal homicide.

The arrest ended a 24-hour manhunt involving more than 160 law enforcement officers, but it left troubling unanswered questions about official responses to months of bizarre behavior before the restaurant attack, including encounters with police in Illinois and Colorado and an arrest at the White House that raised red flags.

Last July, Reinking was arrested by the U.S. Secret Service after he entered a restricted area near the White House and refused to leave, saying he wanted to meet President Donald Trump.

The suspect told Washington, D.C., police he was a sovereign citizen and had a right to inspect the grounds, according to an incident report.

Reinking was not armed, but at the FBI's request, Illinois police revoked his state firearms card. Four guns, including the AR-15 used in the shootings, were transferred to his father, a procedure allowed under Illinois law.

chronic bronchitis, a constant irritation of the lining of tubes that carry air to one's lungs. His doctors said chronic bronchitis is a condition more prevalent with age and can aggravate the symptoms of pneumonia. Bush was also hospitalized, for 16 days, in January 2017 for pneumonia. During that hospital stay, which included time in intensive care, doctors inserted a breathing tube and connected him to a ventilator.

He was hospitalized in 2015 in Maine after falling at home and breaking a bone in his neck. In December 2014, he was hospitalized for about a week for shortness of breath, and he spent Christmas 2012 in intensive care for a bronchitis-re-

lated cough and other issues. People in their 90s with Parkinson's disease are often at higher risk of pneumonia and other infections because their swallowing process can be compromised, said Dr. David Reuben, a professor of geriatric medicine at the UCLA medical school in Los Angeles.

"And the stress of losing a loved one can weaken the immune system," he said.

Bacterial infections are treated with antibiotics, he said, while viral infections require other treatments. Infections that spread to the

blood usually are not viral, however, he said.

The prognosis for such a case would depend on several factors, including heart rate, blood pressure and oxygenation, Reuben said.

"The more of these parameters are abnormal, the more serious the case is," he said.



Today's Highlight in History: On April 25, 1898, the United States Congress declared war on Spain; the 10-week conflict resulted in an American victo-

On this date:

In 404 B.C., the Peloponnesian War ended as Athens surrendered to Sparta.

In 1507, a world map produced by German cartographer Martin Waldseemueller contained the first recorded use of the term "America," in honor of Italian navigator Amerigo Vespucci (vehs-POO'-chee).

In 1792, French highwayman Nicolas Jacques Pelletier became the first person to be executed by the guillotine.

In 1915, during World War I, Allied soldiers invaded the Gallipoli (guh-LIHP'-uh-lee) Peninsula in an unsuccessful attempt to take the Ottoman Empire out of the war.

In 1945, during World War II, U.S. and Soviet forces linked up on the Elbe (EL'-beh) River, a meeting that dramatized the collapse of Nazi Germany's defenses. Delegates from some 50 countries gathered in San Francisco to organize the United Nations.

In 1959, the St. Lawrence Seaway opened to shipping.

In 1964, vandals sawed off the head of the "Little Mermaid" in Copenhagen, statue Denmark.

the "Carnation In 1974, Revolution" took place in Portugal as a bloodless military coup toppled the Estado Novo regime.

In 1983, 10-year-old Samantha Smith of Manchester, Maine, received a reply from Soviet leader Yuri V. Andropov to a letter she'd written expressing her concerns about nuclear war; Andropov gave assurances that the Soviet Union did not want war, and invited Samantha to visit his country,

a trip she made in July. In 1990, the Hubble Space Telescope was deployed in orbit from the space shuttle Discovery. (It was later discovered that the telescope's primary mirror was flawed, requiring the installation of corrective components to achieve

optimal focus.) In 1993, hundreds of thousands of gay rights activists and their supporters marched in Washington, D.C., demanding equal rights and freedom

from discrimination. In 2002, Lisa "Left Eye" Lopes of the Grammy-winning trio

TLC died in an SUV crash in Honduras; she was 30.

Ten years ago: Three New York police detectives were acquitted in the 50-shot killing of Sean Bell, an unarmed black man, on his wedding day; as news of the verdict spread, many in a crowd outside the courthouse began weeping, while others were enraged, swearing and screaming "Murderers! Murderers!" or "KKK!"

Five years ago: President Barack Obama consoled a rural Texas community rocked by a deadly fertilizer plant explosion that killed 15 people, telling mourners during a memoservice at Baylor University they were not alone in their grief. President Barack Obama joined his four living predecessors to dedicate the George W. Bush Presidential Center in Dallas. Reggaeton star Don Omar was the top winner of the Billboard Latin Music Awards in Coral Gables,

Florida, taking home 10 prizes. One year ago: A federal judge blocked President Donald Trump's attempt to withhold funding from "sanctuary cities" that did not cooperate with U.S. immigration officials, saying the president had no authority to attach new conditions to federal spending. Ivanka Trump drew groans and hisses from an audience in Berlin while defending her father's attitude toward women, but brushed the negative reaction aside as "politics" during her first overseas trip as a White House adviser.

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College commission's plea to NBA: Bring back prep-to-pros

NEW YORK — The commission proposing reforms to college basketball wants 18-year-olds to be eligible again for the NBA draft, and the NBA Players Association would make that deal today.

Change will take longer than that. NBA Commissioner Adam Silver senses the league's age limit isn't working. Requiring U.S. players to be 19 years old and one year removed from high school has sent many of them to a year of college they don't want, and delayed the full-time bas-

ketball instruction pro teams prefer.

But whether the league would agree




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ROGER'S RETRO REVIEWS: BENJI







In the second half of the 20th Century, there were quite a few dogs made into canine movie and TV stars. I'm talking such hits as Rin-Tin-Tin, Lassie,

Toto, Air Buddy, Beethoven, Hooch, etc. etc. etc. One such movie star dog got his start as I was heading into kindergarten:

1974's "Benji" sparked a 10-movie franchise based around the scruffy, toomixed-breed smart-for-his-own-good pooch. It was also the final movie for two actors well known on the small screen: Frances Bavier (Aunt Bee from "The Andy Griffith Show" and other Mayberry shows) and Edgar Buchanan (Uncle Joe from "The Beverly Hillbillies," "Green

those shows were linked...). Both Bavier and Buchanan were also well-known as character actors, both on TV and in movies. The original show in the franchise (the one we're Bill informs Benji that

talking about here) was filmed in and around Denton, Texas. Benji follows the antics of the ownerless pooch

as he starts his day in an abandoned mansion where he shelters nights, and then follows a circuit, meeting human friends, finding food, and then eventually returning to the mansion for the evening. Along his way he stops off at the Chapman home, where Dr. Chapman (Peter Breck) is raising two kids, Paul and Cindy (Allen Fiuzat and Cynthia Smith) with the help of housekeeper/gov-

erness Mary (Patsy Garrett). Dr. Chapman doesn't like the dog (something to do with his brother getting bitten by a dog as a child), but Mary helps the children conceal their daily meetings with

> Benji as they feed him, pet him, and try to figure out a way to convince the good doctor to let them adopt him. After leaving the Chapmans, Benji trees

a cat in the back yard of a lady watering her begonias (Bavier). She berates him, calling him a "barbarian." From there he meets with police officer Tutle (Terry Carter), who tells the pooch he's gotten engaged, and advises Benji to find his own love. Moving on, Benji performs his daily duty of waking Bill (Bu-

chanan), owner of Bill's Café, from his morning slumber in a chair outside the establishment. he might make the decision to close the café in a week or so, but probably wouldn't actually close up shop for another couple of years. He gives

Benji his payment for waking him – a meaty bone and Benji heads on to rummage through a garbage can before heading back to the mansion.

At the mansion, he's startled when three burglars break in - Linda (Deborah Walley), Henry (Christopher Connelly), and Riley (Tom Lester). The men are nervous about local legends that the place is haunted, but Linda plans to use it as a base of operations for a plan the group's leader Mitch (Mark Slade) has cooked up. The plan involves coercing money out of Dr. Chapman by threatening the kids; but things go sideways when Mitch actually kidnaps the siblings.

I'll stop the narrative there.

"Benji" is a very dated movie. The Chapman kids well, all the characters – talk and act like what they are: Characters in a 1970s kids' movie. There's a qualitative difference between characters in this movie and others of its era, and later kids movies such as, say, 2011's "Hugo" or 2001's "Harry Potter and the Sorcerer's Stone" (Wow! Do you know how hard it is to find modern live-action kids' movies these days? There aren't a lot). The opening and closing music, "I Feel Love" (also known as "Benji's Theme"), performed by country star Charlie Rich, is very much a '70s song in the vein of "Raindrops Keep Fallin' On My Head" or the Coke jingle of the era "I'd Like To Buy the World a Coke."

That said, "Benji" is an innocent movie about a cute dog doing cute dog things in small-town America. It's a part of my childhood, and watching it again for this review was a trip down memory lane.

I would predict young kids and unjaded adults will love "Benji," teenagers might be a bit too "cool" for this movie. Eight and a half stars out of



LAS VEGAS (AP) — The Walt Disney Studios has previewed a scene from the Star Wars spinoff "Solo" featuring the card game where Han Solo and Lando Calrissian meet at CinemaCon Tuesday in Las Vegas. The scene cuts off right as the two space scoundrels decide to bet their ships.

The studio also unveiled early footage from its live-action adaption of "Dumbo" and "Aladdin," starring Will Smith as the Genie, and showed the first scene from "The Incredibles 2," which picks up right where the first left off in 2004.

Both "Solo: A Star Wars" story and "The Incredibles 2" hit theaters this summer.

Unlike most studio presentations at the annual theater owner convention, Disney doesn't generally bring out the stars of its films. Instead it lets the footage and behind-the-scenes reels do the selling.





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
