

Little leagues and other youth sports organizations across Texas will get a couple

of tax breaks starting Sept. 1. THIS TAX relief comes as the result of a small tax reduction bill passed by the Legislature.

The sales tax division of my office will prepare rules and regulations for provisions in the new law which will exempt little league sporting groups from having to pay sales tax on the uniforms and equipment they use.

But let me point out that the legislation is very specific in stating that the new exemption applies only to a league organization itself and does not apply to individuals who play in that league.

This means that league officers can go to the sporting goods store and buy uniforms and equipment for everyone playing in the league and that purchase won't be subject to the sales tax. But Johnny or Johnny's dad will still have to pay the sales tax when they make purchases individually.

31st is deadline for tax reports

"LATE REPORTS are nothing but headaches for the taxayer and for the Comptroller's Office, "Bullock said. "I'd like to see every quarterly report filed on the deadline.

Reports due July 31 cover the April-May-June quarter. Forms for the reports were sent to all sales tax permit holders by Bullock's office in June.



History of a thunderstorm

THESE RADAR overlays, compiled by Atmospherics, Inc., show the lifespan of the June 23 thunderstorm that dropped Castro County. The pinpoint in the center of the scope shows the location of the radar unit, just west of Littlefield, with 10-mile grid lines circling out from it. The smaller circles within the scope show the locations of the area's visual omni-range [VOR] navigational radio transmitting stations. The

heavily bordered area is the territory contracted for weather modification by Atmospherics, Inc., with the western half of two-thirds of an inch to more than two inches of rain over Castro County at the top. The control area also covers portions of Parmer, Lamb and Hale Counties. The shaded areas show the heaviest part of the clouds at different times, where significant rainfall was received. The black spots inside the shaded areas indicate the potential for hail-where the tops of the thunderheads reached the highest altitudes. The first

overlay shows Dimmitt receiving a localized afternoon rain while a heavier thunderhead starts building southwest of Earth. The other overlays show the spread of the clouds and rainfall during the next 7½ hours. Planes operated throughout this period to seed the hail cells with silver iodide. Heavy hail that night wiped out crops outside the control area, near Littlefield, but no significant hail was recorded inside the control area.



Kansas State University, says one official, that some of the state's students have sought admission to a veterinary college which KSU helped organize recently in Nigeria.


Average enrollment in the nation's 19 veterinary colleges is now about 325. And concern is being expressed over the fact that only about 1,300 new veterinarians are being added

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
