Hartman and Miller take Big Spring City Council, School Trustee seats

With only one precinct seat each up for grabs, only 67 voters cast ballots in each of the

Big Spring City Council District 2 election and the Big Spring Independent School District's District 4 race.

179 votes were cast in the Coahoma City Council elec-

tion, and 735 votes were cast in the Coahoma ISD race; in each of those two contests, there were three open atlarge seats available, and voters got to cast three votes.

Doug Hartman took a majority (68.66 percent) of the votes cast in the Big Spring City Council race. Hartman will replace incumbent Car-

men Harbour, who did not run for re-election in the race because she has reached the end of her term limit, having

City Council to canvass election, swear in new Council member

Canvassing votes from Saturday's City Council District 2 election, recognizing outgoing incumbent Carmen Harbour, and swearing in the winner of the race, Doug Hartman, are on the agenda of the Big Spring City Council meeting Tues-

With only 67 people casting ballots in the single-district election, Hartman - an oilfield rig supervisor - prevailed with 68.66 percent of the vote, defeating runners up Eric Escamilla (25.37 percent) and Johnnie Rawls Jr. (5.97 percent).

Harbour did not run for re-election as she has already served two three-year terms, which is the legal term limit for Big Spring council members.

There is a provision on the agenda to approve a runoff election, but that should not be necessary since Hartman received a majority of the total votes.

In other business, the council plans to officially approve on first reading an ordinance renaming the stage and plaza at the Historic Spring the "Marie Hall Plaza and Performance Stage," in honor of F. Marie Hall, creator of Midland's FMH Foundation, which made significant donations to the project's completion; and the pavilion being built in Phase Two of the Historic Spring Restoration Project to the "SM Energy Pavilion" after another prominent donor to the project.

The Council will also:

- · Award an RFQ for engineering services at the McMahon-Wrinkle Airpark. A committee interviewed two firms out of the applications received, and has recommended the firm Freese and Nichols of Lubbock for the job.
- Discuss and consider approval to reestablish Howard County Teen Court.
- · Consider approving the purchase of 43.34 acres of land located between the Airpark and the old Webb Air Force

US abortion clinics face surge of trespassing and blockades

NEW YORK America's abortion clinics experienced a major upsurge in trespassing, obstruction and blockades by anti-abortion activists in 2017, according to an annual survey by an industry group. The National Abortion

Federation report chronicled a litany of actions that ranged from coordinated trespassing efforts by abortion opponents, repeated brick-throwing at windows of a Cleveland clinic and an attempted bombing in Illinois. The report found that

there was an overall decrease in acts of vandalism against clinics but a significant increase in activities aimed at disrupting services and intimidating patients and providers. Acts of trespassing increased from 247 in 2016 to 823 in 2017, instances of obstruction tripled to 1,704 and threats of death or other harm

Many clinics across the U.S. routinely are targeted by legal picketing near their premises. But in some cases, the protests escalated and led to intervention by federal and law enforcement agencies.

At least 10 people were arrested last May when activists anti-abortion blocked the entrance to the EMW Women's Surgical Center in Louisville, Kentucky — the last abortion clinic still operating in the state. Saporta said

Hartman defeated two other candidates: Farmer's Insurance agent Eric Escamilla, who took 17 votes (25.37 percent); and Johnnie Lee Rawls, an oilfield lease manager, who received four votes (5.97 percent).

There were no undervotes - ballots which contain fewer votes than allowed, or votes which are unable to be tabulated for some reason - in the Big Spring City race.

In the BSISD race, Melissa Miller received a majority of the votes with 55.22 percent, or 37 of the 67 votes cast. Miller is the director of institutional assessment for Howard

College. Miller defeated Steven Hobbs, with 16 votes (23.88 percent); and Bond Moughon Ryan, with 14 votes (20.90 per-

There was one undervote recorded in the race.

In the Coahoma City Council race, the three top vote-getters were David Alaman with 61 votes (34.08 percent); Cody Ditto with 50 votes (27.93 percent); and T.J. Rueda with 35 votes (19.55 percent). The fourth candidate, Sharon Dodson, received 33 votes (18.44 percent).

There were 88 undervotes recorded in the Coahoma City Council race. The large number of undervotes is probably the result of people voting for only one or two candidates rather than the full three allowed in the race.

Also a preprinted balloon with the wording "Let it go" will be distributed to each patient who visits the clinic. Staff will encourage consumers to release the balloon as they exit the building. "They may have entered the clinic with a great deal of stress, problems and concerns," Smith said. "But when they walk out, we are encouraging them to let go of all of those emotions.

"In therapy, we have found it's very helpful to picture all your thoughts and problems encapsulated in a balloon and to release them. We are hopeful that this exercise will be beneficial in the future as they work on living with their mental illness."

Refreshments and information will be available at all of the mental health

"Mental Health Month opens streams of dialogue whether it be on social media, in your living room or in the classroom," Smith said. "Mental health organizations are actively pushing stories and information during the month of May using several different hashtags such as #curestigma or #act4mentalhealth. It helps when it's out there so prominently. People who aren't apt to open up about mental illness may find that maybe they can talk

about it if given the opportunity." Children who wear our bracelets may be encouraged to tell their stories instead of keeping it hidden, she said.

"We are always looking for new ways to get our message out there and help people who may be too embarrassed to talk about mental illness."

"Resources are out there," Smith said. "You do not have to travel this road alone."

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CIA nominee offered to withdraw over interrogation program

WASHINGTON (AP) — Gina Haspel, President Donald Trump's nominee to lead the Central Intelligence Agency, offered to withdraw her nomination, two senior administration officials said Sunday, amid concerns that a debate over a harsh interrogation program would tarnish her reputation and that of the CIA.

White House aides on Friday sought out additional details about Haspel's involvement in the CIA's now-defunct program of detaining and brutally interrogating terror suspects after 9/11 as they prepared her for Wednesday's confirmation hearing. This is when she offered to withdraw, the officials

They said Haspel, who is the acting director of the CIA, was reassured that her nomination was still on track and will not withdraw. The officials spoke on the condition of anonymity to discuss internal deliberations. The news was first reported Sunday by The Washington Post.

Haspel, who would be the first woman to lead the CIA, is the first career operations officer to be nominated to lead the agency in decades. She served almost entirely undercover and much of her record is classified. Democrats say she should be disqualified because she was the chief of base at a covert detention site in Thailand where two terrorism suspects were subjected to waterboarding, a technique that simulates drowning.

Haspel has told lawmakers in recent weeks that she would stand firm against any effort to restart the brutal detention and interrogation program, administration officials told The Associated Press on Friday. She is expected to reiterate that publicly this week.

Giuliani confounds, contradicts as he defends Trump in media

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Donald Trump's new attorney, Rudy Giuliani, is delivering confounding and at times contradictory statements as he tries to lessen the legal burdens on his client from an investigation into Russian interference in the 2016 election and a \$130,000 hush payment to a

The former New York City mayor is embracing his client's preferred approach to challenges as he mounts Trump's defense through the media. But it's proving to be a bewildering display.

In an interview Sunday with ABC's "This Week," Giuliani dismissed as rumor his own statements about Trump's payment to adult-film actress Stormy Daniels, said he can't speak to whether the president lied to the American people when he denied knowledge of the silencing agreement and wouldn't rule out the president asserting his Fifth Amendment right against self-incrimination in the Russia investigation. Giuliani also couldn't say whether Trump's personal lawyer, Michael Cohen, had made similar payments to other women on the president's behalf.

Giuliani said despite Trump's openness to sit down with special counsel Robert Mueller in the Russia investigation, he would strongly advise Trump against it.

"I'm going to walk him into a prosecution for perjury like Martha Stewart?" Giuliani asked, referring to the lifestyle maven convicted in 2004 of lying to investigators and obstruction in an insider

Average price of US gas jumps 7 cents, to \$2.90 a gallon

CAMARILLO, Calif. (AP) — The average price of regular-grade gasoline in the U.S. rose 7 cents a gallon over the past two weeks to \$2.90, the 10th week straight of increases.

Industry analyst Trilby Lundberg of the Lundberg Survey said Sunday that the jump marks the highest average price since November 2014.

Lundberg says the increase is largely driven by higher crude oil costs and the phasing-in of summer-grade gasoline, which is used to prevent smog. The highest average price in the contiguous 48

states was \$3.73 in the San Francisco Bay Area. The lowest was \$2.45 in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. The average price for diesel fuel rose 5 cents, to

Hawaii volcano destroys 21 homes, spews lava 200 feet in air

PAHOA, Hawaii (AP) — The number of homes destroyed by Hawaii's Kilauea volcano jumped to 21 Sunday as scientists reported lava spewing more than 200 feet (61 meters) into the air.

Some of the more than 1,700 people who evacuated prepared for the possibility they may not return for quite some time.

Hawaii officials said the decimated homes were in the Leilani Estates subdivision, where molten rock, toxic gas and steam have been bursting through openings in the ground created by the volcano. Officials updated the number of lost homes after an aerial survey of the subdivision. "That number could change," Hawaii County

spokeswoman Janet Snyder said. "This is heartbreaking." Amber Makuakane, 37, a teacher and single

mother of two, said her three-bedroom house in Leilani Estates was destroyed by lava.

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Fatal attack on interracial couple in Arizona heads to trial

PHOENIX (AP) - An interracial couple was walking near a Phoenix park when authorities say a shirtless neo-Nazi began angrily yelling a racial slur and harassing the black man in the couple over dating a white woman.

Authorities say the men exchanged tense words before Travis Ricci rushed back to a home where other white supremacists were partying, grabbed a shotgun and returned in a sedan driven by an associate. Ricci leaned out the car and fired two buckshot blasts, missing the black man — the intended target — and killing his girlfriend, investigators

Lawyers are now picking a jury to decide whether Ricci should be convicted of murder and sentenced to death in the 2009 attack, which prosecutors say was a hate crime. Opening statements are tentatively scheduled for June 6.

The case has offered several unexpected turns.

Ricci, whose defense is expected to include an argument that he's not the man he used to be, claims his great-grandfather was a member of the French Resistance killed by Nazis during World War II.

Authorities are seeking the death penalty, saying 39-year-old Kelly Ann Jaeger's killing was meant

to further the interests of the Vinlanders Social Club, a neo-Nazi group with a reputation for violence that was later targeted in a law enforcement crackdown. Since prosecutors

have called the attack a hate crime, they can seek as many as 11 additional years in prison above the maximum penalty - if Ricci is convicted of other charges, such as attempted murder, drive-by shooting, aggravated assault and assisting a criminal gang.

Ricci pleaded not guilty, and his lawyers have raised questions about the ability of Jaeger's boyfriend, Jeffery Wellmaker, to identify him as the triggerman. They note that nearly two years after the attack, Wellmaker was jailed in an unrelated case and played chess with Ricci behind bars without recognizing him. Aaron Levi Schmidt,

who authorities say was driving the car used in the shooting, pleaded guilty to murder in Jaeger's death. He is already serving 11 years for assisting a criminal gang. It's unclear if he's been sentenced on the

murder conviction. Lawyers for Ricci and Schmidt, both now 36, have said their clients weren't members of the Vinlanders.

Police reports say Ricci told associates before the attack that he saw black men hitting a white woman, though it's unclear if that claim was accurate.

Rebecca Wilder, a spokeswoman for the Maricopa County Attorney's Office, which is prosecuting Ricci, declined to comment on the case. The Phoenix Police Department, which investigated the attack, also declined to comment. Prosecutors said in court records that Well-

maker, who was unarmed, was extremely distraught over the attack and tried to help his girlfriend after she was shot. They say Wellmaker didn't provoke the attack and tried unsuccessfully to push Jaeger out of the path of the shotgun blast, according to court records.

Ricci's attorneys declined to answer questions about the allegations against their client. "He is a very sensitive person who cares

about people in general," said Jennifer Willmott, one of his lawyers. "He has had a very difficult life." Bruce Blumberg, another attorney for Ricci,

said his client's team has gotten records that document the arrest and execution of Ricci's great-grandfather during his involvement with the French Resistance. Blumberg said the great-grandfather's experience may be brought up during the trial, though it's unclear what it will be used to demonstrate. The attack started brewing after Ricci left his friend's home angry and drunk, making his

way into the neighborhood where he eventually noticed Jaeger and Wellmaker, according to a police report. Prosecutors say Ricci hurled a racial slur at Wellmaker and yelled, "What are you doing

with a white girl?" He also told Wellmaker he was going to get "something for him," prosecutors said.


Sometime later, Jaeger and Wellmaker were near a pay phone when the sedan pulled up. Ricci fired two shells, hitting Jaeger in the stomach from about 10 feet (3 meters) away, prosecutors said.

Ricci's attorneys have noted Wellmaker was unable to identify Ricci in a photo lineup after the shooting, and he failed to recognize their client in 2011 when the two served time in the same Maricopa County jail pod. Court records filed in Ricci's case didn't specify the charge on which Wellmaker was jailed, and a records check didn't provide a definitive answer to the question.

Ricci ended up telling Wellmaker he was the person accused of killing his girlfriend, a judge wrote in a pretrial ruling.

The judge said Wellmaker's identification of the shooter was reliable because he would have been able to identify Ricci independent of the jail encounter. While working with a police artist after the shooting, Wellmaker described a unique tattoo across the attacker's stomach, the judge wrote.

In an unrelated crime months after Jaeger's shooting death, police say Ricci stabbed two men who tried to stop him from attacking his girlfriend. He is serving a 22-year sentence for assault and weapons misconduct convictions.



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

He diagnosed me with PTSD, and I refused to believe it, thinking that I had not expe-

rienced the kinds of trauma experienced by military personnel. He reviewed with me the answers I had given to his questions on our initial intake appointment. I learned that I suffered from traumatic experiences in my childhood. It was hard to accept because I had made up so many excuses for my parents' behavior over the years. He told me he could help me get past the anxiety with treatment. In less than two months,

my anxiety lifted. Please tell "My Sad Story" to find a therapist who specializes in trauma and not settle for anyone else. Not every therapist has this training. Symptoms only worsen over time if not treated. -- Relieved

Opening lead jack of hearts. It is hard to believe that anything so unusual could occur in top-notch competition, but it did. The scene was the national Masters Team championship held in New York in 1956.

South elected to open as dealer with a pre-emptive three-spade bid. West was Peter Leventritt, playing with Helen Sobel. Although he was delighted with that contract, he could not afford to double, which would

have been for takeout. So Leventritt passed, as did North, but when three spades rolled around to Helen — a gal who hated to get shut out of the bidding - she dou-

Naturally, Leventritt elected to pass the double, as anyone else would do, and declarer went down three. But since South had 100 honors (which counted in those days), Leventritt-Sobel collected only 400 When their teammates at the

other table played the same hand, Boris Koytchou (South) chose to pass as dealer. But West and his partner were playing weak two-bids, and it seemed to him an appropriate time to open with two spades.

North, Harold Ogust, didn't have much in the way of high cards, but he fancied his distribution and so doubled for takeout. Koytchou, of course, could not think of any better place to play the contract than two spades doubled, so he passed.


This time it was West who became declarer at a doubled spade contract. A heart was led by North, and West eventually got home with six tricks. As a result, he went down two — 300 points — but he also had to suffer the indignity of having 100 honors scored against him.

All told, the Leventritt-Sobel team gained 800 points on the deal 400 at each table. Whoever elected to bid spades first had to pay a heavy price, as both pre-empts boomeranged. That's the way it sometimes goes.





This Date In History

Today is Monday, May 7, the 127th day of 2018. There are 238 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On May 7, 1915, a German U-boat torpedoed and sank the British liner RMS Lusitania off the southern coast of Ireland, killing 1,198 people, including 128 Americans, out of the nearly 2,000 on board.

On this date:

In A.D. 558, the original main dome of the Hagia Sophia in Constantinople completely collapsed during an earthquake; Emperor Justinian I ordered that the structure be rebuilt.

In 1763, Pontiac, chief of the Ottawa Indians, attempted to lead a sneak attack on Britishheld Fort Detroit, but was foiled because the British had been tipped off in advance.

In 1789, America's first inaugural ball was held in New York in honor of President George Washington, who had taken the oath of office a week

earlier. 1824, Beethoven's Symphony No. 9 in D minor, Op. 125, had its premiere in Vienna.

In 1939, Germany and Italy announced a military and political alliance known as the Rome-Berlin Axis.

In 1942, U.S. Army Lt. Gen.

Jonathan Wainwright went on a Manila radio station to announce the Allies' surrender of the Philippines to Japanese forces during World War II. In 1945, Germany signed an

unconditional surrender at Allied headquarters in Rheims (rams), France, ending its role in World War II. In 1954, the 55-day Battle of

Dien Bien Phu in Vietnam ended with Vietnamese insurgents overrunning French forc-

In 1963, the United States launched the Telstar 2 communications satellite.

In 1975, President Gerald R. Ford formally declared an end to the "Vietnam era." In Ho Chi Minh City — formerly Saigon - the Viet Cong celebrated its takeover.

In 1984, a \$180 million out-ofsettlement court announced in the Agent Orange class-action suit brought by Vietnam veterans who said they'd been injured by exposure to the defoliant.

In 1998, the parent company of Mercedes-Benz agreed to buy Chrysler Corp. for more than \$37 billion. Londoners voted overwhelmingly to elect their own mayor for the first time in history. (In May 2000, Ken Livingstone was elected.)

Ten years ago: President George W. Bush, addressing the Council of the Americas, said Cuba's post-Fidel Castro leadership had made only "empty gestures at reform" as he rejected calls for easing U.S. restrictions on the communist island. Dmitry Medvedev (dih-MEE'-tree med-VYEH'-dyev) was sworn in as Russia's president, succeeding Vladimir Putin (POO'-tihn).

Five years ago: President Barack Obama and South Korea's new leader, Park Geunhye (goon-hay), met at the White House, where they projected a united front as they warned North Korea against further nuclear provocations. Twenty-four people were killed by a gas tanker-truck explosion on the outskirts of Mexico City. The Dow Jones industrial average closed above 15,000 for the first time, ending the day at 15,056.20, up 87.31 points. Movie special effects wizard Ray Harryhausen, 92, died in London.

One year ago: French voters elected independent centrist Emmanuel Macron, 39, as the country's youngest president, delivering a resounding victory to the pro-European former investment banker and dashing the populist dream of farright rival Marine Le Pen. Former President Barack Obama briefly returned to the spotlight as he accepted the annual John F. Kennedy Profile in Courage Award at the JFK presidential library in Boston.






lin belted a double on a line drive to left field bringing in Braden Person for the score. Dublin continued to remain scoreless until bringing in 2 runs in the fifth inning.

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In the NBA playoffs, teams quick to tinker with lineups

The "Death Lineup" breathed new life into the Golden State Warriors.

It was yet another reminder: In the NBA playoffs, where even a brief downward slide can be enough to end a season, even the best teams won't hesitate when they feel a need to shake up their starting lineups.

Desperate times in the first round sent Cleveland to desperate lineup measures. Toronto, the team that finished with the NBA's secondbest regular season record, sought a spark by changing its starting five against the Cavs for Game 3 of the Eastern Conference semifinals. Utah showed Houston a new look Sunday in Game 4 of their West semifinal matchup, and while the Jazz slowed the high-powered Rockets at times they still fell into a 3-1 series deficit.

Game 3 against New Orleans so Sunday, May 6, 2018. they put their five best players -Stephen Curry, Klay Thompson, Andre Iguodala,

Kevin Durant and Draymond Green - on the floor Sunday to start a game for the first time all season. The result was a rout, one that allowed the Warriors to head home with a 3-1 lead in their series against the Pelicans.

"Anytime we've been in any danger over the years, we've sort of gone to this lineup," Warriors coach Steve Kerr said. "The lineup worked or whatever, but it's not about the lineup. It's really not."

All due respect to Kerr, he might be overstating

Golden State's starting five on Sunday — some call it "The Death Lineup" because of how opponents tend to succumb against it, others prefer "Hamptons Five" because Curry, Thompson, Iguodala and Green were the players who went to the Hamptons two summers ago in an effort to lure Durant to the Warriors — was absolutely dominant. NBA.com charted them as being on the floor together for 18 minutes, during which they outscored the Pelicans

Every other Warriors lineup used over the other 30 minutes played the Pelicans even, 66-66.

"We got momentum on our side really early," Cur-

ry said. "Every single person on the floor in that lineup is a playmaker. And so we have multiple options and just look for the best shot on every pos-

It wasn't exactly an in-case-of-emergency-breakglass move by the Warriors.

But these NBA playoffs have seen some of those

Cleveland, which has a chance to win its way back into the Eastern Conference finals for the fourth consecutive year on Monday night if it can finish off a sweep of Toronto, almost didn't even get to this round. Facing a win-or-else Game 7 in the first round, the Cavaliers put LeBron James, Kevin Love, J.R. Smith and Tristan Thompson — the four holdovers from their 2016 NBA championship team — out to start with Kyle Korver.

It was their first time starting together this season. James survived cramps, scored 45, and the Cavaliers held off Indiana to advance. They haven't lost since.

"All five of us, we knew what we could get out of each other," James said afterward. "We've been in situations before. We've played in big games before. That's a comfort."

Toronto could use some of that comfort.

Since James entered the league, only one No. 1 seed has gotten swept in the conference playoffs – Atlanta, in 2015, by James and the Cavaliers. Toronto shook up its lineup in Game 3 on Saturday night by trying Fred VanVleet instead of Serge Ibaka, but the Raptors fell into the dreaded 3-0 series deficit when James made a running bank shot at the buzzer for the win.

Everything is on the table for the Raptors now.

"You realize how big it is in this moment to get a victory," Raptors star DeMar DeRozan said.

Sometimes, even subtle changes pay off nicely.

Boston inserted role player Semi Ojeleye into its starting lineup Ojeleye's role: Find a way to slow down Bucks star Giannis Antetokounmpo.

Ojeleye was on the floor to help open the next three games, the first starts of his rookie season. He scored 10 points in those games, though none of that mattered much to the Celtics. His primary role was defense, since Antetokounmpo averaged 27.8 points on 62 percent shooting in the first four games of the series.

With Ojeleye in the lineup, Antetokounmpo averaged 23 points on 50 percent shooting in the last three games — and seemed particularly out of sorts in Game 5, the first one where the Celtics made the

Boston won that night by five points, and wound up surviving the series in seven games.

"He did a great job," Antetokounmpo said, tipping his cap to Ojeleye. "He played hard. He competed." And that's the secret, Kerr said. It's not about the

names, he insists. It's about how well they perform. It's become a bit of a running joke around the Warriors that Kerr won't reveal his starting lineups until he absolutely has to, no matter how many times he is asked.

But this time, after the results on Sunday, Kerr isn't holding his cards to his chest. Game 5 is on Tuesday night. The "Death Lineup" starts.

Fowler's 2-run HR in 14th rallies Cardinals past Cubs, 4-3

ST. LOUIS — Dexter Fowler had a flair for the dramatics during his two seasons with the Chicago Cubs, from game-winning home runs early in his first year at Colorado to the leadoff blast in Game 7 of the World Series in 2016.

The St. Louis Cardinals outfielder was up to his old theatrics early Monday morning, putting the finishing touch on a Cardinals sweep of the Cubs with a two-out, two-run home run in the bottom of the 14th inning.

Fowler's game winner lifted St. Louis to a 4-3 victory over Chicago, doing so in a twice rain-delayed game that appeared to be all but finished when Javier Baez put the Cubs up by a run with his solo home run in the top of the 14th.

That is, until Fowler reminded his old teammates of the excitement they've been missing since he departed Chicago following its World Series championship in favor of a four-year contract in St. Louis.

"It's always something special if you do it against them," Fowler said.

The victory was the Cardinals' fifth straight, matching their season-best winning streak. It also improved St. Louis to 4-1 on the season against the rival Cubs, a year after Chicago won 14 of the 19 games between the two. After Chicago took a 3-2 lead on Baez's solo shot

in the top of the 14th, Luke Farrell (1-2) struck out the first two Cardinals batters he faced before allowing an infield single to Harrison Bader. Fowler then lifted a 2-2 pitch down the right-field line and just over the glove of Chicago outfielder Jason Hey-

"I said to myself, 'If you catch this, I'm going to cry," Fowler said. "He jumped and I though he caught it. So I stopped. Then, I saw it bounce and I was like, 'Oh, my gosh.' Words can't even explain Mike Mayers (1-0) earned the win in relief for St.

Louis, allowing one run in three innings. The Cardinals bullpen allowed only three hits in 8 2/3 innings. The loss was the season-high fifth straight for

Chicago, the team's worst losing stretch since a sixgame skid in late May last season. The Cubs have now failed to score more than three runs in 10 of their last 11 games. "We're just not hitting the ball," Chicago manager

Joe Maddon said. "We're just not scoring any runs. The pitching, obviously, has been good enough to have a really good streak going on, but we've been void of contact." The game, which ended at nearly 1 a.m. local
