## BSISD adopts campus carry

It's official: Big Spring Independent School District trustees approved implementation of the Guardian Plan at Thursday evening's school board meeting, giving BSISD administrators the option of allowing school employees to carry concealed handguns on campus.

The school board unanimously approved the measure.

"Our school board has done a tremendous amount of work studying this program," said BSISD Superintendent Jay McWilliams. "We put a lot of time into contacting school districts around the state that use this program, and I believe firmly that the school board did what is in the very best interest of Big Spring

ISD and our kids. Our kids are our number one priority, and I feel like it was a major step in the safety of all of our kids here in Big Spring."

Big Spring High School Principal Mike Ritchey said he welcomes the program at the school.

"I think it's a great thing," Ritchey said. "I believe any initiative you can take to enhance the safety of students and staff is the right direction to go, and the right approach. At the end of the day, that's our ultimate goal."

At the start of the meeting, three people spoke regarding the Guardian Plan during the public comments portion of the agenda. Two of those people - Ray Smalling and Cory Wood spoke in favor of the plan. Steven Hobbs, school board candidate and runner-up in the recent local election, raised what he claimed was an issue with representation regarding the vote on the Guardian Plan.

"First, I would like to congratulate (newly elected school trustee) Melissa Miller, who is the person who will be speaking for me on this board," Hobbs said. "If you guys are going to vote on Campus Carry prior to Melissa Miller being sworn in, then we are not being represented, my entire district. If you guys are going to vote after she has been sworn in, the information you have gotten in closed-door sessions, she does not have it. If she did have access to that information, which I am almost certain that she did not, it would be illegal. So I ask that the vote for Campus Carry be held off for at least one month until the next open session, so that my representative can make a very well-balanced decision."

In other business, the school board canvassed the votes from the May 5 election, said farewell to outgoing school board member Tony Kennedy, and welcomed Miller to the board. Miller received 63 votes in the election, while Hobbs received 17 votes and Bond Moughon Ryan received 15 votes. Miller signed the requisite paperwork and recited the oath of office before taking her place on the panel.

Kennedy, who had served as the school board president until leaving office Thursday evening, surrendered the gavel to McWilliams before stepping down.

"It's always tough losing... well, we're not losing him," said McWilliams. "Tony Kennedy is Big Spring through-and-through, and I know he's going to continue supporting us and this district, and everything our kids do. I know we're going to see him at everything. We appreciate Tony very, very much."

McWilliams presided over the election of a new president. Tommy Olague Jr. nominated Fabian Serrano for the position, and Serrano was unanimously elected by the board. Serrano then took the gavel and the board president's chair, and presided over election of the new school board vice president and secretary, Julie Harris and Olague, respectively.

# Veterans Legal Clinics in West Texas

Metroplex Veterans Legal Services is conducting 2 free Veterans legal clinics in Midland, Texas.

One clinic is a Veteran's expunction/orders of non-disclosure legal clinic. An Expunction removes all records of an arrest and/or subsequent court case from the public record and the individual may legally deny or fail to acknowledge ever having been arrested for or charged with any crime which has been expunged. A record of an arrest without a conviction is a barrier for employment. An order of nondisclosure is a legal remedy available to people who successfully complete deferred adjudication probation, in which a Texas court orders that your criminal history on a particular case be sealed from public view. A criminal history can be a barrier for housing.

One clinic is a Veteran's Child Support Modification Clinic. This clinic is a partnership with the HEROES program of the Attorney General of Texas, and Metroplex Veterans Legal Services. The Attorney General of Texas' Child Support Division HEROES program provides veterans and their dependants with enhanced, personalized assistance in addressing child support matters. The Veterans Child Support Modification Clinic will provide active duty servicemembers and Veterans with pro bono legal consultations with legal professionals with the expertise to correctly identify veterans' specific modification issues and help them understand the processes and challenges in addressing them. Most importantly, the clinic will give each veteran the opportunity to be heard, and provided explanations to transform a confusing and often emotionally charged legal issue into an understandable and manageable task.

The Veterans Expunction/Orders of Non-Disclosure Clinic will be held on May 18, 2018, at 9:00 am at The Junior League of Midland, 902 W. Dengar Avenue, Midland, TX 79705

The Veterans Child Support Modification Clinic will be held on May 18, 2018, at 1:00 pm, at The Junior League of Midland, 902 W. Dengar Avenue, Midland, TX 79705.

The Veterans and active duty servicemembers must register on-line in advance of the clinic at [westtexas.veterans-legalservices.us](http://westtexas.veterans-legalservices.us).

The pro bono legal resources for Veterans have been very scarce prior to the commencement of our program. According to a recent Washington Post ar-

ticle, new research shows the one reason so many Veterans are homeless: They can't afford lawyers. The research shows that Veterans are losing their homes and missing out on crucial benefits because they lack legal aid. With nearly 50,000 Veterans sleeping on the streets each night, it's clear we are failing to serve those who have served our country. But the solution isn't as obvious as it might seem. Veterans don't need simply more doctors and shelter beds; new research shows that Veterans need lawyers to fight on their behalf as well. According to a new study from the Department of Veterans Affairs, at least five out of the top 10 problems leading to homelessness among Veterans cannot be solved without legal help. Our legal clinics address three of these unmet legal needs, for child support modification, restoring driver's licenses, and legal assistance for warrants and fines.

Metroplex Veterans Legal Services offers single issue legal clinics to Veterans on a pro bono basis. Our legal clinics focus on removing the legal barriers to employment for Veterans, and assisting disabled Veterans to obtain military dis-

ability benefits. The goal of our clinics is to provide free legal counsel and advice to low income, unemployed, homeless, disabled, elderly, or at risk for homelessness Veterans for outstanding traffic tickets, warrants from tickets, and driver's license issues caused by tickets; child support modification; expunction of criminal arrests; bankruptcy; consumer fraud; VA disability benefit appeals; and combat related special compensation. These unpaid traffic tickets, and delinquent child support can lead to suspended driver's licenses, which can lead to barriers for these Veterans to obtain employment.

We would like your assistance in helping Veterans and active duty servicemembers by publishing this information. This clinic is open to all Veterans and active duty servicemembers in Texas, with either a VA id card or a CAC card or a DD214 with a honorable, general or general under honorable discharge. This is a limited opportunity and with your assistance we are hoping to reach all of the Veterans and active duty military servicemembers that need assistance with this legal issue in your area.

# Reflections: Fourth Commandment- Rest for the Weary

We live in a time-crunched world. Parents whip up a quick breakfast for bleary-eyed children before bundling them into cars to be dropped off at day-care and school. Some grab a drive-through burrito before negotiating traffic on the freeways while juggling cell phones. Weary from long hours at work, the same commuters make their way home past memorized billboards. Weekends are filled with a hundred errands, second jobs, T-ball, soccer, football. Church is squeezed into an already full schedule that has no margins.

The opioid crisis in America may be a symptom of our over-extended and anxious culture. Overdose deaths have quadrupled since 1999. Over 42,000 Americans died of opioid overdose in 2016. The National Council on Alcoholism and Drug Addiction stated, "Readily available opioids have become 'drugs of solace' that mask

physical and emotional pain in a world offering little hope that conditions will improve."

A recent report from the American Psychological Association stated, "Chronic stress is increasingly eating away at our overall well-being."... "The psychological and physical toll of stress in America will undoubtedly continue to snowball if something doesn't change."

Somewhere along the way we eliminated the fourth commandment as irrelevant and archaic: "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy." A half-century ago, most businesses were closed on Sunday and youth sporting events recognized Sunday as a day for worship. All that has changed. Today our calendars are filled up to a 24/7 frenzy.

When Jesus said that man was not made for the Sabbath but the Sabbath was made for man, he affirmed the need for the Sabbath in our lives. He underscored the importance of the Sabbath to all of us for mental, emotional, spiritual and physical health.

In 1924 Scotland's Eric Liddell, the fastest runner in the world, refused to compete at the Olympics on the Sabbath. When the King of England com-

manded him to run for his country on Sunday, Liddell respectfully replied he had a higher king. The Academy Award winning movie, Chariots of Fire portrays Liddell reading Isaiah 40:31 to a congregation on Sunday while young men stumble and fall on the mud-splattered track. "Those who wait for the Lord will gain new strength; they will mount up with wings like eagles, they will run and not get tired, they will walk and not faint." The next week, Liddell ran the 400 meter and won the gold.

Sabbath requires time for rest, silence, solitude and worship, but it is more than a day of rest. It is a way of life that is filled with wonder, worship, awe and delight. When Jesus declared himself the Lord of the Sabbath, he offered to us a better way. He said, "Come unto me all you who are weary and heavy laden and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn of me, for I am gentle and humble in heart and you will find rest to your souls."

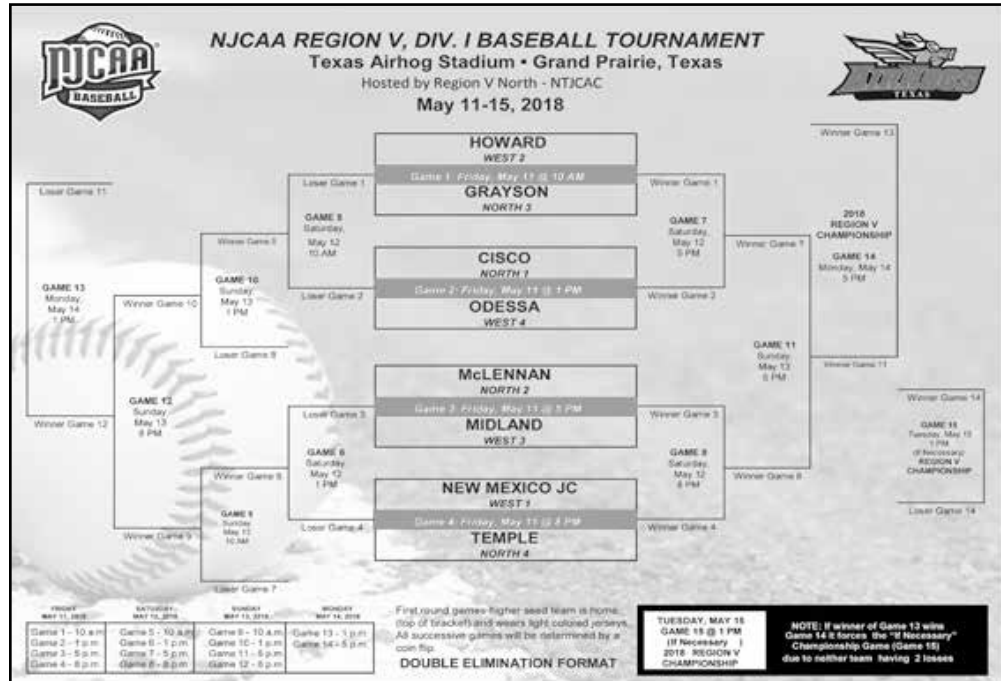

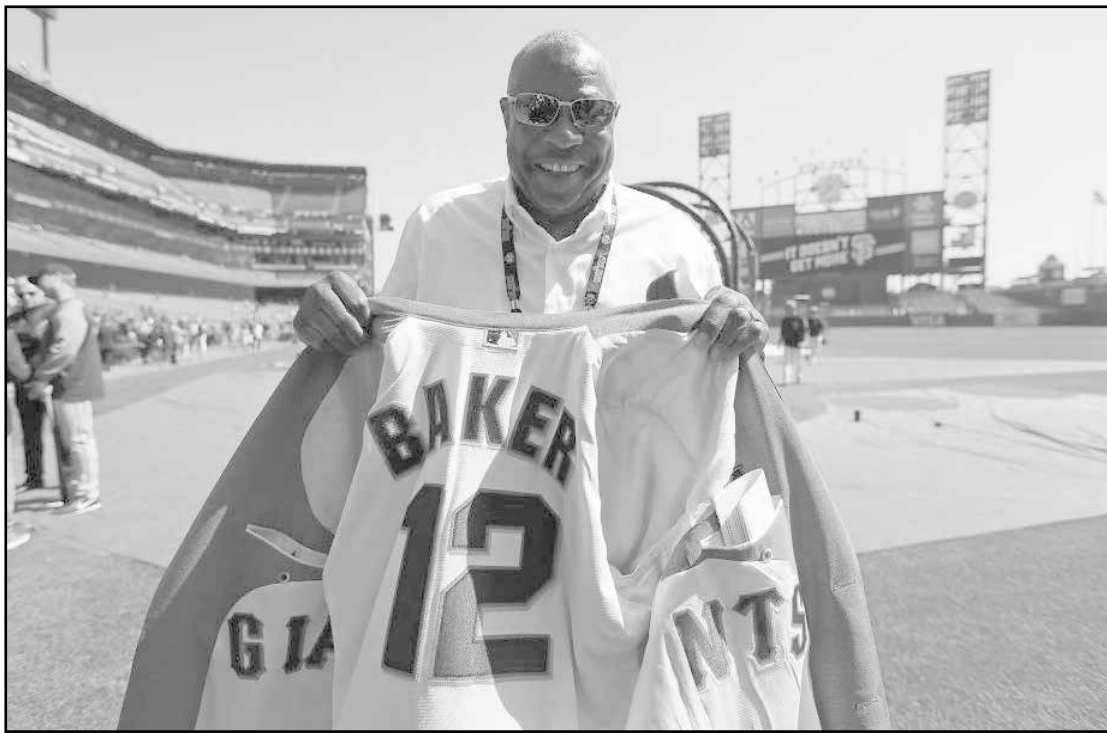
Then Darren is off to play another game, his dad now watching him regularly at last after all those years of Baker managing in the major leagues and bouncing around the country.

He lost his job with Washington after last season, even after the Nationals won a second straight NL East title.

It has been a blessing of sorts for Baker.

"I haven't been home to see the hills green in Sacramento here in a long time," Baker said. "The hills are always brown when I come home. It's pretty cool, it's real cool."

He never forgets to remind himself of his good fortune, even during the down times in a big league baseball career spanning a half-century. Sure, he still wants to manage — and go out on his own terms when the time comes. Preferably with a World Series title that has eluded him as a manager.

Baker was out of baseball when his father, Johnnie B. Baker Sr., died in November 2009. Again when daughter Natosha got married in the summer of 2014. And now.

The 68-year-old Baker never gets used to this, but he now has endured firings by the Cubs, Reds and Nationals. Still, he walked onto the field at AT&T Park for the Giants' series opener with Washington on April 23 with a grin and hugs to give. Stephen Strasburg hustled out onto the grass for an embrace.

"For him to be able to go out and watch for his son I can just imagine. My dad being able to come and watch me all the time, coach me at every single level. It's definitely probably a pretty cool moment to be able to do that, to be able to sit back and really watch your son play and enjoy that moment with him," Nats star Bryce Harper said. "Dusty, you can imagine how good of a father he is to his son because he was a father to a lot of us in here."

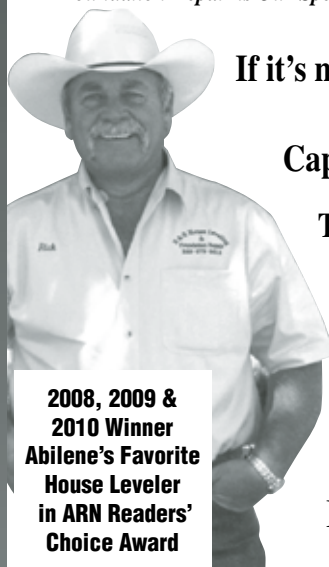

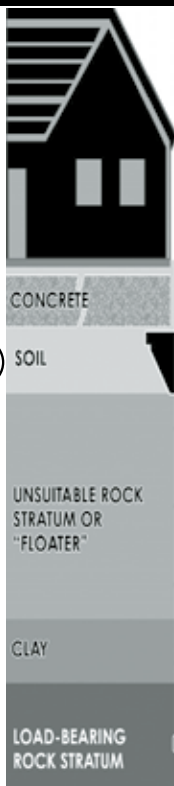

**Test your play**

**1. You are declarer** with the West hand at Three Notrump, and North leads the jack of diamonds. How would you play the hand?

**2. You are declarer** with the West hand at Six Spades, and North leads the queen of clubs. How would you play the hand?

**1. You start with** eight sure tricks and many different ways to try to acquire a ninth. But to nail down the contract beyond the shadow of a doubt, win the opening diamond lead in dummy, play the king of clubs and overtake it with the ace!

Continue with the ten of clubs, forcing out the jack or queen. Regardless of who wins the trick or what is returned, you are in complete command. Sooner or later you force out the other missing club honor to assure yourself of three club tricks and the contract.

If you try any other method of

play, you might succeed, but you might also fail. The only way to guarantee three notrump is by over-taking the king of clubs with the ace.

**2. Obviously,** the only problem is to avoid losing two trump tricks, since you have no losers in the three other suits. To give yourself the best chance, you should take the first club with dummy's king and lead a trump toward your hand.

If South produces the queen or king of trumps at trick two, your worries are over. You win with the ace, return the jack of trumps and shortly thereafter chalk up the slam. But what do you do if South follows with a low trump at trick two?

The correct percentage play — the play that will win in the long run — is the jack, planning to finesse again later if the jack loses to the queen or king. Despite anything you might have heard or thought to the contrary, the planned second finesse is far better than going up with the ace on the second round of trumps if South follows low again.

The suggested line of play is not guaranteed to succeed; it is merely the best way to play the given suit combination and offers about a 75 percent chance of losing only one trick in the suit.

# Shohei Ohtani homers again, surging Angels beat Twins 7-4

ANAHEIM, Calif. — The Los Angeles Angels' schedule limited Shohei Ohtani's chances to hit over the past four games. When the Angels got back home and put their two-way rookie sensation back in the lineup, Ohtani hadn't missed a beat.

Neither had the rest of the Angels, who are putting big offensive numbers almost every night lately.

Ohtani hit his fifth homer and added an RBI double, and Ian Kinsler had a two-run homer among his three hits in the Angels' seventh win in nine games, 7-4 over the Minnesota Twins on Thursday night.

Justin Upton also homered in his third straight game and Kole Calhoun drove in the tiebreaking run in the sixth inning as the Angels snapped Minnesota's five-game winning streak.

Los Angeles has scored at least five runs in seven of its last eight games, and nearly everybody in a halo cap had a big hit in the opener of an 11-game homestand.

Ohtani was outstanding in his first start at designated hitter since last Friday. His pitching duties and two interleague games had limited him to two at-bats in the past four games.

"I'm still making little adjustments every day, each at-bat," said Ohtani, who has a hit in 14 of his 16 starts as a DH. "I'm still learning."

Ohtani turned Trevor Hildenberger's belt-high outside sinker into his first homer of May, blasting it 413 feet to the fake rock pile beyond left-center field in the seventh inning.

Ohtani also drove in Albert Pujols in the third for his first multi-RBI game since April 12, showing off his incredible speed on the basepaths while taking second.

"We knew he was dangerous," Minnesota manager Paul Molitor said. "We've got to pitch him carefully, make him aware of the inside of the plate, but if you make mistakes, he's going to hit them."

Andrelton Simmons had three hits for the Angels, and Garrett Richards pitched five-hit ball into the sixth inning of the opener of the Angels' longest homestand of the season.

Brian Dozier hit a three-run homer off Richards in the sixth inning before Max Kepler followed with a tying solo shot off Jose Alvarez (2-0). But the Angels reclaimed the lead moments later and eventually ended Minnesota's longest streak of the season.

"I probably couldn't have thrown the ball better (in the first five innings), to be honest," said Richards, who yielded only two singles before the sixth. "It's disappointing to have the whole outing kind of tarnished."

After Kinsler hit his first homer since April 12 in the second inning, Upton added a solo shot in the

third, giving him four homers in five games. Pujols and Ohtani followed with back-to-back doubles for a 4-0 lead.

Los Angeles answered with a rally that began with Simmons' single off Jose Berrios (3-4), who yielded seven hits and five runs.

**BIG AL**

Pujols was honored briefly in the first inning for getting his 3,000th hit last Friday in Seattle. His 3,005th career hit in the third inning gave him a seven-game hitting streak. He also flawlessly turned a key 3-6-3 double play at first base to end the seventh.

**KOLE CONNECTS**

Calhoun is in a 5-for-63 slump over the past month, but he drove in the go-ahead run with a line-drive sacrifice fly to the wall. He hit another fly to the warning track in the eighth.

**JJ'S FIRST**

Jim Johnson pitched the ninth for his first save since joining the Angels in the offseason. The veteran reliever had two strikeouts.

**TRAINER'S ROOM**

Twins: CF Byron Buxton was reinstated from the 10-day disabled list, and he went 0 for 2 with a walk while batting ninth. Buxton was out with migraines and a subsequent broken toe after fouling a ball off his foot during a rehab assignment.

Angels: Reliever Keynan Middleton returned from the disabled list after missing 10 days with right elbow inflammation. He yielded two walks and a double while pitching a scoreless eighth. ... RHP Matt Shoemaker isn't making progress in his return from a forearm strain, manager Mike Scioscia said. His throwing program has been shut down. He made only one start this season before his latest injury problem.

**UP NEXT**

Twins: Lance Lynn (1-3, 7.28 ERA) is coming off his first victory in a rough season. He hasn't faced Los Angeles since July 2013, and he has never beaten an AL West team.

Angels: Tyler Skaggs (3-2, 3.08 ERA) makes his first career appearance against Minnesota. He has allowed more than two runs just once in seven starts this season.

You looked at him like that, or the cool grandpa I guess you could say. He was easy to talk to, easy to get along with and you looked forward to coming to the park and playing for him every single day because he was that type of manager."

Baker doesn't believe his skin color has anything to do with him no longer working as a manager — despite many inquiries over the years that have gone completely unanswered — but rather his age and salary at this stage.

That doesn't mean Baker is necessarily bitter, just a realist.

"Do you ever make peace with it?" he asked. "You make peace but it makes you kind of lose some faith in mankind, between right and wrong. And you realize in the world, especially in this new world, there's always been discrimination, race discrimination, but it seems like in this new world there's age and salary discrimination, which go hand in hand."

He is in the stands for nearly every home game to watch Cal's new infielder with that sweet left-handed swing that Darren developed by mimicking home run king Barry Bonds for all those years. Baker was San Francisco's skipper in 1993 when Bonds joined the Giants through a runner-up World Series finish in 2002, when then-3-year-old Darren wandered onto the field as a bat boy and was scooped up by J.T. Snow — who now broadcasts some of Darren's games for the Pac-12 Networks — at home

plate before he could get run over by David Bell coming in to score. The age requirement for bat boys changed that offseason to 14.

At Cal's cozy campus ballpark, Evans Diamond, wife, Melissa, sits on the other side of the stands by design.

"She talks too much," Baker said. "I talk too much," Melissa said separately later, smiling.

When Giants CEO Larry Baer and top executive Brian Sabean reached out to see if Baker might consider rejoining the organization, he let them know he had already made most of his summer plans around seeing Darren play. So Baker is serving as a special adviser to Baer, a position with plenty of flexibility.

"I missed so many of his games, so it was a treat this winter to get to see him play fall ball but in fall ball they're playing against each other," Baker said. "It's been pretty cool watching him. Most of the time I run most people off so I can watch. They want to talk, they want to talk Giants

or baseball, I say, I'm here to watch my son."

When former Cal coach David Esquer left for Stanford after last season, Darren kept his commitment to the Golden Bears pro-

gram.

"I told him: 'Hey, the Bakers keep their word.' My dad always was 'you have to sign a contract, it's your word,'" Baker said. "It's not like that in the world but it's like that in my family. When you say you're going to do something you do it. ... It worked out great and it worked out for me with the Giants. I got a nice triangle going here. That's my Bermuda triangle."

That would be San Francisco — he still has a home in suburban San Bruno — to Berkeley where Darren is to the Sacramento area where he resides most of the time.

"I certainly would think for Dusty it's a perfect scenario for him if he's not managing to be back with the Giants and also be able to watch his son play on the weekends," Giants manager Bruce Bochy said. "It's a pretty nice gig because he's like all of us, we miss a lot of time watching our kids play but now he has the opportunity to do that. Yet to have a voice here with what we're doing. So it's good for

him. He's earned this."

Baker and his son don't get a lot of time together, speaking more by phone or grabbing quick visits after games.

"I'll look up in the stands and give him a nod," Darren said. "It's weird how it kind of worked out for the better. I think he's happy. I'm happy he's here. A little bit (bittersweet). I think part of him wants to be in the game still obviously but he's never really seen me play consistently. For my first year in college to be the first time for him to see me play is probably better."

On this night, Baker is dressed in a camouflage thermal T-shirt and munching on raw peanuts from a place in San Francisco and pupusas he shares with anybody nearby who's hungry. Two sons of Hall of Famer Orlando Cepeda are there.

Baker orders a cold beer and sits back in his fold-up chair. He cracks open a few more peanuts.

"You know," he said, "it's all good."

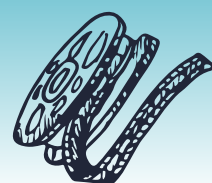

# ROGER'S RETRO REVIEWS: Breakfast at Tiffany's



"Moon river...wider than a mile..." "Breakfast at Tiffany's" is one of the best-loved romantic comedies in the world. Starring Audrey Hepburn as the quirky New York socialite and companion to wealthy men, and George Peppard as the struggling writer and companion to wealthy women, it uniquely portrays the struggle between relationships and independence from social ties. The film starts with young, beautiful Holly Golightly (Hepburn) emerging from a New York taxi dressed in an elegant evening gown and pearls, in front of Tiffany and Co. jewelry store early in the morning. Looking at

the jewelry in the store's window, she snacks on a roll and coffee that she's brought with her for breakfast, and then enjoys a leisurely walk home. At her apartment building, she's accosted by Sid Arbusck (Claude Stroud), her date from the night before, and she does her best to avoid him. She's lost the key to her apartment, so she buzzes her Japanese landlord Mr. Yunioshi (Mickey Rooney), an artist, who buzzes her in, but yells at her for disturbing him. She says she will pose for him "sometime," mollifying him somewhat. Later, she's awakened when her new neighbor Paul Varjak (Peppard)

buzzes her, asking to be let into the building, since his decorator has his key. The two chat as Holly gets ready to visit Sally Tomato (Alan Reed), a mobster in Sing Sing prison. She reveals that Tomato's lawyer Mr. O'Shaughnessy pays her \$100 a week to talk to the aging gangster and deliver the "weather report" he gives her each week.

As she's leaving to visit Tomato, Paul's "decorator" pulls up; she's an aging wealthy woman named Emily Failenson (Patricia Neal).

That night, another date (Mel Blanc) tries to visit Holly, and she eludes him via fire escape. Peeking into Paul's apartment, she sees Failenson (who Paul calls "2E") kiss a sleeping Paul and leave money on his desk. Holly climbs in through the window and wakes Paul. The pair talk, and she learns he's a writer who published a book of short stories a while back, but now doesn't even have a ribbon in his typewriter. They fall asleep, but Holly has a nightmare about her brother Fred, who's overseas in the Army. When Paul asks about him, she says she doesn't like men who pry, and leaves.

Later, we learn through various turns of events that Holly is actually a small-town girl named Lula Mae Barnes, who married an aging veterinarian (Buddy Ebsen) at a young age, before fleeing that life for the bright lights of New York.

"Breakfast at Tiffany's" is a poignant look at the things and events that tie people together, despite our best efforts to stay free. Paired perfectly with the haunting "Moon River," sung in the opening credits by Andy Williams – and by a wistful Hepburn herself during the movie – the film is about wishing for simpler times in a complicated and often uncaring world.

There is some controversy surrounding the film. Andy Rooney's portrayal of Mr. Yunioshi has been condemned as "yellowface" and continues to draw criticism. Rooney wore makeup and a special mouthpiece to create the character, which epitomizes a common stereotypical view of an Asian caricature.

Producer Richard Shepherd apologized for the casting choice, saying Director Blake Edwards insisted on Rooney for the part.

Rooney's performance is somewhat startling by modern standards, but his role is a fairly small part of the overall movie.

Altogether, "Breakfast at Tiffany's" is a wonderful piece of American culture. Nine stars out of 10.
