Summit talk turns warmer; Trump says 'talking to them now'

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump on Friday warmly welcomed North Korea's promising response to his abrupt withdrawal from the potentially historic Singapore summit and said "we're talking to them now" about putting it back on track.

"Everybody plays games," said Trump, who often boasts about his own negotiating tactics and skill. The president, commenting

By CATHERINE LUCEY House for a commencement speech, said it was even possible the summit could take place on the originally planned June 12 date.

"They very much want to do it, we'd like to do it," he said.

Earlier Friday, in a tweet, he had called the North's reaction to his letter canceling the summit "warm and productive." That was far different from his letter Thursday to North Korea leader Kim Jong Un, blaming "tremendous anger and open hostility" by Pyongyang for the U.S. withdrawal. The tone

statement saying it was still "willing to give the U.S. time and opportunities" to reconsider talks "at any time, at any format." Vice Foreign Minister Kim Kye Gwan

called Trump's withdrawal "unexpected" and "very regrettable," and said the cancellation of the talks showed "how grave the status of historically deep-rooted hostile North Korea-U.S. relations is and how urgently a summit should be realized to improve ties." Then Trump, in his response to that re-

sponse, said it was "very good news," and "we will soon see where it will lead, hopefully to long and enduring prosperity and peace. Only time (and talent) will tell!"

The president's surprise exit from the planned talks on Thursday had capped

weeks of high-stakes brinkmanship between the two unpredictable leaders over nuclear negotiating terms for their unprecedented sit-down. The U.S. announcement came not long after Kim appeared to make good on his promise to demolish his country's nuclear test site. But it also followed escalating frustration — and newly antagonistic rhetoric — from North Korea over comments from Trump aides about U.S. expectations for the North's "denuclearization." The White House has repeatedly offered

mixed messages. Hours after releasing his cancellation letter on Thursday, the president declared, "I really believe Kim Jong Un wants to do what's right." After that, however, a senior White

House official said the North had reneged on its promises ahead of the summit. Trump said from the White House that a "maximum pressure campaign" of economic sanctions and diplomatic isolation would continue against North Korea — with which the U.S. is technically still at war — though he added that it was possible the summit could still take place at some point.

The senior U.S. official said the North violated a pledge to allow international inspectors to monitor the supposed implosion of the test site. International journalists were present, but the U.S. government can't verify the site's destruction. The official spoke on the condition of anonymity to avoid overshadowing Trump's comments Thursday.

Russian President Vladimir Putin, a staunch ally of Kim Jong Un, said the North Korean leader had in fact done "everything that he had promised in advance, even blowing up the tunnels and shafts" of the site. Putin said of Trump's cancellation announcement, "In Russia we took this news with regret."

Texas governor meeting with students, shooting survivors

 $AUSTIN,\,Texas-Texas\,Gov.\,Greg$ Abbott is shifting the focus of his meetings on school safety and mass shootings this week to those who have been closest to the recent violence, including students, surviving victims and one person who grabbed a gun and fought back.

Abbott, a staunch gun-rights supporter, called the meetings to look for "swift and meaningful" ways to prevent future violence following the shooting last week inside Santa Fe High School that killed 10 people. The final meeting, slated to start Thursday afternoon, will include more than 30 people who can provide personal accounts of last week's attack in Santa Fe and last November's massacre at a tiny church in rural Sutherland Springs, Texas.

Much of the first two days of meet-

ings focused on student mental health and ideas about "hardening" school campuses, including beefing up security and possibly arming more teach-

Most of those scheduled to attend Thursday are students, families and staff from the shooting in Santa Fe. a city about 30 miles (48 kilometers) south of Houston. Also invited are two survivors of the church shooting that left more than two dozen people dead, the church's pastor and neighbor Stephen Willeford, who lives across the street from the church and has been hailed as a hero for grabbing a rifle and shooting back at the attacker.

One of the students set to attend has said the Santa Fe shooting should not lead to new gun restrictions in Texas, where more than 1.2 million people are licensed to carry handguns and openly carrying rifles in public is le-

"Something needs to happen,"

16-year-old Callie Wylie said Monday as she stood at a memorial for her classmates who were killed. "But I don't think at this time people need to be pushing politics on us and telling us. 'Oh, this is gun control.'"

Abbott has signed bills in recent years that reduce the cost and training needed for a handgun license, and expanded where handguns can be legally carried. The governor said Wednesday he could support stronger requirements for reporting lost or stolen firearms and quicker reporting to law enforcement of court orders that deny people access to guns.

Still, few people expect proposals for any major new restrictions to emerge from this week's meetings.

Rhonda Hart, a military veteran whose daughter Kimberly Vaughan was killed at Santa Fe, said Texas should make it much harder to buy and own guns. She is not among those meeting with the governor.

Texas waves passing rules, fines firm after testing glitches

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - After glitches during statewide standardized testing, Texas is excusing students affected from some passing requirements and fining the firm that administers the exams.

Last month, 41,702 students were booted for about 20 minutes from the State of Texas Assessment of Academic Readiness, or STAAR exam. Then, earlier this month, 29,307 students taking it were affected by about 90 minutes of connectivity slow-

Education sioner Mike Morath announced Thursday that 5th and 8th graders who were affected won't be required to pass the exams to move on to the next grade. Testing problems also will be taken into account when the state calculates schools' campus and district academic accountability ratings.

Morath also said Educational Testing Service, the New Jersey-based firm that administers STAAR testing, has been assessed \$100,000 in "liquidated damages."

"You should have to wait a week, have counseling, and walk through lines of protesters who tell you you're a murderer" to buy a gun, Hart said Wednesday.

Texas' reaction to the Santa Fe shooting so far has been in sharp contrast to the response after the Feb. 14 shooting rampage at a high school in Parkland, Florida, that killed 17 people. Three weeks after that massacre, Florida politicians passed a gun-control package after a lobbying campaign led by student survivors of

Abbott has said his meetings are to explore ideas that could be pursued in the law or by executive order, but has given not timeframe for acting on any proposals. The Legislature doesn't meet again until January 2019, and Abbott has so far ignored calls from a handful of lawmakers to call them into special session.

US forecasters expect 10-16 tropical storms in active season

MIAMI (AP) — U.S. government forecasters said Thursday that they expect an active Atlantic hurricane season - an announcement that came as odds increased that the first tropical weather system of the year was forming in the Guif of Mexico.

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration forecast calls for 10 to 16 named storms, with five to nine hurricanes. One to four hurricanes could

be "major" with sustained winds of at least 111 mph (178 kph).

If that forecast holds, it would make for a nearnormal or above-normal season. An average hurricane season produces 12 named storms, of which six become hur-

ricanes, including three major hurricanes. "There are no strong


climate signals saying it's going to be extremely active, like last year, or extremely weak," said Gerry Bell, the lead hurricane forecaster at NO-AA's Climate Prediction

In the short term, the National Hurricane Center said Thursday a mass of low pressure in the western Caribbean was becoming better defined and likely would become a subtropical or tropical depression by late Satur-

The system currently off the southeastern Yucatan Peninsula was expected to move northward. Heavy rains were likely across western Cuba, much of Florida and the northern Gulf Coast into early next week. In the United States, the downpours could dampen Memorial Day, the unofficial start

of the tourist season. Florida's governor has directed state authorities to prepare flood response resources to help residents in the event of tor-

rential rains.

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

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

How much proof do you need?

number of people as they were brought to him (Matthew 15:29-31). There were so many people who stayed for several days that Jesus was concerned for them and had compassion on them and miraculously fed them (Matthew 15:32-39).



Then there were the religious (Pharisees) and the political (Sadducees) leaders. They approached Jesus with a different attitude. Matthew 16:1-4, And the Pharisees and Sadducees came, and to test him the asked him to show them a sign from heaven. He answered them, "When it is evening, you say, 'It will be fair weather, for the sky is red.' And in the morning, 'It will be stormy today, for the sky is red and threatening.' How about you? If you are an honest seeker, the evidence is there - just like Jesus said. Paul wrote in 1 Corinthians 15:1-5, Now I would remind you, brothers, of the gospel I preached to you, which you received, in which you stand, and by which you are being saved, if you hold fast to the word I preached to you - unless you believed in vain. For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve (ESV).

We have all the evidence that we need. It all happened as God and Jesus said it would. Don't be stubborn and ignore it. Don't let the skepticism of those in the world create doubt in you. Don't let those who adamantly deny God make you fearful concerning the faith. How much proof do you need?

Reflections: Treasure Every Life

It didn't take long to record the first murder in human history. The Bible's first death was a homicide. Cain, enraged with resentment, jealousy and anger attacked his brother and killed him. Since that moment much of human history has been written in blood.

We are all too familiar with headline news for mass shootings, terrorist attacks and violent conflict around the world. Just last week another school shooting took place in Santa Fe, Texas. Even small towns are not immune. Murders occur in every city in every region. Globally more than one person dies every min-

person dies every minute of every day as the result of violence.

Most of us abhor murder. On the other hand, most of us accept the necessity of killing in warfare. We spend billions of dollars every year to make sure our young men and women are equipped and trained to kill on the battlefield.

But, there are exceptions.

Desmond Doss, who served in World War II, was committed to honor the sixth commandment, "Thou shalt not kill." He refused to carry a firearm or weapon of

any kind into combat. Instead, he served as an unarmed Medic. Doss was twice awarded the Bronze Star for exceptional valor under fire in Guam and the Philippines. At Okinawa he served on Hacksaw Ridge, a particularly vicious battle in which he personally saved the lives

of 75 wounded GIs. He was wounded four times and survived with seventeen pieces of shrapnel embedded in his body. He became the first pacifist to be awarded the Medal of Honor. His story has been captured in several books and a documentary, The Conscientious Objector, along with the movie, Hacksaw Ridge.

Hacksaw Ridge was re-

Hacksaw Ridge was re-Tinsley leased on November 4, 2016. It went on to receive

six Oscar nominations including Best Picture and Best Actor. It also received Golden Globe nominations for Best Picture, Best Director and Best Actor and was chosen as one of the ten best movies of the year by the American Film Institute.

Jesus took the sixth commandment to a new level. He said, "You have heard that the ancients were told, 'You shall not commit murder,' and 'Whoever commits murder shall be liable to the court.' But I say to you that

everyone who is angry with his brother shall be guilty before the court; and whoever says to his brother, 'You good-for-nothing,' shall be guilty before the supreme court; and whoever says, 'You fool,' shall be guilty enough to go into the fiery hell." (Matthew 5:21-22).

Jesus dug beneath the surface and unearthed the significance of the sixth commandment. It is all about how we see another human being. Every person is valuable. Every person deserves respect. Regardless of culture, gender, age or race, every human life is to be treasured.

Jesus was consistent in living out what he taught. He embraced the outcast and the poor. Every person he met was precious in his sight. When He was crucified he prayed that God would forgive those who nailed him to the cross and promised paradise to the dying thief. To obey the sixth commandment, we must do more than refrain from inflicting harm on our enemy, we must embrace every person as a precious creation of God.



RENTON, Wash. — Seahawks coach Pete Carroll wanted to be talking about football matters — Seattle's recommitment to the run game, the addition of two new coordinators, almost anything to do with what happens between the lines.

Seattle's Doug Baldwin had the most striking comments, directed at both the league and President Donald Trump after his remarks to "Fox & Friends" on Thursday saying "maybe you shouldn't be in the country" if you don't stand for the

"He's an idiot. Plain and simple," Baldwin said. "I respect the man because he's a human being first and foremost, but he's just being divisive, which is not surprising. It is what it is. But for him to say anybody who doesn't follow his viewpoints or his constituents viewpoints should be kicked out of the country is not very empathetic. It's not very American like, actually, to me. It's not very patriotic. It's not what this country was founded upon. It's kind of ironic to me the President of the United States is contradicting what our country is really built on."

Even normally reserved Seattle quarterback Russell Wilson agreed with the sentiment that the owners' decision was a message to players to essentially be quiet.

HOUSTON — Chris Paul's grit and veteran leadership have pushed the Golden State Warriors to the brink of elim-

Now the Houston Rockets must wait to see if his injured leg is strong enough to help them take one last step to the NBA Finals.

Eric Gordon came off the bench to score 24 points and his steal on Golden State's last possession secured a 98-94 victory Thursday night that gave the Rockets a 3-2 lead in the Western Conference finals. But the victory came with a cost, as Paul had to leave the game in the final minute with a right hamstring injury that could keep him out of Game 6.

"His spirits aren't great,' coach Mike D'Antoni said. "He wanted to be out there, and for sure he's worried we'll see tomorrow how it goes."

Paul was receiving treatment after the game and did not speak to reporters.

The Rockets head to Oakland for Game 6 on Saturday night a win away from knocking off the defending champions and advancing to the NBA Finals for the first

time since winning back-to-

back titles in 1994-95.

Kevin Durant scored 29 points for the Warriors, who lost in Game 5 of a playoff series for just the second time since 2015. Just like Cleveland in the East, a run of three straight trips to the championship round is on the verge of ending.

"We haven't been in this position before ... so it's a chapter we need to figure out and finish the story," Stephen Curry

The Rockets won a second traight defensive struggle between the two potent offenses, leaving the Warriors a loss from missing the NBA Finals

for the first time since 2014. Draymond Green made a 3-pointer with just over minute left to get Golden State within one. Harden, who was 0 for 11 on 3s, missed his last one with less than 30 seconds left, giving the Warriors the ball back.

Curry missed a floater and Trevor Ariza grabbed the rebound and was fouled with 10 seconds left. But he made just one of two free throws to give the Warriors another chance.

But Gordon came up with his steal when Green lost control in the lane and added two free throws with 2.4 seconds left to put it away.

Green was asked what was supposed to happen on the "We was supposed to score,"

he said. "I lost the ball ... not

much more to it than that.' Harden scoffed at a reporter who questioned him about his struggles from long range in the last two games, where he's

"Who cares," he said. "I'm just missing shots, but we're winning."

Klay Thompson shook off a knee injury that had his status for this game in question to score 23 points and Curry added 22. A bruised left knee kept Andre Iguodala out for the second straight game, and Kevon Looney started in his place.

After losing Game 1 of the series, the Rockets made the best of home-court advantage this time, thrilling a sellout crowd that included Justin Timberlake, Houston Texans star J.J. Watt and rapper Travis Scott.

Houston's straight win in the series after

snapping Golden State's NBA

playoff-record, 16-game home winning streak with a 95-92 victory on Tuesday night.

Golden State led by one to start the fourth before Paul got going, scoring seven points to power a 10-5 run that gave the Rockets an 81-77 lead with about 9 1/2 minutes left.

Thompson made a 3-pointer after that and then officials reviewed Paul's first basket of the quarter and ruled he got it off after the shot clock expired, leaving the Warriors ahead 80-79.

The Rockets were clinging to a one-point lead with about seven minutes left when Durant fouled Gordon on a 3-point attempt, losing one of his shoes in the process. Gordon made all three free throws to start a 7-2 spurt that extended the lead to 88-82 midway through the quarter.

Warriors: Coach Steve Kerr was unsure Thursday if Iguodala would be able to return for Game 6. "He's dying to play, but he's not healthy enough, Kerr said. "We'll just continue to take it day to day."... Curry made four free throws to tie Rick Barry for most free throws made in the playoffs in franchise history with 378. ... Golden State had 18 turnovers.

Rockets: Clint Capela had 12 points and 14 rebounds for his seventh double-double this postseason. ... Houston made 13 of 43 3-pointers, led by four from Gordon.

SANTA FE STRONG

The Rockets honored the 10 people killed in last week's school shooting in Santa Fe, Texas, before the game, with the school's choir singing the national anthem and team owner Tilman Fertitta wearing a "Santa Fe Strong" T-shirt, before Houston scored the game's first six points in a first half where the team led by as many as 11.

Houston also wore rectangular patches on its jerseys that read: "Santa Fe HS," to remember those affected by the tragedy.

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
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

- 1. One spade. This may seem to be an enormous underbid, but that's
- and then bidding one spade after partner's heart response, you portray a strong hand typically 17 points that was too good for an immediate one-spade overcall. At this point, you must keep in
- mind that partner's one-heart reply to your takeout double does not promise any strength at all. You hope to hear from partner again, but if he passes, it is highly unlikely that your side can make a game.
- 2. Three hearts. With your excellent trump fit, 17 high-card points and singleton club, you don't need

much more than K-10-x-x-x of hearts in partner's hand to have a good play for game. A two-heart bid would be too pessimistic, and four hearts too optimistic. Three is just about right.

3. Two hearts. Again you have 17

- high-card points, but your distribution is not nearly as good as in the previous hand. There is no singleton club here, and that makes a world of difference. Moreover, the raise to two hearts is in itself a very positive move; it tells partner you had more than a minimum double, as well as a good trump fit, and that is really just about all you have in this case.
- 4. One notrump. This may seem unduly conservative, but since partner has promised no strength, one notrump is as far as you should want to go. If you were to jump to two notrump instead, you would be contracting single-handedly for 62 percent of the tricks with only 45 percent of the points in the deck, and you would thus be placing yourself in distinct jeopardy. The one-notrump bid, on the heels of your takeout double, indicates a hand of at least

opening notrump strength.

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

History: On May 25, 1968, the Gateway Arch in St. Louis was dedicated by Vice President Hubert Humphrey and Interior Secretary Stewart

On this date:

In 1521, Martin Luther was branded a heretic and had his writings banned by the Edict of Worms (vohrms) because of his religious beliefs.

In 1787, the Constitutional Convention began at the Pennsylvania State House (Independence Hall) in Philadelphia after enough delegates had shown up for a quo-

In 1793, Father Stephen Theodore Badin became the first Roman Catholic priest to be ordained in the United States during a ceremony in Baltimore.

In 1810, Argentina began its revolt against Spanish rule with the forming of the Primera Junta in Buenos Aires.

In 1916, the Chicago Tribune published an interview with Henry Ford in which the automobile industrialist was quoted as saying, "History is more or less bunk."

In 1935, Babe Ruth hit his last three career home runs nos. 712, 713 and 714 — for the Boston Braves in a game against the Pittsburgh Pirates. (The Pirates won, 11-7.)

In 1942, U.S. Army Lt. Gen. Joseph Stilwell, frustrated over being driven out of Burma by Japanese forces during World War II, told reporters in Delhi, India: "I claim we got a hell of a beating.

In 1957, the third tube of the Lincoln Tunnel connecting New York and New Jersey was opened to traffic.

In 1961, President John F. Kennedy told Congress: "I believe that this nation should commit itself to achieving the goal, before this decade is out. of landing a man on the moon and returning him safely to the earth."

In 1979, 273 people died when an American Airlines DC-10 crashed just after takeoff from Chicago's O'Hare Airport. Sixvear-old Etan Patz (AY'-tahn payts) disappeared while on his way to a school bus stop in lower Manhattan. (In April 2017, former store clerk Pedro Hernandez, convicted of killing Etan, was sentenced to at least 25 years in prison.)

In 1986, an estimated 7 million Americans participated in "Hands Across America" to raise money for the nation's hungry and homeless.

In 1992, Jay Leno made his debut as host of NBC's "Tonight Show," succeeding Johnny Carson.

Ten years ago: A tornado tore through the Parkersburg, Iowa, area, killing nine people. NASA's Phoenix Mars Lander arrived on the Red Planet to begin searching for evidence of water; the spacecraft confirmed the presence of water ice at its landing site. Seven crashes and spinouts marred the first Indianapolis 500 since the two warring open-wheel series (CART and IRL) came together under the IndyCar banner: Scott Dixon staved ahead of the trouble to win the race. The French film "The Class" won top honors at the Cannes Film Festival. J.R. Simplot, Idaho's billionaire potato king, died in Boise at

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Trump pardons late boxer Jack Johnson a century later

 $WASHINGTON-President\ Donald\ Trump$ has granted a rare posthumous pardon to boxing's first black heavyweight champion, clearing Jack Johnson's name more than 100 years after what many see as his racially charged conviction.

"I am taking this very righteous step, I believe, to correct a wrong that occurred in our history and to honor a truly legendary boxing champion," Trump said Thursday during an Oval Office ceremony. He was joined by WBC heavyweight champion Deontay Wilder, retired heavyweight titleholder Lennox Lewis and actor Sylvester Stallone, whom Trump credited with championing the pardon.

Trump said Johnson had served 10 months in prison "for what many view as a raciallymotivated injustice."

"It's my honor to do it. It's about time," the president said.

Trump had tweeted in late April that Stallone, a longtime friend, had brought Johnson's story to his attention in a phone call.

> The Oval Office ceremony was a celebratory scene, bringing together boxing greats past, present and fictional. The guests brought with them a colorful boxing championship belt, which sat front and center on the president's Resolute Desk as he spoke. At one point, Trump jokingly asked Lewis

whether he could "take Deontay in a fight" if he really started working out.

Lewis said Johnson had been an inspiration to him personally, while Stallone said Johnson had served as the basis of the character Apollo Creed in his "Rocky" films.

This has been a long time coming," he said Trump has a personal history with the sport, and hosted matches in the 1990s at his hotels.

After Johnson's conviction, he spent seven years as a fugitive, but eventually returned to the U.S. and turned himself in. He served about a year in federal prison and was re leased in 1921. He died in 1946 in an auto crash.

His great-great niece, Linda E. Haywood, had pressed Trump for a posthumous pardon, and Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., and former Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev., had promoted Johnson's case for years. The son of former slaves, Johnson defeated

Tommy Burns for the heavyweight title in

1908 at a time when blacks and whites rarely

entered the same ring. He then beat a series of "great white hopes," culminating in 1910 with the undefeated former champion, James J. McCain previously told The Associated Press that Johnson "was a boxing legend and pioneer whose career and reputation were

ruined by a racially charged conviction more

than a century ago." McCain, who is often at odds with Trump, praised him late Thursday for the pardon.

"I applaud President Trump for issuing a post humous pardon of boxing legend Jack Johnson whose reputation was ruined by a racially charged conviction over a century ago," he said in a tweet.

"Pretty much. I think that's part of it. It seems that way," Wilson said. "But I think a policy right or wrong is not going to fix our problems."

The new policy allows teams to adopt their own workplace rules, which many players interpreted as a backhanded way of subjecting them to fines, suspensions or loss of jobs should they carry on

Players are also frustrated the league didn't consult with the players' association before announcing the policy.

"I mean, they weren't ever going to engage us anyway. When you really think about it, why would we have a say-so?" Denver linebacker Brandon Marshall said. "I think they should have, right, but I guess they don't look at us like that, to have a sayso or input in this policy."

Others around the league didn't see the policy as a potential issue.

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"I'm really not too worried about it. I would expect that everybody's gonna be out there with their hand over their heart, showing respect to the flag and to the country," New Orleans quarterback Drew Brees said.

But teammate Demario Davis had mixed emotions about the policy. His father served in the military, but he also understands why players have been protesting.
