New procedures are now in effect through the Texas Decerning advancement in grade on drivers licenses.

A DPS spokesman said in the past an applicant has been permitted to drive any type of commercial vehicle on the road

test with the examiner. Now applicants for the commercial or chauffeur licenses must take the road test in a commercial type vehicle which has a manufacturer's rated capacity more than 2000 pounds or one ton. The vehicle can be designated to carry either passengers or property as long as it meets the size re-
