weekend after," said parade organizer Lisa Duggan. "Anybody who wants to be in it is more than welcome. They'll just need to be in the lineup by 9 a.m."

Duggan said the parade will line up at the Coahoma High School Stadium parking lot, and the parade will head south down Main Street at 10 a.m. The parade will include favorites such as the Texas Tech Uni-

versity Masked Rider, Hardin Simmons University's Six White Horses and Jimmy Sherrod and his "Big Boy Toys" of Garden City. Local floats, bands and cars, among other things, will fill out

By day, she's a mild-mannered news director at KBST Media. When the sun goes down, she turns into Super Comic!

Adrienne Green can often be seen around town covering meetings, events, traffic accidents and fires for the local radio station, but said she's always had a dream of being a stand-up comedian. Lately, she's been making that dream a reality.

"I started writing in December, and I've been doing open mic since March at the Desert Flower Art Bar. They have open mic on Thursday nights. It's been good. It's been fun. Not every night is a success, but it's definitely a learning ex-

perience," Green said. "I'm going to say my first solid performance was the first Thursday in April. April 5. I tried it in March, but I wasn't prepared. It was just kind of off-the-cuff stuff. I was like, 'Oh, no! I need to come back prepared!'"

Come back prepared she did, and after only rocking the open mic for about two months, is moving on to bigger things: Green auditioned Friday in Snyder, and has been named as one of the first two semi-finalists in the annual West Texas Talent Search. As part of that experience, she'll perform at the Midland County Fair Aug. 25; and the next round of competition in the Talent Search Sept. 1.

"I saw it on Facebook,

and when I see things on Facebook sometimes I wonder if it's a scam or not, but actually they've been doing it for about 13 years. And I was like, 'Well, I'll go try it out and see how it goes.' It went good. I had trouble getting my application in online, so I had to get there early to fill it out. So then he said, 'Well, you're here. Let's go ahead and get started.' As soon as I got done, he said, 'You're our first semi-finalist.'"

Green said giving her performance in front of a single judge instead of a noisy bar crowd was a little different.

"He was the director and organizer of it. His name is Daniel Richard Ryan," she said. "I had a microphone and I stood

Trump declares primaries delivered 'great night' for GOP

LOS ANGELES — Primaries in eight states bolstered Democrats' hopes for a "blue wave" in November, but President Donald Trump put his own spin on the races, declaring Wednesday "the Trump impact" had delivered a "great night" for Republicans.

the race for governor. Lt. Gov. Gavin Newsom, a Democrat, easily advanced the general election, with business executive John Cox coming in second.

Cox's strong finish put to rest GOP fears that no Republican would qualify for the deeply Democratic state's top office this fall and the party's other candidates would suffer from a resulting lack of voter interest on election day.

"Great night for Republicans!" Trump tweeted Wednesday, hailing what he called "the Trump impact."

"So much for the big Blue Wave, it may be a big Red Wave," he added. "Working hard!"

That remains to be seen, as voters in seven other states went to

Dr. Bradford Glass was born in Luling, Texas, on Jan. 12, 1947, to Weldon and Dorothy Glass. He grew up in Denver City and Monahans, Texas. In 1969 he graduated from Baylor University with a Bachelor of Science in Biology. He furthered his degree in San Francisco, California, where he graduated from the California College of Podiatric Medicine. He was later certified by the American Board of Foot and Ankle Surgery and named Fellow of the American College of Foot and Ankle Surgeons. He was a member and later, President of the Texas Podiatric Medical Association and served as a board member for the American Podiatric Medical Association. Dr. Glass also served as an investigator and President of the Texas State Board of Podiatric Medical Examiners and was a true advocate for both his profession and his peers.

in Big Spring, Texas, and helping with many projects to improve Buffalo Trail Scout Ranch in Ft. Davis, Texas. He introduced a love of Scouting to his son who also became an Eagle Scout and to his daughters and granddaughter who are involved in Girl Scouts.

Dr. Glass 71, was preceded in death by his parents and a brother, John. He is survived by his loving wife of 47 years Lauretta, his children Matthew Glass (wife Brea), Debby Glass, and Becky McLaren (husband Tayton), Ken and Donna Cronenworth (brother in law and sister in law), Brice and Kindra Moore (niece), and Charles Cronenworth (nephew). He was fondly known as 'Pops' to his three grandchildren: Alaura, Brennan, and Pyper.

the polls. Neither party immediately appeared to suffer major setbacks. And the winners and losers in California's most competitive races could take days to sort out given the state's unique election laws.

But Trump saw the night as a repudiation of "Fake News"

"Many more Republican voters showed up yesterday than the Fake News thought possible," Trump tweeted. "The political pundits just don't get what is going on out there - or they do get it but refuse to report the facts! Remember, Dems are High Tax, High Crime, easy to beat!"

Overall, it was a big night for women, as female candidates for governor advanced, including Democrat Michelle Lujan Grisham in New Mexico and Republican Kristi Noem in South Dakota. Female Republican governors in Alabama and Iowa will vie for their first full terms after succeeding men who resigned.

California's Sen. Dianne Feinstein also fared well, fending off challenges from the left. It was still unclear whether a Republican would earn enough votes to oppose her on California's November ballot.

The governor's race was one of many drawing attention to California, a state not accustomed to being a national political battleground. But its handful of competitive House races — more than a half dozen Republican-held seats may be in play — have made it hotly contested territory in the fight over control of the House, drawing big money and the spotlight on the biggest primary night of midterms. Democrats need to pick up 23 seats nationwide to retake the House.

Much of Tuesday's drama focused on women, including former federal prosecutor and Navy pilot Mikie Sherrill, who bested a field of Democratic rivals to replace retiring New Jersey Republican Rep. Rodney Frelinghuysen. The favorite of Washington Democrats will take on GOP Assemblyman Jay Webber in one of several New Jersey races Democrats view as possible pickups.

In Alabama, four-term Republican Rep. Martha Roby was forced into a runoff election next month after failing to win 50 percent of her party's vote. She will face former Democratic Rep. Bobby Bright in Alabama's conservative 2nd district — where Trump loyalty has been a central issue.

Roby was the first member of Congress to withdraw her endorsement of the Republican president in 2016 after he was caught on video bragging about grabbing women's genitals.

In New Mexico, Democratic Rep. Michelle Lujan Grisham won her party's nomination in the race to succeed outgoing Republican Gov. Susana Martinez. If Grisham wins, she'll be the state's second Latino state executive.

Alabama Gov. Kay Ivey fended off three GOP challengers, while South Dakota Rep. Kristi Noem became the first female nominee for governor in her state.

In Iowa, 28-year-old Democratic state Rep. Abby Finkenauer was trying to become the youngest woman to serve in Congress.

And in New Mexico, former state Democratic Party Chairwoman Debra Haaland, a tribal member of Laguna Pueblo, won her primary and could become the first Native American woman in Congress if she wins this fall.

Haaland said in her primary victory statement: "Donald Trump and the billionaire class should consider this victory a warning shot: the blue wave is coming."

Mississippi Republican Sen. Roger Wicker won

his primary contest as did New Jersey Sen. Bob Menendez, a Democrat who faced federal bribery charges last year. The jury deadlocked, but Republicans hope to use Menendez's legal troubles to tar other Democrats like Sherrill across the state.

Republican businessman Bob Hugin claimed the Republican nomination to face Menendez this fall.

In California, national Democrats spent more than \$7 million trying to curb and repair the damage inflicted by Democrats attacking each other in districts opened by retiring Republican Reps. Ed Royce and Darrell Issa, and the district where Republican Dana Rohrabacher is facing challenges from the left and the right.

In two of the three Southern California districts, Democrats were coming in second place behind Republicans, but the races were too close to call early Wednesday, leaving Democrats at risk of being locked out. In another, Issa's district, Republican Diane Harkey was leading in early returns, as two Democrats vied for the second slot.

Republican Rep. Mimi Walters easily advanced to the November election in her Orange County district that has been targeted by Democrats. The second spot remained up for grabs.

And to the north, House intelligence committee chairman Devin Nunes, a Republican, qualified for the general election ballot as well. Nunes is a polarizing

figure in national politics given his support for Trump in one of the many investigations into Russian meddling in the 2016 election.

A key Senate race took shape in the heart of Trump country as well.

Montana Republicans were picking a candidate to take on Democratic Sen. Jon Tester, one of the most vulnerable senators in the nation. State Auditor Matt Rosendale won the GOP nomination.

in front of a screen and he recorded me while I did my five minutes. He didn't laugh. I finally got a couple of good laughs out of him, and then he put down his phone and said, 'I was recording you...I was trying really hard not to laugh but you got me.' Green's comedy material, so far, is drawn from her own life, she said.

"My husband is quite a character, so I enjoy telling over-enthusiastic dramatizations of our marriage, and with my brother and my sister and our family so far. There are other things that I'm looking forward to writing about, I just haven't put it together so far. My influences are the storytellers; Gabriel Iglesias, Bernie Mac...I don't really do any one-liners, but Mitch Hedberg is somebody else that I also enjoy. And George Lopez."

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DPS Joins Annual Commercial Vehicle Inspection Effort

AUSTIN – Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) Troopers, inspectors and investigators will conduct enhanced commercial vehicle inspections from June 5-7 as part of Roadcheck 2018, an annual three-day enforcement effort across North America to increase motor carrier, vehicle, driver and cargo safety and security. DPS Troopers will be on the lookout for commercial vehicles, including 18-wheelers and buses, with serious equipment violations and drivers out of compliance with state and federal requirements.

“The Roadcheck program highlights how essential commercial vehicle compliance and enforcement is to overall highway safety,”

said DPS Director Steven McCraw. “Drivers of both commercial and passenger vehicles can do their part to help save lives and reduce crashes on our roadways by always practicing safe driving practices and proper vehicle maintenance.”

In addition to Roadcheck, DPS periodically carries out additional enforcement efforts in targeted areas where a high volume of trucks or buses may be operating.

During Roadcheck 2018, specially-trained troopers and civilian personnel will inspect commercial vehicles for equipment violations involving brakes, tires, lights and loading standards. Troopers will check driver licenses and electronic logging devices/log books, which

document how long the driver has been on the road. In conjunction with these efforts, DPS will also be watching for aggressive, distracted, fatigued or impaired passenger vehicle drivers, the cause of most commercial vehicle crashes.

In 2017, DPS and other Texas law enforcement agencies participating in Roadcheck inspected 8,355 commercial vehicles. The inspections found that approximately 23.6 percent of the vehicles had serious violations that required the truck or bus to be placed out of service until repairs could be made. Inspectors also placed 227 drivers out of service for various violations, including operating a vehicle with brakes out of adjustment and failing to have the proper type of driver license for the vehicle being driven.

Each year, the Roadcheck program, which is sponsored by the Commercial Vehicle Safety Association (CVSA), places special emphasis on a category of violations. This year, CVSA will be highlighting hours-of-service compliance as a reminder of its importance to highway safety.

As Roadcheck begins, DPS is also reminding motorists to slow down or move over for vehicles on the side of the road. By law, drivers in Texas must move out of the lane closest to police, fire, EMS, Texas Department of Transportation vehicles and tow trucks that are stopped on the side of the road with emergency lights activated – or drivers must slow down to 20 mph below the speed limit. DPS encourages Texas motorists to show the same courtesy to fellow drivers stopped along the road.

Arrington Legislation to Improve Services for Disabled Veterans Signed into Law

WASHINGTON, DC – On Friday, June 1, the President signed into law bipartisan, common sense legislation authored by Congressman Jodey Arrington (TX-19) that ensures veterans with service-connected disabilities are provided with the best in-home adaptation services, and at a reduced cost to taxpayers.

“Currently, disabled veterans who need special modifications to their homes are stuck in a broken system with long wait times and mediocre services,” Arrington said.

Arrington’s bill transfers responsibility for home adaptations from the Vocational Rehabilitation and Employment (VR&E) program to Specially Adapted Housing agents. These agents have both the competency and capacity to speed up construction projects, providing more effective and efficient services to our disabled veterans, and saving taxpayers money.

“Someone injured while serving our country in the military deserves nothing less than the highest level of excellence from their government. This common sense solution is sorely needed to save taxpayers money and, most importantly, help our disabled veterans by putting the right people on the job to address their needs in a timely fashion.

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Hawaii volcano lava destroys hundreds of homes overnight

HONOLULU (AP) — Lava destroyed hundreds of homes in mostly rural Hawaii area overnight, a county spokeswoman said Tuesday.

"We don't have an estimate yet, but safe to say that hundreds of homes were lost in Kapoho Beach Lots and Vacationland last night," said Janet Snyder, a spokeswoman for Hawaii County on the Big Island.

A morning overflight confirmed that lava completely filled Kapoho Bay, inundated most of Vacationland and covered all but the northern part of Kapoho Beach Lots, scientists with

the U.S. Geological Survey's Hawaiian Volcano Observatory said.

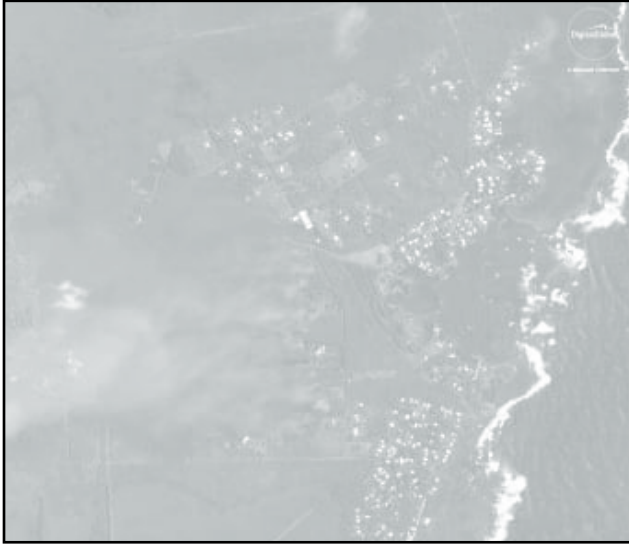
Lava early Tuesday destroyed Big Island Mayor Harry Kim's second home, Snyder said.

County Managing Director Wil Okabe said his own vacation home in Kapoho Beach Lots is also threatened. Okabe described the area as a mix of vacation rentals and year-round residences.

"For us it's more of a vacation area, but for those who live there permanently, they're trying to figure out where they're going to be living," he

Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission Approves Hunting Regulation Changes for 2018-19

AUSTIN — Hunters will see several hunting regulation changes this fall, including an early opener for dove season in the South Zone, a mule deer season in Lynn County, experimental mule deer antler restrictions, an increase to the northern pintail bag limit, and a one week reduction to the spring Eastern turkey season for 2019 in 13 counties.

The following modifications and clarifications to the 2018-19 Statewide

Hunting Proclamation, details of which will be incorporated into this year's Texas Parks and Wildlife Department Outdoor Annual, have been approved by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission:

Open the general dove season in the South Zone on Sept. 14; earliest starting date for the region since 1950.

Shorten the Eastern spring turkey hunting season in Bowie, Cass, Fannin, Grayson, Jasper, Lamar, Marion, Nacogdoches, Newton, Panola, Polk, Red River, and Sabine by one week while retaining the current closing date of May 14. The Commission also approved closing the Eastern turkey season in Upshur and San Augustine counties.

Open in Lynn County a 9-day buck-only mule deer season with no special archery season.

Set a 20-inch minimum outside antler spread of the main beams restric-

tion on mule deer bucks in Briscoe, Childress, Cottle, Floyd, Motley, and Hall counties.

Clarify that deer antler restriction regulations that state in each county where antler restrictions are imposed, a person who takes a buck in violation of antler restrictions is prohibited from subsequently harvesting any buck deer with branched antlers on both main beams in that county during that current deer season.

Lastly, The Commission adopted changes that simplified archery regulations by remove requirements for broadhead hunting points to have two cutting edges and a cutting width of 7/8 of an inch. Also removed were the minimum pull requirement of 125 pounds and the minimum crossbow stock length of 25 inches.

After re-evaluating a proposal that would permit the use of air guns and arrow guns to take certain game animals, game birds, alligators, and furbearers, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission has rescinded the previous rule they adopted in March and has requested staff to modify their recommendations and propose new rules to be considered by the Commission at their next scheduled meeting in August.

Place your bets: Delaware takes sports wagers, others close

DOVER, Del. (AP) — The market for legal sports gambling in the United States widened significantly on Tuesday with expanded betting in Delaware, putting legal wagering within driving distance of three major East Coast cities less than a month after the U.S. Supreme Court cleared the way for states to accept the bets.

Instead of flying to Las Vegas or betting illegally, fans in Philadelphia, Baltimore and Washington can make a short drive to legally bet in Delaware on the NBA Finals, the Stanley Cup Final or the World Cup. More states are likely to join the action by the time the NFL starts its season in the fall.

"Giants and Yankees, all day, every day," Manhattan native Karriem Keys said Tuesday after betting on the New York Giants to win the Super Bowl next year.

Keys, 53, who now lives in Dover, was one of a couple of dozen people laying down early wagers at Dover Downs as Delaware became the first state outside Nevada to offer legal gambling on individual sporting events.

"In New York, we would go right to the corner store, to the bodega, and bet," Keys said. "That's not legal, but, you know, everybody was doing it. But now it's legal so it's great."

Gov. John Carney had the honor of placing the first bet, wagering \$10 on the Philadelphia Phillies to beat the Chicago Cubs on Tuesday night.

"I'm a big sports fan, a big Philadelphia sports fan," said Carney, who traveled to Minnesota in February to watch the Eagles win the Super Bowl.

Dover Downs casino workers took in 36 bets within the first 20 minutes of legal wagering. The offerings at Delaware's three casinos include bets on professional baseball, football, hockey, basketball, soccer, golf and auto racing.

Handbag designer Kate Spade found hanged in apparent suicide

NEW YORK (AP) — Kate Spade, a fashion designer known for her sleek handbags, was found hanged in the bedroom of her Park Avenue apartment Tuesday in an apparent suicide, police said. She was 55.

Spade's body was found by a housekeeper not long after 10 a.m., police said at an afternoon news conference. Her husband and business partner Andy Spade was in the apartment at the time.

The police department's chief of detectives, Dermot Shea, said that while investigators were still in the early stages of their inquiry, evidence including the state of the apartment and the presence of a note pointed to "a tragic suicide."

It's not clear how long Spade had been dead. The medical examiner will perform an autopsy.

The couple's 13-year-old daughter was at school. Shea wouldn't discuss what was in the note, but law enforcement officials told The Associated Press that, among other things, it contained a message to the teenage girl telling her it was not her fault. The officials were not authorized to speak publicly and spoke on condition of anonymity.

"We are all devastated by today's tragedy," her family said in a statement through a spokesman. "We loved Kate dearly and will miss her terribly."

We would ask that our privacy be respected as we grieve during this very difficult time."

A crime scene truck was parked outside their building on Manhattan's Upper East Side, and barriers had been set up to keep back reporters and gawkers who were arriving to the building.

The company she founded and later sold, Kate Spade New York, now has over 140 retail shops and outlet stores across the U.S. and more than 175 shops internationally.

Julia Curry, a spokeswoman for the company, said that "Kate will be dearly missed" and "our thoughts are with Andy and the entire Spade family at this time."

Neva Hall, executive Vice President at Neiman Marcus Stores, said the news was devastating.

"Her creative light and bright mind will be greatly missed," Hall wrote in a statement.

Kate Spade was born Katherine Brosnahan and grew up in Kansas City, Missouri.

She was working as an accessories editor at Mademoiselle magazine when she launched her company with husband Andy in their New York apartment in 1993. She started the company based on six shapes of bags that she thought every working woman needed. It created a smash.

Miss America drops swimsuit portion and won't judge on looks

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) — When the Miss America pageant started in 1921, having young women parade around in bathing suits seemed like a great way to get tourists to come to the Atlantic City Boardwalk after Labor Day.

But how America views women has changed drastically since then, and the Miss America Organization is run by women who don't think it's such a hot idea.

Accordingly, when the pageant is held this September, nearly a year into the #MeToo era, it will no longer have a swimsuit competition.

"We're not going to judge you on your appearance because we are interested in what makes you you," Gretchen Carlson, a former Miss America and the new head of the organization's board of trustees, said in making the announcement Tuesday on ABC's "Good Morning America."

For decades, women's groups and others had complained that the swimsuit portion was outdated, sexist and more than a little silly.

Carlson, whose sexual harassment lawsuit against Fox News Chairman Roger Ailes led to his departure, said the board had heard from potential contestants who lamented, "We don't want to be out there in high heels and swimsuits."

The announcement came after a shake-up at the organization that resulted in the top three positions being held by women. The overhaul was triggered by an email scandal last December in which Miss America officials mocked winners' intelligence, looks and sex lives.

Instead of showing off in a

bathing suit, each contestant will interact with the judges to "highlight her achievements and goals in life and how she will use her talents, passion and ambition to perform the job of Miss America," the organization said.

Carlson said the evening-wear portion of the competition will also be changed to allow women to wear something other than a gown if they want. The talent portion of the contest will remain.

"It's what comes out of their mouths that we care about," Carlson said.

Leanza Cornett, Miss America 1993, supported the dropping of the swimsuit competition.

Beltre tiebreaking HR for Rangers beats A's 7-4

ARLINGTON, Texas — Adrian Beltre and the Texas Rangers went deep against the A's.

Beltre hit a tiebreaking homer leading off the eighth, and the Rangers scored all of their runs on a season-high five long balls in a 7-4 win over the Oakland Athletics on Tuesday night.

"I think our offense is capable to do this more often," Beltre said.

Beltre made it 5-4 when he connected off reliever Lou Trivino (3-1), who then walked Jurickson Profar before Joey Gallo pulled a two-run shot into the right-field seats. It was Gallo's 16th homer, and Profar hit his fourth earlier in the game.

After missing 28 games during two stints on the disabled list because of a left hamstring strain, and playing only his fourth game since being activated again, it was only Beltre's second homer this season. His first at home was his 3,083th career hit, the most among active players.

"It's tremendous for Adrian to get on the board with a home run there late when we needed something big to kind of pick us up in that situation," manager Jeff Ban-

ister said.

Chris Martin (1-1) pitched a scoreless eighth for his first big league victory, and Keone Kela struck out the side in a perfect ninth for his 14th save — the most in the majors without a blown chance.

Shin-Soo Choo stretched his majors-best on-base streak to 21 games with a leadoff walk in the first. His game-tying two-run homer in the seventh, right after Delino DeShields had a bunt single to end an 0-for-21 stretch, gave Choo a 12-game hitting streak to match Colorado's Charlie Blackmon for the longest active in the big leagues.

Robinson Chirinos, on his 34th birthday, and Profar also homered for Texas.

"This ballpark is a little bit conducive to it, especially when it's playing like it is tonight with the wind blowing," A's manager Bob Melvin said. "You've got to keep the ball down. Some of their best hitters got some big hits for them."

Khris Davis hit a two-run homer and scored on Matt Olson's single in the first for Oakland. Davis hit a solo homer, his 14th, in the fifth for a 3-1 lead. Olson's second RBI single of the game made it 4-2 in the seventh, when the A's left the bases loaded.

Cavs turning to seldom-used Hood against Warriors

CLEVELAND — Rodney Hood's most significant moment in these playoffs came while sitting on the bench.

Well, he's getting up and getting in the NBA Finals. Looking for an offensive weapon to negate Golden State's size and ability to switch assignments on defense, Cavaliers coach Tyronn Lue said he'll play Hood in Game 3 on Wednesday night in hopes of cutting into the Warriors' series lead.

Hood, who began this postseason in Cleveland's starting lineup, has been mostly a non-factor during the Cavs' spring run which included him refusing to check into the final minutes of a blowout win over Toronto in the second round.

That's not an option now.

"We're going to give Rodney a chance," Lue said following practice at Quicken Loans Arena on Tuesday. "He'll get a shot and see how he does. He's been working, staying ready. So we'll see."

Lue didn't specify if Hood will start, when he'll come in, how much he'll play or whose minutes will be affected.

Hood promised to be ready for anything.

"I don't know when it's going to come or what stage of the game," Hood said. "I've been preparing. I've been working hard, so if I get the opportunity, just go out there and play. Just have fun."

Trailing 2-0, the Cavs are searching for some kind of spark and could find it if the 6-foot-8 Hood can tap into some of the offensive skills that made

him attractive to Cleveland at the trading deadline.

He was acquired on Feb. 8 from Utah, and there were more than a few basketball experts who viewed the lean lefty as the best new piece on a day when the Cavs also dealt for guards George Hill, Jordan Clarkson and big man Larry Nance Jr.

Lue didn't get nearly enough in Games 1 and 2 in Oakland from J.R. Smith (5 of 19) or Kyle Korver (4 points). Korver has been completely neutralized by the Warriors, who are not giving him any room to shoot.

"It's hard because they switch out on everything," Lue said. "So all the actions you run for Kyle, they just switch out to deny and take him away. When they are helping on LeBron's penetration, the one guy they're staying at home on is Kyle. They're not leaving his body."

Unlike the 37-year-old Korver, Hood is quick enough to beat the Warriors off the dribble, create open space to shoot and maybe get to the rim. Defensively, he's got length and mobility.

He's shown flashes. The Cavs now need him to shine steadily.

"He's very talented," said forward Kevin Love. "He's a guy that can step in and fill up a scoreboard. Left-handed. A little bit unorthodox in the way that he plays. Just having that height on him and that wingspan, and the ability to not only make shots, but on the defensive end to switch out. Also play a guy like K.D. (Kevin Durant) at his size and just make it tough on both ends of the floor for their team. That gives all of us a lot of confidence that he can come in and make an im-

pact."

Hood's short stay in Cleveland has been nondescript.

He averaged 16.8 points for the Jazz, but the 25-year-old never truly found his rhythm while coming off the bench for the Cavs over the regular season's final 21 games. Still, he was in Lue's starting lineup for the series opener against Indiana before Cleveland got beat soundly.

Hood saw spot duty the remainder of that series, and was essentially ineffective in three games against the Raptors before Lue tried to send him into the closing minutes of the clinching win on May 7 as the Cavs completed a sweep of the Eastern Conference's top-seeded team.

When Hood declined, it upset a few teammates. Hood insisted he wasn't protesting his reduced role and ex-

plained that there had been a mix-up. He apologized to the Cavs, many of whom laughed off the incident as minimal in a season overflowing with juicier drama.

While waiting for another chance, Hood has received positive support from Cleveland's coaches and former teammates, including Joe Johnson who could relate to his plight after sitting in Houston.

Hood is Houston he's ready.

"Just going out there and try to help the team, on offense be aggressive and on defense just be physical," he said.

Hood struggled during a playoff series with Utah against Golden State a year ago, making just 1 of 15 3-pointers and shooting 12 of 38 overall.

Those stats don't matter now.

The only number that counts is his and will soon be called.

Florida State wins first WCWS title

OKLAHOMA CITY— Jessie Warren's career finished just the way she envisioned it.

On Monday night, Florida State's star third baseman made perhaps the play of her career, a diving catch and throw for a double play that helped preserve a 1-0 win over Washington in Game 1 of the Women's College World Series championship series.

On Tuesday, the senior did the damage with her bat. She had three hits, including a homer, and Florida State beat Washington 8-3 on Tuesday night to claim its first national title.

Warren, who hit .520 in the World Series, was named most outstanding player. As it all sunk in, tears started to flow.

"I think that's every senior's

dream, is to leave with a 'W,' to end their season on a 'W,'" she said. "That was one of the goals. I am so proud of this team. This university has done so much for me. This coaching staff has taken me under their belt as their own child. I came into this program as a kid and I'm leaving it as a strong woman. I wouldn't have wanted it any other way."

The Seminoles (58-12) won the best-of-three championship series 2-0. They lost their opener before winning six straight to become just the third team to come through the losers' bracket and take the title.

Florida State pitcher Meghan King settled down after a rough start to complete a record-setting World Series. She broke the record for lowest ERA (0.20) among pitchers who threw at least 10 innings. She

earned four wins and a save in Oklahoma City while allowing just one earned run in 34 1/3 innings. She was on such a run that Florida State's ace throughout the season, Kylee Hanson, never had to pitch in the championship series.

It was the first national title for an Atlantic Coast Conference team.

"These kids took a chance on us and the dream to be here," Florida State coach Lonni Alameda said. "People contact us because they want to play in the national championship game and that's what we want to teach and coach. To be told that you can only be in other conferences — now we've come through and you don't. You can go to the ACC and you can play at different schools. It means so much for the growth of the game."

Dear Confused and Disappointed: Your son should keep his word and pay you back without your having to prompt him, but "should" doesn't put money in the bank. It's time to speak up and speak firmly. As you said, you're not an ATM. You're an

autonomous person with a voice. Now use it. Tell your son directly -- not just through your husband -- that you expect him to pay you back in full within three months (or however long you deem acceptable). Draft up a contract with a timetable, and have him sign it. There's no guarantee of his repayment unless you want to get an attorney involved, and I don't get the impression you do. But he might be moved (i.e., shamed) to action once he sees how serious you are.

Lastly, don't blame yourself for his lack of accountability. No matter how strongly we impress values upon our children, it's up to them to see that they stick in adulthood.

Opening lead — queen of spades.
Many deals present declarer with a choice of several lines of play. Whenever he is faced with such a situation, declarer should opt for the approach that offers the greatest likelihood of success.
Consider this deal where South reached six diamonds as shown. He won the spade lead, drew a round of trumps, cashed the A-K-Q of hearts and ruffed his last heart in dummy.

He then played the ace and another club, and the defenders collected two club tricks to put the slam down on.
Declarer's method of play would have worked against several distributions of the adverse clubs. If either opponent had been dealt the doubleton K-Q, or if East had started with the singleton king or queen, declarer would have been home free.
In addition, South would have succeeded if East had been dealt the doubleton king or queen of clubs. In that case, East would have been forced to return a spade after taking his club trick, allowing declarer to discard his last club as he ruffed in dummy.
Granting the legitimacy of South's line of play, the fact remains that the line he chose was due to fail far more than half the time.
A much better approach — admittedly hard to think of because it is an unnatural thing to do — is to lead a low heart toward dummy at trick three and finesse the ten! As it happens, the ten wins, and declarer can later discard two of dummy's clubs on his K-Q of hearts, thus losing only one club trick.
Because the heart finesse will make the slam whenever West holds the jack — 50 percent of the time — it is clearly the superior line of play.

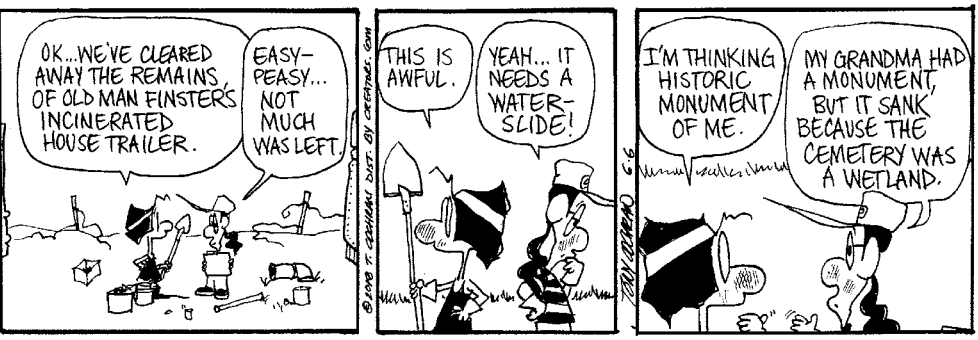

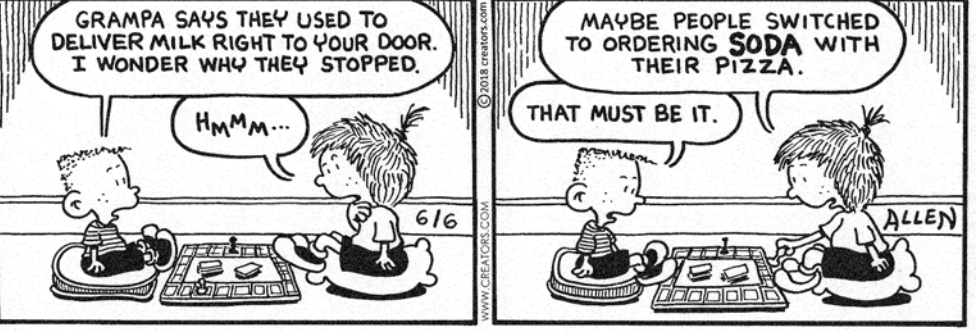

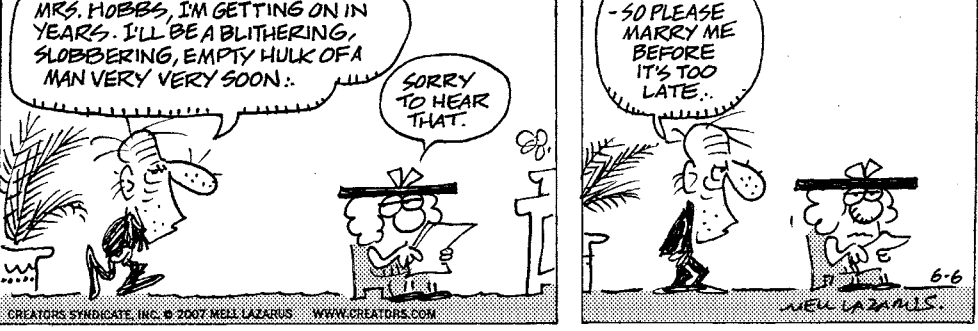

This Date In History

Today is Wednesday, June 6, the 157th day of 2018. There are 208 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On June 6, 1968, Sen. Robert F. Kennedy died at Good Samaritan Hospital in Los Angeles, 25 1/2 hours after he was shot by Sirhan Bishara Sirhan. On this date: In 1523, Gustav Vasa became Sweden's new king, Gustav I. In 1654, Queen Christina of Sweden abdicated; she was succeeded by her cousin, Charles X Gustav. In 1799, American politician and orator Patrick Henry died at Red Hill Plantation in Virginia. In 1809, Sweden adopted a new constitution. In 1918, U.S. Marines suffered heavy casualties as they launched their eventually successful counteroffensive against German troops in the World War I Battle of Belleau Wood in France. In 1925, Walter Percy Chrysler founded the Chrysler Corp. In 1933, the first drive-in movie theater was opened by Richard Hollingshead in Camden County, New Jersey. (The movie shown was "Wives Beware," starring Adolphe Menjou.) In 1944, during World War II, Allied forces stormed the beaches of Normandy, France, on "D-Day" as they began the liberation of German-occupied Western Europe. In 1966, black activist James Meredith was shot and wounded as he walked along a Mississippi highway to encourage black voter registration. In 1978, California voters overwhelmingly approved Proposition 13, a primary ballot initiative calling for major cuts in property taxes. In 1982, Israeli forces invaded Lebanon to drive Palestine Liberation Organization fighters out of the country. (The Israelis withdrew in June 1985.) In 1994, President Bill Clinton joined leaders from America's World War II allies to mark the 50th anniversary of the D-Day invasion of Normandy. A China Northwest Airlines passenger jet crashed near Xian (SHEE'-ahn), killing all 160

people on board. Ten years ago: The Dow industrial average dropped 394.64 points to 12,209.81, its worst loss in more than a year. Crude futures soared nearly \$11 for the day to \$138.54 a barrel. Actor Bob Anderson, who played young George Bailey in "It's a Wonderful Life," died in Palm Springs, California, at age 75. Five years ago: Director of National Intelligence James Clapper moved to tamp down a public uproar spurred by the disclosure of secret surveillance programs involving phone and Internet records, declassifying key details about one of the programs while insisting the efforts were legal, limited in scope and necessary to detect terrorist threats. Russian President Vladimir Putin and his wife, Lyudmila Putina, announced they were divorcing after nearly 30 years of marriage. Esther Williams, 91, the swimming champion turned actress, died in Los Angeles. Longtime soap opera actress Maxine Stuart, 94, died in Beverly Hills, California. One year ago: Bill Cosby's chief accuser, Andrea Constand, took the stand at his sexual assault trial to tell her story publicly for the first time, saying the comedian groped her after giving her three blue pills that left her paralyzed and helpless. (The jury deadlocked, resulting in a mistrial, but Cosby was convicted in a second trial.) George and Amal Clooney welcomed twins Ella and Alexander. Saudi arms dealer Adnan Khashoggi, 81, once one of the world's richest men who was implicated in the Iran-Contra affair, died in London. Scooter Gennett hit four home runs, matching the major league record, as the Cincinnati Reds routed the St. Louis Cardinals 13-1. Today's Birthdays: Singer-songwriter Gary "U.S." Bonds is 79. This Date In History

Today is Friday, June 8, the 159th day of 2018. There are 206 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On June 8, 1968, authorities announced the capture in London of James Earl Ray, the suspected assassin of civil rights leader Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. On this date: In A.D. 632, the prophet Muhammad died in Medina. In 1042, Edward the Confessor became King of England, beginning a reign of 23 1/2 years. In 1845, Andrew Jackson, seventh president of the United States, died in Nashville, Tennessee. In 1917, during World War I, Maj. Gen. John J. Pershing, commander of the American Expeditionary Force, arrived in Liverpool, England, while en route to France; also, the 1st Expeditionary Division (later the 1st Infantry Division) was organized at Fort Jay in New York. In 1920, the Republican National Convention opened in Chicago; its delegates ended up nominating Warren G. Harding for president. In 1939, Britain's King George VI and his consort, Queen Elizabeth, arrived in Washington, D.C., where they were received at the White House by President Franklin D. Roosevelt. In 1948, the "Texaco Star Theater" made its debut on NBC-TV with Milton Berle guest-hosting the first program. (Berle was later named the show's permanent host.) In 1953, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled unanimously that restaurants in the District of Columbia could not refuse to serve blacks. Eight tornadoes struck Michigan's Lower Peninsula, killing 126 people. In 1967, during the six-day Middle East war, 34 American servicemen were killed when Israel attacked the USS Liberty, a Navy intelligence-gathering ship in the Mediterranean Sea. (Israel later said the Liberty had been mistaken for an Egyptian vessel.) In 1978, a jury in Clark County, Nevada, ruled the so-called "Mormon will," purportedly written by the late billionaire Howard Hughes, was a forgery. In 1987, Fawn Hall began testifying at the Iran-Contra hearings, describing how, as secretary to National Security aide Oliver L. North, she had helped shred some documents and spirit away others. In 1998, the National Rifle

Association elected actor Charlton Heston to be its president. Ten years ago: A suicide truck bomber struck a U.S. patrol base Sunday in northern Iraq, killing one U.S. soldier. A man went on a knife rampage in Tokyo, killing seven people. Rafael Nadal won his fourth consecutive French Open title in a rout, 6-1, 6-3, 6-0, again spoiling Roger Federer's bid to complete a career Grand Slam. Yani Tseng of Taiwan became the first rookie in 10 years to win a major, beating Maria Hjorth on the fourth hole of a playoff with a 5-foot birdie on the 18th hole to win the LPGA Championship in Maryland. Five years ago: President Barack Obama and Chinese leader Xi Jinping (shee jihn-peeng) concluded a two-day summit in the California desert that ended with few policy breakthroughs but the prospect of closer personal ties. Serena Williams won her 16th Grand Slam title and her first French Open championship since 2002, beating Maria Sharapova 6-4, 6-4. Palace Malice took charge on the turn for home and won the Belmont Stakes, holding off Preakness winner Oxbow and Kentucky Derby winner Orb. One year ago: Former FBI Director James Comey, testifying before Congress, asserted that President Donald Trump fired him to interfere with his investigation of Russia's ties to the Trump campaign. British Prime Minister Theresa May's strategy of calling an early election backfired as her Conservatives lost their majority in Parliament. Actress Glenna Headly died in Santa Monica, California, at age 62. Jelena Ostapenko became the first unseeded women's finalist at the French Open in more than 30 years by beating Timea Bacsinszky, 7-6 (4), 3-6, 6-3. (Ostapenko went on to win the title.) Today's Birthdays: Actor-comedian Jerry Stiller is 91. Actress Millicent Martin is 84. Actor James Darren is 82. Singer Nancy Sinatra is 78. Singer Chuck Negron is 76. Musician Boz Scaggs is 74.
