Public Hearings on tap for City Council

 Big Spring City Council members have their plates full for the council meeting scheduled Tuesday at the council chambers, 307 E. Fourth St. Starting with presentations and public hearings, the council will hear a presentation from Boy Scout David

Tidwell about his planned Scout project to distribute care packages to area homeless; Big Spring residents will then have the

opportunity to sound off to city leaders about three land use issues the council is considering. Those proposed changes include: a zoning change from Multi-Family Dwelling (MF) to Neighborhood Service (NS) at 903, 907 and 911 Douglas St.,

also known as Lots 2 to 4 in Block 17 of the Cedar Crest Addition; a zoning change from Neighborhood Service (NS) to Single-Family Residential Dwelling (SF-3) at 209 N.E. Seventh St., also known as a 50-foot by 130-foot lot in Tract 34 of the Wm. B. Currie Addition; and a proposed annexation of approximately 17.58 acres northwest of the intersection of West Sev-

enth and Lorilla streets, also known as two tracts out of the south part of Section 31, Block 33 North, one 5.65 acres, and the other 11.93 acres. After the public hearings, council members will consider several items of business, including bid awards. Up for council consideration are the recommended award of a bid

North Korea gets first big dose of Trump summit news

PYONGYANG, North Korea — North Koreans got their first big dose of news Monday that their leader Kim Jong Un had arrived in Singapore for what even the state-run media was calling a historic meeting with U.S. President Donald Trump.

The news covered the front page of the ruling party's newspaper and was the top — and only — item on the first news broadcast of the day on Korean Central Television, which for many North Koreans is the only channel available.

People crowded around poster stands at subway stations around the capital to read the news and gathered at noon in front of the city's main train station to watch a big screen display of images of Kim getting off the special Air China flight that took him to Singapore.

A report by the Korea Central News Agency said the summit would have "wide-ranging and profound talks" and noted that it is being held "under the great attention and expectation of the whole world."

The relative speed with which the state media got the news of Kim's arrival in Singapore out to the North Korean public suggests a certain level of confidence that the meeting will go well — or at least well enough. For the North, Kim Jong Un has already won a huge propaganda bonus by merely having the summit and sitting down as an equal with the U.S. president, an accomplishment his father and grandfather sought but could never realize.

By prominently showing the Air China jet that flew Kim to Singapore, the reports also made no secret of China's important role behind the scenes. That might not bode so well for Trump, who has expressed some concern about China's influence.

Even so, the summit continues to be a highly sensitive topic in North Korea and it is difficult — even more so than usual — to get people to express their opinions about it. The media reports Mon-

day follow months of only the scantiest of coverage of the plans for Kim to meet Trump, though his summits with South Korea's President Moon Jae-in and China's President Xi Jinping received major coverage soon after they had ended.

"When I woke up this morning I saw the news in the newspaper that our respected Marshal went to Singapore for the North Korea-U.S. summit," said Han Il Gwang, a Pyongyang resident, displaying typical discretion when speaking to an Associated Press Television crew. "I know that Singapore is a very hot country so I wish that our respected Marshal stays healthy and comes back in good health."

Such characteristic caution when speaking in public notwithstanding, there is no doubt the prospect of the summit is generating a good deal of interest, and probably astonishment, among average North Koreans.

North Korea has so far presented Kim's sudden diplomatic overtures to his neighbors and to the United States as a logical next step following what Kim has claimed is the completion of his plan to develop a credible nuclear deterrent to what Pyongyang has long claimed is a

policy of hostility and "nuclear blackmail" by Washington.

Those points were echoed in Monday's media coverage, which stressed that the talks with Trump would be focused on forging a relationship that is more in tune with what it called changing times — most likely meaning the North's new status as a nuclear weapons state — its desire for a mechanism to ensure a lasting a durable peace on the Korean Peninsula and, finally, denuclearization.

What exactly it has in mind for any of those broad topics remains to be seen.

for a telehandler and work station to Briggs Equipment of Abilene in the amount of \$149,456.21. Of seven bid requests sent out, six were returned. Of those, one did not meet specifications; of the remaining five, the Briggs bid was the lowest.

Another proposed bid award is for a motor grader. Of the five bid requests sent out, four were returned. The recommended bid award is to Warren Cat of San Angelo in the amount of \$224,750, the lowest of the returned bids.

Wrapping up the bid awards, V-Bar Equipment Company of Abilene is city staff's recommendation for the award of a bid on two forklifts. Five bid requests were sent out, and all five were returned. Of those, one did not meet specifications. The V-Bar bid of \$28,718 was the lowest bid by a wide margin; the next lowest was \$46,508.23.

In other business, City Council members plan to:

* Hear a presentation by KDC Associates on the proposed Comanche Trail Park Amphitheater Improvement Project;

* Consider an emergency reading of a resolution authorizing an interlocal agreement with the Texas Department of Trans-

Clemens, Shugart lead Texas past Tennessee Tech, 4-2

AUSTIN, Texas — The most dangerous offensive team in the country was rendered harmless on Sunday.

Tennessee Tech managed just three hits, a season-low, against Texas pitchers Chase Shugart and Blair Henley as the Longhorns won 4-2 to even their NCAA Tournament best-of-three super regional series at one victory apiece.

Game 3 is on Monday.

All-American Kody Clemens drove in two runs, one with his 23rd home run of the season for Texas (41-21).

Tech (53-11) leads the nation in several categories, including runs (more than 10 a game) and home runs.

The Golden Eagles managed two hits and one earned run in six innings against Shugart (6-3). The three total hits in the game were Tech's fewest since Feb. 27, 2015, when they had one hit against Northern Illinois.

"The guy was dynamite," Tech coach Matt Bragga said. "Their pitchers were phenomenal. But I think we were a little bit tight."

Shugart threw 99 pitches, striking out five against five walks.

"Going into today, coach (David Pierce) just said empty the tank," Shugart said. "If we have to go to Blair in the fifth we'll go to Blair in the fifth." Their hitters did a really good job of fighting off 0-2 pitches and

getting deep into the count. It was really driving me nuts, but they're a good hitting team."

The Longhorns jumped ahead 2-0 after two innings. Clemens lined a double to right center to drive in a run in the first. Ryan Reynolds hit a bloop opposite field double to left that gave Texas a 2-0 lead in the second inning.

The Golden Eagles, home team for Game 2, cut the deficit in half in the second with a single, walk and throwing error by Clemens while trying to complete a double play.

Clemens didn't take long to atone; he slugged a solo home run off losing pitcher Travis Moths (13-3) with one out in the third for a 3-1 lead.

"We may walk him every time tomorrow," Bragga said.

Texas added a fourth run in the seventh with an RBI single by Tate Shaw in the seventh inning.

Shugart walked two batters in the sixth, putting runners on first and second with one out, Chase Chambers and Trevor Putzig hit benign fly balls to end the inning.

Henley, a front-line starter making his first relief appearance of the season, replaced Shugart in the seventh. He was greeted by David Garza, who hit his 17th home run of the season but the first for Tennessee Tech in two games here. Henley picked up a save.

Balk gives Astros 8-7 win for their first 4-game sweep of Rangers

ARLINGTON, Texas — Houston manager A.J. Hinch thought it was clearer that Texas closer Keone Kela balked with the go-ahead run at third base in the ninth inning.

Rangers counterpart Jeff Banister says he had never seen a balk ruling after umpires didn't make the call immediately when a pitch was thrown.

Either way, the Astros have the first four-game sweep of their Texas rivals.

George Springer scored the tie-breaking run on Kela's balk after homering on the first pitch of the game, and the Astros beat the Rangers 8-7 Sunday despite blowing a six-run cushion early and a one-run lead late.

Kela had already thrown the pitch to Evan Gattis with two outs when Hinch came out of the dugout. Crew chief Sam Holbrook said the umpires stopped Hinch before he could argue to discuss whether Kela had declared that he would pitch out of the windup with runners at second and third.

Once the umpires agreed Kela hadn't made such a declaration, they awarded Springer home. Replay showed Kela (3-3) not pausing in his delivery, and Banister was ejected by Holbrook while arguing the decision.

"There was nothing, no umpire called a balk," Banister said. "My

argument was didn't know that we could come out and get the umpires to convene to try to see what everybody came up with. Upsetting in the sense that you can't argue against a balk."

Springer walked to lead off the ninth, went to second on a wild pitch and took third on a flyout by Yuli Gurriel after an intentional walk to Jose Altuve. As for the confusion after the pitch to Gattis, Hinch didn't think there was much of an argument.

"It was a weird play and I think it caught everybody off guard, including the umpiring crew," he said. "Kela does that all the time with nobody on, so I think he was so focused on the hitter, he decided to do a quick pitch, which you can't do."

Kela didn't have much of an argument himself.

"I didn't know exactly what the call was but I've done it previously," he said. "I've used the quick pitch a lot. So when I came set, I felt I had come to a set stop and then make my pitch. But under the umpire's discretion it wasn't enough time for me to hold the ball."

The World Series champion Astros won their fifth straight and moved a season-high 17 games over .500 (42-25) despite Dallas Keuchel failing to hold a 6-0 lead.

The 2015 AL Cy Young Award winner couldn't get through five innings, matching a career worst by allowing 13 hits while throwing 106 pitches in

just 4 1/3 innings.

Gurriel's fourth hit was a tiebreaking homer in the seventh, but the Rangers got even again when Nomar Mazara doubled and Adrian Beltre singled him home with two outs in the eighth against Will Harris (2-3).

Hector Rondón struck out the side in the ninth for his third save of the season and second in as many games.

Texas dropped a season-high 14 games under .500 (27-41) despite a sea-

son-best 16 hits.

Ronald Guzman's RBI single for a 6-6 tie finished off Keuchel in the fifth, and the Astros stayed even when lefty Tony Sipp came on thanks to Gurriel's leaping grab of a liner from Shin-Soo Choo that turned into an unassisted double play at first base.

Choo, who reached base in a majors-leading 26th straight game, and Carlos Perez had two-run singles for the Rangers.

Nadal, Halep 1st pair of No. 1 French Open champs since 1992

PARIS — Rafael Nadal and Simona Halep needed strong French Open showings to hold onto their top rankings. They did just that, becoming the first pair of ATP and WTA No. 1s to both win the title at Roland Garros since Jim Courier and Monica Seles in 1992.

Nadal sits barely ahead of No. 2 Roger Federer on Monday, with a 100-point lead of 8,770 to 8,670.

They would have switched places if the Spaniard had failed to win his record-extending 11th championship Sunday.

"Today is all about Roland Garros," Nadal said after defeating Dominic Thiem 6-4, 6-3, 6-2 in Sunday's final. "I don't think about the rankings at all today, no?"

Alexander Zverev is No. 3, nearly 3,000 rankings points further back.

Juan Martin del Potro

jumped two spots to No. 4 by reaching his first French Open semifinal in nine years, and Thiem rose one place to No. 7 by reaching his first Grand Slam final.

Marco Cecchinato made the biggest move in the ATP top 100, going up 45 spots to No. 27 — putting him in line for a Wimbledon seeding next month — after reaching the semifinals. At No. 72, he was the lowest-ranked semifinalist in 19 years.

The 25-year-old Italian had never won a Grand Slam match before this French Open, but he beat Novak Djokovic in the quarterfinals after also eliminating players seeded No. 8 and 10.

Halep, Caroline Wozniacki and Garbine Muguruza remained the WTA's top three, but French Open runner-up Sloane Stephens went from No. 10 to a career-high No. 4.

Madison Keys, who lost to Stephens in the semifinals, is now No. 10 after entering the

tournament at No. 13.

Last year's champion in Paris, Jelena Ostapenko, dropped from No. 5 to No. 12 with a first-round exit this time. She was the first reigning women's champion to lose her opening match at the French Open since 2004.

Halep, who first grabbed the top ranking last October, could have been overtaken by five women if she didn't at least get to the semifinals at Roland Garros. But Halep not only made it to the semifinals, she beat 2017 U.S. Open champion Stephens 3-6, 6-4, 6-1 in the title match Saturday for her first Grand Slam trophy after three losses in major finals.

"The fact that I could be No. 1 in the world last year gave me confidence and gave me, like, a little bit of relief, because I touched something, something big, something huge," Halep said, "and I just had in my mind to win a Grand Slam after that."

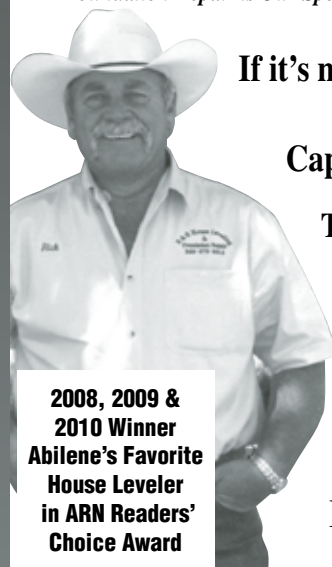

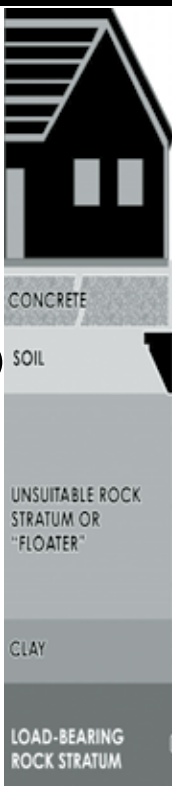

This Date In History

Today is Monday, June 11, the 162nd day of 2018. There are 203 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On June 11, 1776, the Continental Congress formed a committee to draft a Declaration of Independence calling for freedom from Britain.

On this date: In 1509, England's King Henry VIII married his first wife, Catherine of Aragon.

In 1770, Captain James Cook, commander of the British ship Endeavour, "discovered" the Great Barrier Reef off Australia by running onto it.

In 1919, Sir Barton won the Belmont Stakes, becoming horse racing's first Triple Crown winner.

In 1938, Johnny Vander Meer pitched the first of two consecutive no-hitters as he led the Cincinnati Reds to a 3-0 victory over the Boston Bees. (Four days later, Vander Meer refused to give up a hit to the Brooklyn Dodgers, who lost, 6-0.)

In 1942, the United States and the Soviet Union signed a lend-lease agreement to aid the Soviet war effort in World War II.

In 1947, the government announced the end of sugar rationing for households and "institutional users" (e.g., restaurants and hotels) as of mid-night.

In 1955, in motor racing's worst disaster, more than 80 people were killed during the 24 Hours of Le Mans in France when two of the cars collided and crashed into spectators.

In 1962, three prisoners at Alcatraz in San Francisco Bay staged an escape, leaving the island on a makeshift raft; they were never found or heard from again.

In 1978, Joseph Freeman Jr. became the first black priest ordained in the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints.

In 1985, Karen Ann Quinlan, the comatose patient whose case prompted a historic right-to-die court decision, died in Morris Plains, New Jersey, at age 31.

In 1993, the U.S. Supreme Court unanimously ruled that people who commit "hate crimes" motivated by bigotry may be sentenced to extra punishment; the court also ruled religious groups had a constitutional right to sacrifice animals in worship services. The Steven Spielberg science-fiction film "Jurassic Park" opened in wide release two

days after its world premiere in Washington, D.C.

In 2001, Timothy McVeigh, 33, was executed by injection at the federal prison in Terre Haute, Indiana, for the 1995 Oklahoma City bombing that killed 168 people.

Ten years ago: President George W. Bush, during a visit to Germany, raised the possibility of a military strike to thwart Tehran's presumed nuclear weapons ambitions; Chancellor Angela Merkel (AHN'-geh-lah MEHR'-kuhl) joined Bush in urging further sanctions against Iran if it failed to suspend its nuclear enrichment program. For his part, Iranian leader Mahmoud Ahmadinejad (ah-muh-DEE'-neh-zahd) called Bush a "wicked man." Four Boy Scouts were killed when a tornado hit the Little Sioux Scout Ranch near Blencoe, Iowa.

Five years ago: A parade of FBI and intelligence officials briefed the entire House on the government's years-long collection of phone records and Internet usage, saying it was necessary for protecting Americans, and did not trample on their privacy rights. The American Civil Liberties Union and its New York chapter sued the federal government, asking a court to demand that the Obama administration end the program and purge the records it had collected. The Los Angeles Dodgers and Arizona Diamondbacks got into a bench-clearing brawl in the seventh inning that resulted in six ejections before the Dodgers won the game at home, 5-3.

One year ago: Supporters of LGBT rights marched and rallied in the nation's capital and dozens of other U.S. cities, celebrating gains but angry over threats posed by the administration of President Donald Trump. "Dear Evan Hansen," the heartfelt musical about young outsiders, took the best new musical trophy at the Tony Awards along with five other statuettes. The Stanley Cup returned to Pittsburgh after the Penguins defeated the Nashville Predators 2-0 in Game 6. Rafael Nadal (rah-fay-ehl nah-DAHL') won his record 10th French Open title by dominating 2015 champion Stan

Wawrinka 6-2, 6-3, 6-1 in the final.

Justifiable! Racing gets 13th Triple Crown with Justify

NEW YORK — Justify defied all the odds on his way to achieving Triple Crown immortality.

The late bloomer won the Belmont Stakes by 1¾ lengths on Saturday, giving the sport its 13th Triple Crown champion. American Pharoah ended a 37-year drought in 2015 and now just four years later, racing is celebrating another sweep of the Kentucky Derby, Preakness and Belmont.

Justify began his racing career on Feb. 18, a scant 77 days before the Derby. He won his first three races by a combined 19 lengths, making trainer Bob Baffert a believer.

The big chestnut colt with the appetite to match burst onto the national scene with a 2½-length victory on a sloppy track in the Derby. Two weeks later, he survived a challenge in the fog-shrouded Preakness, winning by a half-length, again in the slop to set up a Triple Crown try.

"The raw talent is there," Baffert said. "He just came on there and broke every curse there was. It was meant to be."

On a cloudy 80-degree day at Belmont Park, Justify proved a cool customer.

He didn't flinch when greeted by 90,327 roaring fans as he walked onto the track. He stood so quietly in the starting gate that jockey Mike Smith wondered if he'd respond when it sprang open.

Did he ever.

Justify led all the way in achieving one of the sports world's toughest feats 45 years to the day that Secretariat won the Belmont by a record 31 lengths. Baffert called Justify one of the all-time greats.

"I think he's the greatest of all time," Smith said. "I just won the Triple Crown, man. He's my champion."

Justify accomplished a lot in a very short time.

At 6-0, he joins Seattle Slew in 1977 as the only two undefeated Triple Crown winners; he's the first to sweep

the series without racing at age 2 (because of a pulled muscle); and he's the only horse to beat nine rivals in the Belmont with a Triple try on the line. Slew also was a wire-to-wire Belmont winner.

Justify's human handlers also made history.

Baffert became the second trainer to win the Triple Crown twice, having overseen American Pharoah. James "Sunny Jim" Fitzsimmons guided Gallant Fox in 1930 and Omaha in 1935.

"It never gets old," Baffert said. "American Pharoah, he'll always be my first love."

At 52, Smith became the oldest jockey to win the Triple Crown. He celebrated by grabbing white carnations from the winner's blanket and tossing them in the air.

"He just puts an old man out there to sit still, who stays out of the way and lets a good horse be a good horse," Smith said, crediting Baffert for using him.

Smith and Justify took a curtain call before entering the winner's circle.

Back in New York where he dominated in the 1990s, Smith took Justify on a walk past the packed grandstand, soaking in the cheers and giving the crowd a closer look at racing's newest hero.

Justify's victory gives racing its second Triple Crown winner of the decade. The last time there were two Triple Crown champions in the same decade was the 1970s, which produced Secretariat, Seattle Slew and Affirmed.

Purchased for \$500,000, Justify earned \$800,000 for his Belmont win, giving him \$3,798,000 in his brief career.

The powerful colt with the blaze running the length of his face showed no signs that the rigors of running a compressed schedule had gotten to him.

On a fast, dry track, Justify was just as good in his third race in five weeks at his third different track.

Sent off as the 4-5 favorite, Justify ran 1½ miles — the longest race of the series — in 2:28.18 and paid \$3.60, \$3.50 and \$2.80.

"This horse ran a tremendous race, he's so gifted," Smith said. "He's sent from heaven. I tell you, it's just amazing."

Baffert had fretted after Justify drew the No. 1 post, a spot he detests for his horses. But Smith turned it into an advantage, gunning Justify to the lead and defying any horse to challenge.

Restoring Hope, also trained by Baffert, ran interference for the champion while traveling second and deterring any threats by forcing them to go extremely wide. Nobody did.

Smith got the colt into a relaxed rhythm under a moderate pace heading into the backstretch, and he had an easy trip from there.

"You can't doubt him now, there's no way," said Bill Mott, trainer of third-place Hofburg. "He did it right up on the pace, and everybody had an opportunity to take their shot. They didn't do it. They let it go too easy."

There were mild bids turning for home. Vino Rosso made the most serious move to get within a length but never threatened. Justify pulled away down the 1,097-yard stretch in front of screaming fans with only 24-1 shot Gronkowski picking off a half-dozen rivals in taking up the chase down the lane.

"My thought turning for home was that he had a shot to get him if Justify was vulnerable at mile and a half," said Chad Brown, who trains Gronkowski. "I thought maybe, because I could see Gronkowski flying, but he just couldn't get to that horse."

Gronkowski, named for and partly owned by New England Patriots tight end Rob Gronkowski, returned \$13.80 and \$7 in his U.S. debut after arriving from England.

Hofburg paid \$3.70 to show.

Vino Rosso finished fourth, followed by Tenfold, Bravazo, Free Drop Billy, Restoring Hope, Blended Citizen and Noble Indy.

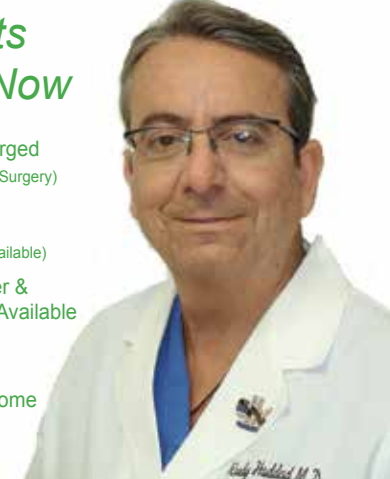
