Juvenile shot in head during apparent game of 'Russian Roulette'

Big Spring Police Department

On the 8th of June 2018 at approximately 4:00 A.M., Big Spring Police Department Officers were dispatched to the 1800 block of S. Nolan in reference to a gunshot victim. Upon arrival it was found a juvenile male had sustained a gunshot wound to his head. The initial reports from various witnesses at the residence indicated this was a suicide although physical evidence indicated otherwise. The Big Spring Police Department Crimi-

nal Investigations Division responded to the location and began their investigation. As a result of this investigation it is now believed the juvenile was shot as a result of a game of "Russian Roulette" and although this is believed to be an accident, the Big Spring Police Department expect arrests to follow. The investi-

gation has led officers to believe two

firearms were recently stolen from vehicles in the area of Barcelona Apartments and HEB although there has been no reports of the thefts. The Big

Spring Police Department asks residents to check their vehicles for any weapons that may have been stored in their vehicles and report any that are missing.

This is an ongoing investigation

and there is no further information available at this time.



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US launches bid to find citizenship cheaters

LOS ANGELES — The U.S. government agency that oversees immigration applications is launching an office that will focus on identifying Americans who are suspected of cheating to get their citizenship and seek to strip them

U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services Director L. Francis Cissna told The Associated Press in an interview that his agency is hiring several dozen lawyers and immigration officers to review cases of immigrants who were ordered deported and are suspected of using fake identities to later get green cards and citizenship through naturalization.

Cissna said the cases would be referred to the Department of Justice, whose attorneys could

then seek to remove the immigrants' citizenship in civil court proceedings. In some cases, government attorneys could bring criminal charges re-Until now, the agency has pursued cases as

they arose but not through a coordinated effort, Cissna said. He said he hopes the agency's new office in Los Angeles will be running by next year but added that investigating and referring

cases for prosecution will likely take longer. "We finally have a process in place to get to the bottom of all these bad cases and start denaturalizing people who should not have been naturalized in the first place," Cissna said. "What we're looking at, when you boil it all down, is poten-

He declined to say how much the effort would cost but said it would be covered by the agency's existing budget, which is funded by immigration In this Dec. 13, 2017 file photo, L. Francis Cissna,

Immigrants who become U.S. citizens can vote, serve on juries and obtain security clearance. Denaturalization — the process of removing that citizen-

The U.S. government began looking at potentially fraudulent naturalization cases a decade ago when a border officer detected about 200 people had used different identities to get green cards and citizenship after they were previously issued deportation orders.

In September 2016, an internal watchdog reported that 315,000 old fingerprint records for immigrants who had been deported or had criminal convictions had not been uploaded to a Department of Homeland Security database that is used to check immigrants' identities. The same report found more than 800 immigrants had been ordered deported under one identity but became U.S.

Since then, the government has been uploading these older fingerprint records dating back to the 1990s and investigators have been evaluating cases for denaturalization.

Earlier this year, a judge revoked the citizenship of an Indian-born New Jersey man named Baljinder Singh after federal authorities accused him of using an alias to avoid deportation.

Authorities said Singh used a different name when he arrived in the United

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States in 1991. He was ordered deported the next year and a month later applied for asylum using the name Baljinder Singh before marrying an American, getting a green card and naturalizing.

Authorities said Singh did not mention his earlier deportation order when he applied for citizenship.

For many years, most U.S. efforts to strip immigrants of their citizenship focused largely on suspected war criminals who lied on their immigration paperwork, most notably former Nazis.

Toward the end of the Obama administration, officials began reviewing cases stemming from the fingerprints probe but prioritized those of naturalized

citizens who had obtained security clearances, for example, to work at the Transportation Security Administration, said Muzaffar Chishti, director of the Migration Policy Institute's office at New York University law school. The Trump administration has made

these investigations a bigger priority, he said. He said he expects cases will focus on deliberate fraud but some naturalized Americans may feel uneasy with the change. "It is clearly true that we have entered a

new chapter when a much larger number of people could feel vulnerable that their naturalization could be reopened," Chishti Since 1990, the Department of Justice has filed 305 civil denaturalization cases,

according to statistics obtained by an immigration attorney in Kansas who has defended immigrants in these cases. The attorney, Matthew Hoppock, agrees director of U.S. Citizenship and Immigration that deportees who lied to get citizenship

> should face consequences but worries other immigrants who might have made mistakes on their paperwork could get targeted and might not have the money to fight back in court. Cissna said there are valid reasons why immigrants might be listed under

> multiple names, noting many Latin American immigrants have more than one surname. He said the U.S. government is not interested in that kind of minor discrepancy but wants to target people who deliberately changed their identities to dupe officials into granting immigration benefits. "The people who are going to be targeted by this - they know full well who

> they are because they were ordered removed under a different identity and they intentionally lied about it when they applied for citizenship later on," Cissna said. "It may be some time before we get to their case, but we'll get to them."

3 Top Health Risks for Men according to Dr. Vernon Johnson

BIG SPRING, TEXAS -- June is Men's Health Month, an important time to highlight the health concerns men face and prevention efforts that could mean the difference between life and death.

Heart disease

Heart disease is the leading cause of death for men in the United States, meaning one in four men will die from the disease. Over half who die suddenly from heart disease never experience warning signs like shortness of breath, chest discomfort or an irregular heartbeat.

Though it is possible to develop heart disease without recognizing the symptoms, there are risk factors that can alert individuals to an unhealthy cardiovascular system:

- Diet high in saturated fat
- Excessive drinking
- High cholesterol
- Diabetes
- High blood pressure

Prostate cancer

Prostate cancer is the most common cancer among men, excluding skin cancer. It has no specific cause, but aging, obesity, family history and race contribute to a man's risk for prostate cancer.

Prostate cancers typically grow and spread slowly. Some studies show older men who died of other causes also had prostate cancer that never affected

Workforce crisis hits Midland and Odessa area nursing homes

97 percent turnover for Certified Nurse Aides in Texas communities

AUSTIN, TEXAS — A statewide workforce crisis affects the ability of Midland and Odessa area nursing homes to maintain quality and provide much needed care to the most vulnerable seniors in the

Certified Nurse Aides working in the 22 nursing homes in Andrews, Brewster, Crane, Ector, Ector, Glasscock, Howard, Jeff Davis, Loving, Martin and Midland counties are part of a 97 percent average annual staff turnover rate for the state of Texas. Registered nurses and licensed vocational nurses each have an average 90 percent turnover rate, according to a report released by the Texas Health Care Association detailing the challenges with recruitment and retention of direct care staff

According to the U.S. Bureau of Health Workforce, West Texas will need another 5,162 nurses just to keep up with the expended demand by 2030 as Texas is projected to experience a widespread shortage of RNs. There are currently 2,626 people working in nursing homes in West Texas.

"The state's low nursing home Medicaid reimbursement rate and heavy regulation are affecting the ability to retain nursing staff as they look for other opportunities out of the long term care business," said Kevin Warren, president and CEO of the Texas Health Care Association. "All too often, long term care providers in Midland and Odessa and the rest of Texas are scrambling to fill shifts instead of focusing on continuous improvement because they can't compete in the labor market."

West Texas' strong economy is partly to blame for the nursing home workforce crisis, Warren said. The unemployment rate in Midland and Odessa is one of the lowest in the nation, dipping to just 2.4 percent recent months, according to Bureau of La-

Texas nursing homes are challenged with one of the lowest nursing home Medicaid reimbursement rates in the nation. In fact, the state's Medicaid rate falls almost \$10,000 short of the cost of care on an annual basis per Medicaid resident. More than two-thirds of all residents in Texas nursing homes rely on Medicaid to cover their costs after depleting their assets. For a typical long term care facility with 100 beds, these numbers can equal a shortfall of more than \$650,000 a year they need to make up somewhere else.

It also leaves nursing home operators unable to raise wages to hire and retain staff, who can quit and easily find another job with higher pay or less stress, in other service industries or healthcare

"This data simply supports what anyone involved in long term care already knows — staffing is the key to delivering the kind of long term care you would want for your own family," said Warren. "The more consistent and dedicated the staff is, the more they understand and are able to effectively respond to each individual's care needs. Having the necessary resources to compete in a highly competitive workforce that is already in short supply is critical to meeting the needs of all individuals relying on the nursing home community in Texas."

They have burned more than 40 square miles and are believed to have been started by lightning strikes or other natural causes. Fate of massive AT&T-Time Warner merger in US judge's hands **By MARCY**

WASHINGTON — The fate of the AT&T-Time Warner merger, a massive media deal opposed by the government that could shape how much consumers pay streaming TV and movies, rests in the hands of a federal judge.

U.S. District Judge Richard Leon is expected to announce in court Tuesday his deci-Trump Justice Department sued to block the \$85 billion

merger, arguing that it would hurt competition in pay TV and cost consumers hundreds of millions of dollars more to stream TV and movies. If Leon approves the deal, the

be allowed to absorb the owner of CNN, HBO, the Warner Bros. movie studio, "Game of Thrones," coveted sports programming and other "mustsee" shows.

Another possible outcome would be for the judge to approve the

merger — but on condition that AT&T not acquire certain Time Warner assets, such as Turner Broadcasting's CNN, or sell off its valuable DirecTV, or accept curbs on how it deploys Time Warner programming.

Or Leon could reject the merger outright, accepting the government's contention that it would hurt pay-TV consumers and competition in the industry.

The mega-merger is a highstakes bet by AT&T Inc. on the synergy between companies that produce news and

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

on-one, Trump signaled that things had gone "better than anybody could have expected" and something would be signed soon. That something turned out be a document, with no details provided at the ceremony, which was the first concrete development in what had been a substancefree day until then.

— The contents of the document surfaced in advance of Trump's news conference before he departed for home. It was thin on detail: Trump promising "security guarantees" to Pyongyang and Kim recommitting to the "complete denuclearization of the Korean Peninsula."

— What was new in that news conference: Trump said Washington would stop war games with Seoul. That's of huge significance — the drills military infuriate Pyongyang who see them as rehearsals to topple the Kim dynasty. Trump said he ultimately wants to bring U.S. soldiers home from South Korea. There are nearly 30,000 stationed there. Trump also said Kim agreed to destroy a 'major' missile testing site, but offered no specifics.

- Trump said the denuclearization process would be starting "very quickly;" the two developed "a very special bond;" and he "absolutely" would invite Kim to the White House. Kim ignored reporters' shouted questions whether he would make that momentous journey, Trump later said Kim had accepted the invitation.

— Kim declared the "world will see a major change" and he and Trump "decided to leave the past behind."

- Trump and Kim shook hands and exchanged farewells without interpreters as the summit ended.

BYE FOR NOW?

— So what happens next? Will Trump and Kim meet again — when, where and will it then be less of an event, not if it's in Washington or Pyongyang — or will denuclearization prove to be too big a hurdle to circumvent? A three-way declaration also including South Korea on formally ending the 1950-53 Korean War might be the next most plausible and highprofile development. China would need to be present as

THE HANDSHAKE

— Earlier at the day's start, the choreographers and protocol teams did their work: both men emerged pretty much on cue, having left their respective hotels within minutes of each other, at the scheduled time of 9 a.m. from opposite porticos at the Capella Singapore hotel to engage in a first

handshake timed at 13 seconds. It wasn't on the battling alpha male Richter scale that characterized Trump and French President Emmanuel Macron's' first greeting, but it was hearty. Trump put his hand out first, Kim following his lead. Trump grasped Kim's right arm, and then, later, took ahold of Kim's left arm as they turned to face photographers whose cameras were producing a cacophony of shutter clicking as the soundtrack.

THE INITIAL CHAT, POSI-TIVE SPIN AND FLAGS

— "Very, very good:" "excellent relationship;" "We will solve a big problem," so pronounced Trump in real-time positive spin. Kim rode the wave of optimism himself, adding, it "was not easy to get here" and that there "were obstacles but we overcame them to be here." Kim, via his interpreter, captured the parallel universe which now served as geopolitical reality: "Many people in the world will think of this as a scene from a ... science fiction movie.'

— Towering behind the two leaders' grip and grin were a striking series of American and North Korean flags side by side on an equal footing, almost interlocked. It was a stunning piece of imagery for Korea watchers across the peninsula given the 70 years of North Korean iconography in which the U.S. standard was the flag of the devil.

DUDE, CHECK OUT MY

 In a bizarre moment, Trump showed Kim the interior of his presidential limousine, "The Beast," as they strolled on the grounds after lunch. Kim was definitely smiling as he curiously peered in.

RODMAN'S TEARS

 Sporting a red "Make America Great Again" baseball cap, Dennis Rodman, erstwhile participant on Trump's "Celebrity Apprentice" and fleeting acquaintance of Kim, went full Reality TV show by copiously weeping during a live segment from Singapore with CNN. An emotional Rodman said he received a call from a White House staffer ahead of the summit to tell

him the president was proud of him. He claimed he had "something to do this North Korean situation" and also took a dig at Trump's predecessor. President Barack Obama, he said, "just brushed me off" and "didn't even give me the time of day" when Rodman returned Pyongyang with a message from Kim after one of his trips there.

entertainment and those that funnel it to consumers — who spend more time watching video on phones and tablets and less time on traditional live TV on a big screen.

Approval of the combination would be a stinging defeat for the Justice Department, which could move to appeal Leon's ruling. The proposed merger was so big and consequential that it drew the government's first lawsuit in decades to block a merger of two companies that don't directly compete. First floated in October 2016, the deal also brought fire from then-candidate Donald Trump, who promised to kill it "because it's too much concentration of power in the hands of too few."

Dallas-based AT&T's power flows from its position as a wireless, broadband and satellite behemoth that also became the country's biggest pay-TV provider with its purchase of DirecTV. It claims about 25 million of the 90 million or so U.S. households that are pay-TV customers.

Leon's ruling could shape the government's future competition policy. Approval could open the floodgates to deal making in the fast-changing entertainment and video-content worlds. Major cable, satellite and phone companies are bulking up with purchases of entertainment conglomerates to compete against rivals born on the internet, like Amazon and Google.

Rejection likely would chill future combinations. Pressing in the wings are potential big-billions deals involving 21st Century Fox and Disney, Verizon and CBS, T-Mobile and Sprint. Comcast and Verizon are also jockeying for position in the new

As president, Trump has called the merger "not good for the country" and said he believed it would push pay-TV prices higher. Looming in the background of the deal has been Trump's long-running feud with Time Warner's CNN, which he has often derided as "failing" and a purveyor of "fake news."

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The six-week trial featured a parade of expert witnesses as attorneys for the opposing sides took Leon on a journey through the twisty dynamics of the media and entertainment landscape. The companies' CEOs, AT&T's Randall Stephenson and Jeffrey Bewkes of Time Warner Inc., testified in support of the deal.

The government argued that AT&T would gain outsize market power, jacking up the prices it charges cable providers to carry networks in the Time Warner stable. Postmerger, AT&T rivals like Charter Communications and Cox, which currently pay Time Warner for its channels, would suddenly also become AT&T's customers. The government's star witness was Carl Shapiro, an economist at the University of California, who used an economic model to predict that consumer cable bills could rise \$500 million annually in aggregate by 2021.

The companies' main economist, Dennis Carlton from the University of Chicago, refuted Shapiro's model as overly complicated and rejected his conclusions. The government failed to prove that the merger would dampen competition and innovation and raise prices for pay TV, said Daniel Petrocelli, the companies' lead attorney in defending the merger. In fact, he suggested, consumers could end up paying less after a merger — maybe even \$500 million less annually.

AT&T has said it needs to buy Time Warner to compete with the likes of Amazon, Netflix and Google in the shape-shifting streaming-TV environment. The combination would push technology forward and give consumers more choices, AT&T has promised.

Texas Tech to 3rd CWS in 5 years

LUBBOCK, Texas — Michael Davis and Texas Tech are going back to

Davis hit the biggest of the Red Raiders' three home runs, a tiebreaking two-run shot that put them ahead to stay, in a 6-2 win over Duke on Monday to send them to the College World Series for the third time in five

"Just kind of coming out and having fun, taking in every moment," said Davis, a senior shortstop playing at home for the last time. "That final out, that's probably the most enjoyable thing I've got to do since I got here."

The Red Raiders (44-18) led for good after Davis' homer in the fourth made it 3-1 in the deciding game of the bestof-three NCAA super regional.

It was the 12th homer of the season for Davis, the only current position player for the Red Raiders who got in the lineup when they were in Omaha two years ago. He was playing second base then.

Gabe Holt and Brian Klein also homered for Texas Tech, which is 20-0 this season when having multiple homers in a game.

"You never plan on home runs," coach Tim Tadlock said. "Guys got some pitches in the middle of the

While Dusek has been part of three CWS trips, he hasn't yet appeared in a game at Omaha. Only four current Red Raiders actually played in the 2016 CWS: Davis and a trio of pitchers: Steven Gingery, Davis Martin and Erikson Lanning.

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
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When Others Jump to **Conclusions**

John Milton's observation that 'they also serve who only stand and wait" could well be applied to some occasions in bridge where inaction can be more rewarding than action.

Take this case where South reached four hearts on the sequence shown and West led the K-A-Q of spades, declarer ruffing the third round. South

then drew three rounds of trump, hoping the missing hearts would divide 3-3. But when West turned up with four trumps, declarer was fighting a losing battle. He next attempted a club finesse, losing to West's king, and South finished down two, losing three spades, a trump and a club.

If South had paid heed to Milton's words, he would have made the contract. All he had to do was to discard a club on the third round of spades. This simple precautionary measure would have allowed him to get home safely if the missing trumps were divided either 3-3 or 4-2 (84 percent), and he would have wound up scoring the 10 high-card tricks he had started with.

It could be argued in defense of South's play at trick three that he was only doing what came naturally when he won the trick instead of deliberately losing it, but the hard fact is that spontaneity in bridge rarely produces compensating rewards. The aim of the game is to win, and if losing a trick instead of winning it improves one's chances of making the contract, that is the best policy to follow. As another sage once observed, "Haste maketh waste."

This Date In History

Today is Tuesday, June 12,

the 163rd day of 2018. There are 202 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On June 12, 1963, civil rights leader Medgar Evers, 37, was shot and killed outside his home in Jackson, Mississippi. (In 1994, Byron

De La Beckwith was convicted of murdering Evers and sentenced to life in prison; he died in 2001.) On this date:

In 1550, the city of Helsinki was established through a decree by King Gustavus I Vasa of Sweden.

In 1665, England installed a municipal government in New York, formerly the Dutch settlement of New Amsterdam, and appointed its first mayor, Thomas Willett.

In 1776, Virginia's colonial legislature adopted Declaration of Rights.

In 1898, Philippine nationalists declared independence from Spain.

In 1939, the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum was dedicated in Cooperstown, New York.

In 1942, Anne Frank, a German-born Jewish girl living in Amsterdam, received a diary for her 13th birthday, less than a month before she and her family went into hiding from the Nazis.

In 1967, the U.S. Supreme Court, in Loving v. Virginia, unanimously struck down state laws prohibiting interracial marriages.

In 1968, the Roman Polanski horror film "Rosemary's Baby," starring Mia Farrow and John Cassavetes, was by released Paramount Pictures.

In 1978, David Berkowitz was sentenced to 25 years to life in prison for each of the six "Son of Sam" .44-caliber killings that terrified New Yorkers.

In 1987, President Ronald Reagan, during a visit to the divided German city of Berlin, exhorted Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev to "tear down this wall."

In 1994, Nicole Brown Simpson and Ronald Goldman were slashed to death outside her Los Angeles home. (O.J. Simpson was later acquitted of the killings in a criminal trial, but was eventually held liable in a civil action.) Boeing's new 777 jetliner went

on its first test flight. In 2016, an American-born Muslim opened fire at the Pulse nightclub, a gay establishment in Orlando, Florida, leaving 49 people dead and 53 wounded before being shot dead by police.

Ten years ago: In a stinging rebuke to President George W. Bush's anti-terror policies, a deeply divided Supreme Court ruled that foreign detainees held for years at Guantanamo Bay in Čuba had the right to appeal to U.S. civilian courts to challenge their indefinite imprisonment without charges. Three heavily armed robbers stole two Pablo Picasso prints, "The Painter and the Model" and "Minotaur, Drinker and Women," plus two paintings by other artists from a museum in Sao Paulo, Brazil, (The works were later recovered.) Taiwan and China agreed to set up permanent offices in each other's territory for the first time in nearly six decades.

Five years ago: The director of the National Security Gen. Keith Agency. Alexander, vigorously defended once-secret surveillance programs before the Senate Intelligence Committee, saying that collecting Americans' phone records and tapping into their Internet activity had disrupted dozens of terrorist attacks. Ariel Castro, 52, accused of holding three women captive in his Cleveland home for about a decade, pleaded not guilty to hundreds of rape and kidnapping charges. (Castro was later sentenced to life plus 1,000 years and soon after committed suicide in prison.) NASCAR driver Jason Leffler, 37, died after an accident during a dirt car event at Bridgeport Speedway in New Jersey.

One year ago: Tens of thousands of protesters held anticorruption rallies across Russia; more than a thousand were arrested, including opposition leader and protest organizer Alexei Navalny. The Golden State Warriors brought home the NBA championship, defeating the Cleveland Cavaliers 129-120 in

New coach Penny Hardaway already having impact on Memphis

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — League championships, the NCAA Tournament and another Final Four berth all accomplished by teams with a healthy dose of local talent — before sellout

High expectations for any college coach. For someone in their first college job, the combination easily could be just too much.

Not for Anfernee "Penny" Hard-

"I meet pressure head on," Mem-

phis' newest coach said. "I mean I feel like I was born to do what I'm doing right now. I feel like I have a good enough staff and us as a crew and our team, I really love my team, know it's there, but I'm ready for the challenge."

Coaching his hometown Tigers seems like a perfect fit for the man known locally as just Penny. And fans desperate to reclaim past glory see the Memphis native who grew up here, played at then-Memphis State for another local legend in Larry Finch and returned to town when his All-Star career in the NBA ended as the man to restore the program to the glory that includes three Final Fours — even if only one still counts on the

Hardaway, who turns 47 in July, shares those same standards for the

What the charismatic Hardaway has done in less than three months on the job has cranked optimism higher than ever, and it's paying off already. Attendance had dropped to 4,583

per game last season, worst in nearly 50 years. By dipping so low, the university missed out on any revenue sharing from playing games at the FedExForum and the NBA's Grizzlies. Donations to the athletic department dipped more than \$1 million in the 2017 fiscal year with Memphis on the hook for nearly \$10 million after firing Tubby Smith two seasons into his contract.

Now Memphis is expecting season ticket sales and donations around \$4.5 million for the 2019 fiscal year with men's basketball the big draw. Hardaway gave the university's bottom line a big boost too by agreeing to a three-year deal paying \$1.3 million this season, much less than the \$3.25 million Smith was due.

That's the result of the confidence in Hardaway whose basketball resume features 14 seasons in the NBA as a player and three straight Tennessee high school championships and an AAU program as a coach.

"I took a public high school from not being ranked to being No. 1 in the country and an AAU program that was just starting out to being No. 1 in the country, so my track record is pretty good," Hardaway said. "When it comes to my coaching, a lot of kids and their parents have seen me coach on the EYBO circuit when I was able to coach. And then my experience in the NBA, that all just puts the icing on the cake."

First, the coach with his own signature shoe turned over half the roster in high style, riding to visits in a customized Mercedes van featuring his own personal logo in the headrests. He added seven players including point guard Alex Lomax following him from East High to land the nation's 19th-best recruiting class by Rivals.com . Hardaway now is competing for the No. 1 player in 2019 Memphis native James Wiseman against Kentucky coach John Calipari. Hardaway convinced Mike Miller,

with his two NBA championships, to join him and hired Tony Madlock away from Mississippi. Sam Mitchell, a former NBA head coach and player, also is being added to the coaching staff. Memphis just opened a new building for men's basketball last December, and Hardaway wants to add some shooting guns to the lounge to bring the facility up to NBA-level.

It's all part of Hardaway's sales

"That message spoke loudly to these kids that we're trying to get to our program back to where it used to be and that we wanted them to be a big part of it and if they wanted to go further, that we could help them get further to understand what it takes on and off the court to get to the NBA," Hardaway said.

The Tigers haven't reached the NCAA Tournament since 2014 and last played in the Sweet 16 in 2009 just before Calipari ditched Memphis for Kentucky. Hardaway has toughened up the nonconference schedule as well with cross-state rival Tennessee among the teams added for the upcoming season.

It's a combination Hardaway believes will test both himself as a coach and his team and make Tigers' basketball must-see TV again for a program considered family for so many people

Oakland ready to again celebrate **NBA champion Warriors**

OAKLAND, Calif. — For the second straight year, throngs of Oakland fans will get to celebrate the Golden State Warriors with a parade for a team some are calling a basketball

Hundreds of thousands of fans are

expected to line downtown Oakland streets Tuesday to cheer Stephen Curry, Kevin Durant and the rest of the Warriors winning their third title in four years.

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'Ocean's 8' opens with franchise-best \$41.5M to top weekend

NEWYORK "Ocean's 8," the femalefronted overhaul of the starry heist franchise, opened with an estimated \$41.5 million at the box office, taking the weekend's top spot from the fastfalling "Solo: A Star

Wars Story."

At a lower price point and in less fanboyguarded franchise, "Ocean's 8" — despite ho-hum reviews found nothing like the stormy reception than the female-led "Ghostbusters" reboot did on the same weekend two vears ago.

Made for approximately \$70 million, "Ocean's 8" and its cast featuring Sandra Bullock, Cate Blanchett and Anne Hathaway, set an opening-weekend best for the franchise, not accounting for inflation. The three "Ocean's" previous films — starring Brad Pitt, George Clooney and Matt Damon, and based on the 1960 orig-

debuted with between \$36-39 million in the last decade.

"Ocean's 8," also starring Mindy Kaling, Sarah Paulson, Awkwafina, Rihanna and Helena Bonham Carter, drew a largely female audience — 69 percent — for a result that slightly surpassed expectations. "We thought we'd come in in the \$35-

40 (million) range," said Warner Bros. distribution chief Jeff Goldstein. "Number one, it's fun. Number two, it hits an underserved audience. Unfortunately, there is just a lack of stories that are aimed right at women."

Yet the weekend's three new wide releases were all female fronted.

The horror thriller "Hereditary," starring Toni Collette, debuted with \$13 million, setting a new company record for A24, the indie distributor behind releases like "The Witch" and "Moonlight." The feature-film directing debut of Ari Aster, "Hereditary" has received rave reviews and been hailed as the year's scariest movie since its debut at the Sundance Film Festival. Either from disappointment or simply because they were stunned from fear, audiences gave "Hereditary" — about a family cursed after the death of its matriarch — a D-plus

CinemaScore. Less successful was "Hotel Artemis," starring Jodie Foster. The Global Road release, also starring Sterling K. Brown, Dave Bautista and Charlie Day, flopped with \$3.2 million in 2,407 theaters. Set in a near-future Los Angeles, "Hotel Artemis" is about a members-only

Coming between more massive blockbusters like the recent "Solo" and the upcoming "Incredibles 2" and "Jurassic World," the weekend was down about 20 percent from last year, according to comScore, when "Wonder Woman" was setting box-office records. But some of the story was still the same.

hospital for criminals.

The Focus Features release grossed \$470,000 in 29 theaters for a per-theater average of about \$16,000. Initial reviews, which came out this week, were mixed for J.A. Bayona's sequel. But critics were also less thrilled with 2015's "Jurassic World,"

which grossed more than \$1.6 billion worldwide.
