

The U.S. Department of Agriculture says Texas Natural Meats of Lott produced the beef on Aug. 8, 2017. The problem was discovered Tuesday during routine sampling.

The recall involves 1-pound (0.45-kilogram) bags of Green Field Farms Rogers Texas Ground Beef that expire Aug. 8, 2020. The beef, with USDA at a farmers market in Rogers, Texas.

The beef should be discarded or returned to place of pur-

Most E. coli bacteria aren't harmful, but some produce toxins that can cause severe illness. People who get sick from toxin-producing E. coli develop symptoms three to four days after swallowing the germ. Many victims suffer bloody diarrhea, severe stomach cramps and vomit-

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A burned body found in a San Antonio apartment has been identified as that of a missing college student.

The Bexar County Medical Examiner's office on Wednesday said the body is that of 20-year-old Northwest Vista College student The body was found Monday, three days af-

ter Vargas was last seen. The cause of death is listed only as homi-

cidal violence.

Police have arrested 20-year-old Ernesto Esquivel-Garcia on charges of murder, arson and abuse of a corpse. Federal immigration officials have also put a hold on Esquivel-Garcia, who does not have an attorney listed to speak for him.

The case involves three incidents in 2012 and 2013 when the center's devices were either stolen or lost, potentially compromising the health records of 35,000 people. The Office of Civil Rights' investigation into the data breaches found the center didn't fully encrypt all of its devices during that

MD Anderson had alleged the center wasn't subject to encryption requirements because the health information involved was being used for research.

Caterpillar plant in Texas reminder of trade conflict stakes

Express-News SEGUIN, Texas — Dozens of half-built engines, more than twice the size of a car engine, stand in a row. They slowly roll ahead on a conveyor belt, stopping periodically as workers run quality checks, install fuel lines and tighten bolts with power wrenches.

The San Antonio Express-News reports these engines, ranging in size from nine to 18 liters, are used in generators, oil and gas operations and industrial applications. Nearly three out of four of them are heading out of the country to foreign markets.

In reversal, Trump signs order stopping family separation

Bowing to pressure from anxious allies, President Donald Trump signed an executive order Wednesday ending the process of separating children from families after they are detained crossing the U.S. border illegally.

It was a dramatic turnaround for Trump, who has been insisting, wrongly, that his administration had no choice but to separate families apprehended at the border because of federal law and a court decision.

Records: 9 threats in months before Santa Fe school deaths

SANTA FE, Texas (AP) — Police records show Santa Fe High School received nine threats in the months leading up to the mass shooting last month that

left 10 people dead and 13 injured. Santa Fe Independent School District Police Chief Walter Braun says none of the threats was related to the May 18 massa-

Records obtained by the Houston Chronicle show one of the threats came nine days before the shootings at the school southeast of Houston. Eight students and two substitute teachers were killed. A 17-year-old student, Dimitrios Pagourtzis, is jailed and charged with capital murder.

Braun says he won't detail the nature of the threats received. Records show they're among 114 incidents like auto accidents, medical issues, disturbances and suspicious activities the school district police handled from January through May 18.

"Many of our Texas member companies are multinational, they operate all over the world," said Tony Bennett, chief executive of the Texas Association of Manufacturers as he considered rising trade barriers. "We will not go unscathed.'

Fears are growing about the impact of a wider trade war with adversaries and allies alike as the Trump administration moves to alter U.S. trade policies, slapping steep tariffs on foreign steel and aluminum on which manufacturers across Texas and the United States rely and threatening to tear up the North American Free Trade Agreement with Mexico and Canada. Stock and commodity markets around the world sold off Tuesday, a day after President Donald Trump threatened to impose tariffs on an additional \$200 billion in Chinese products, and up to \$400 billion if China retaliates.

Illinois-based Caterpillar is considered a bellwether of the global economy because of its vast international reach and last year earned more than half of its \$45 billion in revenues from foreign sales. Caterpillar spokeswoman Rachel Potts said the company is assessing the potential impact of changing trade policies and lobbying the Trump administration to reconsider recent moves that could make it harder for U.S. companies to sell into foreign markets.

"Right now, is there a level of geopolitical uncertainty in the world that could impact us? Yes," Potts said. "Are we engaged on all of those talks? Yes.'

The Trump administration has done much to create that uncertainty, last week announcing it would go forward with that 25 percent tariffs on \$50 billion worth of Chinese goods — from tires to ship turbines to can sealing machines — starting in July. China immediately retaliated, readying tariffs of a similar scale on U.S. agricultural and other products These moves came just weeks after the Trump administration added Canada, Mexico and the European Union to the list of trading partners getting hit with tariffs on steel, again provoking retaliatory actions.

For the time being, the brewing trade war is expected to have a small impact on the U.S. economy, which is driven by domestic spending. Exports account for about 13 percent of the goods and services produced in the United States, according to the

Commerce Department.

Still, trade disruptions could hurt specific industries, such as those that import lower-cost foreign steel, raise prices for consumers and slow the economic expansion. And few states have as much at stake in the trade conflict as Texas. Texas sells more goods in international markets that any other state, exporting some \$265 billion in products in 2017, according to the Commerce Department. Texas also imported one-sixth of all foreign steel coming into the United States, also more than any other state, according to an analysis by the Brookings Institution, a Washington think

Canada, Mexico and China are Texas' top export markets, and already the prospect of deteriorating trade relations is creating uncertainty that is leading companies to delay investments and hiring, said Bennett of the Texas Association of Manufacturers.

"If you're exporting out of Texas, particularly to Mexico and Canada, you can't really make any plans for plant expansion, plant location," Bennett said. "It puts everybody in a holding pattern and is not an efficient way of doing business in a global econo-

Canada to legalize marijuana on Oct. 17

TORONTO — Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau said Wednesday marijuana will be legal nationwide on October 17.

Trudeau said in Parliament that the government is committed to better protecting Canada's youth and hopes to take money away from organized crime.

The Senate gave final passage to Trudeau's bill to legalize cannabis on Tuesday. The country will become the second in the world to make pot legal nationwide.

"The legislation is transformative," said Justice Minister Jody Wilson-Raybould, adding it "marks a wholesale shift in how our country approaches cannabis, leaving behind a failed model of prohibition."

The federal government had said provincial and territorial governments will need eight to 12 weeks following Senate passage and royal assent to prepare for retail sales. Trudeau spokeswoman Eleanore Catenaro said officials listened to the provinces that asked for more time to

"The law still remains the law," Wilson-Raybould said. "I urge all Canadians to continue to follow the existing law until the Cannabis Act comes

into force."

Canada is following the lead of Uruguay in allowing a nationwide, legal marijuana market, although each Canadian province is working up its own rules for pot sales. The federal government and the provinces also still need to publish regulations that will govern the cannabis trade.

Many questions unanswered, including how police will test motorists suspected of driving under the influence, what to do about those with prior marijuana convictions and just how the rules governing home cultivation will work.

The Canadian provinces of Quebec and Manitoba have already decided to ban homegrown pot, even though the federal bill specifies that individuals can grow up to four plants per dwelling.

"Provinces can set their own laws. If individuals are challenging that law, they can challenge it," Wilson-Raybould said.

Former Toronto Police Chief Bill Blair, who is the parliamentary secretary to the justice minister, said discussions for pardons of past convictions "can't take place" until legalization is in effect.

In the neighboring U.S., nine states and the District of Columbia have legalized marijuana. California, home to one in eight Americans, launched the United States' biggest legal marijuana marketplace on Jan 1.

The news was also greeted with enthusiasm by marijuana advocates in the U.S. Don Hartleben, who manages Dank of America, a retail cannabis store just south of the border in Blaine, Washington, said Canada's legalization was not only politically exciting, but a potential business boon for him.

Many of his customers are Canadian tourists who are terrified of trying to bring pot across the border, he said. If more use marijuana when they're in Canada, more will use when they're on vacation in the states.

les expanded the terms of the settlement, ruling that it applies to children who are caught with their parents as well as to those who come to the U.S. alone. Other recent rulings, upheld on appeal, affirm the children's rights to a bond hearing and require better conditions at the Border Patrol's short-term holding facilities.

In 2016, the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled that child migrants who came to the border with parents and were held in custody must be released. The decision did not state

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

Royals lose ninth straight, fall to Rangers, 3-2

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Austin team rules. Bibens-Dirkx earned his first victory of the season, shutting down a struggling Kansas City Royals squad that's wondering when it will get its next win.

Bibens-Dirkx pitched effectively into the seventh inning, Rougned Odor homered and the Texas Rangers extended their winning streak to a season-high five games with a 3-2 victory Wednesday night.

Bibens-Dirkx (1-1) allowed one run and five hits in 6 2/3 innings for his first win since last Sept. 6 in a relief appearance at Atlanta - and sent the Royals to their ninth straight loss.

"The first two starts didn't quite go as I had wanted," Bibens-Dirkx said, "so to get another opportunity and to come out here and do what I feel like I can do on a pretty consistent basis was nice."

Kansas City's slump is its longest this season, and the Royals have dropped 15 of 16 overall and been outscored 102-38 while losing 16 of 18 in June. Their worst June in franchise history was 7-19 in 1970, the team's second year in existence. The Royals will wind up June with nine games against the Astros, Angels, Brewers and Mariners, clubs above .500.

Bibens-Dirkx, a 33-year-old right-hander, spent 12 years in the minors, including two seasons with independent league teams before making his big league debut A Round Rock on Tuesday after violating

Jake Diekman worked the ninth for his second save, but not before yielding a leadoff homer to Mike Moustakas. The game ended when Hunter Dozier was thrown out at second on a delayed steal.

"It's perfect timing," Royals manager Ned Yost said to steal. "You probably haven't noticed that we've been having trouble bunching some hits together. It's a chance to maybe hopefully catch them by surprise and get into scoring position and one hit will tie the ballgame up and keep us going."

Yost acknowledged that Isiah Kiner-Falefa making his first big league start behind the plate factored into the decision to send Dozier. His throw nearly hit Diekman in the head.

"It was kind of scary, a crazy, crazy way to end the game," Kiner-Falefa said. "It worked out. Everything worked out. That was close. I was kind of in shock that he was out. I was just glad it didn't hit Jake, honestly. I tried to adjust my throw last second and saw it bounce, but that was close."

Diekman just avoided being hit.

"I was shocked — that the ball was thrown, that he was running at all — but it was my bad for not getting out of the way," Diekman said. "It ended the game and it didn't hit me, so we're good."

A night after he was out of the starting lineup for the first time all season, the 2017 American League MVP homered twice, including the last of three straight by the Astros in the sixth inning, to lift Houston to a 5-1 win over the Tampa Bay Rays on Wednesday night.

Altuve, who pinch-hit in the ninth inning on Tuesday night, said getting a little break gave him a chance to regroup.

"It felt good. It's always good to sit down and think about how you feel," he said. "And I came back

The game was tied in the bottom of the sixth when

George Springer's 15th homer this season made it 2-1. Two pitches later Alex Bregman sent an 87 mph slider from Rays' starter Nathan Eovaldi (1-3) into the seats in left field for his 11th home run.

But the Astros weren't done yet, as Altuve put one on the train tracks atop left field for the second time on Wednesday night to push the lead to 4-1. It was the first time the Astros had hit three home runs in a row since May 2, 2008 when Miguel Tejada, Lance Berkman and Carlos Lee did it against the Milwaukee Brewers.

Altuve got a little amp up after seeing the balls by Springer and Bregman leave the yard, and once he got in a hitter's count he was looking for a ball to drive.

"There was a lot going on in that inning and I got a little excited," he said.

It was a welcome display of power for a team which managed just five singles in a 2-1 loss to the Rays on Tuesday night that snapped Houston's 12-game winning streak. Wednesday night's win made the Astros the first team to reach 50 victories this season.

"It was a pretty electrifying crowd after three home runs one after another after another," manager A.J. Hinch said. "Obviously, it was a huge inning for us. What energy that got put back into the building and also our team. Pretty imnressive "

Houston starter Charlie Morton (9-1) allowed just two hits and one unearned run in six innings for the win.

Fletcher's bat helps Arkansas beat Red Raiders 7-4 at CWS

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Dominic Fletcher was a freshman All-American in 2017 and so impressive in the fall practices that coach Dave Van Horn thought Arkansas might have another Andrew Benintendi in the making.

A month into the season, though, Fletcher was batting .190 and led the team in strikeouts.

All that was a distant memory Wednesday when he went 4 for 4 with a homer and four RBIs to help deliver a 7-4 win over Texas Tech that put the Razorbacks in control of their bracket at the College World Series.

The difference?

"Just sticking with the approach and not trying to do too much," Fletcher said. "Just a couple different things in my swing. But mostly just being relaxed up there and not getting too jumpy."

Fletcher doubled in two runs in the first inning, homered in the fourth, had a bunt single in the sixth and singled in a run in the eighth. His average has jumped more than 100 points, to .296, and he's become an integral part of an Arkansas lineup that is one of the most potent in the nation.

"He slowly climbed out of it, a little here, and little there, and down the stretch the last 45 days he's been pretty good," Van Horn said. "He'll have a game where it doesn't look good and he'll have a game like today and he'll hit three or four balls on the screws."

Arkansas (46-19) mostly held in check the Red Raiders (45-19), who had come into the game scoring 8.2 runs per game and batting .311. Their six hits were their fewest in 19 games, and their 14 strikeouts were three fewer than the season-high 17 they had in a 5-1 loss at Arkansas in April.

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

Dear Guilty Smoker: No, you don't have an obligation to your girlfriend to quit smoking. You have an obligation to yourself. Every cigarette you smoke cuts your life expectancy by approximately 10 minutes, and the life of a smoker is, on average, 10 years shorter than that of someone who has never smoked. The great news is that if you quit smoking today, you can undo a good deal of that damage. According

Prabhat Jha, director of the Centre for Global Health Research at St. Michael's Hospital, "quitting smoking before age 40, and preferably well before 40, gives back

almost all of the decade of lost life from continued smoking." That doesn't mean you should keep lighting up through your 39th year, however. Jha adds: "Former smokers still have a greater risk of dying sooner than people who never smoked. But the risk is small compared to the huge risk for those who continue to

As for e-cigarettes, the American Lung Association writes: "We don't presently know what is in

e-cigarettes. However, in initial lab tests conducted in 2009 the FDA found detectable levels of toxic cancer-causing chemicals, including an ingredient used in anti-freeze, in two leading brands of e-cigarettes and 18 various cartridges. ... A 2014 study found that aerosol from e-cigarettes ... contains ... formaldehyde." In other words, e-cigarettes contain cancer-causing chemicals and addictive nicotine. Why substitute one crummy habit with another?

a substantial loss. An example of how a declarer can take advantage of such a situation is

bled the slam contract, and it was no great feat for declarer to deduce, after he saw dummy, that the double had to be based on the expectancy of taking

two trump tricks. South therefore proceeded to play the hand on the assumption that West held the K-Q-6 of trumps. He won the heart lead, played a diamond to the ten and ruffed the eight of hearts.

Declarer next led a diamond to the queen and ruffed the king of hearts! He then eashed the K-A of clubs, ruffed a club, crossed to the ace of diamonds and ruffed dummy's

last club. By this time, 10 tricks had been played - four rounds of clubs and three rounds each of hearts and diamonds. South's last three cards were the A-J-10 of spades, while West held the K-Q-6. The stage was set for the

coup de grâce. Declarer now led the jack of spades, and West was a goner. He could take only one trick, so the doubled slam was made.

We don't think much of West's double. It wasn't reasonable to suppose South would go down more than one. The potential gain from the double thus figured to be 100 points, while the possible loss from the double, if it enabled declarer to make the contract, came to 1,760 points. There was obviously much more to lose by doubling, so West should have provided by today's deal. West douremained silent. Tomorrow: Test your play.


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




Today's Highlight in History: On June 21, 1788, the United States Constitution went into effect as New Hampshire became the ninth state to ratify

On this date:

In 1377, King Edward III died after ruling England for 50 years; he was succeeded by his grandson, Richard II.

Hall In 1834, Cyrus McCormick received a patent for his reaping machine.

In 1932, heavyweight Max Schmeling lost a title fight rematch in New York by decision to Jack Sharkey, prompting Schmeling's manager, Joe Jacobs, to exclaim: "We was robbed!"

In 1942, German forces led by Generaloberst (Colonel General) Erwin Rommel captured the Libyan city of Tobruk during World War II. (Rommel was promoted to the rank of Field Marshal; Tobruk was retaken by the Allies in November 1942.) An Imperial Japanese submarine fired shells at Fort Stevens on the Oregon coast, causing little damage.

In 1943, Army nurse Lt. Edith Greenwood became the first woman to receive the Soldier's Medal for showing heroism during a fire at a military hospital in Yuma, Arizona.

In 1948, the Republican national convention opened in Philadelphia. (The delegates ended up choosing Thomas E. Dewey to be their presidential nominee.) In 1963, Cardinal Giovanni

Battista Montini was chosen during a conclave of his fellow cardinals to succeed the late Pope John XXIII; the new pope took the name Paul VI. In 1964, civil rights workers

Michael H. Schwerner, Andrew Goodman and James E. Chaney were slain in Philadelphia, Mississippi; their bodies were found buried in an earthen dam six weeks later. (Forty-one years later on this date in 2005, Edgar Ray Killen, an 80-yearold former Ku Klux Klansman, was found guilty of manslaughter; he was sentenced to 60 years in prison, where he died in January 2018.)

In 1977, Menachem Begin (men-AH'-kem BAY'-gihn) of the Likud bloc became Israel's

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


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
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Neymar to start in unchanged Brazil team to face Costa Rica

ST. PETERSBURG, Russia (AP) Nevmar will start for Brazil in an unchanged lineup against Costa Rica on Friday at the World

Although Brazil coach Tite said Neymar still needs time to reach peak shape, he insisted he is not endangering the striker's health.

"Yes, he will be playing. There's no sacrifice here," Tite said through a translator Thursday. "We want to win but the coach is not going to play around with a player's health, the price would be too high to pay."

Tite also said he would use the same 11 players that were held to a 1-1 draw by Switzerland in the team's opening match.

Neymar limped out of a training session on Tuesday after appearing to hurt his right ankle. But on Wednesday, the Brazilian soccer confederation posted photos and a video of Neymar training with the rest of the squad and said he was fine.

"It's an evolutionary process. You need to speed up the steps,' Tite said. "He's already speeded up that process."

The world's most expensive player, who joined Paris Saint-Germain for 222 million euros (\$260 million) from Barcelona, only just made it to the World Cup after breaking a toe in his right foot on Feb. 25.

After recovering from surgery, Neymar played in two World Cup warm-up matches and scored in both to take his international tally to 55 goals.

But he lacked sharpness when Brazil opened its World Cup campaign with the draw against Switzerland on Sunday. Although Neymar was fouled 10 times during that match, he was still noticeably below his best.

On Thursday, Tite became angered after he was asked if he had spoken personally with Neymar to encourage him to be more unself-

"Absolutely not. The information you got is not true," Tite shouted, his voice rising steeply as he called it a lie. "That didn't happen."

He then said it would be pointless to restrict Neymar's way of play-

"I'm not going to take his initiative away from him in the last third of the field, take away his genius," Tite said. "The last third of the field is where you chances, and I'm not from anyone."

Anything but victory could leave Brazil, one Russia, in a difficult position to advance from the group

Serbia leads Group E with

three points after beating Costa Rica 1-0 and next plays Switzerland in Kaliningrad on Friday. Serbia and Brazil then meet on Wednesday in Moscow.

Brazil has no margin for error against Costa Rica, which won its group at the last World Cup and reached the quarterfinals.

"It is a decisive game, of course," said Tite, who sat next to defender Thiago Silva. "You can't run

Silva will take over as captain from left back Marcelo because Tite is rotating the job. Silva was Brazil's captain four years ago, when he was criticized for breaking down before a penalty shootout in the round of 16.

In Russia, he's urging his teammates to be brave.

"The team is fully aware of what we are going to be facing tomorrow," he said. "They didn't start well but they are ready to recover. The fight is on."
