

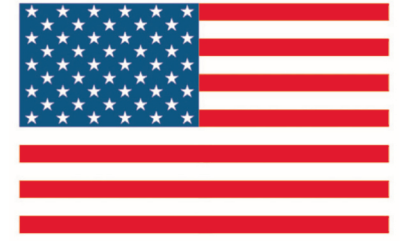

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## Fatal accident claims two, leaves one in critical condition

Two Big Spring residents are dead and a third is in critical condition following a wreck in Crosby County, Texas. The accident occurred just outside of Ralls, Texas.

Brayden Sizenbach, 18, a recent Big Spring High School graduate, was pronounced dead at the scene, while Nova Montgomery, 50, succumbed to her injuries on the way to the hospital. Montgomery's daughter, Austyn Montgomery, 16,

who just finished her sophomore year at Coahoma High School, is listed in critical condition at University Medical Center's Pediatric Intensive Care Unit in Lubbock.

"On June 24 at 9:22am we had a one vehicle roll over. The vehicle was heading north bound on State Highway 207 in Crosby County, just South of Ralls. The vehicle was driven by Nova Lea Montgomery. The driver was heading North on 207 where she drifted off into the grass, onto the median and then over-corrected, causing the vehicle

to roll," said Lieutenant Bryan Witt of the Lubbock County DPS. "The vehicle came to rest on the drivers side in the middle of the highway. Both Nova and Brayden were pronounced deceased at the scene by Judge Nancy Stone. Austyn was then transported to University Medical Center's Pediatric Intensive Care Unit with critical injuries, where she remains at this time. At this point, there is no information regarding the cause as they will continue investigating."

## Reliever route - Airpark connections on City Council agenda Tuesday

The Big Spring City Council will discuss connections between the U.S. 87 reliever route west of Big Spring and the McMahon-Wrinkle Airpark at their meeting Tuesday evening.

The council will meet at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday in their chambers, 307 E. Fourth St.

The reliever route connection issue is listed on the meeting's agenda as "Discussion and Consideration of West Texas Connector Project Entrances from the Reliever Route in to the Airpark Property and Permission to Create a Reliever Route Access Roads Committee."

According to a memorandum from City Manager Todd Darden to Mayor Larry McLellan and the members of the Big Spring City Council, provided as supplemental information with the agenda, city staff recommends the creation of a five-person agenda to assist with the project.

"This Project is broken up into three (3) phases:" the memo says. "Phase I includes a proposed route extending east from the intersection with Stallings Road, Phase II includes a route that circles around the north side of the airport where it ties into the Business 20 Loop, and Phase III

## Donations, volunteering surge at border asylum-seeker center

MCALLEN, Texas — One by one, around Father's Day, the surge of Amazon boxes containing shirts, pants, underwear and many other items began arriving at an asylum-seeker rest center in the border

town of McAllen, Texas.

Included in the packages were notes of support. One read: "As someone who has a dad who would do anything for their child I hope this helps a few of the dads that come through your doors with the same ideas."

The boxes started arriving as people across the country began to learn about President Donald Trump's policy of separating children from their families.

"All of the sudden they started getting like a thousand boxes a day and then more and then more. And they had to come and secure space here and that filled up and they got another space and that filled up," said Natalie Montelongo, a native of nearby Brownsville who flew in from Washington, D.C., to volunteer at the center. She set up an Amazon wish list with items needed by the shelter and posted the link on

social media.

Now, the immigrant respite center run by Catholic Charities of the Rio Grande Valley has received so many boxes that it had to rent additional storage space.

"I feel like each one of these boxes represents one person that wishes

includes a route that continues through the existing airpark on Airpark Drive and 1st Avenue that would extend to the south and connect to the new U.S. 87 Reliever Route."

According to the memo, the committee would be responsible for researching and recommending priorities for the different phases, funding and partnerships.

In other business, the council plans to earmark \$750,800 from the city's General Fund for the city's share of a joint law enforcement radio project with Howard County.

The purchase of the radio system is planned for Fiscal Year 2018-2019, but an unexpected windfall from mineral royalties has prompted the city to consider setting aside part of the cost of the system early.

"Whereas, the expenditure for the City in the Joint County/City Digital Radio System is planned for the 2018/2019 fiscal year," reads the text of the proposed ordinance up for consideration at Tuesday's meeting. "Whereas, the General Fund balance is forecasted to have a higher than originally budgeted growth due to mineral royalty revenue being higher than forecasted in the 2017-2018 fiscal year. Whereas, the City Council wishes to set aside \$750,800 of General Fund fund balance in the 2017-18 year to be used for purchase of radios in the 2018-19 year or when needed in a later fiscal year if the start date is pushed beyond September 30, 2018."

The proposed ordinance goes on to direct the city manager to set aside the funds as "committed fund balance" dedicated to the project.

Council members will also consider granting permission to seek bids on road base material; and accepting bids on two half-ton pickup trucks and 164 1 1/2 yard dumpsters.

The road base material would be used to build the entrance road to the new "Big Sandy" landfill planned to go into operation when the city's current landfill is full.

City staff's recommendation on the two pickup trucks is to Cavender Chevrolet of Boerne, Texas. Cavender had the low bid in the process: \$21,957.34 each for two 2018 Chevy Silverado 1500s; a grand total of \$43,914.68. Four other bids were received by the city during the bid process.

The recommended bid by Rolloffs USA for the dumpsters was also the low bid. Out of three bids received, Rolloffs bid \$431.24 per container, significantly less than the next lowest bid of \$499.25 per container. Rolloffs' total for all 164 containers is \$70,722.72.

# In sign of detente, North Korea skips annual anti-US rally

PYONGYANG, North Korea — In another sign of detente following the summit between leader Kim Jong Un and U.S. President Donald Trump, North Korea has decided to skip one of the most symbolic and politically charged events of its calendar: the annual "anti-U.S. imperialism" rally marking the start of the Korean War.

Fist-pumping, flag-waving and slogan-shouting masses of Pyongyang residents normally assemble each year for the rally to kick off a month of anti-U.S., Korean War-focused events designed to strengthen nationalism and unity. It all culminates on July 27, which North Korea celebrates as a national holiday called the day of "Victory in the Fatherland Liberation War."

Last year's event was held in Kim Il Sung Square with a reported 100,000 people attending. North Korea even issued special anti-U.S. postage stamps.

Officials had no on-the-record comment on the decision not to hold the event this year. But Associated Press staff in the North Korean capital confirmed Monday that it would not be held.

North Korea has noticeably toned down its anti-Washington rhetoric over the past several months to create a more conciliatory atmosphere for the summit and avoid souring attempts by both sides to reduce tensions and increase dialogue.

North Korea's state media were filled with reports, photos and video of the June 12 meeting between Trump and Kim in Singapore.

A 42-minute documentary-style news special was aired on the state television network two days after the summit and has been repeated frequently since, meaning that by now there are probably few North Koreans who are unaware of

the changes in the air. For many North Koreans, the program was also quite likely the first time they had ever seen what Trump looks like.

Still, North Korea's handling of the changes and how it presents them to its people remains highly nuanced.

So far, it hasn't said much about what Washington is interested in the most — denuclearization. But it has made significantly fewer references to its need to have nuclear weapons than it was making last year, when Kim was test-launching long-range missiles at a record pace and tensions with Washington neared the boiling point.

North Korea's decidedly less strident posture these days underscores the delicate position it finds itself in after decades of touting the United States as its archenemy.

State media referred to Trump quite deferentially in their reports of the summit, calling him by his full name and adding the title of president of the United States of America — itself a somewhat jarring contrast to the way it normally spits out merely the surname of U.S. officials, with no titles.

Considering how its relations with Washington could quickly slip back into acrimony if the difficult process of negotiating denuclearization and the lifting of trade sanctions breaks down, it remains unclear how much, or if at all, North Korea intends to recalibrate its other propaganda and indoctrination efforts.

Getting rid of all the anti-American propaganda would be a Herculean task.

The 1950-53 Korean War, and the devastation the country suffered at the hands of the U.S. and its allies, remain a major part of every North Korean's education.

Negative portrayals of Americans as big-nosed goblins are a common sight at elementary schools and kindergartens and exhortations to beware of American

aggression, deceit and brutality are a staple message of textbooks and at "class education" centers around the country. Anti-American slogans can also still be seen in Pyongyang and throughout the countryside, though they are not that numerous.

they were here and is following the issue and that cares," Montelongo said.

But donations also came the old fashioned way, too. Local residents stopping by and dropping off what they could and caravans of volunteers from around the country who made the journey to McAllen in Texas Rio Grande Valley packed with donations and cash.

Every day, busloads of migrants are transferred from federal facilities to a central station in McAllen. There, volunteers from the respite shelter help find the right buses and purchase bus tickets. As a group, they then walk to the shelter three blocks away, where they can shower, eat, and pick up new clothes, medicine and hygiene products.

Colorado librarian Wyne Cler saw a Facebook post from a friend's friend asking for volunteers to help. Even with her limited Spanish, she jumped at the chance, raised \$4,000 in one day and brought her daughter. She spent hours trying her best to help migrants at the center and trying to cheer up their day with hearty hugs and laughter. Cler and her family fled Vietnam as the war ended, she said.

"This is not my America. When we came in '75 we were welcomed with open arms. And we were not separated. My entire family got here safely," Cler said.

On a typical day, more than 100 asylum-seekers are released from McAllen-area holding facilities, clutching their belongings in clear plastic bags stamped with Department of Homeland Security logos, said Norma Pimentel, executive director of Catholic Charities of the Rio Grande Valley.

Now, Pimentel is trying to channel some of the help into cash donations so they can construct a new building by their church. The rest center currently rents its space.

The center also needs more volunteers to keep up with the flow of people and donations, and it needs additional medicine for babies. Montelongo said the center has seen several babies arriving sick.

"I'm so devoted to this respite because I think it's the first glimpse of what we all think the U.S. stands for," Montelongo said.

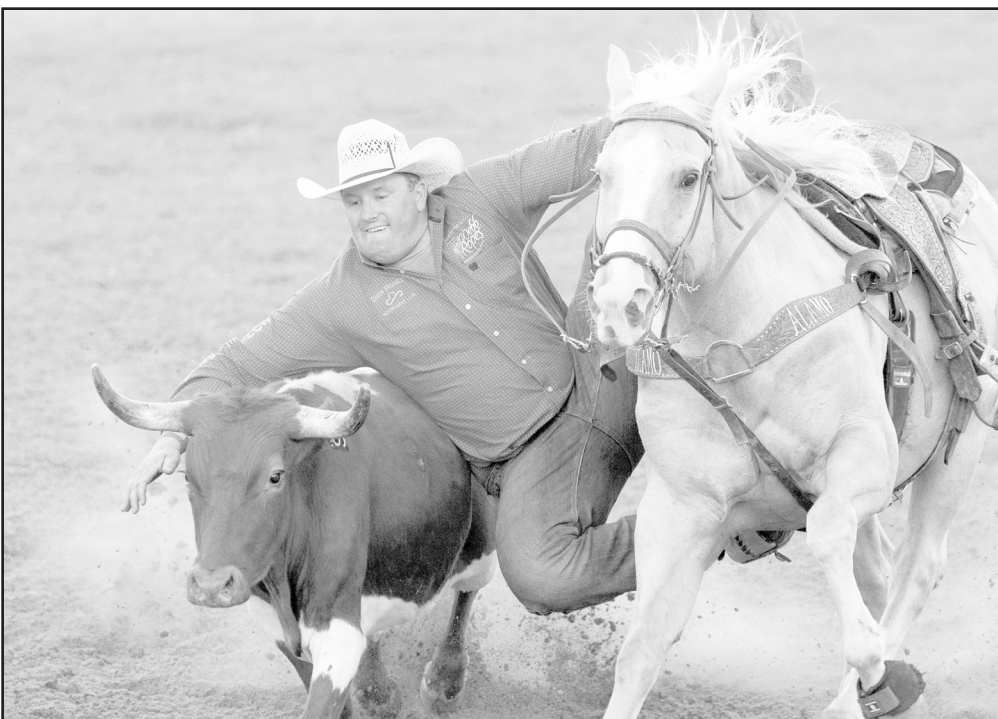

# Even with 2 wins, Mexico's place in next round not secure

YEKATERINBURG, Russia — Seven teams have won their first two World Cup matches, and six of them are through to the next round.

The exception is Mexico.

El Tri still may need points to secure a place in the round of 16 for a seventh consecutive World Cup.

Victories over defending champion Germany and South Korea weren't quite enough. If Sweden beats Mexico on Wednesday and Germany beats South Korea, three teams would be tied atop Group F with six points, sending it to tiebreakers that start with the best goal differential.

Mexico goalkeeper Guillermo Ochoa said there wasn't any panic when he and his teammates learned they had unfinished business in their final game.

"We knew that we were going to play for first place against Sweden," Ochoa told reporters Sunday. "This result wasn't going to change anything."

If Mexico and South Korea both win, Mexico would win the group and every other team would be tied with three points.

Sweden hasn't made it to the second round since 2006. And like Mexico, six points wouldn't necessarily be enough to advance. The Swedes might end up needing to win by two goals, depending on what Germany does.

Mexico upset South Korea 1-0 in its opener and then dispatched Sweden 2-1. It looked like those results would be enough for Mexico to advance, but then Toni Kroos scored deep into extra time to give Germany a 2-1 win over Sweden, setting up the

various scenarios that will come into play during Tuesday's simultaneous matches.

### SHOW OF SUPPORT

Swedish midfielder Jimmy Durmaz was subject-

ed to racial attacks from fans on social media after the loss to Germany. Durmaz entered the game as a substitute, and his foul gave Germany the free kick that set up Kroos' game-winner.

Durmaz was born in Sweden to ethnic Assyrian parents who emigrated from Turkey. He's been called a "terrorist," and vitriol has also been directed at his family. The online abuse was reported to police.

In a show of unity, the team and coach Janne Andersson stood with Durmaz as the player read a statement Sunday before a training session, calling the attacks "completely unacceptable."

"I am proud to play in the Swedish national team," Durmaz said. "I will never let any racists destroy that pride. We must all stand against all forms of racism."

### SCORING DIFFICULTY

A two-goal victory by Sweden would guarantee it a spot in the next round. But that's easier said than done.

Sweden has just two goals for the tournament, by Andreas Granqvist and Ola Toivonen.

Marcus Berg, who had eight goals in qualifying, has been held scoreless despite a team-high six scoring opportunities through two games.

### WALL OF OCHOA

While Mexico's defense has been solid, Ochoa is the biggest reason that El Tri have given up just one goal in the tournament.

Known by supporters as "The Great Wall of Ochoa," he has been a steady presence for Mexico and has a tournament-high 14 saves. He stopped nine shots against Germany and five against South Korea. Denmark's Kasper Schmeichel is next with 10 saves.

Suppose you're declarer at four hearts on today's deal, and West leads the ace of diamonds followed by a low club. That's exactly what happened when teams from the U.S. and Great Britain clashed in the 1984 women's world championship.

There's no way of knowing at this point how you'll ultimately fare, because the outcome depends on how the missing trumps and spades are divided. The British declarer, Sally Horton, won the club shift with dummy's ace and led a heart to her ace, disclosing the horrendous 5-0 trump

break. Undaunted, she next cashed the king of clubs and led a spade to the queen. West playing the three and East the ten.

Mrs. Horton then ruffed a club, led a diamond to the king and ruffed the ten of diamonds, producing this position:

♦ 9

♦ K 9 8 4  
♥ Q

Needing three more tricks to make her contract, Mrs. Horton cashed the queen of trumps and exited with a low spade. It did not matter whether East or West won the trick — either way, dummy was certain to score the K-10 of trumps and so make four hearts.

If East won the spade, she would have to return a trump into dummy's K-10. And if East took the spade with the ace, West would have to ruff any return by her partner and would then be forced to make the same suicidal trump return into dummy's K-10.

Mrs. Horton thus demonstrated — once again — that no matter how bleak the outlook might be, perseverance will often reap a just reward.

This Date In History

Today is Monday, June 25, the 176th day of 2018. There are 189 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On June 25, 1868, Congress passed an Omnibus Act allowing for the readmission of Florida, Alabama, Louisiana, Georgia, North Carolina and South Carolina to the Union. On this date: In 1788, Virginia ratified the U.S. Constitution. In 1876, Lt. Col. Colonel George A. Custer and his 7th Cavalry were wiped out by Sioux and Cheyenne Indians in the Battle of the Little Bighorn in Montana. In 1910, President William Howard Taft signed the White-Slave Traffic Act, more popularly known as the Mann Act, which made it illegal to transport women across state lines for "immoral" purposes. In 1938, the Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938 was enacted. In 1947, "The Diary of a Young Girl," the personal journal of Anne Frank, a German-born Jewish girl hiding with her family from the Nazis in Amsterdam during World War II, was first published. In 1950, war broke out in Korea as forces from the communist North invaded the South. In 1967, the Beatles performed and recorded their new song "All You Need Is Love" during the closing segment of "Our World," the first-ever live international telecast which was carried by satellite from 14 countries. In 1973, former White House Counsel John W. Dean began testifying before the Senate Watergate Committee, implicating top administration officials, including President Richard Nixon as well as himself, in the Watergate scandal and cover-up. In 1981, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that male-only draft registration was constitutional. In 1993, Kim Campbell was sworn in as Canada's 19th prime minister, the first woman to hold the post. In 1998, the U.S. Supreme Court rejected a line-item veto law as unconstitutional, and ruled that HIV-infected people were protected by the Americans with Disabilities Act. In 2009, death claimed Michael Jackson, the "King of Pop," in Los Angeles at age 50 and actress Farrah

Fawcett in Santa Monica, California, at age 62. Ten years ago: A divided U.S. Supreme Court struck down a Louisiana law that allowed capital punishment for people convicted of raping children under 12; the ruling also invalidated laws in five other states that allowed executions for child rape that did not result in the death of the victim. A jury in Woburn, Massachusetts, convicted Neil Entwistle of first-degree murder in the deaths of his wife, Rachel, 27, and their 9-month-old baby, Lillian Rose. (Entwistle was sentenced the next day to two life prison terms without possibility of parole.) Five years ago: President Barack Obama declared the debate over climate change and its causes obsolete as he announced at Georgetown University a wide-ranging plan to tackle pollution and prepare communities for global warming. Russian President Vladimir Putin confirmed the whereabouts of National Security Agency leaker Edward Snowden at a Moscow airport, but promptly rejected a U.S. plea to turn him over. Democratic Texas State Senator Wendy Davis began a one-woman filibuster to block a GOP-led effort to impose stringent new abortion restrictions across the nation's second-most populous state. (Republicans voted to end the filibuster minutes before midnight, sparking a chaotic scene with demonstrators who succeeded in forcing lawmakers to miss the deadline for passing the bill.) One year ago: In eastern Pakistan, an overturned oil tanker burst into flames, killing at least 150 people who had rushed to the scene to gather leaking fuel. In the U.S., tens of thousands of people waving rainbow flags lined streets for gay pride parades in coast-to-coast events. Today's Birthdays: Actress June Lockhart is 93. # Weekend sports in brief

## WORLD CUP

NIZHNY NOVGOROD, Russia — With the country's most one-sided World Cup victory, England advanced to the last 16 with a game by spare.

Harry Kane scored a hat trick in Sunday's 6-1 rout of Panama, giving England its biggest victory margin at the World Cup in its highest-scoring game since 1966.

That previous high-scoring affair turned out well, too, with England beating Germany 4-2 to win its only World Cup title.

Four years ago, England failed to win a match at the World Cup and was eliminated in the group stage. On Sunday, England was taking on a weaker team: A Panama side making its World Cup debut. The loss eliminated Panama and Tunisia, while putting Belgium into the round of 16.

Kane's three goals moved him into the lead with five at this year's tournament, one more than Cristiano Ronaldo and Romelu Lukaku after two games.

KAZAN, Russia — Radamel Falcao's first World Cup goal led Colombia to a 3-0 victory over Poland on Sunday and kept the team in the running for a spot in the knockout round.

Falcao had been expected to lead the team at the last World Cup in Brazil, but he injured his knee ahead of the tournament and missed Colombia's run to the quarterfinals. Healthy again, the Monaco striker scored with the outside of his foot in the 70th minute after a superb pass from playmaker Juan Quintero in the back of the defense.

Poland, which has two losses, was eliminated.

Yerry Mina scored the first goal in the 40th and Juan Cuadrado completed the win in the 75th.

## GOLF

CROMWELL, Conn. — Bubba Watson overcame a six-stroke deficit to win his third Travelers Championship title, shooting a 7-under 63 on Sunday for a three-stroke victory at TPC River Highlands.

Watson became the first three-time winner on the PGA Tour this season, and pulled within one of Billy Casper's tournament record of four victories.

Watson finished at 17-under 263. Third-round leader Paul Casey, Stewart Cink, Beau Hossler and J.B. Holmes tied for second. Casey shot 72, Cink 62, Hossler 66 and Holmes 67.

Watson came from six back to win the 2010 event for his first tour title, and beat Casey in a playoff in 2015.

ROGERS, Ark. — Japanese teenager Nasa Hataoka ran away with the NW Arkansas Championship on Sunday for her first PGA Tour title.

The 19-year-old Hataoka won by six strokes, closing with an 8-under 63 at Pinnacle Country Club for a tournament-record 21-under 192 total. She broke the mark of 18 under set last year by So Yeon Ryu.

Hataoka won twice late last year on the Japan LPGA and has finished in the top 10 in five of her last six LPGA Tour stars, including a playoff loss last month in the Kingsmill Championship. Hataoka began the round tied with Minjee Lee for the lead.

Austin Ernst shot a 65 to finish second.

MADISON, Wis. — Scott McCarron won the American Family Insurance Championship on Sunday, closing with an 8-under 64 for a one-stroke victory over hometown player Jerry Kelly.

The 52-year-old McCarron birdied Nos. 14-16 and

parred the final two to hold on for his first victory of the season and seventh in three years on the PGA Tour Champions. He finished at 15-under 201 at University Ridge. Kelly shot 65, also paring the final two holes.

## AUTO RACING

SONOMA, Calif. — Martin Truex Jr. won the NASCAR Cup Series race in Sonoma on Sunday, using a clever pit strategy to cruise to his second career victory on the challenging road course.

Truex easily held off Kevin Harvick for his second win in three weeks and his third victory of the season in his Furniture Row Racing Toyota.

The defending Cup Series champion waited to pit until the 81st lap, a full eight laps later than Harvick. Truex and his crew chief, Cole Pearn, appeared to use a bit of trickery on the decision, bluffing an earlier move to the pits and enticing Harvick into pit lane instead. The decision left fresher tires on Truex's car down the stretch and allowed him to pass Harvick for the lead around the final hairpin turn with 20 laps to go.

ELKHART LAKE, Wis. — Pole sitter Josef Newgarden dominated the IndyCar race at Road America on Sunday, leading 53 of 55 laps for his third victory of the season.

The defending series champion crossed the finish line with a comfortable 3.38-second cushion over second-place finisher Ryan Hunter-Reay. Points leader Scott Dixon finished third, part of the three-car pack that separated from the field with about 13 laps to go in the road race.

The victory completed an impressive weekend for the Team Penske driver at the 14-turn, 222-mile-long track, where Newgarden's No. 1 Chevy registered the top speed in in practice. He returned to the podium following a five-race stretch finishing no higher than eighth, dropping him from first to fifth in the driver standings.

LE CASTELLET, France — Lewis Hamilton capitalized on a mistake by rival Sebastian Vettel to enjoy a wire-to-wire victory at the French Grand Prix on Sunday and retake the lead in the Formula One title race.

Starting third behind Hamilton and Mercedes

teammate Valtteri Bottas, Vettel tried to use his faster set of tires to make a good start. But the German's lunge on the inside of the first corner crunched his Ferrari into the back of Bottas, damaging both cars and sending them into the pits for repairs. Vettel emerged with a new front wing and the entire field to fight through, and even though he made quick work of the slower cars he had to settle for a fifth-place finish.

Red Bull's Max Verstappen and Kimi Raikkonen in his Ferrari crossed second and third to complete the podium at the Paul Ricard Circuit. Red Bull's Daniel Ricciardo was fourth.

BEAVER DAM, Wis. — Sprint car driver Jason Johnson died following a crash at Beaver Dam Raceway in Wisconsin, race officials said Sunday. He was 41.

Johnson was injured during a World of Outlaws race Saturday night at the 1/3-mile-long dirt oval, the series said. It said the driver from Eunice, Louisiana, crashed on lap 18 of a 40-lap race while racing for the lead and was taken to a hospital.

The series posted a message Sunday morning on Twitter saying that Johnson had died.

## TENNIS

HALLE, Germany — Borna Coric defeated defending champion Roger Federer 7-6 (6), 3-6, 6-2 to win the Gerry Weber Open final on Sunday.

The 21-year-old Croat saved three of the four break points he faced and took his second match point to end Federer's 20-match winning streak on grass for his second career title.

Coric, who defeated second-seeded Alexander Zverev in the first round, saved two set points in the first set tiebreaker.

Federer, who skipped the entire clay-court season for the second year in a row, had been going for his 99th title, one week after taking his 18th grass-court title in Stuttgart. It would have been a record-extending 10th title from his 12th final in Halle.

LONDON — Marin Cilic saved a match point on his way to defeating Novak Djokovic 5-7, 7-6 (4), 6-3 on Sunday as he claimed a second Queen's Club title.

The top-seeded Croat first won the Wimbledon warmup event in 2012, but was the runner-up in 2013 and also lost to Feliciano Lopez in last year's final. Having saved six break points, Djokovic struck with the first chance of his own to clinch a draining 67-minute first set, before a reversal of fortunes in the second.

The 12-time Grand Slam champion wasted an early opportunity to break before Cilic saved a match point at 4-5 and then won six points from 4-1 down in the tiebreaker to level the match. Cilic produced a stunning forehand passing shot on his way to breaking for a 5-3 lead in the decider and then delivered a nerveless service game to close out the match in just under three hours.

## HOCKEY

The Washington Capitals have re-signed John Carlson to a \$64 million, eight-year contract that allows the Stanley Cup champions to keep the do-it-all defenseman.

Carlson will count \$8 million against the salary cap through the 2026-27 season. General manager Brian MacLellan announced the deal Sunday.

The 28-year-old who has made the Washington area his home and wanted to stay if there was a fit. The Capitals got the cap space necessary to re-sign Carlson by trading veteran defenseman Brooks Orpik and backup goaltender Philipp Grubauer on Friday night at the NHL draft.

Carlson outperformed his last deal that paid him just under \$4 million a season and was at his best in a contract year. He led all defensemen with 68 points in the regular season and 20 in the playoffs to help Washington win the Metropolitan Division and then the Stanley Cup. The contract makes Carlson the second-highest-paid player on the Capitals behind Alex Ovechkin.
